

Elms Lot Too Small for Courts; Council to Study New Site

On recommendation of the city park board, Tawas City Council decided Monday night that Lot 20 in the Elms First Addition, which had been proposed for a tennis-basketball court by residents, is too small for this purpose.

Charles Landon of the park board, along with Gary Stephan and John McMurray, other park board members, reported he had inspected the property. He believed that by the time a tennis court was constructed on Lot 20 there would be no room remaining for parking.

The park board suggested that a forester be contacted to evaluate the stand of trees on the property and to make recommendations for removal of dead trees. The property had been dedicated as a city park by the late N. J. Crocker, developer of the subdivision, and contained several different species of trees.

It was the park board's opinion that the property should be brushed

to allow future installation of picnic tables and playground equipment.

Tawas City Garden Club, which presented a petition Monday night signed by 18 of its members, asked the city to retain the "woods status" of Lot 20. The garden club is to be invited to participate in planning for future development of the property as a picnic area and playground.

As an alternate location for tennis-basketball courts, the park board has recommended that city property north of the baseball diamond on First Avenue be utilized. The property is 200 feet in width and has a depth of about 800 feet, which would provide adequate room for blacktop courts and parking. This site is used during the winter for an ice skating rink and is equipped with a mercury vapor light.

It was estimated that the two tennis courts would require about 10,000 square feet of blacktop. A study is to be made this year on financing, with the intent to start construction on the project next spring.

In addition to the above, Landon said it was the opinion of the park board that the city should complete its current project at the Tawas City Park before undertaking any new projects. He said that, in addition to the parking lot now under construction, there is much hard work remaining in planned improvements for the park.


Fair Society Readies Hale Show Grounds

Event Moved to August 4-5

Tourist Festival Condensed to One Week-End

Eleventh annual Michigan Tourist Festival in the Tawas has been condensed from a week-long event to a two-day program on Saturday and Sunday, August 4-5. Officials of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, sponsoring organization, are in hopes that the change will provide a more snappy program pace for both visitors and local residents.

In addition to the above change, dates for the program have been moved up one week due to conflicts with other events.

One of the principal attractions during the two-day event will be the 13th annual Tawas Bay Water-

front Arts and Crafts Exhibit and Sale, which opens at 9:00 a. m. on Saturday, August 4, at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

The arts and crafts show will continue on Sunday, August 5. Because of several construction delays, contractors for the City of Tawas City and the city crew are working at a rapid pace to complete construction of a new parking area along US-23 at the city park.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Monday that, depending on weather conditions, concrete curbs would be constructed in time for the arts and crafts show. The parking lot is to

have a layer of crushed stone and is to be blacktopped later this year.

Other program features on Saturday, August 4, include a sidewalk sale, tourist festival parade, boat rides on the "Holiday," the first annual Griffin Cup power boat race,

the National One Design sailboat regatta, a street dance at East Tawas and fireworks at the East Tawas Park.

Activities on Sunday, August 5, in-

clude the annual pancake breakfast and dawn patrol at the Iosco County Airport, the East Tawas Lions Club chicken barbecue at the East Tawas Park, continuation of the annual Griffin Cup power boat race and Na-

tional One Design sailboat regatta, men's all-star softball game at the East Tawas Athletic Field and a game between all-stars from women's and men's softball leagues at the East Tawas Athletic Field.

Four Arrested On '72 Substance Act

Four persons were arrested at East Tawas during the past week by Iosco County Sheriff's Department officers and charged with violating the Michigan Controlled Substance Act of 1972.

Appearing in district court Monday were Christopher R. King, 20; Steven C. Engle, 18; Russell D. Ackerman, 18, all of the Tawas area, who were charged with possession of lysergic acid diethylamide (LSD). This is a high misdemeanor and, upon conviction, has a maximum penalty of one year in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

King entered a plea of guilty to the charge and is to be sentenced at a later date by District Judge J. Richard Ernst. Engle and Ackerman did not enter a plea and the

case is to be heard before Judge Ernst on July 23.

