Michigan Supreme Court Gives

Landmark Decision on State School Financing

In a landmark decision last week, the Michigan Supreme Court ruled that the state legislature must adopt a new school financing method for the 1973-74 school year and declared that the present method of financing public schools through property taxes is unconstitutional.

As a result, it is expected that local districts will be forced to give up cherished local controls in exchange for "a better state-wide method of financing education."

Chief Justice Thomas M. Kavanagh declared that the local property tax may continue to be used, "but

it will have to be in a way that guarantees greater equality between school districts' financial resources." Justice Thomas E. Brennan, one of three judges who dissented in the four to three decision, called the majority decision a "political position paper, written and timed to encourage action by the legislature through the threat of future court intervention."

Equalizing school finances throughout the state appeared to be the basic point in the decision, requiring some "rich" districts in the state to help pay a share of financing education for districts such as Detroit.

It could mean that some type of regional school districts could be formed for purposes of taxation. With its state equalized valuation of \$22,045 per pupil, Tawas Area School District is among the top 16 percent in the state. However, this "rich district" status is balanced by a higher than average local revenue and its \$253 in state aid per pupil puts this district in the lowest category. The instructional expense per pupil in this district is \$448, indicating that 94 percent of the schools spend more money per pupil than this district.

In all probability, school financing will be borne by a higher state-wide income tax. Such a proposal was defeated last November by the people on a constitutional referendum.

Iosco Valuation Increase Seen Through Sales Study Report

A \$5,732,000 increase in the state equalized value of Iosco County real estate was reported Friday to the state tax commission by Henry Oates, county tax equalization director. This increase represented valuations as indicated by sales studies conducted during the past year by the county tax equalization director's office.

Oates said Friday that he had been notified by the state tax commission that a spot check of real estate assessments would be made sometime during 1973. The last time a spot check had been conducted in Iosco was in 1967, when the county adopted Gem Survey's appraisals. Prior to that a spot check of assessments had not been made here since 1953, when several members of the board of supervisors petitioned the state to conduct the survey.

The county tax equalization director's report concerned the true cash value of his recommended real estate valuation increases. Theoretically, one-half of this true cash valuation figure is the state equalized valuation.

Oates' recommended increases as to the true cash value base of the individual townships and cities were as follows:

Foster Homes Needed in Iosco

In recent months, there have been a number of children coming under the jurisdiction of the Iosco County Probate Court whose present homes were unsuitable, but, in some instances are left there simply because no foster homes are available.

"This is especially true when the child in need of a foster home is 14 or 15 years old," states George Burnette, juvenile officer for the probate court.

Burnette said the majority of homes licensed through the probate court desire babies or young children in their homes, although there is some need for homes for young children. Additional foster homes are needed in every school district of the county.

Children placed in foster homes by the court or department of social services are supervised by the juvenile officer or caseworker and help for the foster parents is always available, should a problem arise as a result of the placement.

Application for a foster home license can be made through the Iosco County Probate Court or the Iosco County Department of Social Services. Requirements for licensing include that the home be safe, clean and orderly in appearance and large enough to accommodate the number of foster children for which the license is issued.

The foster family should be composed of a mother and father about the same age as parents bringing up their own children and all members must be in such physical and mental health as will not adversely affect the health of the child or the quality and manner of his care.

Members of the foster family must also be of good character, habits and reputation. All members must be willing to accept the foster child into the home as a member of the family group.

A moderate fee is paid to the foster parents to provide room and board, clothing and miscellaneous necessities required by the foster child. The cost of medical and dental care for the foster child is also provided.

Police Check Three Accidents

Michigan State Police investigated three personal injury accidents involving snowmobiles during the past week.

Elsie Perry, 51, South Branch, was treated at Tawas Hospital Sunday for an injured shoulder. Operating a snowmobile on a private trail in Plainfield Township, the machine struck a bare spot on the ground and rolled over.

Tyler Cholger, 27, Trenton, was injured Monday when he lost control of his snowmobile on an ice-covered field in Tawas City and rolled over. He was treated at Tawas Hospital for an injured right ankle.

Local Draft Boards Complete Reorganization

Reorganization of Michigan's draft boards in preparation for probable standby operations some time in 1973 has been virtually completed, according to Arthur A. Holmes, state director of selective service.

During the past year, many smaller county draft boards have been consolidated into intercounty boards and larger boards have been grouped at single sites. The number of local board offices has been reduced from 97 to 29. The original 134 local boards, many of them part time, have been consolidated to form 81 full time boards. An additional 14 Detroit boards will be consolidated early in 1973.

Congress has authorized selective service to continue standby operations if inductions are suspended in July 1973. Local boards would continue to register and classify registrants and maintain an available manpower pool to prepare for any emergency resumption of the draft.

All young men continue to be subject to registration within 30 days of their 18th birthday or up to 30 days after that date. Registration can be accomplished at any local board office or with volunteer registrars who have been appointed in most high schools and youth centers. Young men who have any questions about registration may write or call the draft board.

