## TA Delays Tax Vote Until Sept.

With school financing still uncertain because of the inability of the state legislature to adopt a state aid bill, Tawas Area Board of Education decided Monday night to cancel its August 13 operational millage election and reschedule it for early September—possibly September 10.

The major reason for the delay is that the current state aid bill being debated by the legislature requires a levy of 20 mills for a school district to receive any state aid.

Last year, this school district had total operational millage of 16 1/2 mills—nine allocated and 7 1/2 voted—one of the lowest in the state. The board of education will ask for renewal of 7 1/2 mills, approved two years ago by voters but now expired, along with an additional amount yet to be specified.

Supt. Edward J. Barry said Monday night that it appeared that the school would need in excess of 1.8 additional mills to operate during the coming school term. However, the above amount and the additional seven-tenths of a mill allocated by the county this year, would fall short of the possible requirement of 20 mills to receive any state aid.

Barry said the board would be placed in a ridiculous position if it held a millage election in August and then found that it did not meet the final requirements of the state aid bill. He, along with the school attorney, recommended that the district hold off on its forthcoming millage election.

However, the state aid bill's major sponsor has stated that it may be as late as October before the final bill is adopted. Thirty-one other school districts, along with Tawas Area, may be in a precarious position as voted millage must be certified in mid-September to be included on tax statements. If voted down, there would not be time for another election.

"This puts us in the soup, but we must hold back to the last minute so we will know exactly what we need," said Barry. He said the 9.7 mills allocated by the county would raise only \$386,000 toward the school's 1.5-million dollar budget for 1973-1974.

Barry reported Monday night that he would have complete lists of registered voters for the upcoming election. He said that computer information had indicated that there are 1,372 parents of school-aged children in the district and less than 50 percent of that total is on the voter registration list.

In other business Monday night, resignations were accepted from Rosemary Verville, William Lenz and Sandra L. Myszak, all members of the teaching staff.

## Supt. Barry Sticks to Guns—Says: Community College Operational Tax Could be Problem for Local Districts

Taken to task by Kirtland Community College officials for his recent statements to Tawas Area Board of Education—that he believed Kirtland College was circumventing established authority in order to gain a local foothold at Lansing as a means of forcing this school district into the Kirtland College District—Supt. Edward J. Barry commented at Monday night's meeting that "no one is going to give anything for nothing."

Barry's retort came during the regular board of education meeting, at which time three representatives of Kirtland, accompanied by three local residents interested in seeing Kirtland establish a freshman center here, apparently were looking for a retraction from the local superintendent.

Before the meeting was over, Kirtland officials said they planned to continue with their efforts for establishment of a freshman college here.

Following the last board of education meeting, Barry and Robert Elliott, board of education president, met with Dr. Robert Stenger, president of Kirtland Community College, who took exception to Barry's recent remarks covered by the press. Barry said Monday night that Kirtland officials had been invited to the regular meeting of the board of education to share information.

Elliott announced that a special meeting is to be held Wednesday, July 25, 8:00 p. m., East Tawas Elementary Unit, to hear presentations by any community college in the area interested in establishing a college center in this county. Kirtland will be represented at the meeting and invitations have been extended to Alpena Community College and Delta College.

The board of education president said the meeting was important to all residents of the county interested in schools and colleges. While such meetings in this area usually have a poor turnout, this one will be of major importance to taxpayers, as well as to those interested in education.

Barry said Monday night that he may have assumed some things in making statements about Kirtland's financing, but he emphasized that people of this school district "should know where we stand." He said his goal was to get information to the people and said that in 1971, prior to his coming here, the board of education went on record as being opposed to any action by the state forcing this district into the Kirtland Community College District. He said there may have been changes since then, but pointed out that the board of education has expressed the desire that the people have the opportunity to decide which community college district to join.

