

# State Would Assist Erosion Control by Sand Purchase

Preliminary word has been received from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources indicating that the City of Tawas City has qualified for a pilot erosion control project at the city park.

According to word from a DNR spokesman at Lansing, the city would receive funds to purchase several thousand yards of sand to be placed along the beach.

The city's share of the project would consist of construction of a groin in the bay to help hold the sand.

Mayor John Brugger said that official confirmation of the project was expected this week. The tentative announcement was received here through a telephone call from Lansing.

A two-member survey team visited the city two weeks ago to inspect erosion at the park. At the time, Dr. Ernest Brater of the University of Michigan, who is working with the water resources commission, advised against removing sand from the lake bottom to be used as fill along the beach.

The state's technical advisor said that removal of lake bottom sand would only compound the problem of severe action by waves during storms. He said, too, that the Tawas Bay area lacked sufficient drifting sand.

The study was made here at the request of State Sen. Robert Davis, whose office had been contacted during a trip to Lansing by Mayor Brugger and City Mgr. Reginald Publitz.

Davis said that four or five pilot projects had been undertaken on Lake Michigan and believed one should be located on the Lake Huron side of Michigan.

The city has been seeking a solution to the problem of shoreline erosion for several months. Nearly 150 feet of bathing beach has been lost at the city park.

The water line of Tawas Bay is lapping at the outer edge of the tennis courts and a severe storm early Saturday morning again eroded deeper into the park property.

It is expected that the water level of Lake Huron will rise several more inches next year.

Mayor Brugger said that no word had been received concerning state participation in a project at the East Tawas City Park. This information may be included in the letter of confirmation.

# Amputee Rescued in Boat Mishap

Laurie Frank, 54, former Tawas City resident, was one of three men rescued by the United States Coast Guard Monday after their boat capsized and they spent 21 hours floating in the Gulf of Mexico.

Frank, who resides with his wife, Pearl, at Zephyrhills, Florida, had accompanied his landlord and another man on a fishing trip at 8:00 a. m. Sunday. They were approximately 10 miles off the coast of St. Petersburg when a storm hit that area about 2:00 p. m. Waves were reported to be 10 feet in height.

Attempts to turn the boat upright were unsuccessful. One man was not wearing a life jacket and clung to the other two men who were holding onto the boat.

Wives of the three men became alarmed when their husbands did not return home that evening and police were notified. A coast guard helicopter, called to look for four boats lost during the storm, located the three men at 11:00 a. m. Monday. They were rushed to a hospital by ambulance, but other than being tired and soggy from their all night ordeal, they suffered no ill effects.

Because of the publicity of the near tragedy printed in Florida newspapers, Frank telephoned his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Abram Frank of Tawas City, to report he was all right.

"I asked Laurie if he was afraid of sharks while he was floating in the Gulf of Mexico," said Mrs. Frank. "He answered: 'If one had gotten hold of my one leg it would have had something to chew on.'" (Frank, a veteran of World War II, lost one leg as the result of a land mine explosion. He wears an artificial limb.)

His mother said that Laurie had told her he was going to "confine his fishing to shore from now on."

# Intermediate District Wants Vocational Survey

A move to study the possible establishment of a vocational education center in Isosco County was endorsed Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Appearing before the board was John Tafelski, superintendent of Isosco Intermediate School District, who reported that the county board on September 13 had committed itself to the development of a comprehensive plan for meeting the vocational training needs of the county.

Establishment of an area skills center has long been discussed by boards of education of this county and the intermediate school district. Two surveys were conducted in the 1960s involving this county with Bay and Arenac and, at one time, the state department of education designated Isosco as a possible site for such a center.

Since then, intermediate school districts have been reorganized throughout the state, but Isosco is one of only a few independent county districts in the state which has not been involved in a consolidation.

In October 1971, Isosco Intermediate School District hired a vocational coordinator to make an independent study. During the time this survey was being completed, Bruce Vickey of the intermediate school district developed a shared time vocational training program involving the county's four high schools. This program has met with some success and is in its second year, but transportation continues to be one of the major problems.

During his presentation Monday

night, Tafelski said the survey indicated that 60 to 75 percent of the juniors and seniors of this county's high schools were uncommitted concerning future careers and were employment bound with little technical training.

Tafelski said the survey, 1½ years in the making, indicated there was a need for expanded vocational training in order to improve educational opportunities for youth and adults of this county.

The intermediate superintendent felt it was "not appropriate" to talk about establishment of a vocational skills center at this time, as further investigation should be made by the four school districts and a committee of citizens.

The planning effort would include a determination of the number of people to be served, program priorities, facilities needed, development of an organization and administrative structure, plans for capital outlay and operational financing, implementation of a timetable leading to the proposed development.

Status of Isosco Intermediate School

District in the state's plans for an organization by regions is still up in the air, although boards of education apparently were successful in making the point at a hearing conducted months ago. It was stated then that Isosco desired to be affiliated with the Bay-Arenac Intermediate School District, contiguous to the south boundary, should there be any reorganization.

