Transportation Costs Soaring

Enrollment Drop Costs School \$20,800

An enrollment drop of 26 students on the fourth Friday of September will result in a loss of \$20,800 in Tawas Area School's state aid, according to a report Monday night by Supt. Edward J. Barry.

The loss represents the amount which had been budgeted for two new school buses, vitally needed because of the added transportation through switching to a split session program.

When voters were asked in September to renew 7 1/2 mills of operational taxes, plus 1 1/2 mills of new taxes, the administration and board of education had banked on an enrollment increase to make up the budget dif-

ference by expecting \$900 for each additional child counted on the fourth Friday.

A special census of school-aged children in the district conducted last May indicated that there would be an increase of approximately 40 to 50 new students this fall. School officials became alarmed in September when the projected "new" students did not show on classrolls.

It was reported Monday night that an extensive campaign had been conducted during the summer by St. Joseph Catholic School to "recruit" elementary students from families of the parish. The situation here is quite unique as many parochial schools around the country are closing doors due to financial problems, while the East Tawas parish is reportedly considering expanding its classrooms.

The Rev. Fr. John Rushman, pastor of St. Joseph Church, said Tuesday that the parish's school had an increase of only five pupils this fall, from 119 last year to 124 pupils in 1973-1974. He said the school has a maximum capacity of about 125 students.

In addition, Emanuel Lutheran School is reported to have picked up about five elementary students who attended the public school last term.

In the long run, a healthy and expanding parochial school system here would take considerable pressure off bulging classrooms in the public schools—but not for the 1973-74 term because of the hiring of additional teachers and other improvements to the public school.

"One of the sad things," commented Superintendent Barry, "is that some of the students who switched to the parochial schools this fall will probably return to the public school after the fourth Friday count." Even though some students may return, the public school would still be out \$800 per child in state aid.

A number of improvements have been made in the elementary grades of Tawas Area School this term, including hiring of additional teachers to reduce the pupil-teacher ratio, a new library in each unit and other improvements. The public school provides transportation, band and some other programs for parochial children.

The actual count of students on September 28 in the public school was 2,018, as compared to 2,067 last year at the same time. Gross state aid paid to the school includes persons enrolled in the adult school completion program, which results in a total enrollment of 2,090 students, as compared to 2,117 last term.

Enrollment in both the middle school and high school held its own. The middle school (grades six through eight) has a total enrollment of 521, identical for those grades last year. The high school has an enrollment of 798, as compared to 745 last year.

The major change in the enrollment came in the elementary grades. The kindergarten class lost 21 pupils as it moved into the first grade, 114-93; the first grade dropped three students as it moved up, 104-101; last year's second grade dropped five students as it moved to the third grade.

124-119; last year's third grade gained two students as it moved into the fourth grade, 124-126; the fourth grade dropped seven students, 135-128, as it moved into the fifth grade.

Added to the public school's current financial problem is the fact that administrators underestimated the amount of miles that buses will travel this year due to the new split session. According to a report to the board of education, bus travel during September amounted to 34,611 miles, as compared to 18,692 miles during September of 1972. Based on this rate, buses would travel 321,000 miles during the school year—1,787 daily—and the total was underestimated by 70,000 miles.

Complicating the problem is the current gas shortage. The school has been informed that it is 2,842 gallons of gasoline over its September allotment of 4,494 gallons. The buses used 7,336 gallons of gasoline during September and application has been made to the federal government to boost its allocation.

The above total includes athletic events, but it does not include other school vehicles or spectator buses. To meet the energy crisis, Tawas may have to follow the policy of other schools in discontinuing the use of buses for extra-curricular activities. Other schools have filled buses at local gasoline stations, but this results in an 80 percent increase in cost because of the state and federal taxes, coupled with a bid price to schools.

As it stands right now, the school has 2,000 gallons of gasoline to operate its buses during December. And even if it receives the necessary gasoline, buses are wearing out more rapidly during the split session and no replacements are in sight.

Oscoda Youth Fatally Injured in Auto - Bus Crash Friday

Richard Kenneth McKnight, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard E. McKnight, 211 East Evergreen, Oscoda, died Friday afternoon about an hour after his automobile was involved in a collision with an Oscoda Area School bus on River Road.

