Registration Days Announced Monday by Tawas A. School

Registration days for grades nine through 12 at Tawas Area High School will be Wednesday through Friday, August 28-29, 8:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m., at the high school building.

All students in these grades who are attending Tawas Area School for the first time and have not yet registered are to do so on Friday, August 23, 8:30 a. m. to 4:00 p. m.

Because of early planning by the teaching staff, registration for middle school students, grades six through eight, will not be needed for returning seventh and eighth graders. These students may pick up locker assignments and schedules any week day, August 19 through August 23, 9:00 a. m. to 3:00 p. m., at the middle school office.

New students and all sixth graders may register for school with their parents in the evening, anytime between 4:00 and 7:00 p. m., on the day specified by their last name.

The following chart indicates the proper dates for registration: Students with last names starting with A through L, Monday, August 19; M through Z, Tuesday, August 20.

Upon registering on the above days, new students with their parents may register for school, pick up a basic information packet and receive a tour of the school.

"This orientation is planned to relieve some of the trauma new students go through on the first day of school," states Robert McDonald, middle school principal.

This year, all lockers are to be assigned except for those students who register with their locker partner or bring a note signed by a prospective partner.

Since split sessions are still in effect, the starting time for all sixth, seventh and eighth grade students will be 12 o'clock noon. Classes are to terminate at 5:15 p. m.

"This is only the second year that Tawas Area School has had a middle school that functions separately from the high school," said McDonald. "This year, as last year, there will be changes in the curriculum."

All mathematics classes are to be sectioned according to individual students' abilities. Science, social studies and language arts will remain as required classes, but a student will have choices as to what specific areas in those subjects he wishes to study.

Two new classes have been added to the curriculum. The first is algebra for eighth grade students. This course is offered for advanced mathematics students and will cover the same material as high school algebra.

Enroll Children Before Aug. 23

Any families new to the Tawas Area School District having children to enroll in grades kindergarten through five are asked to do so before August 23, if possible. Offices will be open from 9:00 a. m. to 4:00 p. m. at both East Tawas and Tawas City Elementary Schools.

Identical Opening Adopted for Four of Iosco's Schools

Acceptance of a calendar change by the school faculty Monday night opened the way for the board of education to set the opening day of Tawas Area School's 1974-75 term on September 3.

The new opening day coincides with all other school districts in the county. Earlier this year, superintendents of the four school districts had agreed to open before Labor Day and the date of August 26 had been set for negotiation purposes.

However, both Hale Area School and Oscoda Area School are to hold millage elections in August and boards of education of those districts, along with Whittemore-Prescott Area School District, then adopted a September 3 opening date.

The conflicting opening days came to a head at a special meeting of Tawas Area Board of Education last week when it was pointed out that all four schools cooperate in a shared time vocational program. It was pointed out, too, that Iosco Intermediate School District provides special education for the four schools.

A tentative agreement for the change was reached last week with negotiators for Tawas Area Education Association and the general membership approved the action prior to Monday night's regular meeting of the board of education.

Tuesday, September 3, will be an orientation day for teachers. An opening day luncheon for the staff, administration and board of education is to be held at noon.

The first day for students will be Wednesday, September 4.

The calendar adopted by the board of education Monday night calls for 185 teacher days and 181 student days during the year.

Vacations during the year include November 15, first day of deer season; November 28-29, Thanksgiving; December 23-31, Christmas vacation; January 1, New Year's Day.

There will be no school on January 17 which will mark the end of the first semester and will be an inservice training and record day for teachers.

School will be closed March 28-31 for Easter vacation; April 1-4, spring vacation; May 26, Memorial Day.

Hale School Year Depends On Millage

Hale Area Board of Education took formal action Monday night designating Tuesday, September 3, as orientation day for teachers and Wednesday, September 4, as the first day of school for the 1974-75 term.

How long the school operates after that date depends on the outcome of the August 26 school operating millage vote, but the board of education adopted a resolution stating it would "do the best we can until we do not have any more money."

