## Mayor Asks Iosco to Consider Park Development Plan

A representative of the City of Tawas City told members of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners last week that he believed the city park should receive more consideration for development than previously given by the county.

Mayor John N. Brugger declared Wednesday that the county had agreed to take over development of the park last year, but county park commission authorities had stated that money was not available.

The mayor pointed out that federal revenue sharing funds were being used to upgrade Old Orchard Park, which the county operates. Previously, he said, the county was ineligible to receive federal or state money because of a short-term lease on Old Orchard Park. He believed that parks in other areas of the county should be given consideration, too.

The Tawas City mayor stated that the city had spent \$8,000 in developing a parking lane along city park property for joint use with the county and had paid for engineering on further development of the parking lane, which serves the county building.

He said that the park could no longer be considered for city use only as it is being utilized by the traveling public as well as by residents from all over the county. The park is not designated as a revenue-producing facility, he said, but is mainly for the enjoyment of persons using the facilities. The mayor pointed out that it has become a major attraction for visitors since installation of large concrete animals for playground equipment purchased through state bond money and city funds.

Brugger said that the city has \$5,000 in escrow to help with the development and state bond money would be lost if the project is not "rolling" this year. He said the city had paid for engineering on the project.

No action was taken, but the commission indicated this would receive top priority for discussion at the February meeting.

In other business, Ronald R. Tyler, prosecuting attorney, said that it was his opinion that the board had made no substantial error in its December bid opening for construction of a building to house the Department of Social Services. He stated that there was no discrimination in regard to contractors.

At its meeting two weeks ago, Edward Davison Jr., Tawas City building contractor, stated in a letter that there were irregularities in the December bid opening, which awarded the contract to O. S. Rose Builders.

Tyler said there was little merit to the argument that, if no bid bond was required, there would have been bidding from more contractors, "since it is well known among building contractors that when the contract is awarded, an eventual performance bond is necessary." Rose did not include a bond with his bid. Awarding of the contract, however, is contingent upon a performance bond.

The commission authorized payment of \$150 per month to the county sheriff in lieu of housing formerly provided in the county jail. The sheriff's quarters in the jail are to be remodeled for office use.

Iosco-Arenac Regional Library requested an appropriation of \$10,000 for books and materials to help meet demands being made upon the library, plus rising costs. At approximately \$5 a book, the library said it could purchase an additional 2,000 books. Divided among seven branches and 13 bookmobile stops, along with the headquarters' reference library, a library spokesman said this would amount to a very small amount of aid.

It was stated that state library officials had pointed out to local libraries that federal revenue sharing money could be used for such assistance and urged counties to be contacted. Commissioners said the matter would receive further consideration and that the Arenac County Board of Commissioners would be contacted to determine if that county would share in the expense.

The board of commissioners had excluded any additional pay for deputies in the various county offices in its most recent salary program and there have been no deputy officers since January 1. As a result, the commission voted to pay deputies in the offices an additional \$500 a year because of the added duties and responsibilities.

Representatives of the various schools appeared before the allocation board and asked that millage taken from the county be applied to their budgets, inasmuch as none of the schools' operational budgets had been met by the proposed allocation of nine mills. In addition, school representatives pointed out that state law obligates the allocation board to approve the full 15 mills which it controls. Action by the allocation board, in its final order in May, returned the .15 of a mill to the county.

Nelkie said he again appeared before the board of commissioners in October and pointed out that the county should spread only enough millage to meet its budget in 1973. No action was taken.

Several factors contributed to the surplus of funds in the county treasury at the end of 1972, Nelkie said Friday that the commission drew up its budget in April 1972 without contacting his office for information on finances. As a result, he said, the budget did not take into consideration \$23,000 in state income tax money which had been held in escrow for the county and should have been included in the revenue budget. In addition, the budget did not include revenue or expenditures under the Emergency Employment Act, amounting to about \$39,500 for the hiring of six additional employees.

A major factor for the year-end surplus on December 31 was the five percent "penalty" tacked on the county's valuation by the state tax commission after the county was equalized last spring. Each unit in the county was given a factor of five percent and, based on the new valuation, county operational millage returned more than anticipated.

City councils of both Tawas City and East Tawas took immediate action following this property valuation increase to reduce millage spread in each community in order to insure that tax revenue did not exceed what was actually required to meet city operational budgets.

As a result of this inaction by the county, said Nelkie, total revenue received by the county treasurer amounted to \$895,804.52, as compared to a figure of \$729,158 which had been budgeted in October 1971.

This surplus, amounting to a total of \$166,646.52, included \$85,166.07 more than anticipated from fees collected by county offices with an actual amount of \$214,048.60 as compared to a budgeted \$128,882.53;

state income tax of \$114,208.38, as compared to the \$75,000 budgeted, or a surplus of \$39,208.38; real estate taxes of \$567,547.54, as compared to \$525,275.47 as budgeted, or a surplus of \$42,272.07.

Fees received from the county of \$55,059.47 from the clerk's office, \$45,247.45 from district court, \$895.13 from the equalization department, \$2,517.50 from the probate judge, \$41,645.41 from the register of deeds, \$13,451.62 from the sheriff's department and \$55,232.02 from the treasurer's office. The fees are expected to show an increase in 1973.

Actual expenditure of money for county operation during 1972 was \$818,082, as compared to a budgeted amount of \$729,148 adopted in October 1971 by the county commission.

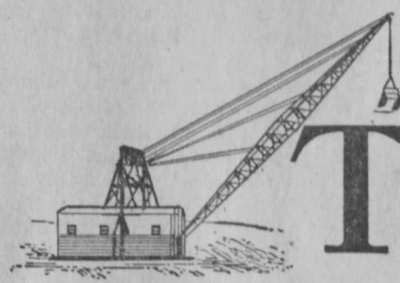
The county treasurer said Friday that the real problem would come this year as he anticipates the year-end surplus to be even larger than in 1972. He said that he expects state auditors would cite the county commission for exceeding its 1972 budget. The real problem, however, could come with federal auditors.

