Judge Allan Miller Declines Appeals Ct. Appointment

United States Sen. Robert P. Griffin invited Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas to Washington, D. C., Friday, June 29, to discuss certain vacancies in federal judicial posts.

Two posts are presently vacant. A seat on the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals became vacant by the recent passing of Judge Wallace Kent of Kalamazoo. Also effective June 30, Judge Ralph Freeman, formerly of Flint, retired from the Eastern District of Michigan, Southern Division.

After a two-hour conference, Senator Griffin offered to submit Judge Miller's name for the Freeman vacancy. This was declined by Judge Miller since it would require full-time residence in the Detroit area. Judge Miller left a Detroit law firm in 1958 and has held the 23rd Circuit

post in Tawas since 1960.

The Eastern District of Michigan has nine judges, eight of whom sit in Detroit and one, Judge Stephen J. Roth, sits also in Flint and Bay City.

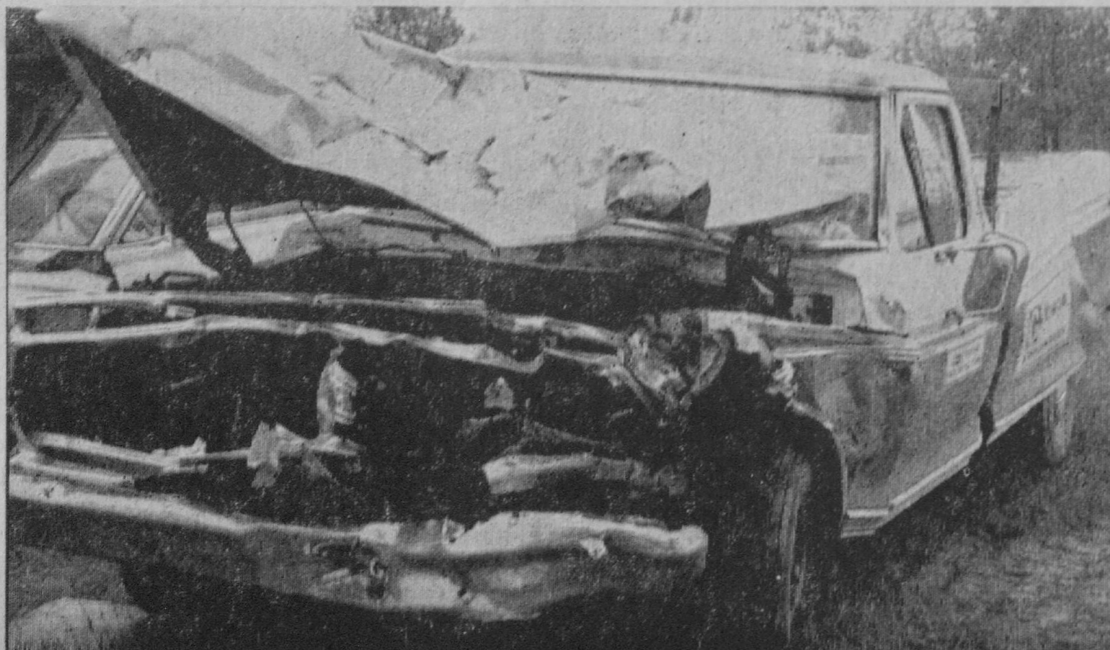
The Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals sits in Cincinnati and is comprised of judges from Michigan, Ohio, Kentucky and Tennessee. The judges maintain offices in their individual residential areas, but hold hearings periodically in panels of three. Michigan presently is represented on this court by Judge George Edwards and Judge Wade McCree, both of Detroit.

Senator Griffin stated that the seat should be filled from the western side of the state to balance representation. Senator Griffin left Saturday, June 30, for a trip to China before resuming the task of filling these vacancies.

