

Election Results

A "hot" general election is promised for Tawas City voters on November 6 as Mildred DeBeauvoir, tallied 184 votes in challenging the incumbent mayor, John N. Brugger, who received 145 votes in Tuesday's non-partisan primary election.

Five of the six incumbent councilmen were top vote getters among 13 candidates. The sixth incumbent was seventh on the list after votes were tallied Tuesday night.

A total of 356 voters turned out for Tawas City's first primary election. Councilmen are elected at large rather than by the old ward system.

Mrs. DeBeauvoir received 33 votes in the First Ward, 79 in the Second Ward and 67 in the Third Ward. Brugger received 31 votes in the

First Ward, 54 in the Second Ward and 60 in the Third Ward. Vincent M. Beam Sr. received 26 votes and was eliminated from the November election.

Top vote getter on the ballot was James J. Lansky, 274. Other votes for council included: William L. Groff, 214; Chester Smyczynski, 188; Edward C. Savage, 176; Clark Tanner, 174; William L. Ezo, 149; Robert Rollin, 147; Russell R. Carney, 133; Reginald K. Look Sr., 128; Robert W. Pawloski, 81; Jerry J. Shoblen, 76; Jack "Ollie" Johnson, 49.

Russell E. Pierce was the low man and was eliminated from running in the November election. The remaining field of 12 will be candidates for the six council vacancies.

18-Year-Old Drowned In AuSable River

The body of an 18-year-old Detroit, who was last seen July 31 climbing up a high bank along the AuSable River, was recovered Friday morning by skindivers near Lumbermen's Monument.

Death of Larry Mayfield was ruled an accidental drowning. With three companions, Mayfield had been swimming in the river and was reported missing after climbing half way up the bank of the river.

A state police tracking dog was used in efforts to locate him, but skin divers from the Isosco County Sheriff's Department and state police at East Tawas finally located the body.

Proceeds from this year's festival will go to the purchase of playground equipment. Headquarters for the festival is the fire hall with its large playground and athletic field.

Sewer - Water Set for HUD Housing

Members of the East Tawas Council and housing commission were assured Monday that sewer and water extensions necessary to serve a federal housing project at East Tawas would be ready during initial construction this fall.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, said that some areas of the city where 20 units were being scattered were served by existing facilities and that arrangements for extension of mains had been made to serve other areas when required by the contractor.

The project, one of the last being financed by the federal office of Housing and Urban Development, is to provide 30 units of high-rise housing for the elderly near the Bay Street-Church intersection, while 20 units for low income non-elderly persons are to be located in the Lincoln - Grant, Wilkinson - Franklin, Huron-Ogemaw areas.

Mayor Robert Bolen announced that a meeting would be held in the near future with the planning commission to consider revision of the city's zoning ordinance.

The council directed the city attorney to take steps necessary for condemning the old Swedish Lutheran Church, which is unoccupied.

Pending the outcome of a proposed general obligation bond issue to finance parking lot construction under a special assessment plan, the council accepted a proposal from Christ Episcopal Church on a 15-year lease of 3 1/2 lots for parking lot expansion.

The church offered to lease the property at a rate of \$1,500 annually, with a deduction of 10 percent if the 15-year total is paid in a lump sum. Total cost of the lease, plus development of the property for city parking purposes, has been estimated at approximately \$50,000.

Opposition Heard on Rezoning; City Disallows Request

Taking note of opposition voiced by residential property owners, Tawas City Council voted six to one Monday night not to allow rezoning of four lots along US-23 from RC multiple family to B-1 business.

Following a public hearing on the proposal, Ald. Clark Tanner's motion to disallow the rezoning was seconded by Ald. Edward Savage. In making his motion, Tanner said he was not in favor of spot zoning—"it is either the whole block or nothing."

Mayor John Brugger, who cast the only vote against the motion, had asked that the matter be tabled for further study and consideration by the council. A motion to that effect died for lack of support.

The property in question, which includes the former residence of the late N. C. Harting at the corner of North Street and Lake Street (US-23), is owned by Richard Ziehl of Detroit, formerly of Tawas City.