This matter, however, may not come before the people as a bill in the senate, if adopted into law, would force all of Iosco County with the exception of Oscoda School District and part of Tawas Area School District in Wilber Township into

Kirtland. According to a statement made at Monday night's meeting, State Sen. Robert Davis, who opposes the bill, has assured that a hearing would be held here on the matter.

Elliott pointed out that Tawas Area Board of Education could not "dictate" the direction for Iosco County to follow and this was the reason for calling an open meeting to hear from all community colleges which may be interested in developing college credit courses here.

Herbert Ostrander, business manager at Kirtland, said that the community college district's board of directors was committed to sound fiscal operation. He said that the college's cash balance had grown from \$30,000 in 1970 to a cash balance in excess of \$100,000 with a million dollar budget. Of the 11 smaller community colleges in the state, he said that Kirtland ranks first, with approximately \$567,000 in state equalized valuation behind each child. He said that Kirtland has a head count of approximately 800 students with 504 of those termed as fiscal year equated students, a term utilized by the state to determine credit hours for reimbursement.

The Kirtland president said that it was not his intention to circumvent Tawas Area Board of Education in holding meetings here with local residents concerning establishment of freshman college credit courses. He said that the community college's board of directors had directed him to establish a center here to serve the Iosco area as well as parts of Arenac County.

"We have never attempted to hoodwink anyone," said Stenger. "If the people do not want us, we have a lot to do in other areas of the district." He said he did not want anyone to think that Kirtland was "knight in shining armor" to save Tawas Area, as we are looking for something for Kirtland, too." He said the college was looking for more sophomore students to improve its FYES status.

Stenger said that Kirtland intends to offer nothing less than college credit courses here at the lowest cost to the students, with the instructional level equal to that on campus. "We are not interested in the dollar, but the student," he stated.

Kirtland has offered to establish freshmen level courses at a cost to students of \$10 per credit hour. However, the state has set a minimum cost of \$15 and the proposal may be illegal, Stenger said that, to get around this, Kirtland may adopt a scholarship program to pay the \$5 difference. The legality of such a move is being studied.

The Kirtland official said that "we do not want millage—what we propose to offer would be without local taxes." He said that college board of directors does not encourage the provision in the current senate bill which would allow a community college district to levy two mills of taxes without a vote of the people.

Barry said that after losing a bonding proposal at the polls and with an operational millage proposal to go before voters of this school district in the near future, he was very much concerned over the possible addition of one or two mills by a community college district. "We have a responsibility to protect our interests and we cannot go to the public and ask for money without all the facts. We feel we will have a difficult time in obtaining the renewal of our operational millage and some additional needed operational taxes."

Stenger said that this would be Kirtland's fifth year in this kind of a learning situation and that plans were being made to go ahead with establishment of a freshman college center in this county. He said that the board was looking at one site, but land had not been purchased as yet and it may be too late for establishment of a freshman college this fall.

If the state allows such a move, he said that Kirtland would cooperate in any way possible with the local area to establish such a college.

The three local residents accompanying the Kirtland officials to the meeting were Dr. E. B. Cavell Jr., Judge William McCready and Harold French.

## TC Park Board Invited to Discuss Elms Park Request

Tawas City Park Board has been requested by the Tawas City Council to attend the July 16 council meeting for discussion on a petition requesting park development on city-owned property in the Elms Subdivision.

Lot 20 of the subdivision had been established as a public park in 1949 by the subdivider, the late N. J. Crocker. A number of diseased and dead elm trees were removed in recent years.

Petitioners residing in the area have requested construction of tennis and basketball courts on this property, which would require removal of other trees. When petitions were first presented to the council it was believed that, in deeding the property to the public, the subdivider had included a provision prohibiting removal of any trees. A later investigation of the deed failed to show any such provision.

However, because of the lack of parking to serve such a facility, the council believed there should be further discussion before any action is taken on the development. In the meantime, alternate sites for tennis and basketball sites are to be sought for presentation at the July 16 meeting.