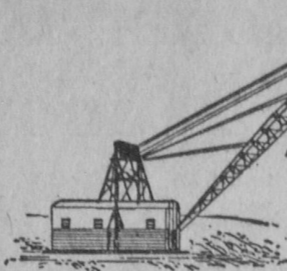

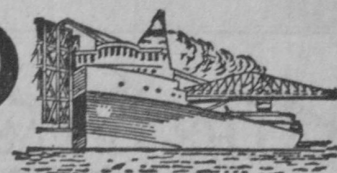

Iosco Might Not Have Say on CC Dist.

Tawas Area Board of Education, which has been shouting loud and clear for months that it did not want this district to be shovled by the state into joining Kirtland Community College District without a vote of the people, may have its words shovled right down its collective throats.

Senate Bill No. 346, introduced March 26 by Senator Charles O. Zoller, is reportedly gaining steam in the senate education committee.

The bill would do just what Tawas Area Board of Education and Supt. Edward J. Barry have been arguing against: Force this school district into Kirtland Community College District, along with Whittemore-Prescott Area School, Hale Area School, several townships in Arenac and two townships in Alcona Counties.

Through revising boundaries for all community college districts in the state, the proposed bill, to top it all off, would give boards of trustees of each community college district the power of levying a two-mill operational tax without the vote of the people. At the present time, there is a one-mill limit on non-voted tax for community colleges.

The first reaction to this latest development at Lansing was a meeting of educators Friday morning called by Iosco Intermediate District.

Only last week, Tawas Area Board of Education showed its ire over the fact that Kirtland Community College District was making overtures directly to the local public concerning establishment of a freshman college here without coordinating its efforts first through local school authorities.

Believing that the people "have the right to vote" on which community college district to join and warning that Kirtland was attempting to "get its foot in the door" here in order to influence Lansing legislators, Tawas Area Board of Education invited Alpena Community College and Delta College, as well as Kirtland, to make public presentations concerning what the community colleges have to offer.

An advocate of having all colleges cooperate in establishment of a college center in Iosco, Barry has been outspoken in his attempts to prevent the legislature from accomplishing just what Senate Bill No. 346 would do. He said only recently that Kirtland Community College was interested in Tawas Area School Dis-

trict because of this district's high valuation. He said that Kirtland was in serious financial trouble and that Tawas Area School District would be a ripe plum for the picking.

Because Kirtland is located 70 miles to the southwest at Rosecon, with little previous association with the Lake Huron Shore region, Barry has felt that, should Tawas Area School District be forced into a community college district other than one right here in Iosco, it should go to the south to Delta College or north to Alpena Community College.

Many Tawas Area High School graduates have continued their education at Alpena CC and at Delta. In addition, the latter college has been closely associated with Iosco schools through providing data processing.

North is the direction in which Oscoda Area School District will be traveling, including the Townships of Oscoda, AuSable and Wilber, as that district is included in the Alpena Community College District under lines drawn by Senate Bill No. 346. Part of Wilber Township is included in Tawas Area School District.

The Delta Community College District proposed under Senate Bill No. 346 would have an indentation in Arenac County, reaching as far north as Standish, while the remainder of Arenac—including the Townships of Arenac, AuGres, Mason, Sims, Turner and Whitney, along with AuGres and Omer—would go to Kirtland.

Barry commented last week that the lines as drawn by Senate Bill No. 346 would indicate some gerrymandering on the part of someone with influence.

HUD Approves \$1,169,387 for ET Project

A contribution of \$1,169,387 has been approved by the Federal Housing and Urban Development Department for the 51-unit housing development for elderly and non-elderly persons at East Tawas.

John Elliott, chairman of the East Tawas Housing Commission, said that he had received notification of the approval on June 30.

Elliott said that construction is expected to start early this fall. The developer is Gregory Construction Company of Bay City.

The project includes 31 apartments for elderly persons and 20 units for non-elderly low income persons.

State Police Investigate Four PI Accidents

Four personal injury accidents were investigated during the past week by Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

Harry J. Kay, Utica, was taken to Tawas Hospital Sunday following an accident on private property in Oscoda Township. Kay lost control of his motorbike and drove into a ditch.

