

Adopt Maintenance Plan for Summer at Tawas A. School

Priorities for summer maintenance and installation of several new doors at the high school were authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Although operational costs for the 1973-74 term are increasing through inflation and board authorization to hire nine additional instructors, the board of education is awaiting final passage of the state aid bill before submitting an operational mileage proposal to district voters.

Priorities adopted for summer maintenance included installation of a new hot water heater in the high school boiler room, installation of a ventilator in the science room, installation of new doors with smaller windows at the high school, painting six classrooms in the high school and painting of the junior high school corridor.

In addition, the old portion of the Tawas City Elementary Unit would be repaired and redecorated. By moving the sixth grade to the junior and senior high school building, four

classrooms are to be freed and utilized as a materials center, library and storage area. Fourth grade classes at East Tawas are to be moved to Tawas City, freeing space at East Tawas for an elementary library.

The board of education authorized the superintendent to investigate backtapping of the front drive at the high school.

The board of education authorized the school to enter into an agreement with Peoples State Bank for the latter to utilize an alley at the East Tawas Elementary Unit as an exit from its parking lot to Sawyer Street. The school would retain possession and control of the property and would be protected from liability by a bank insurance policy. The bank would pay approximately \$4,000 for backtapping of the alley and would provide a gate on the school playground. It was recommended by the board of education that traffic in the alley be limited to one way between Newman and Sawyer Streets.

Authorization was given to utilize three classrooms in the East Tawas Elementary Unit, along with the gymnasium, as a senior citizen center on a temporary basis. Similar centers are being developed at schools of the county under a \$25,000 federal grant. All maintenance of the rooms utilized would be handled under the program. Areas would be provided for an office, crafts room and game room. It is anticipated that about 100 persons would be involved.

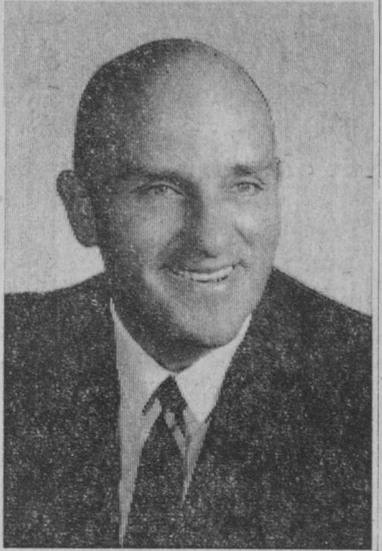
Federal grants to Tawas Area School this year include \$675 for an Alpha reading program, \$6,000 for learning centers for educationally disadvantaged at the two elementary units and \$27,000 under Title One.

Summer programs include a remedial reading class for 12 children in elementary grades, reading classes five days a week at the high school conducted by William Lenz and a special remedial program for kindergarten through fourth grade at East Tawas. The board of education authorized use of a shuttle bus to transport students.

The board of education voted four to three to disallow a recommendation from the athletic director, along with recommendations of the superintendent and principal, for the school to adopt the guideline of the state for athletic eligibility. Tawas Area School requires students engaged in athletics to be passing in all grades. The state minimum is a passing grade in three subjects and there presently is a bill before the legislature to require all schools to follow the state minimum because of discrimination.

Following a report of Mrs. Norma Worsham, transportation director, the board of education decided it would not change its policy in regard to allowing drivers to maintain buses at their homes on certain routes. The report indicated that requiring buses to be returned to school each day would add approximately 2,000 miles to the bus fleet each month. Total mileage of buses during the 1972-73 school year amounted to 223,451 miles and 49,703 gallons of gasoline were utilized in the vehicles.

Intermediate School Board Picks Supt.

John Tafelski, 37, presently serving as Merrill Community School superintendent, has been hired as the new superintendent for Iosco Intermediate School District. He replaces Ernest W. Jordan, who resigned to become superintendent at Au Gres-Sims High School.

Tafelski graduated from Bay City Central High School in June 1953. He received an associate degree from Bay City Junior College in 1957, then received a bachelor of science degree from Central Michigan University in 1960. He received a master of arts degree in school administration from CMU in 1964 and has earned approximately 60 semester credit hours beyond a bachelor degree.

Tafelski's first teaching position was at Houghton Lake High School from 1960 to 1964. He was director of guidance and counseling at Pinconning Area School from August 1964 to June 1969. He served as principal at Merrill in 1969 and was hired as superintendent in 1970.

Tafelski served two years with the Eighth Infantry Division and was the division's survey specialist and recreation director.

He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of two children.

Head Basketball Post to Fairless

Richard Fairless, who has served as junior high basketball coach for the past eight years, has been appointed head basketball coach for the 1973-74 school year. The announce-

ment was made Monday night by the board of education.

A member of the Tawas Area School faculty for the past 10 years, Fairless succeeds James Papenfus, who resigned as head coach earlier this year and was appointed athletic director.

During the past two seasons, Fairless-coached junior varsity basketball squads have compiled a record of 33 wins and three losses. During his tenure, the Junior Braves have had an over-all record of 92 wins and 40 losses.

A native of Flint, Fairless graduated from St. Matthews High School in 1957. He attended Flint Junior College and received a bachelor of science degree from Adrian College in 1963. Studying at Idaho State University during the summers of 1967 and 1970 under a National Science Foundation grant, he received his master of teaching science degree in 1970. He has headed the science department of Tawas Area School for the past two years.

In addition to his basketball coaching duties, Fairless has served eight years as junior varsity football coach.

Split Session School Adopted for 1973-74

As a means of relieving overcrowded conditions, Tawas Area Junior and Senior High School will operate under a split session arrangement during the 1973-74 term. The plan was approved by a unanimous vote of the board of education at Monday night's session.

Under the program, high school students in grades nine through 12 will attend classes from 7:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon. The sixth grade is to be combined with the seventh and eighth grades as an intermediate school, with classes running from 12:05 o'clock to about 5:00 p. m.

It was emphasized that the remainder of the elementary grades, kindergarten through fifth grade, will continue to operate under the conventional school day program.

The split session program, utilized at Pinconning for a number of years and once considered here as a remedy to the lack of classroom space, has been under study by school administrators since defeat of a bonding proposal last month.

Administrators said Monday night that the change would provide some classroom breathing room during the two sessions, with two classrooms free in the morning and about six in the afternoon, depending on classroom utilization in the shared time vocational program.

The additional classroom space will mean that the school may provide a much-needed expansion of curriculum, which has been under consideration by the board of education but unobtainable because of the lack of classroom space. John Alexander, high school principal, estimated Monday night that hiring nine additional instructors would cost an additional \$84,000 in operating funds.

Additional staff members which Alexander felt as mandatory includes one person in guidance and counseling and two additional physical education instructors. Enrichment of existing programs in the junior high school would include one instructor in home economics and one teacher in arts and crafts. At the present time, space limitations prohibit any vocational training in junior high grades.

