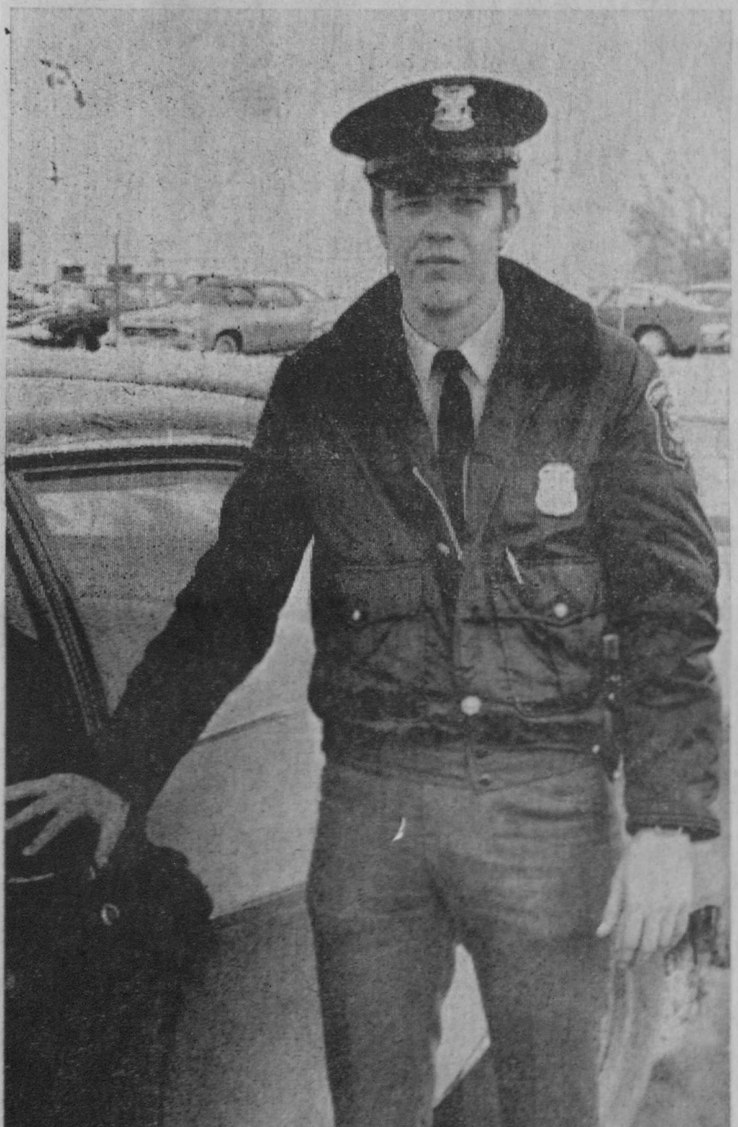

# Bank Paid \$775,000 on Insurance Bond Claims

Peoples State Bank of East Tawas announced Tuesday that it has reached a basic agreement with Hartford Indemnity Company on claims filed in May and July of 1972 under the bank's fidelity bond.

The bank, Pres. John Lippert stated, is in the process of liquidating those assets and converting them to cash.

The claims arose out of events discovered in February 1972, involving discrepancies in the bank's records. Richard L. Harwood, former president of the bank, last month pleaded guilty in federal court to criminal alteration of the bank's records in the amount of \$616,754.39.

Lippert, formerly with a bank at Gaylord, was brought by the board of directors to the bank at East Tawas to take over operation of the bank following Harwood's departure.

Lippert went on, "The bank has undergone more internal changes during this past year than most would undertake in a decade; the staff, management and directors have worked endless hours on the problems we have faced; we have a strong capital account; our liquidity is excellent as a result of realigning our investment program."

"Through new programs adopted, we are equipped to handle the increased business we anticipate for the Tawas area in the near future. The bank pledges to help build a better community for everyone through sound banking. We look to the future with great optimism."

## Board Selects 4 Architects for Interviews

Four prospective architects for designing the proposed new Tawas Area High School are to be interviewed this week by the board of education, after which the board is to reach a decision on its final selection.

Named as candidates for the job from a list of 11 different firms were Wekely Kushner Associates, Incorporated, Mt. Pleasant; Daverman and Associates, Grand Rapids; Bryselbout, Starke, Hacker and Simon, Incorporated, Bay City; Warren Holmes Company, Lansing. The Bay City firm has served the school district on a consulting basis for a number of years.

Representatives of each firm are to be interviewed Thursday night and Saturday morning.

Earlier this month, the board of education announced that it would propose construction of a new high school as a means to resolve present overcrowding and educational problems of the district. This decision followed a review of findings from a three-month study of educational problems by a citizens' advisory committee.

