

Gas Supply Called Adequate for Coming Winter

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company says it will have adequate natural gas supplies this winter and "for the foreseeable future" to supply all existing and new home heating customers in its service areas throughout Michigan.

"While our gas supply is sufficient to meet the needs of all residential and commercial customers and those industrial customers who require gas for their operations, we are urging our customers not to waste this valuable fuel," said Hugh C. Daly, president of Michigan Consolidated.

He pointed out that the utility is conducting a non-profit program to encourage home heating customers to install a minimum of six inches of insulation in the ceilings of their homes.

"We are doing this," Daly said, "not because of any severe shortage of gas on our system at present, but because new natural gas reserves are becoming much more difficult and expensive to acquire and the demand is continuing to grow."

"We believe that by initiating an all out gas conservation program, we

will be able to serve more customers in the future and hold down their heating bills," Daly added.

He pointed out that Michigan Wisconsin Pipe Line Company, Michigan Consolidated's affiliate and principal gas supplier, was authorized in July to expand its deliveries by 28-billion cubic feet of gas a year, with 13.4-billion cubic feet dedicated to Michigan Consolidated.

"This is enough gas to meet all the demands for gas for additional space heating in our service area in the next year and we will also be getting

more gas from newly-connected gas fields in Northern Michigan to take care of the rest of our high priority markets," Daly said.

He explained that Michigan Consolidated anticipated the current national shortage of natural gas over three years ago when it stopped making additional sales of gas to large industries which purchase gas on an interruptible basis and which are equipped to use other fuels. The company further protected its residential customers by instituting a system of priorities for serving new

customers, with householders getting the top priority.

"As a result of these measures, together with a very aggressive gas acquisition effort by Michigan Wisconsin, our company today is able to meet all the gas requirements of the vast majority of our customers and we presently see no situation which would alter this position," Daly said.

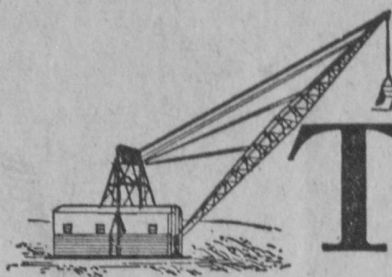
At the same time, Michigan Consolidated is developing several new underground storage reservoirs in old Michigan gas fields in which it injects much of the gas delivered

during the summer. During the winter when customer demands exceed pipeline deliveries, the gas is withdrawn from storage.

"These storage fields enable the company to meet winter fuel needs of our customers that are about double the deliveries we get from our pipeline suppliers. By storing much of our summer supply, we can serve twice as many heating customers than would be possible without the storage, thus dedicating the bulk of our gas supplies to the highest quality use," Daly said.

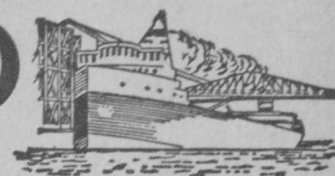

Fed. Judge Rules Harwood's Prison Term Will Stand

Richard Harwood, former president of Peoples State Bank of East Tawas, was unsuccessful Friday in an effort to have his five-year prison term set aside in federal district court at Flint.

United States District Judge Thomas P. Thornton of Detroit rejected motions by Harwood's attorney to have the sentence set aside at the conclusion of a five-hour hearing.

Judge Thornton said he did not be-

lieve Harwood's testimony that his guilty plea had been unduly influenced by alleged threats from an attorney or promises of rewards for silence, allegedly made by an official of the bank.

Harwood was sentenced to five years in prison October 1 by Judge Thornton after he entered a guilty plea February 3 to making false entries in bank records totaling \$616,000. He had entered a guilty plea to three counts of a 36-count federal indictment.

Since sentencing, he has been at the federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kansas.

Judge Thornton said he would formalize the ruling in a written memorandum.

Hearing Held on Tax Districts

A lengthy hearing was held Monday night by the Tawas City Council on proposed special sewer assessment districts. About 25 property owners in the three districts were present to hear a detailed explanation of plans and costs by City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz.

The three sewer projects total an estimated \$240,000, of which \$40,000 would be paid by the city at large. The remainder would be assessed against benefited property owners.

The proposed special assessment districts are located in the River Street-Spring Street area and along US-23 south of the river bridge.

Check Burglary

Iosco Sheriff's Department investigated a cabin break-in last Thursday in Wilber Township.

Entered was a cabin owned by John Newberry, located on Brooks Road. Entry was gained by breaking a window.

On Wednesday, officers investigated the larceny of a chain saw owned by Clarence Raymond, Wilber Township.

Tawas Harbor Gets Fed. Planning Aid

Cong. Philip E. Ruppe announced Wednesday that he had received word from the United States Army Corps of Engineers concerning the release of preconstruction planning funds for the improvement of Tawas Bay Harbor at East Tawas.

Ruppe and Cong. Elford A. Cederberg, who formerly represented the district, have been seeking these funds since 1972. Cederberg serves the Tenth District and Ruppe serves the Eleventh District.

