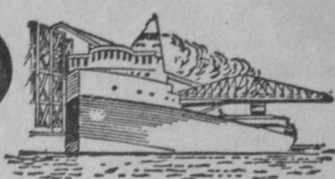

## Board Picks Architect for New High School

Daverman Associates, Incorporated, Grand Rapids, has been selected by Tawas Area Board of Education as the architect for the district's proposed new high school building.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told board members that prequalification forms for the proposed bonding program were to be filed with the state on March 26. The new architect has commenced a space analysis of school facilities.

Such an inspection is necessary before the Municipal Finance Commission would approve a bonding election.

Barry said the state would inspect the school's instructional program, check the school's annual audit and make a physical inspection of facilities.

"Approximately six different steps are required to receive approval from Lansing," said Barry. "The state will not allow a school district to overbuild its facilities."

While the school district is too small to have a formal bond rating, Barry said that finances of the district appear to be excellent and he believed that an excellent interest rate could be obtained on bonds.

No indication has been given when the electorate might expect to vote on the bonding proposal, due to the lengthy process of making application to the state and the preparation of preliminary plans. The board of education has indicated, however, that such an election could be expected before next fall.

Determination to ask voter approval for financing construction of a new high school was reached last month following a comprehensive study by citizens' advisory groups.

The board of education reached the conclusion that a new high school was the only answer to the district's problem of overcrowded classrooms.

The present high school, if the program is approved by voters, would be converted into a middle school.

In the meantime, a committee studying the 45-15 or year around school concept will attend a conference April 4 at Plymouth. Members of the board of education and administrators are to accompany the group.

## 'Waiting Game' May be Necessary on Millage Vote

With six different state aid bills before the legislature and a good possibility that the final one will not be approved for 1973-1974 school financing until late spring, Tawas Area Education Association probably will be playing the "waiting game" before placing an operational millage proposal before district voters.

Expanding this year will be the district's 7 1/2 mills of operational tax, which has been in effect for the past two years with voter approval.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told board of education members Monday night that the exact amount of money needed to operate the school next term could not be determined until a state aid bill is adopted. One bill being considered by the legislature, for instance, would require a school district to levy 22 mills of operational tax to receive full state aid.

Barry said there were some advantages in waiting until after July 1 to hold a millage election, although time would then be short before opening of the new term next fall.

While work starts this month on preparing a budget for the county allocation board, Barry said he did not wish to get "budgeted up" until finances are known. "We want to have all the facts and our complete program before we go to the people and ask for operational money; then, the people will know what they are getting for their money," said Barry. He emphasized that elections are costly and a waste of tax money to be forced to have more than one vote by the people.

As it now stands, the district may have to ask for more than the present 7 1/2 mills of voted operational

tax. Without considering inflation, an additional \$54,000 would be needed to balance the budget to cover pay increases granted the present teaching staff under the master contract.

As a means of protecting itself in the event that voters should not approve the operational millage, a "pink slip" policy was adopted Monday night by the board of education. This means that teachers would not be rehired in the fall should finances be lacking. This is a requirement under the master contract with the teacher's union.

Barry and members of the board

## Iosco Commissioners Discuss Ways to Aid School Financing

As the result of a discussion Wednesday between the Iosco Board of Commissioners and county school superintendents, a study is to be made of the possible linking or coordination of school libraries through the Iosco-Arenac Regional Library.

Commissioners, who only last month voted to increase this county's allocation to the regional library, indicated they were receptive to a suggested plan to use some of the county's federal revenue sharing money for libraries.

It was believed that duplication of services could be eliminated by combining present branch libraries operated by the regional library

with school libraries, with the entire centralized library system coordinated through the regional library. At the present time, the various communities provide housing for the branch libraries and it was felt that a saving could result if the branch libraries were located in the schools.

It was pointed out that major users of present branch libraries are school students and that arrangements could be worked out for public utilization of the libraries.

All superintendents have been requested to provide the board of commissioners with costs and other information concerning school libraries for future consideration with regional library officials. In addition, legal ramifications of the proposal are to be studied.

This action came during discussion concerning money received by the county through federal revenue sharing as well as taxes received by schools and the county through the 15 mills split annually by the county allocation board.

Discussion on library services came about during consideration of a number of ways in which county funds might legally be used to assist financing school services. Another possible way to utilize revenue sharing funds to assist schools is in the area of recreation.

## Plainfield Finally Gets Park After Long Wait

Patience has finally paid off for residents of Plainfield Township. Earth moving equipment and men of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources started work Friday on site preparation for the new Long Lake Park.

Iosco's share of the construction cost was first committed in 1966 by the old board of supervisors, according to Dennis Chrvia, township supervisor. Delays have been so numerous that one official allowed Friday that perhaps the entrance

sign should read: "Long Wait Park."

But now that work has started on the project, township officials and residents have a couple of reasons to be pleased. First, this is the first park to be constructed in Western Iosco County through the joint efforts of the county parks and recreation commission and the department of natural resources; secondly, the area comprising the park has had considerable usage in past years without any facilities and this will be changed this summer.

Theodore Fairbanks, regional waterways supervisor for the DNR at Roscommon, said Friday that plans call for a 36-foot-wide boat launching ramp with parking lot to accommodate 30 cars and 30 boat trailers.

In addition, there will be a public restroom building and a 30-car parking lot in the day use picnic area. No camping is allowed in the park.

The park will be small, comprising only about 10 acres, but it has approximately 700 feet of frontage on Long Lake with one of the best swimming areas in Western Iosco County. Entrance to the park is by Kokosing Road, which intersects with M-65 north of Hale.