Although no federal revenue sharing money has been used for operation to reduce taxes, as required by law, Nelkie said that something would have to be done in April to reduce the county's millage. Such action toward reducing millage next spring could have serious consequences, as federal revenue sharing is based upon the amount of local tax effort.

The county received a little over \$200,000 in federal revenue sharing funds for 1972. This money has been committed by the county commission for a variety of construction projects, including the proposed office building to house the Department of Social Welfare, facilities at Old Orchard Park, remodeling of the county jail and the county building.

The treasurer urged the county commission last week to exercise closer coordination between the board and county offices in the future to avoid such problems. He said his office and staff was always open to them.

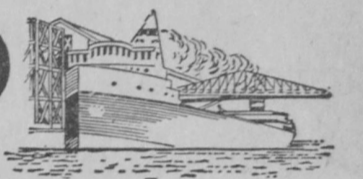

## County Exceeded Budget by \$88,934

Iosco County ended 1972 with a cash balance of \$82,388.61 in its general fund for a total of \$176,440.51 surplus funds in its treasury. According to County Treas. Edward Nelkie, this could result in lowering the amount of federal revenue sharing money for the county next year.

Nelkie said Friday that he had warned representatives of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners last spring that they were headed for a general fund surplus of at least \$80,000 by the end of 1972 and that the surplus would be even higher at the end of 1973.

As a member of the county allocation board, Nelkie urged last April that the county's allocation of tax millage be lowered for 1973 operation and that the excess be given to schools. Due to an unusual vote, however, the school's representative on the allocation board sided with the county and Iosco's operational allocation remained at 4.80 mills.

The allocation board withheld .15 of a mill from the county in its preliminary order, with the intention of not spreading it on the tax rolls. Representatives of the various schools appeared before the allocation

## Fire Training Course Starts in Tawas

Thirty-four volunteer firemen from East Tawas and Tawas City started a 66-hour training course Tuesday night at the East Tawas Fire Department's headquarters. When the course is completed next November, firemen successfully passing a final examination are to be state certified.

William Deckett, an elementary teacher at Oscoda and a member of the East Tawas department, has over-all charge of the instruction.

Tuesday night's meeting opened with an orientation concerning state laws and arson by Robert Huddy of the Michigan State Police.

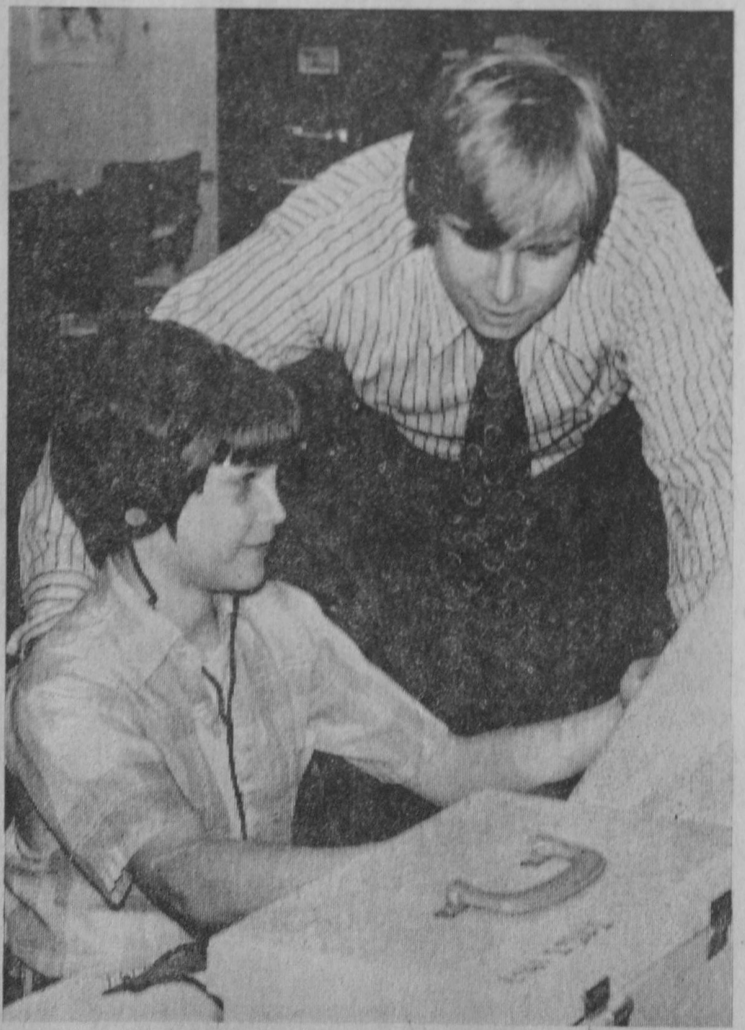
Classroom sessions are to be held once a week through February for a special first aid course conducted by N. R. Lesinski, director of Tawas Hospital Ambulance Service. In addition to the regular American Red Cross first aid instruction, firemen are to have classes in mouth-to-mouth resuscitation, heart massage and child birth.

Following completion of first aid instruction, firemen are to meet once a month for classes concerning fire apparatus, portable extinguishers, fire hose use, ladder practice along with practices in fire service ropes, fire stream, forcible entry, ventilation and familiarization with utilities.

Manuals used in the instruction will be furnished by the International Fire Service Training Association. Guidelines are to be furnished by the Fire Fighters Training Council. Instructional materials are being purchased by city councils of both communities.

Deckett said that it is expected that such instruction for volunteer firemen will be required by the state within one or two years.

Members of the advisory committee handling the program are William Look Jr., East Tawas fire chief; W. L. "Skip" Rapp and Joseph Badalucco, assistant chiefs at East Tawas; Kenneth Wojahn, secretary of the East Tawas Fire Department.

