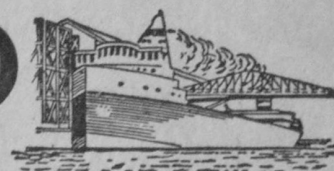

MPSC Comment Draws Fire

Railroad Healthy; Looks to Future

A bright future was predicted for the eastern section of Michigan from Bay City north by Edward V. Goodman, president and general manager of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway Company.

Angered by comment attributed to a member of the railroad staff of the Michigan Public Service Commission that if given permission the railroads will abandon all of the state north of Bay City, Goodman said:

"There is no section of the state with a brighter future and the D&M Railway hopes to play a big part in its development. I can foresee no circumstances which will cause us to abandon our line. It is profitable and we feel it will serve even more

industry in the near future.

"Our line is profitable and we feel we are an important part in the growth of the area. We have invested much time and money in obtaining industrial sites and have a busy department selling them to prospective employers. We are here to stay, make no mistake about it."

In an interview after the hearing before the MPSC, Goodman expanded:

"More and more thought is being given to the welfare of the employee in all industries. We have an area that is very attractive to the working man and his family. He does not have to drive half a day to go fishing, hunting or boating. He is here. It is here. An ideal combination.

"We invested almost two million dollars in additional freight cars last year. Would that indicate we are planning anything but better service for more and more customers?"

"Our railroad runs from Bay City to Cheboygan and Alpena. We expect a substantial growth in the next 10 years."

Three Holdup Men Foiled by Victim's Fists

Three holdup men were frightened off early Monday morning when their intended victim disregarded a snubnose revolver pointed at his head to strike one of the holdup men in the face. All three men then ran off and avoided apprehension by area police agencies.

Robert E. Jones, operator of the Iosco Hotel in Tawas City, told investigating sheriff's department officers that the three men pounded on the back door of the hotel at 5:15 o'clock, stating that they were police officers and to open the door.

Jones said he thought it strange that police officers would come to the back door at that time of the morning. He loaded a .32 caliber automatic pistol and slipped it in his back pocket.

When he opened the door, Jones was confronted by a revolver thrust into his face by one man. No words were spoken, but Jones struck the gunman immediately, spinning him around. The sudden action by Jones apparently startled the trio as all three ran off.

Jones told officers that he fired three shots into the air and ordered them to stop. However, they split up and ran in different directions.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said the three men all wore air force parkas. Investigation continues.

Two PI Accidents Checked by County

Two personal injury automobile accidents were investigated over the week-end by Iosco Sheriff's Department.

A car driven by Lawrence C. Brainard, 18, East Tawas, ran into a car parked on US-23 in front of the Tawas City branch of Peoples State Bank shortly after midnight Sunday. Brainard and a passenger, Richard Bertsch, 17, Tawas City, were treated at Tawas Hospital.

The driver told officers that he glanced from the road for an instant to talk to his passenger and he ran into the rear of a parked car owned by Kenneth A. Schaaf, East Tawas.

One person was injured Saturday in a two-car crash on M-55 at Towerline Road, Reno Township. Thomas Bain Jr., 43, Hale, was in the process of making a left hand turn off Towerline Road onto M-55. His vehicle stalled as he pulled onto the highway and was struck by a car driven by Barbara Hadden, 56, Tawas City. She was treated at Tawas Hospital. Two passengers in her car escaped injury.

City Makes Plans for 1973 Projects

With spring rapidly approaching, Tawas City Council is to hold several special meetings in the near future to coordinate its plans for proposed street construction and water-sewer projects.

Work is to commence this week by a contractor on construction of bridges on First Street and Mathews Street, replacing old structures which have deteriorated rapidly during recent years.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told councilmen Monday night that Edmands Engineering Company of Bay City had assured him that plans for reconstruction of 12 major streets with 17,110 feet of plant mix blacktop would be ready by the March 19 council meeting.

Considerable work must be accomplished by the city crew prior to start of this \$68,450 project, being financed with federal revenue sharing money. Preliminary preparation would include blading of shoulders and bringing the roads to grade.

In addition, the council and the city manager must coordinate storm sewer, sanitary sewer and water main construction so as to insure that this work is completed prior to work on the street surfaces. The obvious reason is that once the street work is completed, the city does not wish to cause damage to the blacktop surface with sewer and water main construction.

In its original planning, the council designated blacktop work this year on only those streets which would require a minimum amount of preparation for sewer and water work.

The city is still awaiting engineering for storm sewer drainage on Fourth Avenue, Oak Street, German Street and Beach Street, as well as engineering authorized for several sewer and water extension projects.

"As soon as we get the engineering, we should sit down and discuss construction of necessary water and sewer connections so we know exactly where we stand," stated Mayor John Brugger.

