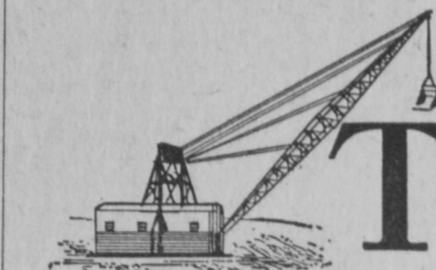
Perpetual Care Money Being Used to Purchase Land

Authorization to purchase land for future expansion of the city cemetery was given Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

This action was taken on recommendation of Wilfred Clark and Ervin H. Ulman, cemetery board members, who met February 6 with Mayor John N. Brugger and City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz.

The property, comprising approximately eight acres, was purchased from John Hosbach at a cost of \$5,000. The property is located east of Emanuel Lutheran Cemetery and is situated entirely within the plat of the city.

Long in discussion before city officials, the site includes a beautiful stand of maturing Norway pine. The city is to have a forester inspect the pine to determine the best means of future utilization of the property

Petition Council

Citizens Ask City to Outlaw Snowmobiles

A petition asking the city to outlaw the operation of snowmobiles on city streets was presented Monday night to the East Tawas Council by Otto Kobs, a resident of West Washington Street.

The petition, signed by neighbors of Kobs, said the present ordinance was of little value in the control of snowmobiles with present police equipment and that it was not practical or feasible to duplicate equipment on the police department.

"It is evident that snowmobilers are aware of the immunity to control of any kind and a great many of them are taking advantage of this situation by using city streets for a racetrack, zipping through intersections without slowing speed, crossing lawns and roaming the city at all hours," stated the petition.

"We even have children driving their friends about the city who will not be old enough to drive an automobile for another four or five years. Since increasing numbers and more powerful engines, these vehicles are a public nuisance and a hazard to life and property; since there is no way to control their use, we feel the only sensible and effective course would be to outlaw their use on all city streets and inhabited portions of the city," stated the petition.

The petition asked that the proposed ordinance be placed before voters in April using the following wording: "Shall the use of snowmobiles be banned from the streets and inhabited portions of the city?"

The petition was turned over to a council committee for study.

A special meeting of the council is to be held Friday concerning purchase of property known as the A&P parking lot by the city.

The council decided that the city would not participate in mayor's exchange day during Michigan Week.

The planning commission was urged to study rezoning of the city to allow expansion of commercial areas in blocks east and west of Newman Street and to set aside areas for multiple housing.

First reading was held on a proposed new ordinance concerning hunting within the city. Hunting is to be limited to the northeast portion of the city east of School Road and northeast of Lincoln Street.

Expect Materials Soon for Bridges

Shipment of materials to commence work on constructing new bridges at Mathews Street and First Street is expected this week or next, according to a report heard at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said the bridge contractor had completed work on fabricating the wooden bridges and that rail shipment of the material is expected shortly.

The council is to hold a special meeting as soon as an engineering report is received on the proposed reconstruction of major city streets. This project, to be financed through federal revenue sharing funds, was authorized by the council several weeks ago.

Considerable work must be accomplished prior to actual street construction work, including grading of shoulders, construction of road base, along with sewer-water connection work. Some of the work may be contracted by the city.

Construction of bridge approaches is to be included in the street program.

Members of the council recommended Monday night that the city obtain prices on purchasing a new back hoe for work on sewer and water mains. Methods of financing such a purchase would have to be studied as federal revenue sharing money has been earmarked for street work.

In other business, a report from the planning commission stated that the Fraternal Order of Eagles was interested in obtaining the location of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company on First Street as a possible site for its quarters, including a liquor license. Use of the property under an ordinance variance was allowed the gas company in 1963, but

East Tawas Council OK's Street Work With RS Money

Authorization to spend \$53,925 in federal revenue sharing funds was given Monday night by the East Tawas Council. Of the total, approximately \$25,000 would be for street improvements. A balance of \$17,000 would remain in the fund.