At this point, estimated cost of the construction is unknown, but it is believed that it would range between three and four million dollars. From 30 to 33 teaching stations would be included in the building.

Prin. John Alexander reported Monday night that he had contacted representatives of the University of Michigan Bureau of School Services concerning accreditation of the school for 1973-74. The school has received a probationary status during the past two years due to five violations of the accreditation standards.

A spokesman for the university said that a committee would make the final decision concerning this school's accreditation based on the recent visitation and the indication from Ann Arbor was that this school could expect loss of its probationary status after making no gains in two years.

Included among the five violations of the accreditation standards was

one which stated that the present facility has a capacity of 650 students, using the state department of education's formula for optimum capacity. The enrollment for grades seven through 12 during 1972-1973 is 1,123 students.

There have been many new concepts in education since the present high school was designed more than 16 years ago. Supt. Edward J. Barry states that the proposed new building would be designed to offer flexibility in the future to meet enrollment needs as well as changing educational needs.

If the proposal is approved by voters and the district is bonded for a new high school, the present high school would be converted into a middle school. The superintendent said that such a plan would offer much-needed space for vocational training, home economics, commercial, physical education and other courses for students in grades five through eight who are not now receiving the training due to the lack of facilities.

In addition to the board's proposal for new construction, school officials and a citizens' committee are continuing their study of the possibility of an extended school year as a means to make full utilization of facilities. The superintendent said he was presently meeting with members of the teaching staff to determine interest in the year around school concept and a survey of student interest is to be made. It is hoped that additional data may be presented next month.

### New Owners of Whittemore Hotel

## Commission to Proceed With New Office Building for Social Welfare

A split vote last Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners saw adoption of a resolution to proceed with construction of a new building to house the social welfare department.

Final action on the proposal had been delayed two months and was passed by a three to two roll call vote. Voting in favor of the proposal were Robert Foster, Fred Lomas and William Woreley. Opposed to the measure were J. Berkeley Smith and Carl Libka.

In a position statement to the commission concerning their "no" votes, Smith and Libka said their voting "in no way reflects on the low bidder, but rather our feeling that the project, approved in concept before we took office January 1, is not in the best interest of Iosco County, inasmuch as we feel it represents spending county funds to build a state office building."

The resolution adopted by the majority of the board acknowledged receipt of a performance bond from O. S. Rose Builders for construction of the building and authorized the contractor to proceed with the project.

Rose entered the low bid last December and, through acceptance

of two alternates, the actual contractual price for the construction is \$30,865. The construction is to be financed with federal revenue sharing money received by the county.

Construction of a new building to house offices of the department of social services had been under discussion for more than a year. In November, about the time an announcement was made concerning the county's allocation of federal revenue sharing funds, the commission decided to advertise for bids on the project.

Foster, Lomas and Woreley, holders from the old nine-man commission, have pointed out that the department of social services, which has expanded rapidly since operation was assumed by the state several years ago, has been bulging

at the seams in present offices in the county building. The department now numbers 17 employees, which is larger than the total staff for all other offices in the county building, stated the three commissioners.

The 34 by 86-foot building is to be located adjacent to the Iosco Medical Care Facility on Plank Road, which is administered by the department of social services.

## Iosco Continues Talks on Landfill Proposal

A county-wide solid waste disposal plan developed two years ago is to be taken out of "mothballs" and reviewed by the district health department.

This action resulted Wednesday during discussion between the Iosco County Board of Commissioners and public health department officials.

Raymond Jurczyk, district health sanitarian, and Larry Thornton of Lansing, representing the Michigan Department of Health, reminded commissioners that July 1 was the deadline for local governmental units to file sanitary landfill plans with the state.

Earlier this month, the mayor of Tawas City and supervisors from Baldwin and Alabaster Townships recommended to the commission that the county study the possibility of developing a county-wide sanitary landfill, rather than each individual unit of government operate an expensive disposal area.

excellent position to comply with the state law because of its prior planning. It was reported, however, that the state is currently considering some changes in the law. It was stated that solid waste management may be placed in the hands of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and a bill is being developed to provide funds for planning sanitary landfills.

More discussion on this topic is to be held at the March 7 meeting of the commission.

In other business Wednesday, the commission made a slight realignment of the county department of public works. The commission is to add one of its own members to the department and named Harry Samotis of Oscoda as the "at large" representative in the department. The remaining membership unchanged includes the drain commissioner, road commissioner and chairman of the county board of commissioners.

