

MICHIGAN DEER HUNTERS will find some of their best hunting prospects for Thursday's season opener in wooded areas containing oak trees and along oak ridges, thanks to a bumper crop of acorns, reports Department of Natural Resources wildlife biologists. Even if snow blankets the countryside, deer should be actively pawing for these little nuggets in wooded areas. That is because acorns are mighty important to the diet of deer, a fat-producing staple which literally can put the animals in good shape to make it through Michigan's long winters. This year's outstanding output of acorns, even bigger and better than in 1972, is traced to favorable frost conditions in the spring. Recognizing the importance of the acorn to many species of wildlife, it seems amazing that foresters continue to cirdle and kill oak trees on public lands in this area of Northeastern Michigan.

Losing Candidates May Ask Recount

Candidates defeated in last week's general election in Tawas City have until Thursday to file petitions for precinct recounts. According to state law, such a petition must be filed within six days of the official canvass, which was conducted last Friday.

Federal Milk Aid Restored to Schools

Although official word has not been received locally, the federal government is expected to restore full funding of the special milk program to provide snack time milk for school children.

Last July, the department of agriculture limited spending for milk this year, but congress insisted that funding for the special milk program be restored to the full level provided in the department's appropriations legislation for 1973-74.

As a result, schools participating in the national school lunch program are to be reimbursed at a rate of four cents per one-half pint of special milk served.

In the case of Tawas Area School, it will mean that the school lunch program will be reimbursed approximately \$1,500. Loss of the funding had been of major concern to local school officials because of rising lunch program costs due to inflation.

Alpena Trucker Died in Crash

A 58-year-old Alpena truck driver was killed early Monday morning in a crash about one-quarter mile south of the M-171 intersection at Oscoda. Killed was Theodore Leo LaCross, an employee of Thunder Bay Manufacturing Company of Alpena.

Investigating Oscoda - AuSable Township Police said that LaCross had left Alpena at about 4:30 a. m. The tractor-trailer unit was south-bound and carrying heavy castings. At about 5:30 a. m., the tractor-trailer unit veered over, the curb

along US-23, struck a light pole and crashed into a large restaurant advertising sign. Officers said they found no skid marks on the pavement and there were no witnesses. An autopsy was ordered by the county medical examiner.

The victim, who was thrown through the windshield and landed on a blacktop parking lot, was dead on arrival at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital.

Board Interviews School Planner

Giving consideration to hiring a professional educational consultant to recommend future educational programs and facilities, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night interviewed Dr. Alex Kloster of Michigan State University, East Lansing.

A member of the MSU faculty, Kloster has wide experience in the field of education and has worked with a number of districts in the state concerning future planning.

The MSU specialist would conduct a study of Tawas Area School from an unbiased and objective standpoint to forecast future enrollment and building needs, evaluate the present educational program and would recommend future courses of action to meet needs of the district.

Kloster is to draft a proposal concerning the cost of his service, along with that of the complete MSU staff at his proposal, for consideration by the board of education. He said that such an evaluation and recommendation report could be completed by the end of March.

"We cannot afford to leave any stone unturned concerning an analysis of our present program and the course of direction in the future," stated Robert Elliott, board of education president. He said that with two recent bonding proposals defeated by district voters, the board of education's record "was not too good."

As soon as costs are determined for the survey, a proposal is to be made to the board of education.

In other business Monday night, it was announced that bids on bus bodies and chassis are to be opened at the December 10 meeting. The board is also to consider the possibility of leasing buses.

It was reported that Huron Auto Parts of Tawas City had agreed to help with the servicing of buses and that the bus fleet is slowly "getting back into shape," according to Harry Crawford, transportation director.

The fleet now has a couple of spare buses in order to free others for servicing.

No action was taken on a recommendation at the last meeting to study the possibility of establishing a school bus garage for servicing the fleet. This proposal is to be studied by the MSU survey if the contract now under negotiation is accepted.

