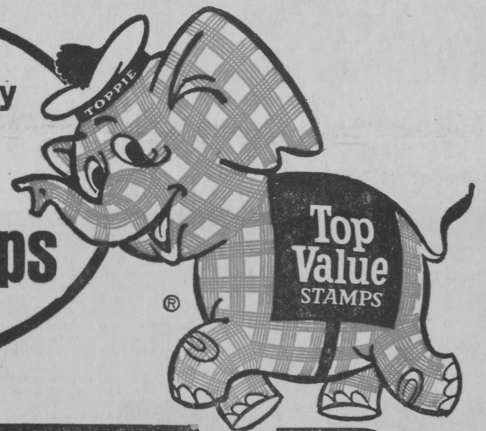

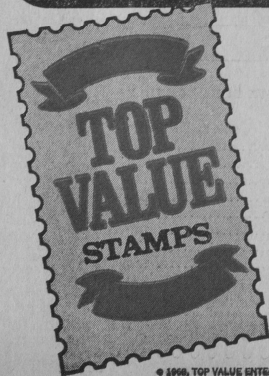

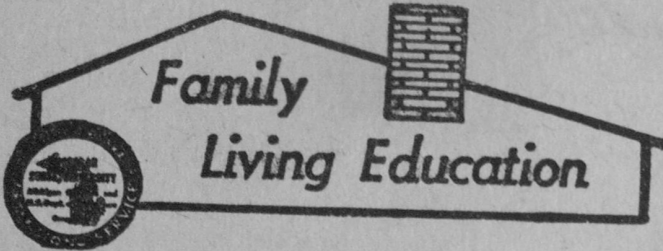

Children Need Foster Parents

"Children are in need of your concern, your action and your help," states Benson B. "Pete" Beck, director of the Inso County Department of Social Services.

A foster parent can expect low pay for maintaining a child (\$3.60 per day for a delinquent teen-ager). There is much frustration and much exposure to the current problems of young adults, including drug use, running away, dating, acting out and much testing of adult values, such as religion, hair style and so on.

"It is not an easy responsibility, but it is not an accomplished," said Beck. "The greatest reward is seeing your foster child do well, gain responsibility and make it into adulthood. Being a part of that kind of accomplishment is the most powerful reward."

Currently, the probate court and DSS need foster homes. Twenty or more homes could provide a most valuable resource for the young people in need.

"If one cares about children and wishes to get involved, foster parenting is a real opportunity to do so on a real community level," said Beck. Persons interested may call the Inso County Department of Social Services, 362-4449.

The DSS is mandated to provide community services to children. Much research and evidence exists supporting a foster home as an alternative to a training school, jail or other institution.

In this county, children are presently in foster homes rather than institutions. The rate of helping a child to become more responsible and to remain out of further delinquent problems is about 75 percent successful in this county.

"You must remember that often there is less than a 50 percent chance that the particular child can be helped," said Beck. "You are dealing with children with high risk of not becoming responsible adults. Presently, 80 to 90 percent of children who return from institutions fail. Compare that to 75 percent success in our foster homes and you can see why you are needed."

Foster parents are now part of a treatment team that includes a case-worker, school, possibly mental health workers and others. They are not boarding homes or substitute parents. Foster parents are vital in providing caseworkers with knowledge and techniques. They are expected to help a worker in plans for a child.

"They have to feel free to talk about problems with the worker. Honesty and integrity are vital in foster parents," said Beck.

Foster homes can be used on a temporary basis from a week to a month or for long-term placement of a year to four years. Mental health

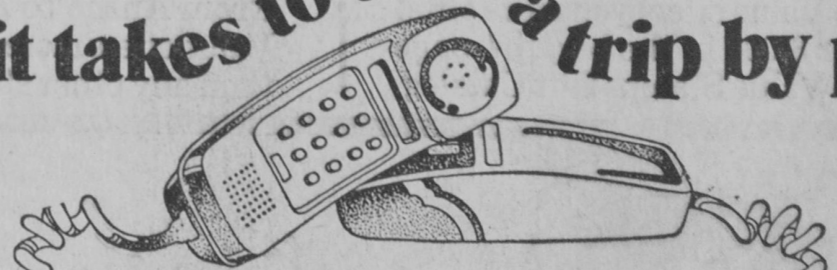

# D&M Roundhouse Museum Preview

## Days of Steam Being Preserved

Public unveiling of progress on the Detroit and Mackinac Railway's roundhouse museum was held last Wednesday when members of the Ladies Literary Club, East Tawas, were the first persons to visit this interesting exhibit.

"We do not have any plans right now to open the museum to the public, as it is still in the development

stages," said Edward Goodman, president of the railroad. "We plan to continue development in the hope that we will have it in condition for opening to the general public, perhaps as early as next year."