Ziehl had presented plans recently to the city planning commission for remodeling the old Harting home into a gift, antique, wine take-out and gourmet shop, with an art gallery on the second floor. He said Monday night that he had owned the property for the past five years. In showing an architectural drawing of his proposal, he believed that it would be better to preserve the old home rather than to demolish it, as has been the case for four old dwellings in the next two blocks to the south where zoning has been changed to commercial in recent years.

The city planning commission voted five to one recommending that the zoning change be allowed. Mayor Brugger said the planning commission did not consider that changing the four lots in question from the multiple family category to commercial was spot zoning, inasmuch as Block 12 to the south had recently been changed from multiple family to B-1 commercial on petitions of property owners.

In the instance of Block 12, however, there were no objections raised at the recent public hearing. At Monday night's meeting, three petitions were presented from property owners objecting to the zoning change. There were 13 property owners present at the hearing, some in favor of the zoning change and some opposed to it.

Hartford Files Damage Suit Against Local Bank Directors

A complaint asking a jury trial on damages not exceeding \$1,875,000 was filed Tuesday in Isosco Circuit Court against directors of Peoples State Bank jointly and severally, by Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company. Peoples State Bank was listed as a plaintiff with the insurance company.

Named as defendants in the suit were Paul Chevix, Lloyd G. McKay Jr., Charles Schreck, William Look, John Mielock and Hugo Keiser, all members of the board of directors.

Named also as a defendant was Richard L. Harwood, former bank president, who pleaded guilty to three counts of a 36-count federal indictment in February charging him with making false entries in bank records. He awaits sentencing.

The petition claims that the defendant directors illegally and improperly surrendered and delegated their individual and collective duties and authority to the former president of the bank and allowed the former president to manage the bank without supervision.

Hartford Accident and Indemnity Company claims that, as a result of the negligence, the bank sustained a loss of \$1,781,574.95 and that \$775,000 of the loss was paid by that insurance company.

The petition claims that the directors failed to investigate or correct the problems disclosed to them by bank examiners and failed to require adequate annual audits of the bank's condition by independent certified public accountants.

Tawas City Voters to Decide GO Bond Proposal on Sewers

Authorization to place a \$41,000 general obligation bond issue before the people November 6 for improvements to the sewer system and authorization to make application to the Farmers Home Administration for a \$74,500 low interest loan for water system improvements was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

This action came on recommendation of the water board, which met two weeks ago with the council and engineering consultants to study plans for water and sewer improvements totaling approximately \$400,000.

Action by the council Monday night concurred with a water board recommendation that the city participate at a rate of 10 percent as its share of proposed special assessment districts which would finance sewer improvements.

Mayor John Brugger said that the proposed general obligation bond issue would finance construction of a force sewer main connecting the Second Avenue lift station, located near the residence of Mrs. August Luedtke, with the sewage treatment plant.

The mayor said that operation of the Second Avenue lift station was the most critical problem in the city's public works. Approximately 75 percent of the city's sewage is pumped from this station to the waste treatment plant and has been overloaded for many years because of community growth. It is proposed that a new force main be constructed parallel to the present line along the railroad tracks.

Brugger said the force main was a public necessity and there was really no choice in the matter. He said that bonding attorneys had advised that a better interest rate could be obtained through a general obligation issue, rather than to adopt revenue bonds to finance the measure.

Hearings are to be held in the future concerning establishment of special assessment districts to finance sewer construction to serve River Street, Margo Street, Victoria Lane and US-23 from Dale Motel to Elms Avenue. The city at large would participate at the normal rate of 10 percent to finance the city's share.

The proposed FHA loan would finance construction of additions to the water distribution system, which include important water line loops on

Ninth Avenue to better serve the area below the US-23 bridge and on Harris Avenue to aid in correcting the problem of serving the Isosco Medical Care Facility and Tawas Area School.

Besides gaining a more favorable interest rate over a 40-year period, the proposed FHA loan would also overcome the problem of selling second mortgage bonds on outstanding obligations.