Regardless of the intermediate school district reorganization potential, it has long been felt that Isosco would have to make some effort on its own toward development of a skills center.

"We are here to serve the kids and the intermediate district desires to cooperate with the four K-12 districts to study vocational education and see what kind of a program could be developed," said Tafelski. He said he planned to meet with boards of education of the county's other three school districts in the near future.

# Tawas Area Board Hears Report on Vocational Classes

John Alexander, principal of Tawas Area High School, told board of education members Monday night that he was "generally pleased" with the progress of the expanded vocational program being offered this term in the high school.

Although the building trades class, which comprises two two-hour instructional blocks, is running behind schedule as far as construction weather is concerned, the school has purchased a lot at the east corner of First Street and Ninth Avenue in Tawas City on which a 26 by 42-foot dwelling and attached 22 by 24-foot garage is to be constructed by students.

Materials for the dwelling are now being placed on the site and preparations have been made to construct the footing. A training session was held Tuesday (yesterday) concerning property abstracts and land titles. The class was conducted by Carl Babcock of Isosco Abstract Office and Atty. Herbert Hertzler.

Instructor for the building trades program is Mark Defibaugh. He is being assisted by a college student receiving his student teaching experience here.

Alexander said that considerable interest was being shown in the food handling instruction being coordinated by Mrs. Mildred Bloomer. This is a two-hour block designed to train students to work as waitresses, cooks and managers of restaurants. The class is planning a semi-formal dinner to be served at the school during homecoming week.

General secretarial office skills are being taught in an office practice class, comprising two two-hour blocks. This program is not funded by the state and some equipment is lacking. The class plans a trip to Wurtsmith Air Force Base to study the civil service operation there.

The principal said that a report is to be made at a later date concerning the home economics program, which now has a space problem.

Steven Hitch, auto shop instructor, reported that this program continued to be popular this year. There are 50 boys presently enrolled in Auto Shop I and II, along with five students from Hale Area School and two from Whittemore-PreScott Area School in the shared time program. This program is being funded by a \$3,000 grant from the state and \$3,000

# DNR Warns of No Snagging in Co. Streams

Michigan Department of Natural Resources reminds fishermen that the snagging of salmon in Isosco County waters is illegal and violators are being cited into court.

According to regulations this year, a fish taken even accidentally on a fouled line (snagged) must be returned to the water.

Coho salmon began running in the Tawas River last week but little success was reported by fishermen. The fish just did not hit any type of bait thrown into the water.

Fishing is expected to start reaching its peak for chinook on the AuSable River during the last half of September and through October. For steelhead, the peak season is expected from mid-October through December.

# Barns-Trees Damaged by Wind Storm

A severe wind storm early Saturday morning damaged numerous trees and barns in the Tawas area. A new barn owned by William Wickert on M-55 was tilted about eight inches by the wind, while an old barn on Townline Road was reported to be flattened in the storm.

Several residents of the Saginaw Bay area of Alabaster Township believed the storm may have been a miniature tornado, judging from the noise accompanying the storm and the fact that several trees were uprooted.

Severe erosion to the shore of Tawas Bay and Saginaw Bay was caused by wave action.

# Isosco CF Drive Netted \$1,022.02

Mrs. Kenneth Verlac of East Tawas, local chairman of the Greater Michigan Chapter of the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation, announced Tuesday morning, September 25, that \$1,022.02 was collected during the September 17-18 mothers' march in the Tawas area. This reflects the great community response to the drive, as the goal was \$800.

# High School Lunch Sales Down; May Cause Price Hike

Administrators of Tawas Area High School hope to encourage students to buy tickets and participate in the school lunch program in order to insure its continuation.

In a report Monday night to the board of education, Supt. Edward J. Barry said 41,158 type A lunches had been served since the start of the school year and ticket sales were averaging 231 daily. He said this was about one-half of the number served last year.

The junior varsity track position is still open.

# Bond Issue Loses; Grant Firemen Talk Park Plans

Members of Grant Township Fire Department were to decide Monday night on what action could be taken on construction of a park at Sand Lake following defeat last week of a bond issue placed before township voters.

"We know we are going to have to do something toward the park as the fire department has \$12,000 to be used for this purpose," stated Henry Gage, a member of the fire department.

Voters of the township rejected a bond proposal to build a new township hall and community center, 146-114. Included in the project was a park-playground area near the present fire hall.

Members of the fire department were told Wednesday by the Isosco County Board of Commissioners that there were no county funds to assist with the park project. Robert Foster, commission chairman, said he would check with state authorities at Lansing to determine if any matching funds were available for the project.

The park project had received approval from the Isosco Parks and Recreation Commission, but matching funds reportedly are not presently available from that source. The park commission had made funds available to other county governmental units to assist with similar projects.