Charles A. Morey, 27, Saginaw, and Richard Markina, 23, Saginaw, received minor injuries Saturday when Morey's car struck a tree on Cooke Dam Road. Morey told officers that a deer jumped out in front of his vehicle and he swerved to avoid a collision.

Truman A. Turpenning, 37, Marlette, was taken to Tawas Hospital Wednesday following an accident with a mini-bike in Wilber Township. Turpenning received shoulder injuries when he rolled over.

Michael J. Ulman, 20, Tawas City, received minor abrasions Sunday when he fell out of a car being operated by Christopher R. King, 20, Tawas City. Officers said that King was driving at a slow rate of speed on Sherman Road. Ulman fell to the roadway when King ran off the road and then turned back onto the roadway.

ments. As a consequence, there is a good possibility that the county may be divided when it comes to community college districting.

D&M Calls Track Story Premature

A spokesman for the Detroit and Mackinac Railway said Monday that any report at this time concerning the possible purchase by the D&M of a 182-mile stretch of track from Bay City to Mackinaw City from the bankrupt Penn Central Transportation Company would be premature.

A report Thursday from a Penn Central official said that executives of the two companies had discussed the proposed sale and take-over of the tracks and Penn Central's switching yards at Bay City. It was reported by The Bay City Times that the proposal was still in the talking stages.

The 182-mile stretch of PC track is part of some 600 miles of track in Michigan that has been proposed for abandonment because the trackage is not profitable to operate.

The D&M has 232 miles of track which runs along the shore of Saginaw Bay and Lake Huron from Bay City to Cheboygan.

It was reported that trustees of the bankrupt PC are currently preparing a plan for either reorganizing or liquidating that railroad.