Expenditures of the revenue sharing fund would include \$777 for street lighting, \$1,053 for a copy machine, \$2,490 for a two-way radio for the fire department, \$4,000 as part of the salary for a fulltime patrolman, \$12,605 for purchase of a tractor and back hoe, \$6,000 for construction of a cemetery storage building and \$2,000 for cemetery expansion.

The street construction during May and June will exceed the revenue sharing money and the balance is to be taken from the regular street budget.

Major streets to be blacktopped include: West Lincoln, from Sawyer to Ogemaw, 1,387 feet, 22 feet wide, 320 tons, \$4,368; Ogemaw, from State to Lincoln, 475 feet, 22 feet wide, 110 tons, \$1,501; East Westover, from Main to Wadsworth, 990 feet, 22 feet wide, 230 tons, \$3,139; Wadsworth, from Westover to Bay, 460 feet, 22 feet wide, 110 tons, \$1,501; Pine, from Bay to Westover, 450 feet, 22 feet wide, 200 tons, \$2,730.

Total length of major street construction will be 3,762 feet, with 970 tons of blacktop at a cost of \$13,240.

Local streets to be constructed include: Wadsworth, from Westover to Franklin, 1,765 feet, 400 tons, \$5,460; East Washington, from Main to Wadsworth, 990 feet, 230 tons, \$3,139; Smith, from Woodlawn to Bennington, 800 feet, 20 feet wide, 160 tons, \$1,638; South Alice, from US-23 southerly, 400 feet, 22 feet wide, 95 tons, \$1,298; Adams, from Bay to Westover, 460 feet, 22 feet wide, 110 tons, \$1,501;

Locke, from Bay to State, 820 feet, 20 feet wide, 180 tons, \$2,457; Adams, from Washington to Franklin, 465 feet, 22 feet wide, 113 tons, \$1,542; West Franklin, from Newman to Church, 682 feet, 22 feet wide, 170 tons, \$2,320.

An Alpena couple, John A. and Angeline Chesney, were injured when their snowmobile collided with a machine operated by Rita Patterson, 14 years old, East Tawas. Officers said the crash occurred at the baseball field on Newman Street.

Marilyn M. Hartwig, 36, Walled Lake, was injured when her snowmobile rolled over on Cooke Dam Road, Oscoda Township.

Hans Krause, 27, Vassar, injured his legs when his snowmobile struck a snowdrift on Tawas Lake.

William H. Pickett, 56, Hale, struck his head on a support beam when he drove his snowmobile under a bridge west of Hale.

Commission to Take Time Naming Successor to Oates

The recent death of Henry Oates, county tax equalization director, and serious illness of Deloise (Dewey) Durant, his assistant, has caused a natural disruption in the operation of the county tax office, but members of the county board of commissioners said Tuesday that some progress had been made toward solving those problems.

William Wereley, commission chairman, said Tuesday morning that the board was not going to act in haste toward appointing a new tax director. The present situation is to be discussed at today's (Wednesday) meeting of the county commission.

Wereley said that the commission had contacted the state tax commission and learned that work remaining incomplete could be handled for the present by certified assessors in the county.

The commission chairman said that Sup. Charles Smith of Oscoda, who holds a two level certification with the state, had offered his services to assist the county office. Dennis Christia, Plainfield Township supervisor with a one level certification, has offered his assistance, along with other state certified supervisors.

Prior to Oates' death, the county tax office contracted with six gov-

Would Locate College Center in Tawas Area

Kirtland Community College, Roscommon, has announced that it will establish an extension center in the Tawas area for freshman-level students.

The college board of trustees authorized development of the center, the first such venture by the college started in 1966. At present, the Tawas area is not included in a community college district.

"There is a real need for freshman college level offerings in the area," said Stanley Evers, director of occupational education and community services.

The program planned at the extension center is primarily liberal arts. Classes would include English, sociology, psychology, speech and introductory business courses.

"A student would be able to complete the first year toward the associate degree in the home community," Evers said. About 30 credit hours are needed for the first year toward the 62-credit degree.

Admission through the extension center would be the same as on campus enrollment, primarily all high school graduates and those nongraduates 18 years and older who could benefit from college course work. Tuition rate would be \$10 per credit hour, the same as on campus courses for students living in the Kirtland district of Crawford, Osceola, Ogemaw and Roscommon Counties.

