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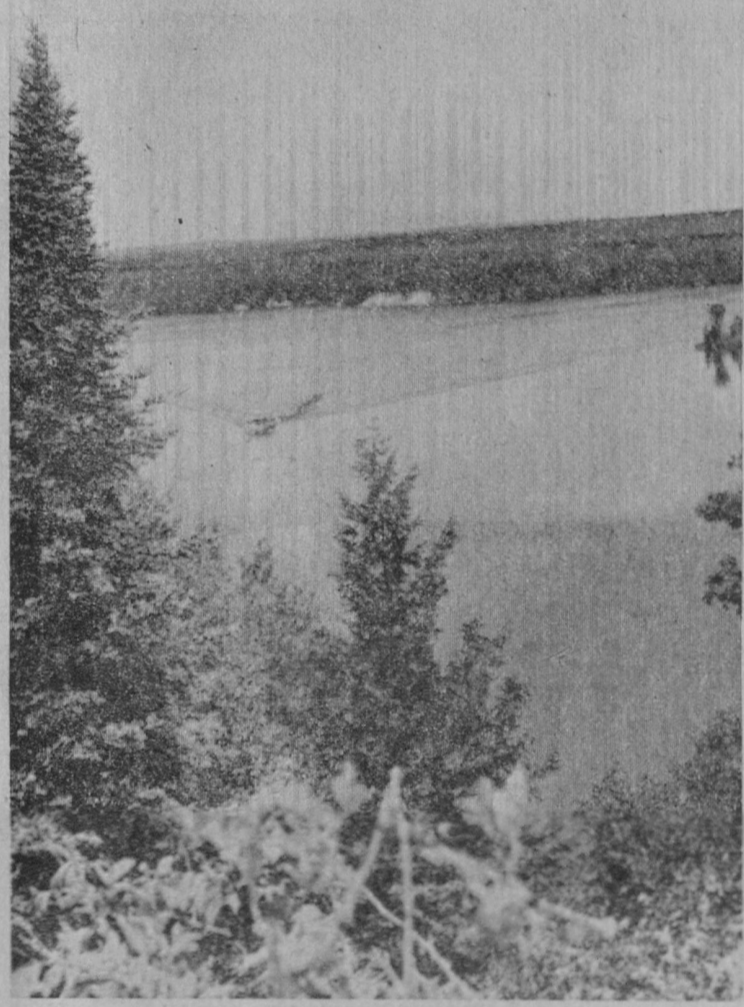

THE HISTORIC 'Riviere aux Sables'

Known to the early French explorers as the "Riviere aux Sables" (River of Sand), the AuSable has played an important and colorful role in the history of Iosco County. This mighty stream was home to Michigan's Indians; it provided the raw materials for the region's fur industry; its mouth served as a haven for the Lake Huron fishing fleet; upon its bosom was carried millions of feet of pine logs during the lumbering era; its flow of water still serves as an important link in the produc-

tion of the state's electrical power supply. Abused through much of its existence through the reckless cutting of timber along its deep valley and causing subsequent erosion, coupled with pollution factors later caused by man, the river is making a comeback through enlightened conservation measures. Today, the river courses its way nearly 240 winding miles from Grayling to Lake Huron is visited by countless thousands of vacationers, who enjoy canoeing,

enter my claim under the laws for ascertaining and deciding upon claims to land in the Territory of Michigan, to a tract of land lying and being situated on the Riviere aux Sables, or Sandy River, in said territory, about one-fourth of a mile from the mouth of said river, and on the west side thereof, extending 80 arpents in the river of said river and containing 640 acres; bounded in front by said river and in rear and on sides by public lands.