## TA Board Studies Report on Proposed Maintenance

Tawas Area Board of Education will be taking a look at a proposed program of maintenance for its three school buildings between now and budget time, according to action at Monday night's meeting. A maintenance program developed by the administration and a board committee was turned over to the board of education for its study.

Prior to the meeting, board members inspected the Tawas City Elementary Unit, where they learned that approximately \$16,000 would be required to perform needed work.

The report indicated that the original classroom wing constructed in the mid-1940s was not structurally strong, needed new windows on the west side and the heating system needed corrections. Of major concern was that rotting roof gutters had caused deterioration of concrete block walls and the roof. Six rooms would require painting this year.

The school superintendent said the board of education must take a long, hard look at maintenance costs for this building as well as the East Tawas Elementary Unit to determine how such expenditures would fit into the school's long-range program. He said the board of education must evaluate all maintenance expenditures to determine feasibility because new classrooms presently cost around \$12,000 each.

In other business, a report on the work of the high school counselors was given by Thomas Pinkowski and Paul Hay.

"We are available all day to students and we try to give the impression that we are never too busy to meet with them," stated Hay. He said the job of a counselor was to guide students, not to make decisions for them.

The two men said that the role of the high school counselor had

changed over the years. At one time, the job of counselor was considered as a stepping stone to become an administrator, but the state now desires the position to be separated from the administration and requires special certification.

The counselor's role was once considered to be a disciplinarian of students, but this is not the case today. It was emphasized that any information given to a counselor was kept in the strictest confidence and it is believed that the counseling office should be completely divorced from the main school office in order to avoid any conflict with the school administration.

Hay said that rather than spending the majority of their time working with students who are bound for four-year college programs, counselors now attempt to work with those students interested in two-year courses for technical and vocational training.

In the past, it has been found that counselors were oriented toward making decisions for a student, rather than opening doors to him. Many parents, too, have felt that the job of a counselor was to make decisions for students, but this is not the job nor the responsibility of the counselor. The student must make his own decisions, with guidance from the counselor, as well as from the home.

It was announced that William Blackmore had been hired as the night custodian, working the hours from 11:00 p. m. to 7:30 a. m. A work schedule for all custodians has been revised listing the duties of each employee.

David Busha has been hired as a teacher aide for the student commons.

O'Farrell, who started at the bank as a teller in September 1970, has worked under the direction of the president the past few months with consultation being provided by the

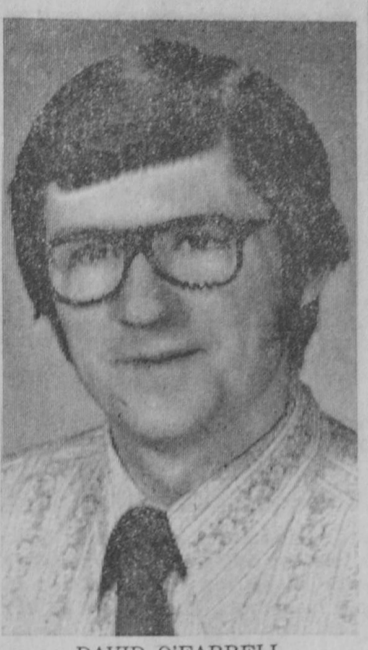
bank's auditors, Arthur Andersen and Company.

# Bursley School Aid Bill 'Poor Sack' for TA

Supt. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area School declared Monday night that the Michigan Legislature was attempting to "get off the hook" regarding state school financing by putting the pressure on local boards of education.

Barry told members of Tawas Area Board of Education that working in a state aid bill being considered at Lansing states that if local districts do not get voter approval for school operational millage, then local boards must exercise their option to levy an income tax.

The local superintendent was speaking about Senate Bill 1495 introduced by Sen. Gilbert E. Bursley of Ann Arbor, chairman of the senate education committee and assistant majority leader.

Under Bursley's bill, local districts would be expected to maintain 20 mills of local effort, plus one additional mill in deficit districts to pay off past obligations. If the required mill was not authorized by the voters, the school board would be "permitted" to levy a local income tax sufficient to bring the district up to minimum standards.

This is a totally new state school aid bill, according to Bursley, which proposes some drastic changes in Michigan's method of financing public K-12 education. He believes the bill will stand a court test for equity under any court ruling thus far made on the subject or any that can be contemplated.

The Tawas Area School superintendent said that Bursley's bill would raise property taxes in this district up to a level to bail out the Detroit area, which currently levies slightly less than 16 mills of school operational tax.

Tawas Area School District presently has an operational levy of 16 1/2 mills of taxes and is considered a "rich" district with \$25,212 in state equalized valuation behind each child. Under the present state aid formula, it receives \$241 per child for a total contribution of \$657 per child; under the same local millage, state aid would be cut to \$211 per child under Bursley's bill and the total state-local contribution would be \$627.

He likened the bill to a teeter-totter with the fulcrum at the Bay City-Muskegon line. Money would be taken from some of the northern tier of counties to bring some of the southern counties up to the same level.

Barry said that the bill would mean that Northern Michigan would have to give support to "poor" districts of Southern Michigan which have extremely high salaries for teachers. He said the bill would "raise taxes to a point where property owners cannot or will not pay them."

Barry said that area legislators must be influenced to do all in their power to oppose the bill. He said, too, that schools must encourage the county to allocate a larger share of its 15 mills for school operation in order to reduce the amount of locally-voted millage which would be required.

"State aid to schools is still in the talking stage, but something will happen this year because of the supreme court ruling," said Barry. "Bursley's bill is a bad sack for us; right now we can live with the present state aid formula. The state finishes the year with a surplus in its treasury and sales tax collections are higher than at any time in history, but the state is not going to cut taxes."

**Tawas Braves Beat Falcons**

Tawas Area Braves turned in their best passing attack of the season and found their eyes on outside shooting Friday night to beat the zone defense of the Ogemaw Heights Falcons, 52-41.