Last summer, Ruppe wrote Roy Ash, director of the office of management and budget, expressing the "extreme disappointment of the people of the Tawas that work on this harbor project was again postponed."

As a result of Ruppe's efforts, OMB has released the \$40,000 which had been appropriated for fiscal 1973, as well as an additional \$20,000 for fiscal 1974.

The corps of engineers indicated that negotiations are presently under way with an architect-engineering consulting firm for the preparation of phase one plan formation and the environmental impact statement.

Commenting on the action, Ruppe said, "Although the planning phase takes approximately 18 to 24 months to complete, I am optimistic that the Tawas Bay harbor project can now proceed on schedule and that it will be completed at the earliest possible date."

M-65 Crash Injuries Fatal to L. C. Harsch

Louis C. Harsch, 79, Whittemore, died Sunday morning at Tawas Hospital of injuries received Saturday afternoon in a two-car crash at the intersection of Leggett Road and M-65 in Burleigh Township.

Investigating state police officers from East Tawas said that Harsch was northbound on Leggett Road and pulled into the path of a vehicle driven by Jerome G. Spencer, 39, Grand Blanc, which was southbound on M-65.

A passenger in Harsch's car, Fred Newmann, 70, Detroit, received minor injuries. Spencer was not injured in the crash.

Officers said that Harsch's vision of traffic on M-65 was obstructed by a large van truck which was parked on the west shoulder of M-65, about 250 feet north of the intersection.

Greenbush Man Died of Wound

John Laszlo, 74, Greenbush, died of a gunshot wound Friday morning on the second day of the 1973 deer hunting season.

Hunting in Section 15 of Greenbush, Alcona County Sheriff's Department officers said that Laszlo had parked his car and walked into the woods about 7:00 a. m. His body was found by another hunter two hours later.

Officers said that the victim had been struck in the leg by a slug and apparently bled to death.

Order Autopsy in Hunter Death

An autopsy has been ordered in the death of Dale J. Clark, 25, Saginaw, who was found dead in a car Friday morning in Section 35, Oscoda Township.

Daniel Harnish, Saginaw, told investigating state police that he and Clark had come to the area to go deer hunting. They slept in the car Thursday night and Harnish found his companion dead at 7:00 a. m.

Dr. James Jacques, county medical examiner, ordered the autopsy following the initial investigation.



WORK STARTED last week by Consumers Power Company on clearing land east of Oak Street and north of Cedar Street in Tawas City for its new electrical substation. Schools-Local Units Benefit from Swamp Tax Increase

State Sen. Robert W. Davis hailed passage Wednesday by the house of representatives of his bill that will provide more than one-million dollars in new funds for schools, townships and counties in the Northern Lower Peninsula and the Upper Peninsula.

"I am extremely pleased that the house has approved the bill I sponsored because it will mean \$1,000,000 in additional income for counties in this section of Michigan, most of which I represent," said Senator Davis.

The measure increases from 20 to 50 cents an acre the state payment to local units of government in lieu of taxes on an estimated 3.6-million acres of tax-reverted forest and recreation lands owned by the state.

In Iosco's case, it will mean that \$11,670.84 would be returned, of

which \$4,668.33 would go to schools and \$3,501.25 would be distributed to townships and the county.

In addition, the bill provides an escalator clause which will increase the payments by four cents an acre three times in a six-year period. The additional 12 cents will bring to 62 cents the payments the state will make to these local units of government by 1980.

Senator Davis, a member of the influential senate appropriation committee, said the bill as passed by the house provides for payment of 20 cents an acre to school districts and 15 cents an acre each to township and county governments. The additional 12 cents will be divided equally between townships and counties.

He said the measure was greatly assisted by support from Governor Milliken. The lands involved have

been known popularly as "swamp-lands" but will now be called tax-reverted recreation and forest lands.

The amount of money each county will receive from the state depends on the number of acres of such land within its boundaries. Luce County will receive \$78,000 in additional funds, the largest increase of any county in Davis' district.

"Passage of this bill is wonderful news for most counties in the 37th Senatorial District because so much of the land has been tax reverted to the state," said Davis.

"This is the most significant state-local revenue sharing measure of the year for Northern Michigan counties. Members of the legislature are to be highly commended for their strong support of legislation that will be so meaningful for this economically-hard-hit area of Michigan."

Kirtland Opposes College Districting Plan Proposed by State Department of Education

As predicted last summer by Supl. Edward J. Barry of Tawas Area School, Kirtland Community College at Roscommon is claiming that Iosco County is now part of its service area since the recent opening of its extension center north of East Tawas.

This fact was made public in a feature article in an area daily newspaper Sunday in which Kirtland's president voiced objections to a redistricting proposal being considered by the Michigan State Board of Education.

Robert A. Stenger, Kirtland president, was quoted as saying he "favours expansion" of his college's boundaries and disliked the "arbitrary way the state developed its proposal."

Last summer, Tawas Area Board of Education, which had been shouting loud and clear for months that it did not want this district to be shovelled by the state into joining Kirtland Community College District without a vote of the people, objected to Senate Bill No. 346 introduced March 26 by Sen. Charles O. Zollar.

