## Kellogg-Robillard Won Canoe Race

Jerry Kellogg of Twin Lakes and Luc Robillard of Quebec City, Canada, defending champions of the AuSable River canoe marathon, set a new record in winning the 26th annual event which finished Saturday afternoon at Oscoda.

Kellogg and Robillard completed the 240-mile course from Grayling to Oscoda in 14 hours and 56 minutes, which slashed 24 minutes off their 1972 pace.

Saturday's victory was the third for Robillard, having won it with another partner in 1970.

John Buckley of Mt. Pleasant and Stanley Hall of Oscoda were in second place, while Cecil Lane of Flint and William Ayers of Greenville placed third.

Twenty-six teams began the race at Grayling Friday night to compete for \$4,000 in prize money.

Paddling at the rate of 66 strokes a minute as they approached Five Channels Dam, nearly 12 hours after the start of the race, Kellogg and Robillard set a grueling pace for the field.

Both men have been racing professionally for eight years. Robillard is a physical education instructor and Kellogg is an ironworker at Muskegon.

Trudy Gilbert of Lansing and Donna Buckley of Mt. Pleasant, the first female duo to compete in the marathon, made the course in 22 hours, 12 minutes and 15 seconds, taking 17th position.

Susan Ann Simons, 10-year-old Oscoda girl, was fatally injured in a two-car head-on crash on US-23 north of M-171 Saturday afternoon.

Investigating Oscoda Township Police Department officers said that Dudsonis was in the act of passing another car when he collided with Simons' vehicle, headed south.

## State Aid Bill Passed, but Tawas A. School Still in Dark

Michigan's legislature passed the long-awaited school finance bill Thursday and sent it to Governor Milliken for his signature, but Tawas Area School officials are still in the dark as to the amount of state aid this school district will be receiving during the coming term.

After spending the week-end analyzing the bill, Supt. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area Schools said Tuesday that he still had several questions to be answered before he could come up with the actual amount of money to be received per pupil.

On Friday, Barry believed that figures furnished by State Rep. George A. Prescott were in error. A

work sheet provided by Prescott indicated that Tawas Area School would receive \$222 per pupil, as compared to \$240 last year.

The Tawas superintendent, who attended a conference last week at Lansing, believed the amount to be received per pupil would be slightly higher than Prescott's figure, but he was continuing to check on a number of questions before he could be sure of Tawas' status.

The board of education has been awaiting enactment of the school aid bill before adopting the millage total to be voted on September 13. The board of education will ask for renewal of 7½ mills of special voted operational taxes and perhaps a

slight increase, depending on Barry's findings.

Although Governor Milliken has called the new state aid bill a "milestone in school finance reform," Prescott was one of 13 members of the house of representatives who voted "no" on the proposal. He said Friday that none of the school districts in his area are benefited by the bill.

Ray Kesler, superintendent of Whittemore-PreScott Area School, agreed with Prescott. He believed that rather than comparing school tax bases in adopting a school financing bill, the legislature should give some consideration to ability to pay. He pointed out that the av-

erage annual income in Iosco County is \$7,500, as compared to \$14,000 in the Detroit metropolitan area and other downstate areas.

Iosco schools, however, are penalized because of a higher than average valuation behind each child.

Basically, the bill guarantees in the coming school year that every school system with a millage rate of at least 22 mills will get \$38 a student for each mill of tax up to the 22-mill level. Tawas Area School and other districts which do not levy 22 mills would receive a percentage based on the total allocated and extra voted millage.

Several amendments to the bill are already being contemplated.

## HUD Approves Federal Flood Insurance for Tawas City Owners

The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development announced Tuesday that effective July 23, local property and casualty agents can start selling HUD national flood insurance in Tawas City. A similar program was adopted earlier this year in East Tawas, Baldwin Township and several other townships.

The National Flood Insurers Association has designated Insurance Company of North America, Detroit, as the servicing company for Tawas City. Agents should contact this company immediately to obtain policy forms, rates, flood insurance manuals and any other necessary information.

According to George K. Bernstein, federal insurance administrator, "now that the community has established its eligibility, owners of both residential and nonresidential prop-

erties should take prompt advantage of this vital insurance protection. He pointed out that annual property damage in the United States resulting from natural disasters averages one-billion dollars and that about 5,000 communities in the nation have some kind of flood threat.