Development of a permanent display area for restored antique rolling stock and railroad equipment has been the brainchild of Charles A.

Pinkerton, chairman of the railroad's board of directors. "Several years ago, we reached a point in time with the realization that some antique equipment stored in our yard, remaining from the days of steam, should be preserved for posterity," said Pinkerton. "There is a nostalgia concerning those days which would have been lost forever had steps not been taken to preserve the few remaining wooden cars."

What started out only four years ago as a small undertaking has actually developed into a large-scale program of museum development on the part of Pinkerton and the railroad. Depending on the extent of development of this experiment in restoration, the roundhouse museum could well turn into one of the area's

top tourist attractions. Four years ago, the railroad "turned loose" Larry Leslie, D&M employee, on reconditioning a combination baggage car-coach, a wooden relic of about 1905 or earlier, which had ended its active days on the railroad's wrecking or work train. What started out as a simple project turned into a massive restoration, as railroad management and employees became more delighted with the old car as each layer of paint was painstakingly removed by Leslie. Eyes "popped" all around when the final layer of paint was removed from the oak interior and fancy wood inlays were found over windows, the product of some master craftsman from a bygone era.

As a result, a decision was made to "go the route" in restoration work

and the passenger car portion was returned to its original elegant condition. In addition, old buildings along the D&M were secured for interesting antiques from early railroad days, donations and purchases of brass lamps and other items were made and a collection was assembled in the baggage portion of the car.

This was only the beginning as Leslie was then directed to start restoration of a wooden baggage-express car, which had been coupled to the previously restored car. A collection of antique business machines, removed from the general office and stored for years, along with an express trunk and other items are now on display in the car. A Lionel toy train setup which was donated by Pinkerton's son, now a junior in college, has been set up in one end of the car.

In the meantime, the railroad acquired an 0-6-0 freight locomotive which was rusting away at an Alpena scrapyard, after yeoman service in an Alpena quarry. A Grand Rapids firm rebuilt the boiler and Leslie has constructed a new wooden cab, which is to be installed once the expansive mechanical restoration is completed. It is hoped that this project will be completed by next year.

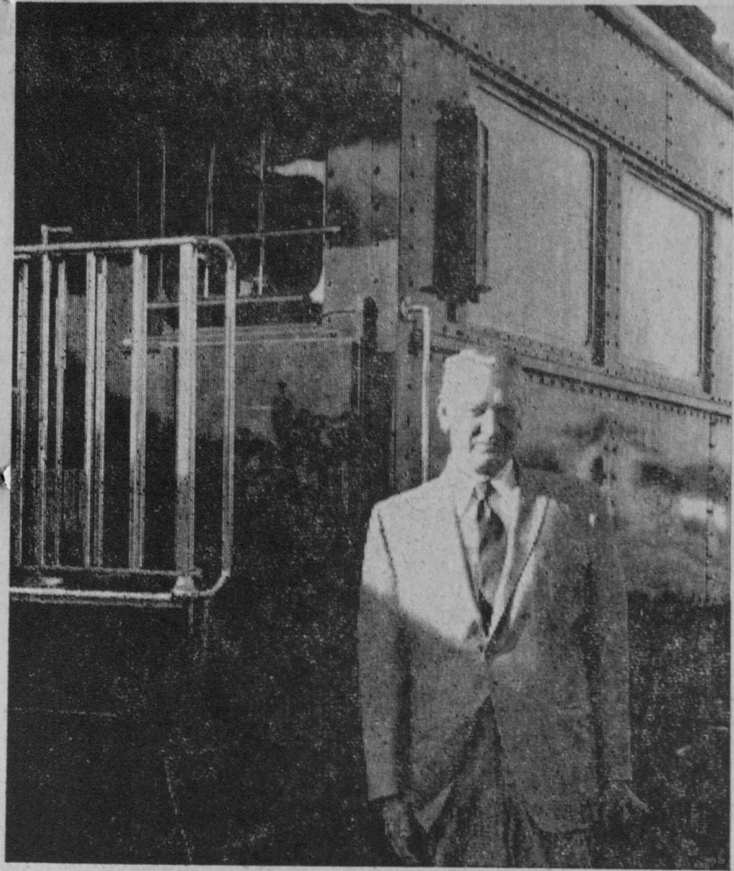
A way car (caboose) which had been donated by the railroad to the Tawas City Park was returned to the D&M when city officials realized this car was deteriorating and could better be preserved in the railroad's new museum. This car is partially restored and work is to be continued by Leslie. An old snow flanger car has been pulled out of the weather and is awaiting restoration.

