Gene Salamony Heads MSBOA

Gene Salamony, Tawas Area Senior Band director, was elected president of the Michigan School Band and Orchestra Association. A professional organization composed of instrumental music instructors, MSBOA was founded for the purpose of improving and promoting instrumental music in the schools of the state. There are 1,100 member schools and directors in this organization.

Salamony has served MSBOA as district president, second vice president and treasurer. He has been state first vice president in 1969-71, which included organizing and administering the state band and orchestra festival involving 300 bands and 20,000 musicians. This past year, he served MSBOA as state treasurer, handling funds in excess of \$128,000. Salamony also represented MSBOA in the Michigan Education Association and served for the past eight years as a member and recent chairman of the only state-wide committee of MSBOA. Salamony is the first president of the organization to be elected from a town north of Flint. He also is the youngest president of MSBOA.

Social Services Offices Moving

Offices of the Iosco Social Services Department are to be located temporarily at 117 First Street, Tawas City, during construction of a new building for the department near the medical care facility.

Because of renovation now taking place in its present quarters in the county building, the department is moving to the former location of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company.

Private Landfill to be Considered for Use by Tawas

On recommendation of Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas, Supt. of Public Works Paul Ropert is to arrange a meeting with Tawas City officials to discuss a contract proposal for utilizing a private sanitary landfill for city purposes.

W. C. Roach, owner of the Multi-County Sanitary Landfill on Monument Road, recently appeared before the East Tawas Council with a proposal to serve that city.

At the present time, the two cities maintain a sanitary landfill on federal property in Huron National Forest. Because of enforcement of state regulations, cost of compacting daily has increased the expense of the operation.

In other business, D. Arthur Evans, businessman, appeared before the council concerning the proposed assessment district for purchase of privately-owned property for parking use. It was stated that full information concerning the proposal was being gathered for presentation at a public hearing to be called in the future.

City Seeks Control of Right-Of-Way

Tawas City Council Monday night unanimously instructed City Atty. Kenneth J. Myles to take legal action necessary to correct what it termed misuse of and trespass on state and city highway right-of-way at the south city limit on US-23.

During council discussion on planning commission minutes concerning the matter, Harold D. Spriggs of Spriggs Body Shop, 1193 South US-23, and L. J. Trinklein, property owner, entered a complaint concerning a neighboring property owner.

Spriggs stated that Kenneth J. Thibault of Ken's Sunoco Service had for some time been using state highway right-of-way for the display of campers and trailers. Spriggs said that as a result, his building was blocked from the view of north and south US-23 traffic and was an inconvenience to him as his customer had difficulty in finding his building. In addition, he claimed that some of the trailers were so long that they protruded over his property line and that a traffic problem was created when customers searching for his place of business traveled at a slow rate of speed along the highway while looking for his building.

"I am only a small businessman, but I am one and I feel that all businesses should be treated fairly," said Spriggs. Stating that he had been inconvenienced for over a year, Spriggs said that he "could not understand why one person can stick stuff on a highway and get away with it. Surely, the state, county or city has some control; I only ask for a just view."

Mayor John Brugger said that the planning commission and the council were considering adoption of a city ordinance to establish a 20-foot setback line from highway right-of-way for the display of merchandise from Townline Road to the river bridge. Under consideration is a provision that would limit display of merchandise to small equipment not rising above eye level of persons riding in an automobile, or about 40 inches.

The mayor said that the problem had been pointed out to the department of state highways, but no answer has been received as yet. The view was expressed that the city should assert its obligation and authority to control both city and state highway right-of-way and is to seek a court order to that end.

Annual Tawas Canoe Race Has Rich Purse of \$1,000

At least two teams from Quebec, Canada, will be paddling in the 20th annual Tawas River Canoe Race to be held Sunday and from 35 to 50 professional racers from the Michigan Canoe Racing Association are expected for the event.

Michael Reed, race chairman for the Tawas Chamber of Commerce, credits the \$1,000 purse announced for this event as the main attraction for the visiting canoeists. In previous years, \$75 was top prize money for first place.

Reed said that it was the first event in which the Central North-eastern Michigan Sports Committee had assisted a local organization in sponsoring an event. The CNMESC raised the \$1,000 purse through donations from 100 individuals and businesses in the Tawas area.