The property was dedicated to the public in 1946 as part of the development of Lakeside Heights, but has remained in its "natural" state—except for the wear and tear on the grounds and trees, which is the usual case for undeveloped public access sites.

While underbrush and some trees will be removed for parking and picnic areas, planners say that the natural beauty of the property will be preserved. Trees covering much of the site include white birch, soft maple and cedar.

Glenn Oligney, DNR waterways construction supervisor for Roscommon, said that construction of the boat launching facility, car-trailer parking lot, restroom facility and entrance roads would cost approximately \$15,000, with 10 percent to be furnished by the county parks and recreation commission.

The DNR is to construct the day use area and the 30-car parking lot and the parks and recreation commission is to reimburse the state for materials used. The latter work is to cost approximately \$3,000.

Members of the Iosco Board of Commissioners met with DNR officials at Lansing Thursday to review final plans before work was to commence the next day.

## Ellis Draws Prison Terms on Two Counts

James Ellis, who was returned from Florida on a fugitive warrant, received two concurrent prison terms Monday in Iosco Circuit Court.

He was sentenced to serve a term of three to 10 years for breaking and entering and a term of three to five years for unlawfully driving away an automobile. He was given credit for 140 days served in the county jail.

Ellis, who once before had to be returned from California and then skipped to Florida while awaiting his court appearance, requested an appeal and Thomas Huck was assigned by the court.

Oliver Adams, who was convicted by jury of manslaughter in the November 23 automobile death of Brenda M. Deschamps in AuSable Township, was sentenced to a term of three to 15 years and his drivers license was revoked "forever" by Judge Allan C. Miller.

Robin D. LaLonde, who with Steve

## Old Whittemore School is Razed

In its final phase of demolition this week is the old Whittemore High School building on M-65. Brick walls of the building were knocked down two weeks ago by Clark Equipment Company of Oscoda and the debris is being used as fill on the site of Whittemore-Prescott Area High School.

The old building was built in 1926 and was used as a high school until 1959, when the then new consolidated high school replaced it. It was used as a grade school and cafeteria until a few years ago, when a new all-purpose room was finished for Whittemore Elementary Unit and the old high school building was declared unsafe for school use.

For many years, it was the only high school in the area between the Tawas, West Branch, Standish and Sterling. As a result, students from Prescott, Hale, Glennie, Curtisville, Turner, Twining, Whittemore and other localities received their high school education there.

The building was also the home of the Whittemore Boy Scout troop for many years.

While the old building was being razed last week, a straw vote conducted by Whittemore-Prescott Area Board of Education indicated that the electorate desired the school district to float a bond issue to finance construction of a 10-classroom addition.

To be constructed at the present high school, the \$500,000 addition would house a middle school, as well as a multipurpose room, library, art room, offices and rest rooms.

The school district has shown rapid growth during recent years, the enrollment increasing by 367 since 1967. There were only 875 students in the school when the district was formed 16 years ago, but the present enrollment is over 1,200.

Under state law, a school district may bond up to five percent of its state equalized valuation without voter approval. Supt. Raymond Kesler said that it was the opinion of the board of education that it would be best to have the electorate give direction as to desires of the district and an advisory vote was held March 5.

## TA Board Delays Grievance Action

A grievance brought by a member of the teaching staff was heard Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. The board exercised its option under the master contract with Tawas Area Education Association to delay its decision for seven days.

Bringing the grievance was Mrs. Arlene Brown, who claimed that she was not being paid \$5 per hour for noon playground supervision. Gary Chapman, representative for TAEA, claimed that the primary duty of a teacher was to teach and that the master contract provided for extra pay for extra duty.

The administration took the position that Mrs. Brown's schedule was for 19 hours, 50 minutes, per week as a gym teacher at the two elementary units. Handling playground supervision, plus 15 minutes of travel time, gave her a total of 23 hours, 10 minutes, of pupil contact time per week, which the administration said was "about average" for elementary teachers.

Chapman said that playground supervision was not a normal teaching situation, that Mrs. Brown was assigned to the duty against her desire and believed that pay for past extra duty was in order.

In other business, the board of education adopted a resolution requesting the intermediate school district to conduct a survey concerning the feasibility of locating a college center in the county.

A report on the hot lunch program indicated there will be an estimated cash balance on hand of \$388.60 at the end of June. This balance, however, will depend on the current rate of inflation. Total receipts from July 1, 1972, to February 28, including a cash balance of \$3,532.29 at the start

of the fiscal year, amounted to \$56,780.40. Disbursements have amounted to \$54,879.84. Outstanding bills at the end of February amounted to \$5,807.28.

Total lunches served since September 1 amounted to 82,402, of which 23,093 were free. The school is reimbursed at a rate of 40 cents for each free lunch. Total adult lunches served amounted to 3,231.

It is anticipated that expenses of the program will be \$39,807.28 for the remainder of the term. The February cash balance and estimated revenue of \$34,743.03 would leave an anticipated balance of \$388.60 in June.

Should food prices increase drastically during the next few months, it may be necessary to raise the cost of meals or lay off some employees. The building and grounds committee is to work with the administration to develop a program whereby shop students could be utilized to assist in construction of a storage building.

Because of upcoming conventions and various meetings, board of education meetings are to be held Monday, April 2, and Monday, April 16, rather than the second and fourth Mondays of the month.

Permission was given to rent the Tawas City Elementary Unit at the end of the school term for a vacation Bible school being planned by area churches.

