AuGres River Petition Hearing Aug. 7

An augmented drain board, established on order of Stanley Quackenbush, deputy director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, is to meet at 1:30 p. m., Tuesday, August 7, AuGres-Sims High School, to review a petition filed by Arenac County concerning AuGres River flooding.

Despite opposition from Iosco and Ogemaw Counties to any move by Arenac to include the two upstream governmental units in a river watershed district, the deputy state agricultural director ruled two weeks ago that Iosco and Ogemaw Counties were included in the district.

Acting on the drainage board will be drain commissioners from the three counties involved (John Mellock from Iosco) and Quackenbush, who represents the state director of agriculture. The augmented drain board which is to make final decisions on Arenac's petition includes the above drainage board, along with the chairman and one member from each of the county boards of commissioners.

In recent weeks, boards of commissioners from both Iosco and Ogemaw declined an invitation from Arenac County to join in co-sponsorship of a watershed control project under Public Law 566. Federal assistance under this law, reported to be 2.8-million dollars for this project, is possible only if all parties involved, or at least a majority of them, agree to cooperate.

Duties of the augmented board at the first meeting would include determination of what taxing units would be assessed for the proposed drain, the sufficiency of the petition and the practicality of the proposed drain.

According to one source, Iosco and Ogemaw Counties would have a 6-5 vote control over any action by the augmented board. It is not expected that the position of members from the two upstream counties would change drastically from that held in recent years.

Community College Discussion Dropped; Too Much Publicity

Because of state-wide publicity over a Lansing report that there is "open warfare among community colleges" to be the first to serve Iosco County, along with reluctance on the part of community college officials to discuss service to this area, Tawas Area Board of Education has canceled its July 26 meeting called two weeks ago to discuss community college proposals.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told members of the board of education Monday night that representatives of Delta College, Alpena Community College and Kirtland Community College were "very reluctant to get involved in any way."

Barry said that such a meeting advertised here could become a "battleground" for six or seven other areas of the state where there are boundary disputes over proposed community college lines. He said that such a meeting could create much ill feeling toward this area, "would create too much visibility and would do much to upset our previous position."

The superintendent reported that Kirtland Community College had initiated an amendment to the existing bill before the state legislature which places most of Iosco County in that community college district. He said that all community college presidents in the state had met recently and apparently there has been an agreement to abide by preconceived boundary lines.

She's Irritated Over Dogs In T. City Park

An "irritated citizen" writing that she is an avid fan of the parks and waterways in the Tawas area believes that the city should post "No Dogs Allowed" signs at the beaches of the Tawas City Park.

"More than once I have gone down to the beach on a nice, hot 90 degree day—away from the housework and family pets—only to share the water with three or four local hounds," stated the letter.

"I love dogs; in fact, I have a couple myself, but I feel that no one should impose their pets on someone else. Especially since this someone may not even care for them. To take a dip in the water is refreshing, but to come and sunbathe on the blanket only to have the dog in the group next to you come and decide that it wants to dry itself all over your blanket is almost as pleasant as having to put up with the local alewife fish population when it goes rancid on top of the water in early summer."

"I am sure the cost of these signs is minimal compared to what some people have to put up with for a relaxing day at the beach," stated the letter.

The school superintendent expressed the opinion that the legislature is making a mistake in creating additional community colleges in this bill.

Barry said that Senator Davis, State Sen. Robert Richardson and State Rep. George A. Prescott had all expressed an interest in testifying at the East Tawas hearing. He said, however, that the three legislators do not meet eye-to-eye on the proposal and "all have their own interests at heart."

He said that the hearing would deal only with specific data on the bill, which is not entirely available at present to this school district.

The board of education is to arrange a preliminary meeting prior to the meeting in order to obtain local opinions.

City to Apply for \$74,000 FHA Loan

Following a joint meeting Monday night between the city council and water board with a representative of the Farm Home Administration, the City of Tawas City is to take steps to apply for a \$74,000 FHA loan to finance the city's share in proposed expansion of the city's water distribution system.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the matter has been turned over to the city attorney and a resolution is to be adopted at the August 6 council meeting requesting the loan.

Bublitz said that financing for proposed sewer main extensions, which has been planned by Edmonds Engineering Company through action of the water board, would be through special assessments to benefited property owners, revenue and general obligation bond issues.