That bill, which came as a surprise to educators around the state and received state-wide attention because of Tawas Area School's objections, would have forced this school district into the Kirtland District, along with Whittemore-Prescott Area School, Hale Area School, several townships in Arenac and two townships in Alcona Counties. Arenac County school officials joined Tawas area in the protest.

As the result of Tawas Area School's protests, the state board of education declared there was "open

warfare among community colleges" serve the area. The board of education had scheduled a meeting requesting that three community colleges serving the area—Kirtland, Alpena Community College and Delta College—outline a plan on how all three colleges might set up adult education and post secondary programs in the area. Because of the publicity at Lansing, the meeting was canceled.

Since then, a plan proposed by the state would expand Delta College north along Lake Huron and Alpena (See KIRTLAND, page 6.)

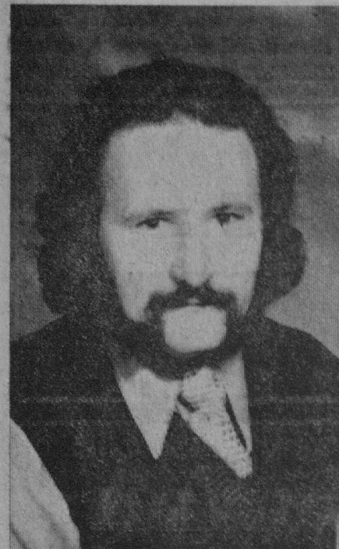

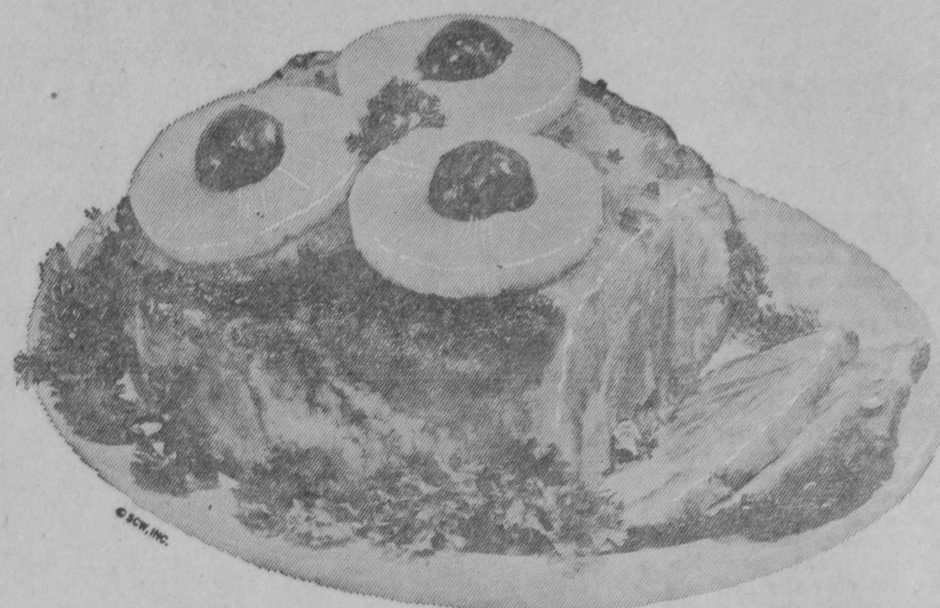

Community College south to meet the proposed Delta line in Alcona County.

The state board plan would leave Kirtland the way it is—basically, the Counties of Crawford, Oscoda, Ogemaw and Roscommon.

Kirtland favors adoption of a plan developed by the Michigan Community College Association. Now before a legislative committee, this bill would allow expansion of Kirtland into the northern part of Arenac County and all of Iosco County, with the exception of Oscoda Area School District, which would go to Alpena Community College. The plan would also expand Kirtland into Missaukee and Wexford Counties.

Stenger was quoted as saying that locking in of the boundaries would leave Kirtland with its present sparsely populated area as the base for its continued existence. He said that inclusion of Iosco County, for instance, would broaden the population base another 25,000 people and another 102-million dollars on its tax base.

Last July, Superintendent Barry of Tawas Area School claimed that Kirtland was interested in Tawas Area School only because of the district's high valuation.

Because Kirtland is located 70 miles to the southwest at Roscommon, with little previous association with the Lake Huron shore region, Barry felt that, should Tawas Area School District be forced into a community college district other than one right here in Iosco, it should go to the south to Delta College or north to Alpena Community College.

In addition to the redistricting, the MCCA bill favored by Kirtland would create four new community college districts in the state, two of which are in the Upper Peninsula and comprise counties which have a total population less than Iosco.

Two weeks ago, Kirtland officials held a ribbon cutting ceremony in rented quarters at Tawas Centre,

which it claims provides services to 42 students in Tawas Area, Whittemore-Prescott Area and Hale Area School Districts.

