## Miss Otis' Book Tells of Tawas' 'Sawdust Days'

"When I began thinking about writing a book on Iosco's history more than 50 years ago, I often dreamed of seeing the title and my name stamped in gold on a maroon cover—my wish finally came true."

The book, "Sawdust Days—When the Tawas Area Was Young," goes on sale this week. And printed on the spine of the cover is the name of the author, Miss Edna Otis of East Tawas. As an added touch, the figure of a woodsman with axe in hand is printed in gold on one corner of the front cover.

Although she began compiling information and writing chapters for her book years ago, because of an active life as a newspaper editor-publisher and later as an antique dealer, Miss Otis never got around to finishing the book until last summer. Since delivering the completed manuscript to the printer last fall, she has waited patiently to see the end result.

The first two copies of the 500-copy privately-printed edition arrived Thursday of last week and she was pleased beyond words. The printer, John Cumming, director of Clarke Historical Library at Central Michigan University, arrived Monday with the remainder.

Cumming and Miss Otis have been friends for years and, when she mentioned that she was "looking around for a publisher," the busy college library director at Mt. Pleasant suggested that he might be able to help her. Cumming has printed a

number of books in his basement print shop as a hobby, but handling a 90-page book on a hand-fed press is no small undertaking. The type was set by a commercial printer, and, after correction, it was assembled into pages and Cumming spent his week-ends during the winter and spring at his press. Binding of the attractive book was completed only last week at Grand Rapids.

Guiding the project locally and preparing a "photo album" for the book was Neil Thornton, while L. G. (Ladd) McKay and Peoples State Bank financed the publication.

Once designated as the official county historian by the old Iosco Board of Supervisors, Miss Otis was born in Baldwin Township, the daughter of Helen N. and Sara Johnson Otis, who came to this county in the late 1860s from New York State.

Following her graduation from the East Tawas Public Schools, she was employed at the Iosco County Gazette, then taught two years in district schools of the county before returning to newspaper work.

In 1916, she became editor of the Gazette. "During the 30 years that followed," states her biography in the book, "she had access to old newspaper files; county, township and city records and interviewed scores of pioneers. Coupled with the memories that every individual files in the 'Memory Notebook,' is a wealth of information, much of it which is available to no one but herself, and could be easily written into a compilation of historical facts and homespun incidents."

## Radio Grant Considered for Iosco County

The Michigan Office of Criminal Justice Programs will announce June 26 a number of grant awards to finance projects designed to reduce crime and improve justice in Michigan.

Grants to be considered in this area is one of \$15,577 requested to improve police communications in Iosco County.

According to George Westcott, Iosco County sheriff, the grant would purchase a new radio console to be installed at the county jail, new radios for patrol cars and six new portable radios. Westcott said that the portables would provide officers with instant communication with the county jail when they leave patrol cars.

The announcement will come at a grant award conference in the Michigan Department of Highways Building, Lansing. Grants are awarded on the basis of applications from local units of government and state agencies. Iosco County filed its application in December.

Authorizing approval of the grants will be Gov. William G. Milliken.

## Primary Has Races

In what should be one of the hottest political campaigns in Tawas City's history, 13 candidates filed for the six seats on the city council and there are three candidates for mayor, thus assuring a city primary election on Tuesday, August 7.

All six incumbent councilmen, along with seven opponents, filed petitions prior to Tuesday afternoon's deadline. Incumbents filing were William L. Groff, Edward Savage, Robert N. Rollin, Chester Smyczynski, James Lansky and Clark Tanner.

Other candidates filing were Russell Carney, William Ezo, Russell E. Pierce, Jack Johnson, Robert W. Pawloski, Jerry Snoblen and Reginald Look Sr.

John N. Brugger filed his petition for a second term as mayor. Opposing him will be Vincent Beam Sr. and Mrs. Mildred DeBeau, who was an unsuccessful candidate for mayor in the 1971 primary election.

The ward system was abolished under the 1972 city charter and all council members are to be elected at large.

Due to confusion concerning the length of terms of council members, resulting through the city's decision to adopt the odd year election law in early 1971, followed by adoption of a new city charter effective January 3, 1972, the council declared two weeks ago that all seats were vacant for the upcoming election.

On advice of the city attorney, who checked with state election officials and the attorney general's office, the three councilmen with the largest number of votes in the November election will receive four-year terms, while the next three candidates will have two-year terms. In the future, only three council vacancies will exist in each election every two years.

With 13 candidates filing for alderman posts in the primary election, the 12 with the largest number of votes will be candidates in the November election. The two persons receiving the largest number of votes for mayor will be candidates on the November ballot.

## More Than Half of County's Acreage is Publicly Owned

Iosco County has 126,079 acres of public, tax-free federal and state land, as compared to 119,000 acres of privately-owned land, according to a report this week from Lansing.