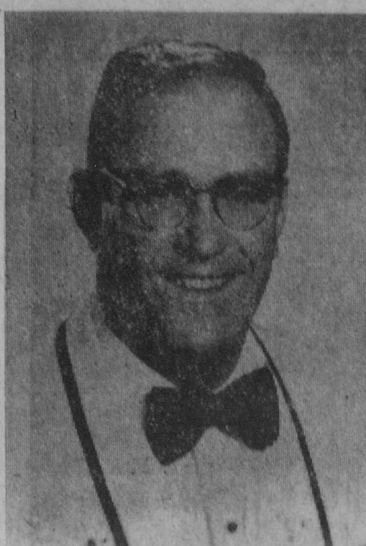
Jan Klinger, treasurer, and Mildred Bielecki, secretary.

# Braves Defeated Cavaliers, 13-6; Required Overtime

Tawas Area Braves opened the 1973 NSL football season Friday night with a 13-6 overtime win over Carrollton. The game marked the second straight win for the Braves and the first time that a Tawas team has been involved in the new tie-breaking rule for prep teams.

After battling to a scoreless tie in a hard-hitting first half, Tawas kicked off and the Braves' defense forced the Cavaliers to punt from mid field. Mark Elliott ran the ball back to the Cavalier 30, but a clipping penalty moved the ball back to Tawas' 11-yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Elliott ran 89 yards for a touchdown on a power sweep. Elliott's fine footwork was aided by excellent blocking on the part of the Braves, led by

