## Supt. Keene of Hale Resigned Monday

Paul Keene, superintendent of Hale Area School for the past three years, announced at Monday night's meeting of the board of education that he was resigning effective at the end of the 1973-74 term on July 1.

Keene told board members: "I really feel that Hale Area School has

reached a point where someone else can come in and take a new look at the total perspective of the district's future."

Coming here three years ago from Port Austin, Keene took over school leadership at Hale at the start of the largest expansion in school history. Voters had approved selling bonds for construction of a new 1.6-million-dollar junior and senior high school. Three months later, he succeeded Paul Sutherland as superintendent and saw construction of the school to final completion and opening in January 1973.

In the meantime, the school's curriculum offering has been improved to a point where it is now considered to be one of the best programs for a school of its size in Northern Michigan.

During his tenure as superintendent, Keene has witnessed a rapid change in state school financing. As local valuation has increased, state aid has been reduced accordingly and the district has assumed the major role in school financing. As a result, it is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain a favorable vote on local tax increases.

Last week, district voters rejected a proposed millage increase for 1974-75 by a large margin. Keene emphasized, however, that the outcome of that vote had no bearing on his decision to resign, as he had "made up his mind" 1 1/2 months ago.

Keene said he had not made any plans as yet for the future.

## Millage Again Going Before Hale Voters

Hale Area Board of Education is to resubmit its millage proposal for 1974-1975 operation to district voters following defeat at the polls on April 2 of a proposition asking for 12.5 mills renewal and 2.5 mills additional for two years.

The proposal is to be included in the annual election in June.

The final tally in the millage election was 536 "no" and 321 "yes." Disappointment over the defeat was expressed by Supt. Paul Keene and members of the board of education, who said that financial problems for the district remain unsolved and they will try again in June.

"What it means is that contract negotiations with three different unions have now stopped—we cannot negotiate operating money which we do not have and schools are required by law to submit a balanced budget to the state," said Keene.

He said that a big concern now is if the school can make its "big push" next year in the elementary grade curriculum through hiring of a diagnostician and support teacher. "We just cannot plan our program at this point for 1974-75," said Keene.

The school needed the millage to prevent further state aid losses, to hire four new teachers and purchase new buses, as well as to meet increasing costs of gasoline and fuel oil.

Because of the district's high valuation behind each child, state aid contributes only about eight percent (\$41,000) to the school's annual budget of \$920,000.

Keene believes that senior citizens of the district generally favored the defeated proposal. While a large number of parents did not vote in the election, he believed that persons in the 25 to 50-year age group who are raising families furnished most of the opposition.

## TA School Budget Higher, but May Ask Only One More Mill

Despite an anticipated budget expenditure increase of \$188,907 next year, Supt. Edward J. Barry told board of education members Monday night he believes that only one mill of additional voted taxes would be required to balance school financing for 1974-75.

Through a new provision in the state aid act benefiting those districts which levy less than 23 mills for school operation, the state would reimburse this district for its one mill of voted debt retirement. Districts levying a full 25 mills for operation are benefited to a far greater extent in state aid membership return than this district.

In June, it is expected that school voters will be asked to approve an additional two mills for operation, but one mill would not be levied. If this is the case, it would be the lowest increase asked by the school in years.

The general fund budget adopted Monday night by the board of education is based on an income of \$1,840,370 and an expenditure of \$1,869,734. The difference between the two figures would be made up by the one additional voted mill, the one mill provided by the state and accounts receivable from uncollected taxes.

Barry told members that the final budget could be lower than the one submitted Monday night. Much depends on bargaining with the staff, which is now under way. In addition, the school has been forced to use a great deal of flexibility in its budget due to pending state legislation.

A bill passed by the senate and presently before the house of representatives would make it mandatory for all schools to pay up to five percent of gross earnings for teacher retirement. Another bill in the legislature would require schools to pay unemployment compensation for teachers. According to latest information, participation in teacher retirement for the first year would be optional for each local district and subject to bargaining.

If the allocation board again designates 9.7 mills for schools, Tawas Area would ask voters to approve renewal of nine mills which expire this year and add one additional mill for school operation. The one mill from the state would be added to this total.

This would bring the district's millage to 21.7. Total revenue from the state would be \$480,607, local taxes would bring \$1,373,456 and \$18,000 would be received in federal money for a total of \$1,872,063.