Investigating Oscoda Township Police said that McKnight was traveling east on River Road. His vehicle went off the left side of the road and he apparently lost control when the wheels returned to the pavement.

The car crashed head on into the bus, which was carrying 25 school children. The driver of the bus was unsuccessful in attempting to avoid the collision. Police credited foam rubber padding on the backs of seats in the new bus for preventing serious injuries to the occupants.

McKnight died at Wurtsmith Air Force Base Hospital, where he had been taken by ambulance.

Two Veteran D&M Employees Honored Upon Retirement

Robert Towns and Helen Johnson, veteran railroad employees with more than 75 years of service between them, were honored at a dinner party Saturday night by the Brotherhood of Railway and Airline Clerks Union, Huron Lodge. The party was held at Lixey's Restaurant, East Tawas.

Towns began his railroad career on the Michigan Central, coming to the Detroit and Mackinac Railway in 1946, where he served at Alpena and Oscoda as relief agent and train dispatcher. He came to Tawas as agent in recent years and held that position until his retirement.

Miss Johnson began her career as a clerk-stenographer in the car service department in 1925, later becoming general office secretary and, in 1945, secretary to the president and general manager.

Master of ceremonies at the dinner was Gary Bird, lodge president and Bay City agent. Vivian Meade,

lodge chaplain, gave the invocation. Mrs. Rosemary Klenow, local chairwoman, showed slides spanning a 25-year period on the railroad.

Gifts from the lodge and general office employees were presented by Mrs. Earl Davis and Miss Sue Fortune. Both retirees had previously received watches engraved with their service time from the railway company. Mrs. Iva Mallon accepted Miss Johnson's gifts as she was ill and unable to attend.

Among the guests were Mrs. Towns and their three children, Robert Jr., Cary and Barbara, along with Arthur Dease and Fred Lomas, retired D&M employees.

Awaits Circuit Court Sentence

Jaime Christopher Stewart was released on \$1,000 bond while awaiting sentencing upon his conviction October 2 in Isco Circuit Court on a charge of delivering marijuana. He entered a plea of guilty to the charge and a charge of delivering LSD was dismissed.

Leon Barlow, who with Stewart was arrested September 13 by Isco Sheriff's Department officers, entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of delivering marijuana. Pretrial was set for October 18.

Students will conduct a "snake dance" tonight (Wednesday) on Newman Street, East Tawas, as part of the homecoming week program. A special permit was issued to the student council by the East Tawas Police Department.

Cooperative Education Shows Success in First Year at TAHS

Seventeen Tawas Area High School students 16 years of age and above are enrolled in a cooperative training program conducted by the school in cooperation with area businesses.

Ray VanHorn, director of the school's cooperative educational program, told members of the board of education Monday night that he hoped to enlist further support from the business community in this program, new to the school this year.

Students working a minimum of 15 hours each week under the program receive three credits per year. Businesses participating include the bank, hotel, two restaurants, a motel, two grocery stores, a shoe store, two gasoline stations and two school offices.

VanHorn said that an occupational inventory conducted between himself and the student attempts to find out the student's interest in a life occupation. "They must start thinking about this sooner or later," he stated.

After a student makes application to enter the program, he is interviewed by VanHorn in a manner similar to the actual interview by an employer. A comprehensive questionnaire is filled out concerning information which an employer might desire.

Once a student has enrolled in the program, a state work permit is necessary if the student is under the

age of 18 years. Potential employers post their needs on a bulletin board in VanHorn's office.

VanHorn meets with participating students each day in order to develop instructional programs in the school which may relate to work at the place of employment. The instructor said this was necessary to eliminate some of the on-the-job training which otherwise would be necessary for each student. He said a successful training program in the school would make work of the student more profitable to the employer.

An employer fills out an evaluation report on the student worker each marking period. VanHorn said that students are encouraged to dress properly when they go out on the job, that each student reports to the school on his job activity and each student is required to maintain a checking account and savings account in a bank. VanHorn said he was encouraging students to place at least 20 percent of their earnings in a savings account.