It was a game of sweet revenge for the Braves, who had lost to the Falcons by only one point earlier in the season when Tawas Area was unable to penetrate Ogemaw Heights' defense. The big difference in the two games proved to be Tawas' improved shooting from the outside.

Tawas Area also came up with a defense against Ranney, six-foot, seven-inch center of the Falcons. The two smallest players among Tawas' starting five, Chuck Saunders and Wayne Etue, teamed up to absolutely frustrate the lanky Falcon center, who had only four points during the night.

But the big difference between the two scores was the fact that the Braves had three players in double figures. Leading the way was Terry Nichols, who was not listed on the Tawas Area starting five when the basketball season opened. Friday night, Nichols meshed six out of 10 attempts from the floor and, with three charity tosses, topped Tawas scorers with 15 points. Trailing be-

hind him was his twin brother, Larry, who had 12 points on six out of 13 shots from the floor. Saunders played an outstanding defensive game and had 12 points on three field goals and six charity tosses.

Tawas Area opened the attack by taking a 13-12 margin in the first quarter. The Braves zoomed out in front with a 17-9 scoring margin in the second quarter. The Falcon offense came to life in the third period as Ogemaw Heights outscored the Braves, 16-12.

The fourth quarter proved to be the clincher for Tawas Area. Up only five points to start the quarter, the Braves' deliberate passing attack—shooting only when a good opening presented itself—forced the Falcons out of their zone defense. Ogemaw Heights moved its defense away from the basket in an attempt to stop Tawas' stall offense. In attempting to gain possession of the ball, the Falcons were too eager and Tawas Area meshed six out of nine charity tosses.

Tawas Area controlled the ball throughout most of the fourth quarter and the Falcons could make only four points. The Braves turned in 10 points and that was the game. A three-point play by Terry Nichols

with three minutes, 50 seconds to go, proved to be a deciding factor. Saunders meshed four out of five foul shots during the quarter while being chased by Falcon defenders.

The Braves go against Essexville-Garber here this Friday night. The Ducks defeated Tawas Area during the letter's "lost week"—the period from January 2 to January 12 in which the Braves lost four games after having a respectable, four and two record before the Christmas break.

On Saturday night, Tawas Area travels to Cheboygan for a return game with a nonconference opponent. The Braves defeated the north country team earlier this season.

Two opposing players wearing No. 33 turned in remarkable shooting performances Friday night—the name of the game is basketball and one player, unfortunately, had to be on the losing side.

Jeff Miller, class senior at Hale Area High School, led the Eagles to an 85-73 victory over visiting Fairview. In so doing, he set a school record during the game by meshing 40 points. This was only one point better than the total turned in by Trent Gascho in a losing cause.

The Eagles, now undefeated in seven games and at the top of the rung in standings, were surprised by the Fairview Eagles. The visitors, mired in second to last place among eight NSL teams with one win and now six losses, did not look like a patsy in any league. The Fairview quintet turned in a fast break passing attack which had the taller Hale Eagles reeling in the first half.

The main attention in the game centered around the personal scoring attacks of Miller and Gascho. Hale's Keyno Shellenbarger played a steady game with 12 points during the night and the Eagles stayed out in front with a 28-25 fourth quarter count.