(The complete history of Chevalier's original land claim and subsequent ownership by various individuals is on file at the Iosco Abstract Office and in the Iosco Register of Deeds office.)
 The Chevalier claim is a reservation of land in AuSable Township, about three miles long and one-half mile in width, its shape conforming to the Rensch method of surveying land and to which the term, "ribbon firm," has been given.
 The claim is embraced in portions of Sections 3, 4, 5 and 6 of T23N, R9E and contains 648.67 acres. The reservation extends from the AuSable River and runs north 85 degrees and 45 minutes west, a distance on the south boundary of 241.08 chains and on the north boundary of 231.09 chains. The width of the claim is given as 27.40 chains. It was surveyed by the surveyor general of Michigan on July 28, 1848.
 Nothing is known of Louis Chevalier except that he was living in Chicago, Illinois, in 1834, when he conveyed his reservation to Joseph A. Collett, who in turn conveyed to Joseph Campau, an independent fur trader of the territory, with headquarters in Detroit and was known as the richest man in Michigan. The Chevalier-Collette deed and the Collette-Campau deed were recorded in the office of the Register of Deeds of Saginaw County on January 21, 1840.
 The assigns of Campau conveyed title to the property to Henry M. Loud in 1867, which saw the beginning of the lumbering era along the AuSable River. This land, at the time of its acquisition by the Lous, was located in the Township of AuSable. The lumbering firm of Loud, Gay and Company later platted a portion of it as part of Osoda. Afterwards, it became a part of the City of AuSable, but, in 1894, it was set back into the Township of AuSable.
 It is believed that Chevalier brought under crude cultivation a portion of the land along the river and his log house stood on the river bank near today's Mill Street bridge. When Henry M. Loud made his first visit to the AuSable River region, the ruins of Chevalier's log house were still visible on the bank of the river.
 History has not recorded a trading post in this vicinity under either the French or the British regimes, but the American Fur Company had a post on the AuSable and Chevalier was probably the trader in charge. Gardner D. and Ephraim S. Williams took charge of the American Fur Company's post at Saginaw in 1828 and an outpost was established at AuSable.
 In the Michigan Historical Collection is an invoice of goods and merchandise taken by George Lashy in his trade with the Indians at Riviere aux Sables. For 12 years, the American Fur Company maintained its post at AuSable. The company withdrew from the region when the source of supply of the fur trade dwindled by reason of extermination.
 A member of a surveying party in Northern Michigan published notes in 1839 stating that the AuSable River was then an unknown stream, but in 1849, Benjamin F. Pierce of Bangor, Bay County, had a trading post or store near the mouth of the AuSable which formed the landmark from which lots were set off and divided for the resident fishermen of AuSable, who wished to purchase land there.
 Thus, the wild, free life in Iosco was over; the fleet of fur-trading canoes had stopped at AuSable for its last cargo when the era of the fishing industry opened, later to be superseded by the bustling lumbering industry. Each succeeding generation has left its mark, for better or for worse.

The earliest mention of the AuSable River is found in "Lahontan's Voyages to North America." The author was a young officer in the French army, who at the age of 22, was placed in command of Ft. St. Joseph. Setting out from Quebec, he arrived at the fort in the fall of 1687 and, the following spring, finding himself short of provisions, he decided to go to "Michilimackinac" to buy up corn from the Hurons and the "Outaouans."
 In a letter written at Mackinac and dated May 26, 1688, he says: "Having left some soldiers to guard the fort in my absence, I embarked with the rest of my detachment on the first of April, with a gentle southeast gale, by the help of which we crossed the Bay of Saginaw. That little gulf is six hours over and in the middle of it there are two little islands, which afford a very seasonable shelter when a wind arises in the crossing over. Before you have crossed this bay, the coast all along is full of rocks and shelves, one of which that I saw was six leagues broad; but on the other side the coast is clear and low, especially toward the Sand River, which lies half way between that bay and a place called L'Aufe du Tonnerre."
 This description of Saginaw Bay, Charity Islands, River AuSable and Thunder Bay will be readily recognized. On the earlier maps, the AuSable was called Sand River and sometimes Sandy River. Owing to its location, there can be no doubt that the mouth of the AuSable, before and for long after the time of Lahontan, must have been a stopping place for the voyageurs, cour- eur de bois, fur traders and Indians, in their journeys up and down the west shore of Lake Huron.
 In the early decades of the 1800s, America was looking restlessly to the West—its broad vistas of opportunity and adventure beckoned men who could meet the rugged frontier. Such a man was David Bates Douglass, a graduate of West Point, who served with the Lewis Cass expedition of 1820 in the exploration of the Upper Great Lakes and Northern Mississippi region. Douglas' journal contained the following reference to this region:
 "We coasted this shore at some distance in order to clear a long crooked sandy point called Point AuSable (Tawas Point) which makes out and encloses a bay (Tawas Bay) of the same name of nearly six miles width. The extremity of this point is barren, but in coasting along the coast beyond it the land, still sandy, is grown up with a beautiful variety of evergreens.
 "About nine or 10 miles from the last point we turned by which we leave Saginaw Bay and, after traversing some three or four miles of coast resembling that just mentioned, we landed in the mouth of a fine river called the Riviere aux Sables. Here we encamped for the night, having made in the course of this day nearly 60 miles and that on my part without eating. There is an Ottawa camp about a mile up this river and we found near our own a small camp of Chippewas, from some of whom we obtained fine fresh sturgeon for supper."
 Antedating any claim for land in Iosco County is one by Louis Chevalier. History has not recorded the story of Chevalier's stay in Iosco County but, in the files of the United States Land Office at Washington, D. C., is a record proving that in the year 1823, Chevalier entered a claim for land situated on the Riviere aux Sables, the document reading as follows:
 Louis Chevalier's Claim
 Notice: I, Louis Chevalier, hereby