Insurance at federally subsidized rates may be purchased from local property and casualty agents and brokers for all existing and new structures built prior to the identification of the areas of special flood hazard in amounts up to \$17,500 for single family houses and up to \$30,000 for all other residential and non-residential structures.

On structures, rates range from 25 to 60 cents per \$100 of insurance, depending on the value. Contents may be insured up to \$5,000 with rates ranging from 35 to 45 cents per \$100 of insurance on residential con-

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitiz was informed that the land use and control measures submitted as part of Tawas City Council's application have been accepted, pending a detailed examination in accordance with federal regulations.

New as well as existing construction will be permitted to obtain subsidized flood insurance under the emergency program until the special flood hazard areas are identified. Once the flood hazard boundary map has been issued, however, subsequent new construction located in special flood hazard areas will not be eligible for flood insurance except at actuarial rates. Therefore, the owners must await completion of the rate-making study to obtain such insurance.

## Arts - Crafts Show Set for Week-End

"This event gets bigger every year, but we really will not know the actual number of exhibitors until everything is set up in the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building when a head count will be taken."

Speaking was Mrs. Herbert Hertzler, who is co-chairman of the 1973 Tawas Bay Waterfront Arts and Crafts Exhibit and Sale to be held Saturday and Sunday. It was Mrs. Hertzler who suggested the idea for this event to the Tawas Chamber of Commerce 13 years ago.

Last year, the exhibit and sale drew nearly 150 entries and Mrs. Hertzler

anticipates the list will be even greater this year. The event is sponsored jointly by the chamber of commerce and Tawas Bay Artists.

While success of the outdoor show depends greatly upon weather conditions, Mrs. Hertzler cites the dual location for its popularity with exhibitors. The city park has facilities to handle all those wishing to exhibit outdoors and the remainder utilize corridors of the county building located directly across US-23.

A major change incorporated into planning for this year's event should place emphasis on more crea-

tive designs and handwork, according to Mrs. Hertzler. Officials of the show adopted the jury system for entries and three out of four applications by potential exhibitors were accepted.

The junior division, which is open to exhibitors under the age of 16 years, has no restrictions. This department will exhibit its work on the tennis court.

This year's show and exhibit will see utilization for the first time of a new parking lot constructed along US-23 through a joint financial effort of the City of Tawas City, Iosco

County and with state funds.

This project was still under construction last week due to a number of delays and may provide some inconvenience to visitors because of the lack of sod in some areas. Grass seed was planted on the back slope and covered with straw.

According to City Mgr. Reginald Bublitiz, the new arrangement will provide parking for 40 cars as compared to the 12 parking spots available at previous shows for those persons desiring to view and patronize exhibits. The parking lot is to be surfaced with plant mix blacktop later this summer. In addition, the parking lot behind the county building is utilized and the parking lot of Peoples State Bank is made available.

Assisted by Ronald Korthals, co-chairman for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, the 1973 program has been in the planning stage since March when letters were mailed to prospective exhibitors.

Prizes donated by exhibitors are to be awarded to visitors Saturday evening and prizes donated by local businessmen are to be awarded to exhibitors at the conclusion of the

show at 5:00 p. m. Sunday.

Dar Davis, director of the Saginaw Art Museum, is to be judge for the show.

## Detroit Canoe Paddler Fell Into AuSable River; Drowns

The 26th annual AuSable River canoe marathon was marred Saturday by the drowning of one of the paddlers, who suffered an epileptic seizure just short of the finish line.

Investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department officers said that Calvin R. Grand, 20, Detroit, fell out of the canoe around 12:30 p. m. about five miles upstream from Oscoda.

Grand and his racing partner had portaged around Foote Dam and were on the last leg of the 240-mile canoe race from Grayling to Oscoda.

Investigating officers said that the victim was not wearing a life jacket or other protective device. His racing partner, Joseph W. Kook of Detroit, said that the deceased was paddling in the bow of their rented canoe and he had no opportunity to rescue Grand when he fell overboard.

Grand's body was recovered by sheriff's department divers about 5:30 p. m., 100 yards downstream from the point where he fell out of the canoe.

Officers reported that Grand was an electronics student at Detroit.

