Marvin Davenport, county extension director, will be at the Reno Township Hall, located on M-65, one mile north of the M-55-M-65 junction, Wednesday (today), January 31, 7:30 to 9:30 p. m., to go through the procedure of making an income tax return for a farmer showing the use of forms 4136, 4797 schedule D, schedule F, schedules A and B and the 1040 form. An overhead projector with transparencies and wax pencil will be used for illustration.

Marshall McGuire, Alcona County extension director, will present per-tinent facts on the Michigan income tax returns.

If possible, a supply of federal and state income tax forms will be provided at the meeting. Otherwise, those present may sign up for the form needed and it will be mailed to them. Individuals who sold machinery, equipment or breeding stock will need the 4797 form and should check for it in the book received from the Internal Revenue Service.



File Report With SS on **Income** After Graduation

Question: When I graduated from school last May, my social security checks stopped. I did not work while I was in school; but I got a job right after graduation, and I earned nearly \$4,000 from June through December of last year. Do I have to file an annual report of these 1972 earnings with social security?

Answer: Yes, even though you did not start work until June, you should report your earnings to social security because you received checks during the first five months of 1972. Since you did not earn over \$140 a month from January through May, you are entitled to your checks for those months even though you earned \$4,000 for the year. Starting in 1973, people can earn as much as \$175 a month without having any social security benefits withheld for that month.

Question: When I become 62 this year, I want to retire and get social security benefits, but I cannot find any document to prove my date of birth. Now what can I do?

Answer: Get in touch with any so-cial security office, and the people there will be glad to help you. Although you may not have a copy of a birth or baptismal certificate, one of these may still be shown on official records. If not, there are other documents, such as a census record, a school record or an insurance policy, that can be used to establish your

Question: I will soon be 62 and plan to quit work then and retire. I have raised my two grandchildren since they were babies. Now they are both in grade school. Will they be able to get social security checks on my record when I start getting monthly benefits?

Answer: Possibly. Under recent changes in the social security law, grandchildren can get monthly checks based on a grandparent's earnings record if certain conditions are met. You should file a claim for benefits for them at any social security office and receive a formal determination on the matter. This can be done when you apply for your