In other business, the council authorized a special hearing on August 6 to hear objections, if any, concerning zoning of Lots 1, 2, 9 and 10 in Block One, F. Scheffer and Company's Addition, from RC multiple family to B-1 Business. This action was requested by Richard Ziehl, who owns the residence of the late N. C. Hartingh and recently announced plans for a business operation there. Remainder of the block west of the property in question was recently changed to the same business zoning.

On recommendation of the planning commission, the council established two-hour parking on US-23 from Mathews Street to the river bridge.

Authorization was given to borrow \$10,000 from the revolving fund to pay off the balance of the cost of the current street construction program, which is being financed through federal revenue sharing money. The revolving fund is to be repaid when the next revenue sharing check is received in January 1974.

Authorization was given to install a stop sign at the corner of North and Court Streets.

## Solid Waste Plan Update Gets Approval

Updating of a solid waste disposal plan developed two years ago by Environetic Research, Incorporated, was authorized Thursday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners.

The meeting was held one day later than usual due to the holiday. In its resolution, the commissioners authorized Otis Love, engineer for the county road commission, to prepare the plan. A ceiling of \$1,500 was placed as the cost of the work, which is to be appropriated directly to the road commission for time in preparation spent by the engineer.

Robert Foster, commission chairman, said that the action would not necessarily mean that the road commission was to become involved in operation of a landfill, should the county go that route. He said that solid waste disposal plans were to be submitted to the state by July 1, but the deadline has been extended for one year.

The commission chairman reported that discussions have been held with township and city officials concerning various aspects of county operation vs. private operation of a sanitary landfill. Under discussion has been a proposal from Wilbur C. Roach of Multi-County Sanitary Landfill to provide county-wide dumping facilities. The firm presently serves Grant Township and has made proposals to East Tawas and Tawas City for providing similar service.

Foster said that information gained from updating the county's present sanitary landfill plan would be utilized at future meetings of the board of commissioners when a definite decision must be reached concerning the direction Iosco is to take.

In other business, the commission authorized an appropriation of \$3,500 as Iosco's share in the purchase of radio equipment for the sheriff's department through a grant from the criminal justice program.

The commission authorized Mr. and Mrs. Louis E. Howay, property owners on Indian Lake, to apply to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources for a permit to dredge the lake bottom in front of their property.

## Appeals Court Affirms 5-Year Fed. Sentence

The five-year sentence of former Oscoda businessman, Gene C. Ballinger, 37, on check kiting charges, has been affirmed by the Sixth District United States Court of Appeals at Cincinnati, Ohio.

Ballinger, now living at Truth or Consequences, New Mexico, was released on \$25,000 bond pending his appeal after sentencing in federal court at Bay City on October 18 of last year.

He had been convicted on 26 counts of mail fraud in a \$750,000 check kiting scheme in 1971 while head of the Oscoda-based Amateur Treasure Hunters Association, Incorporated, and the AuSable Regional Credit Bureau.

The prosecution maintained the scheme cost Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale \$750,000.

Ballinger's attorney has indicated that he will make a motion for rehearing on issues before the Sixth District Court and may continue the appeal to the United States Supreme Court.

## State Historical Marker Slated for Dedication

A program of dedication is to be held Saturday, 2:00 p. m., for the state historical marker recently erected to commemorate the founding of Iosco County's gypsum industry at Aibaster.

The marker, erected by the Iosco Historical Society and financed by the county board of commissioners, is located at the base of Turtle Road near the headquarters of Iosco-Arenac Regional Library and overlooks the lake loading installation of United States Gypsum Company.

Arthur G. Leitz has charge of the program and Albert H. Buch will be master of ceremonies. Judge Allan C. Miller will be the principal speaker and there will be a representative present from the Michigan Historical Commission. The public is invited to attend.