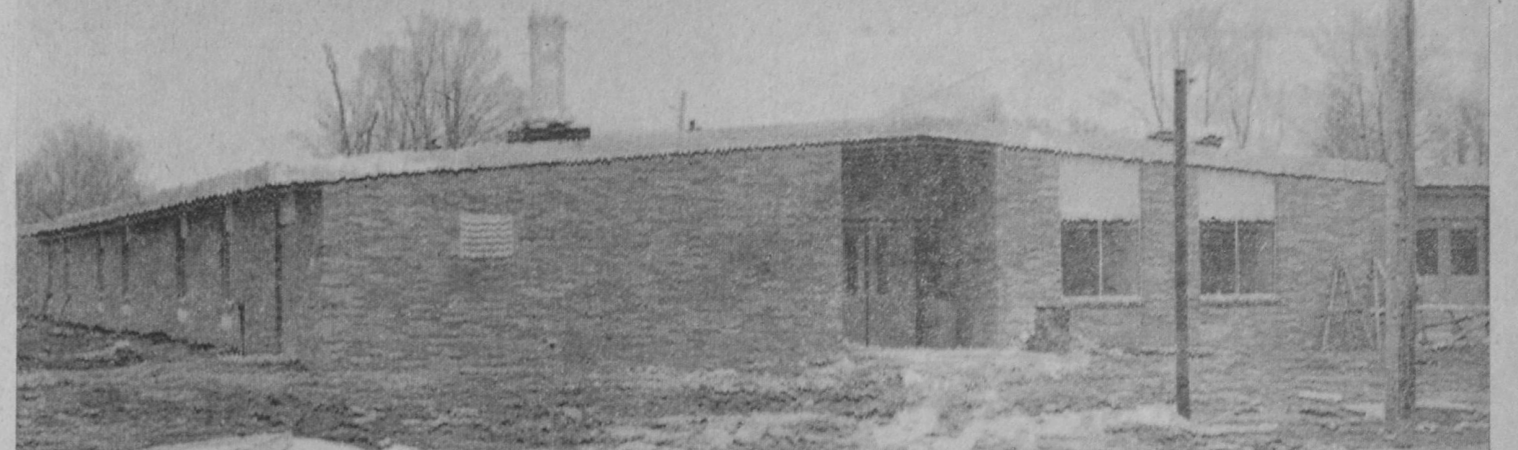
Because of the district's high valuation behind each child, state aid in 1974-75 is again being cut. During the current term, the school receives \$384,232.25, as compared to state aid membership of \$316,422 in 1974-75. Transportation money, however, is being increased by the state from \$62,783.85 during the current year to \$83,427 in 1974-75. Vocational education money is to be increased by \$11,000 from the state.

Whether the school's bright financial picture as painted Monday night extends through May remains to be seen. Schools and the county

are to submit operational budgets to the county allocation board by April 15 and, judging from the record budget recently discussed for county operation, the 15 mills split between schools and the county would not be enough to meet all expenses.

Last year, the allocation board gave schools a slightly larger slice of the millage under its control—an increase of seven-tenths of one mill to 9.7. In the case of Tawas Area School District, it meant that it received an additional \$36,000 in operational funds.

The allocation board last May took note of the fact that the county's general fund had ended the year with a substantial balance. The county general fund balance at the end of 1973 was again substantial, but the preliminary budget for county operation to be adopted this month is expected to reach \$1,344,130, as compared to the current year's operational cost of \$1,046,000. There would be no year-end balance with that county operational expense.



## W-P Students Now in New Addition

The move of seventh and eighth grade students into Whittemore-Prescott Area's new middle school was accomplished smoothly last week.

Seventh graders were moved into the new 25,000-square-foot addition to the high school building from Sherman Elementary School, while eighth grade classes in temporary facilities at the high school moved into permanent classrooms.