A maintenance report indicated that delivery of school doors authorized some months ago had been delayed because of a strike. Delivery is now expected in late December.

Bleachers have been received for installation on the stage and mercury vapor lights installed in the gymnasium have been removed and replaced with incandescent lights. It was found that the mercury vapor lights produced less candle power than regular lights.

It was announced that Ogemaw Heights High School would be the site of district and regional basketball tournaments for girls in December.

Two cars have been received from local dealers for the driver education program and one class of 30 students has started the instruction. A second

class is to start in the second semester, with the remainder of the program to be held during the summer.

Robert McDonald, middle school principal, reported that a student council had been organized for grades six through eight and that student attitude seemed greatly improved over last year, due to the increased curriculum and facilities gained through the split session.

Mrs. Barbara Cuthbertson, principal at the East Tawas Unit, reported that third graders attended an Armistice Day program Monday at the East Tawas American Legion Hall. A film was shown and youngsters enjoyed hearing the World War I experiences of George Rose.

It was reported that parent-teacher conferences at both East Tawas and Tawas City Elementary Units saw 92 percent participation by parents. Thirteen room mothers helped with open houses, six volunteer mothers are helping with the reading program and two high school volunteers are aiding the program.

Herman Rollin, principal at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, reported that about one-third of the mothers of elementary girls attended a family living program concerning sex education conducted in cooperation with the district health department. He said that many mothers expressed the opinion that the program should be expanded to include boys.

Rollin reported that faculty members favored establishment of an elementary curriculum which would provide guidelines for the board of education and teachers, establish goals and an update of subject matter. He recommended that the elementary grades be allowed to study the purchase of text books for the teaching of the metric system. After June 1975, it is required that all school books sold include instruction in the metric system.

Smoke Bomb Thrown Into Village Inn

Smoke bombing of the Village Inn, Tawas City, early Sunday morning is under investigation by Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

Officers said that a military type smoke bomb was thrown into the entry of the main lobby. The lower floor of the building was filled with smoke and the floor was damaged.

Officers investigated four breakings and enterings during the past week. A chain saw and tools were stolen from the Russell Bostwick cottage at Sand Lake. Three buildings owned by Thomas Funk, east of M-65 near Hale, were entered. Two snowmobiles were stolen from a barn owned by Walter Redmond, Reno Township. A burglary was attempted at the Edward Valkoun cottage near Indian Lake, but entry was not made.

Ribbon Cutting Ceremony Held for Kirtland's New Tawas Center

A ribbon cutting ceremony for the new Tawas College Center was held Friday afternoon by representatives of the Kirtland College Board of Trustees, Kirtland's Tawas Advisory Board, the college administration, students, area governmental, civic and educational leaders.

The new center, which is located at 1601 US-23, approximately 1 1/2 miles north of the state police post at Tawas Centre, was constructed by Gordon Shultz, owner of the property.

The classrooms can be enlarged, divided or modified in many ways to meet almost any need.

"The center is a start in the direction of serving the needs of Tawas area residents who wish to take classes for college credit in their own community," states Robert A. Stenger, president of Kirtland.

The center will offer a sequence of courses in communications, humanities, social science, mathematics

and business. This fall, 42 students enrolled in the classes at the center and college officials expect a substantial increase in students for the spring semester.

"The greater the number of students enrolled in the classes at the Tawas Area College Center, the greater the variety of courses that will be offered," stated Stenger.

State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City, who was instrumental

in securing \$5,000 to develop the center and officiated at the ribbon cutting, commended Kirtland for "its initiative to help young people of the area."

Among those present from Roscommon were Richard Silverman, president of the faculty senate; Jerome Weinberg, chairman of the board of trustees; Raymond D. Homer, assistant to the president.

Taking part in the ceremony were Dr. E. B. Cavell Jr., Probate Judge William McCready and Harold French, all members of Kirtland's Tawas Advisory Board.