In addition, the board of education has committed itself to lowering the pupil-teacher ratio in the high school and Alexander recommended hiring one mathematics-science instructor and one combination teacher for English and social studies.

The remaining two instructors would be in vocational education, one for building trades or auto mechanics and one for business education.

While it would appear that more than two classrooms would be freed for high school use through utilization of the junior high wing, Alexander pointed out that some subjects (typing for one) have more than five sections and it will be necessary to utilize some of the available space for classroom expansion.

Under the new arrangement, high school students are to have five 55-minute periods and the intermediate grades will have six 42-minute periods.

Alexander expressed the opinion that expanding the school curriculum was a necessary adjunct to adoption of the split session plan. He believed that adoption of the split session would disrupt the life style of many families, due to the fact that some students would be attending school in the morning and others would attend afternoon sessions. He pointed out, too, that the quality of education has been diminishing each year in the school as classes get larger and larger and fewer subjects were being offered as a consequence of expanded enrollment.

Under the plan, each member of the staff would be assigned to a classroom. One room would be provided for a teacher work area (not a lounge). One advantage created by the split session is the fact that all teachers would be free at one time for student-teacher conferences.

He stressed the fact that while teachers would be in the classroom for five hours, the faculty is contracted for seven hours a day and would be available for conferences as well as having time for class preparation.

Possible construction of a concrete block building to serve as a storage-locker room for organized athletics is to be investigated by the board of education and administrators. One problem created by the split session is that high school sports would not have access to present locker rooms due to junior high gym classes in the afternoon. In addition, the school has always lacked storage space. School

officials are to visit Pinconning High School to inspect a similar building constructed there.

As an alternative to constructing a building, Supt. Edward J. Barry has

suggested possible utilization of the present art room as a locker room. This room presently has restrooms with doors connected to the outside and could be remodeled for showers.

Jacques-Babcock Named to Board

Dr. James Jacques was re-elected to a four-year term and Carl Babcock was elected to a similar term to fill a vacancy on Tawas Area Board of Education at Monday's annual school election.

Coming on the heels of an unsuccessful bonding proposal which saw a turnout of more than 2,000 voters a month ago, Monday's annual school election had a disappointing turnout of a little more than 500 voters.

Jacques and Babcock, both residents of Tawas City, out-distanced the other three candidates listed on the ballot. Jacques received 130 votes in East Tawas, 111 votes in Tawas City and 30 in Tawas Township for a total of 271. Babcock tallied 173 ballots at East Tawas, 126 in Tawas

City and 33 in Tawas Township for a total of 332.

Robert O'Neil, a resident of Baldwin Township, made an outstanding showing with 120 votes in the East Tawas precinct. He received 59 votes in Tawas City and 14 in Tawas Township for a total of 193. Joseph VanDette received 80 votes, 35 at East Tawas, 33 in Tawas City and 12 in Tawas Township; John Smith tallied 58 votes, 31 at East Tawas, 17 in Tawas City and 10 in Tawas Township.

This is Babcock's first experience in an elective position, although he has served as chairman of the Tawas City Planning Commission for the past two years. He succeeds Leonard Sarki, a former board member who had been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Carl Helmer and did not choose to be a candidate. Jacques was elected to his first four-year term in June 1969, succeeding Waldo Curry, who retired that year.

This was the last school election in which polls were located at three different places in the district. Because of confusing precinct lines, the board of education decided to consolidate polls at the high school.

Kocher and Rasch Elected; Wallace New Hale Member

Audrey Kocher and Harvey Rasch were re-elected to four-year terms on Hale Area Board of Education and Frederick Wallace was elected to a two-year term to fill a vacancy in Monday's school election.

A proposal to pay salaries to the board of education, rather than the present method of paying on a per diem basis, was defeated by voters, 66-62.

Wallace received 78 votes in defeating Grace Smith. He had served about two months on the board of education after being appointed to replace Ann Stricker, who retired earlier in the spring.

Phelps Upsets Incumbent; Smith Elected at W-P

Mrs. Ilene Phelps was elected to a four-year term and Mrs. Lillian Smith was named to a one-year term to fill a vacancy in Monday's annual election at Whittemore-Prescott Area School. There were 146 ballots cast in the election.

Mrs. Phelps had 77 votes to defeat two other candidates, Mrs. Ceila Perrin, incumbent, and Dale Snyder. Mrs. Perrin had 41 votes and Snyder had 25 votes.

Mrs. Smith compiled 120 votes to defeat Gavain Teuscher, who had 20 votes.

Adopt Union Representative at Hale School

United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO, CLC has been certified as the bargaining agent for all custodial and bus driver employees at the Hale Area Schools.

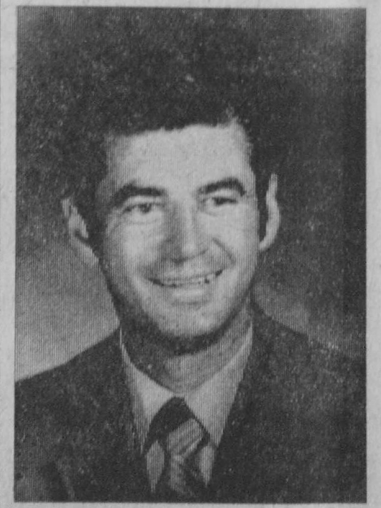
Secret ballot election was conducted in Hale by an agent of the Michigan Department of Labor employment relations commission and the vote was 14 for representation by steelworkers and one for no union. Two ballots were challenged by the union.

The organizing campaign was conducted from the Bay City Steelworkers, District No. 29 suboffice, by Donald E. Taft, who was assisted by an in-plant committee and Charles Deyarmond, United Steelworkers of America, Local Union No. 7652 president. Negotiating committee will be elected Thursday, June 14, 7:00 p. m., in the Hale Fire Hall.

Negotiations for a first labor agreement may follow soon afterwards.

McIntosh Named Ogemaw Supt.

Bill McIntosh, former assistant principal at Tawas Area High School and principal at Ogemaw Heights High School for the past

two years, was signed to a three-year contract Monday night as Ogemaw Heights' new superintendent. He was one of four candidates considered for the position.

McIntosh is to replace Supt. Chester Surline, 60, who retires after serving 24 years as a superintendent in Ogemaw County.

During his 14 years at Tawas Area High School, which began in 1956, McIntosh served 12 years as head basketball coach and had been junior varsity football coach at one time. He retired from coaching in 1968, after his team won its fourth district championship, to become Tawas Area's athletic director and assistant principal.

Since moving to Ogemaw Heights, McIntosh and his family have continued to reside at their home on Monument Road northwest of the Tawas. He said recently that he expects to move to the Ogemaw Heights School District in the near future.