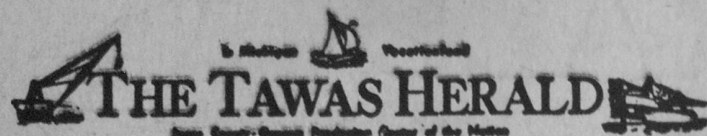
Bucholz Dead

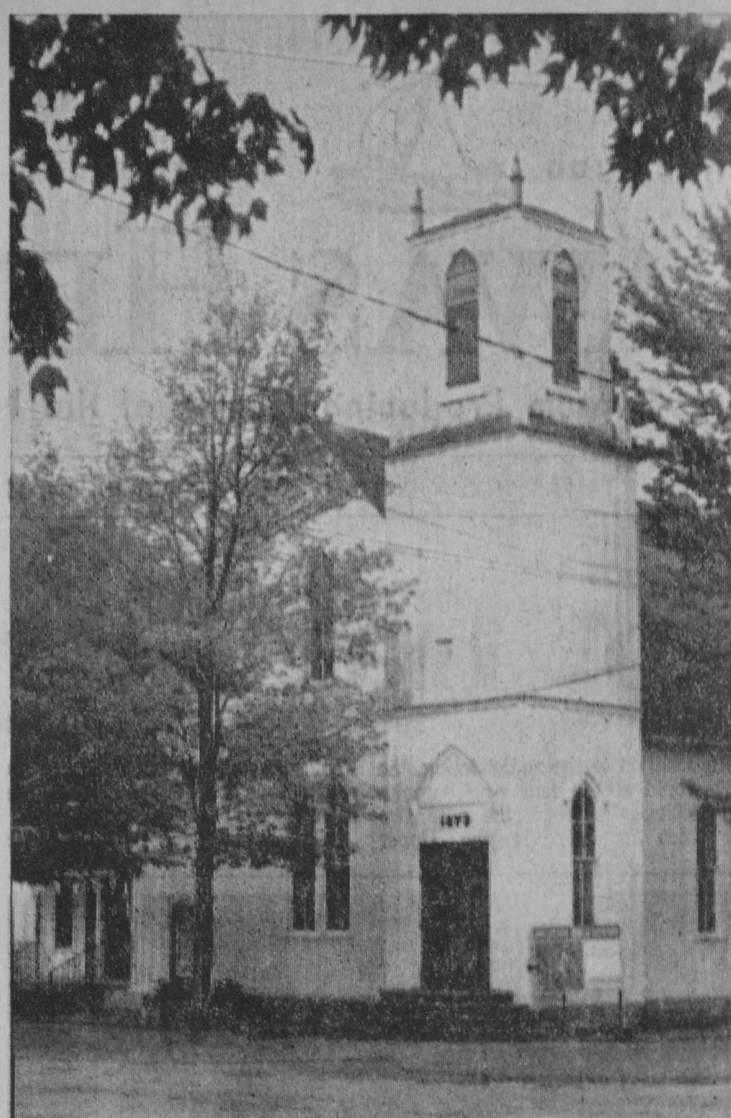

Expect Heavy Volume of GI Home Loans This Year

The number of GI home loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration in the current fiscal year will likely register the heaviest volume of activity in 16 years, Donald E. Johnson, administrator of veterans affairs, reported today.

The VA administrator noted that 303,000 loans with a face value of seven-billion dollars were guaranteed in the first 10 months of this fiscal year, up four percent over the 291,500 loans approved in a comparable period of fiscal year 1972.

The total of 359,000 loans guaranteed in all of the fiscal year 1972, in turn, marked the most active year since fiscal year 1957.

Veteran loans for mobile homes increased 40 percent in the first 10 months of this fiscal year, jumping to 4,900 from 3,500 in a comparable period last year.

Johnson said the upward trend in VA loan volume began in 1971 and he attributed much of the gain to the general availability of mortgage money for home building and buying, and a law signed by the president on October 23, 1970, which restored eligibility for loans to veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict, eliminated the one-half percent loan funding fee previously required of post-Korean veterans and made other changes providing greater flexibility on the loan program.

Nearly 70 percent of the VA home loans are now being made for veterans 35 years of age or less. The medium age of veteran-borrowers is now 31.

48764 Cancellation Erased

Alabaster Post Office Closed; Not Economical

The postal cancellation "Alabaster, Michigan 48764," was erased from the United States postal registry effective Saturday, June 30, after a history of 100 years or more in Iosco County.

There are no records available to indicate the length of time Alabaster has had a post office, but it is believed that postal service to that point started sometime in the 1800s or 1870s.

Since August 1962, the Alabaster post office has been a rural branch of the Tawas City post office and located in a small building housing fire equipment. Mrs. Harry Bolen, postmaster for 25 years, retired in 1962 and, since then, Mrs. Hope Rescoe has served as clerk in charge.

Leonard Hosbach, Tawas City postmaster, who was at Alabaster Saturday morning to close the record books with Mrs. Rescoe, said he had been notified by the Saginaw Sectional Center of the United States Postal Service on February 13 that it was no longer feasible to operate the Alabaster branch office.

In his letter, Roy G. Grobe, Saginaw, postmaster-manager of associated offices in the area, said a "more economical service can be provided to customers of the branch office at Alabaster by the rural route serving the area."

Effective June 23, start of the new pay period for employees, mail was delivered to the doors of patrons by Martin Kasischke, rural carrier on Tawas City Route No. 2. All of the streets at Alabaster are private roads and an agreement was made with United States Gypsum Company that roads would be kept passable for the mail carrier.

Since becoming a rural branch of the Tawas City office, postal patrons in the community surrounding the United States Gypsum Company installation have dropped from 25 to the present 11 lock boxes. The gypsum company, principal patron of the office, may rent a lock box in the Tawas City post office, but no decision has been made as yet.

Hosbach said that stamp sales at Alabaster had dwindled to a low of \$55.70 during January and his records indicated that stamp sales totaled \$112.35 during May. Monthly salary cost for operation amounted to \$145.83.