Board OK's School Cafeteria for Adult Hospitality Lounge

On recommendation of the school athletic director, Tawas Area Board of Education Monday night approved use of the commons area as a hospitality room for adults attending basketball games during the coming season.

James Papefus, athletic director, told board of education members that every school in the conference—with the exception of Tawas—provides a smoking-coffee area for adult fans attending basketball games.

He said that the athletic booster club was in favor of the proposal and would aid in the operation.

The board of education ruled that school buses could be used to transport student spectators to away basketball games but, because of the short supply of gasoline for operating buses during the school day, the school's gasoline supply may not be used for spectator buses.

Approximate cost of gasoline for four to five buses traveling to each away game is \$25. The booster club

paid this expense during the football season. An alternate plan is being studied whereby the cost of gasoline is to be added to the student tickets. Buses would be fueled at service stations.

The above policy also applies to the use of buses for transporting children to the Shrine Circus at Saginaw. Because of the fuel shortage, gasoline for such trips must be obtained from a source other than the school gasoline pump.

The athletic director reported that gate receipts during the 1973 football season were the largest in history, despite the fact that there were only four varsity home games. Receipts during four varsity home games amounted to \$4,575, of which more than \$2,000 was taken in for the Tawas-Ogemaw Heights game. Sale of season tickets amounted to \$292 and \$338 was received for junior varsity and freshmen games.

Deducting \$200 for bond interest payment, a total of \$4,506 is to go toward construction of the school track.

The athletic director reported that he was continuing his study of the cost of moving the football playing field to the infield of the all-weather track, which was constructed three years ago. The move would require crowning and installation of sod, moving four light poles and moving the permanent bleachers.

Such a change, said Papefus, would provide an improved athletic facility for both football and track. Temporary bleachers are set up each fall on the clay baseball infield and the visitors' side is usually muddy during the football season, which brings many complaints. The move would provide better crowd control and would provide lights and seating for night track meets.

The present football field was constructed 15 years ago with labor, equipment and fill entirely donated to the school.

On recommendation of Prin. John Alexander, coaches during the 1973 football season were rehired for 1974.

Child Ran Into Path of Auto

During the past week, Isosco Sheriff's Department investigated one accident in which a pedestrian was struck by a car, nine car-deer collisions and three burglaries.

Donald L. Upton, nine years old, National City, was treated Friday night at Tawas Hospital after being struck by a car on Newman Street, East Tawas. Officers said the boy ran out from between two parked cars and into the path of a vehicle driven by Laverne E. Tudor Jr., 20, Monument Road.

Burglaries of cabins owned by David McLean, Towerline Road, Whittemore, and Robert Brandt, Plainfield Township, are under investigation.

Approximately \$25 in change was taken during a burglary at the Sand Bar. Entry was made by breaking out a rear window.

Judge Miller Heard Three Criminal Cases

Three criminal cases were heard Tuesday by Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Debra Wright entered a plea of guilty to attempted embezzlement at Jim's Market, Oscoda. She had been charged originally with two counts of fraudulent conversion. The case was referred to the probation officer for presentence report.

Arthur W. Morris, charged with larceny from a cabin owned by William Borosch, entered a plea of not guilty. Trial was set for December 14 and the defendant waived the right of a hearing before a jury.

A motion entered by Oliver Adams of Oscoda, asking to be released on bond while awaiting appeal, was denied by the court. He is presently serving a prison term for manslaughter.

