





There are 4,500 more trees and bushes and 6,800 fewer billboards along state highways this spring than there were a year ago.


The trees have been planted and the billboards removed to make the roadsides more attractive.

Before another year passes, it is expected that more than 14,000 additional trees and bushes will be planted and several thousand more billboards taken down.

More than half of the nearly 30,000 signs along Michigan's interstate freeways and primary highways are being removed under the state billboard control act enacted last year. The trees are being planted under the state highway commission's continuing roadside beautification pro-

"Some trees necessarily have to be removed from highway construction and for safety reasons when they are too close to the highway," said E. V. Erickson, chairman of the state highway commission. "At the same time, the state highway program provides for the planting of thousands of trees annually along new and reconstructed highways particularly in urban areas.



Detroit is getting its first chance this week to sample the ground beefvegetable protein "burgers" which have been creating national attention as a way to attack the protein crisis and cut meat costs without sacrificing nutrients or flavor.

Kroger's Burger-Pro meat loaf is a mixture of 75 percent regular hamburger and 25 percent textured vegetable protein (TVP). TVP is made from soybean flour, which is extruded to the size and shape desired. In this case, the granules approximate ground beef in shape and size.

Burger-Pro meat loaf browns and cooks like regular ground beef and may be used in any recipe where regular ground beef might be used. There is somewhat less shrinkage, so patties and meat loaves come out a bit plumper than normal. The dry soy protein, as prepared before mixing, is virtually tasteless. It takes on he meat flavor during cooking. A delcate degree of seasoning has been added to the vegetable protein to ennance its blending qualities with the lavor of beef.