In addition, the next phase in the planning will be to determine financing for the program. Because of the extent and nature of the work, the project would require establishment of assessment districts, revenue and possibly general obligation bonds. The latter would require a vote of the people.

Included would be construction of a forced sewer main connecting the Second Avenue lift station with the waste water treatment plant, loops in the water system to better serve the southeast sector of the city and the Harris Avenue area. Sewer main extensions include crossing the Tawas River to serve the area near Barkman Lumber Company, as well as other parts of the city.

A decision must be reached by the council concerning allocation of work to be accomplished by the city department of public works and work to be done by a contractor.

The city manager is currently studying means of financing purchase of a new back hoe for the department of public works. The present unit is 13 years old and ready for retirement. A new back hoe and tractor would cost approximately \$12,500.

During discussion Monday night, it was emphasized that an equipment replacement fund should be established to insure that funds would be available in the future to purchase equipment.

Braves Win

Tawas Area Braves defeated Pinconning, 54-41, in district class B play Tuesday night at Ogemaw Heights and go to the championship game Saturday night. Opposing the Braves will be either Bay City All Saints or Ogemaw Heights. The host school defeated Essexville Garber Monday night to move to Thursday night's pairing.

East Tawas Follows Engineer's Advice on Water Storage Priority

On recommendation of its engineer, East Tawas Council indicated Monday night it would not consider construction of a 12-inch main from its water filtration plant to connect with Tawas City until the latter provides additional water storage facilities. Tawas City has purchased water from East Tawas since 1958, when the latter's filtration plant first went into use.

The council recommended that engineers for both cities hold a meeting with city officials to work out mutual problems.

Acting on a recommendation from its board of public works, the East Tawas Council noted that Spicer Engineering Company had recommended that both communities construct additional water storage facilities.

In a report to the council, Paul R. Spicer, superintendent of public works, stated that a 500,000-gallon ground level storage tank recommended by Spicer would eliminate the need for a 12-inch force main until about 1979.

He said that should a 12-inch water main connect directly to Tawas City from the filtration plant, rather than the present six-inch main, water pressure in East Tawas' Third Ward could be lowered because of the demand by Tawas City users. He said that the engineering report had indicated that additional ground level storage facilities constructed in Tawas City would allow filling of the storage facility during "off hours" in the filtration plant operation, which has more than adequate capacity to serve both communities.

This was the same recommendation made by Spicer Engineering in April 1971. At the time, the Saginaw firm had acted as Tawas City's engineering consultant and the city council had tabled the firm's plans for future expansion of the city's water storage and distribution system.

That plan included construction of a 500,000-gallon ground storage facility and improvements to the present water supply connections and ad-

ditions to the water distribution system as the first phase; construction of a 12-inch gravity connection to East Tawas in 1979-80; construction of a 200,000-gallon elevated tank by 1990.

In May of 1971, the city council voiced dissatisfaction with the water storage-transmission project prepared by Spicer and hired Edmands Engineering, Bay City, as the city's consulting engineer.

Since changing engineers, the Tawas City Council has indicated its desire to construct a 12-inch force main directly to the water filtration plant, to be followed by construction of water storage facilities. Included in the combined federal project submitted by East Tawas, Baldwin Township and Tawas City is a 200,000-gallon overhead storage tank for Tawas City. Because of President Nixon's freeze on federal funding, this combined project has not been approved for funds.

At its annual meeting February 12, the joint water board of East Tawas-Tawas City adopted two resolutions requested by the Tawas City Council. One resolution recommended to the council that a 12-inch water main and meter be installed at the joint city limit in 1973. The other resolution concerned extension of water mains to the city limits of both cities.

The joint water board took note of the fact, however, that the two city councils and respective engineering consultants were investigating the feasibility of constructing a 12-inch water main and if storage facilities should be a controlling factor.

File Petitions For Fluoride Advisory Vote

The question of adding fluoride to the municipal water supply as a tooth decay preventative is to be placed before East Tawas voters in the April election.

Appearing before Monday night's meeting of the East Tawas Council requesting the advisory vote was a group of women headed by Mrs. Michael Free.

According to spokesmen for the group, benefits of adding fluoride to the municipal water supply would outweigh any disadvantages. Estimated cost of adding the compound would be 10 cents per user per quarter.

The city clerk is to check petitions presented to the council to determine validity of the signatures. If signatures are sufficient on petitions, the matter would be placed before voters in April.

The East Tawas water filtration plant produces the water supply for both Tawas City and East Tawas.

In other business, a committee was appointed to meet with the city attorney to voice their complaints concerning adoption of a new cable television franchise with General Cable Television of Oscoda.