A land contract between the school district and Iosco-Arenac Regional Library for purchase of the old Alabaster school by the library was retired last year and the board of education authorized turning the deed to

#### Fifth National Draft Lottery Held March 8

The fifth national draft lottery held Thursday, March 8, in Washington, D. C., underscores the continuing role selective service is legally obliged to play in our nation's defense posture, according to W. J. Myers, deputy state draft director.

Men born in 1954 will be receiving lottery numbers today. These men will stand ready during calendar year 1974 in the event that congress and the president decide it is necessary to resume draft inductions. These men are the first group to "stand ready" during a period of no draft calls.

Congress has recognized that there would be periods of no draft calls. It determined, however, that it would be unwise to dismantle the selective service system during such periods. Michigan draft boards are going to remain in operation, although at a reduced level. The law requires that each male citizen register with selective service when he reaches age 18.

Selective service will continue to

hold a national draft lottery to assign sequence numbers to young men during the year they turn 19. This number will determine their order of call in the event an emergency arises and the draft must be started again. Men turning 18 in 1973 will be required to register this year. Next year, in 1974, they will get a lottery number. They will "stand ready" for possible induction during the year 1975.

Approximately 103,000 young men were inducted from Michigan between 1964 and 1972. These men served with honor and distinction. A total of 1.8 million young men were inducted into the armed forces during the Vietnam war period.

## County Seeks Successor for Henry Oates

Iosco County Board of Commissioners Wednesday authorized advertising, both locally and throughout the state, for applications to fill the position of county tax equalization director.

A vacancy in this position resulted last month with the death of Henry Oates, who had been tax equalization director here since the position was first established.

In other business, the commission authorized a work alteration agreement with Davison and Son Builders, Tawas City, which is presently remodeling the former sheriff's living quarters in the jail for office use by the sheriff's department. Total cost of the remodeling is now set at \$35,741, to be financed through federal revenue sharing funds.

The low bid of McKay Sales Company of \$2,734.23 was accepted for furnishing a new pickup truck to the sheriff's department.

Following discussion with Sheriff George Westcott, it was stressed by the commission that the City of Tawas is still operating a police department independent of the Iosco Sheriff's Department. The city police department is operating on the sheriff's department radio frequency in order that dispatching of the patrol car may be handled at the jail. In addition, some clerical work of the city police officers is handled by the county.

A report from Tawas Hospital indicated that the ambulance service provided by the hospital was operating at an annual deficit because the volume of calls, except during summer months, was not large enough to make it a self-supporting program. Township and city governmental units presently cooperating with the hospital in operation of the ambulance service requested the county to assume that responsibility last month.

Members of the commission suggested Wednesday that the ambulance service study the possibility of raising its loading fee. No action is to be taken by the county until after the April meeting of the hospital board of directors.

## Whittemore City Council Approves Dump Agreement

Whittemore City Council last week accepted an agreement with Reno Township allowing township residents to use the city dump.

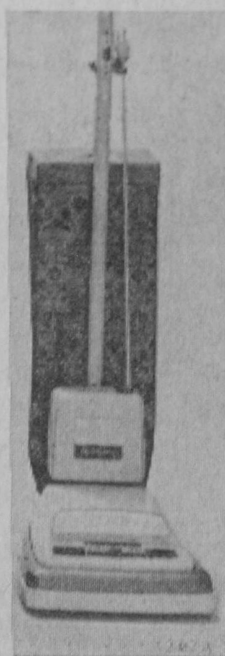
According to terms of the one-year agreement, annual cost to the township would be \$540.

of education expressed the opinion that this was an unfortunate position in which to place anyone, that it was not meant as a threat, but was in compliance with law.

Barry said that Detroit had not followed up on such a policy and this was one of the reasons for its financial problem.

"Even under the present state aid act, and no one knows what the new one will require for participation, this school would not qualify for state funds if our voted tax is not renewed and we only receive the nine mills from the allocation board. We could only operate from September 4 to December 3 and that would be it."

As a means of determining the number of teachers planning to return next fall, the board of education authorized sending letters of intent to the teaching staff. The letters would not be binding, but would give some indication to the administration and board of education in preparing a budget for next term.

"In order to develop a realistic budget for presentation to the allocation board, we will need this information," stated the superintendent.

The Oscoda fishermen had filed an appeal contending that there is no statutory authority for the zone management plan adopted by the DNR to protect the citizens of the state against depletion of the state fishery.

On December 7, Judge Miller ruled against the defendants in another case arising out of confiscation of their nets, which had been set contrary to the DNR's zone management plan for Lake Huron.