Tawas Businessmen Heard Discussion on Energy Crisis

A message from Gov. William Milliken urging resort areas "not to panic" during the present gasoline shortage was passed on Thursday to area businessmen by John North of East Michigan Tourist Association.
 North was one of several speakers at a special combined meeting between the East Tawas Business Association and Tawas City Businessmen's Association held Thursday at the Holland House, East Tawas.
 The East Michigan Tourist Association representative was one of 300

persons attending a task force on state-wide tourism which met Wednesday at Lansing. Discussed were problems relating to the present fuel crisis and how the lack of gasoline would effect the tourist industry.
 North stressed the point that tourist industry leaders should support the 50-mile-per-hour limit on driving as a means of conserving gasoline. He said, too, that state tourist leaders were meeting with representatives of bus lines and travel agencies to work out a possible plan whereby buses could be utilized to transport downstate persons to areas in the north

for week-end fun. Also being promoted as a means of conserving gasoline for such trips is organization of car pools. North said that national representatives of Amtrak had indicated that snow trains using railroad facilities to the north could not be facilitated this year.
 Resort areas are being urged by EMTA to establish storage and service facilities for persons owning snowmobiles. It was stated that downstate visitors could leave snowmobiles in such a facility, return to their homes and conserve gasoline by not hauling trailers and then return north again for week-ends of snowmobile fun by picking up machines and gear at storage facilities.
 It was pointed out that tourism is the No. 2 industry today in Michigan and sales relative to this business during the past year in this state amounted to 14-billion dollars. Tourist-related properties paid 107-million dollars in state taxes, which is more than the state lottery netted this year.
 North stated that closing gasoline service stations on Sundays would cut the tourist business by one-half.

Patrick, owner of a Dearborn radio station and sports director for the Mutual Broadcasting System, is well known to residents of the Tawas area. He, along with Bob Reynolds of WJR, crowned most of the Silver Valley queens when the winter sports park was operated by the chamber of commerce.

Boost Reward for Killer of Bald Eagle

Michigan Audubon Society has announced an addition of \$200 to the reward offered by the Menominee Herald Leader for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons who killed a bald eagle at Hayward Lake in Menominee County. This brings the total to \$1,000.
 The eagle was shot and killed the week of October 15. According to John Wormwood, conservation officer, the bird was found lying near the public access area on the lake's south shore and the two spent shotgun shells were nearby.
 Other contributors to the reward are the National Wildlife Federation and the Detroit Audubon Society.
 Robert Bradburn, president of the Michigan Audubon Society, pointed out that eagles are protected by federal law.

Traveling to Mt. Morris for the nonconference opening game, the Braves fell before the Mt. Morris squad, 47-43, in an extremely low scoring game. The Braves shot 86 times at the baskets during the night and completed only 17 shots for a

shooting average of 20 percent—a completion rate which will have to be improved if the Braves are to live up to predictions that they would be a title contender in the NBC.

"We did some of the right things Saturday night and we did not take any wild shots—the team just could not hit and it was very frustrating," stated Coach Dick Fairless, whose team got off to a bad start in his first year as mentor.

Fairless said he was particularly encouraged, however, by the fact that the Braves were able to run against a fast team and "we could have run them off the floor" with a little better shooting percentage.

The Braves overcame a cold first quarter deficit of 10-7 by coming back to outscore Mt. Morris, 12-7 and 12-10 in the middle quarters. The Braves, enjoying a 31-27 bulge at the end of the third quarter, had a slump at the start of the fourth quarter and that was their undoing.