A certification from the county clerk revealed that there are 1,571 registered voters in East Tawas. According to the official census of 1970, the total number of persons residing in East Tawas is 2,362. This would indicate that there are only 800 persons either under the age of 18 or not registered in the city. Councilmen indicated that the difference is not realistic and that there was an error in the 1970 census, as was claimed at the time of the count.

Although the council had indicated that the city would not participate in mayor's exchange day during Michigan Week, East Tawas was paired with Milan for the exchange. As a result, the city has changed its plans and will participate in the exchange.

A proposed hunting ordinance had its second reading and the final reading is to be held on March 19.

The council tabled a request for adoption of an ordinance prohibiting snowmobiles from operating on city streets.

The East Tawas-Tawas City sanitary landfill facility is to be open one additional hour on Monday and Wednesday afternoons for the convenience of residents. The former closing time had been 5 o'clock.

Trouble Spot in Harris Ave. Water Main to be Replaced

As a means of eliminating frequent breaks in an old cast iron water main on Harris Avenue, Tawas City Water Board has authorized construction of 950 feet of new six-inch water main.

At Monday night's meeting of the city council, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that this section of main has been averaging two breaks each winter for the past four years.

Bublitz said that a number of factors contributed to the breaks. He said that the cast iron main, constructed during the WPA project of

1935, was unstable because of varying thicknesses of main sidewalls. In addition, Bublitz said that a sand cushion had not been provided in the heavy clay and that frost penetration was responsible for the breaks.

This section of Harris Avenue is included in street construction plans for this summer. Street work is to be delayed along this section of Harris Avenue until the new main is constructed. Bublitz said that work could not commence on the water main until early summer due to the high water table.

The city manager said that the new main would have to be constructed parallel to the existing main, with all the necessary valves and residential connections in place to assure that there would be no disruption of service.

In addition to the water problem, Bublitz said that timbers from the old Plank Road constructed in the late 1800s were gradually working toward the surface and would complicate digging of a new trench. He estimated that the project would require about 10 days of work by the city crew. Estimated cost would be \$6 per foot if constructed by the city and \$12 per foot if constructed by a contractor.

The city manager said that the six-inch main would provide additional water volume to the Iosco Medical Care Facility and Tawas Area High School. The present four-inch cast iron main connects to the east with a six-inch main and on Harris Avenue with a six-inch main constructed in 1956 to serve the high school.

Eagles Seek Zoning Change at Proposed New Location

Representatives of Tawas Bay Aerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, have requested a meeting of the Tawas City Zoning Board of Appeals to consider a zoning change to allow location of that organization's liquor license in the clubroom in Tawas City's industrial park.

Proposed location of the new Eagles hall would be the building formerly occupied by Mahar Pattern Company on Ninth Avenue. Such a change would require redesignating the property from industrial to B-2 business.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told the city council Monday night that he was to set a date for the meeting of the zoning appeals board, according to terms of the city zoning ordinance. All property owners within 300 feet of the proposed site are to be notified of the hearing by registered mail.

Although determination of a zoning change is the responsibility of the appeals board, the city manager said the council had a legitimate interest in any zoning change in the industrial park.