The city attorney was instructed Monday night to prepare legal work for a general obligation bond issue to be placed before voters on November 6 to finance construction of a \$41,000 force main connecting the Second Avenue sewer pumping station with the waste water treatment plant.

Operation of this pumping station has been troublesome in recent years due to the growth of the sewage disposal system. Three different lift stations enter this pumping station and approximately 85 percent of the city's sewage is involved. Pumps of larger capacity were installed several years ago, but the station is overloaded due to the expanded system.

It is proposed that an eight-inch force main be constructed parallel to the existing six-inch main which runs along Detroit and Mackinac Railway right-of-way from Second Avenue to the disposal plant.

School Curriculum Gets Improvements

Gaining necessary space through the split session to be utilized this fall, whereby high school classes will attend school in the morning and grades six, seven and eight will utilize the same facilities in the afternoon, plans for improving Tawas Area School's curriculum were revealed Monday night.

Prin. John Alexander said that a rough draft of the high school curriculum, based on changes recommended by department heads, had been developed and the information is to be fed into Bay-Arenac Intermediate District's Computer to determine scheduling.

While the high school curriculum has not been finalized, Alexander said improvements would be made in mathematics, English and vocational subjects. Several innovations are to be incorporated into the business education department.

Because of an expanded physical education program, Alexander recommended that the school make it mandatory for graduation for a student to have two semester hours of physical education, starting with this year's freshman class. Because of space limitations, Tawas Area School has been unable to offer an adequate physical education program until adoption of the split session.

Another reason for the mandatory recommendation is that a student is required to have 900 hours of instruction during the 180 days of school for full state aid reimbursement. The principal said that the five-hour day for students would be equivalent to 900 hours.

He believed that students participating in band should receive a full credit rather than the one-half credit at present. Alexander was of the opinion that a full credit should be given, also, for physical education and that the school require 19 credits for graduation, rather than the current 18, effective with this year's freshman class.

Gives Warning on Septic Tank Cleaning Serv.

Albert Kinstry, administrator of Michigan Department of Health District No. 2, issued a warning Tuesday through the Tawas City office that a downstate septic tank cleaning firm was soliciting business in Iosco County and the local health department is not aware of an approved dumping site being utilized by the firm.

The health director had received one complaint through Michigan State Police that a septic tank truck had dumped its contents in a ditch along a public road, which is in violation of state law. The operator was not apprehended.

Kinstry said local firms listed in the yellow pages of the telephone directory had state-approved dumping sites. He urged Iosco residents to immediately report any unlawful dumping of septic tank cleaning trucks. The Tawas City office's telephone number is 362-2701.

INSECTS help to provide the "raw material" for an unusual collecting hobby of a Tawas City man. Harry Rollin, 84, retired service station operator and a north country woodsman "from way back," keeps his eyes peeled for unusual formations on limbs and trunks of Scotch and jack pine trees while traveling through Iosco wooded areas. It takes a sharp eye and woods knowledge to find what he is looking for. The burls or bumps on tree limbs and trunks in these pictures are caused when an insect penetrates the tree bark and "galls" the wood. Nature is quick to react and a layer of wood fiber quickly grows over the wound, similar to a cancerous growth. Rollin reports that the tree usually dies from this injury. He scrapes and peels the bark off the dead wood, applies a coat of varnish and he has an object of natural beauty, or a handy cane. He does not sell any of his finds and he does not use a cane but, in the event he ever needs a walking stick, he has about 50 unusually shaped ones on display at his home.—Tawas Herald Photos.

State OK's Tax Anticipation Notes for Hale

Sale of \$200,000 in tax anticipation notes was approved July 17 by the Municipal Finance Commission for Hale Area Schools.

When an application is received for a permit to authorize work in or over a navigable water of the United States, department regulations state that notice regarding the matter shall be sent to all persons deemed likely to be interested in that point of navigation or other pertinent factors may be presented.

Subtly Summer: Cranberry Curry and Tea

Carried chicken doesn't have to be hot to be good. Combine it with chilled bites of jellied cranberry sauce in a cool salad for a summer lunch or supper. All you need is dessert.