At the present time, Tawas City only spreads 14 mills of taxes to retire bonded indebtedness on the \$88,000 remaining to be paid on the 1961 addition to the sewage treatment

plant. In addition, the city is retiring \$42,000 remaining from a revenue bond issue which financed water main extensions, meters and the pumping station connecting Tawas City with East Tawas' filtration plant.

In other business Monday night, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz announced that this city's revenue sharing money from the federal government would be increased to \$42,109 in 1974, as compared to \$39,400 during fiscal 1973. This revenue sharing money is based on local tax effort and tax burden and the three-mill levy authorized for bridges and streets has actually gained the city more than \$15,000 in federal revenue sharing money. Bublitz said that both Osceola Township and East Tawas had received notification that federal revenue sharing money for those two units would be lower next year.

The council directed the city manager to contact the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for an inspection of Dead Creek near Brooks Auto Parts. The Michigan Department of Health had recently inspected the creek bank and indicated that the DNR had jurisdiction over any alleged bottom land filling or stream littering.

The city manager said that a meeting was to be called again with East Tawas to consider a proposal from Multi-County Landfill for furnishing dumping service to the two communities, which presently operate a joint landfill off Monument Road. The city manager said that Wilbur C. Roach of Multi-County Landfill had proposed a one-year contract to serve residential, industrial and commercial needs of Tawas City at a rate of \$5,500. He said that Roach had stipulated that the contract could be voided at any time should the county develop a landfill.

Bublitz said that cost to the two cities for operation of the landfill was \$12,039, of which Tawas City's share was \$4,866. He pointed out that cost of new compacting requirements were not included for the entire year and that actual cost this year would be close to Roach's proposed bid. He pointed out, too, that Multi-County Landfill was open seven days a week during the summer and five days a week during the winter, whereas the municipal landfill was open on Saturday and two afternoons.

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Charge Two With Violating State Substance Act

David H. Remilong, 20, and Randy K. Johnson, 18, both of Rose City, were arrested by Isosco Sheriff's Department officers Friday in Tawas City and charged with violation of the controlled substances act.

A car driven by Remilong was involved in a property damage accident at the Village Inn. Officers found a quantity of amphetamine capsules in the vehicle.

Michael T. Fisher, 21, was charged with possession of marijuana. Fisher, whose car was in a ditch along M-55, was arrested by officers and taken to the county jail to be booked. A quantity of marijuana was found in his possession when searched at the jail.

The sheriff's department reports that the Michigan Canoe Racing Association's monument on River Road was vandalized last week. Someone climbed the five-foot fence and bent two paddles on the monument.

Spoke Under Auspices Of ET Church

Christlike simplicity opens the door to spiritual discernment and healing. Noel D. Bryan-Jones, C. S., told an audience Saturday, August 4.

"Do you believe," Mr. Bryan-Jones asked, "that truth is really simple? I do. It is the questions that are getting more and more complicated. And we have to be careful that we are not led into complicated answers."

A member of the Christian Science Board of Lectureship from Worthing, Sussex, England, he spoke under the auspices of First Church of Christ, Scientist, East Tawas, in the Tawas United Methodist Church, East-Tawas.

Olga Sumner, first reader, introduced the lecturer.

Iva M. Adams, lecture chairman, was in charge of the local arrangements.

Through his lecture, entitled "The Simple Truth About God and Man," Mr. Bryan-Jones maintained that simplicity is the key to the healing power of the Christ, Truth.

"Christ is the true idea voicing good, the divine message from God to men speaking to the human consciousness," he declared, quoting from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science.

Noting that the Apostle Paul wrote of "the simplicity that is in Christ," the lecturer said: "The Christ comes to each one of you today as you earnestly seek to find the simple truth of what God is and what you are as His beloved spiritual creation."

He told how grief, loneliness and other everyday problems can be overcome on this basis. He also described healings through wholly spiritual means of crushed fingers and a fractured rib.

"Like a diver who has gone down through the restless waves on the surface to find the calm, simple beauty of the ocean bed, so the Science of Christianity," he said, "enables us to find beneath the waves of unrest and unbelief the calm, strong currents of God as infinite Mind, unutterable Love, omnipotent Truth."

