

# Commission Delays Filling of Vacancy

Filling a vacancy on the county board of commissioners has been delayed until May 2, two days before the deadline requiring a special election.

Under state law, the commission may appoint someone to fill the vacancy or it may call a special election.

At Wednesday's meeting of the extended April session, commissioners were not in agreement as to the method of filling the vacancy in District No. 5, caused by the recent resignation of William G. Woreley, newly-appointed county tax equalization director.

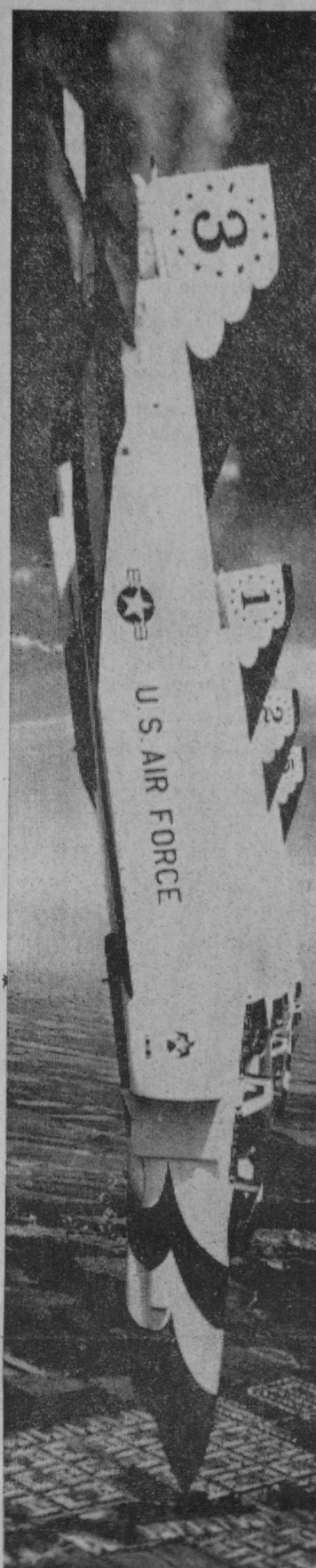
J. Berkeley Smith, Oscoda commissioner, was in favor of holding a special election in District No. 5 to fill the vacancy, while Carl Libka of Tawas City and Fred B. Lomas of East Tawas favored an appointment to the commission. A motion by Smith to hold an election died for lack of support.

Letters seeking the appointment were received from Arthur Aulerich of Reno Township and Melvin McCormick of Grant Township. Mentioned as possible candidates were Alfred Baker, Lyle Bielby and Ira Scofield, all of Plainfield Township, and Kenneth Harvey, a civil service employee at Wurtsmith Air Force Base, Oscoda.

Under last year's reapportionment of the commission, the district comprises Plainfield, Reno and Grant Townships and part of Oscoda Township, including the air force base.

The person appointed or elected to fill the vacancy would serve out the balance of Woreley's two-year term, which became effective January 1. Because commissioners are elected on a partisan basis, it is not known at the present time if a primary election would be required prior to holding a general election. Information on the question was not immediately available Wednesday from the secretary of state's office at Lansing.

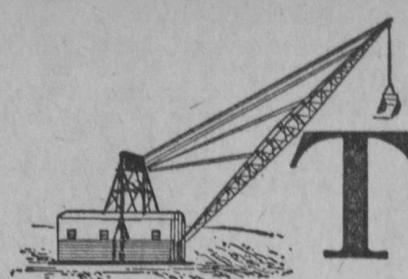
D. Keith Pappas, county clerk, reported that an election would require an expenditure in excess of \$1,000. Cost of the election would be a legitimate expense of the county board of commissioners, he stated.

## TC Sewer-Water Work Discussed

A special meeting of Tawas City Water Board is to be held in two weeks to discuss formation of special assessment districts to finance proposed sewer extensions and to develop a program to finance the city's share of the construction.

This action resulted from discussion during Monday night's regular meeting of the water board. Because of the fact that several members were either on vacation or ill, a quorum was not present and no official action could be taken.

The proposed sewer work includes extensions on Margo Street, a force main from the Second Avenue pumping station to the waste water treatment plant and a major construction program in the First Ward which would require crossing the Tawas River.

In addition, water board members will discuss a proposal presented by representatives of Edmonds Engineering Company for possible incorporation of a limited scope approach toward implementation of the city's master plan for expansion and modernization of the city's water distribution system.

Of principal interest to those water board members present Monday night was that some of the city's wa-

ter distribution problems might be corrected somewhat by installation of several blocks of eight-inch water main, which is included in the master plan.

Because of expanded water consumption through new residential, commercial and public buildings (including the medical care facility and schools in the latter category), the city's water distribution system is pressed to meet demands during peak periods. Tawas City, which purchases water from East Tawas, had discussed the possibility of constructing a new force main to connect with the East Tawas distribution system. However, East Tawas' engineer has recommended that both communities construct additional storage facilities prior to construction of a force main to connect with the filtration plant.