The commission indicated it would act as the governmental agent to ap-

ply for 50 percent matching funds under highway safety planning for an emergency radio communications system for Tawas Hospital. Donald Miner of Tawas Hospital and Wayne McKenna of Emergency Medical Services at Lansing stated that Tawas Hospital had been designated as a regional center in an emergency communications system for hospitals.

Proposed radio equipment would link this hospital with a special state-wide network, as well as providing direct radio communications between the hospital and its ambulances. A proposed ambulance replacement program for the hospital was sent to committee for a report at the next meeting.

It was reported that Otis Love, county road commission engineer-manager, was making a study of all bridges in the county for possible participation by the county in a reconstruction program using federal revenue sharing money.

had submitted his resignation effective March 24.

Following a report by Carl Libka, the commission's representative on the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library Board, the board voted an appropriation of \$7,000 to the regional library. Libka stated that the regional library had been operating at a deficit because of inadequate funding and advancing costs. He believed the county should support the regional library, regardless of the fact that Arenac County may not be able to increase its appropriation.

On recommendation of the building and grounds committee, the commission authorized Landis Engineering to prepare documents for the purpose of obtaining bids on the redecorating, carpeting and other necessary maintenance work at the county building. Constructed in 1953, offices in the building have never been redecorated and maintenance work has been at a minimum. Cost of the work is to be financed through revenue sharing funds.

### Booklets On Drugs to be Distributed

Distribution of new booklets concerning drug abuse is to be made within the next two weeks, according to a report Tuesday by Supt. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area School.

The booklets, enough for every family in the school district, were obtained by Tawas Kiwanis Club. Iosco Sheriff's Department is to assist in making deliveries. Booklets will be available at the high school and the administration office.

Barry said it was the best booklet he had ever read concerning drugs.

## 14th Straight First Division Rating for Tawas Area Band

Tawas Area High School Band traveled to Gladwin Saturday, February 24, to participate in the District IX Festival of the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association.

For the 14th consecutive year, the Tawas band has received a first division rating. For the third time, the band jumped a classification and performed in class A and, as in the past, received a first division rating in this class. Tawas band was the first band north of Bay City ever to enter A competition and receive a I.

The performance was awarded a standing ovation by the audience.

A first division rating is defined, in part, as "an unusually high standard of performance and musicianship... worthy of the distinction of being recognized as a first place winner."

A I rating makes the band eligible to participate in the state festival which will be held on April 28 at Saginaw.

## TA School Applies to State for Vocational Training Funds

Expansion of vocational training programs through additional state funding, as well as local support, is being studied by administrators and the teaching staff of Tawas Area School.

At Monday night's board of education meeting, it was reported that applications for additional state funding for expanded vocational training were being developed for coordination by Bruce Vickey, ca-

reer education director for Iosco Intermediate School District.

All of the proposed classes would be made available to other county schools in the shared time vocational program which was adopted at the start of the current school year and is to be continued next term.

Among instructors appearing before the board of education to outline proposals was Steven Hitch, auto shop instructor. He said that a pro-

posal was being made to the state to make full utilization of local facilities by expanding auto shop instruction to eight hours a day involving 80 students. This would involve four two-hour classes daily.

At the present time, auto shop is offered five to six hours a day. Hitch said there would be some conflicting space problems because machine shop classes use the same general area as auto shop.

In addition, the district is studying the possibility of operating a building trades program. Four Tawas Area students are presently enrolled in the shared time building trades program at Hale Area School and have participated in design and construction of a dwelling at Hale under direction of a local carpenter. Because of transportation problems, Hale Area School and Whittemore-Prescott Area School are to have their own building trades program next term and Tawas Area School is considering a similar program for shop students of this district as well as Oscoda.

Raymond VanHorn, faculty member who is developing the above application for funding, is coordinating applications for a cooperative education program. At the present time, five office education students have been placed with two cooperating employers. Two additional employers are to be interviewed this week.

VanHorn said that juniors and seniors enrolled in the program would be working mainly in offices and the distribution industry. He hopes to expand the program into other areas and this would depend greatly upon cooperating local business firms.

Under this program, the student receives daily on-the-job experience as well as classroom instruction. Second year typing and office practice students would be integrated into a two-hour instructional block. A regular office situation would be developed in the classroom where students would be involved in typing, filing, using transcription equipment, calculators and other machines in order to develop special skills needed in the secretarial field.

Another field being studied is the restaurant business, where students could receive on-the-job training as short order cooks, waitresses-waiters, bus boys and restaurants administrators. VanHorn said the present school curriculum does not offer home economics to boys and a class designated as "bachelors' survival" may be developed to interest boys in home economics.

Prin. John Alexander said that status of the school's application for funding on the above vocational training programs would be known early next summer. The school receives no vocational funds this year from the state and success of the proposed program is contingent upon student-community interest and scheduling, during or after the school day.