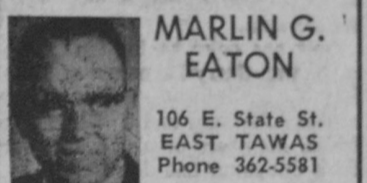

### Council OK's 7,250 Feet of Street Work

A 7,250-foot street resealing program was approved Monday, July 2, by the Tawas City Council. This program is to be completed later this summer and is in addition to the plant mix blacktop reconstruction program for major streets which was commenced last month.

In order to finance this program, along with completion of bridge approaches and other street work which had been underfinanced previously, the council voted to extend its special three-mill tax levy next year.

Current city tax statements reflect the second year of the three-mill tax levy approved by the council two years ago to finance bridge construction. Cost of replacing sidewalks leading to bridges and approach work had been underestimated originally and it was the opinion of the council that this work should be included in the needed sealcoating project, rather than to rely on financing from the city general fund.

As a result of the July 2 action, the city is to apply to the Municipal Finance Commission for authorization to borrow on the anticipated taxes to be received next year from the three mills.

Total cost of the sealcoating work will be \$7,975. Streets included in the program include: Second Avenue, from Second Street to North Street, 1,300 feet; Third Avenue, from First Street to Whittemore, 1,100 feet; Fourth Avenue, from First Street to Whittemore, 1,100 feet; North Street, from First Avenue to Third Avenue, \$750; Sixth Avenue, from First Street to Second Street, 650 feet; Eighth Avenue, from First Street to Second Street, 650 feet; Seventh Avenue, from Second Street to Whittemore, 450 feet; Seventh Avenue, from Fourth Street to Industrial, 800 feet; Ninth Avenue, from Harris to First Street, 450 feet.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that cost of the plant mix blacktop program on major streets was increased considerably through the hiring of contractors to perform some of the shoulder preparation. Bublitz said he hoped to schedule next year's shoulder preparation in the city crew's work program this fall.

In addition to the above, the council approved replacement of 18 of the 25 2,500-lumen street lights remaining in the city. To receive installation of 6,500-lumen mercury vapor

lights are the following intersections: First Street at Court Street, Beech Street at German Street, Maple Street at German Street, First Street at Third Avenue, First Street at Sixth Avenue, First Street at Eighth Avenue, Harris Avenue at Ninth Avenue, Harris Avenue at North Street, North Street at Third Avenue, Beech Street at Court Street, Beech Street at Cedar Street, First Street at Second Avenue, First Street at Fourth Avenue, First Street at Ninth Avenue, Harris Avenue at Eleventh Avenue, North Street at Fourth Avenue, North Street at Second Avenue.

A 2,500-lumen light on First Street at Harris Avenue would be replaced by a 10,000-lumen mercury vapor light, while a 6,500-lumen mercury vapor light would be installed on Murphy Street, 300 feet south of German Street.

In addition, new street lights would be installed on US-23 from the river bridge 2,000 feet to the south.

## Sewage Plants Evaluated by Health Dept.

15 Years Ago—

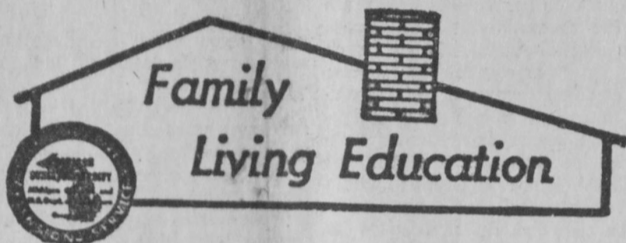

It is July! What happened to June? Time goes so fast these early summer days—too fast when we look at all we planned to do.

When July hits, we have got to settle down to some food business. It is freezer filling time. For many north-country residents, it is company time, too!

Many homemakers have strawberries and rhubarb in the freezer, possibly combined and made into pies. Some of us are the lucky ones with a supply of frozen wild mushrooms and fish. All this frozen food will help solve the problem of stretching food dollars for summer company.

