## Tawas Beach Land Procurement Urged

A resolution adopted Monday night indicated that the East Tawas Council favored procurement of the area within the city limits, presently controlled by Tawas Beach Club, for private development for residential and recreational uses.

The property in question is north-east of Tawas Beach Road and extends to the end of Forest Glen Subdivision, all within the city limits. It was once included in the Detroit and Mackinac Railway's Tawas Beach Park and later obtained by Tawas Beach Club.

A letter from John C. Elliott indicated that the property might be purchased by a group of businessmen and developed as a residential area. Besides increasing the community's tax base, it was indicated that recreational use might be increased through development of the old Detroit and Mackinac baseball diamond.

In other business Monday night, minutes of the planning commission recommended that the council study the possible purchase by the city of the Adams property located east of the intermediate school office. It was indicated that the property, containing 200 feet of frontage on Tawas Bay, was available for \$73,000. It was the opinion of the planning commission that it might be well for the city to purchase the property before any further private development takes place. This, it was stated, would be in line with the city's policy to eventually acquire all of the area between US-23 and Tawas Bay adjacent to the city park. Several years ago, the city purchased the property and dwelling formerly occupied by Dr. Harold Jones.

An agreement between the city and Multi-County Landfill was given final approval. Under terms of the agreement, the landfill is to be open between the hours of 1:00 and 6:00 p. m. seven days a week from May through September. The facility is to be closed on Tuesdays and Thursdays during the winter months. Keys are to be furnished to business firms desiring utilization of the facility during morning hours.

A study is to be made of records accepting Tawasentha Subdivision to determine the city's responsibility for street maintenance. Property owners in the two block area on both sides of Newman Street are being notified that the city intends to rezone that property from residential to commercial. A public hearing is to be held on the proposal. A fire protection agreement with

Baldwin Township was adopted by the city council. The fire department's annual report is to be submitted to the township when it becomes available.

Paul Rupert, superintendent of public works, was authorized to obtain bids on the purchase of a new dump truck with underbody scraper.

Authorization was given by the council for the city to pay its share of the \$900 annual cost for operation of a new senior citizen drop-in center at the American Legion Hall in Tawas City. It was stated that the new facility may be ready for operation later this week.

## Sheriff's Dept. Arrests Four

Three persons were arrested Thursday night at East Tawas and charged with violation of the state's controlled substances act. A fourth person was charged with selling LSD and marijuana.

The sheriff's department said that two informants had been approached at the East Tawas City Park and asked if they wanted to purchase drugs. An undercover officer then went to a cabin at East Tawas and made a purchase of LSD. The officer was advised to go to the park to purchase marijuana.

Arrested at the park and charged with selling LSD and marijuana was Jaime Christopher Stewart. Arrested at the cabin on violation of the controlled substances act were Pamela J. Owen, James D. Hessler and Leon Barlow.

## List Building Applications OK'd

Two building applications approved during the past two weeks by the Tawas City Department of Public Works included:

Tawas Area School, building trades class, construct 26 by 42-foot dwelling and attached 22 by 24-foot garage at the east corner of First Street and Ninth Avenue, \$18,000; Anne Berger, 502 First Street, construct 10 by 10-foot storage shed, \$150.

Tentative approval was given Consumers Power Company for construction of an electrical substation on Cedar Street with 121 by 200-foot fenced area, \$10,000. The permit is subject to vacation of certain streets.

## Veteran Tawas Educator Dead

Ronald W. Butterfield, 60, first principal of Tawas Area High School and a mathematics teacher in the school system until his retirement last spring, died Friday, September 14, at St. Mary's Hospital, Saginaw, following a lingering illness.

Funeral services were conducted Monday, September 17, at Tawas United Methodist Church, East Tawas, with the Rev. Kenneth Tousey officiating. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas.

Born on a farm near North Branch, Lapeer County, on May 15, 1913, he had been a member of the teaching profession for 37 years. After graduation from Central Michigan University in 1934, he came to East Tawas to join the faculty of the freshman college. He later joined the junior high school faculty at East Tawas, where he taught physics and algebra.

Butterfield then taught school at Sterling and Aigonac before joining the United States Navy in January 1943. He served three years with the naval air corps during World War II.

