ET Zoning Board of Appeals Allows Residential Variances

East Tawas' zoning board of appeals last week approved two variances in the city's zoning ordinance by allowing non-conforming use of two residential dwellings for commercial purposes.

Dr. C. Hartley Collins was allowed to use a residence owned by Thomas Quattlebaum as an office and Kenneth Verlac was permitted to use the former residence of Mr. and Mrs. George F. Gifford as a real estate office.

Collins' application received unanimous approval of the six-man board and Verlac's application was ap-

proved by a four to two vote.

The city's planning commission had opposed the ordinance variances.

Both applications had been submitted to the zoning boards of appeals following action in March by the city council which denied the non-conforming use.

Verlac's office had been established in the residential dwelling prior to filing an official application for the non-conforming use, although the owner stated that he had received verbal permission from a city official for use of the property,

The planning commission had indicated that Verlac's property, along with other frontage along Tawas Bay from the city park west, is designated for recreational use in the city's long-range master plan.

A planning commission spokesman said that the matter probably would be discussed at Thursday night's monthly meeting.

Serving on the zoning board of appeals are Leonard Sarki, John Henry, Dr. Norman Payea, George Staudacher, William Look Jr. and Gerald Klenow.

May Circulate Petitions to Stop Spring Street Sewer

Two residents of the Spring Street area, who told Tawas City councilmen Monday night that they planned to petition their neighbors in an effort to stop a proposed sanitary sewer in that area, were cautioned that such action could have an adverse effect on the future growth of the community.

This sewer project, included in three special assessment districts soon to go before the municipal finance commission for bond approval, received very little notice or objection from property owners during public hearings held for that purpose last December.

Since then, however, the city council has come under extreme criticism for the past several meetings from one or two property owners, who believe that the \$19 per foot assessment is excessively high or that engineering is faulty. One property owner, who had petitioned previously for sewer service, blamed past city councils for not constructing sewer service to that area years ago and maintains that the city at large should pay the entire cost.

Although the decision to proceed

with the project legally rests in the hands of the council, regardless of petitions, two protesting property owners were cautioned by Mayor John N. Brugger to "be real sure of what you are doing, as if you stop it, it will probably be forever."

It was pointed out that vacant lots in that area could not be developed without sewer service as the public health department has denied the use of septic tanks due to the ground water problem. In addition, some septic tanks in use have faulty drainage fields and several instances have been found where septic tank systems are draining into ditches.

It was stated that one business place which petitioned for the sanitary sewer, Barkman Lumber Company, has been ordered by the public health department to meet the requirement for toilet facilities.

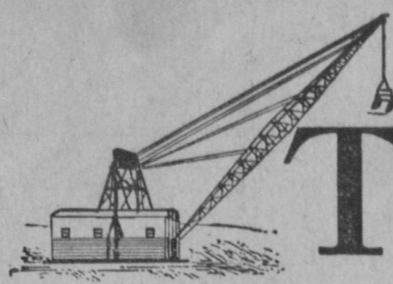
The mayor pointed out that there was a provision in the city's special assessment ordinance to handle hardship cases, where elderly persons cannot afford the assessment. In such cases, the assessment can be carried by the city as a lien on the

property and collected at some future date when the property is sold.

Because of the \$20,000 cost for a river crossing to serve that area, which is to be paid by the city at large, Mayor Brugger said the city council could "walk out on the project at this point and be money ahead" as it would take 20 years of sewer revenue to collect the city's portion of the total cost. He pointed out, however, that the sanitary sewer would be a valuable asset to all property owners, now and in the future.

The council must soon make a decision on the two-block area of Spring Street from River Street to Bird Street in order to present the final assessment roll to its bonding attorney so that resolutions and applications may be made to the municipal finance commission.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the project's timetable was four weeks behind, due to the expansion in December of District No. 3 to include Margo Street. He felt that it was unfortunate that protests now being heard were not registered during the public hearings.

Seek EDA Pre-Application Conference

Ruppe Hears Presentation on Combined Water Effort

Cong. Philip Ruppe assured local officials Saturday that he would do everything possible to arrange a pre-application meeting with Economic Development Administration officials concerning federal assistance for an area water project.