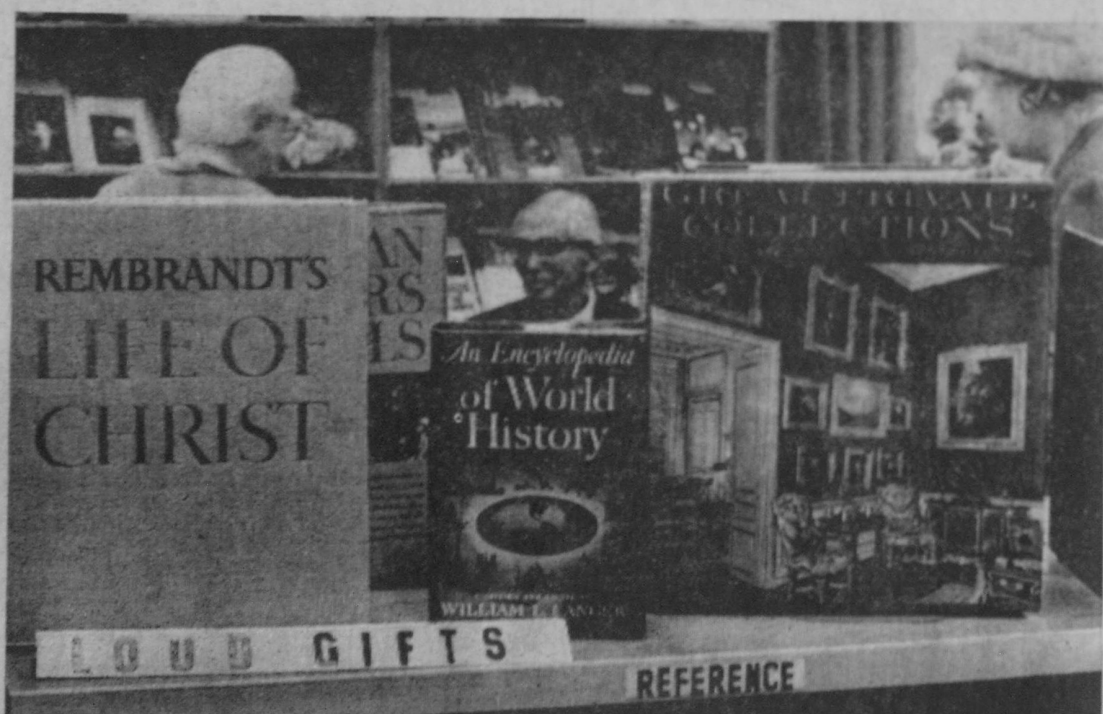
At the last meeting of the council,

minutes of the planning commission indicated that the Eagles were interested in locating in the building formerly occupied by Michigan Consolidated Gas Company on First Avenue. A group of residents from that neighborhood appeared before Monday night's meeting to protest location of a liquor license at that site.

Also appearing before the council was Lester Kendall of Ninth Avenue, who complained that Brooks Auto Parts had expanded its operation onto three lots which it recently purchased. Kendall claims, too, that the firm had disposed of junk materials in Dead Creek.

The city manager said that Brooks had been notified two weeks ago that expansion of the business on new property was in violation of the city zoning ordinance and that owners had indicated that cars and other materials placed outside the original limit would be removed.

The city manager said he would ask the district health department sanitarian to accompany him on an inspection of Dead Creek concerning the alleged dumping of materials in the creek.

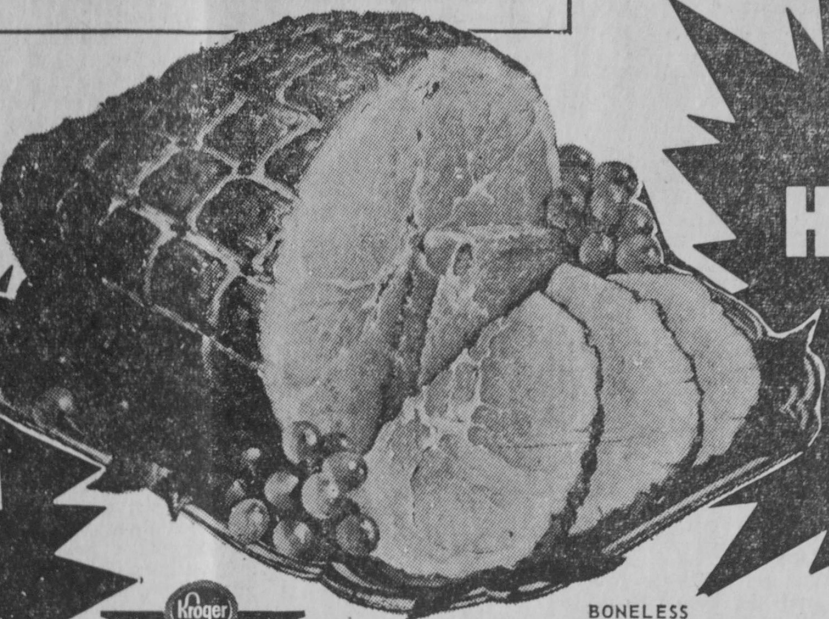

In wrapping up the NSL trophy Friday night to end the league season with a 15-1 record, plus three nonconference losses and one non-conference win, the Eagles meshed 23 points in a red hot first quarter. In that quarter, they penetrated Hillman's zone defense to score with ease and, when forced to shoot the long ones, just could not miss the hoop.

Whether or not the Eagles have a tendency to play according to the ability of the opposition remains to be seen. Hillman's play Friday night certainly was not the same as on the night of February 9, when they upset Arenac Eastern and put the Eagles all alone at the top of the NSL. The visiting Hillman squad just could not penetrate Hale Area's defense and could not find the range on long shots in that first quarter. The Eagles were on top, 28-5, at the end of the first eight minutes of play and appeared on their way to an easy win.

As it turned out, the win was not an easy one for the Eagles. Losing control of the backboards and suddenly "going cold" on their shooting, the Eagles found themselves outscored, 21-16, in the second quarter, but they still had a good scoring bulge after that great first quarter effort.

If the Eagles were cold in the second quarter they were absolutely frozen in the second half. Hale Area, a team which scored 91 points against Posen earlier this season, could only score 15 points in the entire 16 minutes of the second half. Their turnovers, poor shooting and poor passing may have been in sympathy with the same style of play as shown by Hillman, which garnered only 21 points during the same period of time.