Buckley - Kellogg Team Sets New Time Record for Tawas Canoe Race

Secretariat has nothing over John Buckley of Mt. Pleasant and Jeff Kellogg of Twin Lake, except for the size of the winning purse. The amazing colt won Saturday's Belmont by 31 lengths, while the two veteran paddlers acted like colts in winning Sunday's Tawas River canoe race by about the same distance.

Buckley and Kellogg jumped ahead of a 19-team professional field at Tawas Lake and showed their stern to the remainder of the pack in setting a new record time of 51 minutes, 12 seconds, for the 10-mile paddling race.

For their efforts Buckley and Kellogg won first prize of \$250, the largest slice of the record \$1,000 purse shared by the top 10 teams in the 20th annual running of the race. Tawas Chamber of Commerce and the Central Northeastern Michigan Sports Committee paid prize money approximating \$100 per mile.

After the leaders jumped off to a tremendous lead in Tawas Lake, main attention of spectators lining bridges along the route was the battle for the next three places. Finishing only seconds apart at the Tawas City Park were Bill Aynes of Sheridan and Cecil Lame of Flint, second place, 52 minutes, 56 seconds; Don Burkland of Milford and Bob Proulx of Union Lake, 52 minutes, 57 seconds; Darwin Gilbert of Lansing and Bole Welsh of Southgate, 52 minutes, 58 seconds.

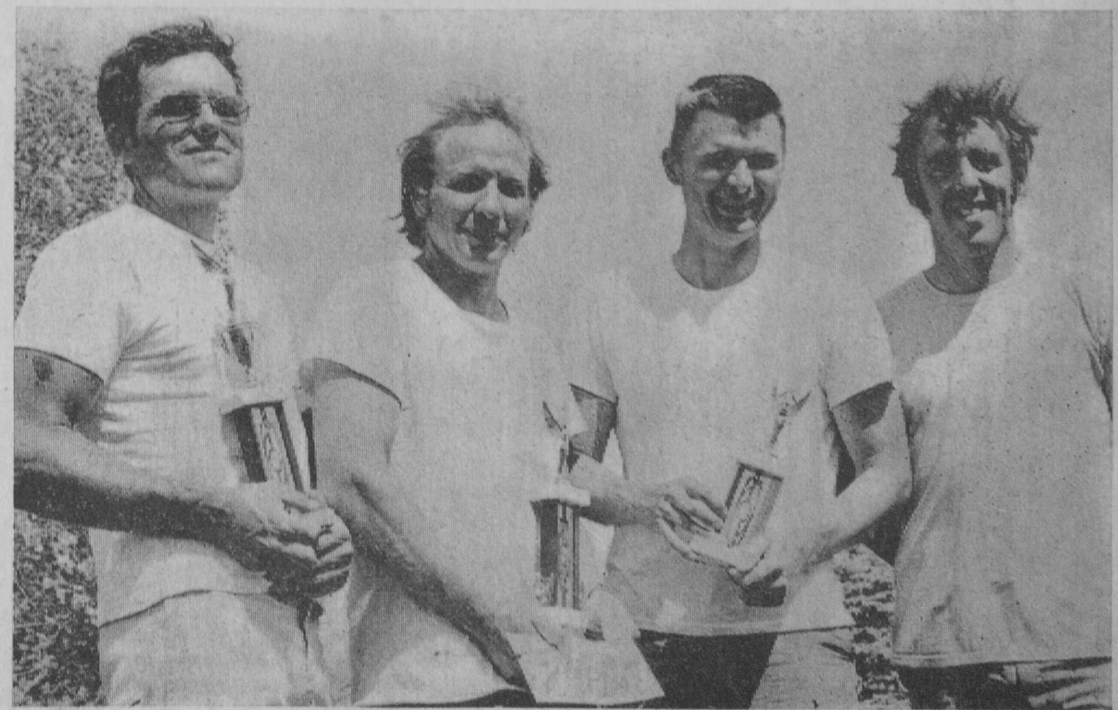
Finish for the next three places was just as exciting, with Butch Stockton of Roscommon and Jack Kolka of Pinconning finishing in fifth place with a time of 53 minutes, 48 seconds; Verlen Kruger of DeWitt and Terry Norris of Bath finishing in sixth place in 53 minutes, 52 seconds; Ron Schram of Holt and Roger Miller of Lansing finished in seventh place with a time of 53 minutes, 55 seconds.

The final three places finishing in the money were Dennis Bowdler of Rockwood and Bill Kellogg of Belleville, 54 minutes, 52 seconds; Ed Adams of Fenton and Roy Widding of Holly, 55 minutes, 39 seconds; Jay Stephan and Dave Wyss of Grayling, 56 minutes, 14 seconds.

A total of 16 teams finished the race and three teams were swamped in Tawas Bay. Although weather conditions were perfect for the race, the first time in several years, paddlers had to negotiate 2 1/2-foot waves rolling toward shore. The three teams which did not finish the race were picked up by patrol boats of the United States Coast Guard and Iosco Sheriff's Department about 200 yards off shore and southwest of the city park dock.