He pointed out, however, that such a conference with EDA is not undertaken because of congressional will and that engineers representing the communities must be prepared to answer all questions concerning the project.

The congressman said he would check with the regional office of

EDA to determine why the project had not been given a pre-application conference months ago and would try to determine if any problems exist with the present application when he returns Wednesday to Washington, D. C.

Need for the project, being sought jointly by Baldwin Township, East Tawas and Tawas City, was stressed by James Campbell, president of Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation.

Campbell told a group of nearly 50 local officials and businessmen attending a luncheon at Lixey's Restaurant that four new industries had been located at the IDC's industrial park in Baldwin Township. He said that 350 jobs had been provided by those industries and that a fifth firm was now negotiating for a new plant there.

Besides the luncheon Saturday noon, Ruppe held office hours that afternoon at the county building to meet with local residents with problems concerning the federal government. He was guest of honor Saturday night at a banquet held at the AuSable Inn, Oscoda, sponsored by the Iosco County Republican Committee.

EPA Sewer Grant Goes to East Tawas

An Environmental Protection Agency grant totaling \$52,600 for the City of East Tawas has been released for that community's sewer system, Cong. Philip Ruppe announced Friday, March 29.

The grant is part of a 1.9-billion-dollar reimbursement allocation recently received by EPA. The money is for sewer systems already constructed and built with the promise of federal assistance.

"I would like to emphasize," Ruppe said of the grant, "that these reimbursement funds are not for additional construction. This money will repay the local communities for the money promised by the federal government when the project was started."

Ruppe noted that East Tawas has now received a total of \$210,464 in EPA grants for its sewer system.

EDA Eligibility Would Require Area Commitment on Secondary Treatment

During his briefing of councilmen Monday night concerning Saturday's meeting with Cong. Philip Ruppe and other federal officials, Mayor John N. Brugger emphasized that before local units of government would become eligible for Economic Development Administration funds to expand and improve water facilities, the units would be required to make provisions for secondary sewage treatment.

Although the matter of secondary sewage treatment was touched on only briefly Saturday, the mayor said that the city's engineering consultants and federal officials had stressed that in order to secure EDA funds, secondary sewage treatment must also be provided.

Construction of expensive secondary treatment facilities probably will receive no federal fundings, but the mayor said that the units involved—Tawas City, East Tawas and

Baldwin Township—had reached a point where "we must obligate ourselves to secondary sewage treatment and to accept our commitment to enter the program."

At the present time, engineering consultants for the above three units, along with Tawas Township, are studying the feasibility of constructing one secondary sewage treatment plant to serve the entire area.

The mayor said that some criticism could be expected to be heard because some areas outside of the two cities may be benefited by past construction projects. He said, however, that meetings between officials of the participating governmental units had been congenial and "we have excellent relations with the communities around us."

He said the entire area must overcome any criticism of what some may believe have been mistakes in past judgment in order to insure

the continued residential, commercial and industrial growth of the area.

Brugger pointed out that the water plan being considered was one of necessity. "We do want and need the industrial park in Baldwin Township; without water and sewer development, the IDC will be choked."

He said that officials of the cooperating units were attempting to obtain 80 percent funding of the water project through EDA funds and that all areas of the application were being covered to determine if the project would receive the necessary points for funding and if sufficient federal funds would be available.

"The area cannot have one commitment for water without one for sewer. This present program is headed in the right direction to insure continued growth of all of the communities," said the mayor.

Annual Spring Election Had Few Voters

April 1 held no surprises in the annual city election at East Tawas, but one write-in candidate made a good showing in the only race for one of three alderman posts to be filled.

There were only 153 votes cast in the election, which included one spoiled ballot.

Mayor Robert Bolen received 149 votes and was re-elected, while Clerk Clyde Soper and Mrs. Grace Pelton, treasurer, each received 150 votes.

In the only race of the election, Gerald Klenow received 52 votes to 16 write-in votes for Robert Toska for the First Ward council seat being vacated by the retirement of Richard Moss.

Robert B. Johnson was re-elected with 44 votes for the Second Ward council seat and Ralph Western won in the Third Ward with 28 votes.

Monday night's scheduled meeting of the city council was postponed until Tuesday night (last night) because of the use of city hall facilities by the election board.