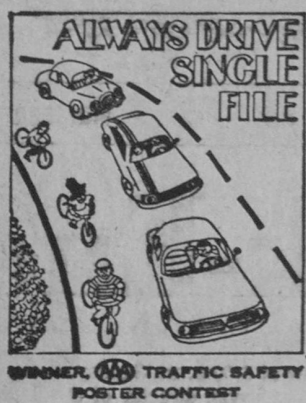

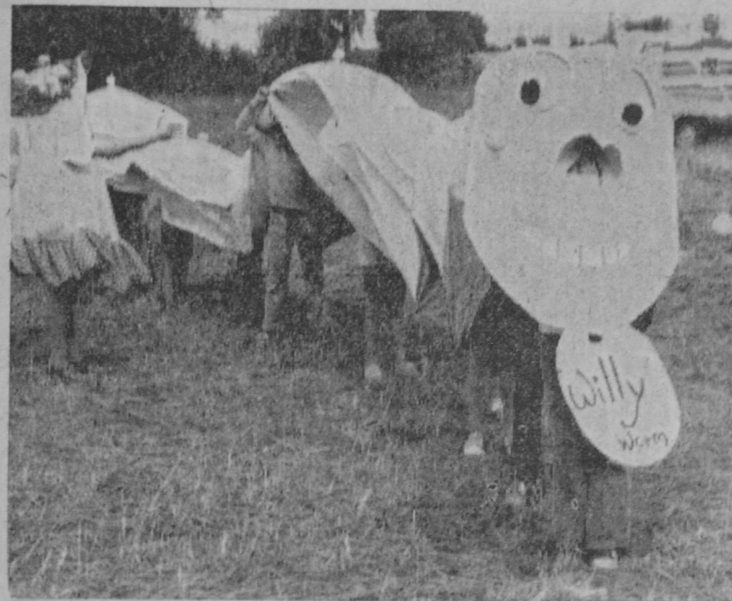

**Deer Poaching On Increase as Meat Prices Go Upward**

Willard T. Musolf, president of the Michigan Deer Hunters' Association with headquarters at Oscoda, recently warned state authorities that steps should be taken to protect Michigan's deer and elk herds due to the present trend toward deer poaching and livestock rustling because of high meat prices.

Because of the added threat to

wildlife, Musolf was of the opinion that special fines and jail terms should be imposed. He suggested a mandatory \$500 fine and a 90-day jail sentence for each count upon conviction.

The association president has urged that a \$1,500 fine and a six-month jail term be assessed to market hunters by state courts, as well as confiscating all weapons and impounding for six months all automobiles used in the commission of such crimes.

In a letter to Musolf, Gov. William G. Milliken said there appeared to be a "reluctance by Michigan courts to impose maximum penalties on those convicted of natural resource violations."

The governor said he had been assured by the director of the Department of Natural Resources that his department was doing everything possible to maintain the maximum level of compliance with natural resource laws "and is confident that his present complement of officers can successfully cope with this escalation of deer hunting activities."

Arrest records of the DNR disclosed an increase in illegal deer hunting activity throughout the state during the period from January through March over the comparable period of 1972.

G. M. Dahl, chief of the law enforcement division, said that the key to a punitive deterrent is cooperation by the courts. "Without this," he said, "any attempts on our part to cope with an increased, illegal deer hunting activity will only be partially successful."

Dahl said he personally was of the opinion that punishment presently available to the courts for dealing with accused deer poachers is adequate, if courts would only render appropriate sentences.

After Workin' On The Railroad He Carves Bushes Into Animals

Lester Shaffer doesn't talk to the animals—he just makes them from flowering shrubs. The 84-year-old retired railroad conductor started making animals in his Somerset, Pa., yard during the early 1940's. His first project was a bear. Since then, his "zoo" has grown to over 30 animals, including two elephants, a rhinoceros, three giraffes, and even a steer.

When Shaffer first starts an animal, the privet bushes he uses are about two to three feet tall. One bush is planted for each leg of the animal. As the bushes grow, they are tied together with twine to form the animals basic shape. Trimming carves the bush into the animal's exact shape. About seven years are required for the bush to grow fully.

During the summer, the bushes must be cut every week. Until a few years ago, Shaffer cut his 30 animals with conventional hand-operated hedge shears. Then a friend gave him a single-blade electric hedge trimmer. It saved him energy, but it still took two days to trim all his animals.

Shaffer recently got a new Rockwell double-edge hedge trimmer and was able to shear his animals in just one day. "I trimmed the whole works without any trouble," he says.

This menagerie is so unusual that it attracts numerous passers-by. "There is someone here almost every day," Shaffer says. During the summer, as many as six families a day stop and walk through his yard.