Almost 200 students were involved in the move, according to Supt. Ray

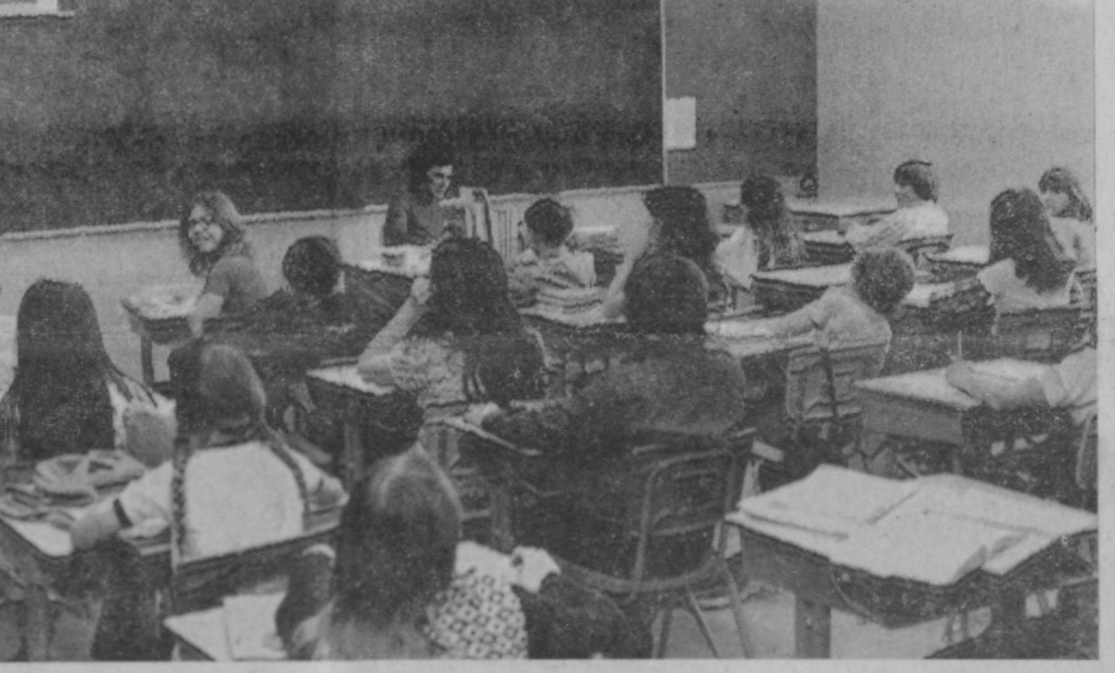
Kesler. The number included 75 eighth graders already at the high school building.

Because of a sudden spurt in elementary enrollments this year, sixth graders were not moved and it may be impractical to move them to the new addition this year.

Growth of the school district had exceeded projected enrollment figures when the addition was designed and Kesler said there is no way to accurately predict how many people will move into a school district.

## TA School's First Tenure Hearing Scheduled April 29

The first tenure hearing in Tawas Area School history is to be held Monday, April 29, 7:30 p. m., at the school administration office on Newman Street, East Tawas.

Two weeks ago, Mrs. Dorothy Libka, veteran first grade teacher at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, was notified by the board of education that she was being released from her tenure contract on the completion of the current school year.

Under state law, a tenure teacher has the right to ask for a hearing—private or public—before the board

of education. Mrs. Libka's letter read Monday night requested a public hearing and she indicated she would be represented by legal counsel.

The board of education deferred action on setting a date for a private hearing requested by Donald Barnes, a probationary teacher, who was denied tenure two weeks ago by the board of education. Barnes currently serves as vocal music teacher in the elementary grades.

It had been hoped that both hearings could be held on the same date, but Mrs. Barbara Cuthbertson, an elementary principal, would be unable to present on that date.

Under the tenure act, teachers released have the right to invite per-

sons to testify in their behalf and the board of education has subpoena powers to call witnesses.

Following the hearing, the board of education has five days to announce its decision. This is the first step in a lengthy legal process which, if carried to the fullest extent, can reach the state tenure commission.

In other business, Earl B. Davis, board of education secretary, announced that Monday, May 13, 5:00 p. m., is the last day on which district residents can register with respective city and township clerks to be eligible to vote in the annual school election on Monday, June 10.

The one four-year vacancy to be filled is currently held by Robert W. Elliott. Although Elliott was not present at the meeting, fellow board members indicated that he had unofficially mentioned that he planned to retire at the end of his term. Prospective candidates have until May 13 to file nominating petitions with the board secretary, which may be obtained from the school office.