Members of the board of education indicated that they were interested in expansion of the vocational training program, regardless of funding by the state.

In other matters concerning vocational training, Thomas Pinkowski, counselor, explained a comprehensive testing program being carried out in the school to test educational abilities, aptitude and vocational abilities of students in grades seven through 12. Tentative approval for purchase of additional testing materials was given by the board of education, subject to review and approval of the superintendent.

# TA Board Designates Smoking Area in School

On request of Tawas Area Athletic Boosters Club, an organization which has raised more than \$2,000 annually for the past two years to purchase equipment for Tawas Area School, the board of education reserved its recent decision and has designated a smoking-refreshment area for adults at next season's basketball games.

Supt. Edward J. Barry said that he had surveyed all schools in the conference and found that all schools had designated such areas for adults. He felt it was a reasonable request and recommended approval.

Voting in favor of the measure were Trustees Helen Payea, Joan Schreck, Earl Davis and Pres. Robert W. Elliott. Opposed were Trustees Clare Herriman and Leonard Sarki.

The booster club proposes to supervise the designated area, limited to adults only, serving free coffee to local basketball fans as well as visitors. The area being proposed is the teacher's room and a corridor near the front entrance.

In addition, the administration has given approval for use of a bus by the booster club to attend the final game of the season at Alpena. All state laws would be enforced concerning carrying of passengers on a school bus.

In other business, Dr. Jack Evans of Central Michigan University appeared briefly before the board of

education. He visited the two elementary schools Monday and Tuesday to examine science programs being offered and to make recommendations for curriculum improvement.

The superintendent reported that the third meeting with noninstructional personnel concerning contract negotiations was to have been held Tuesday. He said that progress had been very slow on a contract and, if agreement is not reached by June 30, action would be required by the board of education.

The superintendent stated that noninstructional personnel were asking for a contract similar to the master agreement with the teaching staff. He said there had been considerable difficulty in bargaining with both full time and part time personnel and apparently there has been animosity shown between the two classifications.

A leave of absence from February 13 to September 1 was granted for personal health reasons to John V. Shaver.

It was reported that the school would probably lose federal funding for 85 of its present 126 federally-connected students. Although congress has not approved a new bill as yet for 1973-74, the one being examined would consider funding for only those students whose parents live and work on federal property and are in uniformed service. This would

Robert McDonald, assistant principal, reported that school absenteeism had dropped considerably since adoption of a new enrollment policy. Thursday and 3.9 percent on Friday. He believed that absenteeism would level out to about 6.5 percent or less daily. McDonald said some complaints had been heard from students and parents, but he said that many more parents were becoming involved and concerned over student absenteeism and he believed the new attendance policy was working.

It was reported that 56 junior high students enrolled in the conservation section of the four E program had cleaned the school grounds as part of an ecology project.

Plainfield Township Fire Department was called to the scene as a precautionary measure against the possibility of fire.

## Onions Are The Cook's Best Friend

Onions are a gourmet's delight and a cook's best friend. No other condiment in the kitchen can add such zest to foods. Onions, too, are considered a proverbial cure-all by many and an important health food. They come in several colors, yellow, white, red, brown; from three general classes, Granex-Grano, Spanish and Globe, which is the most common.

Michigan onions are of the yellow Globe variety grown in late summer and stored after harvesting for marketing during the winter and early spring months, according to marketing officials of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Michigan is sixth among the states in production of dry onions. Major production areas are Newaygo, Ottawa, Allegan, Jackson, Calhoun and Ingham Counties.

Used primarily for cooking, Michigan onions are strong flavored, predominantly round to oval and small to medium in size. Housewives should note that good-quality Michigan onions are dry and firm, with small necks. They are covered with a thin papery skin and are free from blemishes.

For a gourmet treat, place a peeled whole onion inside a chicken before roasting. Or, rub that steak with a cut raw onion before it is broiled. For a succulent, mouth-watering meat stew, stick three cloves into a whole onion before adding to the stew.

More interesting tips for consumers: Experts say if you rub a cut raw onion across your windshield it will not frost in winter weather. Some American researchers say a raw onion chewed in the mouth for five minutes or so renders the lining of both mouth and throat completely free of harmful bacteria. So there is justification for chewing a raw onion during cold and throat infections.