Mt. Morris overcame the scoring deficit and took a four-point lead, forcing the Braves to play catchup basketball. As a result, Tawas was penalized by fouls and Taylor of Mt. Morris meshed five of six charity tosses in that quarter to put the winners out in front to stay.

It was a physical game for the Braves as Mickey Haglund, who scored eight of Tawas' 19 points in the first half, was smacked in the mouth by an elbow in the third quarter and he made only one bucket the rest of the night. His 10 points were high for Tawas' scoring effort.

The Braves dominated the backboards during the first half with 12 pickoffs from the offensive boards and 15 defensive rebounds. The Braves had things pretty much their own way on the backboards throughout the night with 38 out of 58 rebounds.

On the opposite side of the ledger, however, was the fact that Tawas could mesh only nine of 25 charity tosses—again finding that the rims seemed to "shrink" when they tossed the ball toward.

Top scorer of the night was Leatherberry of Mt. Morris, who had 19 points on eight buckets and three charity tosses.

Tawas missed a steady performance from Larry Nichols, who sustained a sprained ankle in practice and did not start the game.

The Braves put all the chips on the line this Friday night when they open the NBC season by going against Essexville Garber on the latter's home floor. The Dukes, a huge and rugged team, will be going into their first game on the heels of winning the conference football championship and the last game of the grid season saw the Bay County team derail any ideas which Tawas might have had for a share of the football trophy.