CURRIED CRANBERRY CHICKEN SALAD (Serves 8)

- 4 cups diced cooked chicken
- 3 bananas, sliced diagonally
- 2 navel oranges, peeled and sectioned
- 3/4 cup golden seedless raisins
- 1/2 cup salted peanuts
- Bite-size greens
- 1 can (8 ounces) Ocean Spray jellied cranberry sauce, cut into 1/2-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup chutney, chopped
- 1 teaspoon curry powder
- 1 cup mayonnaise




Assemble Exhibits Today for 28th Annual Iosco County Fair

Members of the Iosco County Agricultural Society completed a last-minute cleanup of grounds and buildings last week and everything is in readiness for the opening today (Wednesday) of the 28th annual county fair at Hale. The four-day program runs through Saturday.

Although the majority of fairgoers will not be aware of it, there will be a major change in the handling of harness racing events at the fairgrounds track.

New horse barns have been constructed northeast of the grandstand, which should alleviate some of the

confusion which formerly took place between racing heats. In addition, the distance between the judges' stand and the new horse barns is much shorter and will lend to better coordination of the program.

fair, it is but one feature in the overall program, according to Richard Samson, veteran secretary-manager of the Hale Fair. "The fair program is designed to provide fun for families and an outlet for persons interested in exhibiting farm crops, farm animals, homemade items or displays of antiques," said Samson.

The exhibits mentioned by Samson will provide a major attraction for visitors and all of the traditional features of a county fair program are there, from livestock judging and a big midway to a parade and games for kids.

Old MacDonald's Farm, a feature added last year, is included in this year's exhibit. This is a grouping of small farm buildings and live farm animals, which proved to be a big hit with children, particularly those living in urban areas where patting a live farm animal is a novelty.

Of particular interest to many fair visitors will be the arts and crafts exhibition building, where displays of art work, baked goods and handicraft will be exhibited. This building also houses the antique display area with its store front booths offering protection to valuable family heirlooms.

The shrill voices of the carnival barkers will blend with the laughter and shrieks of children to provide that special background noise found only at a carnival midway and the big show of Cooke Amusement Company is scheduled to open at 1:00 p. m. today (Wednesday).

Starting at 9:00 a. m. today, assembling of exhibits commenced in the various buildings. Judging of exhibits entered by 4-H Club members will be held Wednesday evening at 7 o'clock.

A full day of fair features opens Thursday with judging of all 4-H Club livestock starting at 9:00 a. m. Harness racing gets under way at 2:00 p. m., being preceded at 1:00 p. m. by the opening of the midway and judging of open class horses.

Friday's program opens with judging of 4-H Club horses at 9:00 p. m. Youngsters will be using barns formerly used for harness racing horses and located near the large corral constructed three years ago specifically for youth division judging. The midway and exhibit areas open at 1:00 p. m. and the second day of harness racing starts at 2:00 p. m.

Saturday is the big day in the fair program and opens at 10:00 a. m. with games and contests for all ages. Participants in the annual parade are to line up at the fairgrounds prior to the 12:30 p. m. starting time. There will be harness racing at 2:00 p. m. and the midway opens at 4:00 p. m.

Superintendents of the various departments are as follows: George Erickson, livestock; Perry Shellenbarger, poultry; John Dooley, farm produce; Ann Strickler, flowers and plants; Mrs. Irene Goodrow, home economics; Mrs. Gerald Ruckle, domestic arts; Mrs. Adele Brown, antiques; Mrs. Louis Gilles, art, hobbies and handicraft; Elwood Ruckle, games and contests; Lyle Bielby, conservation; Val Samson and Charles Preston, youth division; Robert Ruckle, superintendent of speed for harness racing.

The Iosco County Fair is a member of the Northern Michigan Fair and Racing Association. Total purse divided among winners on a 45-25-15-10-five percent basis, according to finishes, will be \$12,000.

New Control Plan for Superior Would Lower Lk. Huron Level

A new plan to reduce the stage on all five of the Great Lakes—raising all minimum levels and lowering the maximum level of Lake Michigan and Lake Huron—has been recommended by the International Joint Commission of the United States and Canada.

This new regime of levels and flows is of great importance to Lake Huron shoreline property owners in Iosco County—hard hit during recent years by erosion and inundation by the fluctuating level of Lake Huron—as the new plan would redistribute

the water in the Great Lakes, producing slightly higher levels in Lake Superior and slightly lower levels in the downstream lakes.