Racing starts Sunday noon at Grove's Landing, Tawas Lake. The

first divisions, women's amateur and men's amateur, are to proceed from the east end of the lake straight down the river to the finish line at the river mouth. This part of the course covers a distance of five miles.

The next two divisions, professional and men's amateur, are scheduled to start at 12:20 and 12:25 p. m. The starting point will again be Grove's Landing. Racers are to proceed to the west end of the lake, turn a flag and return to the east end of the lake to the entrance of the Tawas River.

After following the river course, the men's amateur division is to finish at the river mouth. Professional teams are to proceed to the finish line in Tawas Bay at the Tawas City Park dock. Entire length of the race course for professionals is 10 miles.

John Forsten will be official timer for racing events. He is to be assisted by Bernard Race, Richard Pleif-

ter, Hugo Wajahn, Robert Kendall, Robert Williams and Bud Fisher. Floyd Grove will be the official starter.

Others assisting the above committee will be Timothy O'Connor, Randall DeWyse, Donald Penman, Patrick Bolen and Robert Hester.

The Iosco Sheriff's Department and United States Coast Guard from Tawas Point will provide water patrol boats for the course in Tawas Bay.

This will be the richest race per mile paddled in Michigan and spectators are offered an excellent opportunity to view the race. There is a mass start in each division at Tawas Lake and spectators may follow the course through Tawas City to the river mouth, stopping at bridges along the route to watch the action.

The committee is hoping for good weather conditions for this race. During the past 19 years, the race has been marred many times by cold weather and rain. Trophies are to be presented at the bandstand in the Tawas City Park.

Deadline Near for City Petitions

Deadline for filing nominating petitions for offices of aldermen and mayor in Tawas City is Tuesday, June 19, but city officials are still uncertain if seats of three aldermen are vacant or if the entire six-member council is to be elected.

The city's charter, which became effective January 3, 1972, has no provision concerning the terms of officials elected in the November 1971 general election, under an amendment to the old Fourth Class City Act.

The charter only states that elective city officers shall be a mayor and six councilmen; at each regular city odd year general election, there shall be elected at large a mayor

(two-year term) and three councilmen, each with a term of four years. Elected in 1971 to what was generally assumed to be four-year terms were Ald. Clark Tanner, Chester Smyczynski and Robert Rollin. It was believed that these men had two

years remaining in their four-year terms.

Three councilmen appointed to fill vacancies were James Lansky, Edward Savage and William Groff Jr. These seats automatically become vacant at the next general election and the successful candidates in those positions would hold office for terms of four years.

Under terms of the charter, the council has authority to correct any contingency not covered in the charter and may declare that all seats are vacant. Seats of three councilmen could be designated for two-year terms so as to correct the problem of electing an entirely new council every four years.

A special meeting is to be held this week to consider any advice from the city attorney. Councilmen believe that all legal avenues should be considered because of the possible effect any error could have on future city bond issues.

Reading Improvement Program Scheduled at Tawas Area School

Tawas Area School will conduct a reading improvement program this summer funded by Title One federal money (ESEA). This program is open to eligible students in grades three through eight for the current year and enrollment will be limited to 75 students.

The course is to be held at the high school reading center five days a week from 8:00 a. m. through 1:30 p. m. Students will attend one hour each day. Instruction will be similar to the format utilized last year.

Students are to be chosen on the basis of need. Recommendations of teachers and parents will be accepted. Students and parents are to furnish

their own transportation. Car pools may be set up and there is a possibility that a shuttle bus may run from East Tawas to Tawas City to the high school at 8:00 a. m., 12 o'clock and 3:00 p. m. Harry Crawford, program director, said that the proposed shuttle bus has not been approved as yet.

Any parent interested in enrolling a student in this program should contact Crawford at the high school, telephone 362-6127.

In addition to the above program, the school is to conduct a clinical remedial program at the East Tawas Elementary School for 10 students. These students are presently enrolled.

Preliminary Order Stands for Schools at 9.70 Tax Mills

A preliminary tax order giving 9.70 mills to Iosco schools for 1973-1974 operation stands as the result of Friday's allocation board action, but a move to "sweeten" school operational millage by reducing the intermediate school's allocation backedfire.