If his visitors have cameras, they usually take pictures, he adds. Pictures of his animals are now in almost every state of the U. S. and in foreign countries as far away as Japan.

Freak Iosco Crash Kills Bay City Man

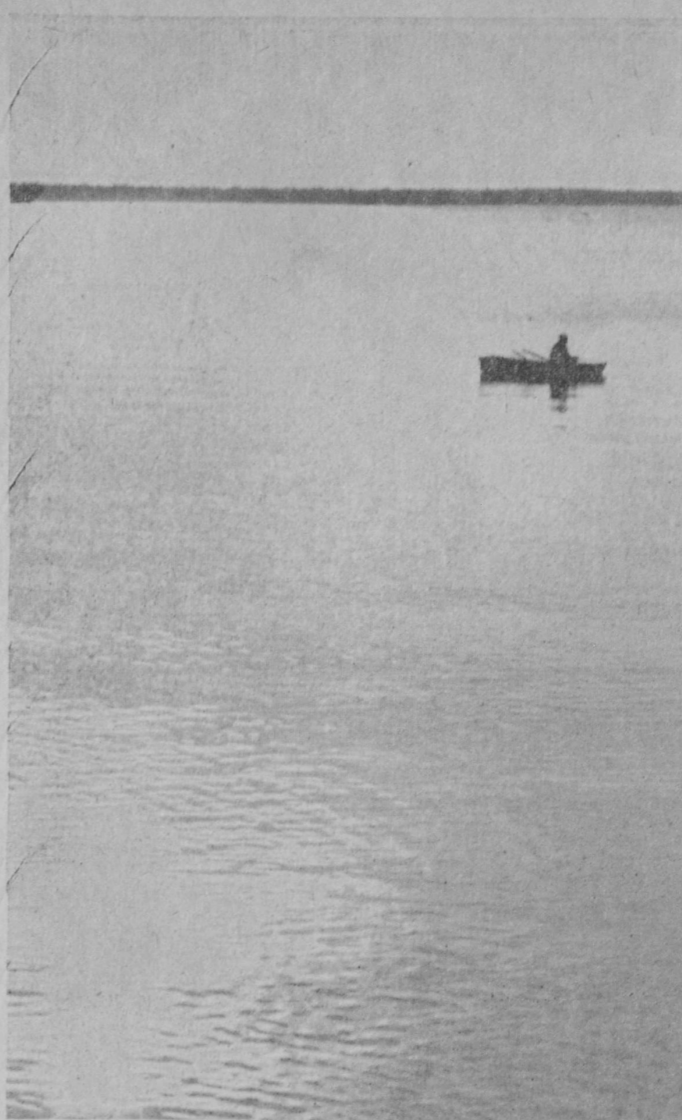

Of the 30 categories listed in the budget, 14 had exceeded budgets by an amount of \$50,814.73, while the remainder were under budgets by \$12,081.56.

