

cial security payments that same month. I had a six-month waiting period before I got my first check. Since the waiting period has now been shortened to five months, will I get a check for the extra month I had to wait?

Answer: No. This change in the disability law is effective for benefits payable for months beginning January 1973 based on applications filed in or after October 1972. If you were already getting disability payments before January 1973, you will not benefit from the shortened waiting period

Question: Shortly after his 18th

birthday last summer, my son was severely injured in a car accident and he probably will not ever be able to work. Even though I get monthly social security retirement payments, my son could not get checks when we applied last year because he was over 18 at the time of the accident. Now I hear that I should reapply for him because of some recent changes in the law. Is this true?

Answer: Yes. Now a child severely disabled before 22 can qualify for social security payments if one of his parents is getting benefits or died