While there would be losses during this period to power and to Lake Superior shore property interests, the lower lakes would receive shore property benefits of greater magnitude.

The International Joint Commission of United States and Canada met July 16 with members of congress from the Great Lakes basin to discuss the regulations of Lake Superior outflows. At that meeting, Christian A. Herter Jr., chairman of the United States section of the joint commission, discussed the major recommendations contained in the commission's report recently submitted to the two governments entitled "Special Interim Report on Regulation of Lake Superior Outflows to Provide Relief from High Water Levels on the Lower Great Lakes."

Maj. Gen. Ernest Graves, division engineer, North Central Division, Corps of Engineers, Chicago, Illinois, who serves as United States chairman of the International Great Lakes Levels Board and the United States member of the International Lake Superior Board of Control, described the regulation plan proposed in the commission's report and discussed the effects that this regulation plan will have upon the Great Lakes system.

In response to an application from the United States Government, January 26 and to expressions of concern on behalf of the Canadian Government regarding critical high water levels in the lower lakes, the commission on January 30 directed the International Lake Superior Board of Control to deviate from its current regulation plan for a period of three months and further reduce Lake Superior outflows to approximately 55,000 cubic feet per second, the minimum winter outflow allowed under the regulation plan.

Subsequently, this period of reduced flow was extended to June 30 to allow time for consideration by the commission and the two governments of the desirability and feasibility of modifying the operation of the control works to relieve conditions on the Lower Great Lakes.

Based upon consideration of the board's interim report, public hearings and a review of the results of the commission's temporary action, the commission has submitted to the government the special interim report, Herter told the legislators.

In the report, Herter pointed out, the commission concluded that the

objective of regulation of Lake Superior outflows should be to provide benefits to interests throughout the Great Lakes system without causing undue detriment to Lake Superior interests. To achieve this objective, all control works in the St. Marys River should be operated so as to keep the levels of Lakes Superior, Michigan and Huron at the same relative position within recorded range of stage and with respect to main levels.

Rather than recommending any specific regulation plan, the commission has asked the government to approve the regulation objective proposed in the report and jointly grant the commission sufficient authority to implement a regulation plan consistent with that objective. In addition, the commission has recommended that the governments of Canada and the United States make provision for the disposition of claims for physical injury or damage to persons or property occurring in their respective territories and resulting from the maintenance and operation of the existing control works in the St. Marys River.

Due to the continuing emergency conditions on the Lower Great Lakes, the commission announced June 30 that it intended to continue regulating Lake Superior outflows in such a way as to provide downstream relief. This course of action will be continued on an interim basis unless the commission is otherwise instructed by the two governments.

According to General Graves, the new plan would produce beneficial effects during the first year if it were introduced during the present period of lake levels.

According to the interim report, water in the Great Lakes comes from the rain and snow falling on the lakes and on the lands surrounding them. The relation between storage volumes of the lakes and outflow capacity is such that, if precipitation persists above or below normal, water levels vary significantly above or below their long-term averages.

High water levels of 1951-52 and occurring again this year are the result of persistent high precipitation. The low levels of 1964-65 occurred when precipitation persisted below normal.

Family Living Education

"Food prices continue to climb." This is today's headline but it is not news to the homemaker. She can almost see her food dollar shrinking more each time she shops.

How to economize is the question. So you decide on careful use of leftovers and your family says, "Ugh! Leftovers," or "That stuff again!" Could be you are doing it all wrong.

How about giving that Sunday chuck roast a whole new look? You know that heated over roast beef is nothing to get excited about. But barbecued beef special, stroganoff or chop suey deluxe—well, that is really something else!

That meat will look even better if you skip a day between its appearances as a star attraction for dinner. This takes some planning ahead which brings up a new word,

"planned-overs." I will buy that.

Using planned-overs means special care between first and second appearances. Remove meat from the bones as soon as possible carefully saving "brown pan scrappings" and fat for future flavoring. Wrap meat in moisture-proof plastic wrap or aluminum foil and store in the refrigerator if you plan to use it within a day or two, or in meal-size portions in the freezer. You can store it frozen for up to six weeks and expect a good flavor to remain.

One rule of thumb for planned-overs is do not go too exotic with combinations of food and seasonings. Your family will enjoy barbecued beef and pork, but barbecued tuna will depend on the kids and dad. Try it if you dare!