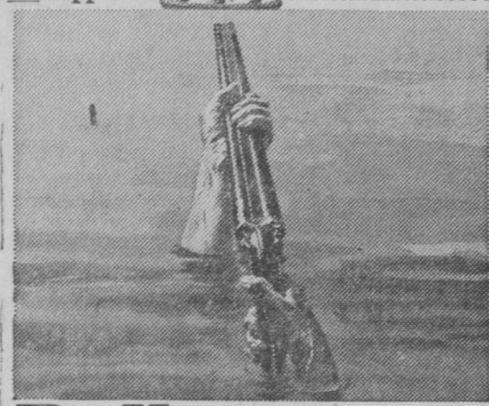

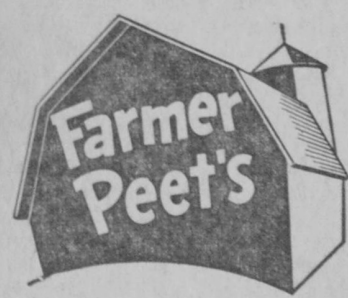

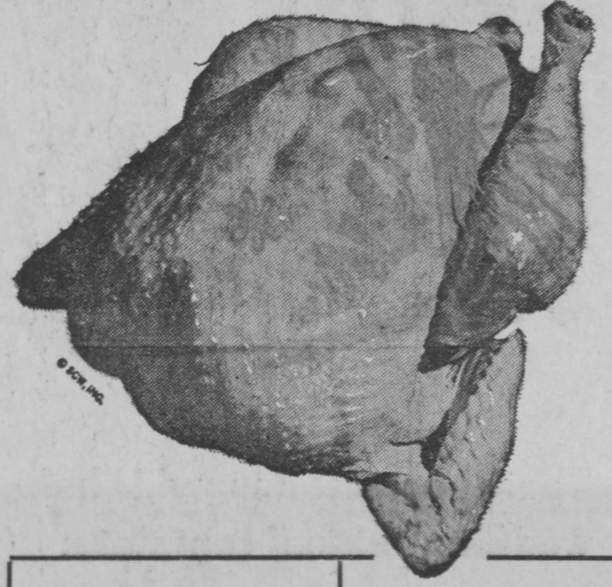

The property is fully fenced to prevent paper and debris from blowing, and the grounds are kept clean.

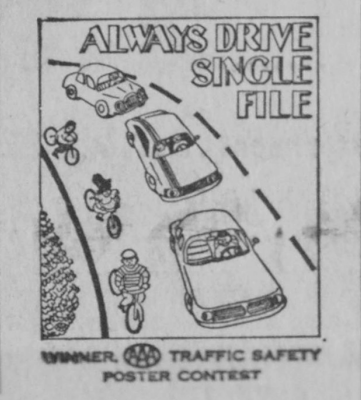
Equipped with two modern bulldozers and a large dragline, the landfill is capable of handling all of the garbage and refuse in Iosco and surrounding counties.

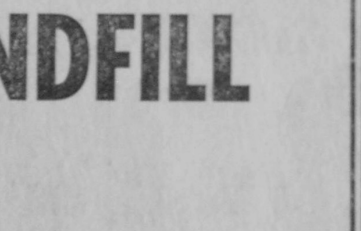

# LETTER to the EDITOR

Dear Editor:

The great majority of dentists are strongly in favor of adding small amounts of fluoride to water systems in order to reduce the rate of cavities in children's teeth. We have seen how Grand Rapids has been adding fluoride to its city water since 1946. The younger people there now only get about one third as many cavities. It is unfortunate that a whole generation of Tawas young people have grown up without this benefit.

As close as Wurtsmith Air Force Base, the water has been safely fluoridated for 15 years. The teeth of the base children are remarkably low in cavities compared to children living in other areas. When the military and civilian dentists used to inspect the Oscoda Area School children's teeth each year, they were in agreement that they could tell which children were from the air base and which were from Oscoda where there was no fluoridation of the water.

No one has ever shown any danger or injury to anyone's health where fluoride had been added to the water properly. The concentration of one part of fluoride to 1,000,000 parts of water is maintained by automatic machinery and laboratory tests will verify this from time to time. The addition is so inexpensive compared to the savings in lifetime dental bills. Your local dentists join in urging every East Tawas citizen to vote in favor of water fluoridation in the April referendum.

half going to Kirtland Community College District, with taxes to be paid by county residents toward support of these institutions.

According to Mrs. Kenneth J. Myles, an area resident presently affiliated with Delta College, such a bill is to be introduced this session into the state legislature. As an alternative, she proposed in February to the board of commissioners that a college center be established whereby Losco would contract with existing colleges to provide a full range of college courses in this county. She offered her services to provide a feasibility study.

Through reorganization of area intermediate school districts, vocational training centers are now being provided and the new center recently opened by the Bay-Arenac Intermediate District is a prime example. Because of its high real estate valuation, area community colleges and adjoining intermediate school districts have expressed interest in joining Losco with presently established districts. In addition, a regional concept of intermediate district reorganization is being considered by the state.

Jordan told commissioners that the shared time vocational program was being provided on an experimental basis this term and is being coordinated through his office. Through financial assistance from the state, Bruce Vickey was hired by the intermediate district as career education director.

The intermediate school superintendent expressed the thought that additional local tax money would be needed in the future to support vocational education, regardless of future intermediate school district reorganization, and believed that an expanded program could be offered if funded through a voted tax similar to the one at present which finances the intermediate district's special education program.

The majority of commissioners expressed interest in the vocational training program. William Woreley, chairman, called it one of the best meetings he had ever attended between county and school officials concerning mutual problems.