"How many people know that we receive the munificent sum of eight cents per acre per year for the national forest acreage and the huge sum of 20 cents per acre on the state-owned acreage?" asks State Rep. George Prescott of Tawas City.

"The above figures should be of interest to county commissioners. When you put these figures alongside the ad valorem rate we pay on privately-owned property, who has it made in the shade?" asks Prescott.

According to the local representative, the total does not include state-purchased lands which are already on the tax rolls at supposedly the ad valorem rate. A flat rate of \$2 per acre is charged under the Wilderness Bill.

Prescott said that 366,971 acres of federal lands presently yield only \$29,357.68 annually in his district. This includes the land in Iosco, 101,181 acres in Alcona, 143,149 acres in Oscoda County and 19,903 acres in Ogemaw County. There are no federal forest lands in Gladwin or Arenac Counties.

State lands now yield to local governments in his district \$51,219. Besides Iosco's state acreage listed above, Alcona has 7,060 acres, Oscoda County has 53,469 acres, Gladwin County has 76,588 acres, Arenac County has 26,455 acres and Ogemaw County has 69,167 acres.

## TC Parking Lane Work to Resume

Approval of a permit to move two power poles in the city park, along with awarding of a construction contract Monday night, should see the immediate resumption of work on completing a 43-car parking lane along US-23.

proceed with moving the poles to a new location.

At the suggestion of the council, the city manager is to study the possibility of sodding the slope between the new curb and the city park.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the project should be completed before the arts and crafts festival in early August, depending on weather. He reported Tuesday that the contractor is to go to work on the project next week and has estimated that the 110 yards of concrete work could be completed in 15 days.

Two concrete animals in the west end of the park are to be moved to the older section and the portion being vacated to be filled due to the high water table.

As a means of possibly enlarging future arts and crafts festivals, Ald. Chester Smyczynski suggested that a chamber of commerce officials should contact McKay Sales Company concerning utilization of its lake frontage east of the city park.

Davison and Sons, Incorporated, Tawas City, was low bidder on constructing a new curb for the parking lane and construction of a five-foot-wide sidewalk separating the parking lane from US-23.

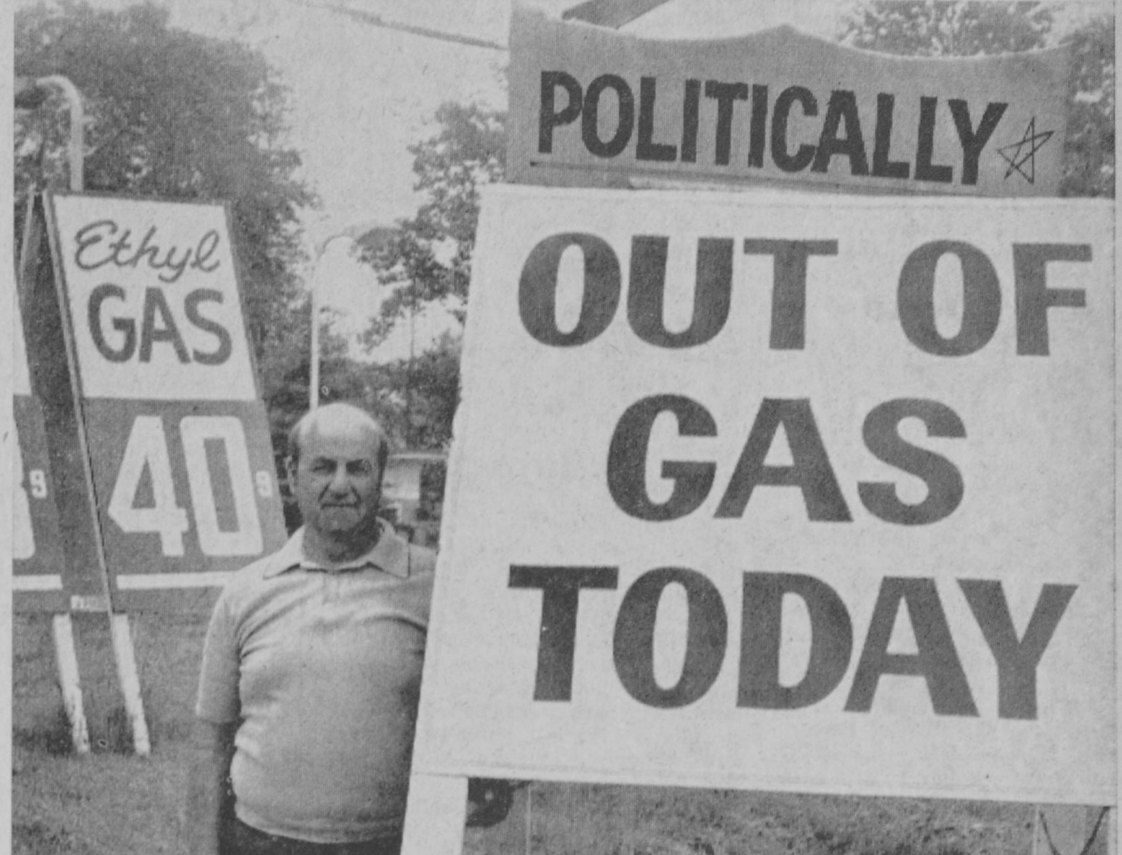
Davison entered a bid of \$7,998 for the work. The other bid received was from Eckstein Construction Company for \$11,853.53.

