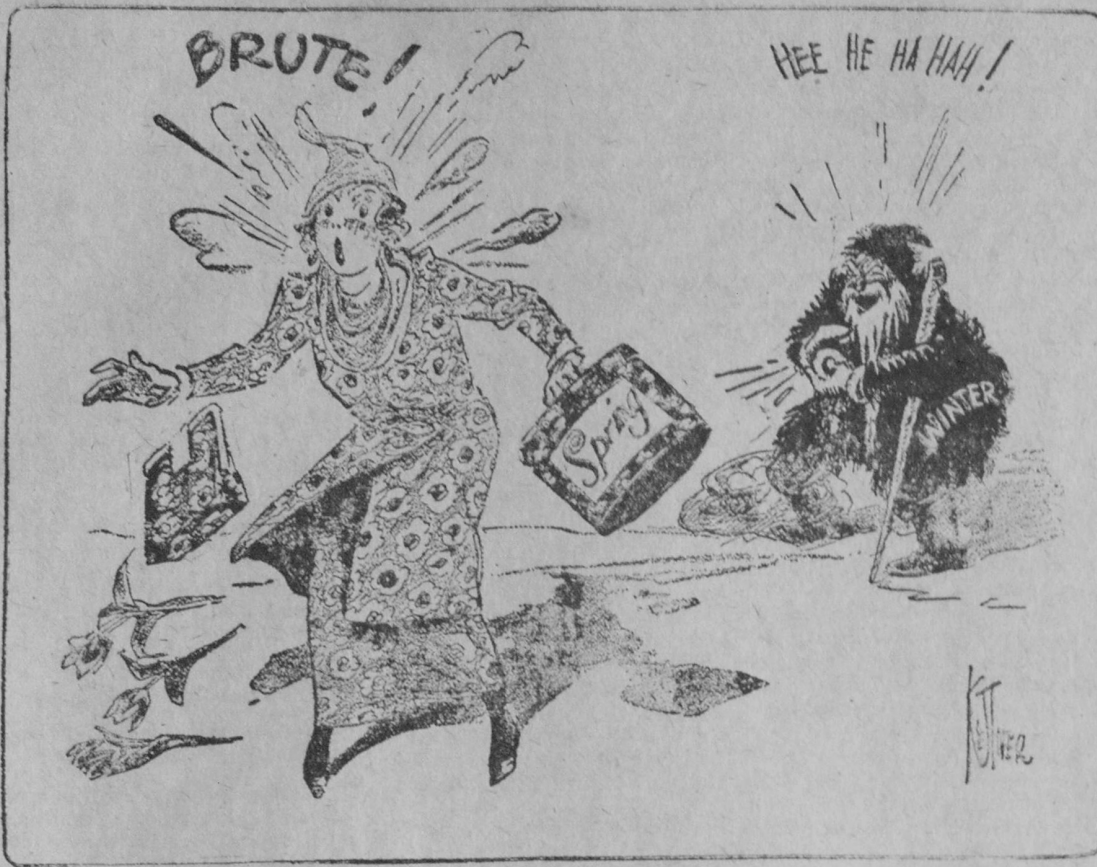


Old Man Winter Had Parting Sock at Spring and State



Old man winter just does not know when to leave. Michigan and other Midwestern States were rocked Monday and Tuesday with another spring storm, which left an accumulation of more than five inches of snow in this area.

All schools of the county were closed Tuesday morning and students took the opportunity to unwrap snowmobiles, most of which had been stored away for the expected warmer weather.

The storm was accompanied by a northeast wind, which reached near gale proportions at 35 miles per hour. As a result, the already battered shoreline of Lake Huron and Saginaw Bay took another pounding for four straight days. The wind at that quarter again raised the water level of Saginaw Bay and caused severe flooding in Bay and Arenac Counties, where the Michigan National Guard was on duty assisting shoreline residents fleeing from advancing water.

Flooding is not as serious in Iosco County as it is in the Lower Saginaw Bay region, but this county has been included in a region now being considered for federal disaster assistance.

The most serious problem here is the damage to seawalls, shoreline and some residences which have been built close to the shore. Storms

last year caused thousands of dollars in damage to the shoreline area between East Tawas and Oscoda, while Tawas Bay frontage from Tawas Point to Alabaster Township has taken a severe pounding.