In other business, the board adopted a resolution to borrow against anticipated state transportation, driver training and special education money. The school does not receive any state aid membership funds this year.

Although the state's computer apparently made an error in the total funds available, the same case experienced by Tawas Area School several weeks ago, the board of education gave authorization to borrow \$90,372.

"This total is far above what we will actually receive in transportation and special education money, but we need the funds to tide over school operation until the receipt of property taxes starting in December," said Supt. Wayne Case.

The board of education designated Dr. William McCadie of the staff of Huron Forest Medical Center as the school's physician.

Authorization was given for the nursery school to use a relocatable building at no expense to the district.

New TA School Bus Policy Spells Out Requirements for Use by Organizations

A new policy governing use of school buses was adopted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education. The major change is that any time a bus is used for other than school oriented trips, the program or organization must be jointly sponsored by the community educational program in order to justify liability of trips.

The new policy states: It shall be the policy of Tawas Area School Board of Education to permit the use of buses for the purpose of:

1. Providing transportation to and from school.
2. Providing transportation for class field trips that are approved by the director of transportation and the superintendent of schools. This approval will be for trips within the State of Michigan.
3. Providing transportation for class field trips that are approved by the board of education for out of state.
4. Enriching educational opportunities for community school enrollees as long as costs are paid for by community education program. This cost is to be computed by taking the per miles cost (including depreciation) from the previous year and applying cost to actual miles traveled. The approval of these education enrichment trips will come from the board of education.

During discussion on the above policy, it was pointed out that proposed trips in the fourth category must be educational in nature and the organization sponsoring the trip with the community education

program must pay its own way based on the above information.

Inssofar as bus breakdowns or flat tires during such trips, it was the opinion of Supt. Edward J. Barry that the school was responsible for such added cost. He pointed out that depreciation was included in the normal cost to the sponsoring organization and that the school has the responsibility to send a good bus on such a trip.

Any organization considering the possible use of school buses during the year should contact the community education director to determine if the organization is eligible for sponsorship.

Much of Monday night's meeting centered around school buses. It was reported by the superintendent that he had contacted Ottawa Equipment Company, low bidder earlier this year on furnishing two new International buses to the school, and learned that the delivery date had been changed to January.

The superintendent expressed the opinion that the bid might now be defaulted as the retail price had increased after the bid had been opened and accepted.

Barry said that 10 Ford buses and 18 Chevrolet buses were presently available, but did not meet the specifications required earlier this year by the board of education.

The board of education gave the superintendent authority to investigate the possibility of leasing buses for school use before taking any action on the current order.

"The school really cannot wait until January for new buses," said Barry. Because of the change to the split session last year, each bus is averaging 20,000 miles per term. (See BOARD, page 4.)

First Foreign Student Arrived in Tawas Sunday

Viveca Falkman, 16, of Goteborg, Sweden, is the first foreign exchange student to arrive in the Tawas area this year as a participant in the Youth for Understanding program.

Miss Falkman will be staying with Mr. and Mrs. Robert Erickson and family of East Lincoln Street, East Tawas. The Ericksons are both members of the faculty of Tawas Area School.

Arriving here Sunday afternoon, she is to spend the next 10 months with the Ericksons and will complete her senior year at Tawas Area High School.

Like most exchange students from Europe, Viveca has studied English for 6½ years in schools of her homeland. Her particular interest in school centers around the study of Swedish literature. She was vice president of the student council in her school.

Her hobbies include riding horses, skiing, basketball and swimming.

Viveca said that her greatest interest here would be getting to know American youth and to take part in student activities. One of the main ideas for the Youth for Understanding program is to have the exchange student get involved in an American family experience. She arrived in this country Saturday night at Metropolitan Airport, Detroit, along with a group of 170 other students from European countries.

Her father, Hans F. Falkman, is the managing director of a bank. She has one sister, Cecilia, 18 years of age.