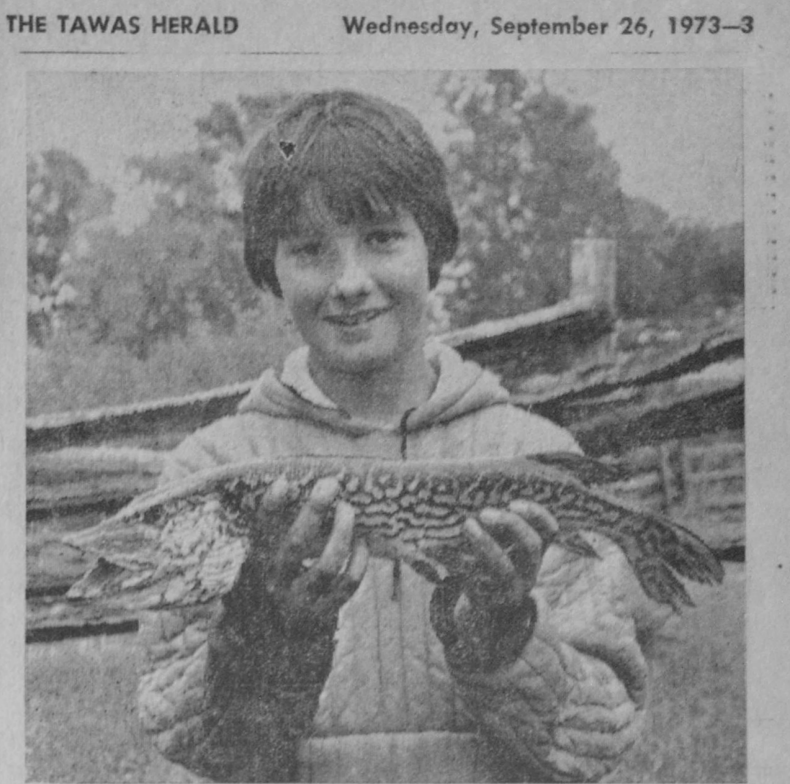

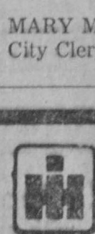

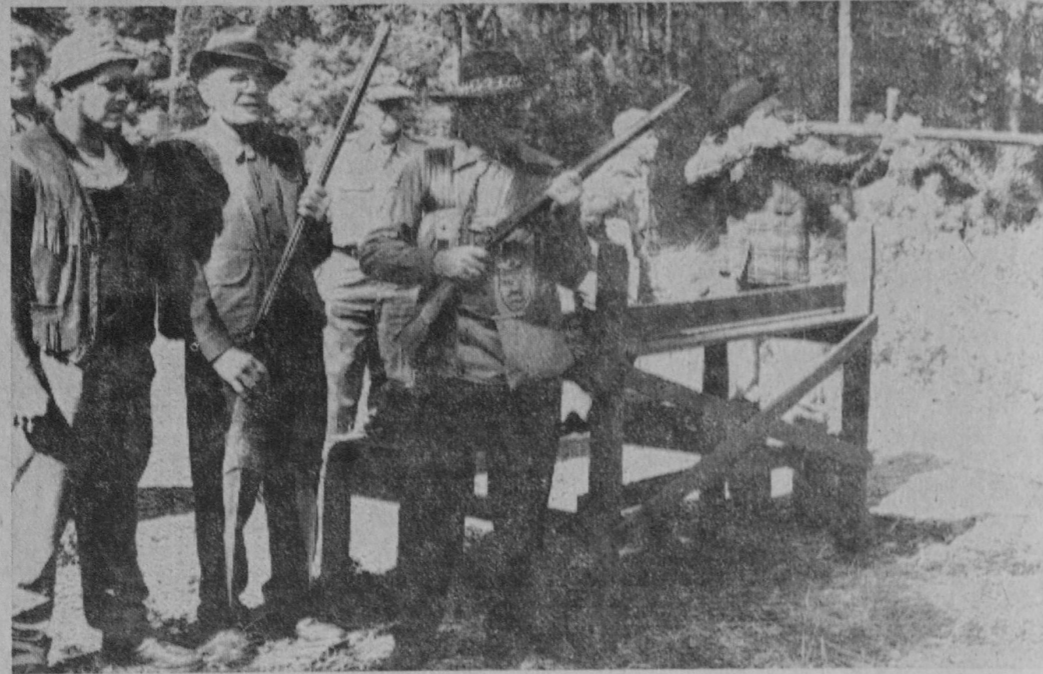

## Gas Company Lends Money to Its Customers

Michigan Consolidated Gas Company's unique program to lend its heating customers money to install insulation in the ceilings of their homes could benefit all its gas users by saving up to nine-million dollars a year in wholesale gas costs, the Michigan Public Service Commission was told Monday, September 24.

Testifying before the commission for approval of the gas conservation program, Hugh C. Daly, president of Michigan Consolidated, said the company's goal was to have 200,000 of its customers bring their homes up to the FHA standard of six inches of insulation in their ceilings during the next few years.

"We estimate that this would reduce the amount of higher cost gas we will have to purchase in the future by about six-billion cubic feet a year, reducing our wholesale purchases by about \$9,000,000 yearly."

"That is nine-million dollars of our cost of service that our customers will not have to pay," he said.

Another witness for the utility, John von Rosen, an engineer and manager of residential and commercial gas services department, said that home insulation "is about the best investment any homeowner can hope to make." He said that an \$83 investment in ceiling insulation could cut heating costs by \$37 a year, a 43 percent return on his investment.

"That compares to putting the same amount of money in a six percent savings account and getting a return of \$5.28."

Daly said the company's non-profit program would promote the installing of insulation in under-insulated homes and winterizing through the media and booklets showing customers how to do the work themselves.

The company would also act as a prime contractor and offer low-cost financing of insulation work done by insulation contractors and dealers.

Studies of various methods of home insulation made by the company were introduced by von Rosen who said ceiling insulation offers the biggest fuel savings at the least cost to the homeowner.

Daly said the insulation program, originally suggested by William G. Rosenberg, MPSC chairman, and announced August 21 has sparked interest throughout the nation.

Daly said Michigan Consolidated is offering to help other utilities in Michigan design similar programs, including use of its printing plates and promotional material.

Michigan Consolidated was the first utility company in the nation to embark on a plan to insulate customers' homes and finance the costs for them.

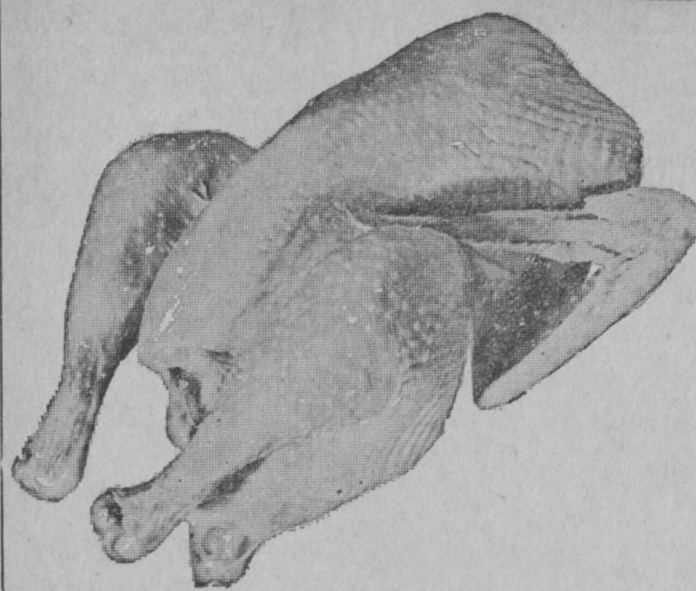

## Tawas IDC's Industrial Recognition Night Proved to be Outstanding Success

First annual recognition night for Tawas area industrialists proved to be a resounding success. More than 160 persons attended the get-acquainted hour and dinner held Thursday night at the Holland House, East Tawas.

Included in that number were 25 guests representing industry and major business of the Tawas area.

John Hosbach, long-time member of Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation and a vice president of Peoples State Bank, was master of ceremonies for the program following the dinner.