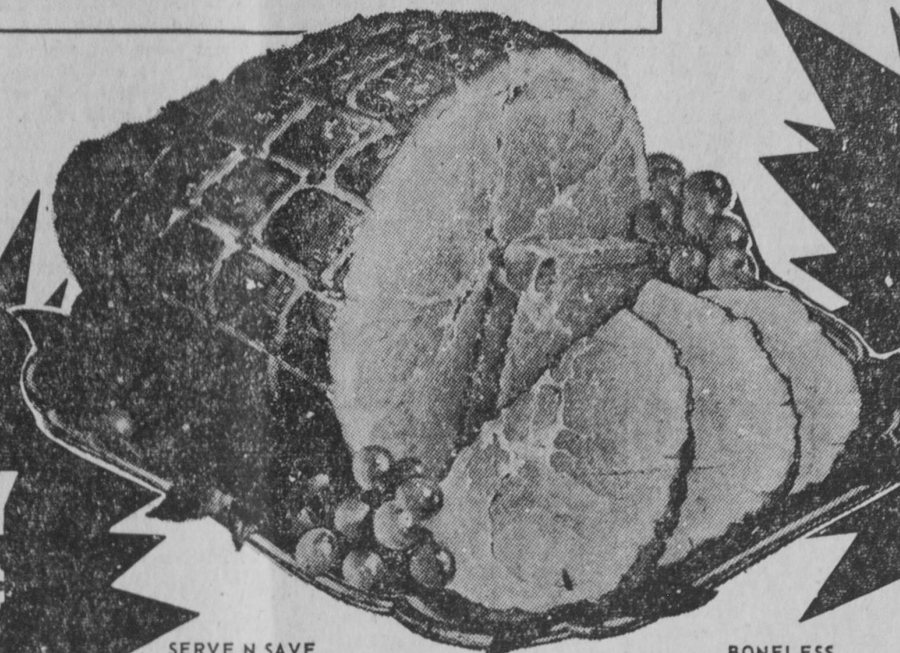

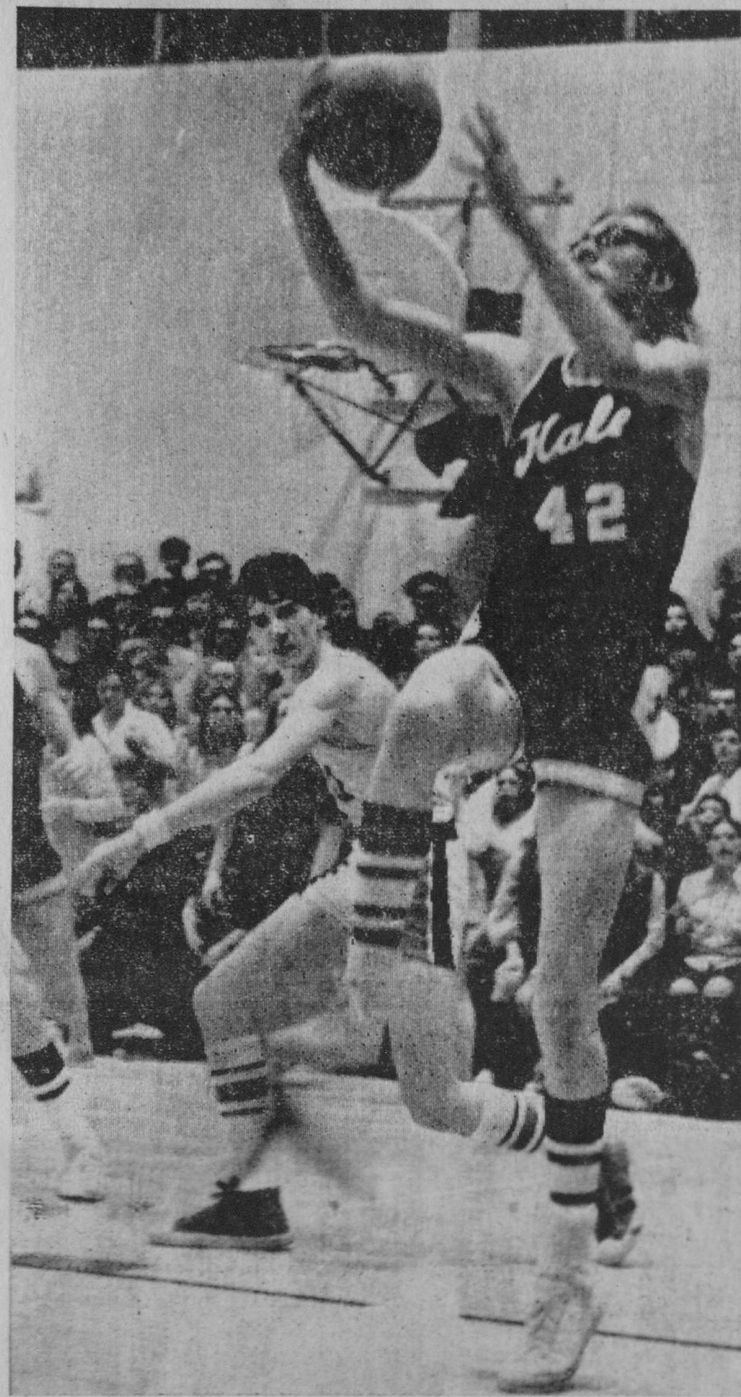

# Eagles Pull Two Games Out of Fire for Trophy

Winning two straight "cliffhanger" games, Hale Area Eagles emerged champion of the D district tournament Friday night at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School. More than 1,000 rabid fans were squeezed into the Cardinal's nest for the deciding game in a tournament which has to go down as one of the most exciting in area high school history.

Now going to the regional tournament at Mt. Pleasant, Hale Area is scheduled to meet Beal City Thursday at 7:00 p. m. Beal City has a 19-2 record. The winner of this game plays in the championship Saturday at 2:30 p. m.

The Eagles, winner of the North Star League trophy, added another coveted piece of polished wood and plated metal to the trophy case in their new high school when they squeezed by Arenac Eastern, 48-44, in Friday night's championship game. The Whittemore-Prescott Area School gymnasium definitely was not a place for anyone with a weak heart.

Teams of both schools proved true to their nicknames — Eagles — by clawing their way to the championship game with exciting wins over area opponents. The Eagles of Arenac Eastern eliminated one of their arch rivals, AuGres-Sims, in the opening night of play, while the Eagles of Hale Area sidetracked the host school Cardinals by only four points on Wednesday night. (See page 2 of this section for details.)