Complaints Investigated by Sheriff's Dept.

Complaints last week by Iosco Sheriff's Department included one for larceny by trick, an attempted larceny of fuel oil and theft of some copper wire.

Vernon Beaubien, Tawas City service station owner, told officers that his son, Russell, had been tricked out of \$10 when making change for two customers. The customers purchased a bag of potato chips and, after a lengthy process of making change, the station attendant was out \$10.

Thomas Schrage, 704 Victoria, Hale, reported Friday that he had surprised a prowler who was trying to steal fuel oil from a tank outside his home.

William Gibbs, 609 Beech Street, Tawas City, reported Friday that 150 pounds of copper wire was missing from his garage.

Proposes Riverfront Purchase at Bridge

William Borosch, Tawas City realtor, Monday night proposed to the city council that it purchase a parcel of property on the northeast bank of the Tawas River near the US-23 bridge for park and fishing purposes.

The property, formerly owned by the late Harry Morley, has about 200 feet of river frontage. Borosch was of the opinion that the property was about the last available with river frontage. He said that the sale price was \$13,900.

The city is to take the offer into consideration and is to make a decision following a study of the plot.

In other business, a delegation of area residents interested in seeing the city improve present tennis facilities and to construct new courts was informed that Tawas City had applied for \$10,000 in funds being distributed by the county parks and recreation commission to aid in such projects. The county commission has allocated \$50,000 in revenue sharing funds for this purpose which is to be available at the end of June.

It was stated that the city should know within a week or two if its proposals had been approved by the county. The city park board last fall

announced its intention to construct new tennis facilities here in 1974.

Spokesmen for the delegation suggested that the net posts at the present tennis court in the city park be changed so the court faces east and west, rather than north and south. It was felt this change would eliminate sun glare from the water and provide a suitable serving area.

No decision has been made as yet concerning future use of the tennis court in the city park due to the lake shore erosion problem. Consideration is presently being given to construction of new courts on city property north of the athletic field on First Avenue. It is felt that adequate parking would be provided there and that courts would be centrally located.

Besides the Tawas, adjoining townships were represented in the discussion.

The council adopted renewal of a contract with Villean-Leman, Associates, Southfield, for planning service during 1974. Representatives of the firm met with the city planning commission six times during the year to update zoning ordinances. Cost of the service is \$1,896.

The council adopted a resolution

requested by the state health department which prohibits construction of future basement sewer drains in any construction on Beech Street north from Cedar Street. The state requested this action because of the shallow depth of sewer in that area.

A letter from the city attorney indicated that a marketable title could be obtained from Farmers Home Administration for purchase of the former Hatton property on Mathews Street and along Tawas River. Authority to purchase the property for recreational purposes at a cost of \$6,000 had been given by the council at its last meeting. City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz recommended that the property be purchased with revolving fund money.

A certificate of occupancy was issued to Russell Pierce to locate his Shoreline Realty office in the former location of Driftwood Steak House on Lake Street.

Preliminary discussion on the city's 1974-75 budget is to start at the April 15 meeting. Four special meetings were required last year to develop an annual city budget and it is expected that about the same number of meetings would be required this year.