Work on the project, which is being financed through state, county and city funds, was started in April but was then delayed by the need for a permit from the department of state highways for moving two power poles on the state right-of-way. The permit was received last week and Consumers Power Company is to

Under Senate Bill No. 85, now in the house appropriations committee and passed by the senate, the return on state lands to local government would be increased to 50 cents per acre and 62 cents per acre in 1980. This would mean an increase of \$76,828.50 to local governments in 1974 and an increase of \$107,559.90 to local governments in 1980.

Under the present rate of 20 cents per acre, the state paid "swamp tax" of \$4,668.33 to schools and townships of Iosco County. Burleigh Township received \$6.01; Sherman Township, \$42.41; Alabaster Township, \$37.44; and Oscoda Township, \$858.65. Whittemore-Prescott Area School received \$420.75; Tawas Area School, \$1,070.25, and Oscoda Area School, \$2,232.82.

The federal government paid \$12,521.60 in "stump tax" to three school districts and the Iosco County Road Commission for its 102,738 acres in Iosco. The road commission received \$13,130.42, or 25 percent of the total; Tawas Area School received \$1,878.25, or 20 percent; Hale Area School, \$2,504.65, representing 26.67 percent, and Oscoda Area School District received \$5,008.37, or 53.33 percent of the total.

## Independent Dealer Says He'll be Out of Gas Soon

In the face of tightening gasoline supplies, Robert N. Rollin, an independent gasoline dealer in Tawas City, has his "out of gas" sign ready in the event his station runs out of its supply.

Rollin said Tuesday that his station pumped 98,000 gallons of gasoline a year ago this month. Because of the tightening of the crude petroleum supply to a refinery at West Branch, his quota of gasoline for June is 56,000 gallons and he had pumped 39,000 gallons of that quota as of yesterday.

"The West Branch refinery is doing everything in its power to keep me in business, but they just cannot get the crude oil," said Rollin.

He said that other independent stations in the area were feeling the pinch and it is reported that one station had closed at East Tawas.

Rollin said that it was hard for him to get the entire picture of the shortage of crude oil. While the cur-

rent problem may be compounded by many different problems—including ecological (greater gas consumption caused by required emission control devices on automobile engines and greater restrictions on refinery operation), plus increasing consumption of gasoline in this country due to the ever-increasing number of motor vehicles, Rollin believes that part of the problem may be politically motivated.

The Tawas City gasoline station operator believes that crude oil shipments from the Near East, where he worked on pipeline construction in Arabia and Saudi Arabia nearly 20 years ago and where such installations have since been nationalized, are being cut off or reduced at the source and the federal government is not giving a full explanation to the public.

He pointed out, too, that the increasing price on gasoline was probably justified due to the fact that until about three years ago, refiner-

ies had not increased prices in the face of inflation.

"I really do not see how all of these problems could have come into focus at once. A year ago, we had to have the volume to get a cheaper price to meet stiff competition and now the volume is gone. Yet, some of the major companies are still giving away stamps to get more business—I can't figure it out," said Rollin.

"I do not believe that the federal government will allow myself and other small independent gasoline dealers to be snuffed under," he stated.

Rollin said that during the last few summers, he annually hired 12 youngsters and one adult to pump gasoline at his two stations. "I am now down to three kids and I have closed one station," he stated.

"Never before have I been in a position where I can sell all the gasoline I can get."

## Freel Reports on Progress of Parking Lot Purchase

New legal technicalities in the proposed purchase of a private parking lot at East Tawas apparently have cropped up, but a report Monday night by City Atty. Michael Freel to the city council indicated that the matter appeared to be one of a minor nature.

Freel reported to the council that options on several parcels of land contained in the parking lot, located between Sawyer Street and the rear of stores facing Newman, had been obtained.

The city is acting as the agent for establishment of a proposed special assessment district to finance purchase of the property for public parking.

In other business, the council waived payment of any fees for transfer of a state liquor license held since 1971 by William J. Muehlen-

beck and LeBistro, Incorporated, located in Portsmouth Township, Bay County, and authorized transfer to the Holland Hotel, 101 Newman Street, East Tawas, as a class B hotel license.

Police Chief Donald Docking presented the resignation of David Foley as a city patrolman. The resignation was accepted with regret by the council. Foley, a resident of Oscoda, is to join the Oscoda-AuSable Township Police Department.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, reported that the city had expended approximately \$41,000 on its street paving program thus far this year.