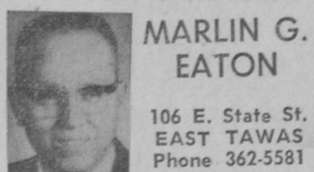

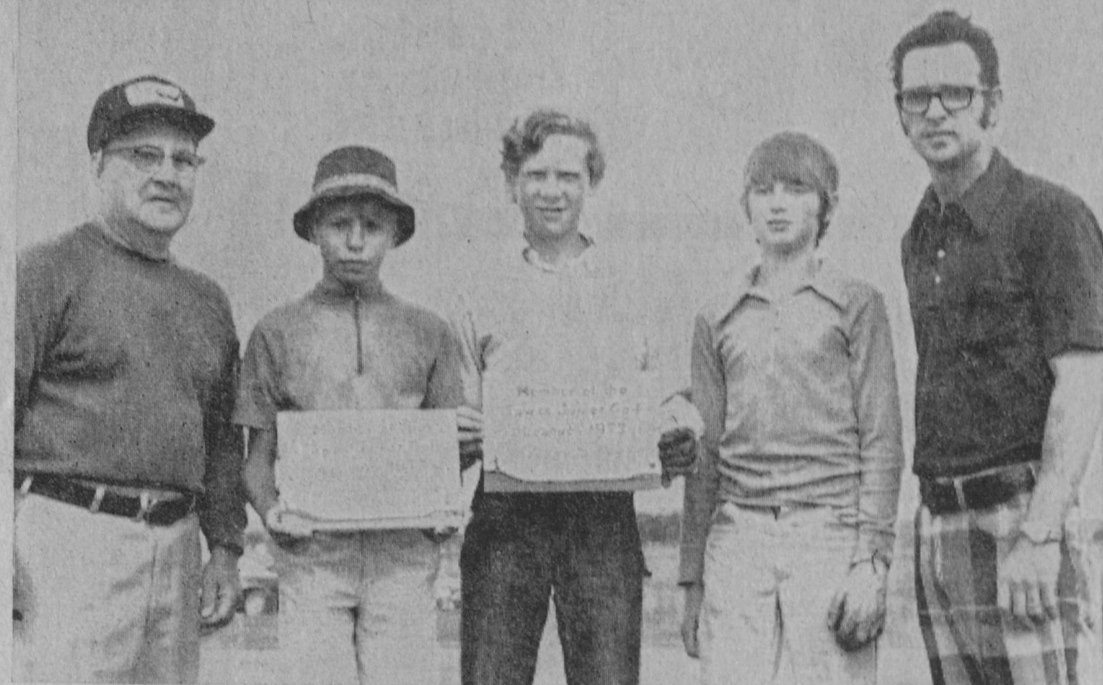

## Popular Picnic Tables Idea of Allan Williams

Motorists having lunch along rural roadsides caught the eye of a young county road engineer in Ionia County 44 years ago. He noticed that the picnickers usually spread their fare out on the ground or set it on one of the broad roadside stumps lingering from Michigan's nineteenth century lumber boom.

Allan Williams, an accommodating fellow with a reputation as a highway innovator, decided travelers deserved something better. So he salvaged some planks from damaged and obsolete highway guardrails and built some picnic tables. He set them out along US-16, then the main state highway extending from Detroit to Muskegon.

Motorists liked them and several sent letters of appreciation to the Michigan State Highway Department in Lansing.

Puzzled and a bit irritated for not having been informed, B. C. Tinney, chief of state highway maintenance, set out for the offices of the Ionia County Road Commission. His immediate suspect was Williams, commission engineer who supervised maintenance of state highways in the county under contract with the highway department.

Williams admitted that he had set out the tables without state authorization, but pointed out that they were highly popular with motorists and had been built without cost to the state.

"Make some more then," said Tinney, "but next time I do not want to be the last to know."

That was in 1929. During the next five years, employees of the Ionia County Road Commission built more than 1,000 picnic tables for use on state highway roadsides throughout Michigan. The roadside table became a Michigan institution and today there are nearly 4,500 of them in 103 roadside parks, 63 freeway rest areas, nine travel information centers, scores of scenic overlooks and some 500 selected sites along non-freeway routes.

They have become a hallmark of Michigan hospitality, used by many of the more than 30-million travelers who stop at state roadside facilities each year.

Williams' original picnic table site on old US-16 in Boston Township is commemorated by an official state historical marker. It credits him with setting out the first public roadside table in Michigan and, as far as anyone can determine, in the nation.

Another county road engineer, Herbert Larson of Iron County in the Upper Peninsula, is credited with developing the first roadside park in 1918. Again, it is believed to be the first in the nation.

Larson's park, on former US-2 near Stager Lake in Iron County, included picnic tables, but it remained for Williams to bring the roadside table to its present popularity. The two men share credit for Michigan's leadership in development of roadside facilities to serve motorists.

Williams, now 81 years old, was once a state highway engineer and directed the design of Michigan's first state highway map. He also designed the diamond-shaped "M" route marker still used to mark Michigan state highways and developed an underbody snow scraper widely adapted for winter maintenance of roads and highways.

Williams served as president or manager of the Ionia County Free Fair for 18 years. He helped develop Ionia County parks, the Ionia airport and the Ionia County Memorial Hospital.

Now retired and living in Ionia, he enjoys an occasional backward glance into his early highway career and an occasional lunch on a roadside picnic table.

## Many Features Condensed On Week-End

Eleventh annual Michigan Tourist Festival to be held in the Tawas Saturday and Sunday has a lively program of outdoor activities ranging from an arts and crafts show to boat races—with a full schedule of activities between those extremes.

The festival, which had been a week-long program since its inception in 1963, has been shortened to one week-end this year in order to provide a compact program for all to enjoy.

In addition to the program announced by Tawas Chamber of Commerce, Tawas merchants will hold sidewalk sales on Saturday, while pleasure boat rides will be offered on Tawas Bay aboard the Holiday docked at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock, East Tawas.