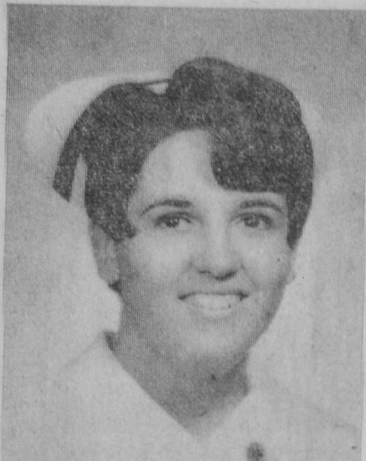

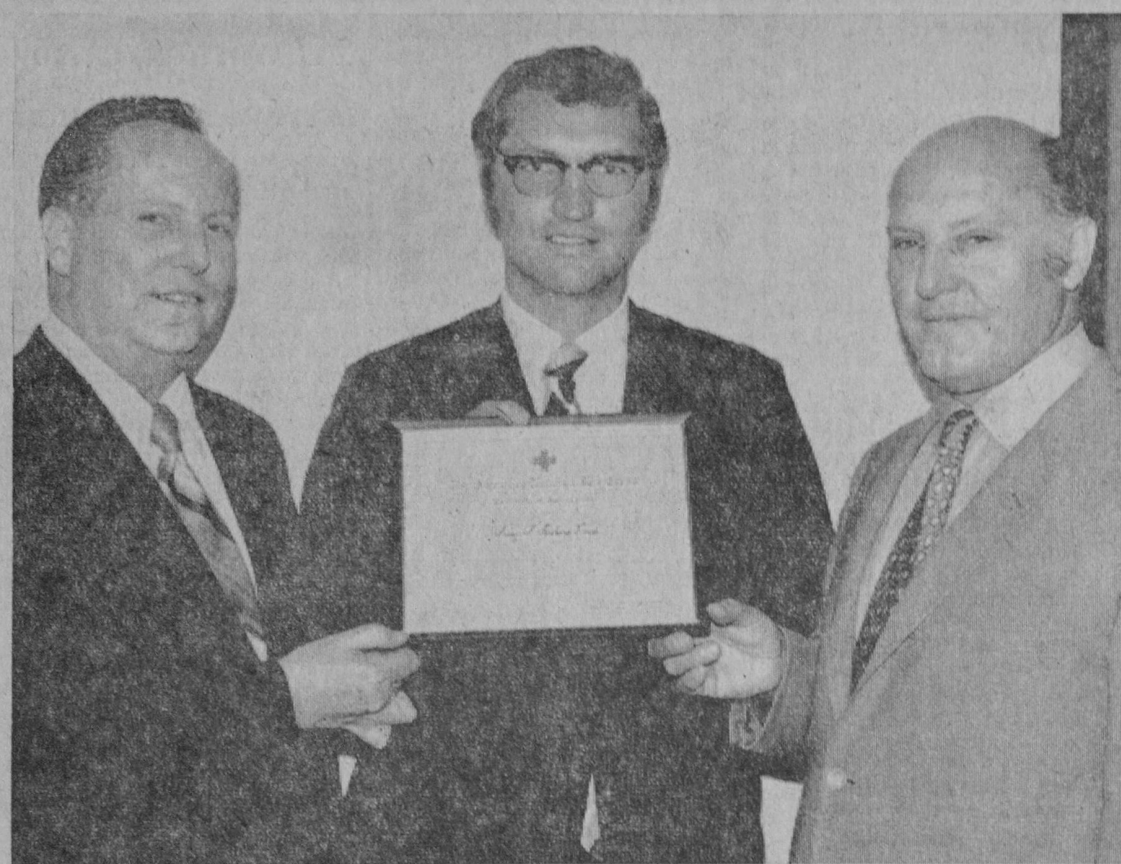

Ahearne's death was the second auto fatality in Iosco County during 1973.

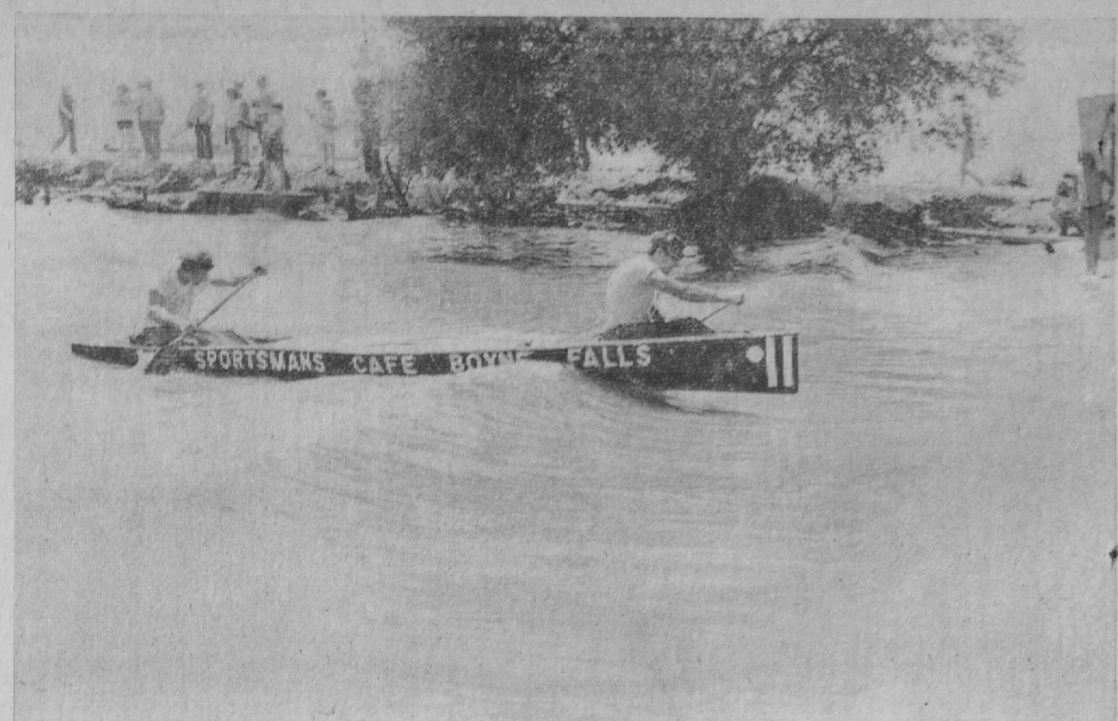

Club Plants Tree in ET Memorial Strip

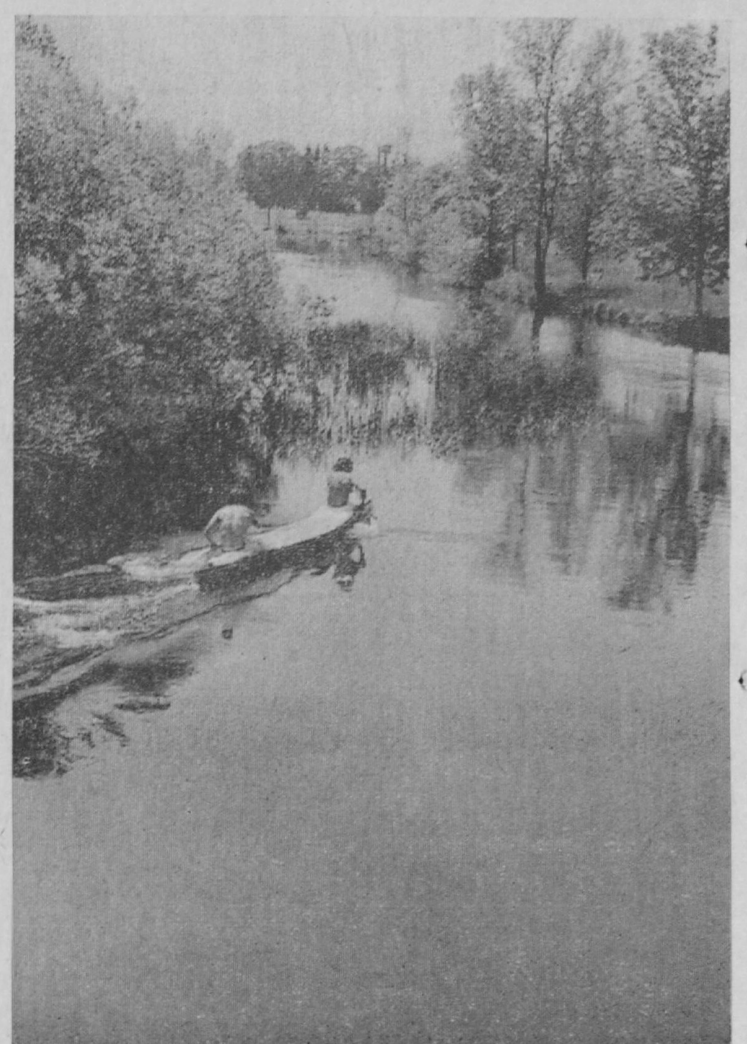
Fourteen members and two guests of the East Tawas Garden Club met in the garden at the home of Mrs. Frank Wilkusi Monday, June 11.