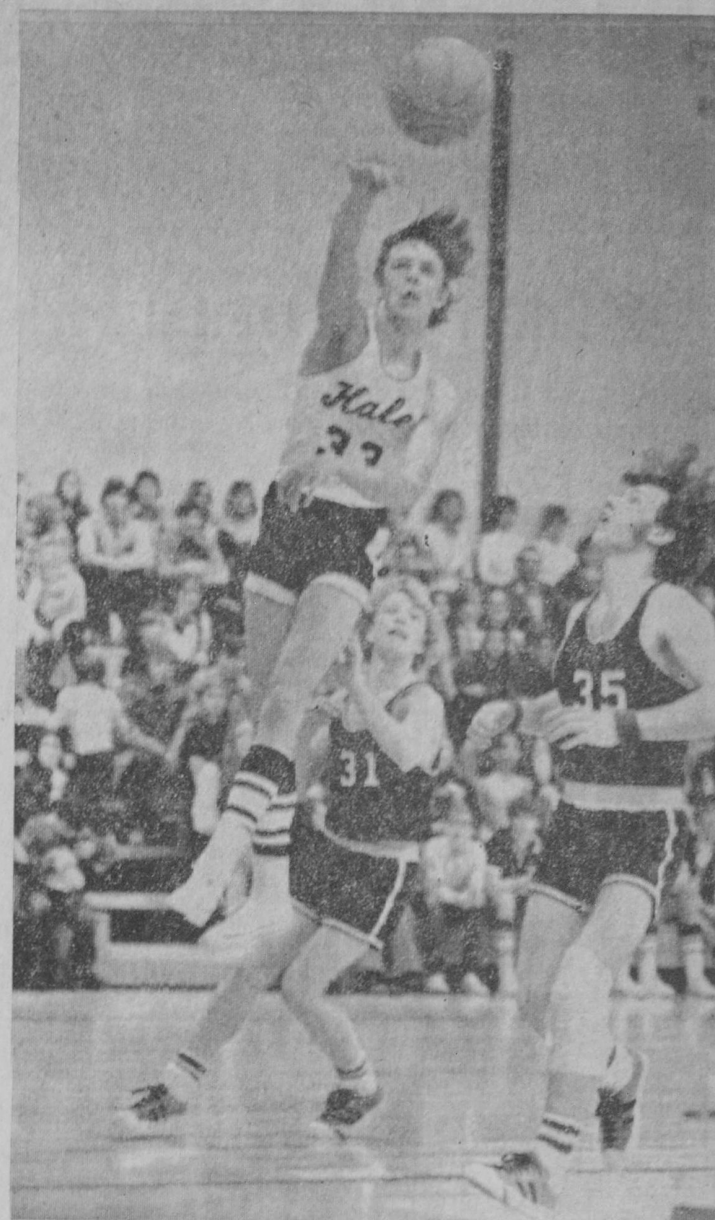

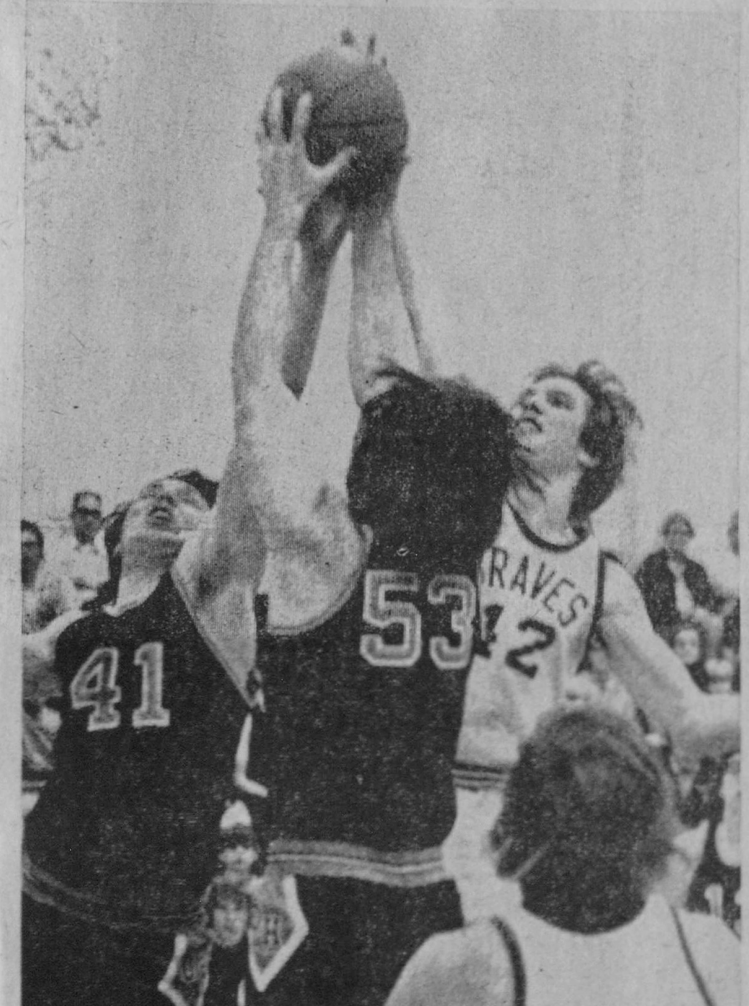

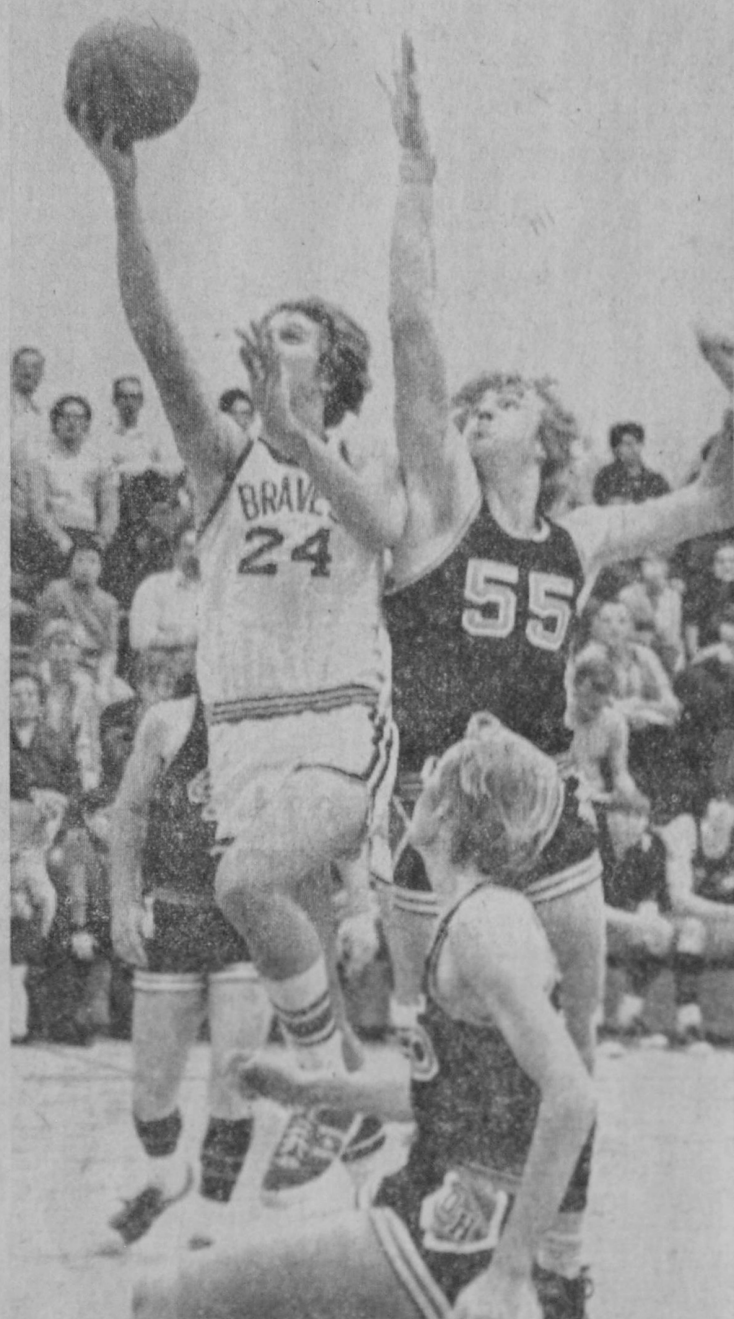

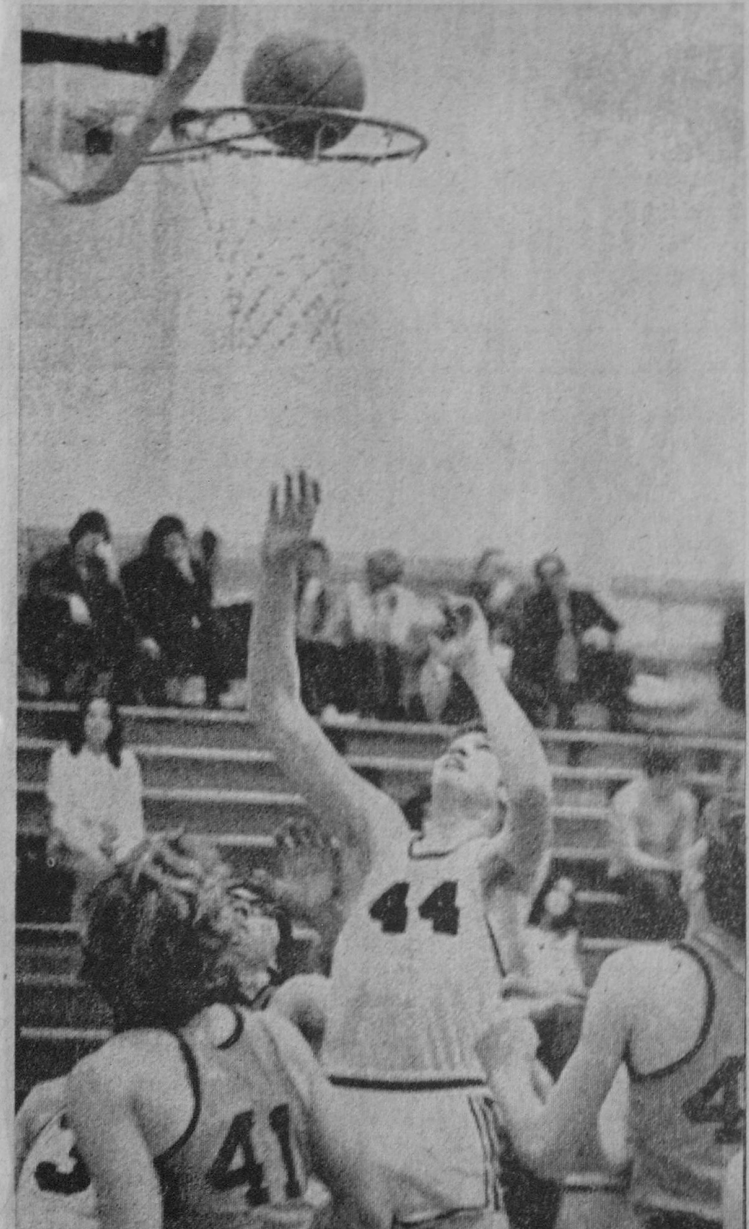

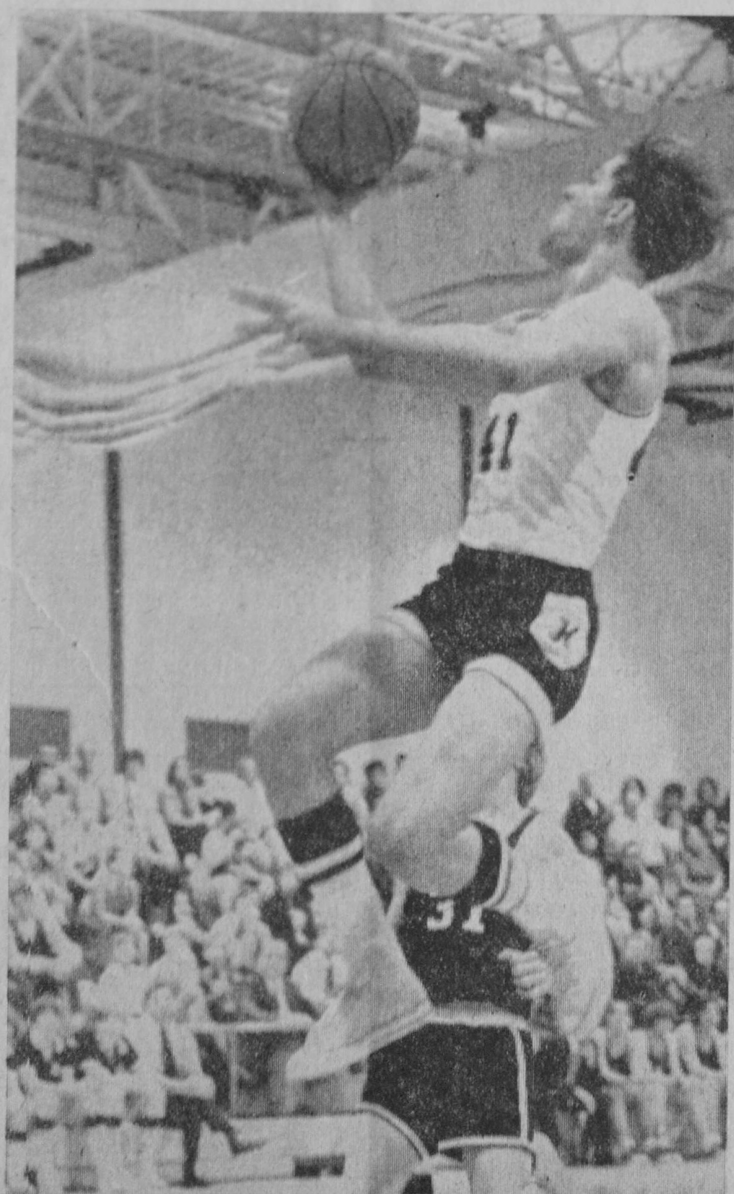
On the brighter side, there have been some good catches of perch along the edges of the broken ice with minnows and wigglers producing best. The best fishing time is early morning to mid-afternoon.