Other students not enrolled in the program, but who work part time in area businesses, are eligible to take part in the work study program. VanHorn said that a banquet is being planned next spring to honor

employers and students participating in the program.

In other business Monday night, it was reported that negotiations between the board of education and the union representing non-instructional school employees was to reopen Tuesday morning. The last contract proposed by the board's negotiator through state mediation was rejected by the union.

Harry Crawford, director of federal programs, reported that the school had been unable to hire a teacher for the Title I reading center, and, as a result, hiring of aids was discontinued until such time as a teacher is hired and equipment is received.

Herman Rollin, principal at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, reported that the hot lunch program there had a profit of \$76.38 during the past two weeks. He said that enrollment in the hot lunch program had been increased from 167 to 192 students and that the program was being aided by lower food costs due to the present reduction in the cost of hamburger. He said that any price fluctuation upward would see a loss in the hot lunch program.

Between 130 and 140 persons attended the "spirit dinner" Monday night as part of homecoming week. The food preparation class in vocational education had charge of the meal.

Commission Opens Session in Remodeled Chamber

Opening its October session one day later than called for by state law, due to the legal holiday on Monday, Isco County Board of Commissioners began its three-day session Tuesday in newly-remodeled quarters in the county building.

Principal activity of the commission during this session is finalization of an operational budget for 1974. A public hearing on the budget is scheduled to be held Thursday from 10:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon.

Because of the three days being devoted this week to the October session, it is expected that the commission's second meeting of the month will not be held.

Work was completed last week on new chambers for the county commission. The large room formerly occupied by the Addressograph Department has been converted into a meeting room.

The room once served as the meeting place for the old county board of supervisors. Originally, the room was utilized by the county library but became available to the board of supervisors when the Isco-Arenac Regional Library was organized and a change of location was made.

The board of supervisors then authorized construction of a new meeting room at the rear of the building,

but those quarters have since been taken over by the district court.

During the past year, the commission authorized a complete renovation of the county building and utilized federal revenue sharing funds to finance the work. Offices and corridors in the building have been repainted, carpeting has been installed in offices and the circuit court room has undergone a major remodeling.

In addition to taking over this room, the commission now has an adjoining office which is open five days a week for the convenience of the public. Each member of the five-man commission spends one day each week in the office.

Fugitive Captured in Giant Police 'Net' Near Harrisville

A 23-year-old Alpena man, who beat up an Oscoda waitress Friday night, then used a Greyhound bus to make his escape and later stole a policeman's gun and patrol car, was captured Saturday night southwest of Harrisville during a massive search by area police agencies.

Held at Alpena County Jail, Harrisville, while awaiting court arraignment is Donald Fisher, who was taken without resistance from his hiding place in a field 1 1/2 miles west and three-quarters of a mile south of M-72.

Fisher is charged with entering the Kentucky Fried Chicken Restaurant at Oscoda about 10:00 p. m. Friday night, where he beat up Miss Joan Hamlin, 38. He took Miss Hamlin's purse and car, then drove north on US-23 before abandoning the auto-

mobile at a roadside park. There, he flagged down the northbound Greyhound bus.

Meanwhile, Miss Hamlin notified Oscoda Township Police, who started north in pursuit of the bandit, found the abandoned car and suspected the fugitive may have taken the bus. They radioed ahead to Harrisville police to stop the bus.

A Harrisville policeman stopped the bus at the traffic signal light on US-23. A man answering the bandit's description was taken from the bus and, while the policeman was questioning the suspect, he pulled a .22 caliber sawed-off rifle which was concealed in a bundle of clothing.

During the scuffle for the rifle, the rifle discharged, but the policeman was not struck by the bullet. However, the officer sustained a hand injury when he attempted to

pull the rifle out of the bandit's hand.

The bandit then took the policeman's pistol and patrol car and headed north on US-23. The car was found abandoned near Sturgeon Point. A tracking dog from the Michigan State Police post at West Branch was called in to assist in the search Friday night, but police abandoned the manhunt until Saturday morning.