James Campbell, IDC president and another veteran member of that organization, introduced guests and fellow members of the industrial development corporation.

In his summary of the IDC's activities, Campbell pointed out the amazing job potential growth in the area which has been fostered by the IDC.

Originally incorporated in the spring of 1964 through efforts of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, the organization seemingly struggled a

number of years before achieving its principal goal—encouraging industry to locate in the area to provide additional jobs and the subsequently larger payroll to aid the year around economy of the area.

Original incorporators of the IDC were Clarence McKenzie, then mayor of East Tawas; George Tuttle, mayor of Tawas City at that time; Robert LaVoy, supervisor of Baldwin Township at the time, and Edward Nelkie, who was supervisor of Tawas Township in 1964.

Things began to happen once the IDC acquired property and began to develop its industrial park on Aulerich Road near the Iosco County Airport. This development started with a public subscription of IDC stock, followed by a decision of officers of the organization to borrow the money necessary to construct its first building at the industrial park.

Three different industries were brought to the new industrial park by the IDC and Campbell announced Thursday night that a new stock sale was being promoted to encourage the location of additional industrial

firms here and improvements to the park. A fourth industrial plant is now under construction at the park.

As an example of the rather amazing success of the IDC in increasing the job potential of the area, Campbell pointed out that Starboard Industries, Incorporated, which started here in 1971 with a payroll of 33 persons, had grown to an organization with a payroll of more than 200 persons and two plants.

State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas City spoke briefly on the proposed changes in unemployment benefits now being considered in the state legislature.

In his talk, Frank Burke of Michigan Consolidated Gas Company, Escanaba, main speaker of the evening, said that the area was fortunate to have the leadership to create an industrial park. Burke said it required more than vision on the part of the IDC leaders to create such a park—"It took a lot of hard work by a lot of people working together."

Burke pointed out that all businesses are founded on a gamble "from the Detroit and Mackinac Railway nearly 100 years ago to the corner grocery store. The wheels of business turn on profit, but business starts on risk capital." As an example of the gamble in starting any business, he pointed out that in 1971—when the industrial park saw its first growth here—there were over 10,000 business failures in the United States.

He said that the conduct of business is generally misunderstood by people, emphasizing that the average profit of all businesses last year in the United States was less than five percent.

"The name of the game in industry is jobs," said Burke. "And for each 100 jobs in an area, retail sales amount to \$500,000." Burke pointed out, too, that four out of five new jobs come through the growth of existing industry. He said that Tawas Area Industrial Corporation's success in attracting new industry to provide additional jobs was nothing less than phenomenal.

Looking toward the future, Burke said it was important that today's high school students understand the risks of business as well as to understand the need for maintaining the proper balance between protection of environment and the operation of industry. He said that it was important for people not to take an extreme position either way as, on the one hand, the extreme position con-

# County Must Spend \$24,500 to Get Facility Recertified

Iosco County Board of Commissioners learned Wednesday that an expenditure of approximately \$24,500 would have to be made at the Iosco Medical Care Facility in order to receive recertification from the state and federal government.

Appearing before the final meeting of September were Roy Bergstrom, director of the medical care facility, and Benson "Pete" Beck, director of the Iosco Social Services Department.

To meet requirements for certification, the county would have to install smoke detectors in each corridor at a cost of \$3,200, construct a steel storage building at a cost of \$15,000, segregate offices from corridors by construction of a \$1,400 smoke wall, vent the laundry room at a cost of \$2,200, as well as provide a standby air compressor for the heating system, expand the parking lot for additional social services employees at a cost of \$2,300 and install air conditioning in one section at a cost of \$500.

Bergstrom and Beck told commissioners that a portion of the expendi-

ture would be returned to the county through an increased budget from the state over a period of years.

In other business, it was reported that the state health department was ready to "crack down" on Iosco County after repeated warnings concerning operation of its dog pound. The sheriff's department is now obtaining prices on constructing a new building and investigation is being made into a proposal from a private landowner at Oscoda concerning location of a dog pound on his property.

Arthur Aulerich was appointed as the commission's representative on the East Central Michigan Planning Region Commission. He joins Carlton Merschel, Harry Samotis and Basil Goupil as members from this county on the commission.

Because Columbus Day is a legal holiday and it falls on October 8, the statutory date for next month's meeting, the first meeting day is to be held on October 9.

A budget hearing is to be held Thursday, October 11, 10:00 a. m. to 12 o'clock noon.

## Iosco Shared Time Classes Continued for Another Term

During the 1972-73 school year, Iosco County high schools cooperated in initiating shared time vocational education programs. Last year's programs were designed to give area students an opportunity to participate in programs not otherwise available to them.

Again this fall, the Whittemore-Prescott High School is offering its metal-working program on a shared time arrangement. Hale schools are offering a nurse's aide program utilizing the facilities of Tawas Hospital and the Iosco Medical Care Facility, Tawas City.

