
#### A Dream of Hunters



MICHIGAN DEER HUNTERS will find some of their best hunting prospects for Thursday's season opener in wooded areas containing oak trees and along oak ridges, thanks to a bumper crop of acorns, reports Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologists. Even if snow blankets the countryside, deer should be actively pawing for these little nuggets in wooded areas. That is because acorns are mighty important to the diet of deer, a fat-producing staple which literally can put the animals in good shape to make it through Michigan's long winters. This year's outstanding output of acorns, even bigger and better than in 1972, is traced to favorable frost conditions in the spring. Recognizing the importance of the acorn to many species of wildlife, it seems amazing that foresters continue to girdle and kill oak trees on public lands in this area of Northeastern Michigan.