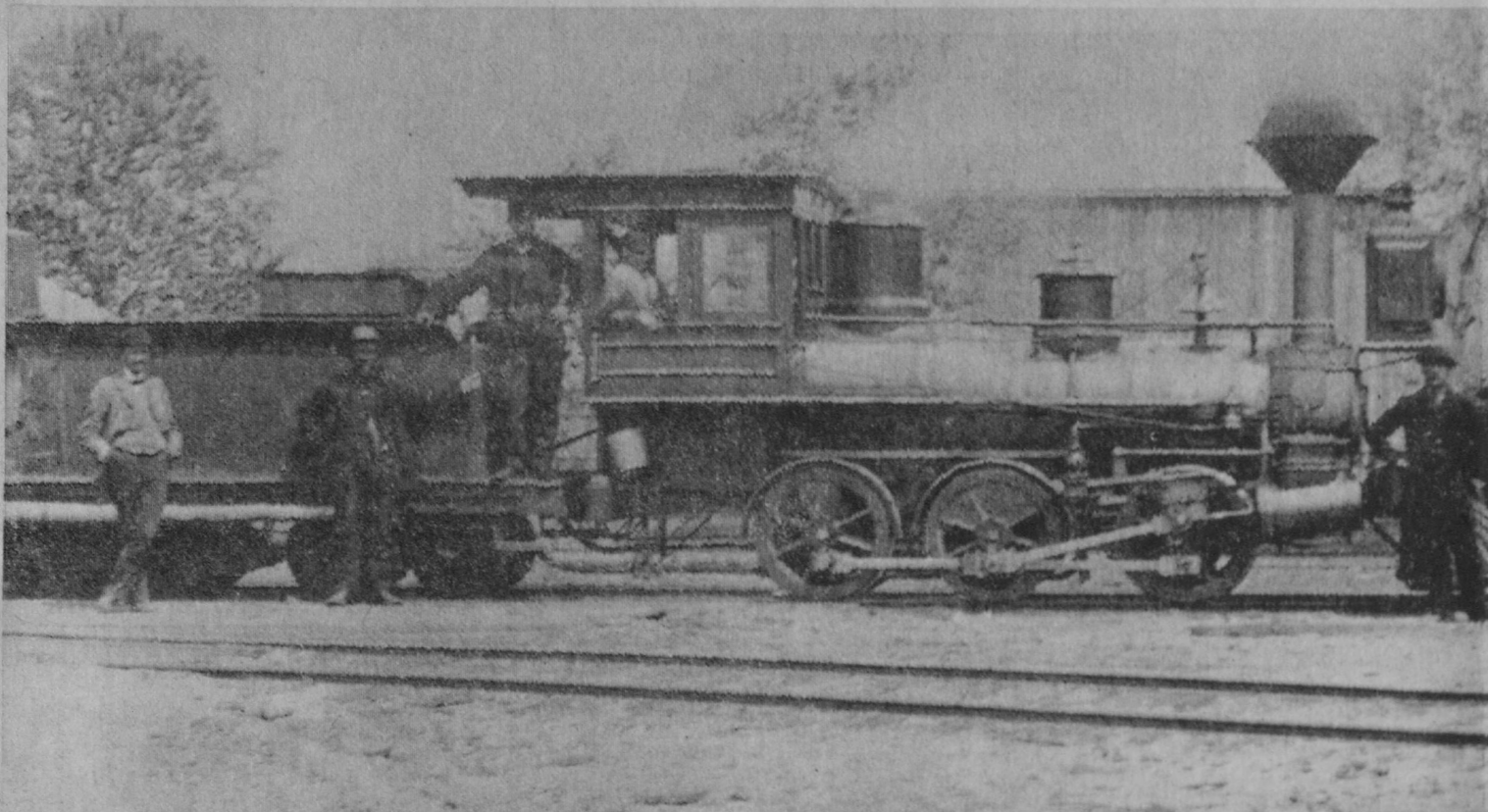

Bubble Burst for Originators of LH&SW, but Railroad Grew

An "energy crisis" and freak atmospheric conditions nearly 100 years ago were factors leading directly to the formation of a transportation system still being utilized today in Northeastern Michigan.

Ice bound during the long winter months, cut off from communications with other areas of the state due to the lack of roads leading into the interior and unable to convert political "hot air" from Lansing into any useful form of energy for propelling sailboats, residents of the Lake Huron shore turned their combined efforts to formation of a railroad.

Although this initial effort in solving the area's transportation problem proved to be a financial disaster, particularly for residents of the Tawas, it was the initial stepping stone toward establishment of a real railroad avenue known today as the Detroit and Mackinac Railway.

In the spring of 1878, travel between the shore towns of Northeastern Michigan and the outside world had changed little from the June day of 1854, when a sailing schooner chartered by the Whittemores entered Ottawa Bay and discharged a group of pioneers, who were to carve towns and eventually a county out of the wilderness.