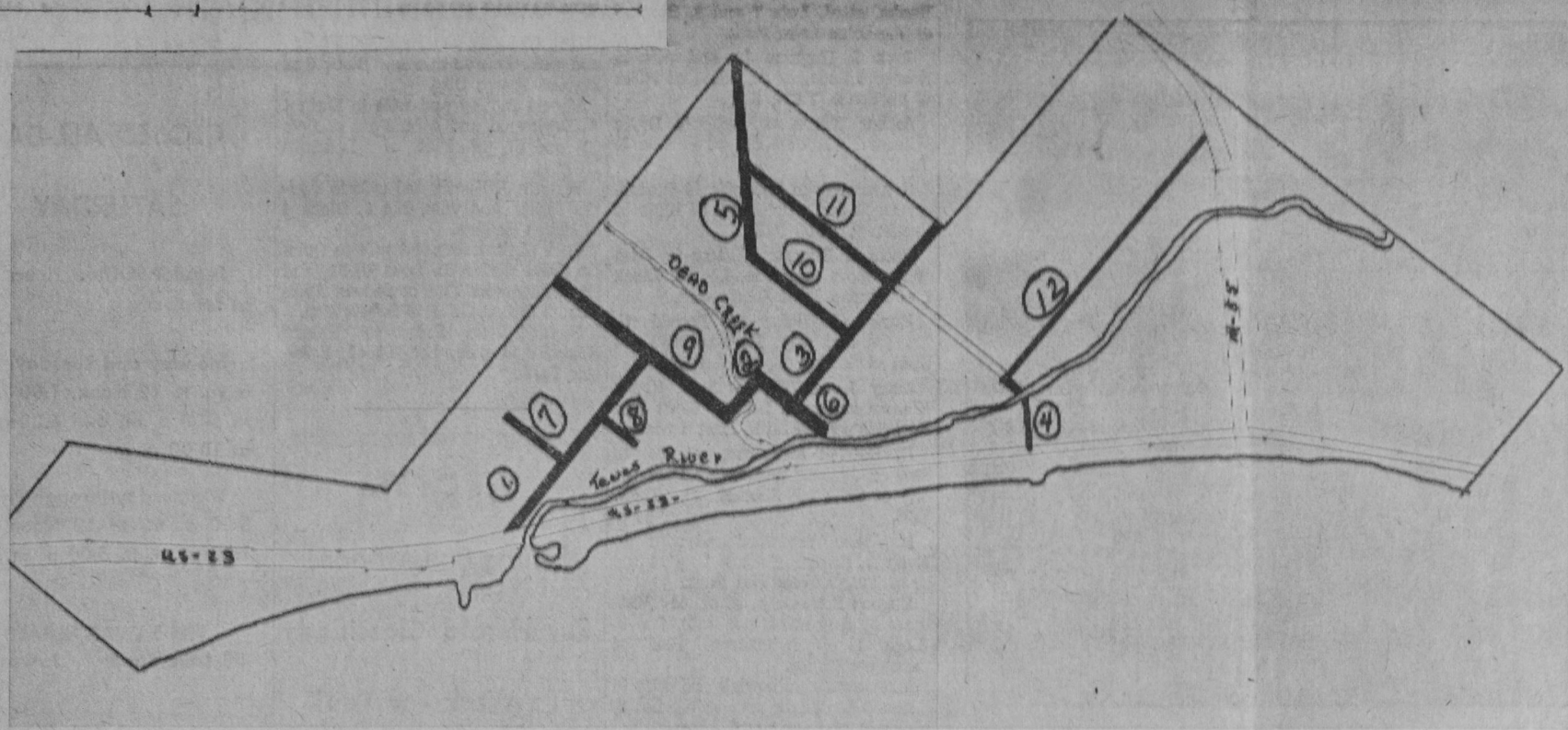

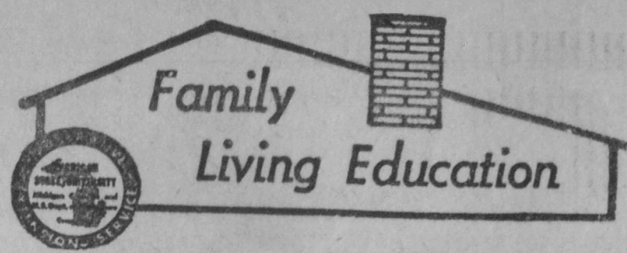

There is something about a fireplace fire that says "Welcome, relax, enjoy."  
This time of year is log burning time, wherever you may be. And a few logs in the fireplace can add warmth to the room. But, the building engineers, realists that they must be, tell us that fireplaces do not provide an economical means of heating.  
Chimneys and fireplaces must be properly constructed for safe, efficient operation. With a well-designed, properly-installed damper, you can regulate the draft, close the flue to prevent loss of heat from the room where there is no fire in the fireplace and adjust the throat opening according to the type of fire to reduce loss of heat. A roaring pine fire, for instance, may require a full throat opening, but a slow-burning hardwood log fire may require an opening of about one or two inches.  
What causes smoky fireplaces? Fallen bricks in the chimney blocking the flue, loose mortar joints or nearby trees or tall structures causing

eddies down the flue are major causes.  
An undersized flue may also cause a smoky fireplace. Installation of a metal hood across the top of the fireplace opening may eliminate the smoking.  
Each year the United States Department of Agriculture receives thousands of requests for information on construction of fireplaces and chimneys. A bulletin has been prepared and is for sale. Write to the Superintendent of Documents, United States Government Printing Office, Washington, D. C. 20402, requesting farmer's bulletin No. 1889, "Fireplaces and Chimneys."  
The table of contents for this 23-page bulletin lists the following: Chimneys—construction and maintenance; fireplaces—design, construction modification, smoky fireplaces, prefabricated (fireplaces and chimneys) and outdoor fireplaces.

### SS Benefits Being Changed for Men

Question: I heard that, with the new changes in social security, men will eventually have their monthly payments figured by a different method. Since I will be retiring in a few years, can you explain what this means to me and when it will go into effect?