Summer time is picnic time. Hamburgers and wieners are still the picnic favorites along with a crock of beans and potato salad.

When buying wieners, it is more important than ever to read the label on the package indicating the contents, since Michigan's high requirement law is no longer valid.

Prior to the latest development, several companies declared their intentions to hold to Michigan's rigid standards even if the big companies managed to win. So products made only of skeletal meat (meat attached to bones) will continue to be available.

If meat by-products are used, they must be declared. The same is true for soybean meal and cereal. Consumers can look for the Michigan Grade One label to identify hot dogs made only with skeletal meat. All beef and all-meat hot dogs, as opposed to regular franks, still have to be made of only skeletal meat.

If you, as a consumer-purchaser are willing to pay more for a quality

product, meeting Michigan's rigid standards, the orders for lower-quality hot dogs will not materialize. Stores will not buy what they cannot sell. This means that consumers will determine the real outcome of the debate on this meat standard.

When you buy hamburger, you also have a choice of all meat or meat ground with soybean meal added to it. If there is some advantage price-wise, the soybean supplemented meat is perfectly acceptable but you should not be paying beef prices for soybeans.

Summertime is notorious for unscheduled eating times. Eating at random makes it difficult to know that the foods consumed include all the basic required foods for a balanced diet. Make sure there is always a supply of milk on hand and encourage the children and adults to drink milk or milk-based shakes or malts. They will cost no more than the nutritionally empty beverages they are more apt to ask for. If you get your quota of milk, you will have a good start on your daily requirement.

Breads and cereals play an important role in quick, eat anytime foods. Whole grain cereals provide most nourishment. If not whole grain, then certainly choose enriched.

Our challenge in July is not only to manage our money so we can provide food for all the mouths we have to feed but to see that each of our crew gets the foods he needs to keep healthy.