All remaining draft boards operate on a full time basis, thus providing better service to the public. In addition to cost savings, centralization has also made possible improved supervision and uniformity of decisions. All draft boards will be capable of rapid expansion in the event of any major mobilization.

Home Building Keeps Steady Pace at ET

Home construction continues its steady pace at East Tawas, according to a report Tuesday night to the city council by Supt. of Public Works Paul Roper.

The city superintendent said that building permits had been issued for 23 new dwellings during 1972, an increase of two over the previous year. Total valuation of the dwellings was \$375,754.

Total valuation of all construction during the year was \$601,792, as compared to \$500,023 during the previous year.

Other categories included 19 garages with a valuation of \$34,165; 28 residential alterations and additions, \$58,813; 51 permits for repairs and maintenance, \$29,904; 22 fences, \$5,717; 14 tool sheds, \$3,739.

There were eight commercial permits issued with a total valuation of \$111,700. The same number of permits was issued in this category the previous year, but the valuation was slightly lower at \$106,500.

Two Supervisors Lack Certificates

Supervisors of all but two of Iosco County's 11 townships have successfully completed state examinations to become certified tax assessors, according to a report Thursday by Henry Oates, county tax equalization director.

Latest to pass the examination were Harvey Odell of Reno Township, LaVerne Koepke of Tawas Township and John Skrocki of Grant Township. The examination was held December 6.

Other supervisors previously passing the examination were Charles Smith of Oscoda Township, Richter Lixey of Baldwin Township, Dennis Chrivia of Plainfield Township, William Olsen of Wilber Township, Dale Lamrock of AuSable Township and John Weible of Alabaster Township.

Oates reports that he is now in the process of making agreements with Sherman and Burleigh Township for tax assessing work to be handled by his office.

At the present time, the county tax department has completed agreements with the City of East Tawas, City of Tawas City and City of Whittemore for tax assessing work.

Others in the county successfully passing the state examination were Peggi Bassi and Deloise (Dewey) Durant of the tax equalization department, along with Wilbur C. Roach. Durant is hospitalized with a serious illness and Olsen is handling his appraisal work.

TC Council Hears Report on Fires

Total number of fire calls handled by the Tawas City Volunteer Fire Department during 1971 was practically the same as the previous year's total, according to a report Tuesday night to the Tawas City Council.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported there were 31 fire calls during 1972, one more than handled the previous year. The department answered 17 calls each year in Tawas City.

There was a shift in the number of calls in townships served by the fire department. Tawas Township had 12 fire calls during the year, as compared to eight during 1971. Alabaster Township had two calls during the past year, as compared to seven in 1971.

Tawas City's 17 fires included five house blazes, one car fire, four grass fires and seven in the miscellaneous category. Tawas Township had five house fires, three car fires and four listed in the miscellaneous category.

Alabaster Township's fire calls were both in the car or truck category. The fire department held 23 practice sessions during the year.

Proposals from interested bidders for the collection of garbage provided the major discussion at Tuesday night's council meeting. The meeting was held one night later than usual due to the holidays.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the city had not advertised for bids on the garbage collection and was only interested in receiving proposals from various prospective contractors.

Other discussion included matters of snow removal and naming a new chief of police. Bublitz reports that he has received three applications for this position and is continuing to advertise the vacancy in order to receive additional applications before naming a successor to Dennis Frank, acting chief, who resigned in December.



Education Forum Scheduled Jan. 9 by State C of C

Tawas Chamber of Commerce is again rendering a valuable service to Tawas Area School District by sponsoring a business education forum to be held Tuesday, January 9, 7:30 p. m., at the East Tawas Elementary Unit.

Through cooperation with the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce, this program will provide information to the public concerning a recent survey of 3,000 of its members to determine what is considered the most important priorities in state education.

Businessmen of Michigan are contributing 1.15 billion dollars to education this year, which represents 48 percent of the total 2.4 billion dollars state schools will spend on public education — kindergarten through grade 12.

James Barrett, an educational specialist, and Lewis Easterling, a trained economist, joined the state chamber of commerce's staff and studied alternatives to present public education practices that could save districts millions of dollars each year.

They came up with 16 proposals, including control of state expenditures in education and career education which, in the long run, could reallocate 465 million dollars into the public education budget.

The 90-minute forums have been held at various locations around the state and each forum is usually preceded by a briefing session with educators, who are encouraged to express their views about the recommendations.

Some of the subjects to be treated include year around schools, minimum classroom teaching schedules, tenure repeal or revision, cooperative purchasing, use of "paraprofessionals," pupil-teacher ratio revisions, driver education range program, school construction alternatives.

The state chamber believes that by adopting its recommendations, schools could use the resulting savings in tax money for expanded career education, improved counseling, educational accountability, program budgeting and increased research.

"This meeting will provide area residents with valuable information that normally is not available," states Harris Barkman, president of Tawas Chamber of Commerce.





Young Widow Should Apply Now for Benefits

Question: My brother was only 25 when he died last month. He left a 21-year-old widow and two children, a two-year-old and a baby, five months old. Even though my brother was very young, could he not still have enough work under social security for his wife and children to get monthly checks?