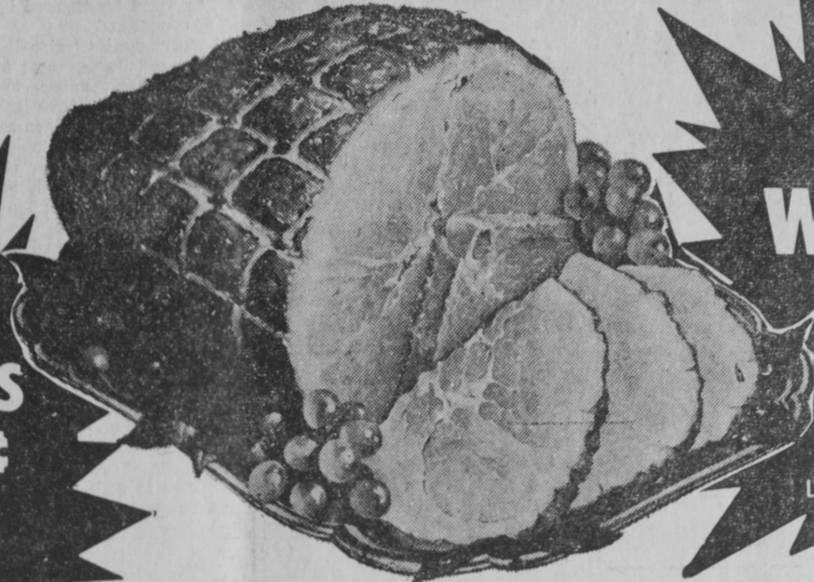

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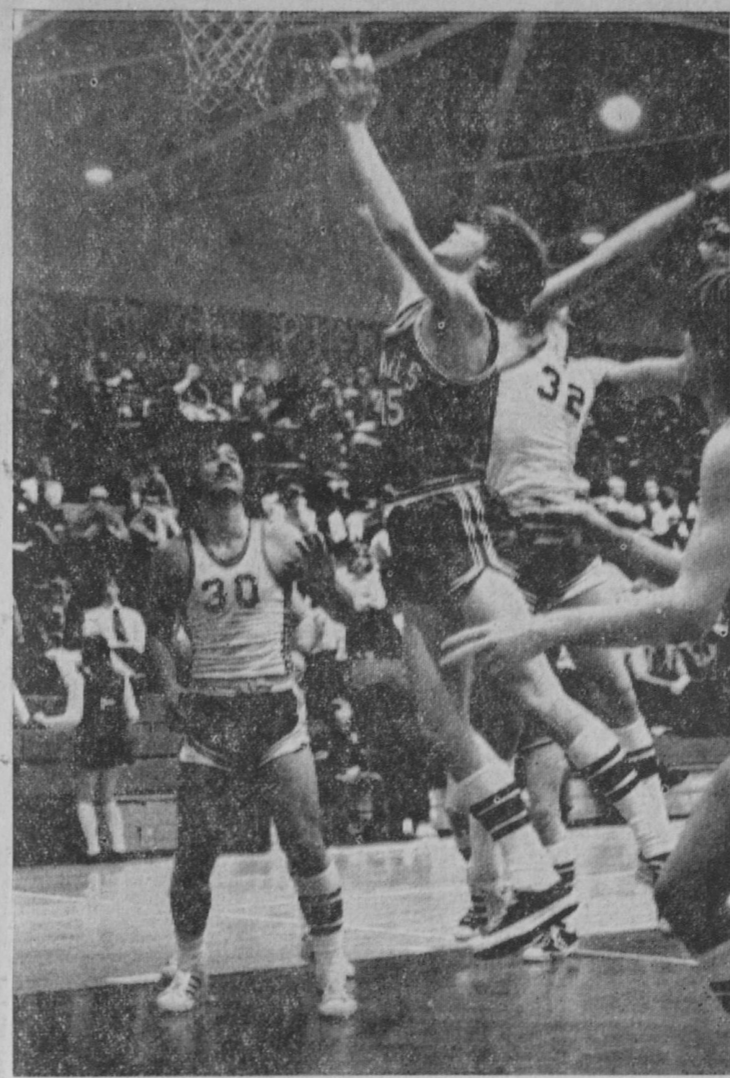

## Motor News Gives Riding - Hiking Trail Report

The Tawas Area and Iosco County are highlighted in an article on hiking across Michigan in Automobile Club of Michigan's February Motor News.

"Increasing numbers of persons are 'back packing' it across Michigan on the state's shore-to-shore riding and hiking trail," Motor News tells its 1,100,000 readers-members. The article, titled "Michigan's Shore-to-Shore Trail," notes that many hikers start at Tawas City, the east end of the trail, and hike across eight counties on a two-week trip ending on the shores of Lake Michigan.

An average day's hike is about 16 miles, readers are told, although on a rainy day it may be as little as six miles. The trail starts in Iosco County, says Motor News, cuts across the

southwest corner of Alcona County, then into Osceola County just south of Mio, Crawford County and the City of Grayling are midpoints. From there the trail crosses Kalkaska and Grand Traverse Counties, the northeast corner of Benzie County and winds up at Empire, in Lee'sau County.