It was announced that 78 kindergarten pupils had been enrolled thus far for next fall. This is a reduction of about 20 from the current year's kindergarten enrollment, but it is expected that more children would be enrolled during a kindergarten roundup on May 3 and during the summer months.

Gene Gerber, community education director, announced that eight schools of Northeastern Michigan planned to hold "Olympic" games this summer at Ogemaw Heights High School. In the past, those schools had sent athletic representatives to the Mid-Michigan Olympics at Alma. The change is being made to conserve gasoline.

It was announced that the North-Huron Association of School Boards would hold its spring meeting April 15 at Mio-AuSable School. The program will include discussions on

## Engineers Schedule Harbor Hearing

Hopeful that reconstruction and expansion of Tawas Harbor facilities at East Tawas will still meet a 1977 completion date, as originally planned, the Detroit office of the Army Corps of Engineers announced that a public hearing will be held Wednesday, April 24, 7:00 p. m., at the East Tawas Community Building.

In an effort to lay groundwork for that meeting and to get a cross section of public opinion for later presentation, Ralph White, harbor chairman, announces that a preliminary public meeting is to be held Monday, April 15, at the East Tawas City Hall.

It is hoped that anyone with questions or suggestions concerning the proposal will attend the April 15 meeting in order to expedite matters when they come before army engineers.

Long in the preliminary planning stage and halted once when \$40,000 in federally earmarked planning money was impounded, the project now has been allocated \$60,000 by the federal government to commence the plans.

Fargo Engineering of Jackson has been retained by the Army Corps of Engineers as its official representative in the negotiation and planning with the state and local community.

A representative of Fargo said Friday that events seemed to be moving along swiftly, after original plans were discussed about four years ago, and design for the structure may be started even before the formal study is completed.

Larry Everett of Fargo said that his firm had been contracted by the federal government to accomplish Phase One of the project by developing a general design memorandum and environmental statement for the recreational and navigational project.

The program calls for construction of 1,750 feet of breakwater by the federal government at the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. As its portion of the project, the waterways commission, a division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, would develop the pier as a harbor of refuge for small craft mooring facilities.

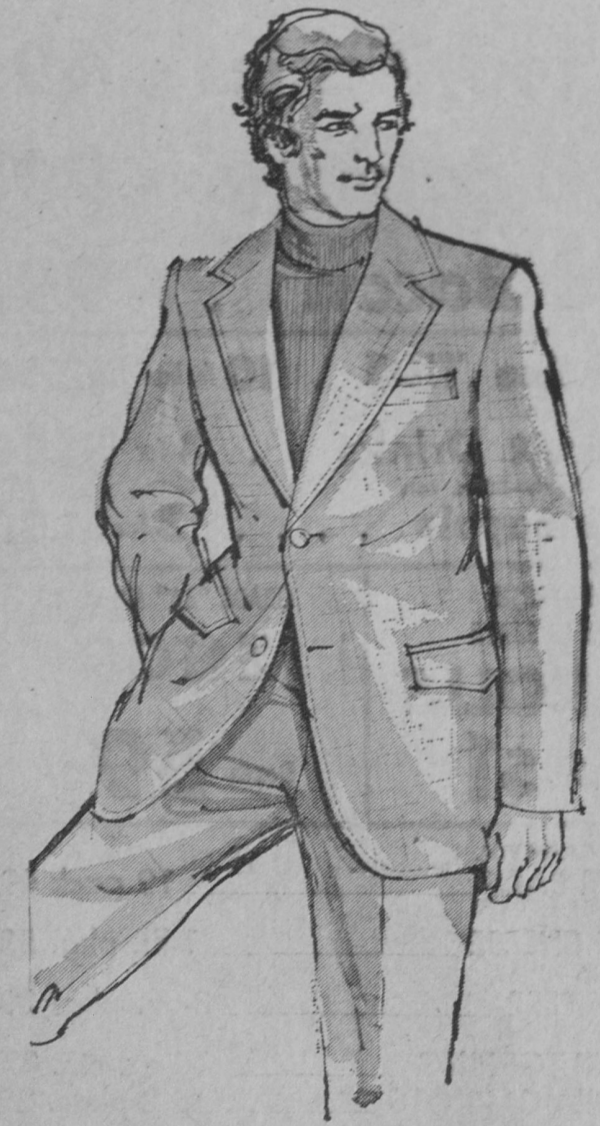

**Old Divider Being Taken Off M-13**

A raised highway median between Pinconning and the Arenac County line—once one of the most dangerous stretches of highway in the state when it was called US-23, now M-13—is being removed by the Bay County Road Commission.