Recently, the railroad purchased two steel passenger coaches from the Midwest Railroad Historical Foundation and restoration on these two pieces of rolling stock is to be undertaken at some future date. Coupled to the railroad's magnificent private office car, the "train" makes an imposing sight for railroad buffs.

While it is too early to talk about operation of public excursion trains on the D&M, Goodman indicated Wednesday that this was a distinct possibility of the future.

In the meantime, four antique automobiles have been added to the museum's 1930 Chrysler, including a Studebaker, DeSoto and two Edsels. A surrey with fringe on top has been added to the collection, along with two other antique buggies—all completely restored by Leslie.

Railroad officials said last week that the search for other items for this growing collection would continue.

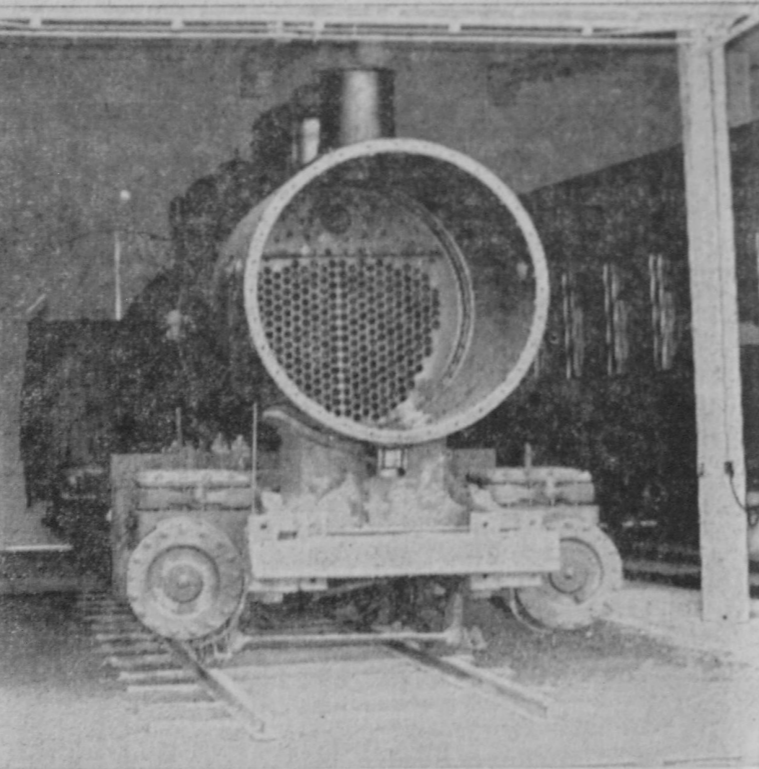

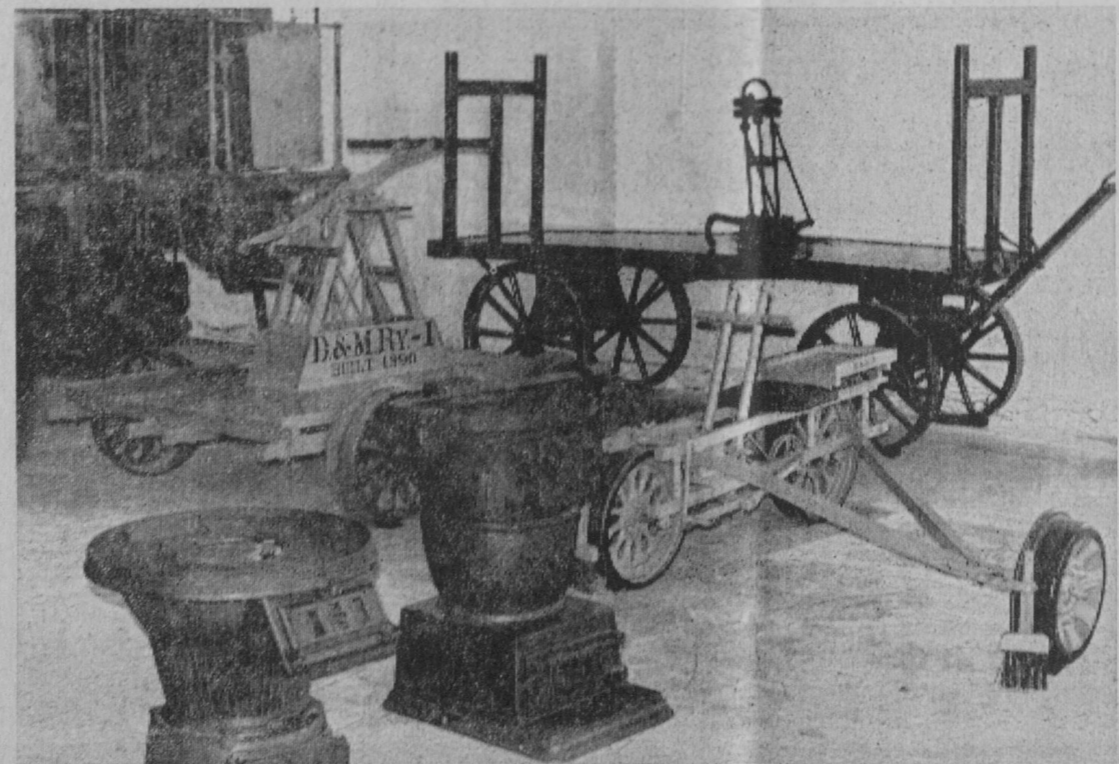

Whittemore Businessmen's Association is sponsoring a three-day homecoming.

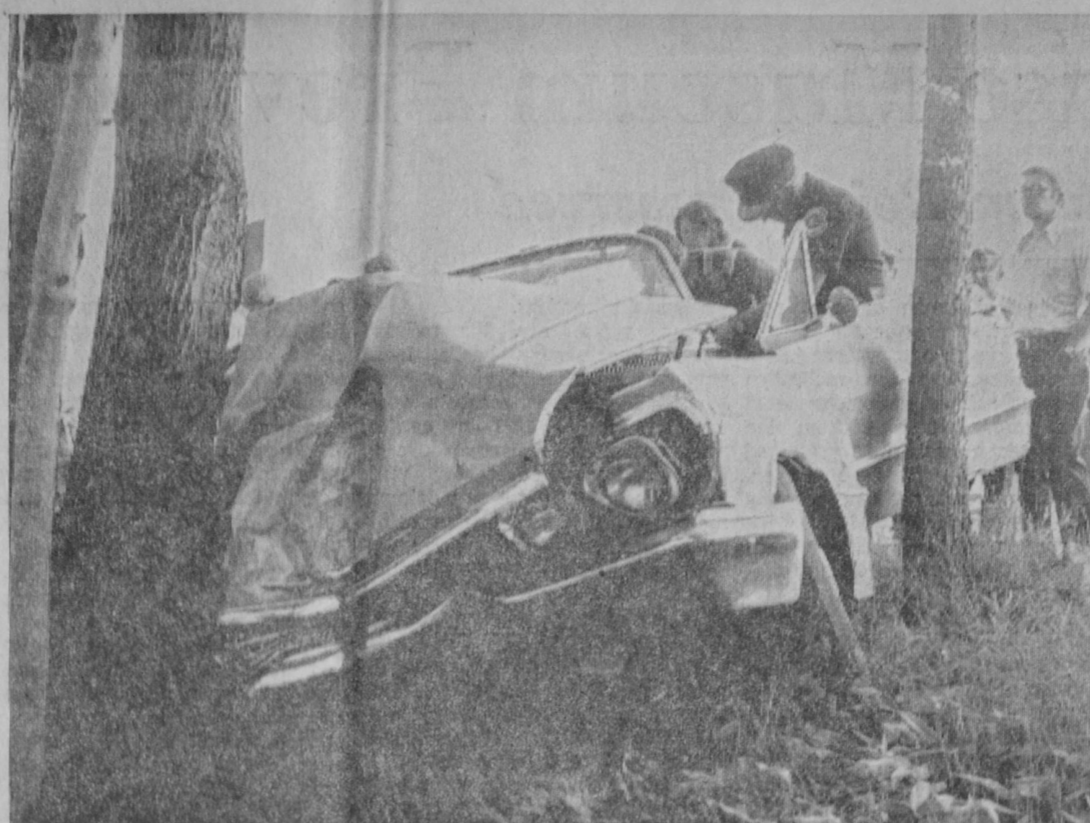

No Premium Cost Due to Disability

Question: I have been getting social security disability payments for over three years and I know I will have medicare coverage starting next month. What will my medicare insurance cost me?

Answer: Because you get disability benefits, you will not pay a monthly premium for your hospital insurance. Medicare insurance is voluntary and, if you want this additional protection, the premium will be \$6.30 a month. If you decide to take the medical insurance, your premium will be deducted from your monthly social security check starting the month your protection begins.

Question: I have been getting monthly social security disability benefits since 1967, and I know I will be eligible for medicare coverage starting in July. Will my minor children, who also get monthly checks as my dependents, be able to get medicare coverage, too?

Answer: No. The recent change in the law extends medicare coverage only to disabled workers like you, and to disabled widows and widowers 50 to 65, people 18 and over who receive social security benefits because they became disabled before 22, and certain other disabled people. Minor children are included.