The United States Army Corps of Engineers recently distributed 25,000 sand bags in Iosco County to protect property against flooding. An AuSable Point resident reported to the Herald Monday that he and his crew had filled 1,600 sand bags over the weekend and placed them along the shoreline in front of his home. "The protection provided by the sand bags is working out beautifully," stated Harry Cook of AuSable Point Road.

Governor Milliken has asked President Nixon to declare 12 flood-ravaged Michigan counties as major disaster areas. Included in the area being considered is Iosco County.

The first request came during the period of November 14-16, followed by a similar request on March 23, which followed a major storm the week previous.

It was estimated the flooding caused more than 16 million dollars in damage in the 12 counties. Milliken asked that the following counties be designated as disaster areas: Berrien, Arenac, Bay, Huron, Iosco, Saginaw, Sanilac, St. Clair, Tuscola, Macomb, Monroe and Wayne.

In the meantime, county and city

snow removal crews were hard at work Tuesday clearing main thoroughfares of snow dropped in the night storm. By 10:00 a. m. Tuesday, the snow had stopped falling, but crews and equipment were having difficulty moving the heavy blanket of snow left from the all-night storm.



Property Owners Now Eligible for Flood Insurance

Baldwin Township residents were eligible to apply for federal flood insurance policies beginning Monday, according to Howard Burdett, township trustee.

Baldwin, the first governmental unit in Iosco County to apply for the federal insurance program, was made eligible last week by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, according to information from George Berstein, federal insurance administrator.

Baldwin Township officials had applied for eligibility in February and about 150 property owners could benefit from the insurance program.

The program covers those lands which are being flooded, principally at Tawas Point and Tawas Lake. At

present, the federal program does not provide insurance for landowners with wind-driven water and erosion problems, which is the principal concern in this area.

Residents may apply for the subsidized insurance through any local insurance agent handling Insurance Company of North America policies. The company's Michigan office is located at Detroit.

All existing structures are eligible for insurance if signed within 30 days, April 9 to May 9, and the policy becomes effective immediately. After that time, there is a 15-day waiting period for the policy to become effective.

All new structures built after April 9 are eligible for insurance. However, Burdett said that persons building in a flood hazard area may pay a higher rate.

The maximum coverage on residential construction is \$17,500 for single family dwellings and \$30,000 for multiple family and other types of buildings. Contents may be insured up to \$5,000.

Opened Busy April Session Tuesday

Iosco Board of Commissioners opened its April session Tuesday morning and is set to continue Thursday.

Major work of the session will be to adopt a tax roll footing report, equalization of the county's tax base and adoption of a preliminary budget for 1973-1974.

The county road commission was to make its annual report Tuesday afternoon. It was expected that a report would be given on a bridge construction program in the county utilizing federal revenue sharing funds.

Kenneth Wojahn Attended Institute for Fire Instructors

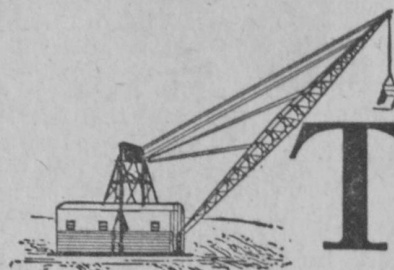

Skydiver Plunged to Death from Altitude of 5,500 Feet

A skydiver from Wurtsmith Air Force Base, whose main parachute apparently failed to function properly, plunged to his death late Friday afternoon after jumping from a height of 5,500 feet above the Iosco County Airport.

Dead is SSGT. Dennis V. DeFir, 25, 3038 US-23, whose wife, Susan, witnessed the tragedy from the ground. Investigating Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers said that a preliminary investigation by personnel from Wurtsmith Air Force Base

indicated that DeFir's parachute may have been packed improperly, but a report Monday indicated that the parachute had been packed properly. Officers said that DeFir apparently made no attempt to pull the ring on his reserve chute.

DeFir and Edward Collier of East Tawas were skydiving from a plane piloted by Robert Schmidt, East Tawas, and were trying to hit a target.

Collier told sheriff's officers he

jumped behind DeFir at an altitude of 5,500 feet. Both men were members of a skydiving club which meets at the airport.