The council authorized for bids on a new garbage removal contract. The contractor is to provide the

service of a compactor truck. The present contract with Edward Schanbeck expires in August. It was reported that a meeting is to be held with Tawas City shortly concerning a joint solid waste disposal program.

Building applications approved during the past two weeks included: Kennedy Bakery, Westover Street, install wrought iron fence around court; Edward Cain, 886 Wadsworth, erect fence; Vermont Chamberlin, 320 Lakewood Drive, install aluminum siding; George Hutchinson, 701 West State, install new roof; Vernon Wood, 929 Maple Drive, erect storage shed; William Leslie Jr., 580 Alice Street, construct new dwelling at \$23,000 and remodeling of another building, \$1,400. Moneys Stores, Incorporated, was issued a permit to remove a small building on its property.

## Council Hears Proposal to Use Private Landfill

A proposal to use a private landfill for disposal of Tawas City's garbage and trash at a one-year contract rate of \$5,500 was presented Monday night to the city council by W. C. Roach of the Multi-County Landfill on Monument Road.

Roach told councilmen that operation of landfills by governmental units in Iosco was presently in a "state of flux," due to new requirements by state agencies. He pointed out that present public landfills were having problems in meeting state requirements prohibiting burning and demands for daily backfilling.

The private landfill owner, who submitted a similar proposal to East Tawas several weeks ago, said his operation had been approved by the state. Roach, who attended three special schools sponsored by the state concerning landfill sanitation, told councilmen that he estimated his 16-acre site would handle area needs until 1990.

The Iosco County Board of Commissioners held a special meeting last week to consider a county sanitary landfill and a report from the county department of public works is to be considered at today's

(Wednesday) meeting of commissioners. County officials visited sanitary landfills being operated in Western Michigan.

Roach told councilmen that should the city accept his proposal and should the county landfill later become a reality, the contract with him could be voided. He believed, however, that regardless of what action county commissioners might take, it would be more than a year before a county landfill could go into operation. He said that plans must be approved by the department of

City officials said there was adequate room for both fishermen and boat operators to use the river. Youngsters are discouraged from swimming in the river and "no swimming" signs are to be posted on the city dock in front of the boat launching ramp.

## City Manager Cites Safety Need

School is out and it is "summer fun time" for youngsters. However, two dangerous situations were pointed out at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that he had received numerous complaints from motorists concerning operation of bicycles on city streets. Motorists have complained, said Bublitz, that youngsters riding bicycles are disregarding safety rules and some even showed a "defiance for motorists" by riding two or three abreast down the center of busy streets.

health and department of natural resources and his application required 18 months for processing.

He said his private operation was equipped with two bulldozers and a dragline and was capable of handling anything and everything from residential, commercial and industrial users, all to be included in the contract price.

On call of Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas, officials of the two cities are to meet soon concerning Roach's proposal. At the present time, the two communities operate a joint landfill on Monument Road.

He said that the only problem that could be encountered was the fact that private contractors were picking up trash and garbage outside of the Tawas and disposing of loads at the city landfill.

In other business at Monday night's meeting, the council approved an allocation of \$384 to the summer baseball program.

Enforcement of the city's weed ordinance was requested by Ald. William Groff Jr. The ordinance requires that vacant lots be mowed by owners.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that he had met with Sheriff George Westcott concerning utilization of city patrolmen in a program being coordinated by the sheriff's department.

Complaints have been received concerning the high rate of speed of cars in residential areas, particularly on streets which have just been blacktopped.

A petition signed by 27 property owners in the Bay Drive area requested that a tennis-basketball court be constructed on the city-owned Lot 20 of Crocker Park Subdivision.

As a result of the above request, the council is to study the possibility of constructing tennis-basketball courts at alternate locations in the city.

Council Approves Additional Expense on Retaining Wall

An additional expenditure of \$2,951 for materials and labor to correct a problem encountered with the design and construction of a retaining wall on the west bank of the Tawas River along Ninth Avenue was authorized Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

The supplier of materials for the project had believed it would not be necessary to have cables reinforcing piling driven into the river bottom. However, due to higher water this spring, piling could not be driven to the proper depth and a portion of the retaining wall buckled during backfilling operations.

The wall has been straightened

and the problem corrected by attaching a steel cable on every third piling and running it to a "deadhead" in the river bank.

After backfilling is completed, a layer of crushed rock is to be placed as a walkway for fishermen along the retaining wall.

The city manager reports that the total expenditure for construction of the retaining wall, including the additional bill, is \$9,700. The project was partially financed through a \$3,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources.

According to the city manager, bills totaling \$51,826 for the 1973

blacktopping program have been received. Two other bills for gravel from the county and one private contractor involved in site preparation and hauling materials are yet to be received.

Actual cost of blacktopping by Central Paving Company was \$35,647. The firm is to return later this summer to complete First Street, Mathews Street and Ninth Avenue.