Guidelines for Shoreline Control to be Outlined at June 26 Meeting

A two-hour meeting concerning new Michigan laws and guidelines for shoreline protection control is to be held Tuesday, June 26, 7:30 p. m., at

the East Tawas Community Building. All persons interested in shoreline protection for Iosco and adjoining counties are urged to attend.

Marvin Davenport, county extension director, who is local coordinator of the meeting for the Bureau of Water Management for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, reports that the meeting is one of a series being held throughout the state to give citizens, public agencies and officials the opportunity to review a set of tentative guidelines concerning a unified soil erosion and sedimentation control program.

"As you know," states Davenport, "there has been significant shoreline damage this past year. Citizens, local officials and contractors have been trying to cope with this problem."

"Telling the people that they built or bought property in the wrong location does not seem to satisfy them. So, the Bureau of Water Management (DNR) has asked us to help them meet with all of you."

In 1972, the Michigan Legislature enacted Public Law 347, commonly known as the Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Act. The act provides that after June 30, 1974, a person, firm, corporation, partnership or association shall not maintain or undertake a land use or earth change covered by this act, subsequent rules or by local ordinance without a permit approved by the appropriate county or local enforcing agency.

A person violating this subsection is guilty of a misdemeanor. The act provides, also, that a county is responsible for the administration and

enforcement of the rules throughout the county, except within a city, village or charter township that has a plan. Certain public agencies may be authorized to enforce the act. Persons engaged in agriculture pursuits are exempt from provisions of the act until January 1, 1979.

In accordance with the act, the Michigan Department of Agriculture, with assistance of soil conservation districts and in cooperation with appropriate national, state and local agencies, by July 1, 1973, are to prepare a unified state-wide soil erosion and sedimentation control program.

This program is to: A. Identify land uses which may be governed by this act; B. Include recommendations, guidelines and specifications for the control of soil erosion to prevent water sedimentation; C. Set forth means by which agricultural practices shall, by January 1, 1979, be in compliance.

The Michigan Department of Agriculture has developed a tentative set of guidelines to carry out these three responsibilities. In order that they may be finalized, the department, with the assistance of the Michigan State University Cooperative Extension Service, is carrying out a series of public information meetings throughout the state.

Davenport said that copies of the guidelines are to be available at the meeting.

County Sanitary Landfill Up for Discussion Tonight

A meeting to discuss a county sanitary landfill is to be held tonight (Wednesday) at the Iosco County Building between county, township and city officials.

This action was taken last Wednesday by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners following a lengthy meeting with Larry Thornton, a representative of the environmental protection branch of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

Operation of a central landfill in this county has been under discussion for several years. Increasing operational costs to individual units maintaining landfills, as well as problems in meeting state regulations, is causing considerable concern to officials.

Thornton told commissioners that the county should invite all local units of government to participate in planning for a central landfill. A model ordinance is to be provided by the DNR representative.

It was stressed by the commission that it would be necessary to have a firm commitment from local units of government within the county to determine the desire of each unit concerning a central landfill.

A recommendation of the buildings and grounds committee to install carpeting in the new social services building under construction was denied. It was stated that the cost difference between installation of tile and carpeting was \$2,000 and the commission decided to proceed with the original plan for installing tile.

The commission authorized the county to assume the cost of renting temporary quarters for the department of social services at a rate of \$225 per month, plus the cost of utilities and moving.

Authorization was given by the commission to advertise for bids on carpeting the county building. The county building is now being renovated and the commission authorized major offices to close and operate on a standby basis during painting. Advance notice to the public is to be given.

On suggestion of Chairman Robert Foster, the buildings and grounds committee was directed to make a study to see what land would be required for expansion of the county airport and what arrangements could be made concerning a trade, option to purchase or purchase of the necessary land.

W. C. Roach, airport manager, appeared before the commission concerning updating of the airport map.

J. R. Smith, Osgoda commissioner, was of the opinion that the county would have to go to a vote of the people for permission to raise Iosco's share. He was of the opinion that any letter of intent concerning the cost of sharing should be conditional on approval of the people for the necessary millage. Smith was opposed, also, to an expenditure of \$4,200 for updating the master plan.

Authorization was given to Tawas Chamber of Commerce to use the county building on August 4-5 for the annual arts and crafts show.

The commission reserved from 10:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon on Wednesday, June 20, for a discussion on federal revenue sharing matters.

Authorization was given to purchase a boat and trailer from Jerry's Marina at a cost of \$1,200 and an outboard motor from J&M Marina at a cost of \$655. The appropriation is to be made from the marine enforcement account.

Interpretation of Odd Year Election Law Caused Problem

TC Council Declares Six Seats Vacant; Petitions Due June 19

It is now official—seats of the entire six-member Tawas City Council have been declared vacant for the 1973 primary and general elections.

Persons desiring to become candidates for the August primary election have until Tuesday, June 19, 4:00 p. m., to file nominating petitions at the city hall. The ward system was abolished under the 1972 city charter and all council members are to be elected at large.

In addition, a mayor is to be elected to a two-year term. Candidates desiring nominating petitions for positions of aldermen or mayor may obtain them at the city hall.

Following council action Wednesday night by which all six alderman posts were declared vacant for the next election, the council adopted a resolution specifying that the three alderman candidates receiving the largest number of votes in the November general election are to be elected to four-year terms; the next three alderman candidates receiving the largest number of votes are to be elected to the unexpired two-year terms.

A confusing situation relative to the length of terms of council members resulted through the city's decision to adopt the odd year election law in early 1971, followed by adoption of a new city charter effective January 3, 1972.

When the council chose to adopt the odd year election under a 1971 statute, rather than to hold an annual spring election, it was generally assumed that aldermen were elected to four-year terms in November of 1971, rather than for two years as was the case under the old Fourth Class City Act.

Councilmen elected by wards at that time were Clark Tanner, Chester Smyczynski and Robert N. Rollin. The other three aldermen whose terms expire at the end of this year are James Lansky, Edward Savage and William Groff Jr. All three were appointed to fill out unexpired terms of previous aldermen, either through resignation or death.