At one time, Alabaster had a population of several hundred persons, along with two stores and a boarding house. When Mrs. Bolen suc-

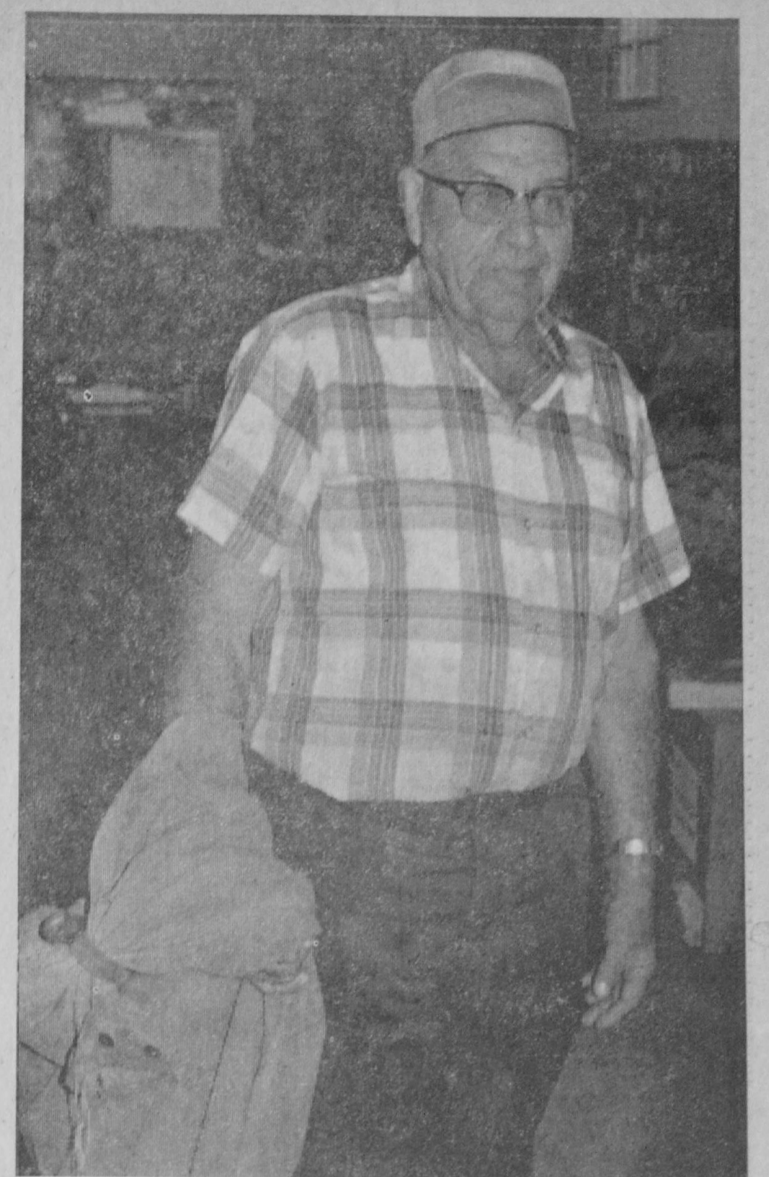
ceeded Edwin Benson as Alabaster postmaster in 1938, the office was located in the company store, which burned to the ground two years later.

Hosbach said that discussion concerning discontinuance of the office was started last fall when Karl Kobs announced that he would not be interested in renewing his Star Route contract in 1973.

Since July 1, 1945, when he succeeded Ernest Wegner, Kobs has been carrying the mail twice daily

between Tawas City and Alabaster. Under Star Route contract No. 48768, mail was dispatched in 1945 directly from postal cars included with Detroit and Mackinac Railway passenger trains and, when truck service was inaugurated, Kobs picked up mail pouches destined for Alabaster at the Tawas City post office.

Kobs, 81, and his wife were honored at a retirement party Friday night at Hosbach's hunting camp in Baldwin Township. Local postal employees were in attendance.

Township Liquor Money Goes to Iosco

Liquor Control Commission checks totaling \$3,867.50 were received by six townships of Iosco last week, but H. K. Johnson, finance director for the state liquor control commission, said that future payments would be made to the county.