Sheriff's department deputies, while on routine patrol Thursday night, observed a car with one headlight not operating. The officers turned the patrol car around and the car ahead accelerated its speed. Officers said they saw a subject throw an object out of the right front window and the car stopped. Officers said that as they approached the car, one subject was seen stuffing something between the top and bottom of the back seat.


Upon checking the street, officers found a plastic container with 16 small tablets and a foil wrapper, along with 12 tablets found in the vehicle.

On Sunday afternoon, officers arrested Michael T. Crowley, 17, Rose City, at the East Tawas City Park. Two plain clothes officers observed four persons sitting in a car at the parking lot and witnessed money changing hands, along with the exchange of a plastic bottle.

The officers walked to the car and identified themselves and Crowley ran toward Tawas Bay, with one plain clothes officer giving chase. The officer pulled his service revolver and ordered the youth to stop, but the bottle was thrown into the water and later recovered. Crowley was booked at the county jail for possession under the 1972 controlled substance act.

TC Council Hears Financial Report; Water-Sewer Planning

Annual report of City Treas. Mary Byrd read at Monday night's council meeting indicated that the City of Tawas City had total revenues of \$245,612.62 and total expenditures of \$230,452.66, with accounts payable of \$12,305.45, during the 12-month period ending June 30.

Total revenues included \$134,932.32 in the general fund and \$110,680.30 in the street fund. Taxes collected amounted to \$104,443.97, which included \$70,809.47 for the general fund and \$33,634.50 for the street fund. Other major revenue money included \$22,141.14 in sales tax, \$33,724 in Act 51 state money, \$11,083.59 for trunkline maintenance, \$1,064 in traffic fines, \$4,451.36 for intangibles and liquor tax, \$1,713.42 for cemetery

lots, \$5,761.39 for fire calls, \$1,108.11 for gas tax refund, Michigan income tax of \$6,397.83. The city issued a tax anticipation note of \$33,000 to complete work on street and park construction. The state's share of the park project was \$2,598.75.

In other business Monday night, the council directed that a study be made of the cost of sewer service to Tawas River Trailer Park. It was stated that the trailer park has its own water system and that it was presently paying \$50 per quarter for sewer service. It was believed that the sewer rate should be adjusted upward because of the number of trailer units.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that a meeting has not been held

as yet with officials of the City of East Tawas to discuss a proposal from Multi-County Landfill for furnishing dumping service to the two communities. Attempts are being made to schedule this meeting in the near future.

Tawas City Water Board has invited members of the city council to attend its session next Monday night to discuss plans for financing water loop systems and sewer extensions costing an estimated one-half-million dollars.

The program, long in the discussion stage, includes a force main to connect the troublesome Second Avenue sewer lift station with the waste water treatment plant, water line loops to improve service to the northwestern area of the city (in-

cluding the medical care facility and high school) on Harris Avenue and the area south of the US-23 bridge with a loop along Ninth Avenue. In addition, the program would include a river crossing to serve the area along M-55, along with sewer extension on South US-23, Beech Street and Victoria Lane.

Plans have been completed by the city's engineering consultant for this program and a report is to be given Monday night on the progress of a pre-application request filed by Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City concerning a possible federal grant for water and sewer improvements to serve industrial locations.

Mayor John N. Brugger and City Manager Bublitz met last week with bonding attorneys to discuss financing this city project. The mayor said there were some "complicated stepping stones" to be followed in order to establish a financial package. It is anticipated that the project would be financed by voted general obligation bonds, revenue bonds and special assessment districts.

The federal project with East Tawas and Baldwin Township is separate from the project under consideration and would include a new elevated storage tank, extension of mains and construction of a force main to connect Tawas City with East Tawas' water system.

Council Rezones Property for New Apartment Complex

Approval for rezoning three lots in the Case Addition was given Monday night by Tawas City Council in order to facilitate construction of the new nine-unit Bay View Apartments.

Council approval followed a public

hearing at which no objections were heard to rezoning the three lots from B-2 commercial to RC multiple family zoning.

To be located facing US-23 south of Woodward Avenue intersection,

plans for the new two-story apartment complex were explained by Dewey Cripps of Construction Expenditures, Incorporated, Grand Rapids, developer of the project.