He returned to East Tawas High School in the fall of 1947 as basketball coach and taught mathematics and science. He became principal in 1949 and served in that capacity until the reorganization of Tawas Area School, serving as principal from 1953 to 1956. He then resigned as

principal to devote full time as a science and mathematics instructor in the high school. In addition to his teaching duties, he coached tennis for a number of years.

Butterfield was granted his master degree from the University of Michigan in 1951 and later studied at Case Institute, Cornell University and Michigan State University under science fellowships.

He was an active member and longtime officer of Tawas United Methodist Church, a member of state and national education associations and of Baldwin Township Planning Board.

He is survived by his wife, the former Marion Haglund, whom he married December 28, 1936, at Ft. Wayne, Indiana; one son, David, Burlington, Ontario, Canada; two grandchildren; one brother, Stewart Butterfield of North Branch; two sisters, Mable Lugten of Holland and Jean Mitchell of Warren.

## Property Exchange Proposed to City

Consumers Power Company was granted a special use permit Thursday night by the Tawas City zoning appeals board to construct a new electrical substation to serve the Tawas area. The project now goes to the city planning commission for a recommendation to the city council on the closing of portions of three unopened streets and an exchange of land with the power company to develop a trail as a city street.

The proposed new substation would be located in a wooded area to the north of the present substation on Cedar Street near the Michigan Bell Telephone Company warehouse and office.

Two of the nine property owners adjacent to the proposed construction attended last Thursday night's hearing and no objections were heard by the zoning appeals board.

The power company proposes to construct a low profile substation in a wooded area. Plans presented by Gordon Huck, Tawas District manager for the power company, indicated that a green belt buffer zone would be retained around the station along with a 131 by 200-foot fenced area.

At the present time, a trail connecting Cedar Street with Bridge Street in East Tawas, located on the city limit west of the old fairgrounds property and on which the Dubovsky residence faces, is on property owned by the power company.

The power company proposes to deed a 66-foot strip of land in order that this trail might be developed as a street. In exchange, the power company has asked the city council to vacate portions of Ottawas, River and Huron Streets, all undeveloped and north of Cedar Streets, to be used in the electrical substation site.

The council turned the power company's petition over to the planning commission for study and a recommendation at its Thursday, September 27, meeting. A special meeting of the council is to be held that evening to inspect the area and to study possible drainage problems which may exist.

The power company proposes to remove its present high profile substation on Cedar Street should the project be approved by the city.

## Parade Saturday Opens Hunting-Fishing Program

A parade starting at 9:00 a. m. from the East Tawas Elementary Unit will feature Iosco Sportsmen's Club's second annual observance of national hunting and fishing day.

The parade will include a color guard, boy scouts, archers, Tawas Area High School pep band, recreational vehicles and conservation exhibits.

The day-long program will include a 10:00 a. m. flag raising at the club grounds, exhibitions in archery, small arms, muzzle loading and trap shooting.

## Five Burglaries Are Investigated

Michigan State Police investigated five breakings and enterings during the past week.

A house trailer owned by George Davey, St. Clair Shores, was entered at 1298 South US-23, Tawas City. Burglars broke the glass out of a door to enter a cabin owned by William MacDonald, 121 River Road, Grant Township.

Three cabins in the same vicinity in Plainfield Township off Towerline Road were entered. The cabins were owned by Elmer Johnson of Pontiac, the Rev. C. W. Ballinger of Standish and Howard Hodges of Montrose. Household items were stolen.

## Boat Ramp Use Increases

Utilization of the city's boat ramp on Ninth Avenue showed a marked increase last week-end, according to a report at Monday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

Operator of the boat ramp reported that the facility issued \$1 use tickets to 82 boatowners for launching service on Saturday and Sunday.

## Drop-In Center, Assessing, Fire Truck, Refuse, Bridge Were Council Topics

Allocation of \$225 as Tawas City's share for paying utilities and maintenance of a new Tawas Area Senior Citizen drop-in center for six months was approved Monday night by the city council.

This action was taken on receipt of a letter from Clyde Soper, president of the Iosco County Senior Citizens Council, who stated that the proposed drop-in center would be located in the Jesse C. Hodder Post No. 189, American Legion Hall, Tawas City.

Earlier this year, the council indicated it was willing to participate in such a center being proposed at the former West Parish of Tawas United Methodist Church on Whittemore Street. Since then, the building has been sold and is being used by the Seventh Day Adventist Church.