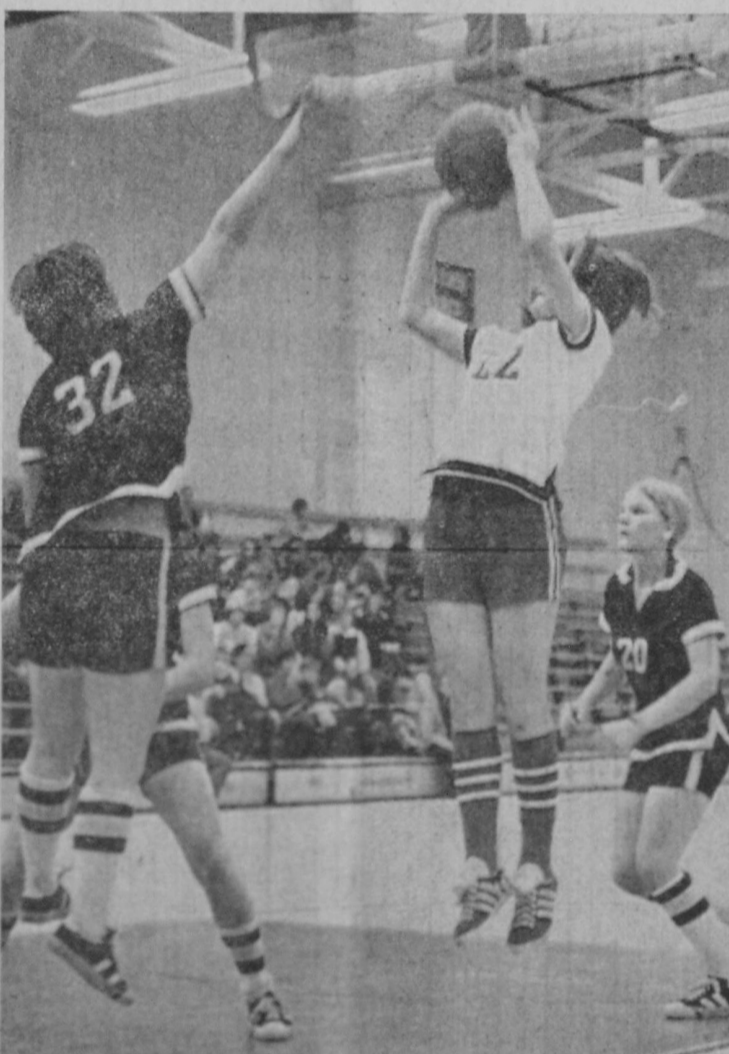

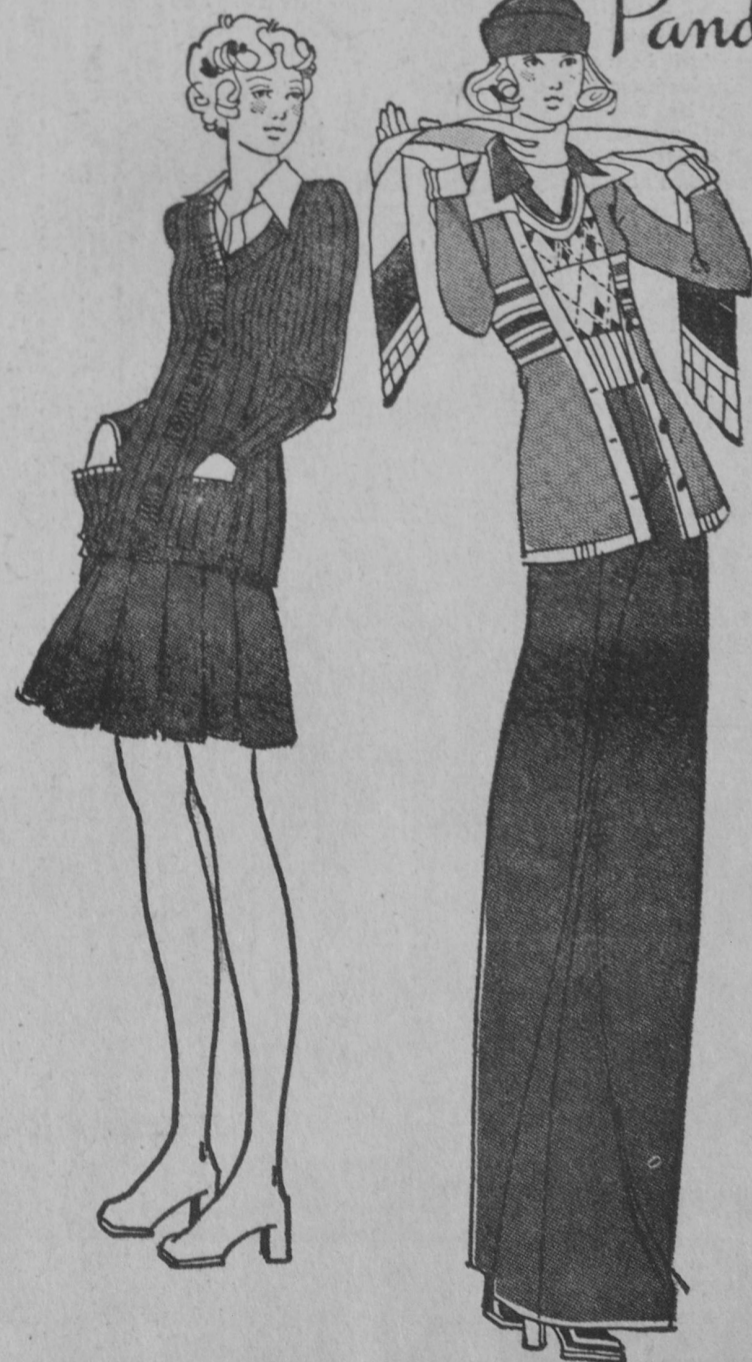

Two Civil Suits Ask Damages Totaling Nearly \$1.5-Million in Iosco County Circuit Court

Damage suits asking judgments totaling nearly 1 1/2-million dollars have been filed in Iosco Circuit Court.

An auto negligence suit filed by James A. Sheehan and Charlene M. Sheehan of Baldwin Township asks judgments of \$120,000 each against Russel G. Anschuetz, 691 M-55, Tawas City. Sheehan, who operates Huron Au-

to Parts in Tawas City, was at the scene of an auto accident January 28, 1972, and was in the process of removing a vehicle from the scene using a wrecker. The complaint said that the wrecker was positioned on the highway in preparation for moving a wrecked vehicle from a ditch. The complaint stated that the wrecker was illuminated by rotating and flashing red light beacons.

According to the complaint, Anschuetz was negligent when he allowed his truck to crash into the wrecker. Both plaintiffs were in the wrecker at the time and sustained injuries.

The second case is a three-count complaint asking a judgment of \$1,150,000 involving an accidental shooting on November 28, 1970. The plaintiffs, Mr. and Mrs. Donald J. VanSickle of Aston, Pennsylvania, claim their 13-year-old son, Donald, suffered the loss of his right arm and hand, has restricted use of the right leg, impairment of speech and permanent injury to the brain due to being struck in the forehead by a .22 caliber slug fired by Phillip Partlo of Burleigh Township. He, along with Edith Partlo, were named as defendants.