The center would offer both afternoon and evening classes as demanded by students. Classes to be offered would not duplicate community school programs of the local school district. The extension program would be developed in cooperation with the community school director.

Evers said no target date has been set for the opening as a building has not been obtained as yet. A class is to open in early August at Tawas Hospital for licensed practical nurses as a separate program.

emental units of the county to perform assessing work for 1973. Those units include Alabaster and Sherman Townships, along with the Cities of Whittemore, Tawas City and East Tawas. Much of the field work on the above contracts had been completed by Oates and his staff.

In addition, the tax director's office was in the process of compiling information to be submitted to a Midland firm which is to provide data processing this year for the township and city officials, along with boards of review, was held Monday at the county building.

According to information in the clerk's office, Oates held a four level certification from the state, one level above the certification required by the state. It would be required that the new director would have a three level certification.

At the present time, Supervisor Smith of Osceola holds the highest certification level in the county. The state tax commission gave its approval to allow Smith to sign reports being sent to Lansing with a two level certification under a temporary basis.

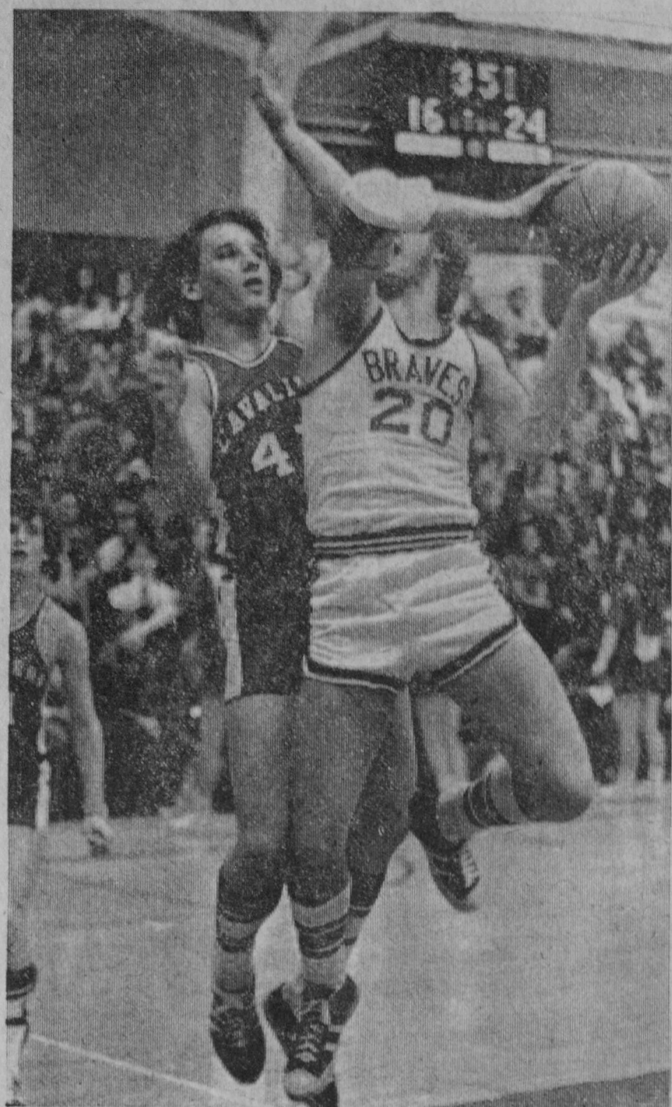

The Braves are scheduled to play host to Gladwin this Friday night. The Flying Gs defeated the Braves earlier in the season and Tawas will be looking for revenge as the conference season reaches its final stages.

Next meeting will be held Wednesday, February 28, 12 o'clock noon, at the community building.

