

Cities to Comply With Restriction on Dump Keys

Effective Thursday, the lock on the Tawas Sanitary Landfill located southwest of the Monument Road in Huron National Forest will be changed and the facility will only be open Monday and Wednesday afternoons and all day Saturday to 6:00 p. m.

This move is to comply with an order dated January 25 issued by Raymond M. Jurczyk, sanitarian for District Health Department No. 2, who said that a new license to operate the facility would not be issued unless deficiencies were corrected by February 2.

In a letter to the Cities of East Tawas and Tawas City, along with a copy to the prosecuting attorney's office, Jurczyk said that a recent inspection of the landfill revealed that

it was being operated contrary to state law.

Deficiencies noted included: 1. Burning of refuse at the time of inspection and signs indicated that this had been happening for some time; 2. refuse was not being compacted and covered at the end of each day's operation; 3. access to the dump via the assorted number of keys that appear to be available during hours the landfill is closed shall be prohibited.

Contacted Monday morning at his office, Jurczyk told the Herald that the number of keys held by area business places and industries had gotten out of hand. He said that use of the dump by persons holding keys often resulted in the unlawful burning of trash at the dump. Otherwise, he said, this landfill appeared to be an excellent operation with no problem of ground water contamination.

Jurczyk said that to comply with state law, it was necessary to compact and cover refuse at the end of each day's operation. He said this could not be accomplished when no attendant was on duty and persons were using the facility through the use of keys. He said that inspection of the facility followed a complaint that refuse was burning on the premises.

Immediate action was taken Monday afternoon by Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas, and Reginald Bublitz, city manager of Tawas City, to correct the problem in order for the continued licensing of the landfill.

"We realize that not making a key available will inconvenience some businesses and industries, but it was mandatory that this action be taken," said Bublitz. "It was felt that it would be better to inconvenience a few rather than to have the dump closed by the state."

He said that the landfill would continue to operate on its regular schedule of being open Monday and Wednesday afternoons as well as all day Saturday. He said that anyone requiring to use facilities for disposal on other days should contact private landfill operators in the area.

The district sanitarian reported to the Herald that inspections were being made of sanitary landfill facilities in Alabaster, Reno and Baldwin Townships. He said that representatives of the state department of health were to attend the February 21 meeting of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners to discuss a county-wide sanitary landfill.



W-P School Names Award Recipient

Whittemore-Prezcott Area High School's 1973 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow is Lily White, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Russell White of Whittemore. She is also among the top 10 students in the senior class. Selected by her score in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken by both senior boys and girls on December 5, Miss White will receive a specially-designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for American Homemakers of Tomorrow. In addition, Miss White remains eligible for state and national honors.

The State Homemaker of Tomorrow, to be chosen from all school winners in the state in judging centering on test performance, will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship. A 20-volume reference work, "The Annals of America," will also be presented to the state winner's school by Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation. The second-ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship.

In late April, 51 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow representing every state and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a faculty advisor, will gather in Washington, D. C., for an expense-paid tour of the capital city and colonial Williamsburg, Virginia. Culminating the tour will be announcement of the 1973 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up. To be selected through personal observation and interviews during the tour plus state-level judging results, they will be awarded increases in their scholarships of \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000.

Instituted in last year's Betty Crocker search, a \$1,000 Nutrition Scholarship is included in the program again this year. Recipient of this grant will be the participating student who is planning a college major in nutrition or a related field, ranks among the highest in his or her state on the over-all examination and, from those meeting these two criteria, achieves the top score on the test's nutrition questions.

A total of 665,600 seniors were enrolled in this year's search, the first in which boys were eligible to participate. Since the program began in the 1954-55 school year, approximately nine million students have taken part and, with this year's grants, scholarship awards will exceed two-million dollars.

Tension Mounts as \$200,000 Prize Eyed

Two Area Residents Await Super Drawing

Excitement over drawings for the "big money" in the state lottery has increased considerably in the Tawas area during the past week—and for good reason, as two Tawas area residents have tickets entered in Thursday morning's super drawing at Port Austin.

Keeping their fingers crossed Thursday morning at Port Austin will be Clifford M. Anschuetz of East Tawas and Mrs. Elmer Squires of Route No. 2, Tawas City, a resident of the Singing Bridge area. They are automatic \$10,000 winners and are among five or more persons awaiting the drawing for the big prizes of \$200,000 and \$50,000.

Local tension mounted last week when there was a mixup involving Anschuetz's ticket. When filling out necessary papers at the local secretary of state's office, Anschuetz's winning ticket was incorrectly stapled to the forms and mailed to Cadillac. There, it was treated as a \$25 winner.

When his name was not included in the super drawing at Ypsilanti, Anschuetz immediately contacted Gus

Harrison, state lottery director. The East Tawas man was told he should have retained the ticket but that the matter would be followed up by his staff. Anschuetz was informed Friday morning that his ticket had been found at Cadillac and to be at Port Austin this week.

"Last week was exciting and I was nervous, but the pressure has really mounted through the week's delay," stated Anschuetz.

Mrs. Squires said Saturday that she was "still shaking" after learning that her ticket was in the super winner classification. She purchased her ticket at Brugger's Foodland, Tawas City. When she returned to the store Friday night, she did not have her ticket with her in order to compare it with the winning number posted on the wall.