"Jesus plunged beneath the stormy surface of uncertain human experi-

ence and demonstrated Christianity to be exactly scientific because it is capable of proof. Its basis is the simple, absolute Truth, the truth of perfect God and his perfect creation, man."

Emphasizing the importance of simple acceptance of the Truth that heals, he said that even young children have proved for themselves that this Truth uplifts, heals and sustains.

"The love of God, the Love which is God," he said, "pours into our lives as we acknowledge and bear witness to Truth as Jesus did. This inpouring of Love comforts, heals and destroys all that is unlike God."

Commenting on the Scriptural statement, "The law was given by Moses, but grace and truth came by Jesus Christ," the lecturer said:

"Grace is not just a girl's name any more than redemption is what you do with green stamps! Grace is the divine influence of Truth within ourselves. And it brings full redemption from suffering of any sort. As he said, Jesus did not come to destroy one jot or tittle of the law. He came to show the blessings of fulfilling the law, condensed into two basic commandments—love for perfect God, for all that is good, and love for man in his real nature as God's perfect son. That is the Truth to which Jesus bore witness."

This Truth is ever at hand, available to all, Mr. Bryan-Jones stated.

Packaged 200-Bed Hospital at Whittemore

Whittemore is one of 73 Michigan communities receiving a surplus 200-bed "packaged disaster hospital" designed especially for natural disasters and other emergencies. Gov. William G. Milliken announced Friday, August 3.
 The hospitals were given to the communities, which paid only a \$25 service fee, through the Federal Surplus Property Section of the Michigan Department of Management and Budget.
 "Although intended primarily for emergencies, these hospital units can and will be, in some instances, used immediately to provide needed additional beds, surgical facilities and supplies for existing local hospitals," Milliken said.
 The packaged hospitals were developed by the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Each unit contains materials to establish and operate an admitting and sorting section, a surgery, X-ray facilities, a clinical laboratory, a pharmacy, dental equipment and a central supply section. Equipment includes cots, litters, blankets, surgical dressings, anesthesia apparatus, a sterilizer, a 15-kilowatt electrical generator and a water supply system.
 In an emergency, a complete hospital can be placed in operation within a few hours.

The bride is a graduate of Eastern High School, Lansing. Her husband is a graduate of Tawas Area High School and Ferris State College, Big Rapids.



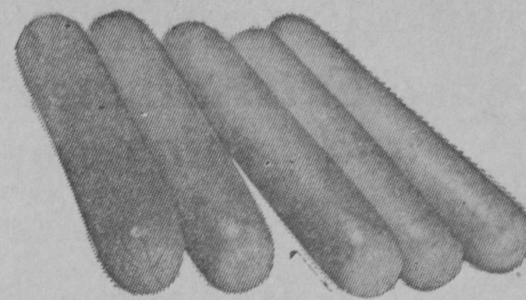

Iosco Adopts Resolutions On Courts, Legislature and Jail

Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday concurred with a resolution opposing a change in the Michigan Code of Criminal Justice as well as calling upon the legislature and governor to "resist the temptation of irresponsibility and to avoid adoption or approving any legislation which transfers state functions to counties."

In addition, the commission adopted a recommendation of its public safety committee to the effect that this county would not participate, at this time, in a federal grant for prisoner rehabilitation being proposed for a Tri-County Inmate Center by Michigan Mental Health Centers, Incorporated.

Commissioners were quick to react to a resolution from Macomb County, which expressed grave concern relative to the role of the courts, the probation department, the department of corrections, the criminal and society if current practices are drastically changed.

Currently pending before the Michigan Legislature is a proposed revision of the Michigan Code of Criminal Justice which would, among other things, take from the sentencing judge the control over the sentencing of a criminal and vest the control with the department of corrections.

The resolution stated that the rights of the public as well as the

right of the criminal sought to be rehabilitated are of equal importance and "must be jealously preserved and guarded within the confines of the present judicial system."

The resolution urged opposition to current legislation relative to the department of corrections assuming the entire and complete responsibility over the length and duration of sentencing imposed by circuit judges on criminals.