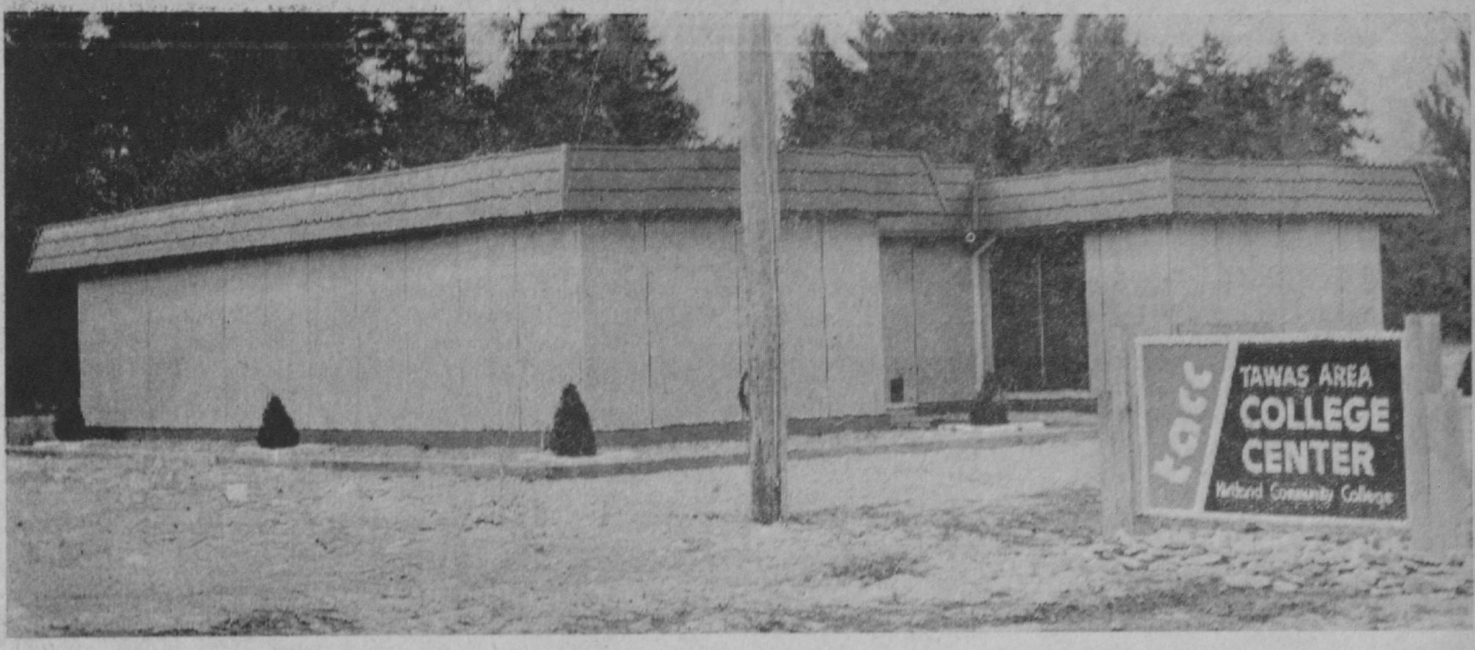

Iosco Airport Management Discussion to be Continued by County Commission

Discussion on management of the Iosco County Airport was continued Wednesday by the county board of commissioners, but no action was taken.

Robert Foster, chairman, indicated that a decision may be forthcoming at the next meeting Wednesday, November 21.

Last month, the commission named W. C. Roach as airport manager, but then appointed Robert G. Schmidt to the newly-created position of assistant manager. Roach has been associated with management of the airport since its relocation and development 15 years ago. Schmidt serves as the fixed base operator and has a flying school service at the airport.

Later in the month, Comm. J. Berkeley Smith of Oscoda recommended to the commission that the fixed base operator be named as the full time manager.

During last week's session, Smith told the commission that control over the airport had "slipped" due to a lack of communications. He claimed that operation of the airport had been haphazard and desired to see it placed on a business basis.

Roach expressed the opinion that the airport operation had been a highly-successful and an economical one. He reported that the county was receiving a 10 percent return on its investment of \$36,000 for hangars and urged the board to now consider extension of runways to 5,000 feet in order to handle jet aircraft.

A letter from Bernard Race, president of the Iosco Flying Club, asked the commission to retain the services of Roach as airport manager. The letter stated that Roach had "performed his duties faithfully and for a good many years. As a local resident, he is a community-minded man and will undoubtedly remain in the area for many years to come," stated Race's letter.