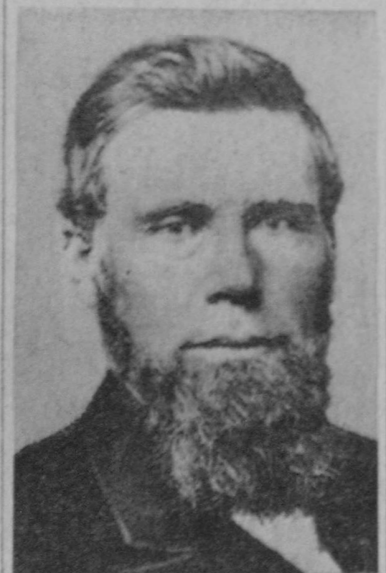
Sailboats and steamers plying the Lake Huron waterway continued to be the major form of transportation here for the next 30 years. But every winter, when ice choked Tawas Bay and Lake Huron, commerce with the outside came to a standstill. A rudimentary passenger service provided by the Green Stage Line, which bounced between Standish and Alpena over primitive roads and across the ice of Saginaw Bay, brought the mail and a few passengers, but transportation of freight was limited practically to the summer months due to the dependency on water.

Freak atmospheric conditions during the mid-1870s emphasized the need for a different form of transportation and businessmen of the Tawas—lumbermen and store keepers—turned their thoughts to formation of a railroad. The talk turned in-

to a "fever" as unusually mild weather during two consecutive winters failed to produce adequate snow upon which lumbermen relied to haul white pine logs to streams for transportation by water in the spring to mill towns.

Recognizing the advantage of year around transportation for the area's major industry, lumbermen of Alcona County established the first railroad lines in Northeastern Michigan. But water transportation still provided a vital link as the narrow gauge lines led from the inland pineries to the shore of Lake Huron, where logs were rafted and towed to Saginaw River mills.

The railroad fever was contagious and into the local quest for a better

means of transporting logs to mills on Tawas Bay stepped Charles D. Hale. With his brother, Sylvester, Hale had constructed a large mill at the mouth of the Tawas River in 1868.

In 1878, the Hales owned extensive pine lands in Western Iosco County, holding an estimated 200,000,000 feet of timber. They had a short, make-

shift railroad of some 3 1/2 miles in successful operation located in Town 21 North, Range 4 East, which extended from their sidings to the AuGres River.

On March 21, 1878, a meeting was held at the courthouse in Tawas City to consider the possibility of constructing a narrow gauge railroad from Tawas Bay into the pine districts of the Rifle and AuGres Rivers—about 21 miles distant. Hale told businessmen attending that it had been demonstrated in various parts of the state that logs could be hauled over such a railroad to mills at much less expense than by conventional water routes.

Besides the many benefits to be derived locally through improved transportation for the lumbering interests, Hale emphasized the benefits which would result for the shore towns through opening the cut-over region to agriculture and the eventual extension of tracks to connect with the Michigan Central Railroad.

Plans for the proposed railroad moved rapidly and it was announced on April 11, 1878, that organization of the Lake Huron and Southwestern Railway had been completed. Unable to secure enough capital locally, Hale had interested C. H. Prescott and other Bay City lumbermen in the project and enough stock was sold in the company to assure its organization. Prescott was named as the railroad's first president on May 16, 1878.

The railroad was constructed within a period of three months but, despite the enthusiasm generated by the new railroad, many business failures in the Tawas could be traced directly to the inability of lumbering interests to secure enough logs the previous winter to operate mills.

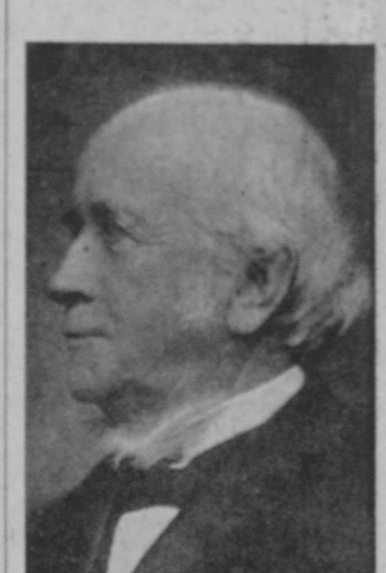
The railroad, too, was having serious difficulties due to the rough and primitive grades, as well as lacking experienced railroad personnel. Frequent smashups and derailments resulted in four railroad employees being killed and others injured during the fall of 1878.

The crowning blow for the fledgling railroad came that winter when weather conditions returned to nor-

mal. An early blizzard effectively blocked use of the railroad and, while the snowfall was adequate for skidding logs to streams, the AuGres River still lacked water the following spring upon which to move logs to the mills.

As a result, creditors of the railroad and its stockholders—which included nearly every businessman in the Tawas—moved in and demanded payment. Short term financing at a 20 percent interest rate proved disastrous for the LH&SW project. The Hales lost their mill at the mouth of the Tawas River plus vast timber holdings and practically every firm doing business in the Tawas toppled into bankruptcy.

On October 2, 1878, the railroad,

with rolling stock and entire equipment, was sold to Prescott at the bargain price of \$17,000. Cost of constructing and operating the railroad for only a year was \$103,500 and the earnings during that time amounted to \$31,000.