In any event, eyes of all basketball fans of Western Iosco County will be focused tonight on the hardwood at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School.

Tawas Area Braves finished out the regular season of play Friday night by turning in a good second half performance before finally being edged out by Alpena High, 56-52. The Tawas team had a record of 10 wins and 10 losses in the 1972-1973 basketball season.

Despite the loss, Coach Jim Papenfus felt that the Braves would be going into this week's district basketball action in a good frame of mind. After playing a very poor first half, the Braves snapped out of it to give the class A north country squad a good run for the money.

After losing by 11 points earlier in the season to Alpena, Tawas traveled north Friday night with an eye for some vengeance. A poor showing in the first half was just too much, however, for a fine second half performance.

Using a good half-court press, Alpena jumped to a 20-14 margin in the first quarter and then doubled Tawas' second quarter scoring effort with a 16-8 count. Throughout the game, Tawas' guards just could not find shooting room because of the tight Alpena defense.

The Braves suddenly found some life in the third quarter and bounced right back into the game with a 15-9 margin over Alpena. In the final quarter, Tawas cut Alpena's lead to only one point and was down by two points with 14 seconds remaining. On Steelheads

Ask Fishermen to Report Clipped Fins

Persons fishing for steelheads in tributaries of Lake Huron are asked to report any catches of fin-clipped fish to the Department of Natural Resources (DNR).

The information gained from the catch reports will help fisheries biologists trace the movements of planted steelheads and may have a bearing on where future plantings are made.

Reports of fin-clipped steelheads taken in the AuSable River in the past several months already have shed some light on steelhead movement patterns in Lake Huron, according to Jerry V. Manz, Roscommon, Regional Great Lakes Fisheries biologist for the DNR.

He said that of 34 marked fish that have been reported caught in the AuSable, at least 15 were planted in Ontario waters. Ontario fisheries crews are known to have planted 10,000 marked steelheads in the Saugeen River in 1970 and the same

number in 1971.

"It is remarkable that about half of the marked steelheads reported recovered in the AuSable have been from Ontario plants," commented Gary Schincke, Mio, DNR District Fisheries biologist. "Obviously, there is a lot of movement back and forth across that lake."

The Michigan DNR last year planted 340,000 rainbow and steelheads in Lake Huron from the St. Marys River to Lakeport, all of them fin-clipped. Many of these fish are now being caught in the AuSable River and others are beginning to show up in Ontario waters. The department is hoping to receive reports of any of these that may be caught so that biologists may learn more about steelhead movements and growth rates.

Many of the planted steelheads were marked by having the adipose fin removed. This is a fin that might easily be overlooked by anglers. It grows on the back between the dorsal fin and the tail.

Fishermen catching steelheads with clipped fins are asked to notify any DNR office or conservation officer. They should report the area in which the catch was made, length and weight of the fish and the missing fin.

This is not a talent or bathing suit contest. Each state winner will travel, at expenses paid, to the national finals at Atlanta, Georgia, in late August.

Convert Refunds Into US Bonds

An unusual opportunity to convert 1972 federal income tax refund checks into United States savings bonds was announced Friday, March 2, by John E. Hoshbach, Iosco County chairman for the bond program and vice president of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas.

"The treasury estimates that this could be the largest tax refund year in history," Hoshbach said, "with 22 billion dollars going to some 58 million recipients, an average of nearly \$400 apiece."

"The United States Savings Bonds Division, through the cooperation of the Internal Revenue Service, provides immediate opportunity for those recipients to convert their refund checks into bonds. A special bond application form is being mailed, with instructions, along with each tax refund check. Persons wishing to turn their refund checks into bonds need only to fill out the form and take it along with the check to the nearest savings bonds issuing agent, most likely the bank. There, bonds in the specified amounts will be issued promptly."

"This timely opportunity," Hoshbach continued, "permits individuals to buy bonds in the amounts desired in a manner convenient for both the purchaser and the issuing agent. We encourage the residents of Iosco County and elsewhere to use their tax refunds to add to their future security, buying Series E savings bonds, which draw 5 1/2 percent interest when held to maturity."

Family Living Education

How much do you know about buying and caring for meat and poultry? Here are some questions, with answers, that should give you a clue as to your knowledge. This is a test we all may take as we try stretching

our food dollars while prices increase.

Question: In buying a can of beef stew, can you be sure of getting a reasonable amount of meat in the product?

Answer: Yes. Inspection regulations of the United States Department of Agriculture's Consumer and Marketing Service require at least 25 percent beef, based on the fresh weight of the meat, to be in canned "beef stew" that is prepared under federal inspection. Similar requirements exist for other processed meat and poultry products—for instance, frozen meat or poultry pot pies must contain at least 25 percent meat; chili con carne at least 40 percent meat; chili con carne with beans, at least 25 percent meat, and corned beef hash, at least 35 percent beef.