In other business, it was reported that a contract with deputy sheriff's officers and the county had not been signed as yet and that Sheriff George Westcott was reluctant to sign one. It was stated that deputies may seek court action to determine if the sheriff or the county is the actual employer. The deputies are members of the Charles C. Miller Lodge, Fraternal Order of Police.

Pros. Atty. Ronald Tyler has asked the state attorney general's office for a ruling on the controversy, but it was reported Wednesday that the attorney general's office "hesitated" to give its opinion.

Paul Harvey of Oscoda addressed the board concerning the snagging of salmon in the AuSable River and Recreation Commission indicated its support of the salmon snagging ban on the AuSable and other rivers of Iosco. The letter stated that any offensive odor along the AuSable was being caused by fishermen who disregarded state law, as well as disregarding the river's natural beauty, by leaving dead fish and entrails along the banks of the AuSable. The parks and recreation commission stated that the main purpose for planting salmon originally was to combat alewives, which formerly littered the Lake Huron shore.

The commission authorized closing of the county building the day after Thanksgiving.

The county appropriation to District Health No. 2 was increased from \$55,000 to \$56,140.

Raise Money to Purchase School Seats

St. Joseph Parent-Teacher Organization is sponsoring a project for the 1973-74 school year to raise approximately \$1,000 for the purchase of new seats and chairs at the St. Joseph School, East Tawas. A bake sale is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, November 17-18, at the St. Joseph Catholic Church, East Tawas, following evening Masses Saturday at 5 and 7 o'clock and morning Masses Sunday at 8 and 10 o'clock.

Next P.T.O. meeting will be held Wednesday, December 5, 8:00 p. m., at the school. Individuals are to bring baked goods for a cake walk.

Iosco Intermediate District Has Special Ed. Director

Foster Eid, who first became interested in working with emotionally disturbed children while enrolled in an air force undergraduate program, is the new director of special education for Iosco Intermediate School District.

Originally from East Detroit, Eid studied art at Wayne State University and recalls now that, at the time, he really was undecided as to a future career.

He joined the United States Air Force and was enrolled in a radar and computer school at Arizona State University. There, he became interested in the John F. Kennedy Center for Emotionally Disturbed Children and decided this field would be his career after his return to civilian life.

Upon his return from Vietnam, Eid enrolled at Eastern Michigan University and his course of study was in the field of mentally handicapped and special education. He received his bachelor degree and master degree from EMU, the latter in educational administration, and currently has six hours remaining before completion of work toward his specialist degree.

As director of special education for Iosco Intermediate School District, a new position created this year, he has responsibility for coordinating activities of two social workers, four speech and language therapists, a teacher for the emotionally impaired and a psychologist, all members of the intermediate district staff. He also directs the operation of the intermediate district's day care and trainable center located at Immaculate Heart of Mary School, which has a staff of three instructors and three aides.

Besides handling the evaluation of staff members, he acts as the liaison between the department of education and the four local school districts in coordinating special education activities.

Eid said that all four of the county's school districts were working together cooperatively to provide a more sophisticated service to the approximately 9,000 school-aged children in this county. Through a "team concept," full utilization is being made of facilities and personnel in the districts, as well as services provided by state agencies in the Iosco area.

Under a new state law concerning special education, it is mandatory that schools provide service to all handicapped children up to the age of 25 years. This includes psychological service, training for the educable and mentally impaired, trainable mentally impaired, operation of day care service, as well as working with children who have impairments in speech, language, vision and hearing.

As an example of his liaison work between the department of education and local school districts, Eid said Thursday that he had received verbal approval from the state for a new lunch program at the trainable day care center. This program would be in cooperation with the vocational education food services program at Tawas Area School.

