Investigating officers said that the victim was not wearing a life jacket or other protective device. His racing partner, Joseph W. Kook of Detroit, said that the deceased was paddling in the bow of their rented canoe and he had no opportunity to rescue Grand when he fell overboard.

Grand's body was recovered by sheriff's department divers about 5:30 p. m., 100 yards downstream from the point where he fell out of the canoe

Officers reported that Grand was an electronics student at Detroit.

> File Within Three Months of Retirement

Ouestion: I am a self-employed housepainter and I plan to stop working completely when I am 62 next March. When should I apply for so-

cial security payments? Answer: You should file for monthly retirement payments two or three months before the month you retire to make sure your payments start the first month you are retired. Question: I will be 65 next May and I plan to retire then. I will earn nearly \$6,000 next year before I retire. After I retire, can I earn \$2,100 for the rest of the year and still get all my social security payments? Answer: No, since you will have

already exceeded \$2,100 in yearly earnings when you retire, you can only get benefits for months in which you neither earn over \$175 nor do substantial work in self-employment.

Question: After 30 years of marriage, I was divorced and I never got any support payments from my exhusband. Now, he is starting to get social security checks and my friends tell me that I cannot get a divorced wife's payment because he did not support me. Is this still true?

Answer: No. The support requirement has been eliminated. A divorced wife can get payments at 62 or over if her former husband is getting benefits and if they were married 20 years or longer.

Question: Although I applied for monthly disability payments in a local social security office. I received a letter from a different social security office telling me I am eligible for payments. If I have a question or a problem, which office should I get in touch with? Answer: You should call, write or

visit the local office. The people there can help you with a problem or answer any questions you may have.