Question: Does the arrangement of words in the name of a meat or poultry product give an indication as to the contents?

Answer: Yes. For instance, if you buy a product labeled "sliced beef and gravy," you can be sure of getting more beef than gravy, based on weight. A product called "gravy and sliced beef" on the other hand, will have more gravy than beef. This "first-most" rule applies to all meat and poultry products prepared under federal inspection.

Question: What does "water added" on a ham label mean?

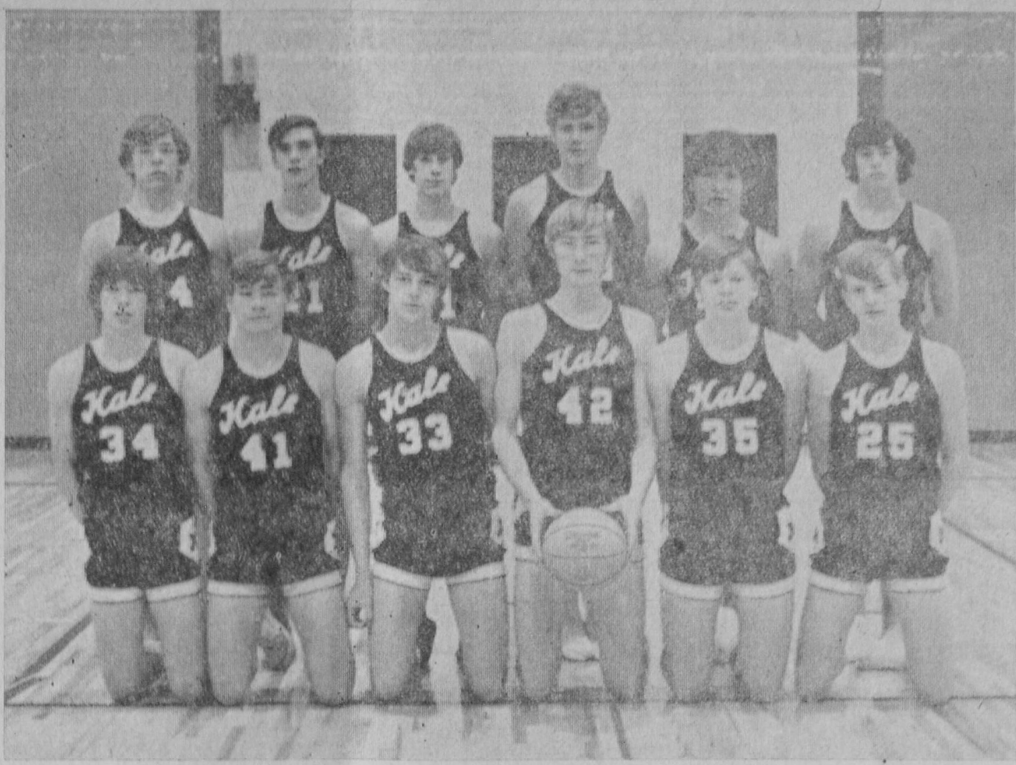
Answer: It means the ham contains up to 10 percent added moisture after it has been cured and processed. If the added water goes beyond 10 percent, the product would have to be labeled "imitation ham" under federal inspection regulations.

Question: How much does meat and poultry inspection cost the consumer?

Answer: Federal inspection—a tax-supported activity—costs each man, woman and child in the United States about 50 cents a year. With it comes assurance that these products have been prepared in sanitary surroundings, are wholesome and truthfully labeled. Part of the funding for federal inspection goes to the states as grants to help them develop and operate inspection programs that meet federal standards.

Question: Is it safe to refreeze poultry that was previously frozen and thawed out?

Answer: Yes. United States Department of Agriculture experts say as long as it still contains ice crystals or is still cold and has been held in the refrigerator no longer than two days after thawing. Put poultry in the freezer right after buying, if you plan to keep it more than two days before cooking. And make sure the wrappings are airtight. Chicken and turkey should keep safely at 0° (the usual freezer temperature) for up to a year. If you are planning to cook the poultry within two days after buying, loosen the wrappings to allow air circulation and store the product in the refrigerator.

Working Wife Has Right to Monthly SS Benefits

Question: My husband and I have both worked for many years and we are nearing retirement age. My sister recently told me I will not be able to get social security checks on my own record because I am living with my husband. She cannot be right, can she?

Answer: No, your sister is wrong. A wife who has worked under social security has the same right to monthly benefits as any other worker. However, a wife cannot get full benefits on her own work record and on her husband's at the same time. If a wife is eligible for benefits on more than one record, she will always get the larger of the two payments.