The work is part of a project calling for eventual removal of the entire divider between Standish and Linwood.

Originally a two-lane highway, the state added a third "passing" lane in the 1930s. That experiment proved fatal for many motorists as some drivers overlooked the fact that the center lane was intended for passing in both directions and head-on collisions were the result.

When an additional lane was added to the highway in the 1940s, a raised divider was constructed down the center with the expectation that head-on collisions would be reduced. Engineers were right in their assumption, but rear-enders, sideswipes and other types of collisions increased.

Automobiles hitting the divider lane often bounced back into traffic heading in the same direction and, when the height of the median was reduced through resurfacing, cars striking the median often bounced over into oncoming traffic and many fatalities resulted.

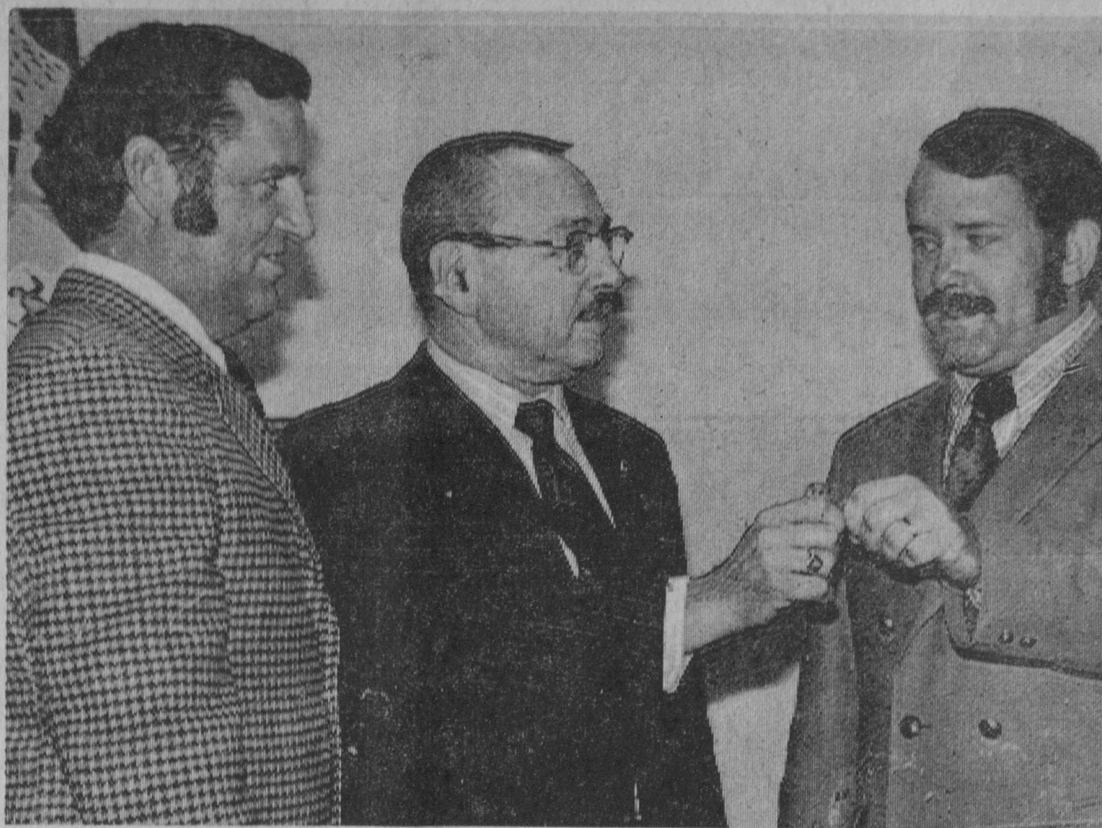
Drivers using this stretch of M-13 will be happy to see the median removed, as will road commission employees. Snow removal is made difficult because of the raised strip of concrete.