A question concerning the length of terms of the first three aldermen arose several weeks ago and the council asked City Atty. Kenneth J. Myles to render an opinion. Myles said there was no provision in the odd year election law extending

terms on city councils from two to four years.

"Inasmuch as this is the first election under the new city charter, presently elected councilmen were elected for two-year terms," said Myles in a letter read at Wednesday night's meeting. He pointed out, too, that the city charter provides for four-year terms.

Myles said that one section of the charter provides that: "The elected officers of the city who hold office on the effective date shall continue to hold the offices to which they were elected for the balance of the terms to which they were elected."

The city attorney said that Section 14.4a makes it clear that the charter did not intend to extend any elected officials' term of office beyond that to which he was elected. "Under the Fourth Class City Act, all councilmen were elected for two-year terms; therefore, it would appear that the existing councilmen must all stand for election," said Myles.

He said the charter, however, adds some confusion by providing that at the regular city election to be held in 1973, "there shall be elected a mayor and three councilmen. The mayor shall be elected for a term of two years and the councilmen shall be elected for terms of four years."

Myles said that the charter provides that city elections be held in accordance with the odd year election law and further provides for staggered terms for councilmen; it provides that the term of office for each councilman be four years and that at each regular city election there shall be elected, at large, three councilmen.

After review of charter provisions, Myles said: "It would appear that it was the intent of the charter that

the first election to be held under the new city charter would result in the mayor and all councilmen being elected; three councilmen for two-year terms, along with the mayor, and three councilmen for four-year terms. Thereafter, only three councilmen would be elected, along with the mayor, at each odd year election."

The charter makes no provision for extending terms of elected officers beyond the period to which elected by the people. City officials were concerned over the lack of

wording in the odd year election law concerning changing terms from two to four years for three aldermen elected in 1971, despite the assumption at the time that they were being elected to four-year terms.

It was pointed out that future bond issues or legal action by the council would be jeopardized should any court action determine that aldermen were not legally elected. This was the principal reason for the council's declaration that all council posts were vacant for the next election.

Solar Eclipse During June

In addition to summer, the month of June will bring the second longest total solar eclipse and a constellation that actually resembles the figure it is named after, according to Hazel M. Losh, University of Michigan astronomer.

She says this year's summer will officially begin at 9:01 a. m. (Eastern Daylight Time) Thursday, June 21.

"The sun has been climbing north since December and on June 21 it will reach its most northerly point," Professor Losh notes. Known as the summer solstice, this event produces our longest day, 15 hours, and shortest night, nine hours.

The new moon occurring on the 30th is especially significant because it will create a total solar eclipse at 7:39 a. m. EDT.

"Although not visible from northern latitudes—the totality path cuts across central Africa—this eclipse is astronomically important because of its long duration of seven minutes and four seconds," the Michigan as-

tronomer notes. She explains that the longest possible total solar eclipse is seven minutes and 30 seconds. In an interval of 1,433 years, the eclipse of the 30th ties for second place in length.

The outstanding constellation of the summer months is Scorpius, which rises in the southeast just after sunset. The scorpion is easily identified as a line of stars curving up like a giant fishhook.

"Unlike many other constellations, Scorpius actually looks something like the figure it is supposed to represent," Professor Losh says. She also observes that Antares, the bright red star in the heart of Scorpius, means "rival of mars."

"Other planets of June include Venus, which is fast becoming the 'evening star' in the west, and Jupiter, which will be rising in the southeast around midnight and shining through until dawn. On June 15, Saturn comes into conjunction with the sun and this will be completely lost to view," Professor Losh concluded.

It was moved by Savage, seconded by Lansky, that all six (6) councilmen posts be declared vacant for the next election. Carried.

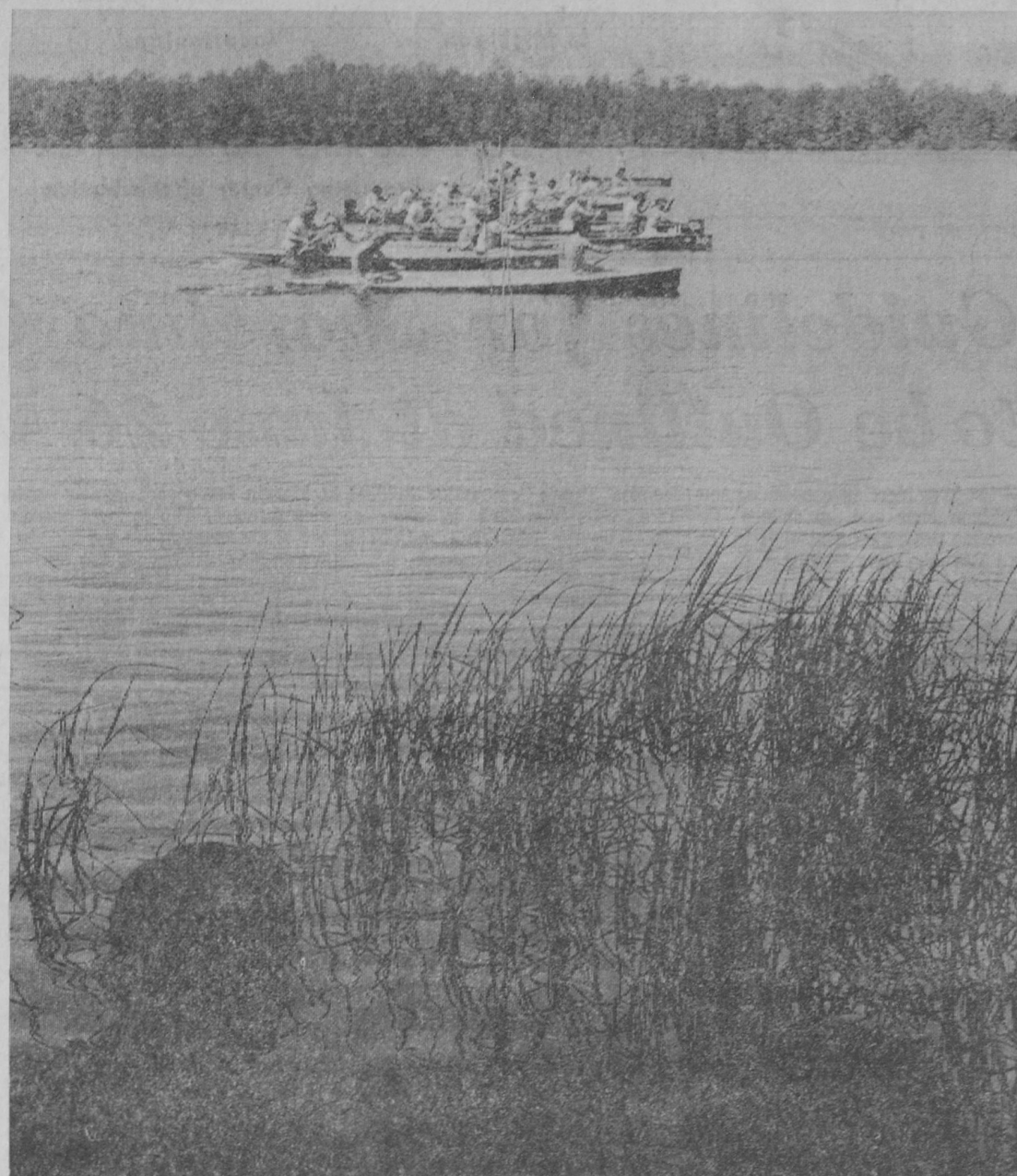
The method of electing the councilmen for four (4) year terms and those for two (2) year terms was discussed at length.