In bankruptcy court, Prescott then purchased the Cameron mill, located on Tawas Bay at the present site of McKay Sales Company, and operated the railroad alone for several months. He then reorganized it under the name of Tawas and Bay County Railroad (Arenac County not having been organized at the time) and extended the tracks to East Tawas.

Financial times changed for the better and, in April 1883, the railroad was sold to Gen. Russell A. Alger, whose base of lumbering operations was located at Black River in Alcona County and included a narrow gauge railroad line. The railroad was pushed up the shore to AuSable and Oscoda, later reaching Alpena, while the western end was extended to connect with the Michigan Central Railroad.

Through the formation of the Detroit, Bay City and Alpena Railroad in 1883, the dream of the Hales and other originators of the Lake Huron and Southwestern was finally realized—the shore towns finally had an effective outlet to the south for their forest products and passenger travel. Ten years later, through another reorganization, the route became known as the Detroit and Mackinac Railway, which still serves the industrial transportation needs of the region.

OA Millage Lost in Recount; One Added 'No' Vote Found

A recount Wednesday of Oscoda Area School's November 5 millage vote changed the original election night tally from winning by two votes to a tie—1,040 "yes" to 1,040 "no."

As a result, the proposition was defeated and the 2.4 mill operational tax requested by the board of education will not be levied against property owners of the school district in Iosco and Alcona Counties.

During the recount conducted by Iosco County Canvassing Board, one "no" vote was found to have been counted as a "yes" vote by the school election board and the final tally was corrected, resulting in the tie.

Canvassing board members said that all figures were double checked and ballots were counted twice to insure accuracy. Representatives of the school district and persons petitioning for the recount were in attendance and agreed with the final tally.

The official recount saw 854 persons favoring and 725 opposed to the proposition in Precinct One. There were 94 "yes" votes and 112 "no" votes in Precinct No. Two, while voters in Precinct No. Three opposed the proposition, 203-92.

The canvassing board noted that 11 ballots were invalidated by the election board, most of which were caused by voters using an illegal check mark.

Members of the official canvassing board included Mrs. Henry Oates of Alabaster Township, Mrs. Bruce McGill of Oscoda, Arden Charters of Whittemore and Mrs. John Lansky of Tawas City.

Settlement of the election issue paved the way for the Iosco County Tax Department to resume its preparations for printing annual tax statements to be sent to county property owners. Work on preparing the tax statements had been delayed until a final result was known on the school district's proposal.

William Woreley, county tax director, said Thursday that preparation of information on tax rates in the 14 units of the county was being rushed to completion and was to have been submitted Monday to Westley Data Processing, Midland, for computation and printing of approximately 25,000 tax statements.

These tax statements are to be in the hands of county property owners prior to or by December 1.

If electronic computers and equipment at Midland operates according to schedule, and this is anticipated by the county tax director, this will be a far different situation than that which existed a year ago.

In November 1972, the tax department experienced a mechanical failure with equipment at the county building and mailing of tax statements was delayed until processing

was completed at Cadillac. In the instance of one unit, tax statements were not in the hands of property owners until the middle of January. This resulted in an inconvenience to taxpayers as taxes are due by the middle of February.

Rather than replace the defective equipment in the county tax department, the Iosco Board of Commissioners voted to accept a contract with the Midland data processing firm for computation and tax statement printing.

Converting to the computer setup cost the county \$11,000 and a monthly rate charged by the Midland firm

is \$1,149, giving a total cost of nearly \$25,000 for the first year of the operation. Additional service provided through data processing in the above cost includes mailing address stickers for property owners and labels for senior citizen homestead exemptions and veterans, plus some duplication of tax rolls. Additional tax rolls and a printout on sales studies are available at an additional cost.

Woreley said Thursday that through utilization of the computer service, tax statements should be prepared in a matter of four to five days and returned to Iosco for mailing.

DNR Applies for Federal Permit on Beach Erosion Control Measures

In line with a recent announcement that it would conduct pilot erosion control projects on Tawas Bay in cooperation with Tawas City and East Tawas, Michigan Department of Natural Resources has applied to the army corps of engineers for two sand fill projects.

One plan submitted to the Detroit office of the army corps of engineers seeks a federal permit to place a sand fill at the Tawas City Park. The second project is for construction of a rock revetment and to place sand fill along the shore at the East Tawas Park.

The Tawas City project would include hauling 4,350 cubic yards of sand from an upland source and placing it along 435 lineal feet of the shore line. Purpose of the fill is to replenish the beach area which has been eroded by high water and wave action.

The proposed revetment at East Tawas would be about 75 lineal feet in length, constructed of rock and would extend about 22 lineal feet lakeward. Approximately 3,000 cubic yards of sand would be hauled from an upland source and placed along 445 lineal feet of the shore line for beach nourishment.

Any interested party entertaining objections to the permit should file written protests with the district office of the army corps of engineers no later than 4:30 p. m., November 25.

A decision on issuance of a permit would be based on an evaluation of the proposed activity on the public interest. The decision would reflect national concern for both protection and utilization of important resources.