Answer: Up to now, the period used to figure average earnings for retirement benefits for men generally has been three years longer than for women. Starting in January, the period for figuring social security eligibility and benefits for men changed in three annual steps. A man who reaches 62 in 1973 will have his average earnings figured over a period one year shorter than under the former law; a man who reaches 62 in 1974 will have his average earnings figured over a period two years shorter. For a man reaching age 62 in 1975 or later, eligibility and benefit amounts will be figured over the same period as for a woman of the same age.

Starting in 1975, this will have the effect of eliminating three more low-earnings years and increasing the average earnings. Since retirement payments are based on a worker's average earnings, the new method will result in higher monthly social security checks for men who reach 62 in the future and for their dependents and survivors.

Question: My brother has been getting monthly disability payments from social security since 1968. I recently read in the paper that disability people under 65 will soon be able to get medicare. Is this true?

Answer: It is true that people under 65 getting social security dis-

ability payments will soon be eligible for medicare coverage. Starting in July of this year, your brother and other disabled people who have been getting social security disability benefits for at least two years will be eligible for medicare.

Question: When I enrolled in medicare some time ago, I was told that if I wanted medical insurance, I would have to sign up for it within three years. But my neighbor, who just turned 65, was told that there is no such deadline. Which of us has the right information?

Answer: Both. Until recently, there was a three-year deadline on signing up for medical insurance. The 1972 social security amendments eliminated this deadline. Now, any eligible person 65 or over can enroll in the medical insurance program during any general enrollment period (January 1 to March 31 of each year.) But people who delay their enrollment more than a year pay higher premiums, depending on how long they wait to sign up.

Question: When I became 65 last summer, I signed up for medical insurance under medicare, but I did not have enough work under social security to get hospital insurance coverage. I heard that congress recently changed the medicare law. Does this mean I can now sign up for hospital insurance, too?

Answer: Yes. Starting July 1, people who are 65 and over and are ineligible for hospital insurance may sign up for this coverage on a voluntary basis. For those who enroll, the monthly premiums will be \$33. Enrollment for medical insurance is also required.

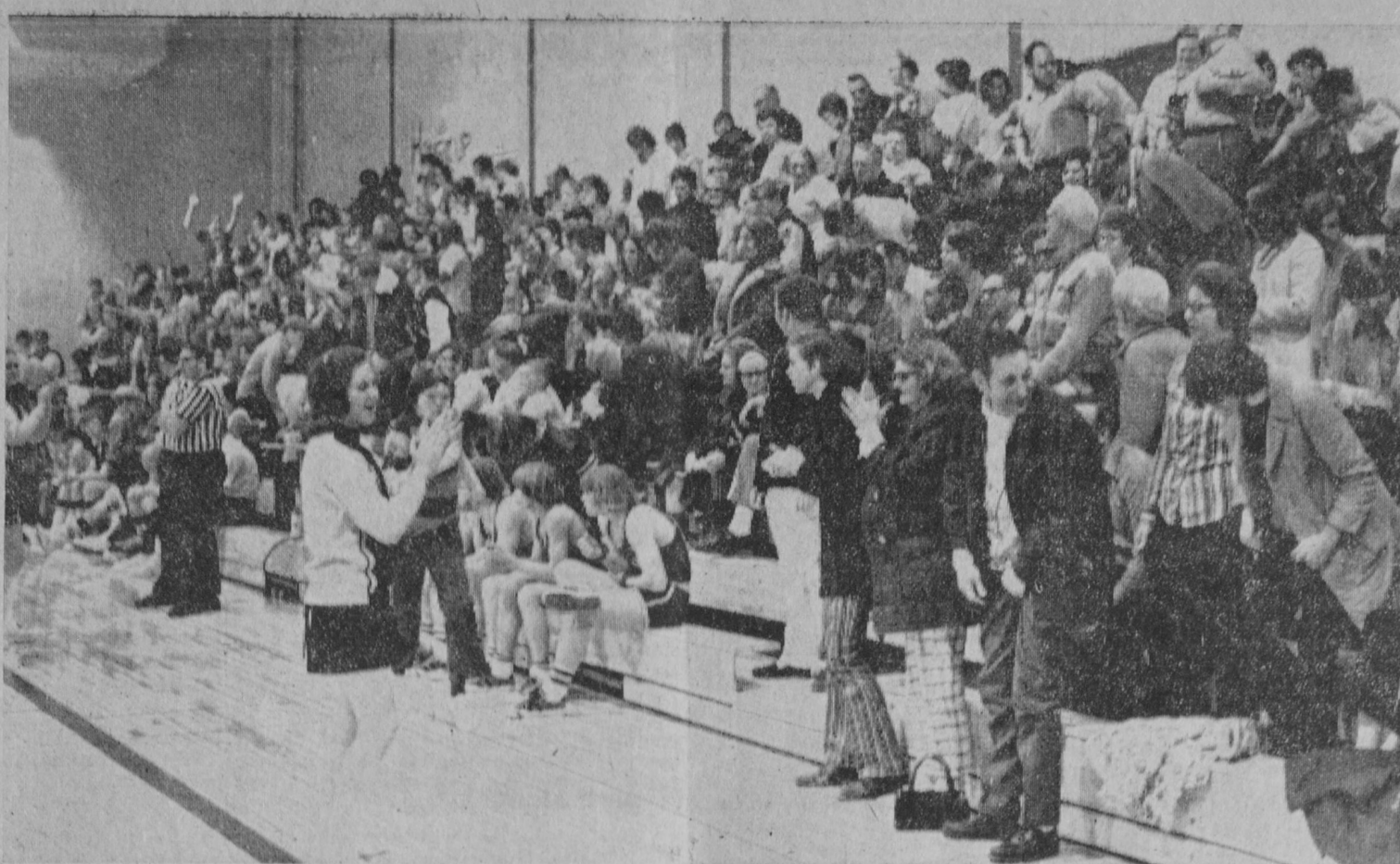