Eid's wife, Jeri, whom he met and married while both were students at EMU, is a new counselor at Tawas Area High School. Both taught school last year at Bellevue. He was a type A teacher at South Junior High School in the VanBuren School District.

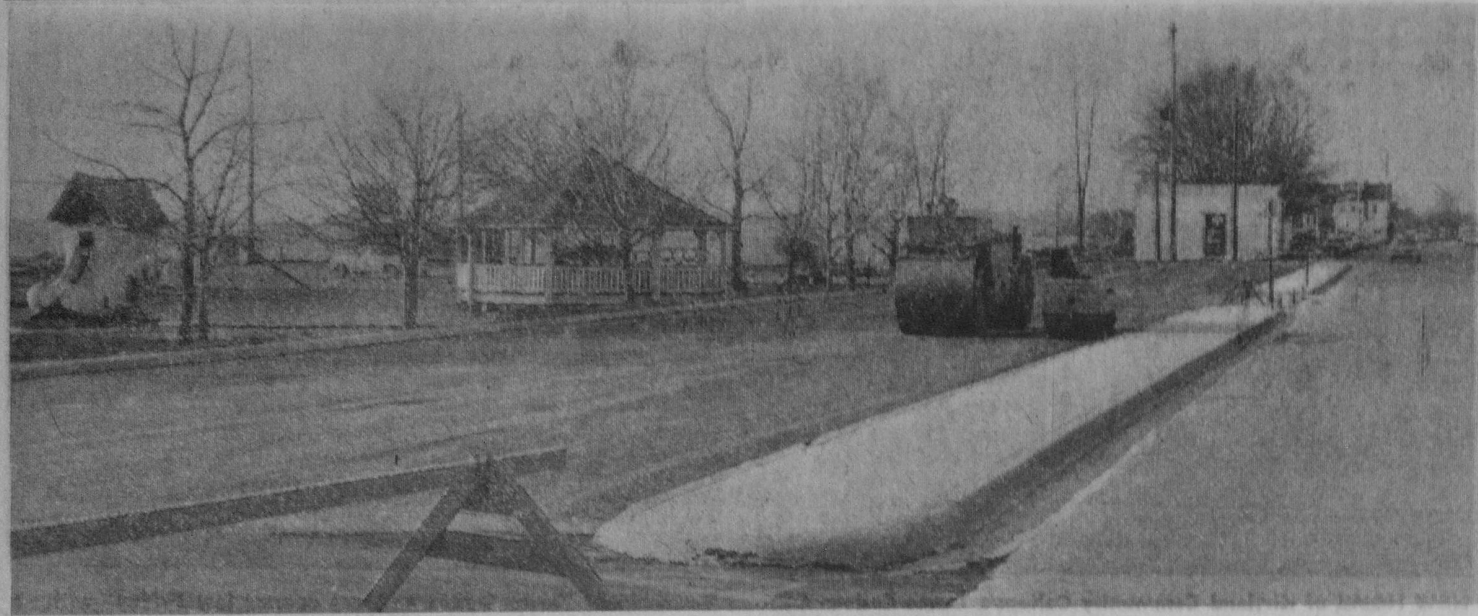

Crime Can be Reduced in Michigan by Citizen Involvement in Prevention

Citizen involvement in stepped up crime prevention programs can go a long way toward reducing crime in Michigan according to Col. John R. Plants, state police director.

Plants has announced that specific programs aimed at preventing burglary, armed robbery, car theft, bad check passing, shoplifting and personal assault are being given wide public exposure by state and local police agencies. "Crime is still our number one problem," Plants said, "and the individual, law abiding citizen is the most essential element in preventing it."

Plants outlined the basis of the enforcement agencies' drive to inform the public about the anti-crime programs. He said, "By making yourself and your property less attractive targets, you can deny criminals the opportunity they thrive on. First, do not become a victim. Keep valuables in a safe place, make sure your home is secure and take caution for the protection of your family and yourself." He also advocates the good neighbor policy by encouraging community concern and support for effective law enforcement.