Rezoning of the property had been recommended by the city planning commission, which received the initial presentation by Cripps. Plans and a drawing are on exhibit at the city hall.

Cripps said that a 16-car parking lot for the use of apartment dwellers would be constructed on the property. He said that trees growing on the land would be retained to provide a green belt barrier between adjoining property.

The developer said work on the project would commence immediately and believed that with good weather conditions it could be completed in about 2½ months.

The developer is to finance extension of the sanitary sewer main to serve the property. At the present time, the existing main ends at the Dale Motel.

The city manager reported that extension of this sewer main is included in a special assessment project being considered by the city. Because of the length of time required to arrange city financing, the developer plans to extend the main to reach his property according to city specifications.

The real estate transaction involving the property was handled by William Borosch, Realtor, Tawas City.

Flint Man Arrested After Oscoda Chase

Daniel R. Lee, 25, Flint, was arrested early Sunday morning by Iosco Sheriff's Department officers following a chase on Bissonette Road west of Oscoda.

The sheriff's department received a call for assistance from Oscoda Township Police, who had begun the chase. Two sheriff's department patrol cars tried to intercept the Flint car on Bissonette Road, but the driver eluded a road block.

The chase ended with a collision between a patrol car and Lee's vehicle at the intersection of Lenard Road.

Other activities of the sheriff's department included investigation of a breaking discovered Saturday evening at the Whittemore Speedway. A quantity of candy and cigarettes was stolen.

Alfred C. Guoan of 4444 West M-55 reported Thursday that someone had shot and killed a 450-pound steer at his farm. Value of the steer was estimated at \$300.

Officers investigated a breaking and entering at the cabin of Minor J. Payne, 5420 Curtis Road. Entry was made through the west door by cutting a screen and removing a window. Household items were stolen.

The annual AuSable River canoe marathon starts July 27 at Grayling and finishes the next day at Oscoda.

Lakewood Transaction is Registered

Although no official dollar amount has been announced, one of the largest real estate transactions in the history of Iosco County was filed July 6 in the register of deeds office.

An 18-page legal instrument was filed conveying Lakewood Shores at Oscoda from the Westinghouse Credit Corporation, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to Terramar-Michigan Corporation of Corpus Christi, Texas.

This property had been developed by the Conel Corporation, but the firm went into receivership and the property was deeded to Westinghouse.

Sale price of the property is reputed to be shown on a separate affidavit filed with the register of deeds but, according to state law, the record is not public and may only be examined by a county auditor.

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Three Damage Suits Are Filed

Three damage suits filed recently in Iosco Circuit Court include two for auto negligence and one for trespassing on property.

A show cause hearing is to be held Tuesday, July 31, 10:00 a. m., before Judge Allan C. Miller on a preliminary injunction asked by Mr. and Mrs. William Weresley vs. A. E. Wheelhouse, Mrs. Audrey Kocher and Charles Kocher, all of Hale.

On July 2, Judge Miller issued a restraining order and enjoined the defendants from trespassing on plaintiff's property or placing any sewer line on the plaintiff's property until further order of the court.

The defendants charge that the plaintiffs wrongfully and unlawfully dug a certain ditch, five feet by three feet by 25 feet in length, across their property in order to reach a sewer line. The plaintiffs claim that this was done without an easement or permission.

The Weresleys claim depreciation in the amount of \$10,000 and ask for treble damages in the amount of \$30,000.

Marlene Burger Pear of Alcona County and F. Orville Burger of Iosco County are plaintiffs in an auto negligence suit against Forrest S. Smith of Manistee. The suit involves a May 22, 1971, crash on US-23 in AuSable Township. Mrs. Pear asks damages of \$85,000 and Burger asks damages of \$16,000.

Joseph Magnatta, Blair A. Magnatta, P. Charles Peters and Karen A. Peters, all of Wayne County, are plaintiffs in a suit against James O. Seawright of Alcona County. This case arises out of a July 1, 1970, accident at the intersection of US-23 and Newman Street at East Tawas. The plaintiffs claim injuries received in a rear-end collision and ask damages totaling \$6,000.