Question: My wife is 66 and a high school teacher. Last summer when she was not teaching she got monthly social security checks. We will report her total wages on our income tax return. My wife thinks that is all she has to do. Is she right?

Answer: No, she must also file an annual report of her earnings with

the Social Security Administration by April 16, 1973. This report is entirely different from an income tax return. The people at your social security office will be glad to help her complete the annual report.

Question: I am planning to retire in August of this year when I am 62. I found a baptismal certificate dated 1911, which is the year I was born. Can I use this to prove my date of birth for social security benefits?

Answer: Yes, since your baptismal record is dated before you were five, it is all you will need to prove your age for social security retirement benefits.

Question: My wife and I both get monthly social security retirement payments and have medicare coverage. We are planning a 20-day trip to Europe later this year. If either of us needs medical treatment while we are on our trip, will medicare cover it?

Answer: No. Medicare cannot help pay for any health services you need while you are in Europe.

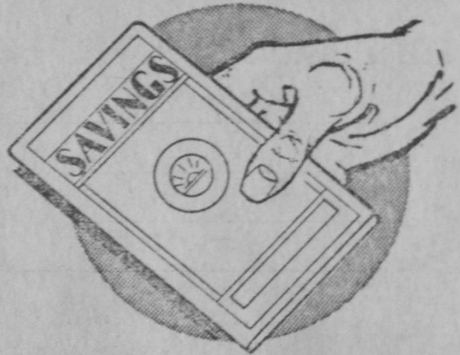

Busy Beaver Causes Much Mischief by Building Dams on Michigan's Streams

The busy beaver, fabled for his industry, is better known for his mischief to many conservation officers. They are the ones who have to answer nuisance animal complaints and the beaver heads the list of nuisance animals in the northern Lower Peninsula.

Beavers may be master dam builders, but they have little regard for the property rights of humans and that is how they get into so much trouble.

Their dams often flood roads, farm lands and railroad tracks. They can ruin stands of good timber by flooding them. Beavers also are sometimes guilty of cutting ornamental trees during their engineering escapades. They have posed hazards to drivers by cutting trees that toppled across roads.

When the Department of Natural Resources receives a beaver damage complaint, a conservation officer is dispatched to the scene to set a trap that captures the animals without harming them. They are then released in other areas where it is hoped they will not get into further trouble.

Next to beavers, deer are the cause of most damage complaints in the northern Lower Peninsula, according to Ned Curtis, Roscommon, regional law supervisor for the Department of Natural Resources.

Deer have been known to damage almost every crop grown in the region, but their heaviest depredations have been committed in the orchard country in Grand Traverse, Benzie and Leelanau Counties. Other favorite crops of whitetails include blueberries, strawberries and potatoes.

When deer are causing serious crop damage, permits are issued to landowners to shoot the animals, but only after a conservation officer has inspected the crops and certified that they have been damaged.

Bears also generate quite a few complaints, Curtis says. His region has five live traps for bears and these are in almost constant use during the summer.

Most of the complaints involve bears playing havoc with bee hives. Once in a while, they are a problem in orchards and occasionally they are guilty of killing livestock.

"People often fear the mere presence of bears and they are some-

times live-trapped and moved for this reason alone," Curtis says.

Skunks can be troublesome in the fall and spring. Curtis says they move under buildings in the fall when looking for places to spend the winter and they may become malodorous tenants. Skunks remain dormant during the winter but give birth in the spring and start creating problems at that time. Usually, conservation officers attempt to capture nuisance skunks in box-type traps and release them away from human habitation.

Raccoons are inordinately fond of sweet corn and sometimes will raid chicken coops, touching off cries for help from the DNR. Foxes, mink and weasels also have been caught trespassing in chicken coops.

Other complaints have been filed

against muskrats burrowing into lawns along watercourses, otters and herons gulping down fish in trout ponds and squirrels creating a racket in attics.

Wherever and whatever the nuisance, the problem is turned over to a conservation officer who considers handling a snarling mink or a sullen skunk as just another occupational hazard.