The director strongly advises personal action against crime. Persons are being asked to report suspicious activities to the police and to be willing to speak out as a witness or complainant. "Crime is a triangle made up of a victim, an opportunity and a desire on the part of a criminal to act against the law," Plants said. "By denying the opportunity, we can effectively cripple crime's triangle."

He was elected governor.

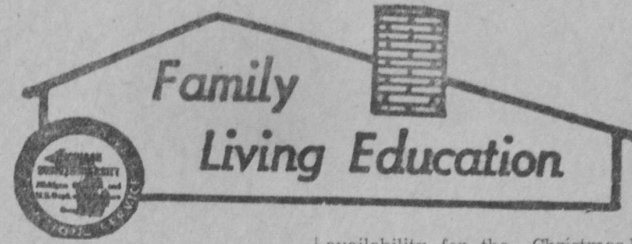

Holidays ahead and company is coming. Folks are busy planning for family and friends from far and near. Schedules get busier and time seems to get shorter. That means it is time for festive and convenient cranberries.

The picture for this season's crop shows abundant supplies of processed cranberries will be available for the holiday season. Abundant supplies of fresh cranberries are expected through November. However, the

availability for the Christmas-New Year period will depend on how well the late variety produced in Massachusetts develops.

Canned cranberry sauce, cranberry relishes and cranberry juice conveniently add flavor and color to company-perfect meals. Cranberry juice cocktail is a healthful blend of the juice of fresh berries, sugar and water which is often fortified with Vitamin C. And for dieters, there is a lower-calorie variety of this fruit drink.

The following may spark your imagination for happy holiday or every day meals: Hot Party Cran-

wiches. This piping-hot snack can be assembled ahead, stored in the refrigerator, then popped in the oven at the last minute. Make biscuits as big or little as you like, bake until golden, split and spread deviled ham onto each half. Slice a can of jellied cranberry sauce into rounds, cut rounds with biscuit cutter, and place one round atop each ham-covered half biscuit. Top with strips of processed cheese. Bake on cookie sheet in moderate 350 degree oven until heated through and cheese melts.

Cranberry Mint Punch. This warm tasty punch teams equal amounts of cranberry juice cocktail and pineapple juice. Heat, pour into mugs or cups and add a couple of after-dinner mints just before serving.

Frosty Cranberry Pie. This pretty pie is mighty tasty. Fold 1 1/2 cups cranberry-orange relish into one pint softened vanilla ice cream. Spoon into an eight-inch baked and cooled pie shell. Freeze until firm. Decorate with whipped cream for serving.

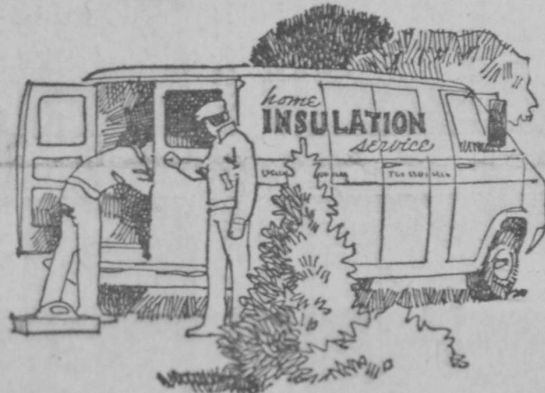

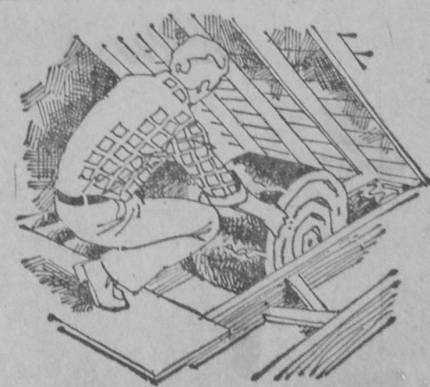
