


The Fraternal Order of Police has announced it is seeking the aid of a state mediator in settling a contract bargaining dispute between Iosco County and sheriff's deputies.


At issue is a question concerning who has responsibility for signing a contract with the deputies—the Iosco County Board of Commissioners or Sheriff George Westcott.

The five-month period is the wait-The five-month period is the walting period. You can file your application during this period but no monthly payments can be made for the first five full calendar months of a disability.

The 12-month period refers to the expected duration of the disability. Social security can pay benefits only if the disability is expected to last for at least 12 months or longer and is serious enough to rule out any substantial gainful work.