"I thought I held the winning number, but I just could not make myself believe it. I waited until I got home to ask my husband. When he told me the number I just about fell through the floor," stated Mrs. Squires. Mrs. Squires said she spent a

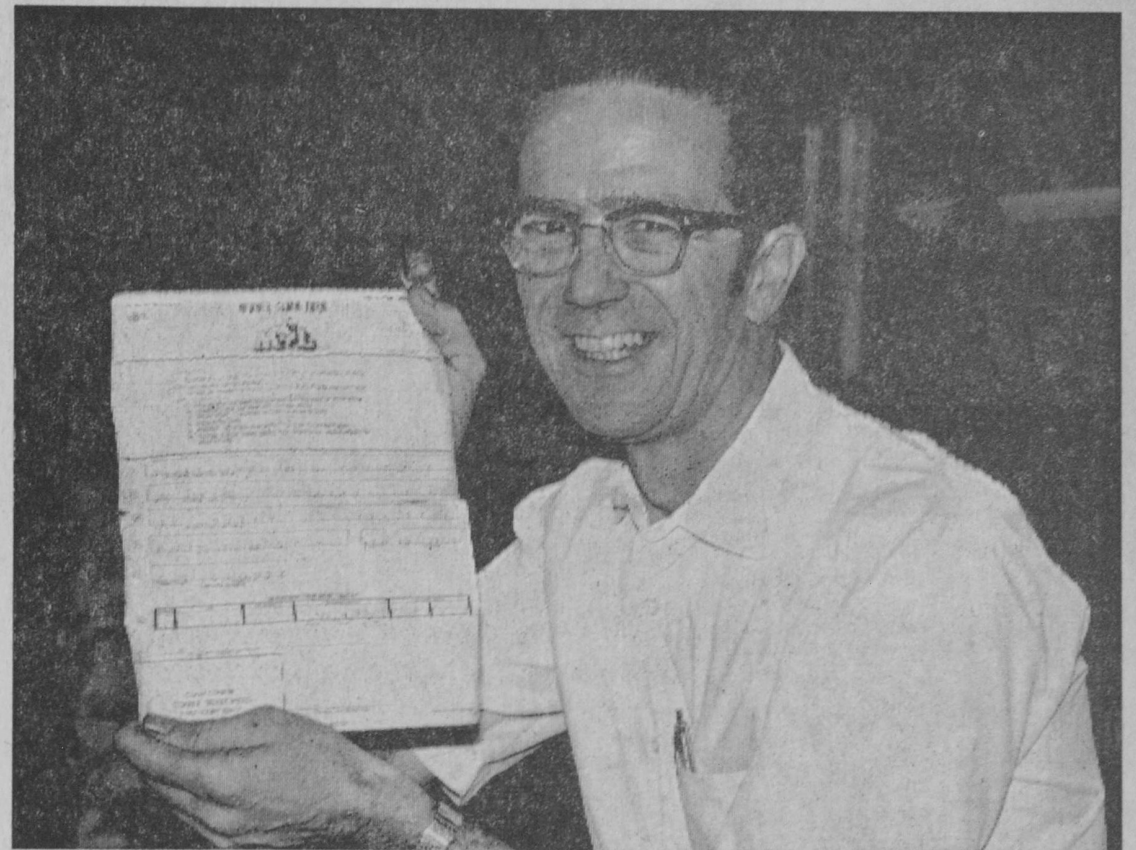
sleepless night thinking about all the possibilities that were being presented. She works in the housekeeping department of Tawas Hospital and her husband is employed at a Pinconning manufacturing plant.

She said she had purchased one ticket each week since the lottery started, but really did not consider the purchases to be gambling. "I have taken a lot of ribbing about buying only one ticket a week," she stated. "I have never won anything before and I have not made any plans—I'll believe it all when the money is in the bank."

Anschuetz, a 1943 graduate of Tawas City High School, who returned to the Tawas area a year ago after residing at Flint and Royal Oak for 25 years, said he had purchased five tickets each week.

He works as a diemaker at Starboard Industries, East Tawas. He and his wife, Betty, said they were not making any plans until after Thursday.

In the meantime, tension is mounting for both residents and for the community as well.

Niles Man Rescued from Bay Ice Flow

A 52-year-old Niles man, who was rescued from a Tawas Bay ice flow Saturday afternoon, was none the worse for his harrowing experience, other than being a little cold.

Jack B. Kohler, who had been fishing perch in the bight of Tawas Bay, was returned to shore at 4:35 p. m. by coast guardsmen from East Tawas. He had been carried out into the open water of Tawas Bay on an ice flow which had broken off the main shelf of ice during a high wind.

State police at East Tawas said that Martin Puracker of Niles had come to the post and notified them at 3:30 p. m. that his fishing partner was on a long and narrow piece of ice which was drifting into open water. A call to the Tawas Coast Guard Station saw the immediate dispatch of two coast guardsmen and a small outboard motor boat.

Coast guardsmen had difficulty navigating through the floating ice, but succeeded in reaching Kohler.

He suffered no ill effects from the exposure.

Police said that Kohler had warned Puracker, who was fishing some distance away, that the ice was breaking up and to run for shore. The two men had driven their car to the Perchville area and parked it on foot for the fishing area beyond the ice fishing village.

Others fishing in the area had taken note of the high wind and returned to shore before the ice began to break up.

Veteran fishermen say that this is the first time in years that ice has broken up this early in the season in the bight of Tawas Bay. All fishermen are warned to use caution when new ice forms.

Haire of Bay Port, when the car in which they were riding was taken into the strong current of the river at a point where the road was covered with three to four feet of water.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, January 29.

Thaw Helped Heating Bills, but Tough on Water Mains

Last week's January thaw brought a few days of welcome relief to high heating bills for area homeowners, but it was not particularly appreciated by the Tawas City Department of Public Works.

Several days of thawing weather were responsible for two breaks in the water distribution system. In both instances, ground shock waves from frost penetrating the water-saturated subsurface cracked cast iron water mains.

The first break was discovered Thursday morning in a water main on Tenth Avenue. Water "boiled" up along the shoulder of the road and service to that area was shut off at 9 o'clock. A second water main break was discovered minutes later on Harris Avenue. This main serves the Iosco Medical Care Facility and Tawas Area High School.

The break in the Tenth Avenue main was repaired with a flexible clamp casing and service was restored to that area at 10:45 a. m.