In his letter, Soper indicated that the county senior citizens council hopes to have the new drop-in center operating by October 1. The City of East Tawas is to cooperate financially in its maintenance.

In other business, a proposal by Landmark Title Company of Oscoda to assume assessing services presently being provided by the Iosco County Tax Equalization Department was tabled for further study and a decision is to be made at the October 1 meeting.

Since elimination of its ward supervisors, Tawas City is one of six governmental units in Iosco County without the services of its own property assessing officer. In July 1972, the city contracted with the county tax equalization department to provide this service.

Robert Allan of the Oscoda firm, who holds a three-level certificate from the state tax commission as a property appraiser, proposes to perform the service at the same rate provided by the county. The cost is 25 cents to spread each assessment on the tax rolls, \$5 to inspect each building permit entailing major construction, \$2.50 for each personal property appraisal and \$7.50 for each complete reappraisal of real estate.

Allan, accompanied by Larry O'Brien, who has a two-level certificate from the state, told councilmen that their firm had made contact with the six governmental units not having an assessing officer. No unit has accepted the firm's service as yet.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz stated that a factor to be considered by the council would be that city property owners might benefit from services

offered by a private firm rather than to have the tax equalization department doing the actual assessing.

It was stated at the meeting that the county board of commissioners would release any governmental unit from present contracts should the private service be desired.

Tentative approval was given by the council for adoption of a lease agreement between the city and Gene Salamony for utilization of his privately-owned fire truck by the volunteer fire department. Final approval is subject to inspection of the lease by the city attorney.

At its last meeting, Salamony proposed the use of his fire truck under an arrangement whereby the city would furnish housing in the city garage during the winter months. A report from the city's insurance carrier, Myles Insurance Company, indicated that a six-month premium to add the equipment to the city's insurance policy would cost \$65.

Daniel Ulrich, chief of the volunteer fire department, told councilmen that he believed utilization of the equipment would be a good investment for the city. The council gave its approval to the proposal on recommendation of Ulrich and the city manager.

Changing crystals in a radio presently in the fire truck so as to operate on the sheriff's department frequency is to be investigated. In the meantime, the city manager is to obtain prices on furnishing radio equipment for the city's other two fire trucks. It was believed that the approximate cost for each installation would be \$1,000.

Arrangements are to be made to hold a special meeting with Harold Knight, certified public accountant, on a proposed pension plan for city employees.

A bid submitted by Leon Houghton of \$5,200 for providing commercial refuse pickup in the city was tabled by the council. It was pointed out by the council that no provision had been made in the current city budget for providing such service, which was excluded under a contract adopted earlier this year between Houghton and the city.

During discussion, Houghton told councilmen that he had received complaints from motel owners over service being provided. Under the contract, motels and cabin resorts which rent units on a year around basis receive a weekly pickup of seven garbage bags each.

The city's contractor said that a

number of the motels and resorts were exceeding the 20-pound limit for each garbage bag and noted that some of the plastic bags contained as much as 90 pounds of refuse and are difficult to handle.

Members of the council expressed the opinion that an exception had been made to the no commercial pickup clause in the current contract for the benefit of motel and resort owners. It was stated that if the weight and bag limit rule was being abused, the contractor should tag the bags with a violation notice and leave them.

A report from the city manager indicated that cost of constructing a 70-foot wooden foot bridge over Dead Creek would be approximately \$5,500. The city manager had estimated that utilization of the old iron foot bridge removed from the Mathews Street bridge would be slightly in excess of \$4,000. Besides setting the bridge in place, this would include replacement of wooden timbers and

installation of a wire screen as a safety measure.

Without installation of the wire screen, the city manager estimated that cost of installation of the old bridge structure over Dead Creek at Tenth Avenue would be approximately \$2,600.

The city manager said that he would contact Davison and Son Builders, Tawas City, to get a firm cost on constructing concrete footings necessary to receive the bridge. A report is to be made at the next meeting.

Effective Monday, October 1, Multi-County Landfill off Monument Road is to provide refuse dumping service for Tawas City and East Tawas. Residents of the city desiring an identification card for utilization of the landfill may submit an application at the city hall. The privately-owned landfill is to offer its services to residential, commercial and industrial users under contract with the two cities.