"The trail itself is great in some spots, less attractive in others," says Motor News. "It's generally wild country, but peaceful."

The article lists supplies and equipment hikers will need and describes the lightweight Gerry mountain packs used, which, including pack, frame, sleeping bag, foam pad, food and fishing equipment, weigh only about 45 pounds.

Food must be carried on hiking expeditions such as this one, Motor News points out. The article pinpoints stores along the route where hikers can purchase food and supplies, pointing out that the stores are several days distant from one another.

A good water supply is not always available, so water must be rationed along some stretches of the trail. Hikers can travel for miles in some areas without seeing a drop of water except that which they carry themselves.

"A hike like this," says Motor News, "makes one realize how many things he takes for granted. Cars, homes, family and friends—even a simple thing like a glass of water—all seem a little more valuable afterward. It is an experience a hiker will never forget and one we recommend to anyone willing to leave his car behind for two weeks."

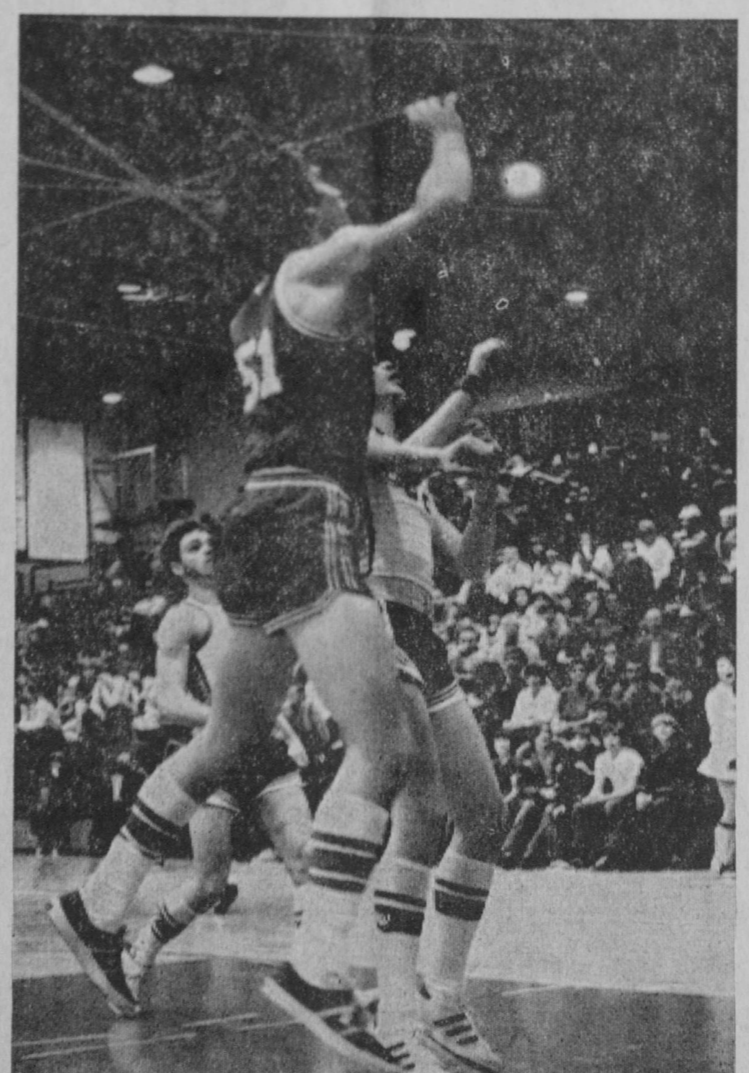

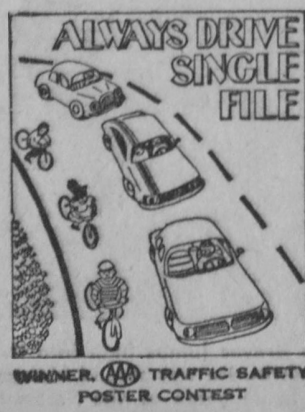

The application states, among other things, that the revenue produced by existing rates is unreasonably and unjustly low, and that to attain the level of earnings previously approved by the Commission, the Company requests rate increases and changes in service offerings which would produce additional annual revenue from its intrastate operations in the amount of \$29.7 million, based on 1972 operating results.