Sheriff's departments from Alpena, Isco and Alpena Counties, along with state police from Alpena, East Tawas and West Branch, Oscoda Township Police officers and city police from Alpena and East Tawas joined in the search.

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Family Living Education

It is the end-of-the-garden-canning and freezing time.

Unless you are one of the fortunate folks with a supply of lids, do not plan to can because no supplies are available. If some homemakers have canned jars which are not in use, get them into circulation.

Have you ever heard of a concoction called "jug"? I have a friend whose family makes "jug" from the end-of-the-garden vegetables because at that late date all their jars are full so they use jugs for canning containers.

Really, what they call "jug" is a stewed tomato concoction and tastes good, too! They begin with tomatoes which they do not bother to peel because the last of the tomatoes are often misshapen.

The directions to follow are simple: Cook tomatoes, put through sieve or food mill. In another kettle, simmer some onions, celery and green pepper (all of which have been sliced or diced). Add some parsley if you have it. Combine with the tomato pulp. Season with salt and a bit of sugar. Amounts depend on what you have and your taste preferences.

You can use "jug" in any recipe calling for tomato sauce, in creole dishes or Italian dishes. One of our favorites is a stewed tomato dish. Save up the bread crusts, dry bread or toast that did not get eaten for breakfast. Cut in cubes. Melt some butter or oleo in a heavy pan. Add the bread cubes, sprinkle with garlic salt and heat till bread is toasted. Stir constantly to prevent burning. Pour some hot "jug" over the bread and serve.

If you have extra beets from your garden just cook them, shred, dice or slice and freeze. If you have room in your freezer but no jars, most anything that can be canned may be frozen. The general rule is to cook it first.

You homemakers are to be highly complimented on the way you have rallied to high food cost. Your gardening, canning and freezing will do more to stabilize food prices than any imposed controls. By limiting your purchases to what you can af-