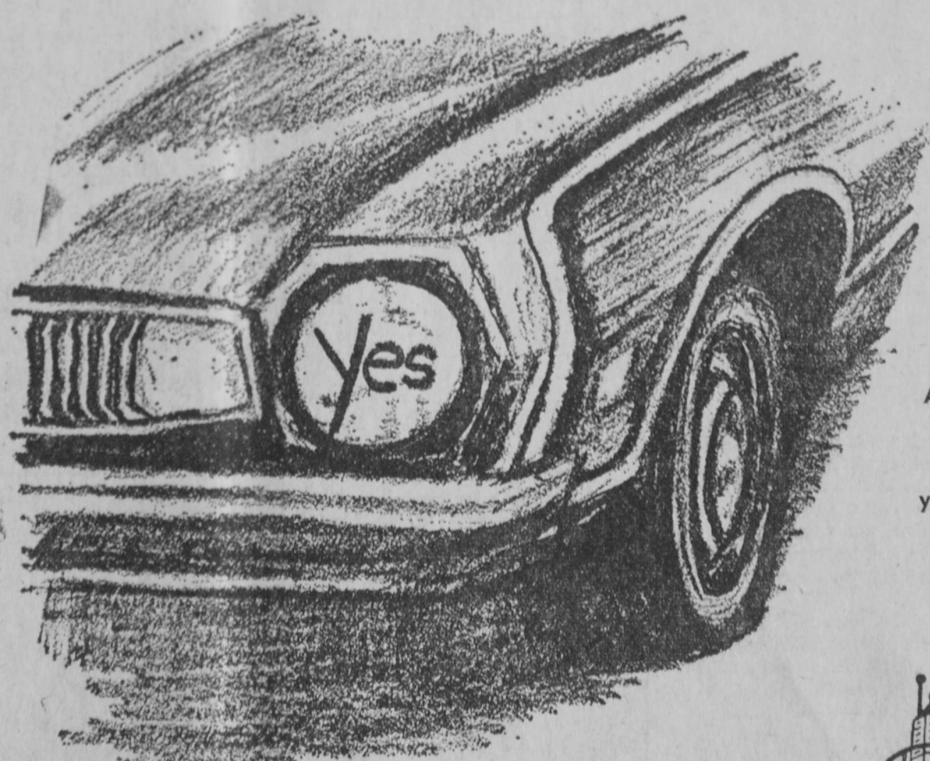

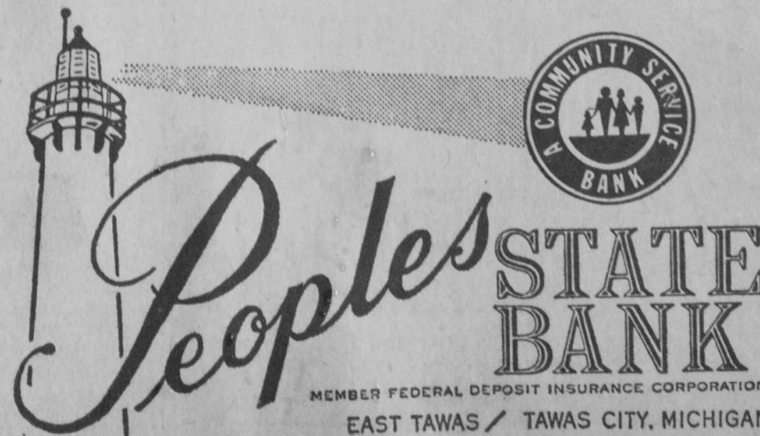

## Forest Supervisor Retired June 29

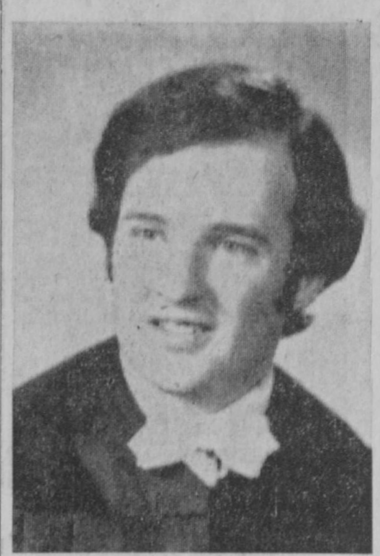

Because of the holiday, only three makeup games were played last week in the Knothole League and three games in the Pony League.

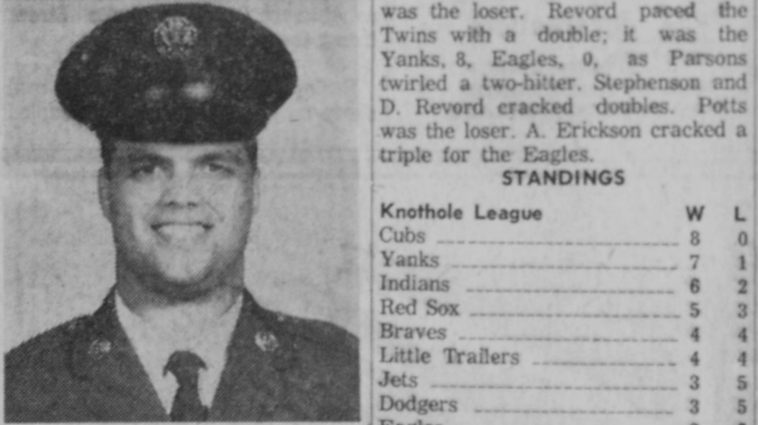

40 Quarters Of Coverage Are Required

Question: Over the years, I have accumulated 51 quarters of coverage under social security. However, for the last two years and until I retire in six more years, I will be working at a civil service job and will not be getting social security coverage. My brother recently told me that he thinks I have to be working under social security at the time I retire in order to get monthly benefits. Is my brother right?