Both teams were primed defensively for the big game, but fans kept looking for one team or the other to suddenly break the game wide open with a hot shooting streak. That breakthrough never came as Arenac Eastern just could not find the range at the baskets, converting only 20 out of 63 shots from the floor, and Hale Area's offense was stalled by an amazing total of 29 turnovers.

Hale's Eagles just could not find the handle on the ball and turned it over 11 times in the first half and 16 times in the second half. Only an incredible shooting performance by Center Greg Pickett overcame the Eagles' passing problems. Pickett meshed six out of six field goal attempts in the second quarter and four out of six shots in the third quarter to maintain Hale Area's slim lead.

Neither team could penetrate their opponent's defense in the opening quarter and the first eight minutes ended in an eight to eight stalemate.

The lead then saw-sawed back and forth as Hale began to lose the ball on infractions or bad passes and Arenac Eastern began peppering the backboard with shots. The only Eastern player to hit with any consistency was Guard Bob Shutte, who meshed three buckets. During the first five minutes of the quarter, Hale Area took only five shots and Pickett meshed every one of them. In the remaining two minutes, Steve Denstedt, Pickett and Steve Humphrey connected from the field and Hale Area had a 23-19 bulge at intermission.

Hale Area found itself with the same problem of turnovers in the third quarter while Arenac Eastern continued to bang the backboard with little results for their efforts. Pickett meshed two more buckets to make it nine in a row before finally missing. Jeff Miller's two pointer put Hale out in front, 29-19, widest scoring margin of the night, but Eastern's Rod Miller meshed a shot to make the score, 29-21. Two more buckets by Pickett were necessary to offset three straight charity tosses by Gene Williamson of Eastern. Two buckets by Shutte then cut Hale Area's lead to 33-28. Miller of Hale and Williamson of Eastern each scored field goals and Hale held a 35-30 lead at the end of the third quarter.

The final quarter was fast and furious as Shutte connected on two straight field goals to cut Hale's lead to 35-34, but Miller meshed a field goal. Keyno Sheltenberger hit on one foul shot and Pickett hit the twine for another two-pointer to give Hale a 40-34 lead. Arenac Eastern scored four baskets and Miller countered with two to give Hale a 44-42 lead with 57 seconds to go. Pickett and Miller meshed two free throws each to offset one bucket by Bruce Grusecki of Eastern to make the final score, 48-44, in Hale Area's favor.

It was the kind of a game where every basket was a big one for the eventual winner and Hale Area meshed an amazing 21 shots out of only 39 attempts. Leading the way to the championship was Pickett, who had 12 field goals and two charity tosses for 26 points. He was followed by Miller, who had seven field goals and two foul shots for 16 points.

Leading Eastern in the scoring column was Shutte, who had 15 points on seven from the field and one charity toss. Williamson had 11 points on four and three. Grusecki had 10 points on five field goals.

Tawas Area Braves turned in a good account of themselves for two quarters Saturday night, but it was just not in the cards for them to repeat as champion of the B district basketball tournament at Ogemaw Heights. A highly-talented Bay City All Saints team whipped the Braves, 62-42, to claim the 1973 trophy.

All Saints, after a close win over the host school Wednesday night, had a cold first half and probably

took the game with the Braves a little too lightly.

The Cougars clicked on 27 of 60 shots for a .450 shooting percentage, while Tawas made only 16 of 53 shots for a .285 percentage.

Talaga led in scoring with 18

points, followed by 14 points each for Learman and Pike. Larry Nichols paced the Braves and took game scoring honors with 20 points. He was the only Tawas scorer in double figures.

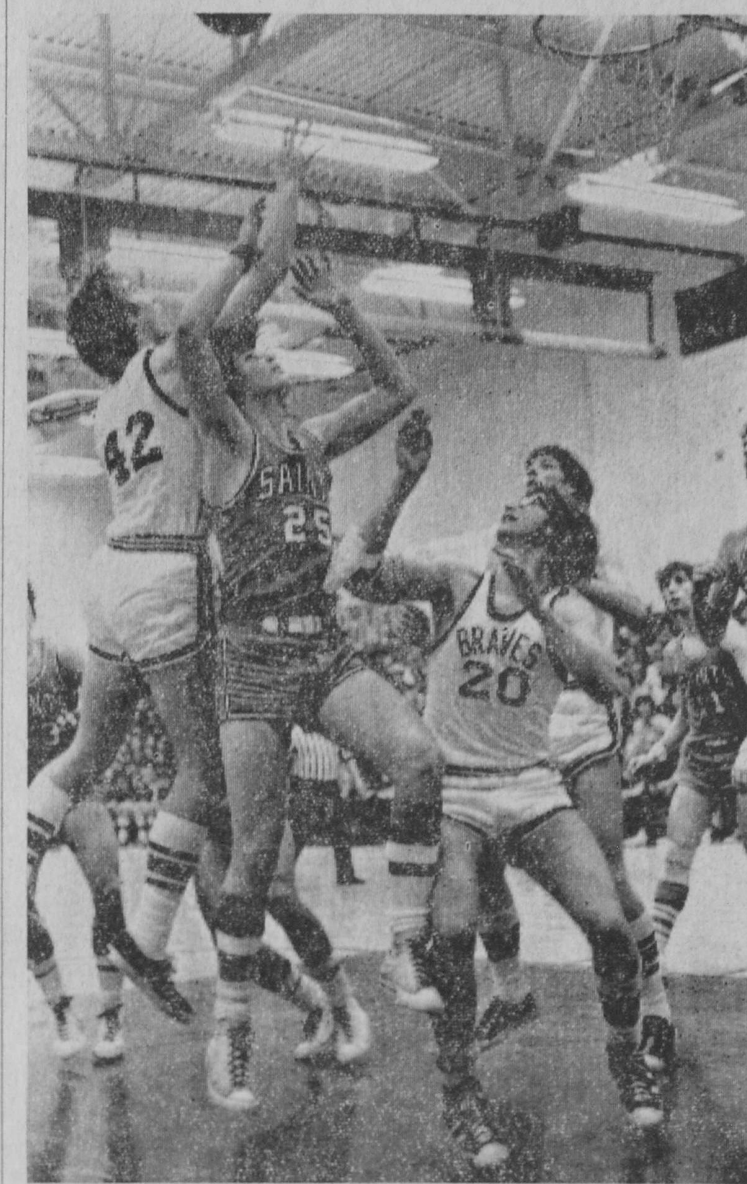
The Braves bowed out of tournament play and the season with a record of 11 wins and 11 losses. The Bay City team has a record of 19 wins and three losses.