Funeral Held for James Birkenbach

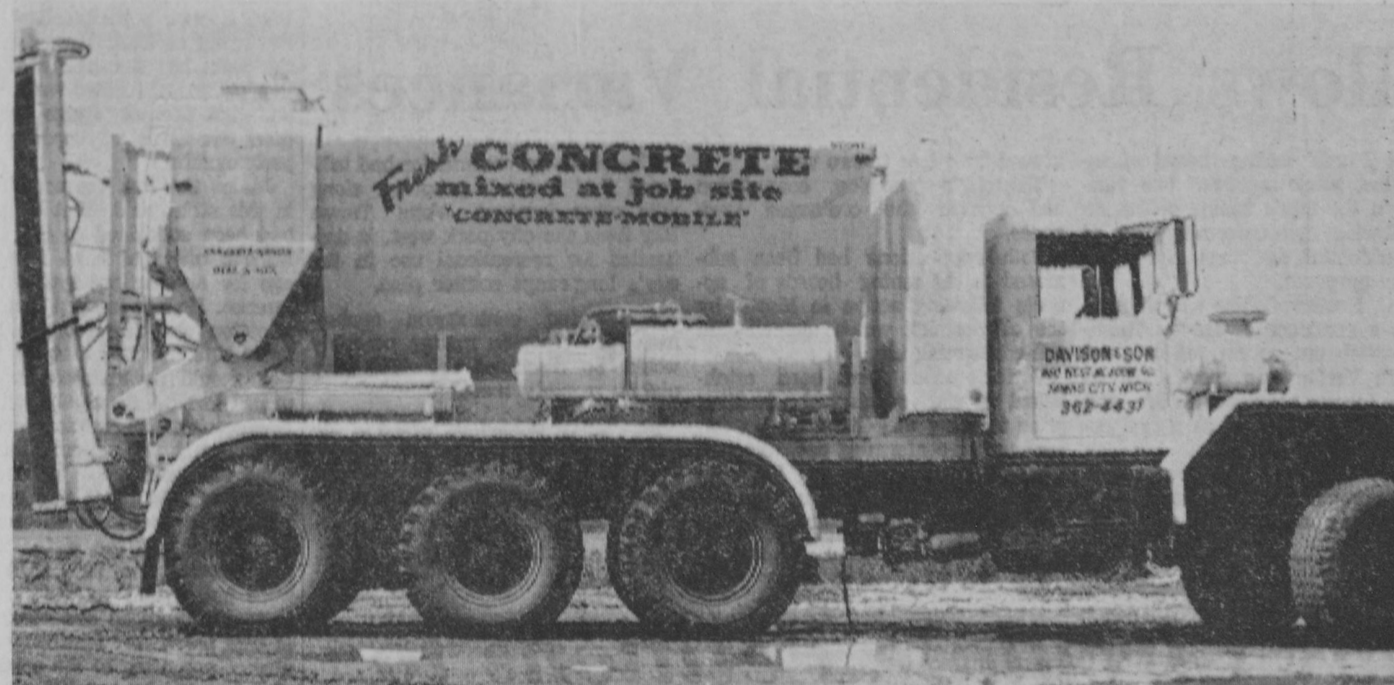

Tawas Lake Included in DNR Planting of Canada Geese

Iosco Sportsmen's Club, Tawas Chamber of Commerce and interested citizens of the Tawas area are cooperating with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources in introducing nesting giant Canada geese in Iosco County. Fifteen pairs of nesting Canada geese will be released at Tawas Lake Thursday, April 4.

These majestic birds should find Tawas Lake an acceptable place to nest and raise their young. The undisturbed character of much of the lake's shoreline should provide the necessary seclusion needed by nesting birds. Nesting success during the first year may not be too good because of the stress the birds undergo from being handled and trans-

ported. However, some of the pairs should be successful in raising broods of goslings.

Those people who fish or boat on Tawas Lake this summer can help make this cooperative project a success by not disturbing or harassing the geese or their young.

The game will migrate next fall and should return to Tawas Lake during the spring of 1975 to again nest and raise their young. With patience and public cooperation, a thriving free-flying flock of wild Canada geese can be established and will grow and thrive in the Tawas area. It can be an added natural resource of which the entire community will be proud.

Return to Horses No Way to Solve An Energy Crisis

American farmers in 1974 are being asked to plant an additional 10-million acres in crops and, at the same time, are being urged to cut back fuel consumption.

Some people feel this could be done if farmers would leave high-powered tractors in the barn and take horses into the field instead. However, a major problem would arise in finding a stray herd of 27-million work horses and mules that would be needed to replace gasoline power on the nation's farms.

Even if enough horses could be rounded up, they would require 81-million acres of cropland just to be fed and the number of farm laborers would have to be more than triple to perform the hand labor that machines now do.

These figures on horses and the energy crisis were compiled by the United States Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service. They show how important machines have become in providing the

huge amounts of food hungry Americans demand.

Farming in the United States today consumes only about three percent of the total energy used in the country. This is the same proportion of the nation's energy supply farming used in 1939.

Of course, agriculture cannot turn the clock back to 1939 when, as an industry, it consumed 1.6-billion gallons of petroleum fuel, compared to the 6.5-billion gallons used by farmers in 1972. This country no longer has the land, manpower or horses to provide sufficient food in 1939 technology.