Iosco commissioners agreed with Midland County in the belief that the legislature has developed the practice of avoiding fiscal responsibility by requiring counties and not the state to absorb the cost of imple-

menting the wishes of the legislature.

"This practice has evolved by transferring state functions to counties and increases the cost to counties for discharging historic state functions, as well as imposing new and additional functions upon counties," stated the resolution.

"We do not dispute the desirability or intent of such legislation," stated the two county commissions. "However, this practice either forces counties to increase the amount of their appropriated funds for implementing state legislative mandates or places counties in a vulnerable position for noncompliance."

It was stated that such practices by the legislature violates the spirit, if not the intent, of the Michigan Constitution of 1963 in that the legislature, in effect, "is appropriating county funds without itemizing and balancing the revenues from which appropriations are to be paid."

The Iosco commission's public safety committee recommended that this county not participate, at this time, with Ogemaw and Arenac in a \$43,075 prisoner rehabilitation grant for a Tri-County Inmate Center as proposed by Michigan Mental Health Centers, Incorporated.

According to the grant application submitted through the Ogemaw County Sheriff's Department, inmates of the three county jails are "predominately poorly educated, from poor families, marked by chronic unemployment and with long histories of social disfunctioning."

The application stated that if the trend of the social adjustment continues, "they (inmates) can be expected to continue this pattern of crime and progress toward greater infractions and lengthier periods of incarceration."

It was proposed that the three counties each allocate \$300 toward matching the federal grant. In addition, utilization of existing equipment and personnel would represent an "inkind contribution" of \$12,604.

The program as proposed by Michigan Mental Health Centers, Incorporated, would establish an educational and recreational program at each jail. This would entail hiring of a program director, utilization of an existing psychologist, hiring of one teacher and a recreational supervisor for each jail.

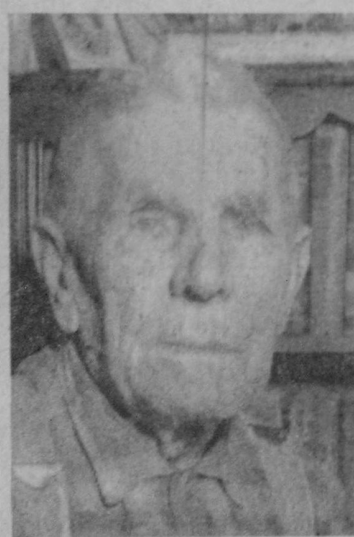
used in the evenings after those offices are closed, or on week-ends. A uniformed deputy will be required to supervise use of the recreational area, which is open to public view to sidewalk pedestrians. When the state jail inspector ordered the county board of commissioners to construct the "bullpen" in the area specified, one county officer expressed the opinion that utilization of the court area for this purpose would remove any opportunity for future expansion of presently overcrowded county vault and office space.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Message on Grocery Sacks Explains Food Dollar Facts

Kroger shoppers in this area will get some economic education with their grocery order this summer. Grocery sacks, approximately 60-million of them across the country, have been imprinted with a message which tells shoppers the facts about what goes into the food dollar they spend in supermarkets. From figures compiled by the Supermarket Institute and reflecting supermarkets nationally, shoppers will learn that 83 cents of the food dollar go to farmers and manufacturers to pay for the products a supermarket sells and to get it to stores. Nine and one-half

cents go for salaries, wages and fringe benefits; 5 1/10 cents are used to pay for rent, utilities, supplies, advertising, promotions, repairs and other expenses; 1 1/2 cents are needed to pay for federal, state and local taxes and for licenses.

This leaves less than one penny net profit for the supermarket to pay shareholders and to reinvest in the business, which means that if your supermarket made no profit at all, your \$10 grocery bill would be reduced less than 10 cents.

To put it another way, when you tip the boy next door 25 cents to car-

ry your \$20 order into the house, he is making more profit on your order than your supermarket did. Most of the larger supermarket firms make even less profit. Kroger, for example, made a net profit of only one-half penny per dollar of sales during the first half of 1973.