Travel Service Business Down Because of Energy Crisis Scare

Nearly half of the resorts and travel service businesses in the East Michigan region have reported June business down from 1972 due mainly to the energy crisis "scare" reported in the metropolitan areas, according to the East Michigan Tourist Association at Bay City.

In a spot survey of 35 businesses in a dozen counties of the Thumb and Northeastern Michigan, 47 percent reported June sales down. The overall level of June sales was down three percent from June of 1972. Eight out of 10 businesses reporting

stated specifically that sales were down due to the public being scared by energy crisis reports. Available gasoline supplies in the northern vacation areas are based on last year's use by tourist travelers. Therefore, the gasoline is for the tourists and vacationers, according to the tourist association, and plentiful supplies are on hand.

"We have many communities offering 24-hour gas service in the resort areas," stated James Hall, EMTA executive vice president. "There is nothing to be scared about."

A total of 32 percent of the businesses reported June sales as being ahead of last year; 21 percent reported sales as being even with a year ago. Four out of five lodging operators reported they had received no cancellations for July and August.

Based on pre-season demands for vacation-planning information, EMTA had predicted a five to 10 percent increase in tourist trade for the 29-county region of Eastern Michigan served by the association.

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


TA's Good Intention Caused College Backfire at Lansing

A report last Thursday from Lansing that there is "open warfare among community colleges" to be the first to serve Iosco County came as a surprise to officials of Tawas

Area School, who have contended that citizens of the county should have a voice in selection of a community college to serve the area. At the invitation of Tawas Area

Board of Education, a meeting has been scheduled for July 26 to hear presentations by three community colleges of the area. Because of this recent development, however, this

meeting may be canceled by the board of education.

Supt. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area School said Friday that the three colleges—Kirtland Community College, Alpena Community College and Delta College—had simply responded to a request from Tawas Area Board of Education for "ideas on how they might set up adult education and post secondary programs."

Apparently through a misunderstanding at Lansing, insofar as this county is concerned, Michael J. Deeb, a member of the state board of education from Mt. Clemens, Wednesday proposed that the state exert authority over Michigan's 29 community colleges relative to charges that the two-year colleges are raiding each other's territories for students to qualify for more state aid.

This is exactly the opposite reaction which the Tawas Area Board of Education has desired. The local board of education has gone on record opposing any move by the state which would force Iosco County into a community college district against desires of the people and has urged that an advisory vote be taken on the matter.

The state board, acting on a proposal by Deeb, has asked its community college advisory board for recommendations on the "Iosco situation," including advice on how to prevent "duality of effort or encroachment into another community college's service area by a neighboring institution."

Iosco County has been the "step-child" of intermediate and community college districts since reorganization of adjacent districts in recent years. As a result, every piece of recent legislation proposed in the past two years has placed this county in the Kirtland Community College District. A bill now before the senate would accomplish this by placing Whittemore-Prescott Area School District, Hale Area School District and Tawas Area School District in the Kirtland Community College District, while Oscoda Area School District, including the part of Wilber Township in Tawas Area School District, would go to Alpena Community College District.

Kirtland Community College has expressed a desire to serve Iosco County and last week announced that it was going ahead with its plan to establish freshman level credit courses here. Alpena Community College and Delta College have not made overtures to locate here, but indicated they would send representatives to the meeting proposed by Tawas Area Board of Education.

It was reported from Lansing Thursday that Deeb acknowledged that the state board of education's Iosco move is really part of a broader state board effort to specifically "coordinate" all community colleges and to adopt a state-wide community college districting plan.

The board had privately considered taking court action to spell out its exact powers over the junior colleges. That possible step was suspended, however, after an assistant attorney general advised the board that it would not be wise to move on the community college matter until the state supreme court makes a final decision on a lawsuit testing the powers of the four-year colleges and universities.

Lower court actions have basically rejected state board attempts over control of university programs, so the state board has appealed to the high court.

The move by Tawas Area Board of Education calling for a meeting between community colleges and the public apparently unwittingly added fuel to the fire at Lansing.

Whatever the state board's next step, a representative of the Michigan Community College Association (MCCA) denied that there is any "open warfare" between the member schools.