Although considerable water was lost and added to the problem of digging around the break, the Harris Avenue main was not shut off until 1:00 p. m. This was to permit use of water during the peak demand period at the medical care facility and the high school. The break in this main was repaired in one hour, 20 minutes, and service was restored at 2:20 p. m.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said this was the first time he could recall two water main breaks occurring at the same time. "The breaks caused much inconvenience to water customers, but they were most patient and cooperative," stated Bublitz.

The city manager said that the shocking power of frost apparently increases as the ground becomes saturated with water. The water table is extremely high this year and the thawing weather increased the potential for ruptured water mains.

In addition, the thawing weather melted snow which acts as a ground cover and protects against frost penetration.

In both instances, frost cracked cast iron water mains installed in 1935. Since 1952, only asbestos water mains have been installed by the city and this type of main has withstood the shocking power of frost penetration.

Despite the expense of repairing the two mains, there was some consolation for the city—snow removal was costly during December and the milder weather during much of January has benefited the city treasury.

Cities to Study Possible Legal Requirements for Police Force

Determination of the legal responsibility of cities as a corporate entity in providing police protection is to be sought by councils of East Tawas and Tawas City before any further discussion is held on proposed reorganization of police departments.

At a special committee meeting Monday night, Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas said that several plans with merit had been proposed to approve police protection in the

two communities as well as the county. He believed, however, that city attorneys should study present state acts to determine the actual responsibility of the two cities.

"Once a legal opinion is received, the councils could take the matter from there," said Bolen.

During the past several weeks, considerable discussion has been heard at meetings of both councils concerning reorganization and realignment of police activities. In Tawas City's case, the city is presently without a police chief and the council is attempting to make a determination as to steps to be taken to provide full-time police protection.

Several ideas have been advanced at regular and special meetings of the two councils, ranging from hiring a new police chief to a complete takeover of city police functions by the sheriff's department.

There have been a number of ideas advanced between these two points. One proposal would have Tawas City hire two patrolmen and have the department coordinate its activities through the sheriff's department. Another idea advanced was to combine Tawas City's department with the East Tawas Police Department. Still another thought was to have Tawas City contract with East Tawas for police protection.

An idea being advanced by Mayor John Brugger of Tawas City would be a county-wide police force handled by the Iosco County Sheriff's Department with the headquarters for such an organization located at the jail. Brugger believes that such an organization would provide a more efficient operation than the present system of individual units, that some duplication of effort would be eliminated for a better use of tax

dollars and that cities, which presently pay a sizeable portion of the county budget, would receive a more equitable return of service from the sheriff's department.

Regardless of the eventual outcome of any of the above plans, city officials attending Monday night's meeting indicated a willingness to cooperate in the coordination of police activities in the Tawas.

Representing the City of East Tawas were Councilmen George Staudacher and Richard Moss, along with Mayor Bolen. Representing the City of Tawas City were Aldermen Robert Rollin and William Groff Jr., along with Mayor Brugger.

Prescott Retains Appointments

State Rep. George Prescott, Tawas City, has retained three important committee assignments in the Michigan House of Representatives. Prescott, beginning his fourth term, has been reappointed by the speaker to the committees on consumers and agriculture, elections and liquor control. Representative Prescott is Republican vice chairman of the liquor control committee.

Legion Post Plans 'Victory Fish Fry'

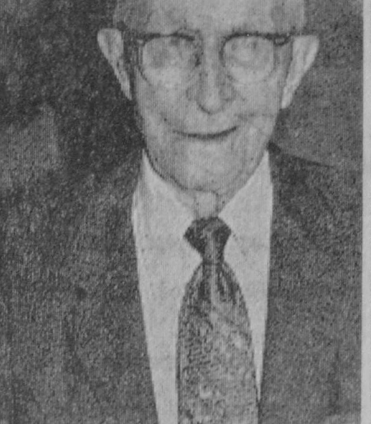

Notice of Hearing Affecting Residential Electric Rates

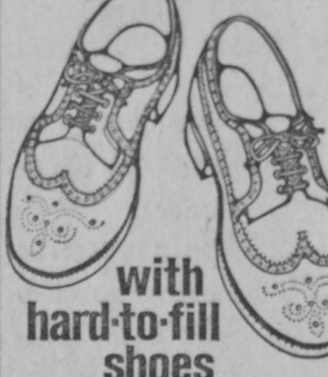

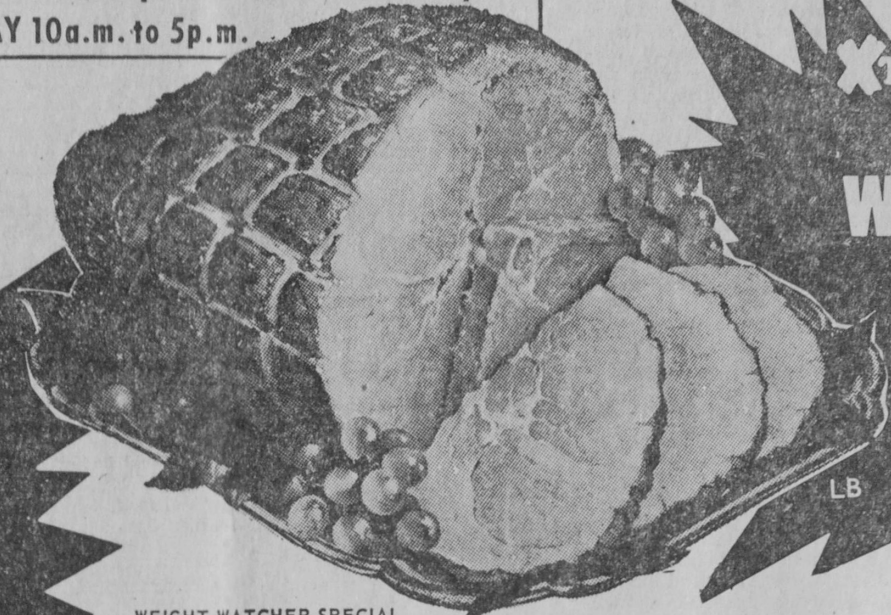

Arenac Eastern played well throughout the quarter, shooting only when a good opportunity presented itself and had few passing turnovers.