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## \$8,126 Raised By Cancer Crusade

Crusade report of Iosco County Unit, American Cancer Society, Michigan Division, Incorporated, was given Thursday, September 13, by Bud Fisher at the Ladies Literary Clubrooms in East Tawas. A total of \$8,126 was raised, including \$3,097.96 from Federal Health Services, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, and \$1,060.75 in memorial donations. This is an all-time record for the Iosco unit.

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# Rev. L. L. Blackman Heads Crusade for Methodist Church

The Rev. Leon Lore Blackman, who will direct the Christian Stewardship Crusade at the Tawas United Methodist Church, East Tawas, is a member of the Southern New Jersey Conference where he has held several pastorates, including the Cadwalader Heights United Methodist Church in the capital city of Trenton; Calvary United Methodist Church (formerly Central) in Atlantic City, the well-known resort and convention city, and the First United Methodist Church in historic Cape May.

During 1971, the ministers in finance and field service raised over 41-million dollars in 318 local church crusades, one annual conference crusade and one program for an educational institution.

Since 1954, Mr. Blackman has directed over 350 local church crusades in 58 annual conferences located in the five jurisdictions of the church. His work has taken him to 39 states, including Alaska and Hawaii, and the District of Columbia.

Recently, he has completed assignments at the Anchor Park United Methodist Church, Anchorage, Alaska; Sun Valley United Methodist Church, Los Angeles, California; Shepherd of the Valley United Methodist Church, Scituate, Rhode Island.

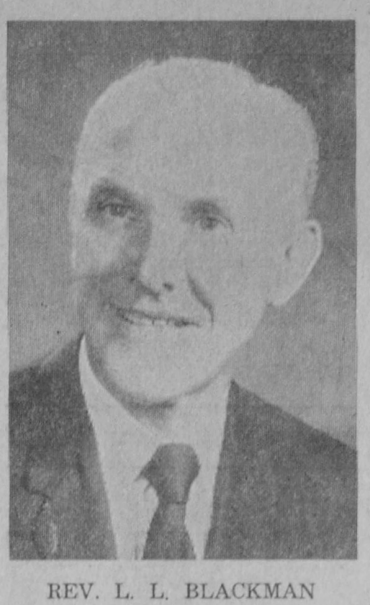

The third touchdown of the first half came when Mark Elliott scored on a sweep from six yards out. Hackborn booted the point after touchdown and Tawas Area held a 20-0 lead at halftime.

Tawas' offense began to click in the second half as Quarterback Mickey Haglund began to move the ball well. Elliott scored the second of his three touchdowns for the night when he raced 25 yards into the end zone. He then took a handoff from Haglund and went 58 yards to hit paydirt.

In 23 running plays during the night, Elliott picked up 162 yards. He caught two passes for another 50 yards. Hughes carried the ball three times for 51 yards, while Haglund picked up 54 yards in nine carries. He completed three out of nine passes.

Defensively, Hackborn was a standout with 14 tackles. Mark Hintz was another defensive standout and stopped one Harrison drive in Tawas territory with a smashing tackle on the nine-yard line.

Tawas' offensive line was led by Guards John Pfeiffer and Glen Desjardins, aided by Center John MacMurray.

The Eagles reached the scoreboard

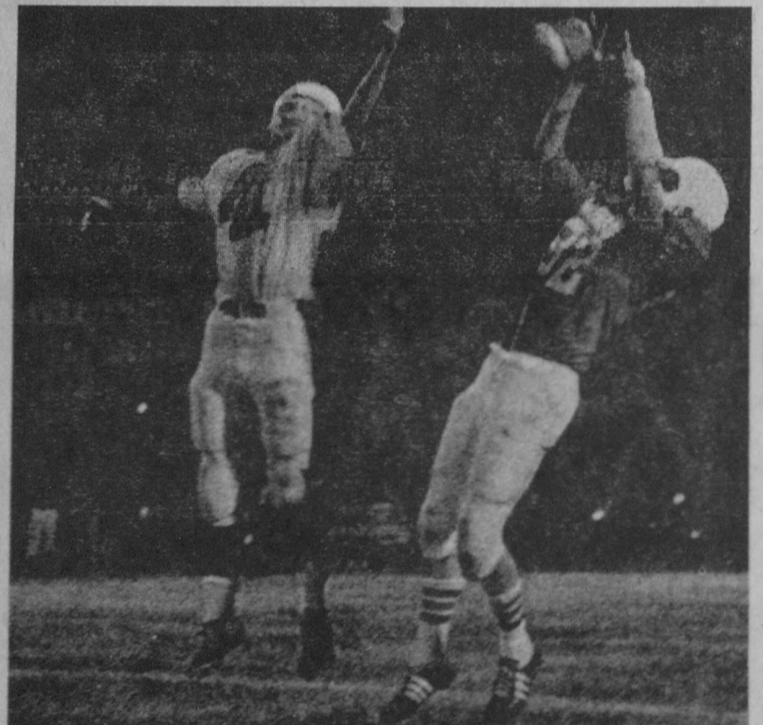
for their one and only time of the night when Tyson Shellenbarger scored on an end around play of 24 yards. He booted the point after touchdown to narrow the gap to 12-7.