**Effect on Customers**

The changes in rates, if approved as proposed, will affect residence and business customers as follows:

- Proposed increases in basic residence rates range from 0 cents to 90 cents per month. No increase is proposed in the rates for Budget Services. One-party and two-party flat rate residence service in Detroit will not be changed.
- Basic monthly exchange rates for business customers with measured service would be unchanged, but local message charges for these customers would increase from the present 4 1/2 cents to 5 cents. Business Metro calls would be increased 1 cent from 8 cents to 9 cents. Proposed exchange rate increases for flat-rate business customers range from 70 cents per month for 1- and 2-party service to \$2.10 for a flat-rate PBX trunk. Increases for semi-public coin service would range from 50 cents to \$1.60 per month. All single line instruments, furnished with business service, including the first one on the line, would be charged for at \$1.85 per month (excluding coin telephones). In addition there will be a separate charge of 40 cents per month for each instrument equipped for TOUCH-TONE® calling.
- The line charge portion for installing telephone service in a home or business where service has never been provided would be increased from the present \$10.00 to \$25.00.
- Residence and business customers would be charged for calls to Directory Assistance (Information) starting in 1974-1975. Customers could make five calls per month to Directory Assistance at no charge. For over five calls, the charge would be 10 cents each.
- Rates for Centrex, PBX and Key services would be restructured, resulting in increases in monthly charges for most customers.
- Nickel-A-Minute service would be discontinued and replaced by Budget Toll Dialing Service.
- Long Distance calls within Michigan would be increased 1 cent per minute for operator-handled calls beyond 25 miles and a lesser amount for dialed calls. Monthly rates for WATS, INWATS and TWO-WAY WATS would be increased 3% rounded to the nearest dollar. Hourly WATS rates for usage over allowance under measured service would be increased 3% rounded to the nearest 25 cents.

The details of the above changes will be given to all Michigan Bell Telephone Company customers by mail. If after receiving this mailed information, you have any questions regarding it, please call or visit your local Michigan Bell business office.

The changes proposed by the Company are subject to approval by the Commission after public hearings. The Commission may approve different service offerings or rates which may be higher or lower than those proposed. ## Family Living Education

Hot Dog! What is in it for you and your family? What ingredients should be allowed in hot dogs and other cooked sausage? And how should these products be labeled so that Mrs. Homemaker can tell at a glance what they contain?

The newest proposal by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) on meat product labeling and ingredients should help consumers. If adopted, the proposal would ban the use of byproducts in these foods. It would also set up two categories of product names to clearly indicate the ingredients used. This should help consumers choose the product which best suits their needs.

Under the first product name category, franks, bologna and other cooked sausages could contain only skeletal muscle meat (no organ meats, etc.), and the ingredients necessary to make it into the traditional product—such as water, sweeteners and curing agents. These products would be called by their traditional names, such as "frankfurter" or "bologna."

Products in the second category, which could contain these same ingredients plus binders such as non-fat dry milk, soy protein, etc., would have to carry a product name indicating the addition of these binders. A product in this category would be labeled, for example, "frankfurter, nonfat dry milk added."

The following two goals are intended to be accomplished. First, the labeling changes would bring regulations into compliance with a recent

federal court decision holding that the use of terms "all-meat," "all-beef" and similar terms on cooked sausage products are misleading to consumers.

Secondly, the proposal to ban byproducts gives USDA an opportunity to "get the issue out in the open and give us a real chance to find out what the public thinks," according to Richard E. Lyng, assistant secretary.

"Comments received in recent months, and opinions expressed widely in the mass media, have indicated that a change in the policy of allowing byproducts in cooked sausages may be desirable," Mr. Lyng said. "Byproducts are both nutritious and wholesome, but some housewives just do not like the idea of buying a product containing such items."

Officials emphasized that the proposal would still require complete ingredient statements listing the ingredients of cooked sausage product in decreasing order. The proposal would also drop from federal regulations an obsolete requirement that cooked sausages be smoked. Since not all cooked sausages now made require smoking, USDA proposes to amend the regulations to make this an optional process for these products.