**Tax Collections Show Decrease**

Tax collections show a \$38,555.23 drop from the previous year, according to a report Monday from County Treas. Edward Nelkie. Treasurers in the county's 14 units collected \$3,542,290.84 and returned \$587,046.04 as delinquent on settlement day with the county treasurer.

Nelkie said this represented an 85.73 percent collection, which compares to 85.8 percent the previous year. Two years ago, the county had a collection of 87.8 percent.

Of the amount returned delinquent, \$350,911.78, or 59.74 percent of the total, is in school taxes. This includes \$121,246.18 for Tawas Area School, \$134,226.83 for Oscoda Area School, \$78,104.22 for Hale Area School and \$17,334.55 for Whittemore-Preccott Area School.

Alabaster Township had the best collection record with a return of

97.21 percent on a total tax levy of \$191,755.20. The unit has 4.30 percent of the total tax levy in the county.

The poorest showing came in Oscoda Township, which had a return of 80.81 percent of a total tax levy of \$1,166,814.45, or 23.20 percent of the county total. Nelkie noted that a large amount of delinquent taxes in that unit came in the Lakewood Shores development.

Sherman Township, which, like Alabaster Township, has large holdings in gypsum company real estate and facilities, had the second highest collection in the county with 94.05 percent of its total levy of \$116,056.74, representing 2.83 percent of the county total. The only other unit coming within 10 percent of a total collection was Baldwin Township, which had a percentage of 90.03 on a

total levy of \$331,021.42, or 8.04 percent of the county total.

Collections in other units were as follows: Burleigh Township, 89.32 percent collection on a total tax levy of \$84,119.07, or 2.01 percent of the county total; Reno Township, 88.63 percent collection on a total tax levy of \$80,389.21, or 1.89 percent of the county total; Tawas City, 88.59 percent collection on tax levy of \$345,042.86, 8.30 percent of the county total; Plainfield Township, a tax collection of 87.17 percent on total levy of \$721,706.39, representing 17.40 percent of the county total;

Grant Township, 87.11 percent collection on a levy of \$258,997.96, representing 6.21 percent of county total; Tawas Township, 86.23 percent collection on a levy of \$122,783.67, or 2.92 percent of county total; Wilber Township, 84.76 percent collection on total tax levy of \$83,346, representing 2.75 percent of county total;

Whittemore collected 84.23 percent of total tax levy of \$42,942.87, or one percent of county total; East Tawas, 83.22 percent collection on total tax levy of \$302,844.77, representing 7.30 percent of county total; AuSable, 82.71 percent of its taxes were collected on a total levy of \$281,516.27, or 6.85 percent of the county's total tax levy.

Nelkie reported that the various treasurers collected \$3,280 in dog licenses.

**Jail Has Problem With Food Cost**

Josco Sheriff's Department is having the same problem as that confronting today's homemaker—balancing the food budget in these days of soaring inflation.

Adding to the jail's increasing food bill, however, is the fact that the first three months of 1974 saw 43 more lodgings than during the same period last year. Those 43 additional persons arrested consumed a total of 1,039 more meals than were served during the first three months of 1973.

Basil Odell, undersheriff, said Monday that the jail's larder had benefited from venison received from the state through highway deer kills. Usable meat from the highway

deer kills has been ground into hamburger to supplement jail menus.

"This supply is fast dwindling due to the fact that more and more motorists are filling out the prescribed state forms to claim deer which are killed in highway collisions," said Odell.

Sheriff George Westcott said that, in the past, the jail had purchased large supplies of day-old bread and outdated coffee and stocked freezers for use when needed. In recent weeks, however, the county has not benefited greatly from the purchase of the outdated foodstuffs due to a reduction in the discount.