Widow Should Apply Prior to 60th Birthday

Question: My husband died three years ago. I will be 60 in a few months and I want to apply for monthly social security widow's payments. Must I wait until I am 60 to apply?

Answer: No. You should apply two or three months before you reach 60. You will need proof of your age, proof of your marriage and your husband's social security number when you apply. If you have a social security number of your own, you will need that number as well. But you should not delay filing your application because you do not have all of the items listed above. The people at the social security office may be able to help obtain them.

Question: I am 58 and had a heart attack in February. My doctor says I should not go back to work. Will I need to bring a letter from him explaining my disability when I apply for monthly social security disability payments?

Answer: You should first call any social security office. They can tell you what information to bring with you when you apply for benefits. If you have a letter from your doctor, you should bring it along when you apply. However, if you do not have a letter, social security will request one directly from your doctor.

Question: I retired and began getting monthly social security payments when I was 63. I will be 65 in the fall. Is it true that I will be enrolled in medicare automatically?

Answer: Yes, you will be automatically signed up for both the hospital and medical insurance parts of medicare. The medical part will cost you \$6.30 a month, but you can decline the coverage if you do not wish to pay the premiums for it.

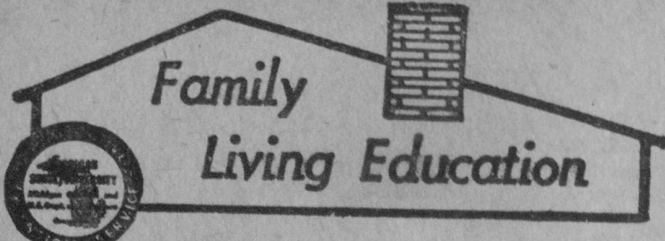

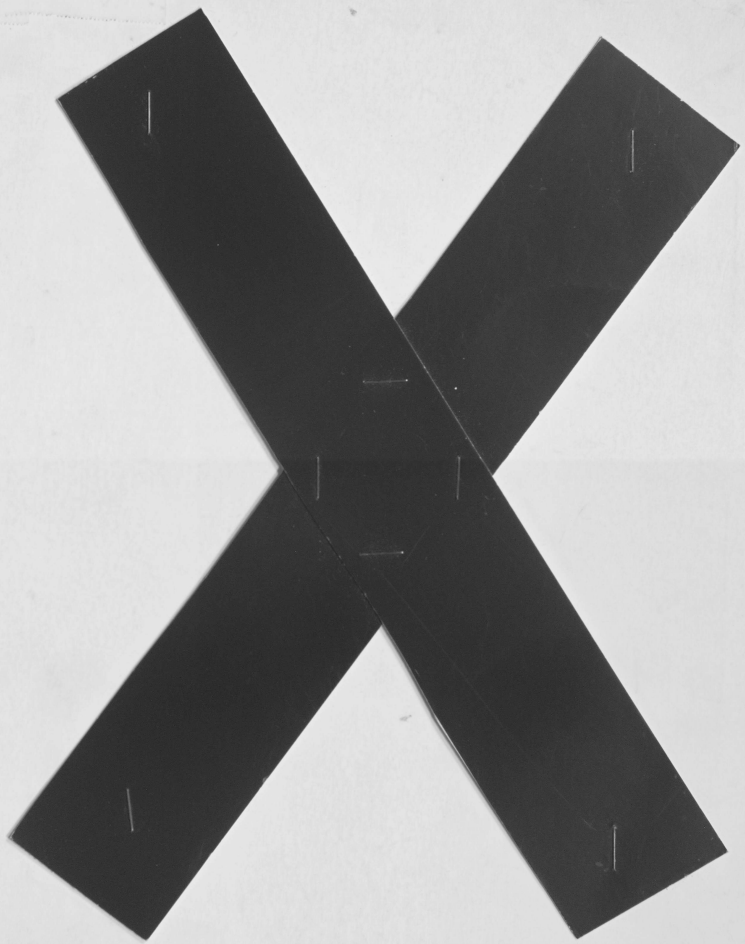