Searchers found DeFir's body about one hour after the tragedy. The body was found face down about one-half mile west of the airport and 100 feet northeast of Auierich Road.

Investigating officers said that the ring had been pulled on the main parachute. The canopy and nylon risers had blossomed out of the pack and were draped over a small tree near the body. The unused reserve chute, with its ring still in place, was under the body.

He was married to the former Susan Bellville of Whittemore last November.

DeFir was born August 14, 1947, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and entered the air force 6½ years ago.

The funeral was held Monday at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Chapel. The body was taken to Virginia Beach, Virginia, where a memorial service is to be held today (Wednesday). Burial is to be at Virginia Beach.

Fisherman Died of Heart Attack

Death of Sturley J. Arthur, 43, Flint, whose body was found Saturday morning floating in Saginaw Bay, Arenac County, was attributed to a heart attack.

Arthur was last seen about 10:30 p. m. Friday dipping smelt south of Sims Road, AuGres Township. His three companions had returned to shore to change clothing. When they returned, the Flint man was missing.

State police said that the victim had recently been released from the hospital where he was treated for a heart condition. An autopsy was ordered by Arenac officials.

Residents Have Opportunity to Learn About TA Proposal

Residents of Tawas Area School District are invited to learn details of an upcoming bonding proposal at a meeting of the board of education Monday, April 16, 8:00 p. m., at the high school cafeteria.

On hand to explain details and answer questions will be the board of education, administrators and representatives of the school's architectural firm.

A \$5,365,643 bond issue is to go before district voters at a special election Monday, May 14. The proposed bond issue would finance construction of a new high school and renovation of the Tawas City Elementary

Unit.

This proposal has been in the discussion stage since last fall and a formal decision to adopt a resolution to place this comprehensive school building program before voters was taken only last week by the board of education.

The proposed bond issue would be for a period of 30 years and, with the district's present state equalized valuation, would require a tax levy of seven mills to retire the bonds.

However, present and future valuation growth of the district is expected to reduce the millage required to retire the bonds.

Earlier this year, the board of education reached the conclusion that construction of a new high school was the only answer to the district's serious problem of overcrowded classrooms. The present high school would be used as a middle school for grades five through eight.

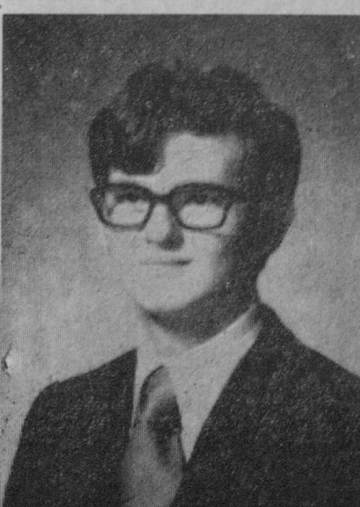
Estimated cost of the new high school with 39 teaching stations is \$4,648,000. It would include a new gymnasium, auditorium and swimming pool.

Remodeling and additions to the Tawas City Elementary Unit would cost \$129,330.

Supt. Edward J. Barry said Monday that it was important that all voters understand the construction program being proposed and the reasoning behind the board of education's decision to place the proposal before voters. He said that interested persons would have no better opportunity to ask questions than next Monday night and urged a good attendance at the meeting.

Complete information on the board of education's proposal is to be made public prior to the May 14 vote.

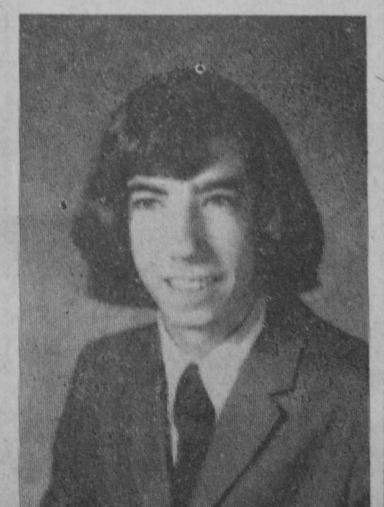
The merit scholarships provide between \$400 and \$8,000 for each winner (\$100 to \$1,500 per year), based upon the individual student's financial need.