## TAHS Senior Named Semi-Finalist in NMS Program

Prin. John Alexander has announced that one student at Tawas Area High School has been named a semifinalist in the 1974 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The student is Mary Thornton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Thornton of Tawas City. She will compete for about 3,100 merit scholarships to be awarded in the spring. In the 18 annual competitions completed to date, 34,450 students have won merit scholarships valued at more than \$5.5-million dollars.

Last spring, two Tawas Area High School seniors, Richard A. Lemon and Paul M. Killey, were named winners of four-year merit scholarships.

According to Edward C. Smith, president of the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, "The approximately 15,000 semifinalists are representative of the nation's most academically-talented young people and they bring honor not only to themselves, but also to their families, their teachers and their communities."

"From this group will come many future leaders in business, industry and the professions," he said. "The future success of these young people will, however, depend upon their

ability to become productive at the high intellectual levels that they are capable of attaining."

The semifinalists were the highest scorers in each state on the preliminary

scholastic aptitude test administered last October to over one-million students in about 17,000 schools nationwide. These students, who constitute about one-half of one percent of the graduating secondary school seniors in the United States, will complete high school and enter college in 1974.

National Merit Scholarship Corporation identifies the semifinalists to all regionally-accredited United States colleges and universities. Many semifinalists find this recognition useful in seeking financial aid from sources other than the merit program and in the process of gaining admission to college.

Semifinalists must qualify as finalists to advance in the competition for merit scholarships. To become finalists, the semifinalists must fulfill requirements that include receiving the endorsement of their schools, confirming their high scores on a second examination and by providing evidence of their academic and other accomplishments.

Ninety percent or more of the semifinalists are expected to become finalists and each finalist will receive a certificate of merit in recognition of distinguished performance in the competition.

Every finalist will be considered for one of the 1,000 National Merit Scholarships that are allocated on a state basis, according to each state's percentage of the total United States high school graduating class. Names of the merit scholarship winners in 1974 are to be announced next spring.

"If your check is lost or stolen, get in touch with your nearest social security office at once," Carr said. "The check can be replaced, but it takes time. Handle your check carefully when you get it and you will not have to wait while it is being replaced."

Social security pays over four-billion dollars a month in benefit checks to almost 29-million people—eligible retired and disabled workers and their families and families of deceased workers who worked long enough under social security.

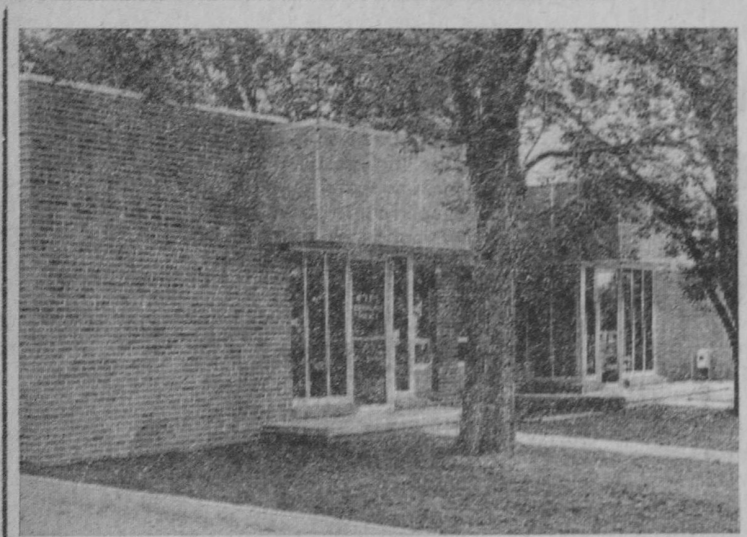

## Family Living Education

If the "10 o'clock hungries" slow you down, it might be you are not eating enough breakfast.