The shared time auto mechanics program at Tawas has been expanded to include a second year for those students who have had Auto Mechan-

ics I.

Business machines and office practice programs have been expanded at each of the local high schools. This has eliminated the need for the shared time program offered by Oscoda last year.

Program expansion and revamping has also eliminated the need for last year's shared time building trades program. As of this fall, each of the Iosco County high schools will have its own building trades program.

Returning Tawas students were able to participate in a food services program for the first time this fall. That program utilizes the cafeteria facilities. The program offers the student experience in institutional and commercial purchasing preparation, serving and storage of foods.

On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed an application with supporting testimony and exhibits with the Michigan Public Service Commission in Case No. U-4332, which requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$36,100,000 on an annual basis. On August 27, 1973, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief, which seeks authority, on an interim basis, to amend its rate schedules so as to increase its electric rates by approximately \$33,810,000 on an annual basis. On April 18, 1973, Consumers Power Company also filed an application in Case No. U-4331 with the Commission for authority to increase its rates for the sale of gas and at the same time filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief to increase its gas rates on an interim basis. At the hearing hereinafter noticed, the motion for partial and immediate gas rate relief, Case No. U-4331, will be heard concurrently with the motion for partial and immediate electric rate relief, Case No. U-4332. In its motion, Consumers Power Company has stated that significant increases in the cost of capital, fuel, taxes, wages, equipment, materials and supplies have had a serious adverse impact upon the earnings level of its electric business and that it has not been able to attain the level of earnings in its electric business found to be reasonable in the prior electric rate order of the Michigan Public Service Commission. Consumers Power Company further alleges in its motion that interim rate relief is required to attract on reasonable terms the capital required to serve the increasing needs of its service area.

Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913, and will continue, if necessary, on the succeeding days of the week of October 8 at the same location and at such time as shall be determined by the presiding officer until the matter has been fully heard.

B. The parties who have already intervened in the above-entitled proceedings shall be entitled to participate as parties in the hearing on Consumers Power Company's motions for partial and immediate rate relief. C. The interim rate increases described in this notice have been requested by Consumers Power Company. The Michigan Public Service Commission may either grant or deny the requested increases, or may grant lesser or greater increases than those requested.

Jurisdiction of the Commission in this matter is pursuant to Sections 1, 2, 6, 7 and 8 of Act 106, PA 1909, as amended (MCLA §§ 460.551, 460.552, 460.556-8); Act 300, PA 1909, as amended (MCLA § 462.2 et seq); Sections 3 and 4 of Act 419, PA 1919, as amended (MCLA §§ 460.53, 460.54); and Sections 4, 6 and 6a of Act 3, PA 1939, as amended (MCLA §§ 460.4, 460.6, 460.6a); and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, as amended, No. 54, R 460.11 et seq.

## Report Earnings on Savings to IRS and Social Security

Question: I recently surprised my grandson with a savings account for his birthday. When I went to the bank to open the account, the bank clerk said she needed my grandson's social security number for the bank's records. Why was this necessary?

Answer: The bank reports earned interest over \$10 a year to the Internal Revenue Service by the name and social security number of the account holder. If your grandson does not have a social security number, ask his parents to contact any social security office for information about applying for one.

Question: I am working full time and so is my husband. We have three children under 10. I want to know if our children could get social security payments on my earnings record under the same rules that apply to their father's earnings?

Answer: Yes, they can get payments if either you or your husband becomes eligible for social security payments or if one of you dies after working long enough under social security. In many families, both the mother and the father work and the children are often as dependent on

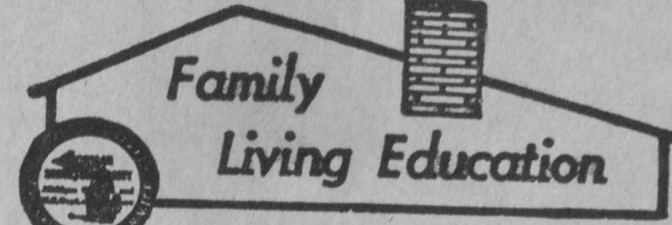
their mother's earnings as on their father's, even if she has not been earning as much as he has. Your children are protected by social security no matter whose earnings are lost—yours or your husband's.

Question: I am 64 and I am getting reduced social security payments. I have been told that I will be enrolled automatically in medicare when I become 65. What should I do if I do not want medical insurance coverage?

Answer: Social security will send you information about both hospital and medical insurance a few months before you are 65. You will also get your medicare health insurance card. If you decide you do not want medical insurance, just fill out the back of the card, sign it and return it to social security before the month you are 65.

Question: I signed up for the doctor's part of medicare twice and canceled my coverage both times. Can I re-enroll for a third time?

Answer: No, if you have canceled your medical insurance more than once, you may not re-enroll under the present law.

We all know about collection bins for recycling bottles and cans and newspapers, but how would you recycle clothing?