The city has committed its revenue sharing funds for two years, totaling approximately \$73,000, to a street blacktopping program.

The council is to hold a special meeting Wednesday night to study the 1973 budget to determine what sealcoating work on other city streets could be accomplished this year.

Ald. Edward Savage pointed out that this was the last year for the three-mill tax levy for bridge construction, adopted two years ago by the council, and suggested that an advisory ballot be included in the November election to determine if the people wished to continue this special levy for more bridges and new street construction.

# 'Sailing Summer' on Bay Anticipated by Yacht Club

According to L. G. (Ladd) McKay, Tawas businessman and yachting devotee of many years, 1973 should be long remembered as a "sailing summer" on Tawas Bay.

Long recognized as one of the finest bodies of water in the nation for holding sailing regattas and the site of past North American meets, Tawas Bay will be the site of four major sailboat regattas starting this month. In addition, a major power boat meet will be held here in early August.

The four major sailing regattas scheduled include the Tawas Bay Memorial Race on June 30-July 1, the Michigan District Lightning championship regatta on July 6, 7 and 8, the North American Lightning Regatta on August 17-23 and the National One Design regatta on August 4-5. Coordinating all of the sailboat

regattas, which will attract upwards of 200 craft, is the Tawas Bay Yacht Club with McKay as racing chairman. Plans for handling the large number of skippers, crews and their families have been made during the winter and spring months and the necessary work involved has been extensive, according to Charles Schreck, chairman of regattas for TBYC.

Assisting Schreck in directing the various committees have been Gary Demerest and Gary Cameron, TBYC members with extensive sailing backgrounds.

The first major event of the summer will be the Tawas Bay Memorial Race on June 30-July 1, in which more than 200 craft in Mackinac and Midget Ocean Racing Classes will be competing for the Jack Lappin Trophy. The trophy honors one of the

original sponsors of this race from Alpena, who has since deceased. Originally scheduled for June 23-24, the date was changed only last week due to a conflict with a race at Alpena.

Although spectators get only a brief view of the start of the race off the East Tawas City Park, it is one of the most exciting events of the season for the crews. The overnight race course is from Tawas Bay to the Port Austin buoy, where boats turn and return to AuSable Point, then turn again and sail to the No. 5 buoy near Charity Islands and return to the finish line at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

The race is scheduled to start at 2:00 p. m. and ends anywhere from 2:00 a. m. to 2:00 p. m. the next day, depending on weather conditions. These class A and B racing cruisers,

ranging from 27 to 46 feet in length, offer spectacular viewing and great picture possibilities for spectators lining the dock.

Race chairman is John W. Sutton, who with his wife, Sue, and crew won the 1972 race in his "Sea Fever." Sutton sold this 39-footer two weeks ago to a "Detroit to Mackinac" racer and he hopes to have a new boat in time for the 1973 event.

Other new boats from Tawas Bay Yacht Club entering this year's race include Buzz Bowman in his 30-footer, sloop-rigged PT Mark III; Bob Driver, in a 41-foot Rhodes yawl; Clarence Holman, past North American Lightning Class champion, who has a new 29-foot Columbia.

Despite the five new boats in the Tawas Bay fleet, Alpena sailors are expected to dominate this year's Tawas Bay Memorial Race. Eleven boats are expected from Thunder Bay and skippers from Alpena won second and third places last year.

This is a handicap race in which corrected time is used to determine the final winner, thus equalizing the variance in the length of the different boats.

An awards banquet is to be held at 3:00 p. m. Sunday, July 1, at Tawas Bay Yacht Club.

This year marks the 25th anniversary of Tawas Bay's Lightning Class fleet and Tawas Bay Yacht Club will be host to 40 boats in the Michigan District Lightning championship on July 6, 7 and 8, as well as hosting more than 100 boats for the North American Lightning Championship, August 17-24.

This will be the third time that Tawas Bay has hosted the North American event, which is to follow this year's world event in the Lightning Class to be held at Buffalo, New York. William McKinley and Demerest represented TBYC in last year's North American race held in New Jersey and were among the top 15 qualifiers for the world's championship race to be held August 6-16 at Buffalo. About 50 boats are expected to be entered there.

Although exact course locations depend on wind conditions at the start of each of the 29 races in the North American, McKay said that one leg of the triangular course would be in full view of the Michigan Waterways Dock and every effort would be made to locate starting and finishing flags in view of shore-side spectators.

Along with the National One Design sailing regatta, a power boat event will feature the Michigan Tourist Festival on August 4-5.

# Iosco Schools Adopt Uniform Calendar for 1973-74 Term

holiday. School re-opens Wednesday, January 2. The first semester ends Friday, January 11, and students will attend school half days on January 10-11.

School will be closed from April 12-21 for Easter vacation. There will be no school on Memorial Day, Monday, May 27.