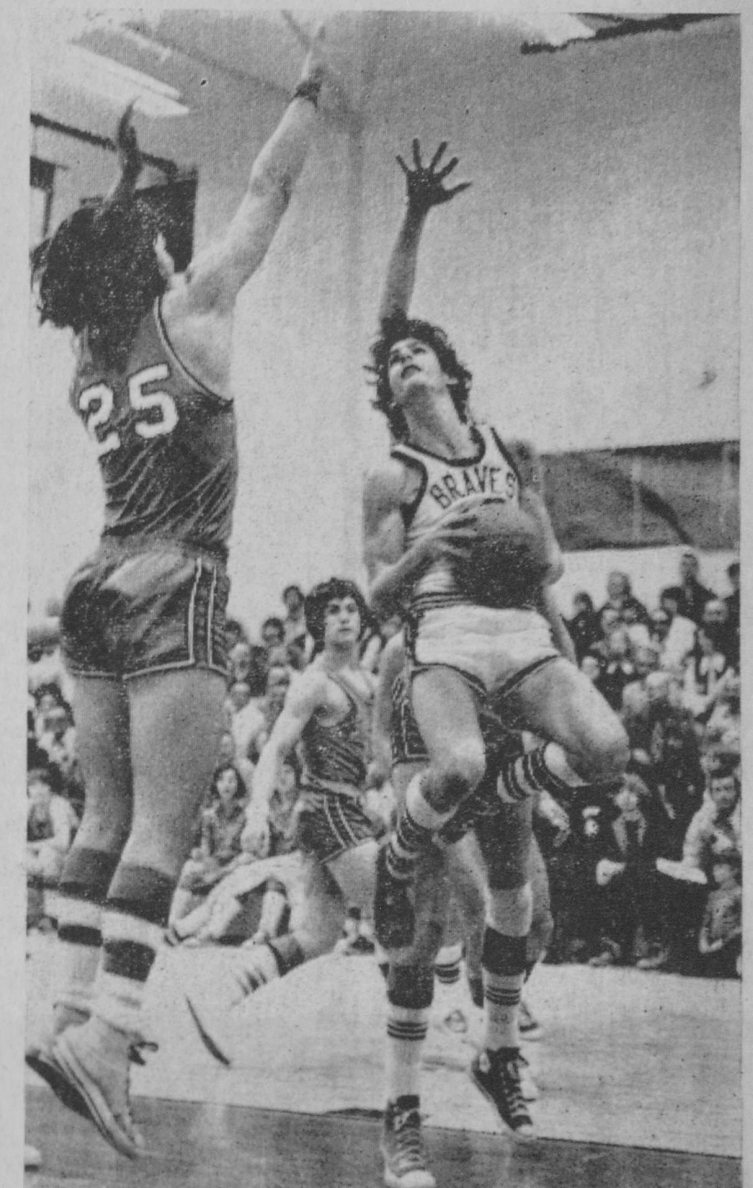

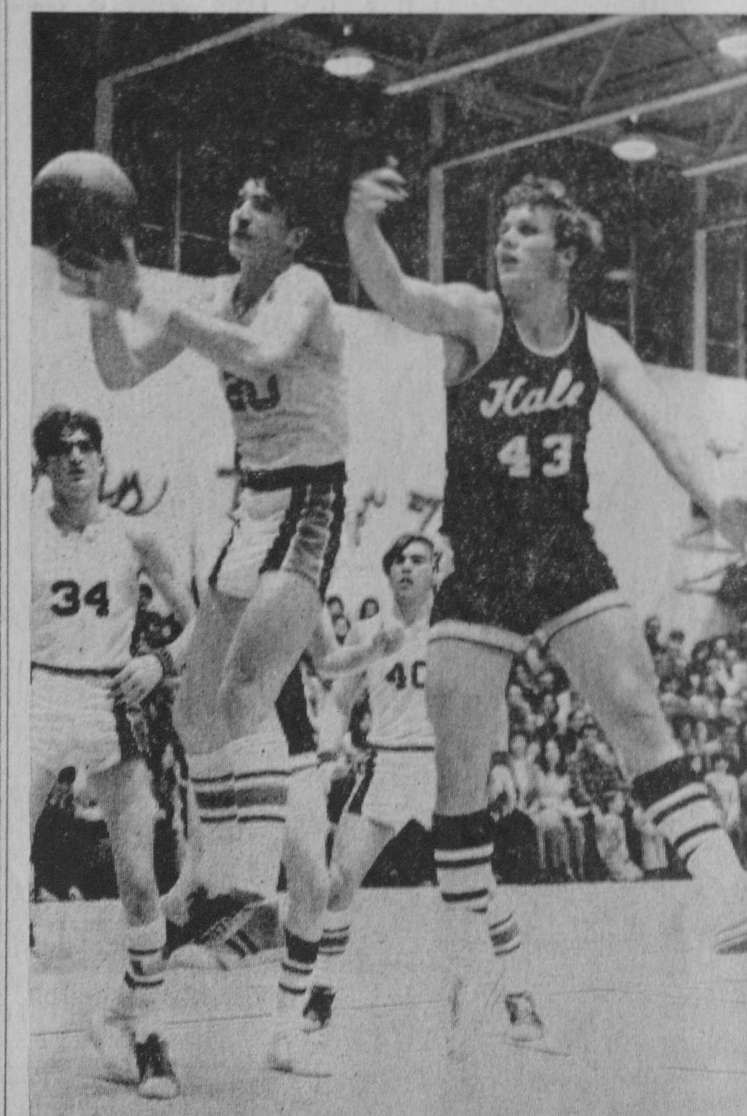

# Enroll Now For Medical Insurance

People 65 and older who have not already signed up for the medical insurance part of medicare can enroll now through April 2 at any so-

cial security office, according to John Carr, social security district manager, Bay City.

Medical insurance helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. It is the voluntary part of medicare, funded by individual premiums and general revenues from the federal government. The basic premium is \$5.80 a month through June. It will be increased to \$6.30 a month, starting July 1.

"You have seven months to sign up for the medical insurance part of medicare the first time," Carr said. "You can apply in the three months before you are 65, the month you become 65 or the three months thereafter. But you must apply during the three-month period before you are 65 to have protection beginning the month you become 65. Otherwise, your protection will begin with a later month."

"After your first sign-up period ends," Carr said, "you can sign up only during a general enrollment period, the first three months of every year. If you delay signing up for more than a year, however, you pay a higher premium."

This year's general enrollment period has been extended through Monday, April 2, because March 31 falls on Saturday.

"Previously," Carr said, "you had to sign up in an enrollment period that began within three years after you became eligible for medical insurance or within three years after your protection stopped because you canceled. The three-year deadline was eliminated by the 1972 amendments to the social security law."

"If you cancel your medical insurance, you can re-enroll only once," he said.

Nine out of 10 people 65 and over are enrolled in the medical insurance part of medicare. Last year, the medical insurance program paid over two billion dollars in benefits on behalf of more than 10½ million people.

The medical insurance part of medicare supplements the medicare hospital insurance program, which helps pay for hospital bills and certain post-hospital expenses.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. The Bay City social security office is at 1009 North Madison Avenue. The phone number is 839-9579.

# Eagles Advanced to Final With Win Over Cardinals

Hale Area Eagles advanced to Saturday night's district basketball championship with a 67-62 victory Wednesday night over a stubborn Whittemore-Prescott Area Cardinal team, which just would not give up until four of its starting players fouled out late in the fourth quarter.