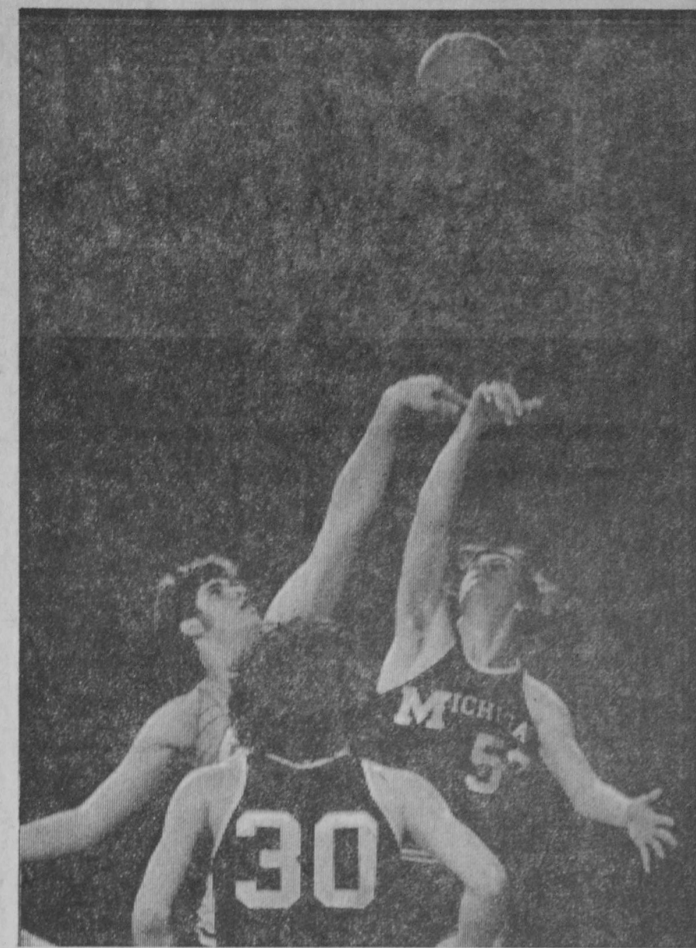
Tim Fox on CMU Junior Varsity

Eagles Shaky, but Post NSL Victory

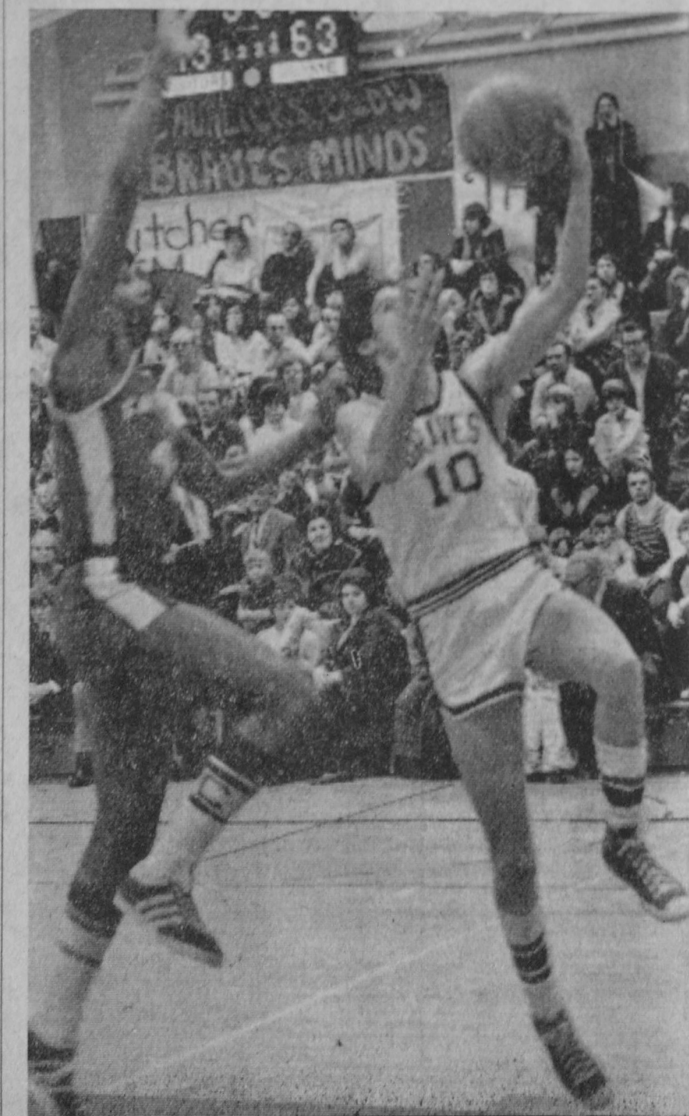

Education

Are you one of the homemakers who have asked for a straight answer about the nutritive value of "organically-grown" foods?