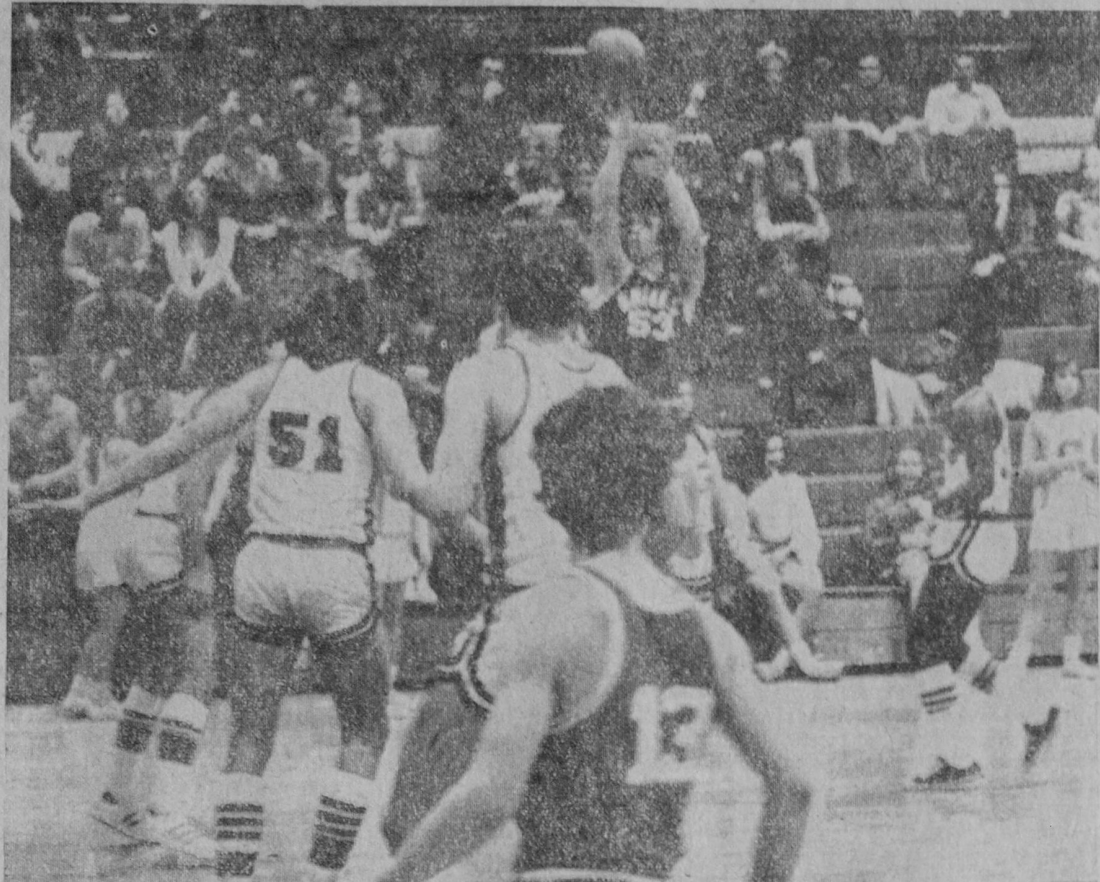

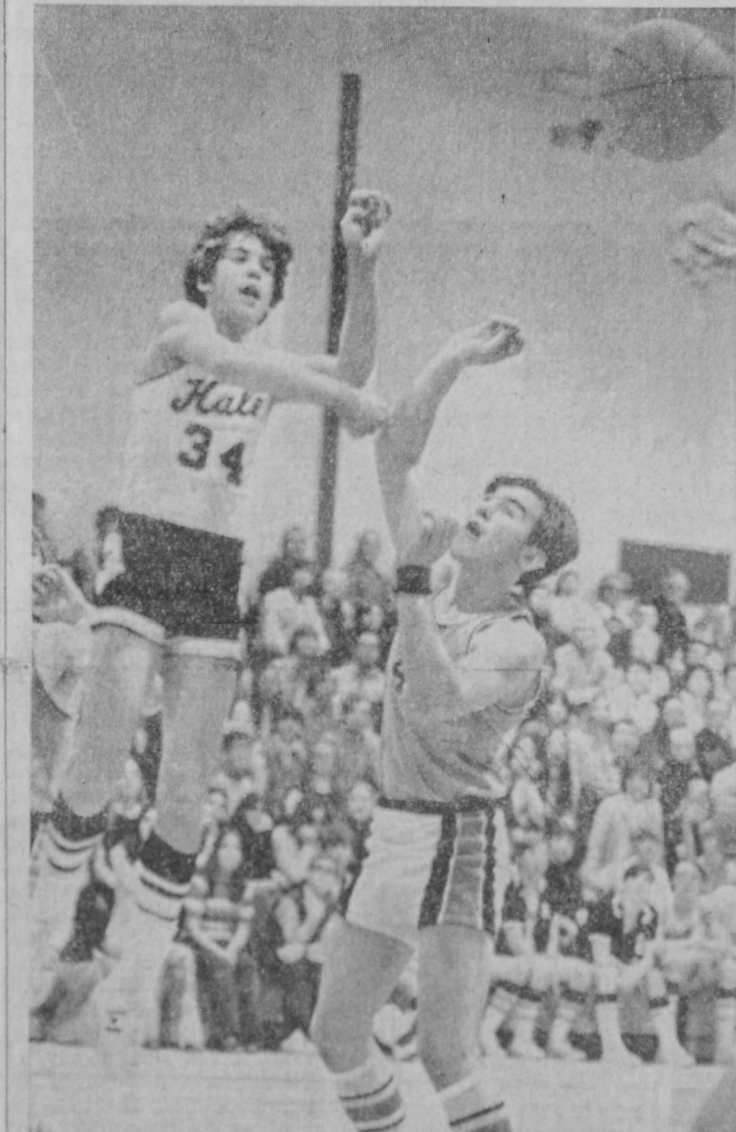

The Rev. Edward J. Fairbanks extends a cordial invitation to the public to attend the convention.