Ernest Jordan, intermediate school district superintendent, told fellow members of the allocation board that circumstances next year would allow a slight reduction in the tax split received by the intermediate district.

Under the preliminary order, the intermediate district received .30 of a mill, as compared to .20 of a mill last year. Jordan recommended that the millage be set at .20 of a mill for intermediate school district and that the remaining .10 of a mill be given to schools.

Jordan's motion to that effect was supported by Ellsworth Bernard. The motion received the favorable vote from Ralph Western, but lost by

"no" votes from Charles Smith, J. B. Smith, Richter Lixey and County Treas. Edward Nelkie.

Charles Smith, who represents Oscoda Township under the new allocation board makeup, and Lixey, representing townships, then moved to give the extra .10 of a mill to the county for operation.

Last year, the final allocation gave 4.80 mills to the county. Voting in favor of giving 4.10 mills to the county were the two Smiths, Lixey and Nelkie. Opposed were Bernard, Jordan and Western.

During discussion on the split of the 15 mills available for school operation, county and townships, J. B. Smith, finance chairman of the board of commissioners, said that the tax order as adopted May 21 by the allocation board was "not as bad" as he had previously thought. He said the county could live within the four mills allocated, but not below that

Annual School Elections Set Next Monday

Annual school election Monday, June 11, at Tawas Area School finds five candidates seeking to fill two vacancies on the board of education.

Polling places for this election are located at the East Tawas City Hall, the city hall in Tawas City and Tawas Township Hall. In the future, there will be one polling place located at the high school.

Dr. James E. Jacques of Tawas City is the lone incumbent filing for re-election. Leonard Sarki, who had been appointed to fill the vacancy of Carl Helmer who resigned, is not a candidate.

Others filing nominating petitions are: Robert O'Neil, East Tawas; Carl Babcock, John J. Smith and Joseph VanDette, all of Tawas City. O'Neil is an employee of Consumers Power Company. Babcock operates Iosco Abstract Office. Smith operates a resort on Bay Drive and VanDette is a deputy sheriff with Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Polls are open from 7:00 a. m. to 8:00 p. m. At Hale Area School, four candidates are vying for three vacancies on the board of education. Candidates for the two four-year seats are Audrey Kocher and Harvey Bascak. Grace B. Smith and Frederick L. Wallace are candidates for one two-year term as trustees.

In addition, voters are being asked if school officers should be paid annual salaries as follows: President and trustees, \$240; treasurer, \$360; secretary, \$360. At Whittemore-Prescott Area School, there are five candidates for two vacancies. Mrs. Celia Perrin (incumbent) is being opposed by Ilene Phelps and Dale Snyder for the four-year term; Lillian Smith and Gavain Teuscher are candidates for a one-year term to fill a vacancy.

Council Hears Report on Park Dock and New Parking Lane

Continuance of construction on a new parking lot along US-23 to serve the city park and county building awaits moving of two electrical poles, according to work Monday night from City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz.

Bublitz reports that he had met Friday with a representative of the department of state highways and learned that it would be necessary for the council to adopt an ordinance eliminating cars in the present parking lane, once the new lot is completed. This action had been contemplated in original planning.

Entrance to the new parking lot, separated from Lake Street (US-23) by a concrete curb, would be at the entrance of the city park. The parking lane exit would be at the east end of the park.

In other matters concerning highways, the council went on record as requesting the department of state highways to conduct a study to determine the feasibility of widening M-55 from US-23 to Plank Road to four lanes. It was stated that traffic generated by M-55 and Tawas Area School creates a serious bottleneck in that area.

Pictures showing deterioration of the city park dock were presented by Ald. Robert Rollin. Last week, the Tawas City Businessmen's Association requested that the city study the possibility of reconstructing the dock.

Mayor John Brugger stated that reconstruction of the dock was included in a plan presented last year by the city to the county board of commissioners. He said that the

plan had been approved by the commission, but no word has been received from the county parks and recreation commission.

The county's share for financing work on the US-23 parking lot came from the building and site fund. State and federal agencies have been contacted concerning possible assistance with renovating the dock, but no funds have been available. Last year, it was estimated that about \$30,000 would be required to construct a retaining wall around the dock, similar to the one presently under construction along Ninth Avenue.