I can tell you that there is no proven, substantiated basis for claiming that plants grown with only organic fertilizer have a greater nutrient content than those grown by conventional methods.

The type of fertilizer used is not a determining factor in the nutritive value of a plant according to the latest information from agricultural scientists.

The nutrient content of a plant is based on its genetic nature. The genes in a carrot cause it to develop a relatively large amount of vitamin A value, just as the genes in an orange are responsible for its high vitamin C content. Climate, including the amount of light together with kind and amount of nutrient material available to the plant for growth and the stage of maturity when the plant is harvested, are the other chief factors involved.

How is nutrient material absorbed by the plant? It must be in the inorganic form. This means that organic fertilizer must be broken down into its inorganic components before the elements are absorbed. Most of the nutrients present, except for the mineral elements, are synthesized in the plant rather than absorbed from the soil in the preformed state.

How is the nutritive value of fresh vegetables and fruits maintained and preserved from the time that they are harvested until they are marketed and then until they are consumed?

It requires great care—maintaining "freshness" is the key to maintaining nutritive value. Maintaining freshness and the desirable flavor has nothing to do with the manner in which the vegetables or fruits are fertilized and grown. Freshness depends on the manner and time of harvesting, control of such factors as temperature and humidity, packaging, speed of transportation and therefore the handling at the wholesale and retail levels and in the home.

The nutritive superiority of most grains over their more refined counterparts, whole wheat flour versus white flour, is well recognized. This superiority, however, is in no way related to the type of fertilizer used or the use of pesticides or additives.

The process of refining removes some of the nutrients in varying degrees, especially the B vitamins, iron and trace minerals. Often products are "enriched" by adding certain purified B vitamins and iron. This is not done, however, for the trace minerals and vitamin E lost in the refining.

Increased use of cereals in the whole grain form is commendable. It can be promoted on the basis of increased nutritive value but not related to fertilizer and processing methods.

Disabled Workers Get Larger Checks

More than 40,000 disabled workers getting both workmen's compensation and social security disability in-

urance benefits get larger social security checks because of recent changes in law, according to John Carr, social security district manager, Bay City.

Enroll Kids For Fluoride by March 1

Parents who wish to have their children enrolled in this summer's topical fluoride program have until March 1 to act, according to Diane Oberlies, chairman of the Tawas Area Newcomers Club's topical fluoride committee.

All three or four-year-old preschoolers, second, fifth and eighth grade students are eligible for the program, providing they have been registered prior to the deadline. Teachers of second, fifth and eighth grades have been asked to pass out the registration forms and letters to all their students. Parents who wish to enroll their children but who have not received the registration cards may send their names, addresses and telephone numbers to Tawas Area Fluoride Program, 830 Newman Street, East Tawas, Michigan 48730. A nominal fee to cover costs of operating the clinic must be submitted along with the registration card.

Individuals desiring further information regarding the program may call 362-6225.

Combined social security and workmen's compensation monthly payments still cannot be over 80 percent of the worker's average monthly earnings before he became disabled, Carr said, but the law adds another way to figure the average earnings.

"His average earnings can now be determined by his highest earnings in any one of the five years before he became disabled," he said.

Previously, the average had to be based on earnings in five consecutive years, or, if it worked out to a higher figure, the number of years used to figure the amount of the worker's social security disability benefit.

To get social security disability payments, a worker must be severely disabled before age 65 and be unable to work for a year or more. In addition, he must have a certain amount of work under social security.

"For more information about how workmen's compensation affects social security payments," Carr said, "call, write or visit any social security office. The Bay City office is at 1009 North Madison Avenue. The phone number is 893-9579."