Goteborg is Sweden's second largest city and is a seaport of 700,000 persons on the North Sea.

This is the third foreign exchange student hosted by the Ericksons in the past eight years.

Rep. Prescott Lone Local Winner In State Primary

George A. Prescott, who was renominated by Republicans as the 105th District representative in the state legislature, received 1,909 votes in Iosco County during the August 6 primary election. He is to be opposed by Patrick Flynn, Democrat, in the general election.

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller was the top vote getter in Iosco County with 2,573, but failed in his bid for the court of appeals.

Iosco voters gave Robert Davis 893 votes to 880 votes for Hugh Prescott of East Tawas and Davis went on to win the Republican nomination for 37th District state senator.

Former member of the Iosco County Board of Supervisors for many years, Edward A. Gerard of National City, 85, passed away Tuesday, August 6, at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. The Rev. Sidney J. Rowland officiated at funeral services Saturday, August 10, at the E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home, Tawas City, with burial following in Memory Gardens Cemetery, Tawas City.

Mr. Gerard was born November 18, 1888, in Mungler. He and his wife, Thressa, moved to the Whittemore area from Bay City several years ago.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Eva Whitney and Mrs. Dorothy DeBats of Bay City and Mrs. Elaine Roentgen of Santa Monica, California; one son, William Gerard of Bay City; seven grandchildren; 17 great grandchildren, and five great, great grandchildren.

Says Spiritual Growth Relates to Human Progress

Spiritual growth relates directly to human progress, Harvey W. Wood, CSB, said in a public address Sunday, August 11, at Tawas United Methodist Church, East Tawas.

A Christian Science lecturer from Chicago, Illinois, Wood held that growth in understanding the spiritual nature of man provides a basis for enlarged activity and achievement.

Wood spoke at the invitation of First Church of Christ, Scientist, East Tawas. He is currently on an extensive speaking tour of colleges and universities. He was introduced by Mrs. Olga Sumner, First Reader.

The real thrust of the teaching and life purpose of Christ Jesus was "to turn human thought away from matter to Spirit," Wood said.

The parables of Jesus, he noted, "are rich in their references to nature's know-how. A mustard seed, a corn field, tares and wheat, a barren fig tree, each teaches valuable lessons in how to grow."

The lecturer explained that, although Jesus "drew upon nature to illustrate spiritual teachings, he is never regarded as a mere naturalist. Nature was not his God. Spirit was the God he worshipped and taught others to adore."

According to Wood, Mary Baker Eddy, who discovered and founded Christian Science, also found nature a practical aid in her teaching.

As an example, he quoted the following statement from her book, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "All nature teaches God's love to man, but man cannot love God supremely and set his whole affections on spiritual things, while loving the material or trusting in it more than in the spiritual."

Wood gave one illustration of the lessons of nature by discussing the camomile, a flower which when crushed gives off a sweet fragrance.

"The lesson is an unforgettable one," he said. "It is easy to love those who love us. But Christ Jesus asked ingeniously, 'Do not even sinners do that?' — love those who love them!"

"Real love, then, always responds with more love. Translated into our human experience, it simply means less and less inclination to react. Righteous indignation loses credibility."

Reactions which start quarrels and wars, he added, will be replaced "with compassionate responses which will resolve personal differences, preserve friendships and expand peaceful relationships," as a sense of love grows in every individual.

an increase of about one-third over prior years.