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Family Living Education

Too soon June? Not if you are young and waiting impatiently for school to let out.

Not too soon if you are planning a June wedding.

Way too soon if you are one of the homemakers who had planned to have all her housecleaning done by June 1.

Too soon if you are planting your garden. The warm weather which brings May flowers did not materialize in many areas. Other areas are flooded. Some need more June to right the wrongs of the weather last month.

As far as food prices are concerned, June really is not going to make much difference. This is the word from consumer marketing agents.

Meat prices are apt to stay at or near the ceiling during the summer. Incidentally, that big list of prices posted in the meat department of your store is the ceiling price, not this week's specials. Should the ceiling be lifted, meat prices would undoubtedly climb much higher. People will eat meat no matter what the price.

Traditional better buys in beef during hot summer months are the forequarter cuts that take long cooking time if you do not mind spending extra hours in your kitchen.

Eggs are predicted to go up two to five cents a dozen in June with retail hanging around 63 to 65 cents for Grade A large. Medium size will be almost that. Remember, if there is less than eight cents difference in cost of large and medium, the large eggs are the better buy.

Broiler and turkey prices are way up as compared with a year ago, in the 59 to 79-cent range.

There should be some fresh fruit coming in from the south but this could well have been destroyed in the recent wind, rain or tornado assault.

I never thought I would see the day when a head of lettuce would cost me 59 cents. The weatherman is partially to blame. Sure makes the sorrel, chives and lettuce seedlings in the garden worth something.

All processed fruits and vegetables are in short supply. The stores are hard put to find any to feature. Price on frozen orange juice concentrate has been the most stable and actually a bargain. Fruits to be featured

Benefits For Blind Persons Are Expanded

Question: My daughter, who is blind, applied for social security disability benefits but was denied because she had not worked in the last six years. However, she had worked long enough to qualify for retirement benefits when she is 62. Have there been any changes whereby she might qualify for benefits now?

Answer: Yes. A person who is blind need now only be fully insured to qualify for disability benefits. You should contact the nearest social security office for further information.

Question: How long does a person have to wait before disability benefits are payable?

Answer: There is a five-month waiting period before disability benefits are payable. No payments can be made for this five-month waiting period.

Question: Will our disabled son, age 23, be eligible for social security benefits if my husband should die or retire?

Answer: A child disabled before age 22 can qualify for benefits on an entitled parent's record should one of the parents die, retire or become disabled.