Engineers said Monday night that the solution to the problem would be for the federal government to approve an EDA application from Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City to aid in financing a regional water and sewer project. However, they said this was unrealistic as the Economic Development Administration is being phased out by the federal government and it will be several years before new programs are developed.

As an alternative, Tawas City's engineers are studying the possibility of constructing new eight-inch lines to parallel four or more blocks of existing six-inch lines on US-23, where friction loss is high (up to 23 percent) due to the age of cast iron pipes. This new line would connect with an eight-inch line running to Tawas Hospital and could eventually cross Tawas River to improve the circulation system.

At the present time, Tawas City's peak load in the summer is at 396,000 gallons a day, which requires use of the deep well as an added supply. Use of well water helps to correct one problem, but it adds another as minerals contained in the well water cause problems in Tawas Plating Company's processing, the city's major water user and an important employer.

Engineers stated at the meeting that the city should be planning for the day in the very near future when the maximum water consumption would reach 500,000 gallons a day, through construction of an expanded storage system and new force main, but believed that a short-term solution could be the construction of several blocks of eight-inch main.

It was the opinion of engineers from Edmonds that federal revenue sharing money would be expanded in the future and that this could help communities to finance large public works projects, including water storage.

In the meantime, it was felt that the city could make a modest improvement in the circulation system through implementation of small increments in the over-all master plan. This, said the engineers, would eliminate any huge local debt, would make it possible to utilize federal funds if and when available in the future and would demonstrate that the city was interested in helping itself.

## Lift Freeze on ET Housing Project

East Tawas Housing Commission's 50-unit "Turn Key" program has been taken off President Nixon's freeze order of January 5 and reinstated for federal funding, according to a joint announcement by Cong. Philip Ruppe and Cong. Elford A. Cederberg.

"This means that the project is back in the active program and we now can sign contracts with the developer," states John C. Elliott, president of the East Tawas Housing Commission.

The \$1,050,000 project, being fi-

nanced as one of the last federal projects of the Office of Housing and Urban Development, is to provide 30 units of high-rise housing for the elderly and 20 units for low income non-elderly persons. The sites scattered throughout East Tawas have been inspected and approved by HUD.

Elliott said he had no idea of when the project would be completed. The project has been in the planning for 4½ years and Elliott said he was just happy to see that it was moving again.

## Civil Defense Coordination Sought With Sheriff's Dept.

Because of increased activity in the civil defense director's office concerning lake shore area flooding, Iosco Board of Commissioners has asked that a study be made toward coordinating civil defense activities through the sheriff's department.

Henry Gage, county civil defense director, told commissioners Wednesday that the federal government had placed increased responsibility on his office concerning flooding and that he had received up to 40 telephone calls per day from local citizens. He is a clerk at the Tawas City post office and telephone calls to that office concerning matters of

civil defense were becoming too frequent.

Gage believed that the county should provide office space to be manned 24 hours a day during storms or emergencies.

Commissioners doubted if they could justify a full time office for the civil defense director when the office is needed only a few times each year.

It was recommended that the commission's public safety committee meet with Gage and Sheriff George Westcott to work out an arrangement whereby calls could be coordinated through the sheriff's department.

Two of the principal officials working in the federal-state relief processing are Lt. James Somers, disaster coordinator for the state police emergency services division, and Leo MacNamee of the OEP. Temporary disaster program offices in Lansing were opened at 2404 South Logan Street.

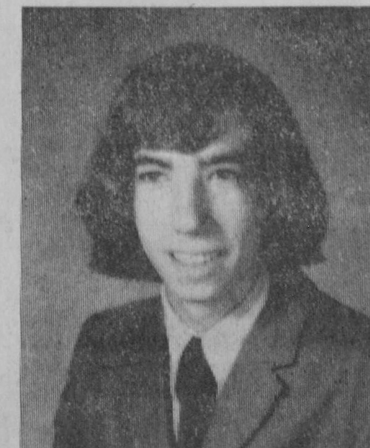

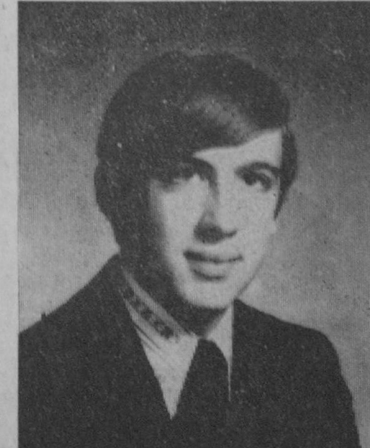
When the hotel opens late this spring, it will have a New Orleans "look"—complete with wrought iron railings and ornamental work on the exterior.—Tawas Herald Photo.

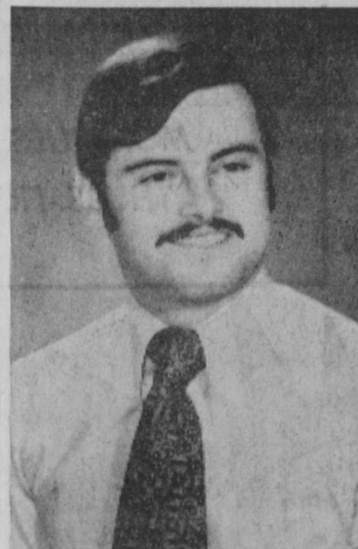

Question: I am 23 and I have been supporting my younger brother, 14, and sister, 13, since my parents died four years ago. Since I recently became disabled, I plan to apply for monthly disability benefits. If I am eligible for checks, will my sister and brother be able to get monthly checks on my earnings record?