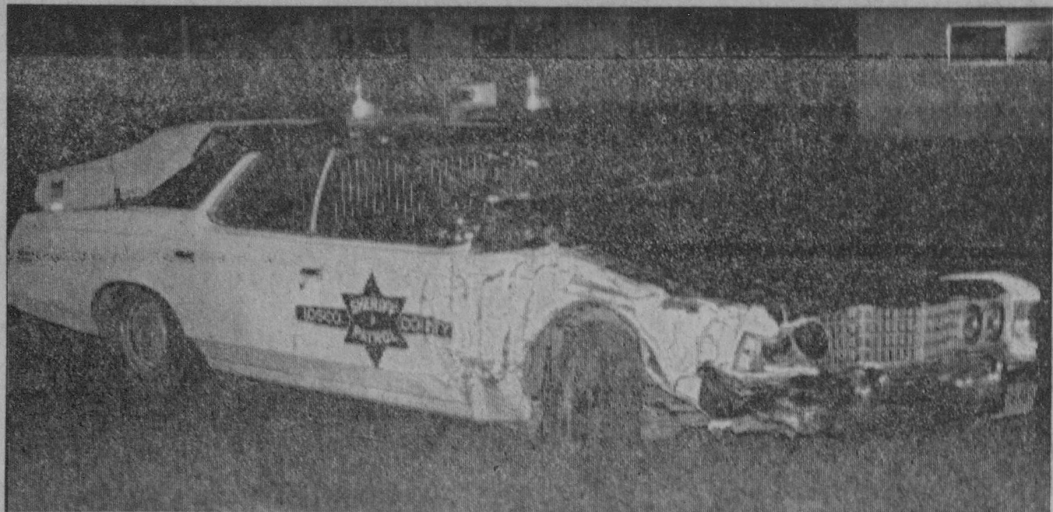

Address System for SS Complicated

Many of the over three-million aged, blind and disabled Americans currently receiving monthly Supplemental Security Income checks have two addresses. John Carr, district manager of the Bay City social security office, stated that the massive national computer system used by the Social Security Administration to administer the SSI program, which began making payments in January, needs to maintain dual address records on many beneficiaries. "The Social Security Administration has two important tasks," explained Carr. "One is to determine how much an individual is eligible to receive from SSI and the other is to make sure that regular monthly checks are issued to the correct mailing address." Carr said that it is not unusual for an SSI beneficiary to live at one address and ask to have his checks mailed elsewhere, such as to a bank or to an in-care-of address. "There are also a large number of checks issued to representative payees who may or may not live with the beneficiary," he pointed out. Carr said that in these cases, social security has to keep track of two addresses, a mailing address and the actual residence address. He continued that both records must be kept up to date because the residence address living arrangements were important in determining the actual amount of the check due. "Anyone who has moved, even if he is using the same mailing address, is responsible for reporting the change to a social security office."

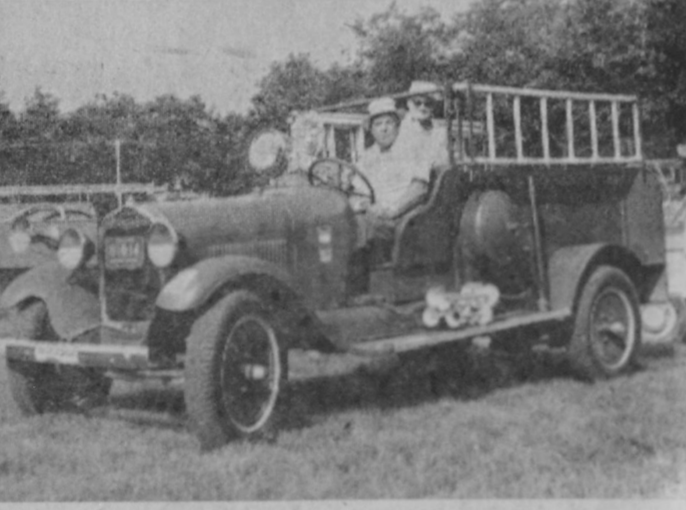

County Commission Considers Employee Salary Agreements

Major work during last week's two-day session of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners concerned details of new salary contracts with sheriff's department personnel and county building employees.

Presentations were made in committee by both the Fraternal Order of Police, representing sheriff's department personnel, and United Steelworkers of America, bargaining agent for county building employees.

A communication from the negotiating committee for sheriff's deputies, read into the commission minutes, asked a \$500 wage increase and dental rider on the Blue Cross Insurance for sheriff's department personnel and dependents.