Change Work Requirements for the Blind

Question: My son is 38 and totally blind. When he applied for monthly social security disability payments last year, he was told that he had not worked recently enough to get benefits. I heard that changes in the social security law change the work requirement for blind people. Is this true?

Answer: Yes. A person who becomes disabled by blindness still needs a certain number of social security work credits, but he no longer has to have the credit for recent work required of other disabled workers. For example, your son, who became blind in 1972, needs credit for four years of work under social security, but it does not matter when the credits were earned.

Question: My husband and I were divorced after 32 years of marriage. I never remarried. My ex-husband died a few months ago. Now that I am 65, can I collect social security on his work record?

Answer: Yes. Since you were married to your former husband for at least 20 years, you can get social security payments on his work record.

Before January, a divorced woman also had to show that her former husband was providing one-half her support, but a recent change in the law ended this requirement.

Question: My doctor told me that I have pernicious anemia and need vitamin B-12 injections on a continuing basis. Will medicare help pay for these injections?

Answer: Yes. When vitamin B-12 is given to treat an illness, such as pernicious anemia, your medical insurance under medicare will help pay for it. When vitamin B-12 is given as a preventive medicine, however, medicare does not help pay for it.

When you apply for payment, you should attach a statement from your doctor describing your condition.

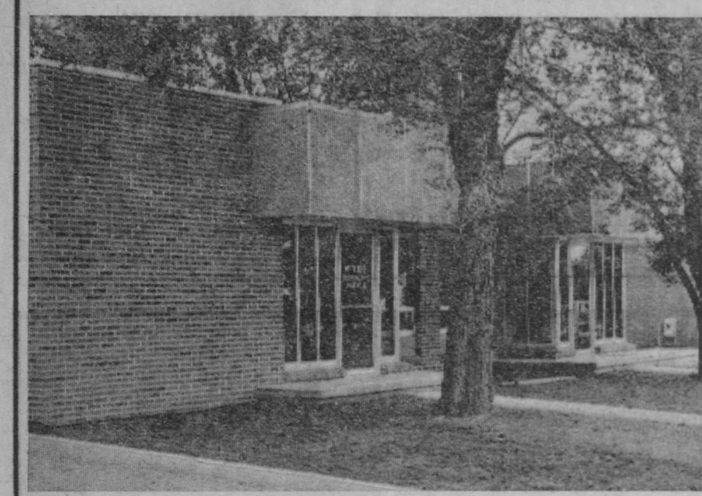

ANNUAL REPORT HALE AREA SCHOOLS HALE, MICHIGAN 48739

January 17, 1973

The Hale Area Schools balanced the budget during the 1971-72 fiscal year. In one and one-half years, we have gone through four millage votes. We have a carry-over of \$60,000 from the 1971-72 fiscal year; at the present time, we are levying 21.5 mills for operation and 6 mills for debt retirement, making a total of 27.5 mills, which is high for our area.

January 3, 1973, we opened a new high school that will accommodate approximately 600 students. This will mean a much greater expenditure for 1973-74 school year. I doubt very seriously if we could ever pass a millage issue in 1973.

We are a land rich and money poor district. By that I mean we have many lakes and a resort area with a high State Equalized Valuation (\$2,868 per child), but 30 percent of the people who live here meet the Federal Standard for poverty. Sixty percent of the people who pay the taxes in the district do not reside in the area. I think the State Aid Act that is being proposed is very unfair to our district because the SEV is

still an important factor in it. You can have all the land value in the world, but if the people do not have the ability to pay it is very difficult to pass a millage vote.

Eighty percent of our operational money comes from local revenues and 20 percent from state and federal. At the present time, we receive \$123 per student while our neighboring district receives \$367 per child. The taxpayers feel this is totally unfair and under Senate Bill No. 1495 we would be worse off.

It is anticipated that there will be an increase of 2 1/2 million dollars in residential resort valuations. This could increase our SEV to \$38,000 per child and under Senate Bill No. 1495 would give us about \$42 per child.

I feel this is unequal and would certainly make for a good court case.

If we are going to run the schools properly, we somehow must have a formula on ability to pay.