A good sign of the mid-morning slump is the feeling that you will fade away before lunchtime.

Studies show if you skip breakfast or do not eat enough, your performance at work will slow down.

In fact, this could be the reason why some people say they are "afternoon people" and morning gets them down.

When children do not eat breakfast, they tend to get restless and droopy in school and their attention span is shortened.

Teachers can pick out the children who have had an adequate breakfast simply by observing their behavior.

To give more children the advantages of a good breakfast, many schools have started a school

breakfast program in addition to the school lunch program.

I have a few suggestions for you on how to beat the mid-morning hungries and how to avoid foods that add only calories to your diet.

Instead of grabbing a sweet roll or doughnut during your coffee break, take a piece of fruit to work and substitute milk for coffee. This increases the nutritional quality of your break considerably.

If you eat breakfast and still get the 10 o'clock hungries, try splitting your breakfast, eating half at home and the other half at work. But be careful the half at work does not consist of high-calorie, low-nutrition foods such as soft drinks, sweet rolls, candy and potato chips.

For weight watchers, a fringe benefit of eating a good breakfast may be reduced food intake at lunch. A salad might do when once you ate two-two desserts, that is.

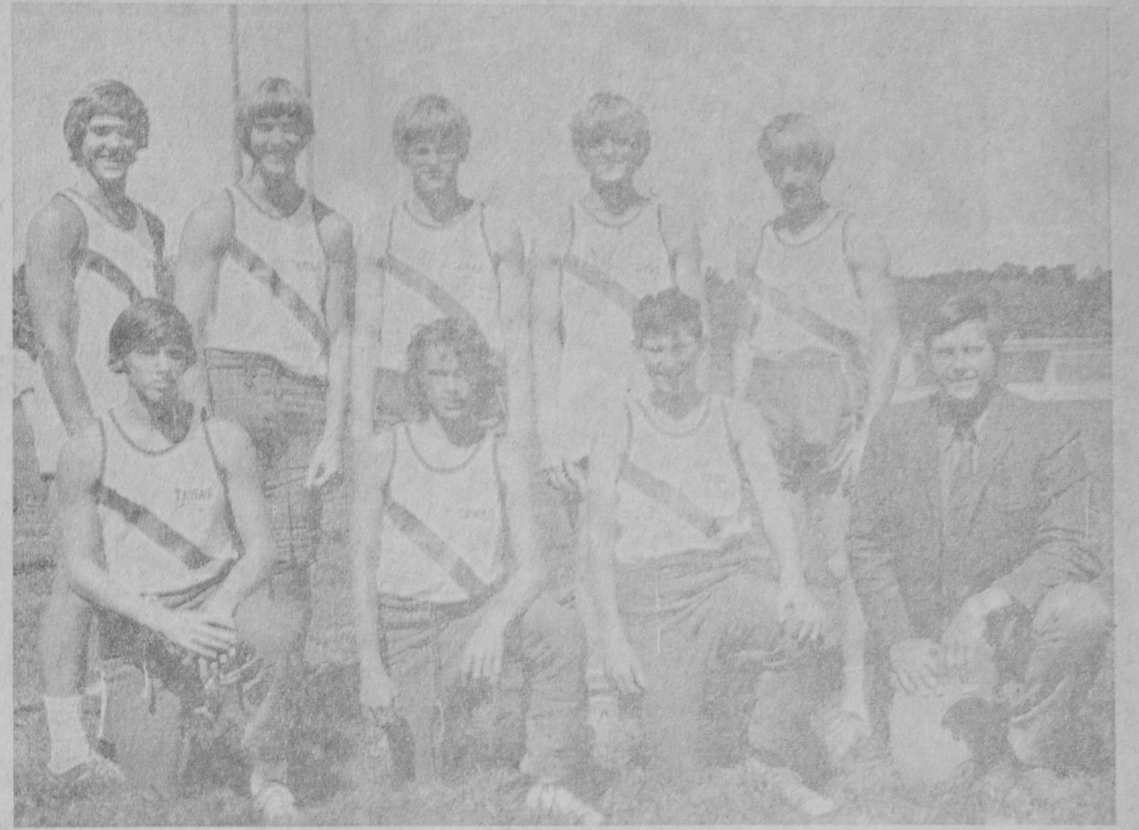
Give breakfast a try, you will feel better, work better and probably look better, too.