Answer: Social security does not provide payments to a worker's brothers and sisters. But your brother and sister might be able to get monthly checks on your parents' social security records. You should check with any social security office as soon as possible to find out if they are eligible.

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**Retirement**  
**Delay Brings**  
**Added Benefit**

A worker who does not get any social security benefits before he is 65 and delays his retirement past that age will be eligible for higher payments when he retires, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

Benefits increase one-twelfth of one percent for each month—or one percent for each year—after 1970 if the worker does not get social security benefits between age 65 and 72 because of his earnings.

"This higher benefit can be paid to retired workers under a new provision of the social security law," Carr said. "It does not affect social security payments to their families."

The new provision will mean additional benefits to some workers already getting social security payments, Carr said. "If a worker already on the rolls qualifies for a higher payment because of the change, he will get an automatic increase in June and it will be retroactive to January 1973," he said.

Over five-million workers will get 198-million dollars in social security increases in 1974 under the new provision.

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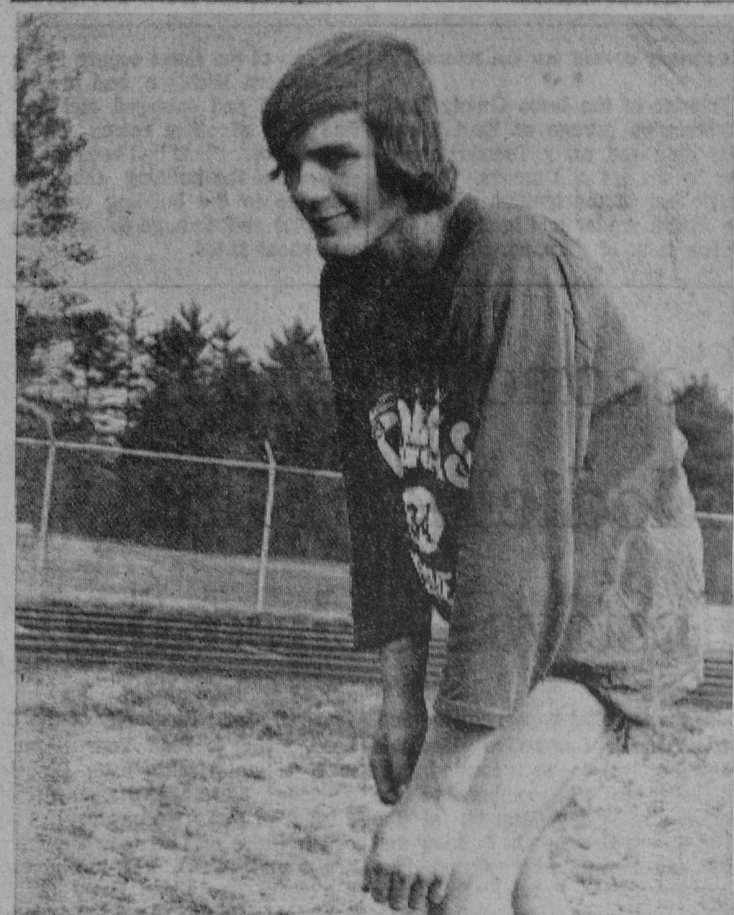

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## Family Living Education

By HELEN MEACH

Every now and then unfamiliar words come along. We read them once or hear them mentioned after which they seem to pop up everywhere. Food additives are such words. To the average housewife they are new, therefore, suspicion beclouds their existence. The strangest thing about these strange words is that additives have been used in grandmother's day. She used sodium chloride (salt), calcium acid phosphate (baking powder), sodium acid carbonate (soda), acetic acid (vinegar) and potassium bitartrate (cream of tartar). This list could go on. Chemicals were with us in the past and they must continue to stay in our food supply as there are increasing distances from our table to the farms. Additives serve a twofold purpose. According to the law, they must be useful and safe. First, useful is a mighty small word for the endless variety of jobs that additives perform. One additive may preserve the crispness of cereal... another makes a powdered product blend in to water without lumps... another retards mold in bread... another holds moisture in coconut... still another lets a product pour, as salt will do in damp weather. Additives can wear seven different masks which can function as follows: Provide flavor, increase nutrition, deter spoilage, provide form, speed preparation, give color and improve packaging. Second, an additive must be safe before it can be used in the food supply. A typical research and testing program to develop a food additive and establish its safety may take from two to seven years, involve thousands of man-hours and cost from \$100,000 to \$10,000,000. Presently, the safe list included over 600 additives that provide useful service. If you would like additional information, write or call the Cooperative Extension Service Office for an up-to-date bulletin called "Food Additives." There is no charge.