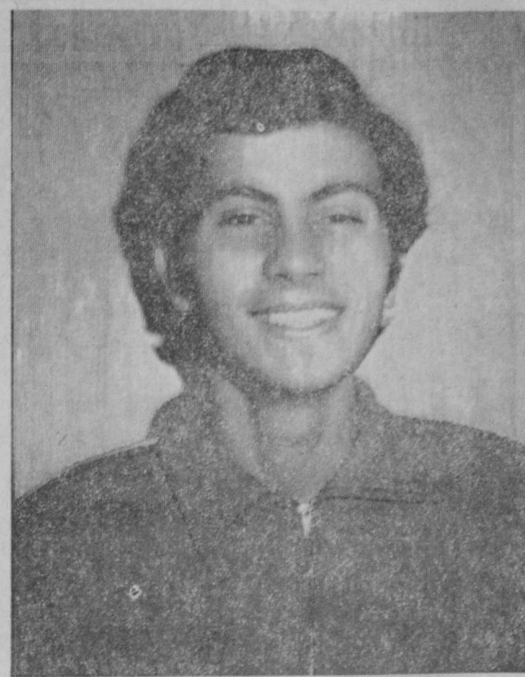

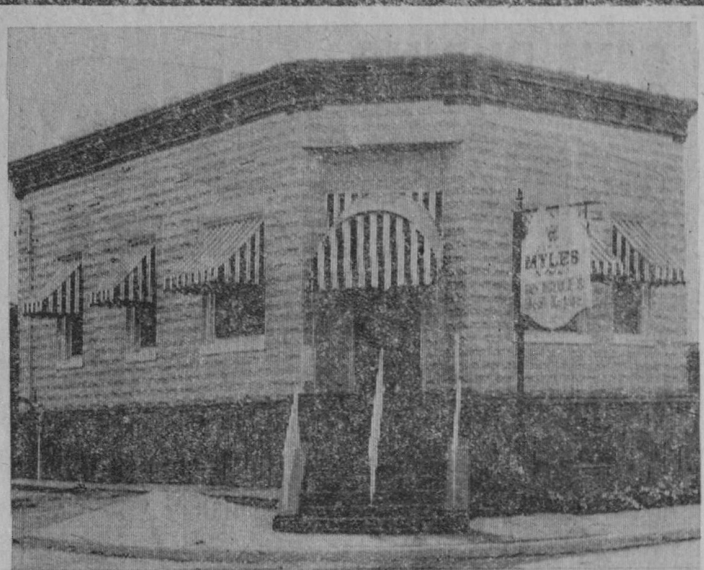

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Expansion Planned for Iosco Career Education

The curriculum and facilities subcommittee of the Career Education Planning District (CEPD) Council met recently at Tawas Area High School. This committee deals with the vocational education programs in the county's schools.

Bruce Vickey, CEPD coordinator, presented some statistical information relative to Iosco County's labor force and its relationship to surrounding counties and the state.

Data presented dealt with the age and composition of the labor force, percentage of employment and unemployment, labor force composition by class of worker, projected employment for 1976, labor force composition by occupation, growth and composition of labor force by industry, regional employment growth, labor force commuting patterns by county of residence.

Other discussion centered around recommendations made at an earlier meeting held by the curriculum committee. The group discussed expanding existing vocational education opportunities in the county. Due to lack of facilities and funds available, it was determined that expansion of the cooperative program in the coun-

ty would be a logical course of action to pursue at this time.

By expanding cooperative programs, the community could be utilized as an extension of the existing classroom facilities, said Vickey. At the same time, students would be gaining valuable on-the-job voca-

tional education experience.

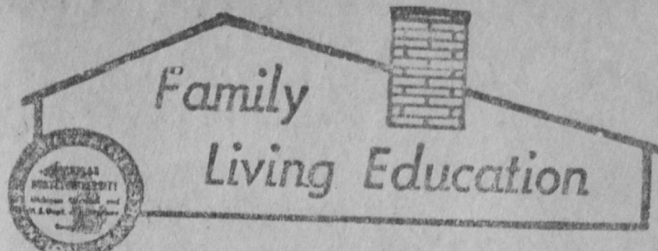
The possibility of expanding the building trades program was also explored. The intent at this time is to attempt to have a building trades program on both sides of the county. At present, the building trades program is located at Hale, which ne-

cessitates transporting all students to Hale for vocational building trades training.

The committee also considered expansion of the shared time automotive services program from three days a week to five days a week.

The other recommendation of the committee had to do with exploring the possibility of locating a local restaurant that is closed for the off season and leasing it to offer a food services training program for high school students.

Vickey said the next CEPD coordinating council meeting would be held in late February.

"magic" in cookbooks, newspapers and magazines.

And, there is magic in your own imagination when you apply it to meal planning for your family.

How about some new ways with

old foods or transforming the basic four for fussy appetites:

If the kids go on milk strike, negotiate with chocolate milk, strawberry milk, cherry milk—all flavored and colored with syrup. These are also tasty when poured on cereals.

Ice cream is another popular member of the milk group. It is good on cereal as well as for dessert. And you can fire enthusiasm by letting your kids make their own—by the crank freezer or ice cube tray method.