Ziehl's letter indicated that the property had been zoned commercial at the time of his purchase. It was later placed in the multiple family zone under the 1965 ordinance. He said he plans to preserve the originality of the present structure.

A \$14,800 maintenance contract with the department of state highways was adopted for 1973-1974.

A letter from Richard Ziehl indicated that he plans to remodel the former N. C. Harting home at 101 Lake Street into a gift-antique shop and art gallery. He plans to apply for a beer and wine take out license.

The property is presently zoned for multiple family use and would require a zoning change for commercial use. It was indicated by the city manager that the property fronts Lake Street directly to the east of property which had been rezoned to commercial earlier in Monday night's session.

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Knight Elected to PS Bank Board

L. G. McKay Jr., chairman of the board of Peoples State Bank, announced last week that the board of directors has elected Harold J. Knight, local certified public accountant, to the board of directors of the bank.

McKay, in making his announcement, stated that Knight will fill a vacancy established by the shareholders at their annual meeting in January.

Knight, a resident of the Tawas area since 1960, came to the area as an accountant. He has since established the office of Harold J. Knight, C. P. A. A graduate of Alcona High School, he also attended University of Michigan where he majored in accounting.

He is a member of the Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants and American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Presently a member of Knight's Templar, Knight is a past master of Tawas City Lodge No. 302, F&AM, and past high priest of Iosco Chapter No. 83, Royal Arch Masons.

Knight, his wife, Dianne, and two children make their home in Tawas City and are members of the Tawas United Methodist Church where he

serves as finance chairman and member of the choir. Chairman McKay stated: "The bank is fortunate to have found someone as capable as Harold to join the board and feels he will add greatly to the bank's future plans and helping in the growth of the Tawas area."





Park Cleanup Proves Costly in Huron National Forest

Vandalism, theft, property damage and malicious destruction of facilities—all criminal activities usually associated with big city streets—have become major problems on national forests around the country.

"It's a sad picture," comments one national forest recreational director. "People seem intent on damaging or destroying almost anything we build at campsites. They cut down trees for firewood, deface structures with crude graffiti, shoot road signs full of holes and strew garbage all over the place. Every dollar spent to repair damage is one dollar less for expanding and improving recreational facilities."

Repair of damaged facilities in national forests is estimated at well over two million dollars annually and that does not include manpower and time lost from other projects, nor the extent of damage to the environment before repair is made. With this money, the forest service could construct many miles of nature trails or 12 to 15 new campgrounds with space for 50 families each.

A case in point is Huron National Forest here in Iosco County. Following the Memorial Day congregation of youths at Gordon Creek, employees of the Tawas Ranger District spent 2½ days in cleaning the grounds. Cost of this one cleanup amounted to \$300.

Calvin Norton, Tawas District ranger, said last week that the condition of the campground Tuesday morning was not as bad as his office had anticipated earlier. Estimates of the number of persons using Gordon Creek range from 1,000 to 3,000 persons.

"The rain helped to ease the problem over the week-end as many people moved out," said Norton. He said the problem with debris on the grounds was relieved somewhat when members of the forest service distributed garbage bags to campground users on Memorial Day. As a result, a large amount of the trash accumulated was already bagged and only needed removal.

Another problem facing forest service personnel is one which apparently is not being answered for the present. "We can clean up the Gordon Creeks and only lose a few trees to campfires, but damages by off road trail bikes is of a far more serious nature," states Norton. "It takes years of growth and expenditure of many thousands of dollars to repair erosion damage caused by wheeled vehicles—it is a long term healing process to stop sand slides once they have started."

Norton said that an accurate magnetic counter located on the road leading to Lumbermen's Monument indicated that 9,800 cars and motorbikes had entered the area between May 22 and May 30. Serious parking and traffic problems were encountered near the Monument over the holiday and steps are being taken to correct the problem before the July 4 holiday.

"The Huron National Forest and Ausable River are the prime scenic

attractions in this county. A decision will soon have to be made concerning the long-lasting damage being created by off trail vehicles and what steps can be taken to lessen or prevent that damage," said Norton.