"On the contrary, I see our colleges making a sincere effort to voluntarily cooperate with each other to best determine how to serve all of the state," said Robert D. Cahow, MCCA executive secretary.

The association has its own districting proposal under study which would leave existing community college boundaries as they are. Areas not now included in a community college district would be added, based chiefly on where residents travel to work and shop.

"But we are not talking about forcing this plan down anyone's throat," Cahow said. "The way to get leadership and coordination is to provide cooperation and service."

This was basically what Tawas Area Board of Education had in mind when it called its meeting of community colleges. However, it may have opened up a "can of worms" at Lansing.

Young Men Must Register at 18 Years

Young men must still register with the Selective Service System at the time of their 18th birthdays, even though induction authority ended July 1, Arthur A. Holmes, state director of selective service, announced Friday, July 13.

He urged those men who have not registered to do so promptly. "Failure to register is a violation of the law," Holmes emphasized, "and could result in prosecution by the Department of Justice." It is expected that approximately 85,000 young men will be subject to draft registration this year in Michigan.

While the president's authority to induct men into military service expired on July 1, all other provisions of the Selective Service Act remain in force. The annual lottery will be held. Young men must continue to register. Local boards will classify them as to their availability for possible military service in the event of a national emergency.

The law requires that all male persons, except certain non-immigrant aliens, must register with selective service within the 60-day period commencing 30 days prior to their 18th birthdays. Under the law, young men have three obligations: They must register at age 18, they must notify their draft boards when they change addresses and they must carry their draft cards with them until their liability expires, which for most men today is at age 26.

Michigan draft boards have been recognized at 27 area offices to carry on the standby draft operation. Volunteer registrars are available in most communities to accept draft registrations. Nearest area office is located at Alpena.

Accepts Guilty Plea on Larceny

Jeffrey A. McGuirk was arraigned July 11 before Circuit Court Judge Allan C. Miller on a charge of larceny from a building. McGuirk declined representation of counsel and entered a plea of guilty. The plea was accepted by Judge Miller and the case was referred to the department of corrections for presentence investigation.

Arenac Files Petition for Inter-County River Drain

Iosco County was notified July 10 by the Michigan Department of Agriculture that a petition has been filed, under Act 40 of the Public

Acts of 1965, which "may affect the drainage in the County of Iosco." Stanley R. Quackenbush, deputy director of MDA, wrote in a letter to

County Clerk D. Keith Pappas that the petition proposes the construction of the AuGres River as an inter-county drain located in the Counties of Arenac and Iosco.

A month ago, the Iosco County Board of Commissioners notified Arenac County that the Iosco board was not interested in acting as a sponsor of a proposed AuGres River Watershed. Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners took the same action and apparently it was necessary for all three counties to be involved in order for the project to be eligible for a reported \$2,000,000 grant from the federal government.

It had been proposed by Arenac County that an "augmented board" be formed for the proposed AuGres River Watershed, comprised of officials from the three counties. Action by Iosco and Ogemaw Counties, however, concluded that arrangement.

The new action by Arenac County apparently is not connected with the federal project and proposes the AuGres River as an inter-county drain, between Arenac and Iosco, under the 1965 state law.

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

Harbor Plan Delayed by Spring Flood

Michigan Cong. Philip E. Ruppe, 11th District, has received a reply from the office of management and budget concerning his recent inquiry into the continuing delay of planning funds for the Tawas Bay Harbor project. The response by OMB noted a new release date for the money sometime "in the quarter beginning October 1."

In his letter to OMB Dir. Roy Ash, Ruppe expressed the "extreme disappointment of the people of Tawas that work on their harbor project was again postponed." The Northern Michigan congressman also cited the fact that the \$40,000 for pre-construction planning had been duly appropriated in the 1973 Public Works Appropriations Act.

The OMB laid the blame for the delay on the extreme flood conditions experienced earlier this spring in various parts of the country. While the office regretted the delay, it said it was necessary in light of "manpower and financial limitations" placed on the corps of engineers due to the "critical ongoing flood control projects" which must be kept on an optimal construction schedule.

Commenting on the later funding date, Ruppe said: "I am optimistic that the money will be released as scheduled later this year and I intend to give the Tawas Bay project my closest attention until the funds are forthcoming."