Tuesday, June 4, will be the last

day of school for students and Wednesday, June 5, will be the last day of school for teachers. Graduation ceremonies are to be held on Sunday, June 2.

According to the schedule, there will be 181 days of school for students and 184 days for teachers. The schedule allows for parent-teacher conferences in the fall and spring.

# Widower Not on SS May Get Benefits

Question: I am a 58-year-old widower and I have been unable to work for the past nine years. I have never worked under social security. However, my wife did work all her life in jobs covered by social security. Can I get monthly social security payments on my wife's work record?

Answer: If you were dependent on your wife for one-half your support when she died, you may start getting monthly payments as a widower at 60. Or, if you are severely disabled, you may be able to get benefits before you are 60. You should get in touch with your social security office to see if you are eligible for benefits based on your disability.

Question: I am 64 and I have been getting monthly social security disability payments for nearly three years. I heard that disability payments are not made to people after 65. Since my payments are a big part of my income, what will I do when I turn 65?

Answer: You will continue to get payments after you are 65, but they will be retirement benefits rather than disability. The only change is that the payments come from a different social security trust fund. The switch-over will be automatic and will not cause any interruption in your monthly checks.

Question: Will medicare coverage for the disabled be the same as the medicare coverage now provided for people 65 and older?

Answer: Yes, the only difference is in the requirement for getting medicare coverage. Disabled people must have been getting monthly social security disability payments for 24 consecutive months. There is a special provision for people who need a kidney transplant or dialysis.

Question: I am totally disabled and get monthly social security checks. I understand I will get medicare coverage starting next month. My wife, who has never worked under social security and does not get monthly checks, is also totally disabled. Will she also be covered under medicare next month?

Answer: No. In your situation, only you, the disabled worker, will become eligible for medicare benefits next month. Recent changes in the law extend medicare protection to disabled workers, disabled widows and widowers aged 50 to 65, and certain other disabled people. Disabled wives are not included.