## State Civil Service Adopts New Test

Sidney Singer, state personnel director, has announced that a new type of test will be introduced into the Michigan Civil Service testing system for the first time this fall.

The test, a biographical inventory, has been used successfully in institutions and industry to predict a prospective employee's suitability for specific positions and thereby reduce job turnover.

This exam part constitutes another major step toward eliminating discrimination in hiring practices by introducing job predictive data related to a person's personal preference and background.

While the typical civil service exam permits credit for only one correct answer, the biographical inventory is used to compare applicant response patterns of persons who are successfully performing in positions similar to those for which the exam is being given.

The biographical inventory strongly resembles an oral examination in the type of questions it asks, the main difference being that all questions are determined by scientific study.

"The test will be introduced into the state's testing program on a limited basis," says Ted Darany of the civil service testing and evaluation division. "We will be giving the test to those persons applying for typist-clerk positions at three different levels. It will be administered in conjunction with other established examination parts, such as spelling and typing performance."

Darany concluded, "This biographical inventory is the final product of two years of concentrated research. Studies are currently under way to determine other occupations for which biographical inventories predict job success."

### Earn Up to \$175 Monthly And Get SS

Question: I retired over two years ago. If I start working part time now, how much can I make and still collect my full social security payments each month?

Answer: You will get your full social security payments for each month you do not earn more than \$175 in wages or do substantial work in self-employment. Or you can get your full benefits, regardless of monthly earnings, if your total earnings for the year do not exceed \$2,100.

Question: I will soon be 65. I was told if I do not perform substantial services in my business I can get social security payments. What is meant by "substantial services"?

Answer: "Substantial services" refers to the amount of time you work in your business, the nature of your services, the type of business and the relationship of your activities before retirement to those after retirement. Usually, 45 or more hours of work in a month is considered "substantial services." Less than 45 hours may be considered substantial if the service is managing a large business or working in a highly skilled occupation. You can get more detailed information at any social security office.

Question: I will be 72 this year. How much can I earn during 1973 and still get my full monthly social security payments?

Answer: You can earn as much as \$2,100 for the months of 1973 before the month you reach 72. No matter how much you earn in that period, however, you can get your full social security payment for any month you neither earn over \$175 nor do substantial work in self-employment. After you are 72, your social security payments will not be affected by your earnings.

Question: I am retired and my wife gets monthly social security checks as my dependent. She just started working and will make more than \$2,100 this year. How will this affect our checks?

Answer: Your check will stay the same, because your payment is only affected if you work. But your wife's payments will be reduced according to the amount she earns.

Robert McDonald, middle school principal, extends a welcome to any adult in the community desiring to help with the instruction.

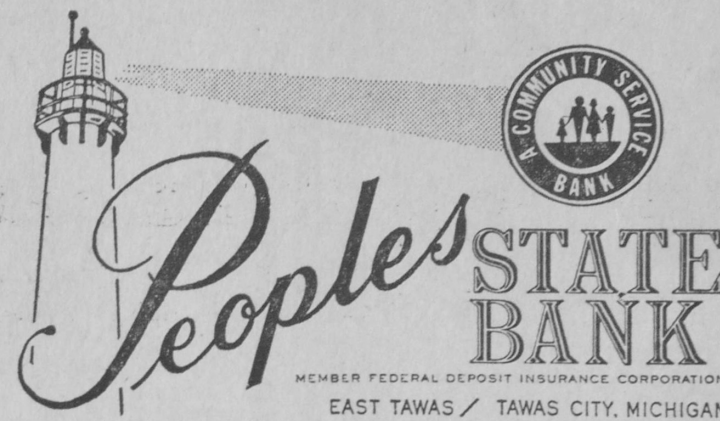