The Cards, seeking to repeat their upset of the Eagles two weeks ago, nearly pulled off the trick again as they came from behind in the fourth quarter to take the lead, 50-48, but then threw caution to the wind as their extremely close guarding tactics against the Eagles backfired on them. Bob Clayton, Paul Rosemeck, Joe Smith and Jim Moraitis all left the floor via the foul route.

Even though their aim faltered slightly at the charity line in the fourth quarter, the Eagles picked up 10 points on fouls during that quarter to give them a total of 27 free throw points for the night.

Howard Barringer meshed two quick field goals for the Cards to tie the game for the last time at 54-54, but Pickett then went to work to score 11 points and Steve Denstedt scored one bucket to put the Eagles out in front. The Cards closed the gap to 57-56 on Moraitis's field goal, but then fell back as four of their starters left via the foul route.

Each team had two big scorers, Miller and Pickett leading Hale Area with 27 and 25 points, respectively. Barringer and Moraitis topped the Card offense with 19 and 17 points.

# Local Postmark Still Available in Tawas City

Postmaster Leonard Hosbach today said that despite the switch to "area mail processing," the local postmark is still available to anyone who wants it.  
"It simply is not true that the local city postmark has been eliminated. It still exists in every post office in the United States," Hosbach said.  
Hosbach was reacting to a few items appearing in some newspapers which indicates the local postmark is a thing of the past.  
"These reports are connected with the installation of 'area mail processing,' a program whereby mail originating within a sectional center area is consolidated at the sectional center facility for complete preparation and processing for outgoing dispatch," he said.  
"By sending mail to a central point for processing, we can give our customers faster deliveries while cutting costs through maximum utilization of mail processing equipment," he explained. "Such mail will receive a postmark which reads 'United States Postal Service, the state abbreviation, the first three numbers of the zip code, along with the date and a. m.-p. m. designation!'"  
The postmaster emphasized that while the new system eliminated the local postmark, it still is available to customers who drop their letters in designated letter-drop units.

Striking with startling rapidity, Adolf Hitler's motorized army crossed the Austrian frontier, seized Vienna, forced Austrian Chancellor Kurt Schuschnigg to resign and placed a full-fledged Nazi administration in command of the Austrian government. Jittery European governments were thrown into a panic as they learned of the German leader's astounding coup. In Washington, D. C., Sec. of State Cordell Hull announced a hands off policy toward the European crisis and noted leaders gave their opinion that there was no immediate danger of a general war.