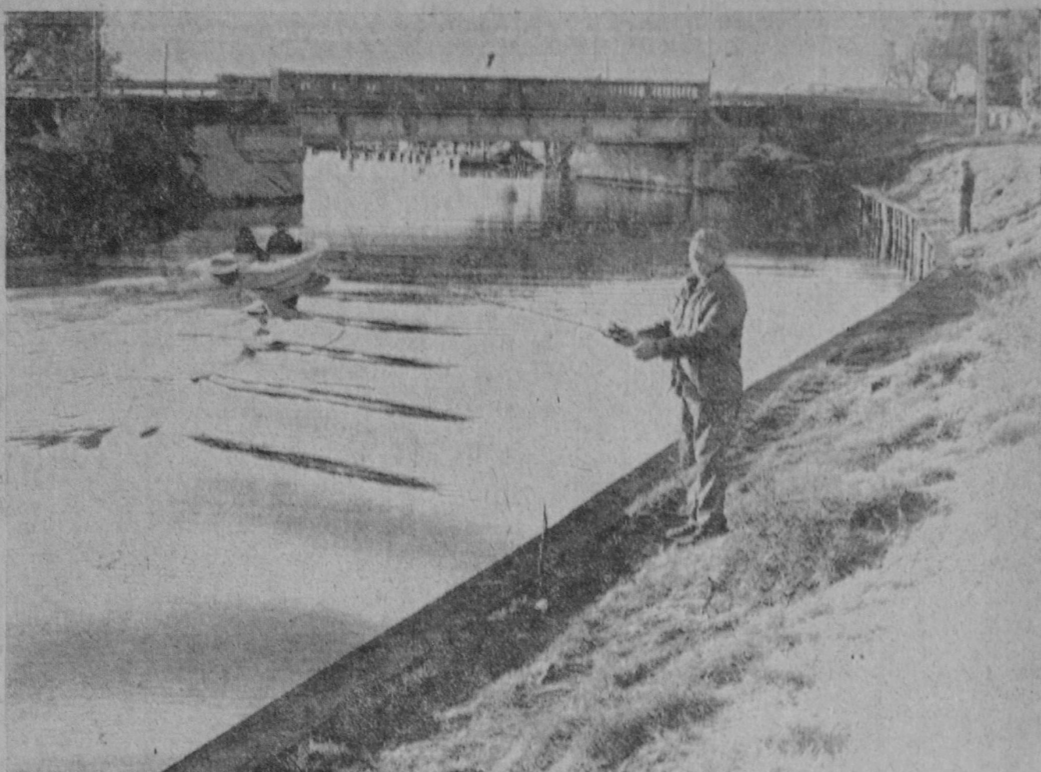

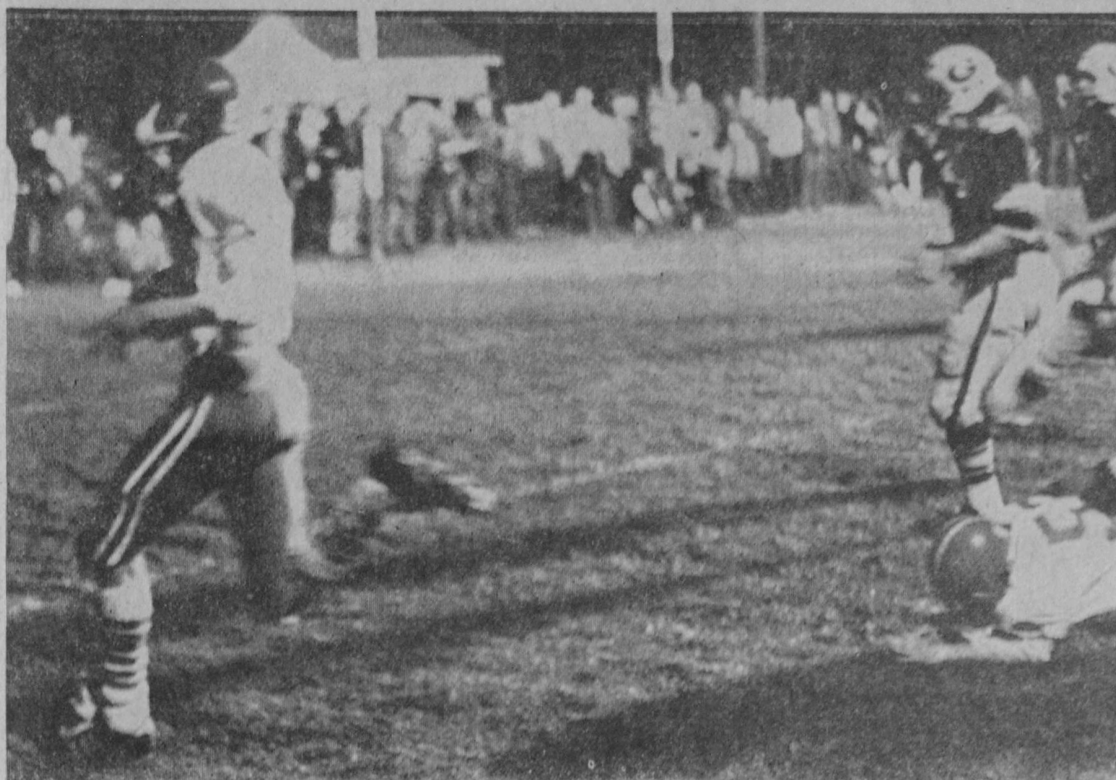
Tawas Freshman Lost First Game

State Public Assistance Is Replaced by SS

Question: What is supplemental security income?

Answer: Supplemental security income is a federal system with nationally-uniform eligibility requirements and payments. The new program will take the place of the present federal-state programs of public assistance payments to people who are 65 or older, blind or disabled.

Question: Is there any printed material available on the new supplemental security income program? If so, how can I obtain copies?

Answer: There is a leaflet, "Supplemental Security Income for the Aged, Blind and Disabled." You may obtain this leaflet by phoning any social security office. The publication number is SSA 73-11000.

Question: Who will be eligible for the supplemental security income payments?

Answer: People who are 65 or older, blind or disabled with little or no regular cash income may be eligible. People who are already on the state rolls do not need to apply. Others who think they may be eligible in January 1974 when the program begins should file an application with social security to determine their eligibility.