The meat group uses the biggest part of your food dollar, so you might want to use one of the meat substitutes—eggs, fish, shellfish, cold cuts, dry peas, dry beans and peanut butter—occasionally.

Custard is a good way to "push" milk and eggs. Add interest by stirring in a square of unsweetened chocolate or by folding in drained berries. Unsweetened custard, combined with meat, onions and vegetables and baked in a pie shell, is a French "quiche" (Keesh), and a great use for leftovers.

Cream puff shells and popovers are excellent containers for meat salads and creamed mixtures such as chicken à la king.

A word on sauces: They are not supposed to hide the foods, so go easy with them. And consider switching some of the usual go-togethers. Raisin sauce goes with ham; try it with meat loaf. Tartar sauce goes with fish; try it with chicken. Tomato sauce goes with beef; try it with fish.

Do not neglect fruits and vegetables (primary sources of vitamins A and C). The aroma of homemade vegetable soup can do as much for the appetite as the aroma of home-baked bread.

Check an herb and spice chart for different ways to spark meat and vegetable dishes.

Pancakes, waffles and French toast are popular members of the bread and cereal group. For a pleasing change, add bits of bacon, sausage or corn kernels to pancake and waffle batter. Or, present your family with tangy French toast by beat-

ing the eggs with orange, apple or pineapple juice instead of milk.

Hot cornbread and biscuits are tasty ways to fulfill the daily bread requirement and they go well with any meal. Borrow a breakfast recipe from your grandparents—cornbread topped with warm syrup.

Whatever foods you use to represent the basic four, keep these daily requirements in mind: Milk group, young children, two-three cups; older children, three-four cups; adults, two cups; meat group, everyone, two servings; fruit and vegetable group, everyone, four servings; bread and cereal group, everyone, four servings.

Fluoride Program Offered Again

Topical applications of fluoride will be offered again this summer to children of the Tawas Area School District, according to Diane Oberlies, chairman of the Tawas Area Newcomers Club's topical fluoride committee.

The fluoride program, which is supervised by the Michigan Department of Public Health, will be made

available to preschoolers, second, fifth and eighth grade students and to special cases referred by dentists.

The procedure consists of four visits to the fluoride clinic. The child's teeth are cleaned on the first visit and a fluoride solution is applied directly to the surface of the teeth. The fluoride application only is then repeated during the three succeeding visits. This technique has been shown to reduce tooth decay by about 40 percent, compared with the 60 to 65 percent reduction obtained with fluoridated water.

In addition to providing protection against cavities, the program offers a valuable dental experience for children with no discomfort. Dental health education by the clinic personnel, including instruction in the proper method of brushing teeth, also is an important part of the program.

Parents of eligible children will be notified at a later date and be given an opportunity to enroll their children in the program. A small fee is charged to cover the cost of operating the clinic.

Marshall McGuire, Alcona County extension director, will present pertinent facts on the Michigan income tax returns.