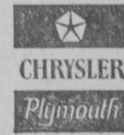

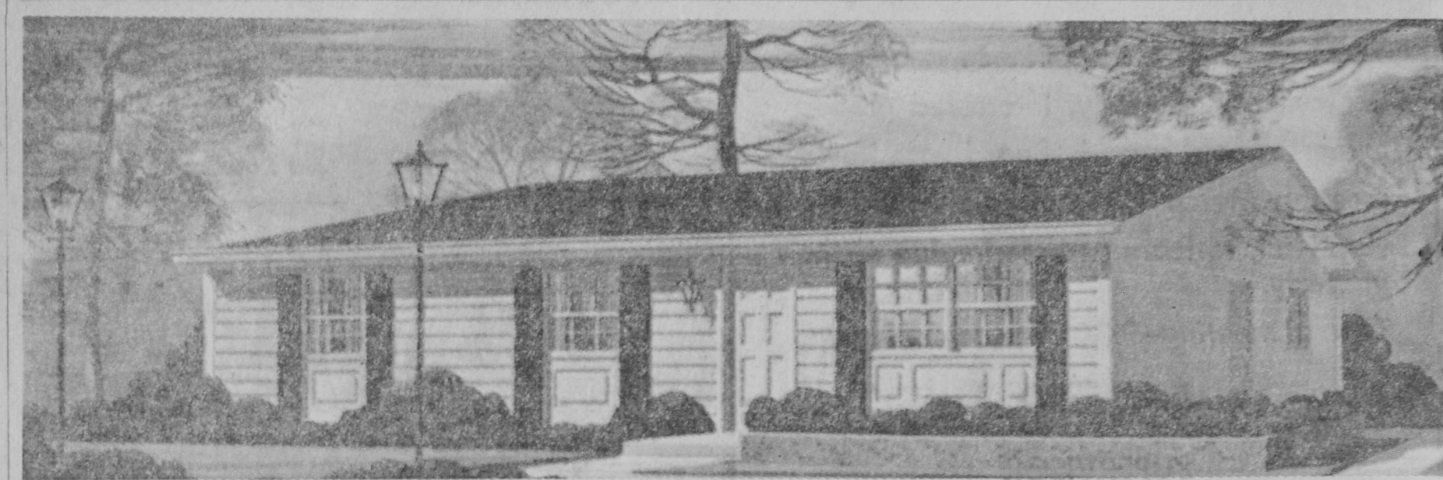

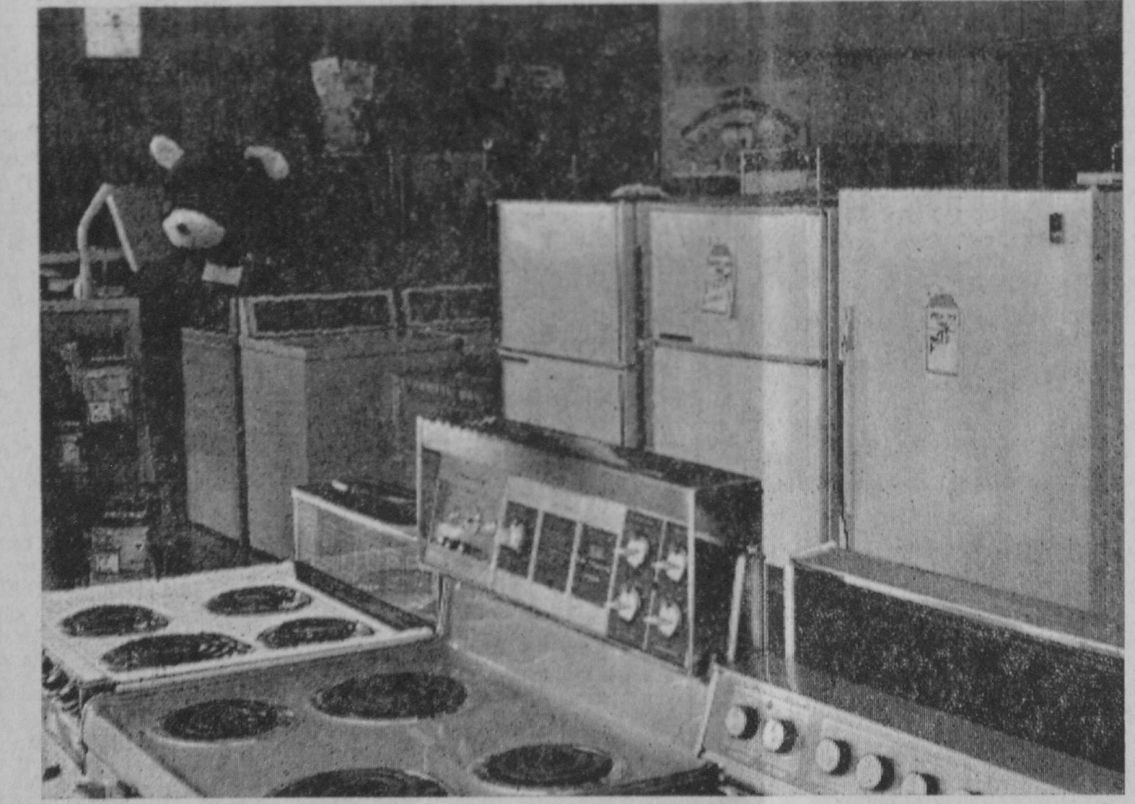