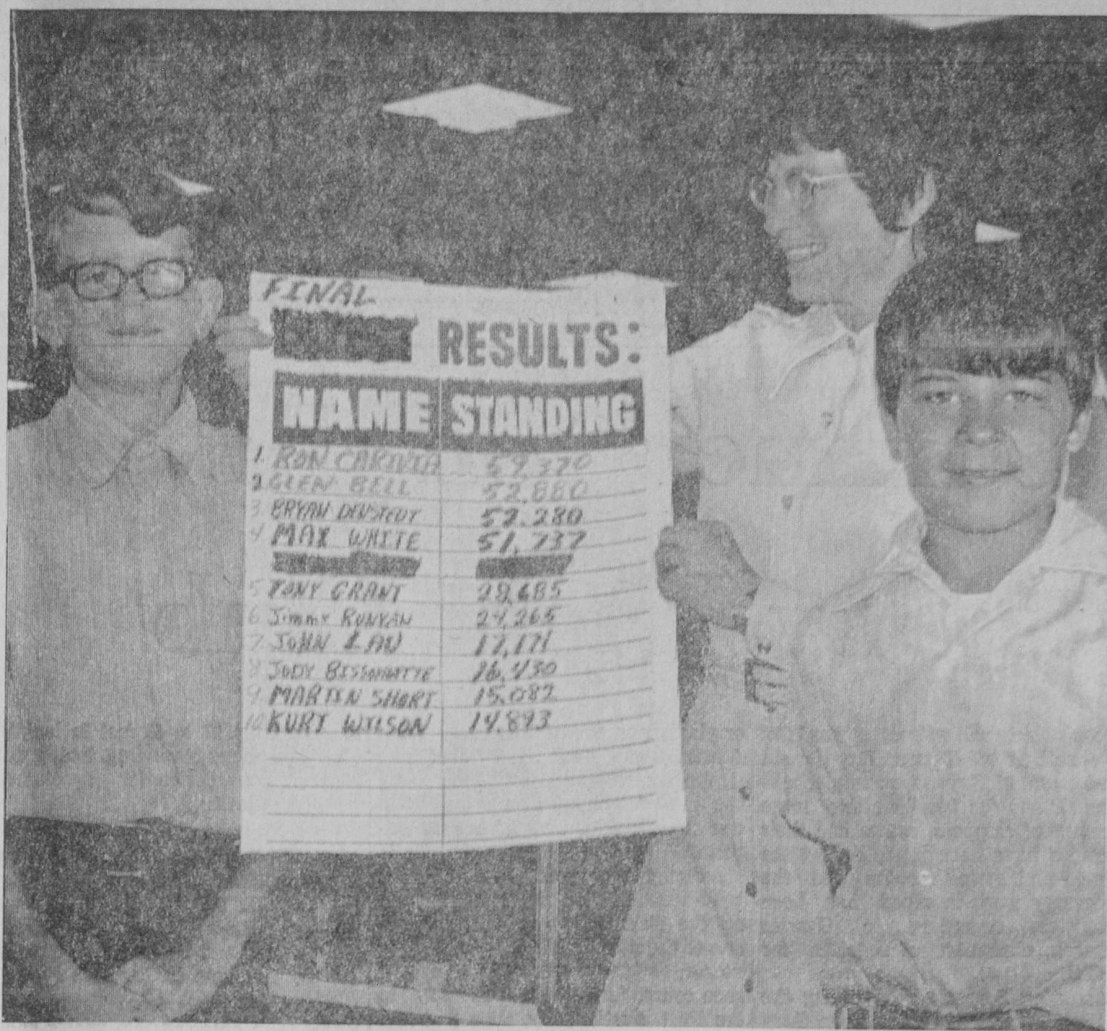

## GI Bill Helps Vietnam Vets

During the seven years that GI Bill training has been available to Vietnam Era veterans, the number of trainees has far surpassed the total of the 13-year Korean Conflict program and the number in college has approached the record set by the 12-year World War II GI Bill.

The current bill became effective June 1, 1966, for all men and women with military service since January 1955 and more than four-million persons have taken advantage of its provisions.

The Korean Conflict bill enrolled 2.4-million veterans between July 1952 and January 1965 and the initial GI Bill, available to the 15.6-million veterans of World War II, enrolled 7.8-million between 1944 and 1956.

College level trainees under the current program have totaled more than two-million and the World War II aggregate of 2.2-million college enrollees is expected to be surpassed during the fall semester.

Only 1.2-million veterans went to college under the Korean Conflict bill. Fewer than 30 percent of World War II GI Bill trainees studied at college level compared to more than 50 percent under the present program.

Success of the current program is helped by a number of new and liberal provisions which include "free" entitlement to veterans who need high school or other preparatory work to meet college entrance requirements, tutoring at VA expense

and full educational entitlement on completion of a military tour, regardless of its length. In addition, unprecedented efforts have been made to encourage veterans to take advantage of their benefits.

Veterans Administration education programs for disabled veterans and dependents of veterans have also grown. During the past year, these education assistance programs for the first time reached 19,000 sons and daughters of deceased or seriously disabled veterans and 4,000 widows and wives of deceased and seriously disabled veterans.

Under the special vocational rehabilitation program for disabled veterans, 8,000 entered training during the past year.

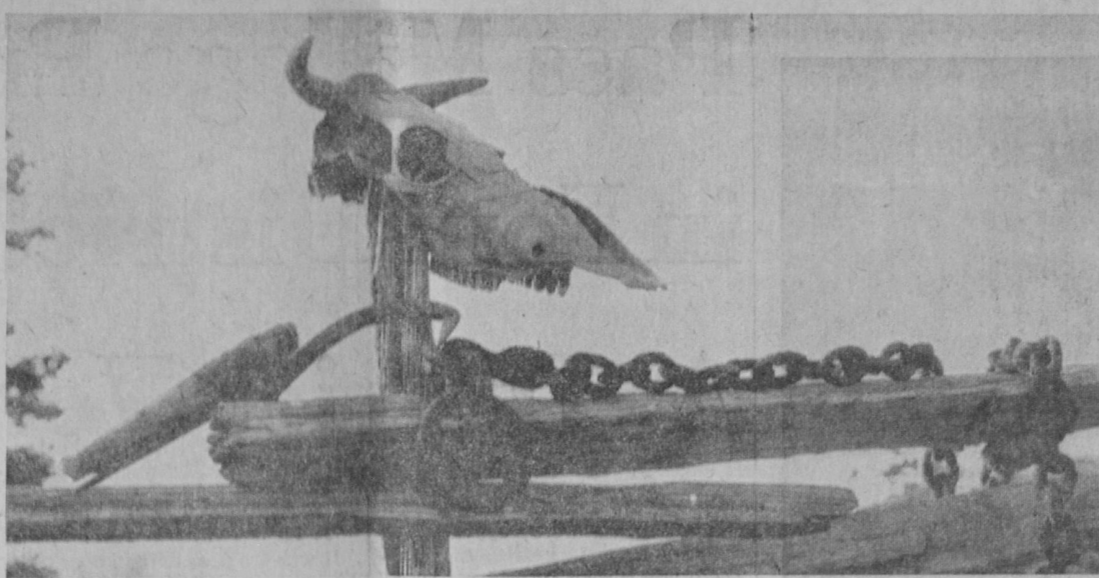

THE TAWAS RIVER, which has long been a source of "collectibles" for a few knowing bottle hounds and persons interested in preserving antiquities, has been the scene of activity during the past several weeks while two bridges are being reconstructed. Apparently the handy repository of junk and trash for several earlier generations of Tawas City residents, new finds have been made while a dragline was being used to remove wooden piling remaining from old bridges. Despite a thorough cleaning of trash 15 years ago by Tawas City businessmen (before corker bottles were being collected) and repeated searches since old bottles became valuable and collecting them became a hobby, several nice whiskey flasks from the pre-1900 era have been picked out of mud removed from the river bottom. To the sorrow of one collector, however,