Recycled mashed potatoes are winners. Try them in potato soup, potato cakes, potato pancakes or shepherd's pie. Just remember that the nutrients in vegetables are fragile. Use

both fresh and recycled vegetables as soon as possible.

There is much to be said for saving food dollars with planned-overs and planning meals for several days in advance.

How long since you have "read" your favorite cookbook for new recipes and ideas? Try it, you may enjoy it. Your family may eat better, more nutritious meals in the bargain.



Apply For SS Benefits Immediately

Question: My doctor has ordered me to quit work right away because of a severe heart ailment. I am 63. Should I apply for monthly social security retirement or disability payments?

Answer: You may apply for both benefits at the same time. If you are eligible, you can begin getting reduced retirement payments immediately. If you are also found to be entitled to disability benefits, social security will substitute the higher disability payments after your five-month waiting period is over.

Question: My mother, who gets monthly social security widow's payments, recently received an application in the mail to fill out and return so she can be assigned a social security number. Since she gets her checks based on my father's earnings record, why does she need a number of her own?

Answer: The Social Security Administration has started issuing numbers to all people receiving social security payments who do not already have their own numbers. The numbers are being issued to help keep individual benefit payments and social security records straight. Your mother's payments will not be affected in any way.

Question: My ex-husband died last month. We had been divorced for nearly three years. I have three children, ages seven, eight and 12. Can

we get monthly social security payments on his record?

Answer: Yes. If you have not remarried and your ex-husband had worked long enough under social security, you and the children can get monthly social security checks on his wage record. The children can get payments even if you have remarried.

Question: I am 21 and, since my father died two years ago, I have been getting monthly social security payments. I go to classes at a trade school where each student advances at his own pace. I will be 22 in January but I will not complete my course until February of 1974. Can I continue to get payments until I graduate?

Answer: Yes. Your payments can continue until the month you finish the course or for two months after the month you are 22, whichever comes first.



Six-Year-Old Boy Drowned at Park

The body of a six-year-old Flint boy was recovered in about four feet of water, 50 to 55 feet offshore from the East Tawas City Park, at 10:20 p. m. Wednesday after he had been missing for more than two hours.

Shawn Miller, born November 1, 1966, was the first drowning victim at the city park in about five years. Investigating East Tawas City Police officers said that the boy and his mother, Mrs. Dawn Miller, were camping at the city park. The boy

was playing with two other boys, aged eight and 10 years, at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

The two other boys told officers that the three of them had been jumping into the water from the dock. One boy told officers that he first believed that Shawn had gone to the business district.

The victim was first missed about 8:00 p. m. Officers said he was a non-swimmer.

Mrs. Hughey Confident of Goal

Former Tawas Woman Seeks Syndication of Her Cartoons

Armed with unlimited confidence and a few sketches, a West Branch mother of seven has taken the first steps toward achieving syndication of her cartoons.

The woman, Joyce Hughey, the former Joyce Moore of Tawas City, has so far created 87 cartoons, including those on the drawing board, whose only characters are two small human-like creatures and a gigantic hand.

Her first cartoon depicted a huge fist hovering over one of the creatures who is saying, "Did you ever have the feeling that someone was trying to tell you something?"

The hand points, beckons, clenches

God." Her cartoons are simple and uncluttered and therein, she says, lies their success.

"The two creatures in the cartoons do not even have names, but privately I call them selves—silent self and speaking self," she said. "We all have dialogues with ourselves and reason with ourselves."

Mrs. Hughey is currently working on seven cartoon portfolios which

will be sent to syndicated newspapers in New York City, New York; Chicago, Illinois, and Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania.

"I am convinced it is just a matter of time before a syndicate will pick up my cartoons," she said.

In the meantime, she will be kept busy with her portrait painting; caring for her seven children, ages one to 16, and full time speaking engagements. Since her cartoons have become known in the West Branch

into a fist or finger-walks behind the creatures and is always compassionate and unassuming.

"He told me that I should first offer the cartoons free to a few papers around Michigan to get exposure, so I checked with six newspapers and all have agreed to carry it weekly for six months," she stated.

How did it all get started? Mrs. Hughey attributes it to the Rev. John Mather, pastor of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church at Rose City.