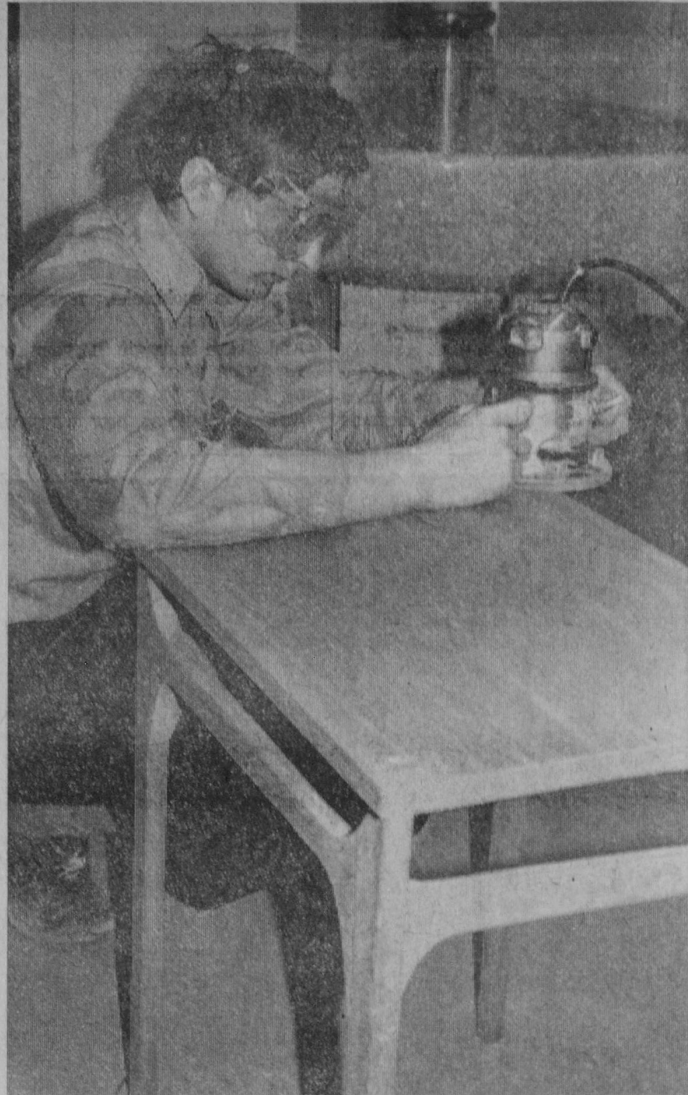

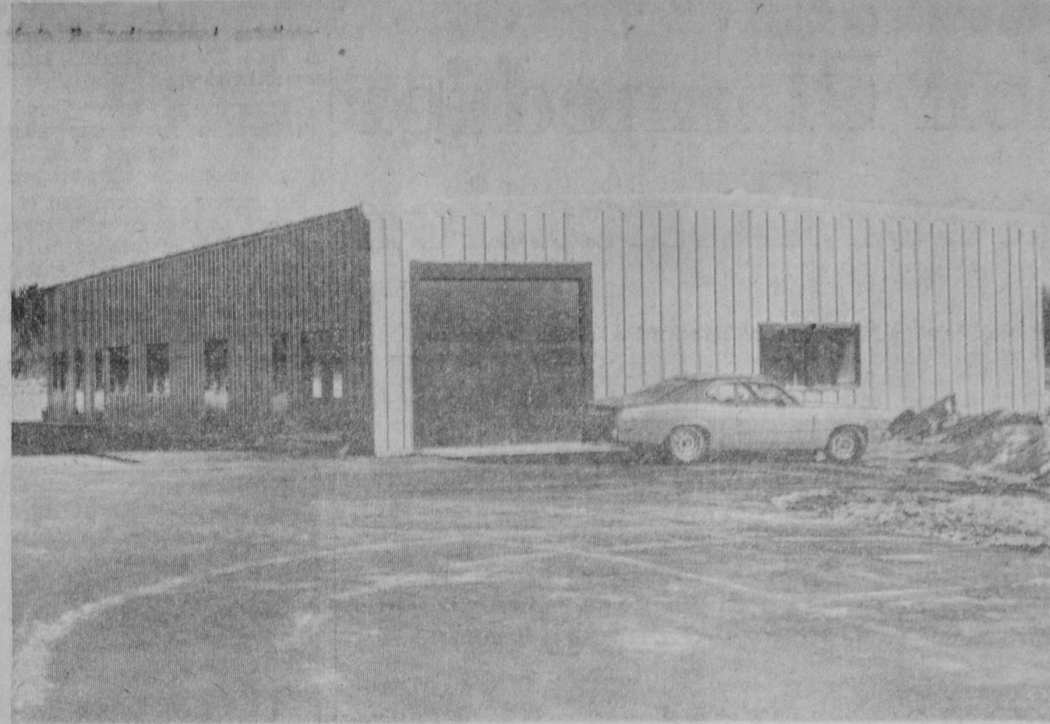
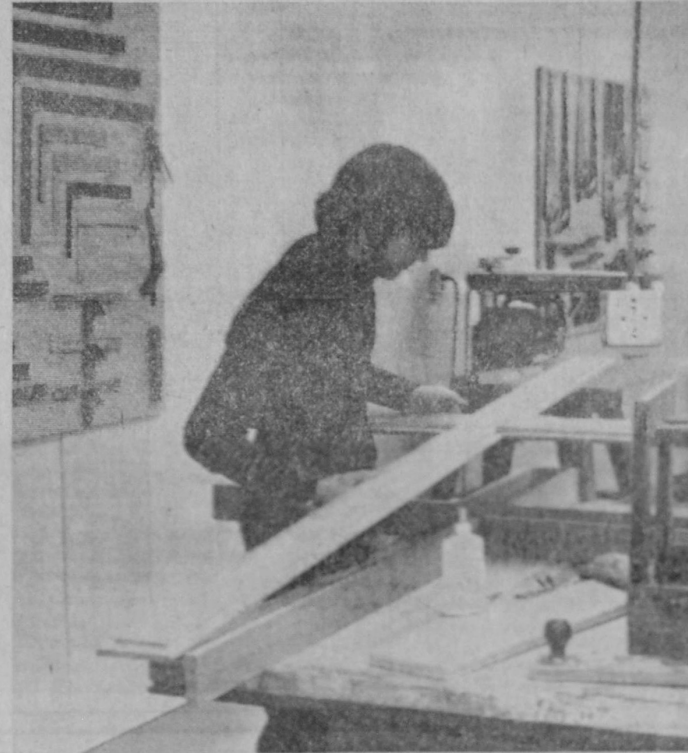

File Report With SS on Income After Graduation

Question: When I graduated from school last May, my social security checks stopped. I did not work while I was in school; but I got a job right after graduation, and I earned nearly \$4,000 from June through December of last year. Do I have to file an annual report of these 1972 earnings with social security?

Answer: Yes, even though you did not start work until June, you should report your earnings to social security because you received checks during the first five months of 1972. Since you did not earn over \$140 a month from January through May, you are entitled to your checks for those months even though you earned \$4,000 for the year. Starting in 1973, people can earn as much as \$175 a month without having any social security benefits withheld for that month.

Question: When I become 62 this year, I want to retire and get social security benefits, but I cannot find any document to prove my date of birth. Now what can I do?

Answer: Get in touch with any social security office, and the people there will be glad to help you. Although you may not have a copy of a birth or baptismal certificate, one of these may still be shown on official records. If not, there are other documents, such as a census record, a school record or an insurance policy, that can be used to establish your age.

Question: I will soon be 62 and plan to quit work then and retire. I have raised my two grandchildren since they were babies. Now they are both in grade school. Will they be able to get social security checks on my record when I start getting monthly benefits?

Answer: Possibly. Under recent changes in the social security law, grandchildren can get monthly checks based on a grandparent's earnings record if certain conditions are met. You should file a claim for benefits for them at any social security office and receive a formal determination on the matter. This can be done when you apply for your retirement benefits.

Question: I get monthly social security checks as a disabled widow, and I just started working at a part-time job. I heard that disabled people are allowed to work and test their ability to work for several months before their checks stop. Does this trial work period apply to me, too?

Answer: No. Since you receive disabled widow's benefits, the trial work period does not apply to you. The trial work period only applies to disabled workers who get monthly disability benefits. You should report to social security that you are working. If your work is not considered to be a substantial gainful activity, your widow's check may still continue.