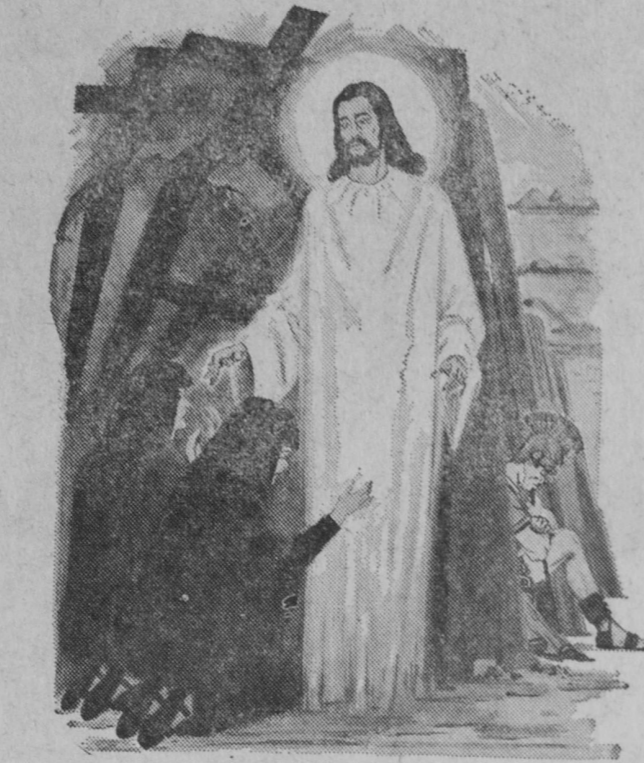

## Recreation Project Now Under Study

A three-man committee was appointed April 2 by Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas to work with the East Tawas Lions Club and city park commission to develop possible locations for a proposed recreational area.

Members of the council named to the committee were George Staudacher, Ralph Western and Jacob Montgomery.

Although city officials still hold

hope of obtaining the Newman Street athletic field from Tawas Area Board of Education for recreational development, consideration is being given to development of a portion of the 60-acre waste water treatment facility for recreational use.

It is expected that some answer will be reached this week between city officials concerning the development.

In the meantime, Mayor Bolen asked the department of public works to make repairs to the fence and tennis court backstop at the Newman Street field.

In other business, Joseph and Timothy O'Connor, owners of the Pendleton Shop, were given permission to remove two parking spaces in front of their Newman Street store and to develop the sidewalk and former parking spaces according to plans submitted to the council.

This project had been submitted to the council at its last meeting and no action was taken until plans were made known to residents. No objections were registered to the city and favorable action was given by the council.

The proposal calls for constructing a curbed area the width of two parking spaces into Newman Street and constructing a new sidewalk in front of the store. Allowance would be made to plant a tree and locate a flower box in the curbed area as a means of beautifying the street.

In presenting their original proposal, the O'Connors felt this was the first step toward eventually establishing a shopping mall on Newman Street as part of the city's master plan.

Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works, gave a preliminary report on plans for constructing a mortuary building at Greenwood Cemetery. A tool shed would be included in the plans.

Mayor Bolen instructed the cemetery committee to study the possibility of constructing a chapel in conjunction with the mortuary building. Plans and an estimated cost are to

be presented to the council at a future meeting.

The council approved the following new rates for grave openings: A charge of \$80 would be made during weekdays and \$120 for week-ends and holidays. The latter charge would cover the additional cost of overtime pay for the city crew. Cost of burial sites was set at \$100 for residents and \$150 for non-residents.

A federal Environmental Protection Grant totaling \$52,600 received by the city has been earmarked for sewer improvement and has been invested. The grant is part of a reimbursement allocation to cities which had been promised, but never received, federal assistance for sewer construction.

Aldermen Robert Johnson, Staudacher and Montgomery were named as a budget and finance committee for 1974-75.

Two proposals were received from Scott Engineering, Alpena, for preparing an aerial topographical map of the 60-acre waste water treatment site. One proposal would cost \$1,050 and a second would cost \$900. The budget and finance committee is to make a recommendation on final selection and approval.

The police department's annual report for 1973 was submitted by Police Chief Donald Docking. Investigation is to be made into several complaints concerning persons using a .22 caliber rifle to shoot out street lights at the cemetery.

Following action of the board of election canvassers earlier in the evening, officers elected in the April 1 city election received the oath of office prior to the opening of the meeting. Among those seated was Gerald Klenow, who is the new First Ward alderman.

## Valeron Corp. Had Record Sales; Looks to New Expansion

The Valeron Corporation, which has a manufacturing facility in the Baldwin Township industrial park of Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation, expects its world-wide sales of cutting tools, gaging devices and related products this year to top \$85,000,000. The firm is considering the construction of five new manufacturing plants or facilities in the United States and four other countries.