One of the principal features of the program will be the 13th annual Tawas Bay Waterfront Arts and Crafts Exhibit and Sale to be held at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building. The exhibit opens each day at 9:00 a. m.

Saturday will be a big day for youngsters taking part in the annual parade. A Shrine clown makeup session is scheduled for 10:00 a. m. at Tawas Masonic Temple on M-55. All children are encouraged to participate.

The annual Tourist Festival parade is to start at 12 o'clock noon from the Mathews Street bridge in Tawas City. The route of marchers, floats and vehicles will be along US-23 to Newman Street at East Tawas. The parade will feature kids dressed as clowns, Saginaw Shrine clowns, floats, Tawas Area High School Band, fire departments from the Tawas, antique automobiles, the Iosco Sheriff's Posse and other mounted units.

## Tawas C. - Whittemore City Primaries Aug. 7

Voters of only Tawas City and Whittemore will be going to the polls for primary elections on Tuesday, August 7. East Tawas did not adopt the odd-year election law provision, remaining with the April election to select city officers, and there is no state ballot in this election.

Despite the lack of interest in other parts of the county, Tawas City has 13 candidates for six seats on the city council and three candidates for the office of mayor. The exceedingly large number of aldermen candidates was caused by confusion over the length of terms of aldermen elected in the last election and adoption of the 1972 city charter. As a result, the council declared that all seats were vacant.

Heading the ballot will be a three-way race for mayor. John N. Brugg, incumbent, is being opposed by Vincent M. Beam Sr. and Mrs. Mildred DeBeauvoir. The mayor's term is for two years.

The six councilmen whose terms expire this year include William L. Groff, James J. Lansky, Robert N. Rollin, Edward C. Savage, Chester

Smyczynski and Clark Tanner. Opposing them will be the following candidates: Russell R. Carney, William L. Ezo, Jack "Ollie" Johnson, Reginald K. Look Sr., Robert W. Pawloski, Russell E. Pierce and Jerry J. Snoblen.

Under provisions of the city charter, a non-partisan system was adopted and the old ward system was abolished with councilmen to be elected at large. The 12 candidates receiving the largest number of votes will run again in the November election, when the six candidates with the largest number of votes will be elected to office.

In the November election, the three councilmen with the largest number of votes would be elected for four years. The next three council-

men with the largest number of votes would be elected to two-year terms. Thereafter, only three councilmen would be elected, along with the mayor, at each odd-year election.

There is only one race listed in Whittemore, but this necessitated a primary as Whittemore operates under the partisan system of elections. Candidates from only the Democratic Party filed nominating petitions for the election.

Vying for the Second Ward alderman's seat are Floyd N. Freel and Herman DeLoach. Running without opposition are Basil Goupil, mayor; Donald Dorsey, clerk; Edward Graham Jr., treasurer. Both Dorsey and Graham were appointed to those positions by the council recently to fill vacancies.

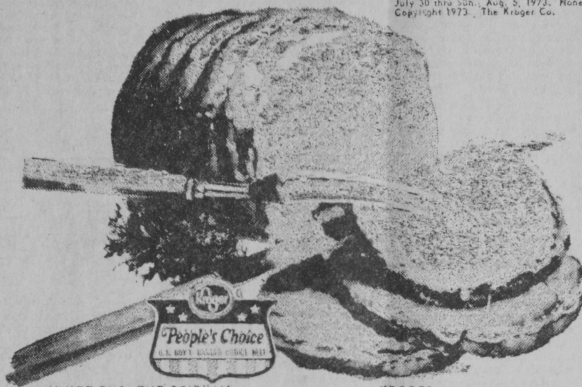

Family Living Education By HELEN MEACH Extension Home Economist

How often have you heard a friend or neighbor say, "I am a vegetarian?" What does it mean? It can mean they do not eat any meat, do not eat meat or fish, do not eat any animal food including eggs and milk or any variant of these. In nutrition lingo, an extreme vegetarian is a "vegan."

Nearly all subjects reported that they currently weighed 10 to 20 pounds less than their highest adult weight. The vegans had lost more weight than the non-vegans. Some vegans had given up cooked food or cereal products in addition to all animal foods.

VA Computer Speeds Checks to GI Students A new Veterans Administration computer program to speed checks to GI Bill students is expected to become operational this month.