According to the complaint, Donald was in the Partlo barn when Partlo was in the process of slaughtering a cow by means of a .22 caliber pistol. The complaint said that the slug fired by Partlo struck the head of the cow, then ricocheted and struck the forehead of Donald, who was 20 feet away.

Answer Questions Pertaining to Social Security Benefits

Question: I am confused about when to file for social security disability benefits. I have heard about both a five-month waiting period and a 12-month waiting period. Can you explain which is correct?

Answer: You should file an application for benefits as soon as it is determined that you are likely to be disabled for a year or longer.

The five-month period is the waiting period. You can file your application during this period but no monthly payments can be made for the first five full calendar months of a disability.

The 12-month period refers to the expected duration of the disability. Social security can pay benefits only if the disability is expected to last for at least 12 months or longer and is serious enough to rule out any substantial gainful work.

Question: Before her recent death, my wife worked under social security for nearly 11 years. Even though I plan to continue working and supporting our two children, ages nine and 12, could they get monthly social security benefits on my wife's work record?

Answer: Yes. The children may be eligible for social security benefits on their mother's record regardless of the surviving father's work situation. You should file an application for the children.

Question: I am 62 and get monthly social security benefits as a widow. Will medicare help pay any of my medical expenses?

Answer: No. Medicare only helps

to pay hospital and medical bills for people 65 or older. If you cannot pay your medical expenses, you may be eligible for medicare. Medicare helps pay the medical bills of individuals at any age based on their need. Call your local welfare office for more information about the medicare program.

Color Slides Observe 25th Anniversary of Movement to Save Jack-Pine Warblers

Celebrating the 25th anniversary of the first major move to save Michigan's jack-pine warbler from extinction, the Michigan Audubon Society has issued a set of 10 color slides that show the bird and its habitat.

The species, officially called Kirtland Warbler, nests only in a small part of the jack-pine barrens in Northern Lower Michigan and nowhere else in the world. Even today, only about 400 birds are estimated to have survived. The adult male is bluish-gray with a striking lemon-yellow breast.

It was in 1958 that Michigan's Department of Natural Resources, in cooperation with the Michigan Audubon Society, designated three tracts of state forest land as Kirtland Warbler management areas. Five years later, about 4,000 additional acres in the Huron National Forest were included in the management program.

Further help has been given by the Bureau of Sports, Fishes and Wildlife, particularly from the office of Endangered Species and the Division of Wildlife Services. Help has also come from the Department of Agriculture through the United States Forest Service.

Under natural conditions, the bird's habitat results from forest fires. One of the dramatic aspects of the management program has been controlled burning. The Kirtland Warbler requires a habitat of small jack pines, about six to 18 feet tall, with numerous openings to keep the lower limbs exposed to

sunlight. The lower limbs thus stay alive and reach down to the thick ground cover in which the nests are built. When the trees get too big, the birds do not nest.

The bird was first collected in 1851 on the farm of a naturalist, Dr. Jared P. Kirtland, near Cleveland, Ohio. Subsequently, it was learned that it winters in the Bahamas. But no one knew where the warbler nested until 1903, when the nesting area was discovered near Michigan's AuSable River by a pair of trout fishermen.

Medicare Beneficiaries Urged to File Insurance Claims

Medicare beneficiaries are urged to file all medical insurance claims for services received from October 1, 1971, through September 31, 1972, before the deadline of December 31, 1973, John Carr, district social security manager at Bay City, announced today.

Under the medicare law, claims for services provided within the October 1971-September 1972 period cannot be reimbursed when received after December 31, 1973.

Carr also explained that a carry-

over rule applicable to the medical insurance part of medicare also allows many claims for services performed in the final three months of each calendar year to count toward the \$60 annual deductible for that year as well as the following year.

Even though a medicare patient has not met his deductible near the end of a year, he should send in all of his bills, especially those for the final three months. Thus, his record is updated so that prompt service can be rendered on subsequent claims.

Carr invited medicare beneficiaries to visit the social security office at 1009 North Madison, Bay City, if they need assistance in completing claims. This especially applies to those people receiving social security disability payments who became covered under medicare beginning in July 1973.

All claims should be promptly mailed to Medicare, Michigan Medical Service, Post Office Box 2201, Detroit, Michigan 48231, to avoid the Christmas mail rush.