Answer: No. The amount of work (quarters of coverage) you need under social security to be eligible for monthly payments is determined by your date of birth, but no worker needs more than 40 quarters of coverage to be insured for life. Since you have 51 quarters of coverage, you are already insured and will be eligible for monthly benefits when you reach retirement age. The amount of your monthly check, however, is not based on quarters, but on your average yearly earnings covered by social security over a period of years.

Question: I just started working full time and my first two check stubs showed the wrong social security number. What should I do?

Answer: Report the error to your employer as soon as possible and show him your social security card so he can correct his records right away.

Question: I recently read a newspaper reminder about notifying social security of any change in my address. I am 32 and I will be changing jobs and moving to another state in a few more months. Do I need to tell social security my new address after I move?

Answer: No. The newspaper reminder you read was meant for people who are getting monthly social security checks and move. Until you start getting social security payments, it is not necessary to keep social security notified of your latest address.

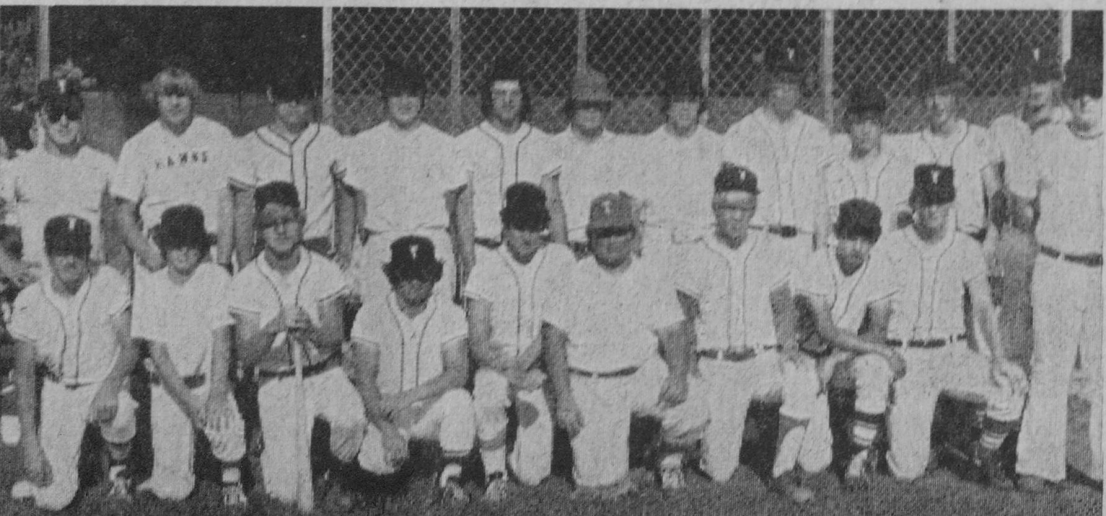

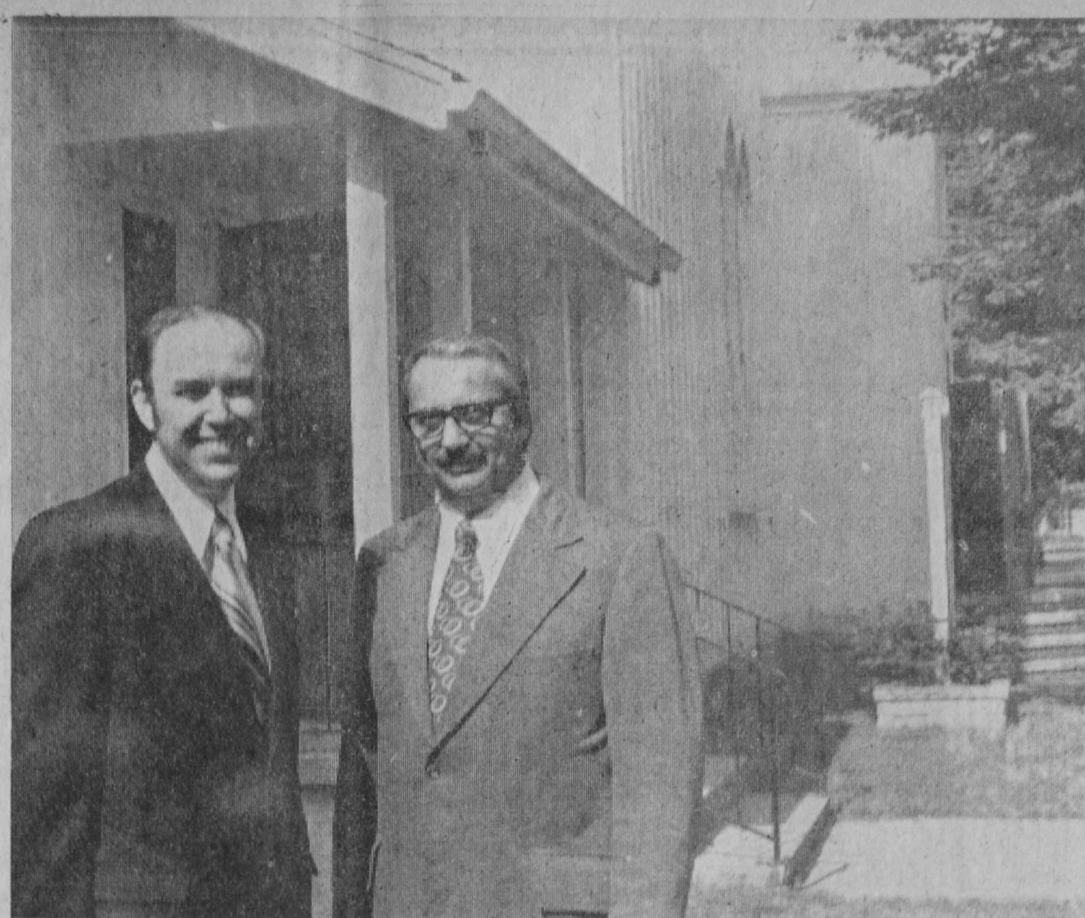
#### Jack D. Farmer Promoted by Air Force

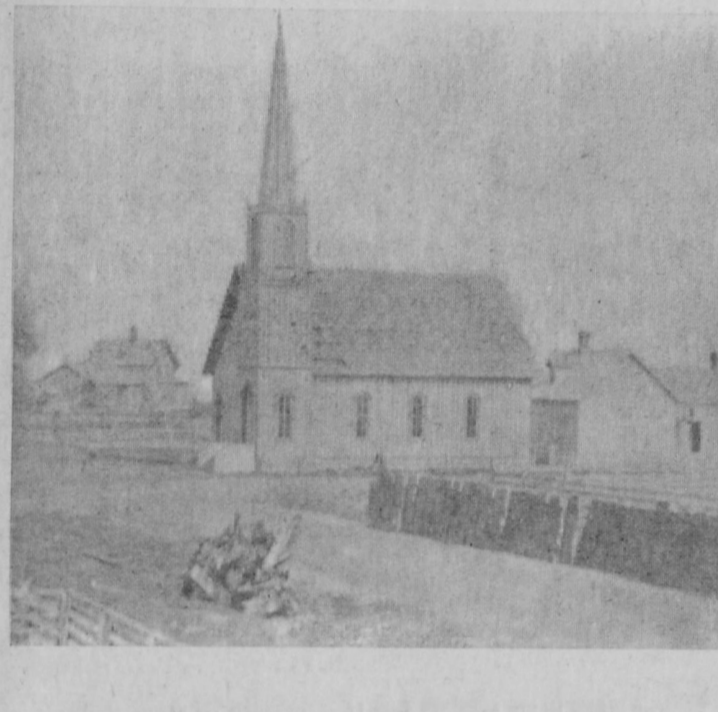