"It was the decision of the commission that until such time as these governmental units do qualify, future distribution of fees from licenses located therein shall be made to the county, to be credited to the sheriff's department for the specific purpose of enforcing the provisions of the state liquor law and the rules and regulations of the commission in the municipalities," said Johnson.

The reason for the commission decision was apparently because the six townships do not have qualified constables to enforce the liquor law. However, all six of the townships turn these checks over to the county to be added to the sheriff's department account.

A warrant totaling \$3,867.50 and representing 85 percent of the amount of alcoholic beverage retailers' license fees collected by the state, were distributed by County Treas. Edward Nelkie as follows: Baldwin, \$1,232.50; Burleigh, \$467.50; Grant, \$722.50; Reno, \$467.50; Sherman, \$510; Wilber, \$467.50.

A number of townships in the county, along with the City of Whittemore, voted to turn liquor control money over to the county to aid in financing the cost of hiring additional deputies for the sheriff's department. Plainfield Township, for example, turned its check for \$1,463, which was credited to the sheriff's department account, over to the county treasurer on June 19.

Tawas and Alabaster Townships continue the practice of electing constables, whose principal duty is to make periodic inspection of tavern licenses.

Several years ago, former Sheriff Ivan O'Farrell pointed out to the old board of supervisors that the actual responsibility for enforcing liquor laws and handling any problems at taverns fell on the sheriff's department rather than on township constables, who are not recognized law enforcement officers.

OK Iosco Grant for Sheriff Radio

A grant of \$15,577 was awarded to Iosco County by the Michigan Office of Criminal Justice Programs. The grant to this county was included in a number awarded June 26 to finance projects designed to reduce crime and improve justice in the state.

Attending the meeting at Lansing were Undersheriff Basil Odell and County Treas. Edward Nelkie.

The county is to add \$3,240 to the above total to aid in purchasing new radio communications equipment for the sheriff's department. The grant was financed through 75 percent federal participation and 25 percent from the state.

Odell said that the sheriff's department was to prepare a list of equipment specifications for justice department approval. He believed that it would be from three to four months before bids would be advertised.

According to Sheriff George Westcott, the money would purchase a new radio console to be installed at the county jail, new radios for patrol cars and six new portable radios.

Grants were awarded on the basis of applications from local units of government and state agencies. Iosco County filed its application in December.

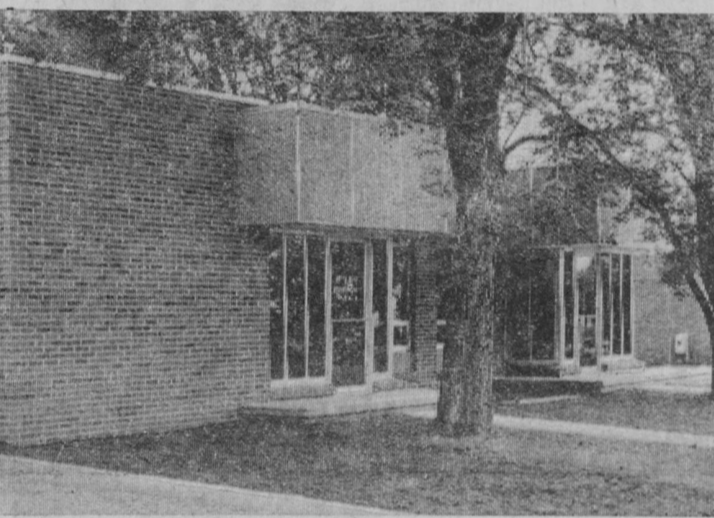
DSS Assumes Foster Care Responsibility

Effective January 1, 1974, the Department of Social Services will assume the responsibility of licensing adult foster care facilities for the Department of Health. These will fall in three categories:

- (1) Family homes which provide care for no more than six adults.
- (2) Group homes for more than six adults and not more than 20 adults of which not more than six are 65 or older.
- (3) Congregate facility for more than 20 adults of which no more than six can be 65 or older.