One of the world's top farm equipment manufacturers reports that in 1973, it required 22 gallons of petroleum fuel per acre to produce crops on a total of 331-million acres of farmland.

With an additional 10-million acres going into crops in 1974, farmers will need 220-million more gallons of fuel this year than last.

Because of the higher cost of fuel,

farmers can be expected to save as much fuel as possible this year by paying closer attention to engine tuning, engine speeds, minimum tillage planting and by switching to diesel powered machines which accomplish more work on less fuel. (That is, if one can find a diesel tractor during the current equipment shortage.)

The margin of adjustment farmers have in fuel economy is narrow and in a year of increased agricultural production, energy savings in this area may be almost unnoticeable.

Counties May Join Efforts On Grant

A coalition of Northeastern Michigan counties may band together in an effort to obtain a federal grant to reduce a high unemployment rate. A program is being sought to provide special skills training for qualified job seekers.

A preliminary meeting last week saw county commissioners from Iosco, Arenac, Ogemaw and Roscommon meeting at Standish to discuss a joint effort to seek Title I funds available under a new government program to lower unemployment.

In addition to the above four counties, there is a possibility that Gladwin and Bay Counties will join the group. Joint action is being considered because of the population requirement of 100,000 persons.

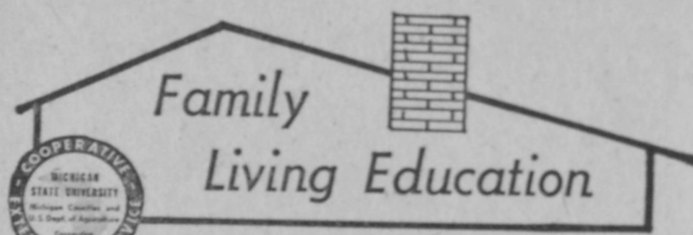
According to figures for 1973, which the federal government uses as a base period, unemployment was at 7.8 percent in Iosco County, lowest of five of the units. Arenac had an unemployment rate of 12.2 percent, Roscommon and Ogemaw had unemployment rates of 9.8 percent and 13 percent of Gladwin's work force was unemployed.

Formal approval of the joint fund-seeking effort would require action by individual county boards of commissioners and it is expected that the commissioners will take the matter under consideration during April sessions.

Adding fabric softener to your laundry will impart softness and fluffiness to washable fabrics. Softener reduces or eliminates static cling that often makes it necessary to peel away synthetics and permanent press items when folding laundry or wearing garments. Some fabrics require no ironing when softener is used; others dry with fewer wrinkles.

There are various types of fabric softeners. The most familiar is the one used in the rinse cycle. To use correctly, dilute fabric softener with water first and add to the final rinse or pour it into the washer's softener dispenser, if available. It is important not to add any other laundry additive to the water when a rinse cycle fabric softener is used. The additive may interfere or react with the softener.

Another type of fabric softener can be used in either the wash or final rinse cycle. Compatible with other wash cycle compounds, such as detergents, these fabric softeners should be added to the wash water before adding detergent and laundry. Then proceed as usual. Do not pour a wash cycle fabric softener into a fabric softener dispenser unless you want it used in the rinse cycle, the manner in which the dispenser is designed to work.

A third category of fabric softeners is the aerosol spray type which is used in the dryer. The manufacturer recommends the following method of use: Before loading wet clothes, spray the product evenly around the inside surface of the dryer drum for five seconds. Hold can upright and eight to 10 inches from the drum. Load clothes and dry. By this method, the clothes pick up the anti-static fabric softener during tumbling.

The newest dryer-softener to appear on the market is the packet variety. The packet is attached firmly to a fin of the dryer, facing the direction of spin. Some dryers have electronic moisture sensors located on the fins. They appear as metallic strips or copper wires. On such dryers, the packet should be placed on the drum, midway between the fins.

According to the manufacturer, the softener is effective for 40-50 dryer loads.

Users should read and follow package directions carefully for best results, regardless of the type of fabric softener. Correct amounts should be used and the product added at the proper time.

Staining may occur if softener is poured or sprayed directly on fabrics. A stain can be removed by dampening the item and rubbing with bar soap. Then launder.