Late Sewell Avery Got Start in Iosco

Business Genius Locked Horns With President

Events in history are often repeated. A case in point today is the federal congress' struggle to curb the power of the nation's chief executive. A little more than 35 years ago, the same arguments being heard today were being charged against Pres. Franklin D. Roosevelt.

One of those involved in that struggle of more than three decades ago was the chairman of the board of one of the nation's 10 largest business firms, who got his start in the business world as a young man right here in Iosco County.

This man who locked horns with the federal government and the national president—and the struggle did not end for nine years—was Sewell L. Avery, president of United States Gypsum Company who, in November 1931, became chairman of the board of Montgomery Ward and Company.

Now holding the top executive position of two large corporations, Avery's first tangle with President Roosevelt was over the National Recovery Administration (NRA), a depression era federal agency which Avery termed illegal and unfair.

The federal government forced Ward's to increase its tire prices by 20 percent in 1934, but NRA was later disbanded through a supreme court ruling. In another dispute, the federal government, on Roosevelt's order, took control of Ward's during a 1944 labor dispute. Avery was forcibly carried out of the Chicago, Illinois, plant by soldiers and dumped on the street.

Avery, born at Saginaw on November 4, 1874, was the son of a fairly well to do lumber and shipping man, who followed the business with which his family had been identified for several generations. Avery's grandfather was born in Maine and had come to Michigan when the center of the lumbering industry shifted to this state.

Avery was graduated from the University of Michigan in 1894. At that period, his family still resided at Detroit and he returned there after leaving school.

During his school years he was restless to get to work and took summer jobs, one of which was acting as a wheelman on a Great Lakes freighter.

"I was trusted then by my father with a job that brought me to the realization that there was one thing above all others that I feared," Avery once told a Chicago Tribune reporter. "It was fear that I would not succeed, would not be equal to the situation in which I found myself."

That job was with the Alabaster Company, successor to the Western Plaster Works at Alabaster, south of Tawas City. When the United States Gypsum Company was formed in 1931, one of its constituent concerns was the Alabaster Company. In acquiring the company, USG at the same time obtained the services of its secretary, a young man named Sewell L. Avery.

Avery served as eastern sales manager for the budding enterprise and then, in 1932, when the USG offices were set up at Chicago, he was called to the new headquarters.

In its first few years, the officers of the new company got to quarreling among themselves. To restore peace, Avery was elected president in 1935, when he was 32 years old.

Under his management, USG became amazingly successful and it made for Avery a great reputation as a business genius, as he developed the company into one of the country's leading building material enterprises.

with the federal government over the Blue Eagle (NRA), through the trouble with the War Labor Board in 1944, and finally, in 1955, his proxy battle with Louis E. Wolfson, financier, over control of Wards.

Among the top news photos in history is one of Avery being carried out of Montgomery Ward Company's plant after the army seized the company in April 1944. The seizure, under direct order of President Roosevelt, marked the climax of a long struggle against Montgomery Ward and Company and Avery over the authority of the national war labor board to compel an employer to sign a closed shop contract with a union.

Avery had contended that WLB lacked authority to compel Ward's to renew the contract. Prior to the seizure, Avery ignored the executive order handed to him by the under-secretary of commerce, then told a United States marshal and his eight deputies to leave the plant.

On the following day, April 23, 1944, 32 soldiers under command of a lieutenant entered the plant. Avery was forcibly evicted from his office, carried in the arms of the soldiers and dumped on the street in front of the plant.

The governmental seizure of Ward's was denounced in the halls of congress as smacking of "Hitlerism," as senators and congressmen assailed the step as a dictatorial invasion of private property rights without precedent or sanction under the constitution.

Federal control of Ward's was returned to Avery's management and the company had a record year for net profit in 1946. In 1949, Avery shook stockholders by a wholesale change in top executives. Then, in 1954-55, Avery locked horns with Louis E. Wolfson and the securities firm of A. M. Kidder and Company, who sought to gain control of the company through stock purchases.

Avery, the largest individual stockholder, owned 64,326 shares, less than one percent of Ward's total stock. Now 82 years old, Avery blocked the move to seize the company and its quick assets of more than 600 million dollars.

He retired from the chairmanship of Ward's on May 9, 1955, ending an active career as one of the most dynamic executives in the history of national business. There had been many stepping stones in his long career as a businessman, but his first was right here in Iosco County's gypsum business. And the company which he guided to financial success—United States Gypsum Company—is still an important employer and taxpayer in the county.