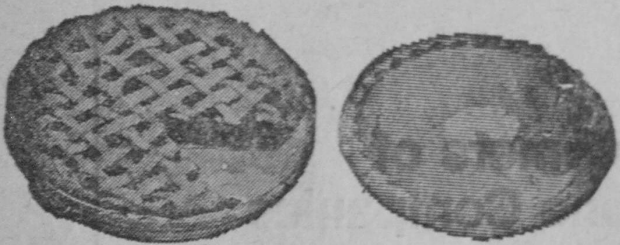


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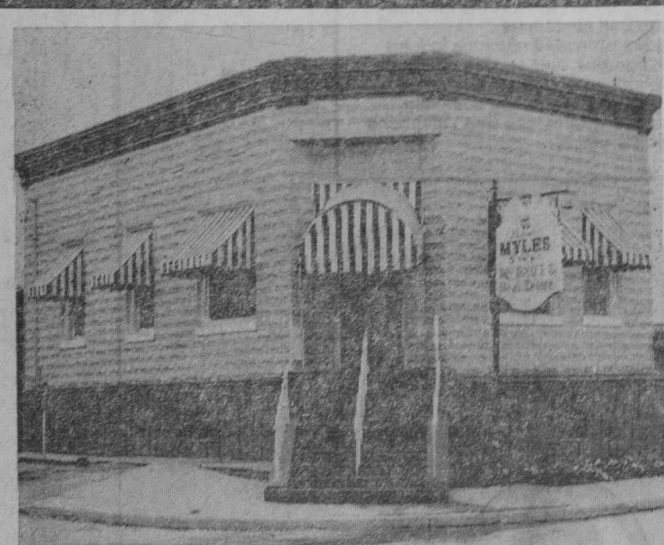

American isolationists see the eclipse of the internationalism fostered by President Roosevelt and Secretary Hull and are greatly encouraged in their determination to

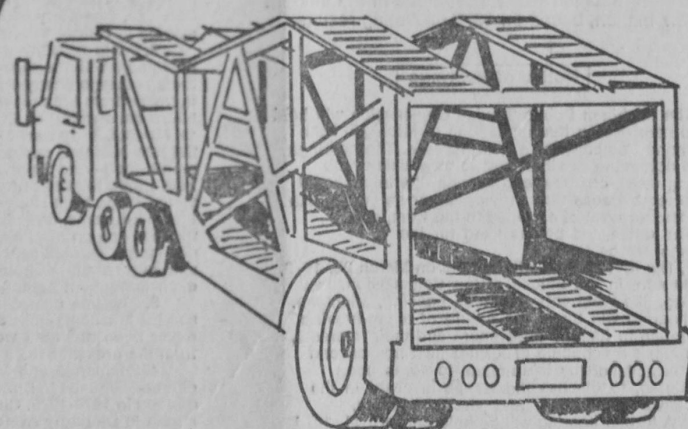

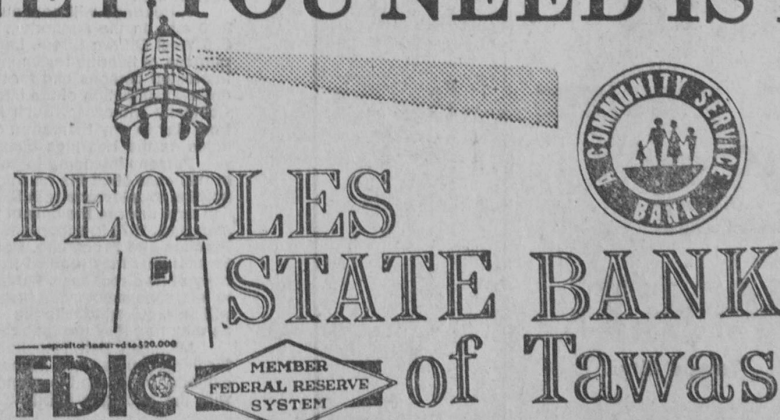

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## Contact SS Office For Information

Question: I retired from Civil Service about six years ago and have not worked since. I wrote to Baltimore and found out I have enough quarters to receive social security checks. I will be 62 in April 1973 and my wife will be 64 next January. My wife has never worked. How should I go about getting my check started?

Answer: Contact your nearest social security office by telephone or in person as soon as possible. You and your wife will both be eligible for benefits if you have the required work. You and your wife will need to furnish evidence of your age. Your social security office can help you locate evidence if you do not know what would be good proof.

Question: My social security check is my only income. A friend told me that he understands that social security beneficiaries will receive an annual increase in their benefit check when the cost-of-living goes up. Is this true?

Answer: Not entirely. The July 1972 amendments to the Social Security Law provide for a cost-of-living increase in benefits when the consumer price index goes up three percent or more. January 1975 is the earliest an increase can occur under this new provision.

Question: I read in the paper last week that a person can pay on the first \$10,800 of his wages or self-employment in 1973 and on \$12,000 beginning in 1974. How long will \$12,000 remain in effect?

Answer: The \$12,000 maximum will remain in effect until the first calendar year in which there is an increase in social security benefits as a result of a three percent or more rise in the cost-of-living, or until it is changed by law.

Question: My wife died last month. I am 60 and cannot work. Since I was completely supported by my wife, why must I wait until I am 62 to get social security payments on her earnings record?

Answer: You do not have to wait. The law has been changed. A dependent widower now can receive reduced social security payments at 60 or full benefits at 65.