Allow East Tawas to Develop ITS Athletic Field

—Editorial Comment—

The proposed land exchange is dead and Tawas Area Board of Education should now make a definite move to "get off dead center" on the issue concerning the Newman Street athletic field at East Tawas. During discussions held between the board and officials of East Tawas, it has appeared from one point of view that the board of education was using its legal ownership of the athletic field as a "hammer" to meet its own ends in securing a possible "free" site for future school use. If true, this is a deplorable condition and one which definitely does not lend itself to promoting good relationships between the school and communities of the entire district.

Immediate action should be taken by the board of education toward turning complete ownership of the athletic field over to the City of East Tawas. The legal aspect of removing a "reverter clause" in the 1957 deed, which turned the property over to the city, should be studied by both city and school attorneys. If the only alternative found requires a referendum by the people of the district, then that question should be placed before voters at the annual school election. Such a vote would probably see approval of the transfer if the following reasons are taken into consideration by voters:

1. At the present time, the City of East Tawas and the East Tawas Lions Club are proposing to spend a large amount of money on development and expansion of the Newman Street athletic field. This proposed development is important to the recreational program for the entire area and for persons of all ages—not just for East Tawas. For years, this field has served as a focal point for such area-wide recreational activities as Knott's and Pony League baseball, independent baseball and tennis and the facilities have been enjoyed by several generations of youngsters growing up in the Tawas area. Those recreational facilities have been utilized by children from the Tawas as well as from the outlying Townships of Baldwin, Tawas, Wilber, Alabaster, Grant and Sherman.

2. The City of East Tawas and the Lions Club have the capabilities and, most importantly, the desire to develop the field as a recreational facility to serve the entire area. What a windfall for taxpayers of Tawas Area School District! Besides serving families residing in the school district, it would provide much-needed facilities for utilization in interscholastic and intermural tennis programs conducted by the school. How much would it cost for a similar development by the school and is the high cost of construction one reason why tennis is not being offered today by the school?

3. How does the Newman Street athletic field fit into the school's plans for future school construction? At one time following reorganization and about the same time that the property was deeded to the city, some members of the board of education believed that the field could possibly be used in the future as a building site—that was the reason for the reverter clause. Since then, however—except for the present—the Newman Street field was never seriously considered for a school building site, one of the principal reasons being that the athletic field is so small for an elementary school site.

4. It would seem that it would be a waste of tax money for the City of East Tawas to abandon this field and develop a new one on property acquired some years ago for the municipal waste water treatment plant. Before this is done, city officials must look to the future growth of the Tawas area to determine if this suggested recreational site would actually block possible future expansion of the treatment plant. If the athletic field were abandoned, would the board of education be prepared to pick up the maintenance expense for the Newman Street field, or would it be allowed to grow up into a weed-filled, neglected eyesore?

5. Although the school retains ownership of the athletic field, is that ownership realistic? The field was purchased many years (1928-1929) before reorganization of area schools. In fact, although perhaps not in legal actuality, that field is "owned" by the people of East Tawas, who were either generous to a fault or could not conceive of any future problems when the property was included in the total school consolidation package in 1953.

(In another instance, which dates back to 1949 and prior to consolidation, many persons insisted that the Tawas City School turn the baseball diamond on First Avenue over to the City of Tawas City. It was the opinion then that the move was justified as the field had been constructed and maintained by the independent baseball team since the 1920s and at no cost to the school. Members of the baseball team and city officials convinced school officials that transferring the property to the city would eliminate any future argument over location of an athletic field in this community once school consolidation was accomplished.)

(In view of the present situation, it is well that the action was taken. It should be pointed out, too, that the city held up its end of the bargain. Dead Creek was rerouted and city-owned property was made

available to the consolidated school system for recreational use. This city-owned property is still used by the school district.)

A site for a future elementary school is needed at East Tawas and school officials should coordinate efforts with city officials to meet that end according to the city's master plan for land use, but not at the expense of wasting tax money through abandoning one facility for a costly development of a new recreational area; and certainly not designating the present athletic field as a possible school site when it probably could not meet the need for actual school construction.

The City of East Tawas should be allowed to develop ITS athletic field for the benefit of the entire Tawas area and it would be in the best interest of the school district if no "strings" are attached when a property deed is transferred.