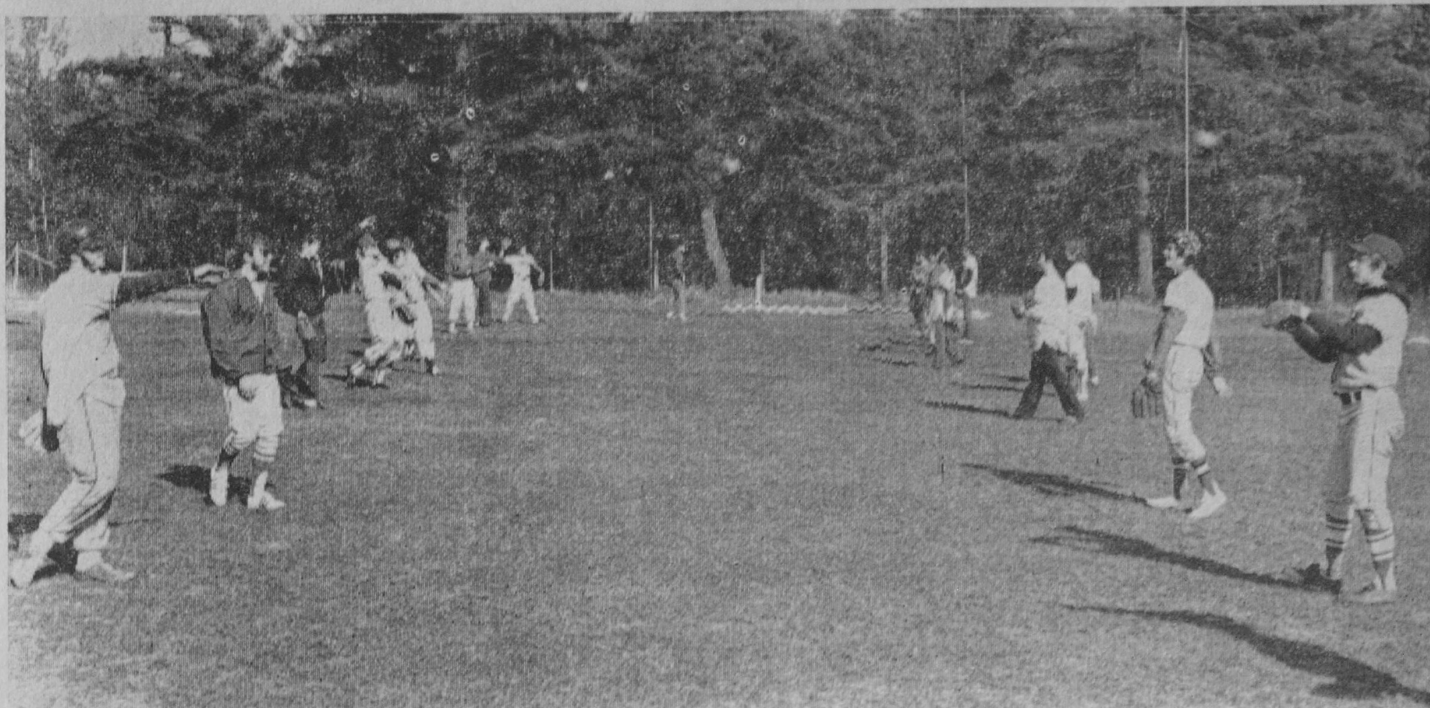

Family Living Education

Everybody needs food. You need food. I need food. Plants and animals need food to live and grow!

That is the idea behind Mulligan Stew, a six-part television series designed to turn kids on to good nutrition. A five-piece rock band, astronomer and world-famous scientists explain "Why we are what we eat."

Fourth, fifth and sixth graders are the target audience, but Mulligan Stew gets everyone, young, old, urban, rural, parents and kids, involved in the exciting world of food. You can get a special package of "goodies," games, fun activities and do-it-yourself projects, for each viewer. There is even a set of materials for a learning director. (That is somebody like a parent or club leader, maybe you!)

friend, Wilbur Dooright, brings them "mission impossible" assignments that are keyed to real nutrition problems. The solutions, carried out by the cast, require the help of astronauts, people on the street and famous food scientists.