Norton said that forest service employees had encountered only a few minor problems at Silver Valley following the closing two weeks ago of that 160-acre area to camping and wheeled vehicles. He said that many people had parked automobiles along Monument Road and walked into the area to view damage caused by trail bikes.

Another problem in the Huron National Forest is vandalism. What sort of person goes into the national forest to engage in illegal destruction? According to law enforcement officers of the forest service, vandalism in public recreation areas is essentially a youthful crime.


A recently completed survey of 124 national forests and 28 national parks shows that nearly two-thirds of the vandalism incidents were

traced to 16 to 21-year-olds; 90 percent were male and, in almost every instance, the vandalism was done by groups of three or more persons rather than by individuals.





Judge Grants New Trial to Arenac Men

Claiming that the court had failed to advise them substantially of all their constitutional rights prior to accepting guilty pleas in the August 1971 assault of Howard W. Hutton, Tawas City barber, two men have been granted a new trial in Arenac County Circuit Court.

Charles Woods, 28, Omer, and Frank Spencer, 36, AuGres, had entered guilty pleas to manslaughter in 1971 and were given prison terms of up to 15 years. Hutton, 64, died of injuries in a Saginaw hospital a few days after the assault took place.

Both men had begun serving their sentences at Southern Michigan Prison, Jackson, but were later released on bond after Judge Philip Glennie, Alpena, granted them a new trial earlier this year.

The order for a retrial was given in view of alleged irregularities in the original trial held in 1971.

The two appeared in circuit court recently in connection with a motion by Arenac County Pros. Atty. Norman Ehrnst to try the pair on charges of first degree murder. Murder charges were lodged against them in 1971, but the two entered guilty pleas to the lesser offense of manslaughter and were sentenced on that charge.


No decision will be made on the prosecutor's motion until the defendant's attorney has had an opportunity to prepare and file an answer brief.

'Early Retirement' for Last DeLosh at USG Installation

Only two men have served as mill maintenance foremen during the past 45 years at United States Gypsum Company's Alabaster installation—the late Claude DeLosh and his son, William. Effective July 1, the latter retires and it will be the first time in nearly 60 years that the DeLosh name will be missing from the Alabaster payroll.

DeLosh, 65, has been off the job since February 21, when his leg was fractured in a freak accident in the maintenance shop.

"I was waiting for a few minutes while a crew was finishing its job. A piece of steel snapped, sailed across the room and struck me in the right leg. My leg was in a cast for three months and I'll be hobbling around for about three more months, so I won't be able to return to work before my retirement becomes effective," states DeLosh.

DeLosh completes 41 years of service effective this month and is the senior employee at Alabaster. His first job in June of 1932 was a tunnel man in the loading department and from there moved to the shore bin crusher. He loaded tramway buckets for a number of years, then worked

14 years at the marine bin before becoming mill maintenance foreman. As mill maintenance foreman, he has had some big jobs to tackle, including supervising installation of automated bucket loading equipment and rebuilding the secondary crusher. One job that he will always remember was the time the return cable on the tramway parted and 31 buckets dropped into Saginaw Bay—all had to be fished out of the water.

One of the first things that DeLosh plans to do in retirement—after his leg fracture heals—is to build a new garage at his home on Wheeler Street in Tawas City.

His wife passed away about six years ago and he says he is not interested in traveling. An avid hunter, he says he is content to "be in the woods."

A leaflet explaining how to estimate social security retirement benefits is available at social security office, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

The leaflet, "Estimating Your Social Security Retirement Check," designed to help people in their retirement planning, includes a chart showing the number of quarters required to qualify for benefits and a worksheet to help in estimating the amount of benefits.

"The leaflet can be used to compute a rough estimate of your retirement benefits," Carr said, "but an exact figure cannot be determined until you apply for benefits. The exact amount of a worker's social security benefits is based on his average earnings under the program over a period of years and that may include his most recent work."

Single copies of the leaflet are free on request at any social security office.





Change Procedure for Issuing Cards

For over 35 years, social security cards have been issued "over the counter" to school-age children by local social security offices.

This service has been changed. From now on cards will be issued centrally from Baltimore, Maryland. Under this new procedure, there will be safeguards to insure that an individual has only one number. It will, however, take three or four weeks from application to receive a card. For this reason, it is important for high school students who do not have social security numbers to apply now if they intend to work during summer vacation.