"The benefit which reasonably may be expected to accrue from the proposal must be balanced against its reasonably foreseeable detriments," stated Col. James E. Hays, district engineer. "All factors which may be relevant to the proposal will be considered."

Confirmation that the DNR had approved the two erosion control projects was received here in early October. A third project is to be located on Lake Huron near the coast guard station.

The three projects are part of a \$370,000 program appropriated by the state legislature in the spring of 1973. The program is to determine the effectiveness of various low-cost methods of erosion control.

The demonstrations are being conducted by the University laboratory working with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources. All programs are to be evaluated after a period of time and a report is to be made on the effectiveness.

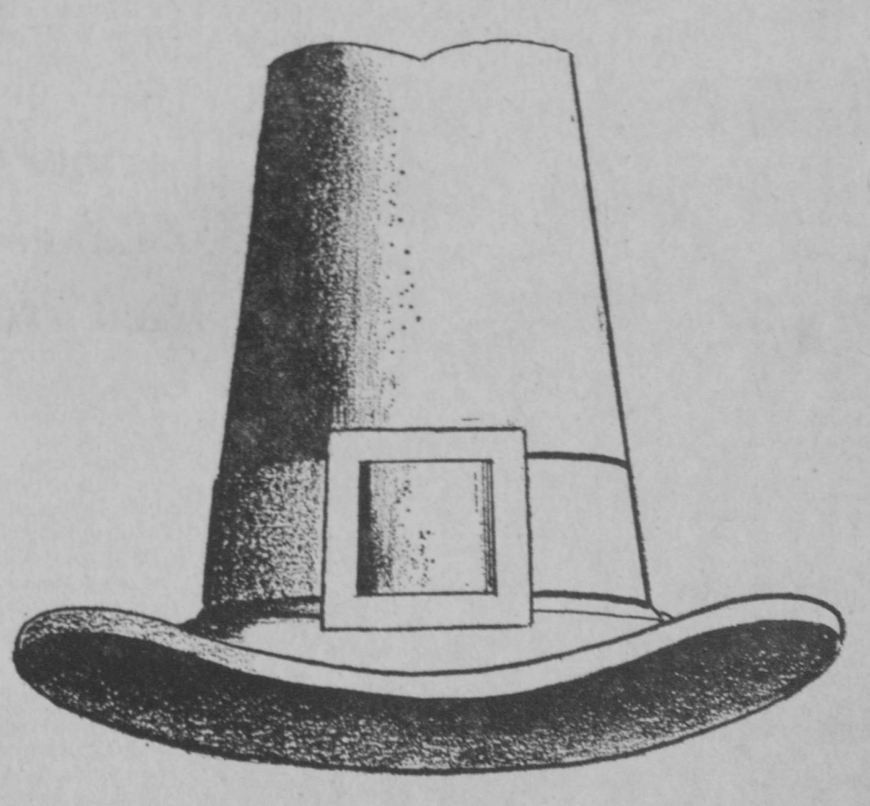

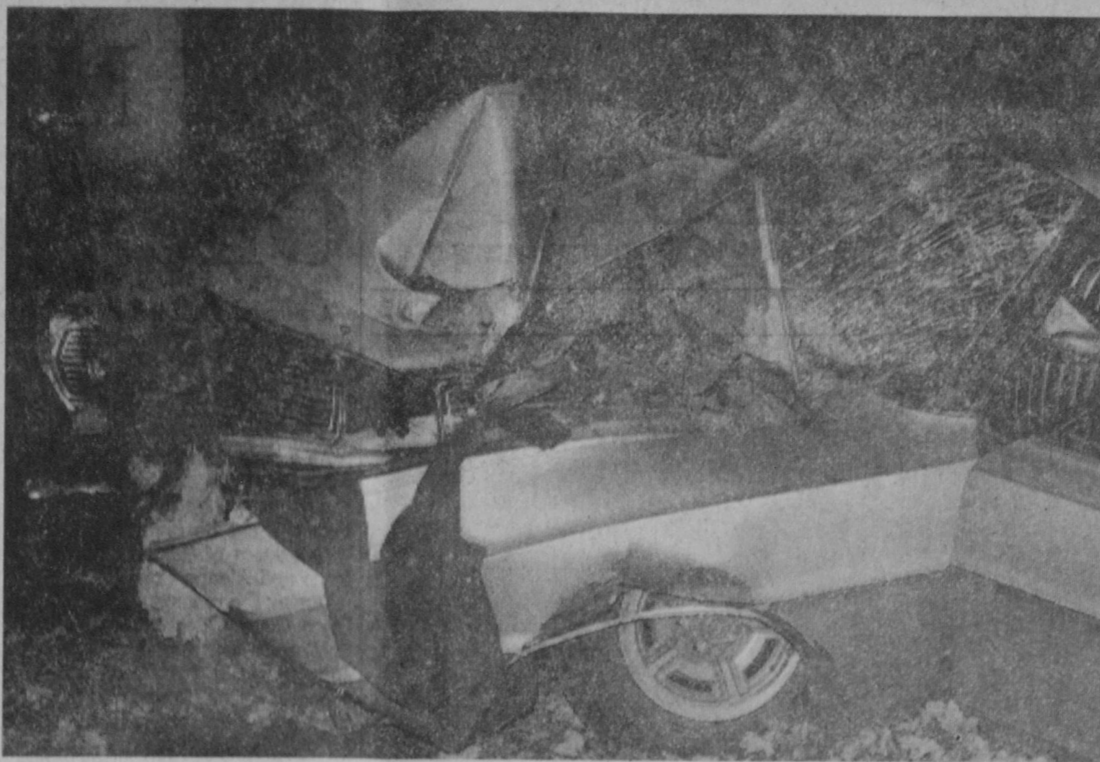

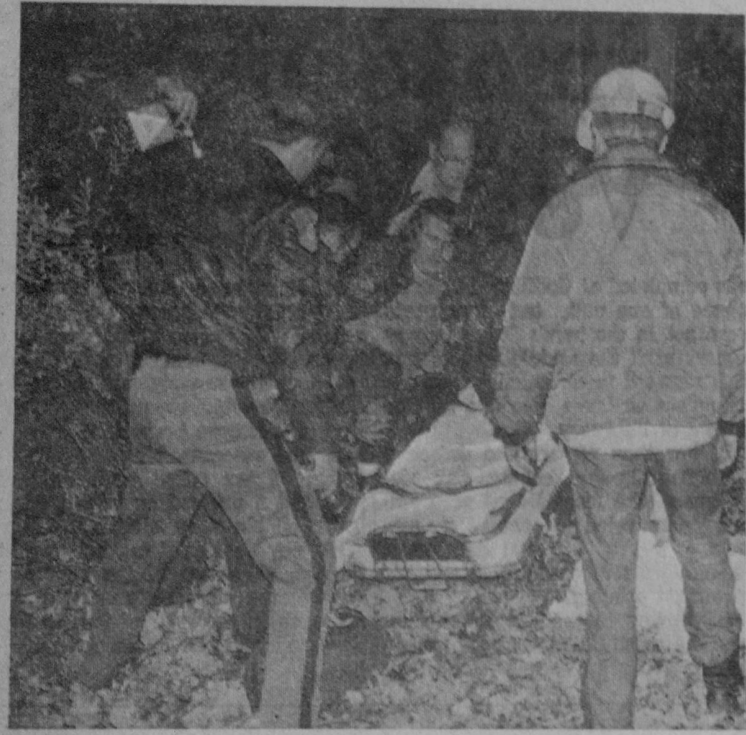
Both cars were damaged in the head-on crash with trees, the Anschuetz vehicle sustaining the most serious damage.

Monthly Disability Benefits Available

Question: I started receiving reduced social security retirement checks last year when I turned 62. I am now 63 and have suffered a stroke. Can I apply for monthly disability payments?

Answer: Yes. If you are found eligible to receive disability benefits, your retirement benefits will be changed over to disability benefits. You cannot collect benefits under both disability and retirement at the same time. Your monthly disability payments would be higher than those you receive now under the retirement program.