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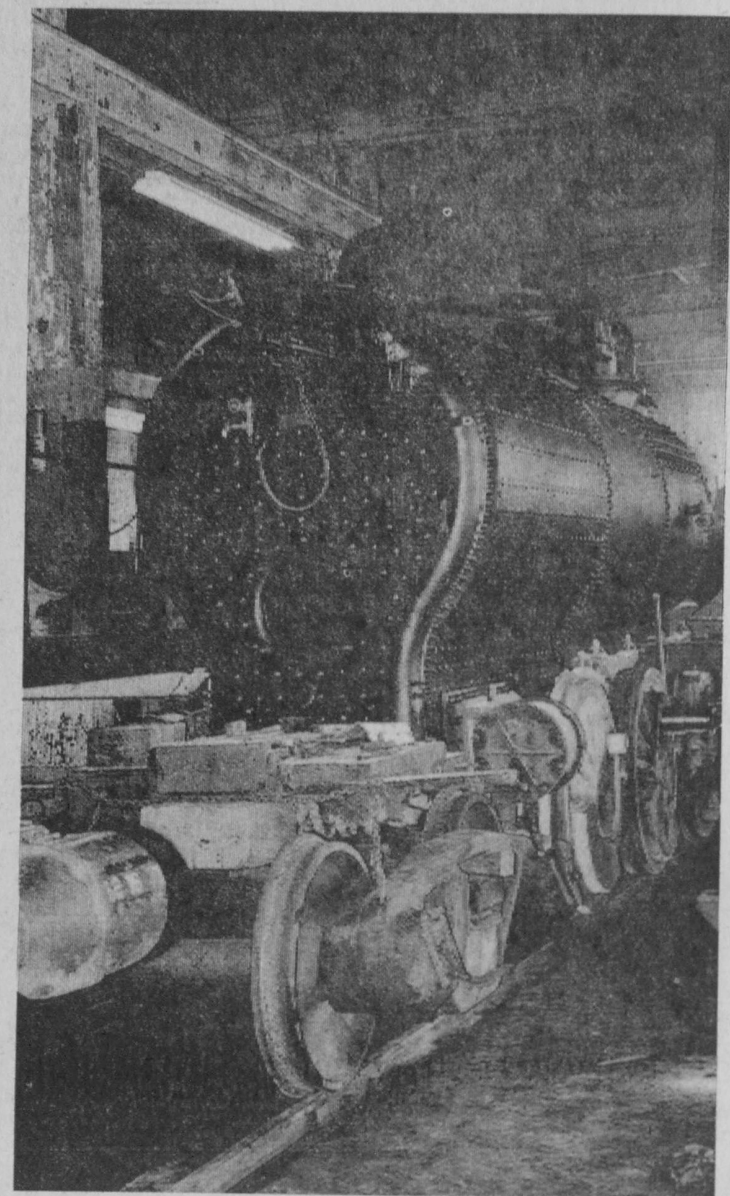
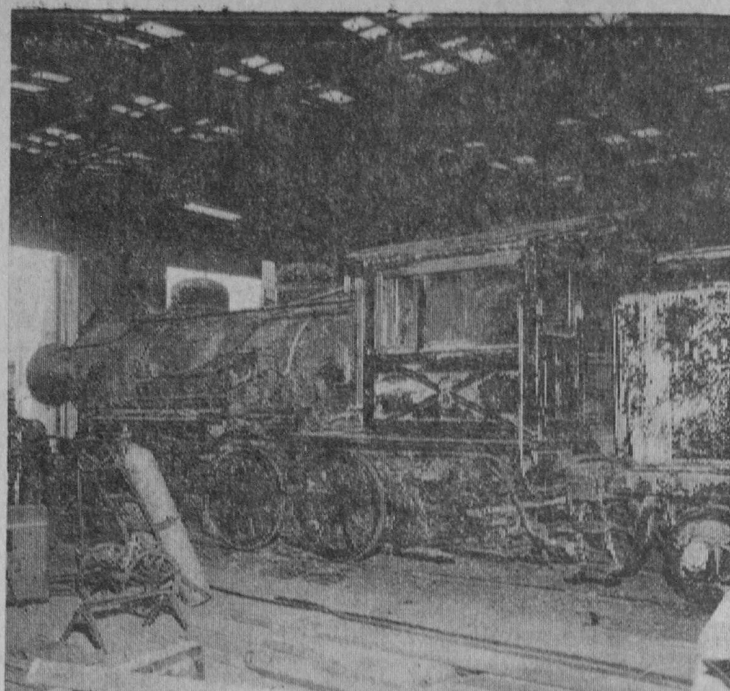
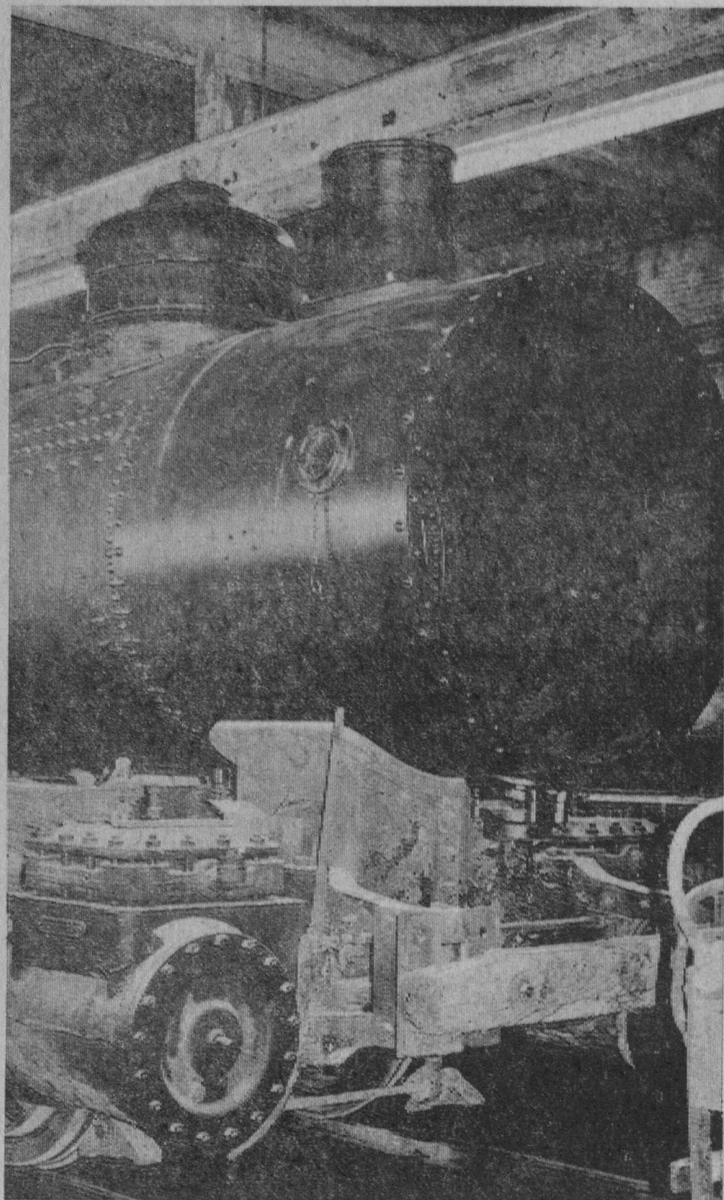

The center will open for public viewing from 2:00 to 4:00 p. m., with Clyde Saper, president of the Iosco County Senior Citizens Council, intro-

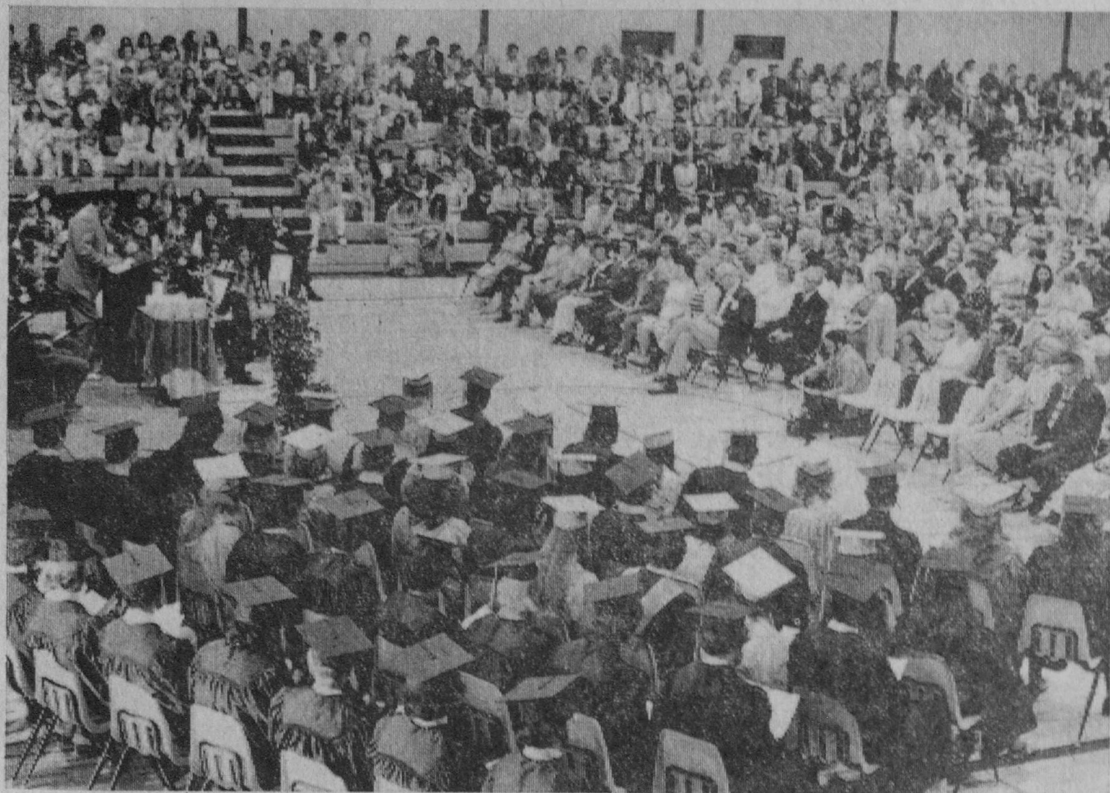