MULLIGAN STEW
(4-6 servings)

Melt one tablespoon shortening. Add one pound beef, cut into small pieces.

Brown over medium heat. Add one teaspoon salt. One can tomato soup (10 1/2 ounces). Two soup cans water.

Cover tightly and let cook slowly until tender, about one hour.

Add three carrots, sliced; three potatoes, cut into four pieces; two onions, cut into four pieces.

Cover and continue cooking slowly about 30 minutes. If there is not enough liquid, add more water during cooking. If stew is too thin, remove lid and cook until thickened.

Safety tip—stir with a long-handled spoon.

If you cook outdoors: Before cooking, rub soap on outside of pan. This makes your clean-up job easy. If you cook in a can, use more water.

Automatic SS Payment at Age 72 for Those Working

Question: I will be 72 in August. Although I signed up for medicare when I was 65, I could not get any monthly retirement benefits because I was working and earning too much. However, after I am 72, I understand I can keep right on working and still get my full benefits. Do I have to apply for these payments after my 72nd birthday?

Answer: No. Your payments will start automatically with the month of your 72nd birthday. Since you continued to work without getting benefits after 65, you can now qualify for special delayed retirement credits. These credits will increase your benefit amount one percent for each year or one-twelfth of one percent for every month after 1970 that you worked and did not collect monthly payments.

Question: After my extended stay in the hospital, my doctor recommended physical therapy treatments as part of my recovery program. If a physical therapist who has an independent practice comes to my home to give my treatments, will medicare help pay for them?

Answer: Yes, but not until July 1. Starting then, the medical insurance part of medicare can help pay for treatment by a physical therapist in your home or in the therapist's office. Of course, physical therapy furnished as an inpatient hospital service, an inpatient extended care service, a home health service or as part of a physician's treatment has been covered under medicare for some time.

Question: My father, who gets a small monthly social security check, is still working. He told me it takes a year for him to get his benefit rate increased because of his new yearly earnings. If this is true, is he not losing some benefits?

Answer: No. Even though there is a delay in refiguring your father's benefit rate, he gets all the increase due him at one time. The refiguring of the rate is usually done in the last three months of the year to take into consideration all social security earnings for the previous year and any increase due is retroactive to January.

Commission OK's Bidding on Repairs to Co. Building

Authorization to advertise for bids on repairing and refurbishing the Iosco County Building was given Wednesday, April 4, by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

According to an estimate by Landis Engineering of Oscoda, cost of the work would be in the neighborhood of \$49,800. Bids are to be opened May 16.

The county building, constructed in 1952-1963, has received little maintenance since the original construction and the building has never been re-decorated.

The program being proposed includes repairing cracks in masonry, painting of interior walls and ceilings, refinishing wood trim and doors, reglazing of windows, in-

stallation of window locks, recover counter tops, construction of new cabinets.

It would include installation of panel on walls of the circuit courtroom and judge's chamber, repair of desks and benches, installation of acoustical tile in the jury room, construction of a new jury box, installation of a public address system and buzzer system, replace roof flashing and install gutters, number all rooms and install a directory in the lobby.

The work would be financed through federal revenue sharing funds.

In other business, the commission authorized AuSable Township to issue bonds through the county department of public works for construction of a new water distribution system. Cost of the project to be repaid by AuSable Township property owners in a special assessment district, would be \$830,000. The township purchases its water supply from Oscoda Township wells.

According to the commission's resolution, the county does not guarantee the full faith and credit of Iosco on the bond issue and that the DPW would only act as the bonding agent. Such an arrangement would save the township the expense of handling two separate bond issues.

Robert Grampré of Oscoda-AuSable Chamber of Commerce and Harris Barkman of Tawas Chamber of Commerce appeared before the commission and asked the county to consider a joint program with the two chambers in hiring a director to aid in attracting industry and commerce to the area. It was estimated that salary of such an individual would be approximately \$18,000 a year, with the county to pick up \$10,000 and the two chambers to split the remainder. Commissioners pointed out that such a salary would be higher than paid to any other county official. Barkman said that Tawas Chamber of Commerce does not have the finances to employ such an individual and that the area was encountering terrific competition from other counties for location of industry, as well as Canada for its share of the tourist trade. The proposal was referred to committee.