many old bottles were broken during operation of the dragline. Early Tawas residents must have liked their whiskey, as well as their patent medicines, judging from the number of glass flasks found in recent years. Pictured are a few recent finds including a pumpkin seed flask with the face of a "standard" clock cast in one side, a swirl pattern shoo-fly flask, a Diamond (Detroit) stomach bitters bottle, patent medicine bottles, blob top soda water bottle, a boom chain and peavy from the logging days and the skull of a cow or steer, complete with horns. Despite the fact that the river today is a great place to find things from the past, it is hoped that the present generation will not be remembered for its trash found in the Tawas River in the future.—Tawas Herald Photos.

# Pass Millage Proposals in Four Districts; Tawas A. District Votes Soon

Operational millages in four area school districts were approved at annual elections held last week. There was a tight turnout of voters in each school district.

Voters of the West Branch-Rose City School District approved a seven-mill operation proposal for one year by a 300-vote margin, 764-428.

In Arenac County, Standish-Sterling School District voters approved renewal of a 12-mill proposal, Arenac Eastern voters approved renewal of three mills to add to the four mills approved last year, AuGres-Sims

voters approved a 13-mill operational levy, up .5 from last year.

It was the first time in over a decade that at least one school did not face a struggle to obtain tax millage which a board of education determined was necessary for the proper operation of the school district.

Voters of Tawas Area School District will decide later this summer on millage renewal and a tax increase to finance school operation for 1973-1974, which will see this district go to a split session as a means of relieving overcrowded conditions.

At the present time, a state aid bill has not been adopted by the Michigan Legislature. A bill which seems sure to pass is one which would require a total operational levy of 20 mills to qualify for any state aid and 22 mills for full state aid.

During the past year, operational taxes received by Tawas Area School included a 7.5-mill levy approved two years ago by voters and expires this year, along with nine mills from the county allocation board for a total levy of 16.5 mills.

Because of having one of the lowest millage rates in the state and one of the highest valuations behind each child, Tawas Area School District has long been penalized in state aid payments.

The school's share from the 15-mill tax levy handled by the allocation board has been increased from nine mills to 9.70 mills for the 1973-1974 school term.

Meanwhile, administrators and Tawas Area Board of Education are awaiting word from Lansing before adopting a tax millage rate to place before voters for 1973-1974 operation.



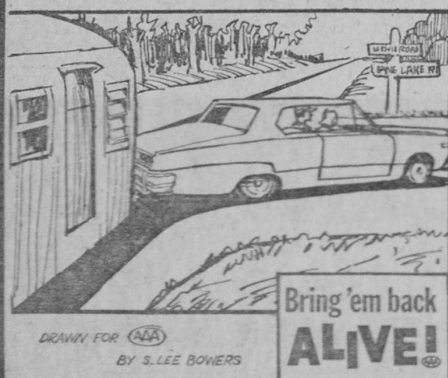
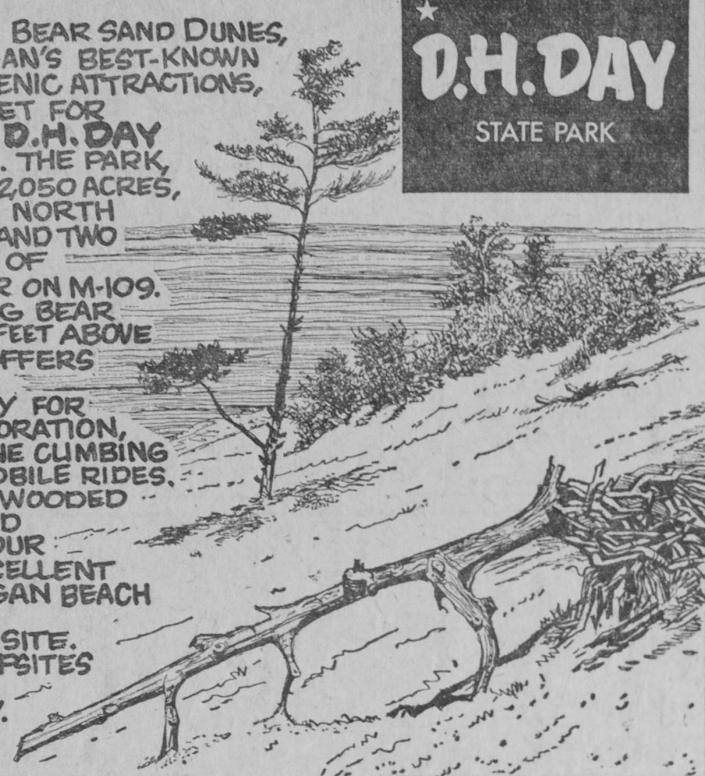
