

THE 1973 DEER HUNTING SEASON ended early for Police Chief Donald Docking of East Tawas. Docking shot his buck at 8:30 a. m. on opening day and is shown hoisting the animal at his garage in East Tawas. Two trophies of his past hunting expeditions are shown in the background. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources reports that the deer kill in this area was about the same as last year and area police agencies report that the number of hunters here was about average. It was reported that a bear was shot by a Detroit hunter in Alcona County "in self defense." The bear reportedly had been wounded by another hunter and apparently made a menacing move toward the Detroit hunter. The bear was hit by seven rifle slugs. The Lower Peninsula has been off limits for bear hunting for about five years. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources reports that several hunters have attempted to bounty coyotes without having a small game license. It is necessary to have a small game license in order to legally shoot a coyote.—Tawas Herald



Tawas would be about 75 lineal feet in length, constructed of rock and would extend about 22 lineal feet lakeward. Approximately 3,000 cubic yards of sand would be hauled from an upland source and placed along 445 lineal feet of the shore line for beach nourishment.