It is as simple as making a "new" outfit from a skirt, blouse and sweater you have never worn together before. With the popularity of the layered look and the use of several garment pieces together, clothing consumers have more freedom to wear garments longer and put them together in new combinations.

Recycling used to mean tearing a garment completely apart and re-

constructing it, but many home sewers have neither the time to invest nor the skills needed for a complete make-over. Instead, they are extending the usefulness of garments by wearing them in new ways or making minor changes.

Brads and trims and patch pockets, a crocheted edging for sleeves or collar, a smock top to wear over

an old outfit—all can give old clothes a new look. A few snips of the scissors and a quick hem turns a long-sleeved shirt into a short-sleeved one. And a little dismantling can transform a sweater with worn elbows into a sleeveless vest.

To get recycling ideas, look at the clothing in the stores. See how you can use things you have differently or change them slightly to get more use out of them.

When buying new clothes, plan for multiple-use garments that can be worn in more than one season. Using separates is just one of many techniques you can employ to make seasonal transitions without making large adjustments in your wardrobe. Recycling your clothes can extend the life of your favorite basic garment and save clothing dollars, too.

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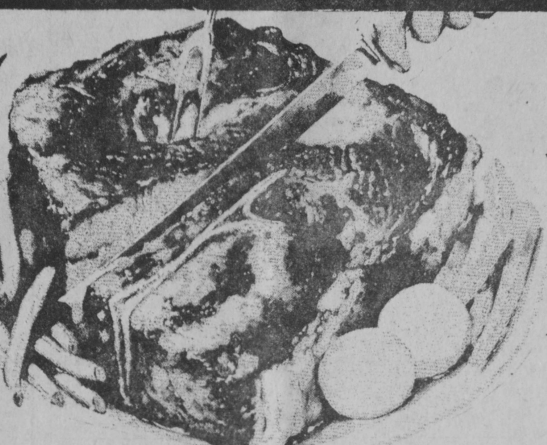

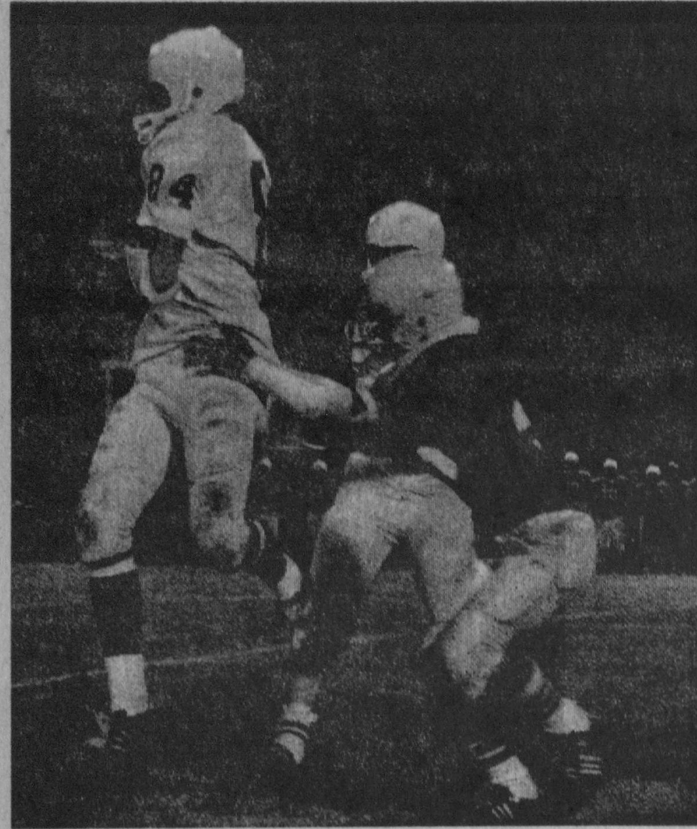

# Testimony Invited on Proposed College Bill

Interested residents of the Iosco-Tawas area and school officials have been invited to testify before the Michigan Senate when a bill concerning community colleges is debated at Lansing in the near future.

This invitation came out of a special senate hearing held last week at Tawas Area School. The invitation was extended by State Sen. Robert Davis of Gaylord.

Details of a bill soon to come before the senate for action were discussed at the hearing. There were 24 persons in attendance, including representatives of Tawas Area School, Oscoda Area School and AuGres-Sims School.

According to information received at the hearing, John Porter, state superintendent of public instruction, has issued a formal statement opposing community college districting contained in Senate Bill 346 which would designate Iosco County as part of the Kirtland Community College District. Porter apparently believes that this county should be assigned to the Delta College District.

Principal objection to the bill long voiced by Tawas Area Board of Education has been the fact that no provision has been made in the proposed legislation to allow voters of a local school district to decide if they desired to belong to any particular community college district.

An amendment being fostered locally is now being proposed to the senate bill which would allow voters of a school district, with boundaries contiguous to two or more com-

munity college districts, to decide which community college district, if any, a local school district would be assigned.