Answer: Yes, if your brother had as little as 1 1/2 years of work under social security, his wife and children could get monthly social security survivors checks and a lump-sum payment to help with the funeral expenses. Your sister-in-law should call, write or visit any social security office as soon as possible to apply for benefits.

Question: I am 67 and enrolled in both parts of medicare. Since I suffer from a severe respiratory ailment, I have to use oxygen in my home. Will medicare help pay for the rental of this equipment?

Answer: Yes. Oxygen that is medically necessary is covered. The medical insurance part of medicare, which helps pay the cost of physicians' services, will pay 80 percent of the reasonable charge, after you have met your \$50 (\$60 after January 1, 1973) annual deductible. A statement from your doctor that the oxygen is medically necessary should be attached to the itemized bill that is sent in for medicare payment.

Question: After my husband died recently, I received a bill from his doctor. Since we both were signed up for medical insurance under medicare, do I just send the bill in for payment as I have done in the past?

Answer: When a medicare patient has died, the request for payment must be submitted with some additional information. Along with the usual form, you will need a receipt showing that the medical expenses were paid and another form (SSA-1660) which explains your legal relationship to the deceased medicare beneficiary. If you need help in submitting your request for payment, call any social security office.

Question: I had a heart attack two months ago and I am unable to work. I have been getting a weekly check of \$60 from my employer's health insurance plan. These checks will keep on coming for six months. Since there is a waiting period for social security disability benefits, should I wait until the insurance checks from my employer stop before I apply for social security payments?

Answer: No, you should call any social security office immediately to apply.

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





The newspapers are full of ads for bargain beef halves, your freezer is almost empty and you cannot pass up a bargain, can you? Well, things are not always as they seem. A closer look at that "bargain" may be in order.

When buying meat by the side or quarter, there are two things to look for: The United States Department of Agriculture's quality grade and the USDA yield grade. The quality grade is the designation you are used to seeing on the meat you buy in the grocery store. US Prime and US Choice are the two top quality grades. Meat graded US Good may be a nutritious purchase but will not be as tender as the first two.

The yield grade measures the yield of boneless, closely-trimmed retail cuts from the high value parts of the carcass, the round, loin, rib and chuck. They reflect the total yield of retail cuts.

The yield grade may not be advertised and you will have to ask for it. But, the yield grade is even more important than the quality grade when buying beef or lamb by the side or quarter. It tells you how many pounds of the carcass will make it to your dining room table and how much will end up in the butcher's fat barrel.

Not all carcasses will be graded for either quality or yield. Both are voluntary and must be paid for by the owner of the plant where the animal was slaughtered or by the wholesaler. Between 95 and 98 percent of all Prime and Choice carcasses are graded as such.

Yield grades are numbered one through five—grade one yielding the highest amount of edible meat and grade five, the least. Freezer meat is usually advertised by hanging weight, the weight of the whole side or quarter of beef before it is trimmed or boned. If the ad offers beef for 70 cents per pound hanging weight, this means 70 cents per pound for bones, gristle, fat and other inedible portions of the carcass in addition to the edible flesh. The following percentages represent expected yield percentages of retail cuts by yield grade: Yield grade

one means the carcass will yield 79.8 percent or more in retail cuts; yield grade two, 75.2 to 79.7 percent; yield grade three, 70.6 to 75.1 percent; yield grade four, 66 to 70.5 percent, and yield grade five, 65.9 percent or less.

Of all carcasses about 30 percent are yield grade one or two; 50 percent, yield grade three, and only 20 percent, yield grade four or five.

Using USDA yield grades, you can see, for example, that if a 300-pound side of beef is a yield grade five, you will take home only 195 pounds (65 percent) or less of edible meat.

At 70 cents per pound, you will pay \$210 for the side, but that \$210 will be buying only 195 pounds of meat or less.

Your real cost, therefore, is \$1.07 per pound or more. That is \$1.07 per pound for steaks, roasts, shanks, hamburger and soup bones.

Of a side of beef, only 7 1/2 percent is T-bone and Porterhouse steaks. That means, of those 195 pounds of meat, there are only about 15 pounds of these choice steaks. The chuck portion, in contrast, is 26 percent of the weight. Twenty-six percent, more than 50 pounds, of the side will be pot roast, Salisbury steak, stew meat and meat loaf.

If you purchase a 300-pound yield grade two carcass, you will get about 231 pounds (77 percent) of edible meat for your \$210, a cost of about 91 cents per pound. The percentages of cuts will be the same, but you will get more of each from the same weight carcass.

USDA officials say the ideal carcass is quality grade US Choice and

yield grade two. A "Choice" or "Choice 3" carcass has marbling which makes it neither too tough nor too fatty.

If you decide to buy a side or quarter of meat for your freezer, remember these few simple rules. Check the quality grade; check the yield grade; be sure the purchase is a truly economical decision based on your family's eating habits, your freezer space, and the current retail cost of the meat you buy.