Applications for social security cards may be obtained from any social security office or post office. A person's social security number remains the same for life. If a card is lost, the social security office can assist you in obtaining a replacement card with the same number as the original card. Also, if your name changes due to marriage, you should

report this to the social security office so a new card can be issued showing the old number and new name.

Until recently, social security numbers were used primarily for one purpose, to keep a record of a person's earnings under social security. Today the numbers are also used on drivers' licenses, savings accounts, military service numbers, school identification numbers, income tax returns and others too numerous to mention.

The main purpose of a social security number remains unchanged, to identify a person's work record. This is so that when the person retires, becomes disabled or dies, benefits to which the worker and his dependents or survivors are entitled can be paid. These monthly benefits are based on a worker's average earnings under social security.

For young workers, 1½ years of work under social security in many instances is enough to qualify the worker and his family for disability or survivors benefits. Once a person has worked 10 years in jobs covered by social security, he is fully insured for survivors or retirement benefits. There are some special rules which apply to being insured for disability benefits.



Did you know that in America one person out of 100—that's over two million—suffers each year from salmonellosis? What is that?

It is one form of sickness popularly known as "food poisoning." While it is rarely fatal, it can be uncomfortable and inconvenient.

Commercial kitchens in hospitals, restaurants, schools and hotels are required by law to maintain high standards of sanitation. Managers of such institutions are schooled in sanitary food handling methods.

But during the summer months, many non-professional quantity food-handlers are thrust into positions of cooking for the church picnic, the girl scouts' campout or the family reunion. During the warm, humid summer months, food-poisoning bacteria run rampant.

Precautions against "sickness germs" are the same, whether you are making chili in a camp kitchen or potato salad for the neighbors in the backyard. The following cleanliness rules can help you to ward off food poisoning this summer:

1. Wash hands before preparing food and following any interruptions during food preparation. Wash hands again after handling raw meat, fish, poultry or eggs.
2. Wash utensils and food containers in soap or detergent and the hottest water available, preferably in an automatic dishwasher. Wash chopping blocks and counters before and after each use.
3. Do not wash pet dishes in the kitchen sink if it can possibly be avoided. If you have no choice, scour the sink and adjacent areas thoroughly.
4. Exterminate flies, insects and rodents.
5. Use separate sponges or dishcloths for counter-wiping and dish-washing.
6. Cook foods thoroughly and serve immediately after cooking or refrigerate. Store leftovers promptly in the refrigerator or discard.

Plan picnic menus with the least perishable foods. Avoid serving foods containing eggs such as custards or sauces and salads made with mayonnaise unless they can be refrigerated as soon as they are prepared.

7. Scrub picnic tables and benches, vinyl tablecloths and placemats and serving utensils. Wash meat grinders and slicers immediately after using them.
8. Learn to keep hands out of food and away from dishes and utensil surfaces that come in contact with people's lips. Do not taste with the cooking spoon or lick your fingers.
9. Insist that all campers and family members wash before eating.

Finally, remember that just because it is a picnic, or whatever, does not mean anything goes. On the contrary, more precautions must be taken because more people are involved and the conditions for bacteria growth are more prevalent. Why ruin a good time with a bad aftereffect? Make this summer a healthy one by emphasizing sanitation in food handling.

No Waiting Period For SS Disability

Question: My husband became disabled in February of this year. Our neighbor says he will have to wait six months before he can receive social security benefits. Is this true?

Answer: No. Recent changes in the social security law change the waiting period for disability benefits from six months to five months.

Question: Jerry, my son, is blind. He has worked at odd jobs since he was 17 years old. I wonder if there is any way he could qualify for social security disability benefits?

Answer: The 1972 Amendments to the social security act enable the blind to qualify for disability benefits based on being "fully insured" only. You should contact your nearest social security office for details.

Question: My husband is going to retire soon and we have a 25-year-old unmarried son who was disabled in a car accident five years ago. Will he be eligible for social security benefits?

Answer: Yes, it is possible that he may be eligible. A child disabled be-

fore age 22 can qualify for benefits on the record of a retired, disabled or deceased parent.