As tentative rules governing the licensing of adult foster care facilities have been written but the final draft has not been approved, the Iosco County Department of Social Services, through the cooperation of the Department of Social Services Regional Office, plan on holding two meetings on Tuesday, July 10, to discuss the current draft with present permit holders for the aged operators and other persons who might be interested. For the convenience of the operators, one meeting will be held on the west side of the county at 10:00 a. m. at the Plainfield Township Hall, Hale, and an identical meeting for the east side of the county will be at 2:00 p. m. in East Tawas at the Cooperative Extension Conference Room in the Federal Building.

Drug Bill Payment Under Medicare Has Limitation

Question: I've been getting social security disability payments for almost five years. Because I need constant medication, my drug bills amount to nearly \$50 every month. Will Medicare help pay these bills?

Answer: Drugs are only covered by Medicare in specific situations. The hospital insurance program will pay for drugs you receive while a patient in a hospital or skilled nursing facility. The medical insurance program covers only drugs which cannot be self-administered and are received either in a physician's office or as a hospital outpatient.

Question: When I signed up for medical insurance under Medicare, I could not get hospital insurance because I had not worked long enough under social security. However, my sister told me that this has recently been changed. How do I apply for hospital insurance coverage?

Answer: Call, write or visit any social security office to apply. Persons, like yourself, who previously could not get hospital insurance coverage may now enroll at a cost of \$33 per month. The enrollment period for 1973 extends through August. If you do not enroll by August 31, 1973, you will not be able to enroll until the next general enrollment period, the first three months of 1974.

Question: I became disabled in January last year and applied for social security payments that same month. I had a six-month waiting period before I got my first check. Since the waiting period has now been shortened to five months, will I get a check for the extra month I had to wait?

Answer: No. This change in the disability law is effective for benefits payable for months beginning January 1973 based on applications filed in or after October 1972. If you were already getting disability payments before January 1973, you will not benefit from the shortened waiting period.

Question: Shortly after his 18th birthday last summer, my son was severely injured in a car accident and he probably will not ever be able to work. Even though I get monthly social security retirement payments, my son could not get checks when we applied last year because he was over 18 at the time of the accident. Now I hear that I should reapply for him because of some recent changes in the law. Is this true?

Answer: Yes. Now a child severely disabled before 22 can qualify for social security payments if one of his parents is getting benefits or died



Hinged Gates For Flood Protection

Hinged gates, which close automatically when Saginaw Bay water backs up, are to be installed over the mouth of drainage tubes at AuGres, according to flood control plans approved last week by United States Army Corps of Engineers.

AuGres Township has made application for flood control assistance several weeks ago under Public Act 99. A three-man committee from AuGres has been working with the corps of engineers teams in the area for the past two months.

Under provisions of the federal act, the corps of engineers provides pumps and other flood control equipment which is to be operated and maintained by AuGres residents. The government furnishes guidelines and technical assistance.

Now that the project has been approved, the township must secure bids from area contractors to install tubes, flaps and diking needed for flood control.

Township residents are hopeful the flood control measures will at least partially relieve land, valued between \$250,000 and \$290,000, from the threat of frequent flooding.

In addition to high-volume portable pumps designed to expedite draining of flooded land, the project provides for installation of dikes and drain tubes to prevent flooding.

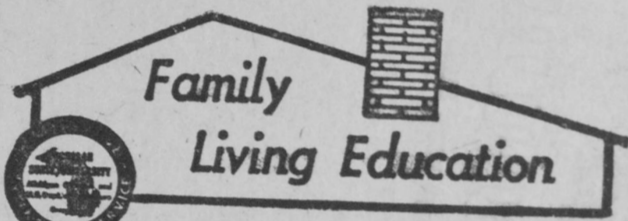

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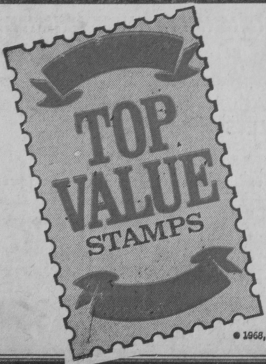

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
