When completed, the church (shown directly below as it appears today) will look similar to the architect's rendering. The Rev. Alfred W. Saulsbury, pastor, said that an engineer had found the building to be structurally sound and that the church building committee unanimously recommended the refurbishing, which would extend the life of the building to a minimum of 50 years. Estimated cost of the total project is a maximum of \$30,000. It is anticipated that the work would be completed next summer and in time for Christ Church's centennial observance. Besides adopting a \$26,020 operational budget for the next year, new vestry members named at the annual meeting were Mrs. T. M. O'-Loughlin, John H. Weible, George Rose and Carl Anderson.

#### NOTICE OF HEARING ON A CONSERVATION PROGRAM INVOLVING GAS RATE SCHEDULES

On August 21, 1973, Michigan Consolidated Gas Company applied to the Michigan Public Service Commission for approval of a program for the conservation of natural gas by means of promoting insulation of residences heated by natural gas. (Case No.

The application states that large numbers of the Company's residential space heating customers reside in older houses which do not have insulation meeting current standards established by the Federal Housing Administration. A study by the Company indicates that installation of 6 inches of ceiling insulation in a typical two-story, uninsulated house built in Detroit prior to 1940 would reduce the quantity of natural gas used for heating by about 17 percent; and that addition of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  inches of ceiling insulation in a typical two-story house built in the Detroit area after 1940 with 11/2 inches of ceiling insulation would reduce the quantity of natural gas used for heating by about

10 percent. The application states that in view of the critical current shortage of natural gas and other forms of energy in Michigan and throughout the country, conservation of natural gas used for residential space heating is in the public interest and in the interest

of Michigan Consolidated's customers. The program which Michigan Consolidated proposes for promoting insulation would include a major effort to communicate to the public the need for conservation of natural gas and the contribution which home insulation can make to that goal. The Company Dated: September 5, 1973

would employ advertising in press, radio, and television together with direct mail to customers and use of its outdoor signs and the message boards carried by its vehicles. It would prepare brochures and make them available through its offices and through insula-

The Company would urge homeowners to install insulation themselves or to hire a contractor to do so. The Company would also offer, on a nonprofit basis to the Company, to arrange for the installation, in residential premises owned by any qualified residential space heating customer, of ceiling insulation meeting the most recent FHA standard. A residential space heating customer would qualify for the program if he is not in arrears in payment of his gas bill. Where the Company thus arranged for installation, it would finance up to 80 percent of the cost of the insulation over a period of up to 36 months, at an interest rate of 1 percent per month on unpaid balance. The Company would not itself sell insulation or install insulation, but would subcontract the work to dealers

and contractors. The application asks the Michigan Public Service Commission pursuan to Section 63 of 1969 PA 306 (MCLA 24.263) to issue its ruling declaring that the proposed program is a utility function within the scope of the service rendered by Michigan Consolidated as a public utility; and that the cost thereof is a proper charge to utility cost of service, to be reflected in rates hereafter prescribed for Michigan Consolidated. The application further asks the

1919 PA 419 (MCLA 460.57) to approve amendments to the Company's Schedule of Rules, Regulations and Rates for Gas Service (MPSC No. 3). Under the proposed amendments payments owed the Company for installation of insulation would become part of the charge for residential space heating gas service rendered to the insulated premises; and the cost of such installation, if not paid for by the residential space heating customer who contracted for the work, would be






### CHECK INSULATION

at least 6 to 8 inches of high quality insulation in your ceilings. Weather-strip and caulk doors and windows. One of the biggest wastes of energy (and costliest for you) is the loss of heated or cooled air through wall, ceilings and floors.




#### SET AND FORGET YOUR THERMOSTAT

Set your air-conditioner control to the highest comfort level. The lower the thermostat setting, the more electricity your unit uses. In fact, for every additional degree of cooling, your air-conditioner uses about 5% more electricity.



#### TURN LIGHTS OFF IN **UNOCCUPIED ROOMS**

Although lighting is only about 6% of the average electric bill, turning lights off in unused areas can result in savings. (Especially in summer, because they throw off heat.) Switching shortens fluorescent lamp life but not incandescent bulbs. So turn off fluorescents only if you'll be out of the room more than 30 minutes.



#### **CLEAN FILTERS** REGULARLY

Clean or replace filters in your heating and cooling equipment at least three times a year. Clogged filters overwork your heating and cooling systems. Clean filters mean cleaner air in your house.



#### OPEN REFRIGERATOR AS FEW TIMES AS POSSIBLE

Once you open your refrigerator or freezer door, remove everything you need for a meal. Each opening of the door wastes energy. Replace worn gaskets so doors seal tightly. Defrost regularly because these appliances have to work harder when frost accumulates.



#### REPAIR LEAKY HOT WATER FAUCETS

A leak of one drop per second for one year will pour over 1300 gallons of hot water down the drain. (You pay money for wasted water and energy.)