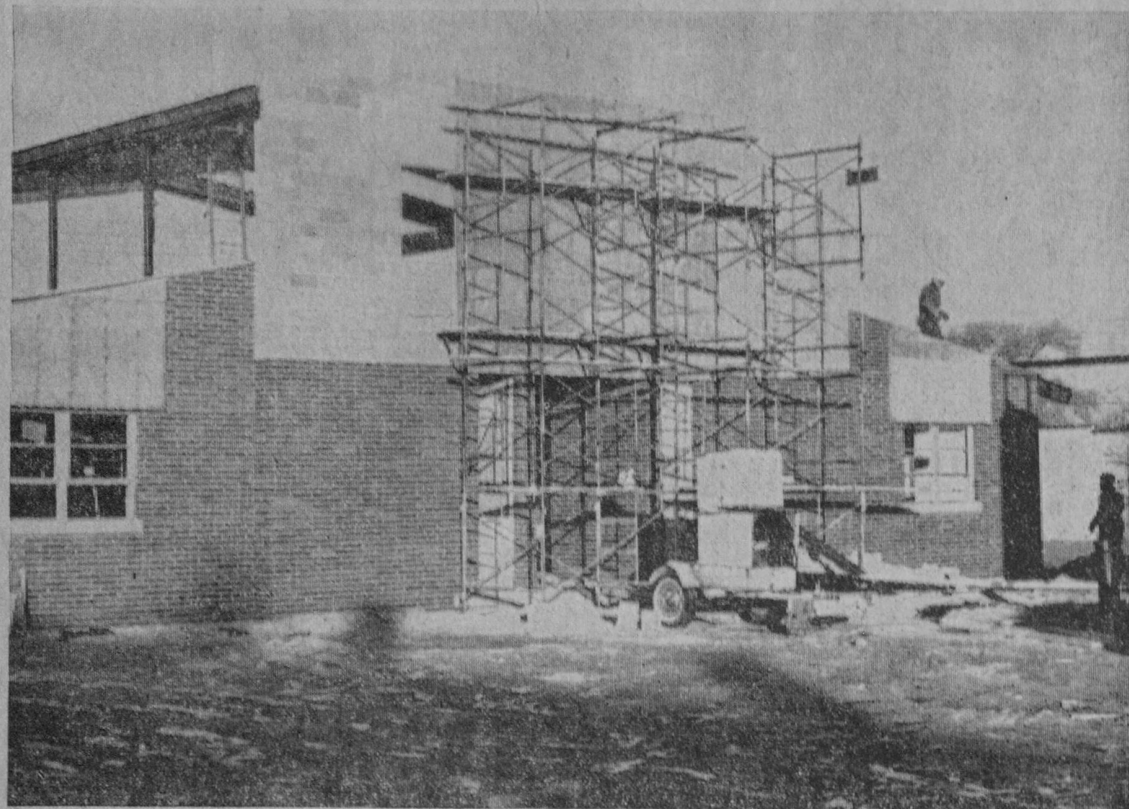

15 Years Ago—

Included among the annual selection of the nation's 10 outstanding young men for 1947 by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce



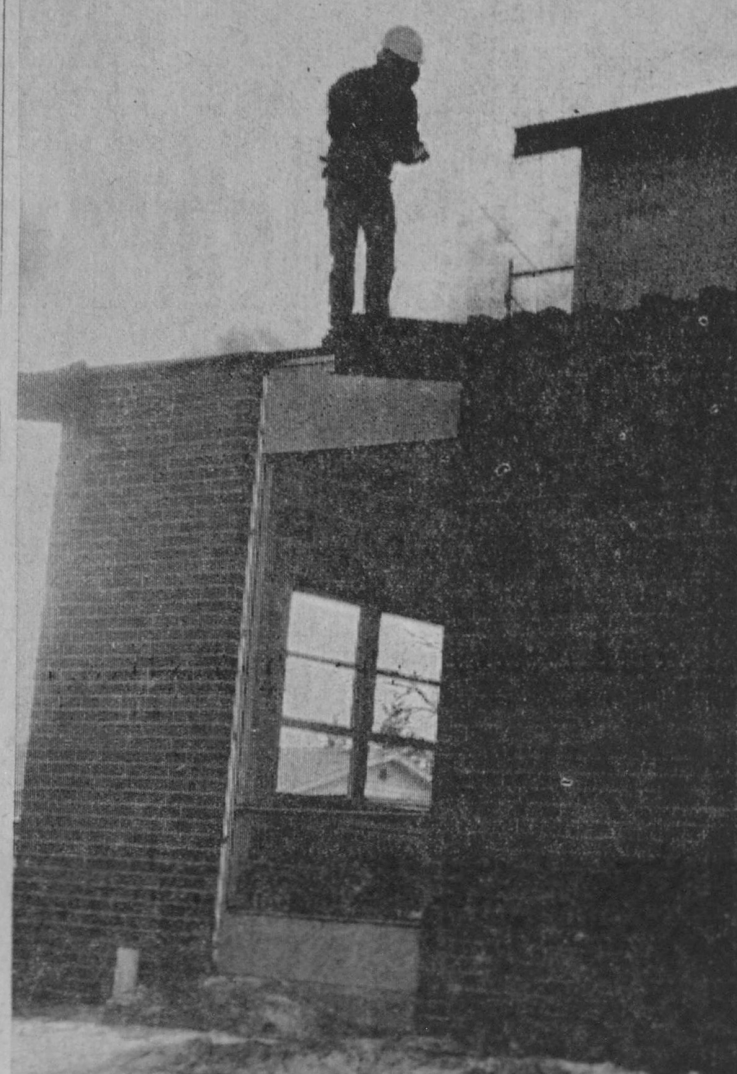
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was Richard M. Nixon, 34, congressman from California.

He has employed as many as 200 men and 25 teams and in some seasons the payroll and freight amounted to \$20,000.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender of Louisiana established a record for long talking in the senate, at least in modern times. Engaged in the filibuster against the anti-lynching bill, he spoke for 27 hours and 45 minutes and he confined himself strictly to his views on the measure.

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