Question: I am 66 and enrolled in medicare. After spending a week in a hospital, I was told that I must transfer to a nursing home for the skilled nursing care I need and medicare will still help pay my bills. How much of my bills will medicare pay?

Answer: If you are found eligible for medicare benefits while you are in a specially qualified kind of skilled nursing home that is called a

skilled nursing facility, the program will pay for all covered services for the first 20 days. For the next 80 days, medicare will pay for all the covered services except \$9 a day.

Question: I have been getting monthly social security disability benefits on my own work record for the past two years and will be 60 soon. I am a widow and my husband worked under social security for many years before he died. Should I switch to widow's benefits at 60?

Answer: You may do so, if it is to your advantage. Obviously, if your monthly social security disability benefit is higher than the widow's benefit, you would not want to make any change.

A point to keep in mind, however, is that a widow collects a permanently reduced benefit if she starts getting checks when she is 60. You would have to wait until 65 to get full widow's benefits. You should call or visit your social security office to discuss your situation in detail.

Legal Steps Started on TC Bond Election

15 Years Ago—

35 Years Ago—

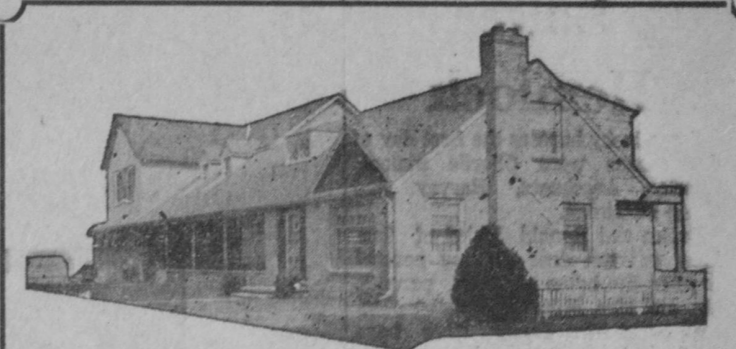