County Treasurer Edward Neltke reported that his office had collected \$54,000 in delinquent taxes from April 6 through May 10 and that the total tax collection as of April 10 had been \$318,251.15. Of this amount, \$490,000 has been invested in short and long term bonds with local banks.

Longhorn Rodeo Comes to Saginaw

"What is in a name?" A change will come about for Saginaw in late April when the World Championship Longhorn Rodeo comes to town. Saginaw could then be called "Cowtown."

This International Rodeo Association-sanctioned event will return to the coliseum this year and even a greater success than last year is expected.

In town for the show will be the professional directors, but also coming will be a flock of professional riders who do this for a living. It is just like the group that travels from place to place on the golf circuit.

The coliseum crew will do another quick about-face, changing the ice hockey and basketball courts of one night into an eight-inch layer of dirt for the next. Huge trucks will begin their pilgrimage one day, putting over 500 tons on the floor.

The usual schedule of events will take place—bull riding, bareback bronc riding, calf roping, steer wrestling, saddle bronc riding and barrel racing for the ladies.

Each event calls for special things. A cowboy has less than four seconds to spring from the back of a running horse, grab an animal five to 10 times his size and throw him to the ground.

On the back of a Brahma bull, the rider is in a position similar to that of a grenade thrower after the pin has been pulled. An explosion is coming—when, where and how is all that is not known. The angry, twisting animal wants that pesky load off its back. Saddle bronc and bareback bronc riders have similar tests, although they have a few duties to perform while making the ride.

With the coliseum floor covered with eight or more inches of dirt, some of this becomes part of a rider's diet when he leaves his animal and crashes.

This thick layer is placed inside the hockey dashers to provide sure footing for the cantankerous animals. It also cushions an ex-rider's fall.

Wereley Resigns Commission to Accept Tax Director's Post

William G. Wereley of Hale, veteran member of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and its chairman since January, resigned Wednesday to accept a new position as county tax equalization director.

He is to succeed the late Henry Oates, who died of a heart attack February 10.

The appointment to the tax director's office came on a three to one roll call vote of commissioners. Voting in favor of the appointment were Carl Libka, Fred Lomas and Robert Foster. The dissenting vote was cast by J. Berkeley Smith, who said he did not question Wereley's qualifications but felt one other applicant should be given further consideration.

As a result of the resignation, the commission named Foster as its new chairman and Smith was named vice chairman. A realignment of committees finds Smith becoming

the new finance chairman and will act on the county allocation board. Libka has been named chairman of the health committee. All other committees are to remain the same for the present.

The commission has 30 days in which to name a successor to Wereley. The appointee is to be named from the Fifth District, Plainfield and Oscoda Townships, which Wereley represented.

In its resolution appointing Wereley to the tax director's post, the commission stated that he was to acquire the required level of state certification as soon as possible. A three level certification is required, as compared to a one level for township or city assessing officers.

Wereley was starting his fifth year as a member of the county commission, having been elected to the original nine-man commission in 1969.

Before becoming a county commissioner, he served on the Hale Area School Board of Education for nine years. He was a member of the county tax allocation board at two different times, first representing schools and as the county commissioner's finance chairman.

Draft Eligible Young Men are Registering in Mail Test

Draft eligible young men are registering by mail during the test project which is currently being conducted by the Alpena Selective Service area office, it has been announced by Alan J. Walker, board chairman.

Since the April test began, 18 young men have applied for mail registration. Normally, the draft board registers 65 young men each month in the counties under its jurisdiction.

Young men reaching age 18 can apply for draft registration by mail during April in a test project being conducted by the Selective Service System. Young men living in counties where there is no draft board office can apply for draft registration by mailing an application to their local board office.

The draft law continues to require the registration of young men at age 18 or within 30 days before or after their 18th birthday. Applications for registration by mail can be obtained at the following sites in this area: Oscoda Area High School, Hale Area High School, Tawas Area High School, Whittemore-Prescott High School and the Iosco County Clerk's Office, Tawas City.

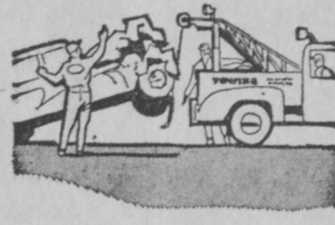