The firm, based at Oak Park, enjoyed record sales of \$59,519,000 in 1973, but has been expanding rapidly and last year sank nearly \$4,000,000 into new plants and equipment.

According to Leo J. Lapwing, president and chairman of the board, Valeron will acquire land this year for new cutting tool plants in South Africa and Spain and, within the next 12-24 months, may also launch new manufacturing projects in Mexico and Japan.

Valeron, which is a major producer of tools made of tungsten and steel, also has launched a development program in ceramics and expects to have a ceramic tool-making plant before too long. Lapwing indicated that this will be a domestic facility.

Valeron, whose sales have risen steadily in the last three years from \$35.2-million dollars in 1971 to \$43.3-million in 1972 and a record high of \$59.5-million dollars last year, produced titanium-carbide-coated cutting tools in addition to steel and sintered tungsten carbide tooling.

Besides the plant here, the firm has manufacturing facilities at Oak Park, Madison Heights, Royal Oak, Troy and Walled Lake. These include plants for producing special and standard cutting tools, investment castings for use in its own tooling systems, as well as gaging devices and adaptive control systems for machine tools.

Locally, the Valcraft Division of Valeron Corporation employs 35 people at its Baldwin Township plant in the manufacture of high speed cutting tools. A company spokesman at the plant said that expansion of local facilities was not being planned for the present.

Two other divisions of Valeron Corporation have plants in area counties. The Valente Metals Division has a plant at West Branch and the Valcast Division has a plant at Clare.

### Supplemental Income Should be Investigated

Question: My sister, who has four children, has very little income. Her 10-year-old son is mentally-retarded. Can she get a monthly supplemental security income payment for her son?

Answer: It depends on how severe the child's condition is and what the family income and resources are. Your sister should contact any social security office to get complete details.

Question: I know I will need a social security number when I go to work full time, but what about now? I am 16 and still in school, but I can get a part-time job stocking shelves in a grocery store. Will I need a social security card?

Answer: Yes, you will need to give your social security number to your employer so he can report your earnings to build your social security protection. If a young worker, like yourself, becomes disabled, it is possible for him to qualify for social security disability benefits with as little as 1½ years of work. It does not matter whether you work full-time or a part-time job, as long as you are paid \$50 or more a calendar quarter.

You can apply for your number at any social security office and you should allow a few weeks for your card to be sent to you.

Question: I will be 65 in September and, although I am going to continue working, I want to enroll in medicare. When should I sign up and what information will I need?

Answer: Your initial enrollment period is seven months, from June 1 through December. If you want full medicare coverage, hospital and medical insurance, to begin as soon as you are 65, you should sign up in June or July. All you will need are your social security card and your birth certificate.

### Family Living Education

As a home sewer, did you ever think of yourself as a clothing manufacturer? It is just as important to know how to care for a dress you have handcrafted as well as a dress you bought.

From now on when you buy a fabric, it will be accompanied by some form of information which must disclose how to wash, iron, dry, bleach and/or dry-clean that particular fabric.

Permanent care labeling is a trade regulation rule of the Federal Trade Commission. It is enforceable only on fabrics manufactured on or after July 3, 1972. So by now home sewers should be aware of this benefit because more information on fabric care is available.

It is a waste of time and money and a disappointment to sew something only to find that the first time it is cleaned (whatever the method you use), there is a change in the appearance and size of the fabric and garment.

Permanent care labeling was instituted by the federal government for the individual's benefit. It is up to you to follow through.

Have you already noticed that knit prices are up, for both ready-mades and yard goods? Availability of fibers is the key problem and world-wide demand is increasing yarn prices. Recent Knitted Textile Association annual convention predicted an industry-wide round of price hikes in all knitted fabrics.

Shortages of nylon and acetate (staple fibers for tricots knits in lingerie, loungewear and sleepwear) are causing price rises from yarn through the finished product.

Consumers may notice some changes in weight, texture and even shape-retention of knit fabrics and clothes. For example, producers may start making a finer denier (size) yarn in order to get more

yield from a pound of fiber. Result: Fabric and garment performance could be affected.

We all need to "sharpen up" as buyers and I suggest that we may learn to make do with garments we already own.

Some of us remember the old saying about being thrifty: "Eat it up, wear it out, make it do or go with out."