In addition, it was learned that the state board of education was to have held a meeting Friday night concerning the establishment of community college centers outside the boundaries of a community college district. It has been indicated that the state board of education is opposed to establishment of such centers unless the community college district coordinates its efforts through the state board of education and local boards of education, as well as to conduct a feasibility study prior to establishment of such a center.

In July, a member of the state board of education charged that the two-year colleges were "raiding" each other's territories for students in order to qualify for more state aid. Michael J. Deeb, a member of the state board of education, then urged that the state exert its authority over the 29 community colleges in Michigan.

State-wide discussion over the proposed senate bill on community colleges apparently came about through discussions held at regular meetings of Tawas Area Board of Education. Little attention had been given to the proposed legislation until local school people began to protest over a number of provisions. As more and more school authorities began to review the proposal, objections began coming to light and 26 different "problem

areas" have been identified in the state.

Besides making its point about being forced into a community college district without a vote of the people, Tawas Area Board of Education emphasized that the proposed legislation would allow community colleges to levy a two-mill tax without a vote of the people (one mill of taxes can be levied by a community college district at present without a vote) and that the proposed redistricting bill would create four new community college districts in the state, two of which would be in the Upper Peninsula in counties of sparse population and served at present by a college struggling for existence.

Supt. Edward J. Barry, in particular, was taken to task by Kirtland Community College officials and its local friends for making statements concerning finances and operational costs of that community college.

Kirtland has since announced its intentions to establish a freshman college in the Tawas area, but its local center is not operational as yet. Earlier in the summer, the board of education protested that Kirtland was making overtures for a college center here without coordinating its efforts through the board of education.

Barry has contended that a college

center could be located here in which any institution could offer courses, including both two and four-year colleges. He has pointed out that, in the past, both Central Michigan University and Michigan State University have offered off-campus courses here and offerings of community colleges, if it is so desired, could be coordinated in one college center.

Because of community college districting contained in the bill before the Michigan Senate, the idea for a coordinated college center here for both two and four-year colleges may not get off the ground. Reliable sources have indicated that presidents of the state's community colleges have "adopted" the districting as proposed by Senate Bill 346 and may not be interested in crossing established lines.

In the proposed senate bill, Oscoda

School District (including that part of Wilber Township in Tawas Area School District) would become part of Alpena Community College District. The remainder of the county would become a part of Kirtland Community College District.

A portion of Arenac County, including Standish-Sterling Central School District, would go to Delta Community College District, while the major remaining portion would go to Kirtland. Arenac school officials are opposed to such districting and believe that all schools of that county should be included in the Delta College District.

Work has begun on a respite care program for retarded children at Northeast Michigan Retardation Services, Incorporated, in Alpena. The program, entitled "Emergency and Short-Term Care for Retarded Children at Home," is funded by a developmental disabilities grant. The program is designed to relieve parents of the constant care of their retarded child, freeing them for vacations, week-ends away, social and family functions they might otherwise have missed. The service will be especially useful for emergencies such as illness or death in the family.

Four respite care homes with trained personnel will be established and four trained human care workers will be employed to serve Northeast Michigan. Parents can schedule stays at the respite care home or have a care worker come to their home. Charge for services is according to ability to pay.

The newly-hired program coordinator, Gail Currell of Hubbard Lake, is a 1972 graduate of the University of Michigan, Flint extension. Her schedule for the next year will involve meeting deadlines for implementation of the program. She is currently recruiting the necessary paraprofessionals for the job.

## Iosco Has Circuit Court Date With AuGres Farmers

Iosco County Pros. Atty. Ronald Tyler is to appear in Arenac County Circuit Court Friday, September 28, to represent officials of this county in a show cause hearing brought by

a group of private property owners concerning the AuGres River watershed.

The petition of the Arenac County property owners claims that representatives of Iosco County appeared at an August 21 hearing of the augmented drainage board with their minds already made up to oppose construction of an intercounty drain proposed to control flood waters of the AuGres River.

Involvement of this county in an intercounty drain to be located in Arenac County has long been opposed by Iosco County taxpayers.

Arenac County governmental officials, along with private landowners along the AuGres River, have maintained that water from the two upstream counties of the watershed—Iosco and Ogemaw—has been responsible for water which floods farmland along the river in the downstream county.

Officials of the two upstream counties have maintained that Arenac County's flood problem actually is caused by drains in that county.

Thirty-five years ago, Iosco authorities indicated they would not become involved in the project unless it was financed entirely by the federal government. In recent years, Arenac County has been unsuccessful in its attempts to have Iosco and Ogemaw join with it in cosponsoring a project to utilize a federal grant said to be 2.7-million dollars, with the local share to be assessed against benefited property owners.

Iosco and Ogemaw officials have maintained that there would be no benefit to upstream property owners through the proposed project.