Ah, summer! Long sunny days, the old swimming hole, campouts, cook-outs and the annual rush of door-to-door salesmen out to help you improve your home and grounds.

They will seal your blacktop driveway, put storm windows on your home, sell you a vacuum cleaner or give you a deal on aluminum siding or a new roof.

The key word is caution. You should avoid buying goods or services from a door-to-door sales person until you have had time to find out that he is a bona fide representative of a legitimate, established business in the community.

Ask for the salesman's name and address of his employer. Tell him you need some time to think about it and suggest that he check back with you next week. If he refuses to identify himself or will not come back, you can be fairly sure you are better off not doing business with him.

A solid tipoff is a line such as: "We happened to be doing a job in the neighborhood and noticed you need the same work done. Since we are here anyway, we will give you a special rate."

It is just a come-on. Beware! Also be aware that, even after you have signed a contract for some goods or services offered door-to-door, you have three business days in which to change your mind.

According to the In-home Sales Act passed in 1971, all you have to do is mail a statement canceling the contract to the address of the company you are dealing with by midnight of the third business day after the contract was signed. (The address must be stated on the contract in bold type.)

If you change your mind about goods you have bought, put them aside without using them. The sales person must pick them up within 40 days or they are yours. Any money you have paid must be refunded. If it is not, you do not have to give the goods back.

All in-home sales are not covered by this law. Exceptions include insurance sales, sales connected with a pre-existing revolving charge account, sales made at your home after a previous negotiation at the fixed business location of the company or sales made when the sales person is in your home at your request. Requesting a salesman to bring carpet samples to your home for you to choose from is one example of the latter.

Some sales people have been get-

ting around the three-day option period by placing the signed contract into an envelope, sealing it and instructing the buyer to "put it in a safe place." Always read the contract carefully or you may find yourself forced by a legal contract to pay for goods or services you do not want or need.

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

Get Information on SS Payments

Question: I am debating whether to retire soon or wait until next year when I am 65. If I retire early, I understand I will get smaller payments. How can I find out how much I will get whenever I retire?

Answer: You should call, write or visit any social security office. They can give you a pamphlet that explains how to estimate the amount of your monthly payment.
Question: I am going to work until I reach 65 a few months from now. Can I apply for social security now, or do I have to wait until I stop working?

Answer: You should apply now at

any social security office. You can apply while you are still working. Applying about three months before you retire will help assure that your first monthly check arrives on time.

Question: I am 39 and working regularly, but each week-end I have to get kidney dialysis. My doctor told me that as of July 1 medicare helps pay for this treatment. How do I apply for this medicare coverage?

Answer: To see if you are eligible for this medicare coverage, call, write or visit any social security office.

Question: I understand a retired worker getting social security checks can now earn \$2,100 a year without losing any of his monthly benefits. Was any change made in the number of hours a retired, self-employed person can work in a month?

Answer: No. There was no change made in the definition of "substantial services" in self employment. Generally, you are allowed to work up to 45 hours in a month without loss of any benefits for that month. However, if yours is a highly-skilled profession, you could be considered to be working substantially with even fewer hours.



Bald Eagle Nest Report Heard by Club

A report relative to the Bald Eagle nesting activity within the AuSable River basin area has been submitted to Iosco Audubon Society by Jerry Weinrich, wildlife biologist of the Department of Natural Resources.

An aerial survey over the area during the month of June revealed eight active nests and one abandoned nest with one unhatched egg. The parent birds were attending the eight active nests with 12 eaglets but the whereabouts of the parents of the abandoned nest were unknown. One unusual nest had three eaglets, which is more than average for this species in the Cooke Dam area on the AuSable River.

This figure is about 50 percent over last year's observation in the same area, which count showed five nests with eight eaglets hatched.

The fish diet of the Bald Eagle appears to be a major factor in the decline of successful nesting. The polluted waters and fish cause sterility and soft shells of the eggs.

Studies indicate that if the birds feed from inland waters, the nests are more productive. There are no reported observations of active eagle nests along Lake Huron shores, which was once a productive area.