Last December, a comprehensive wage package was agreed to by the deputies and the county commission. Under that agreement, salary of the detective sergeant would be \$10,723 over the next three years while a detective and uniform sergeant would be paid at a rate of \$10,423 annually.

Deputies have a starting base of \$8,500, \$9,010 at the end of one year, \$9,550 at the end of two years and \$10,123 at the end of three years. Under last year's agreement, secretarial deputies have a starting base of \$7,443, \$7,889 at the end of one year, \$8,363 at the end of two years, \$8,863 at the end of three years. Turnkeys have a starting base of \$5,954, \$6,311 at the end of one year, \$6,689 at the end of two years and \$7,090 at the end of three years. The dog warden has a starting base of \$7,543, \$7,889 at the end of two years and \$8,362 at the end of three years.

In addition, longevity pay based on the annual salary amounts to an increase of two percent for employees with five years of service, four percent for those with five to nine years of service, six percent for employment of 15 to 20 years and eight percent for 20 years to retirement.

Officers are paid time and one-half for over eight hours, time and one-half for all court time when the employee is off duty, double time for working 10 paid holidays, time and one-half for any call back to work after completion of duty with

a minimum of two paid hours. Uniforms and equipment are furnished by the county.

The commission's minutes did not indicate details of new salary and fringe benefits being requested by county building employees.

In other business Wednesday, John Tafelski, superintendent of Iosco Intermediate School District, reported that two proposals would be placed before voters September 9 seeking authorization to construct and operate a vocational skills center. One proposition seeks 1.98 mills of taxes for operation and 4 of a mill for construction.

Tafelski said that \$1,400,000 would be needed for construction of the building, of which he anticipates \$950,000 would be reimbursed by the state.

Should the proposal be authorized by the electorate, eight instructors would be hired to teach 18 different

skill areas. He said the proposed facility would not duplicate services presently provided by high schools of the county.

The commission authorized purchase of a site from National Gypsum Company for a new dog pound and bids are to be received for construction of a building. Cost of the site was \$600. A bid from Ralph Graves of Hale to drill a well on the site was accepted.

Otis Love, who retired recently as engineer-manager of the Iosco Road Commission, has been hired to provide engineering and professional services for the above project. The site of the dog pound is located southeast of the intersection of Sand Lake Road and M-55.

Authorization was given to advertise for a new equalization director to eventually replace William Wercely, who has held the position for nearly two years and

Box Number Use Requested On Addresses

Leonard Hosbach, postmaster, has urged all rural route postal customers served by the Tawas City post office to use box numbers as part of their return addresses to assure faster, more efficient mail deliveries from correspondents.

"Although box numbers are an integral part of most rural route addresses, it has recently become the practice of many postal customers to omit this element," Hosbach said. "This practice sometimes causes mail to be returned to the sender because of an insufficient address. It has also been cited by publishers and other large mailers as one of the major causes of duplicate mailings to rural customers.

"These duplicate mailings hurt everyone," Hosbach said. "They cost the big mailers in dollars and cents and, because they flood the mail stream, everyone's mail is slowed."

Hosbach said the box number is as important to rural addresses as the house number is to city addresses.

"Unless a rural route address contains both the box number and the route number, it is an incomplete address and is subject to return to the sender," he stated.

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Editorial

Is A Primary Worth the Effort?

Is a primary election really worth all the trouble and expense? Some election officials (and candidates, too) are probably asking that question after only 34.8 percent of Iosco's registered voters exercised one of their most hallowed constitutional rights in last Tuesday's election. Iosco's voters are not the only ones who avoided the polls as the general turnout in Michigan was poor.

Expense for holding Tuesday's primary election averaged a little less than \$3 per voter, or a total of \$12,000 for the 4,175 persons who entered polling booths. The expense to the county will be approximately \$5,000 for ballots and election supplies, while the expense to the 33 precincts will total about \$7,000.

Why do voters shun primary elections? That is a good question and the real answer cannot be laid at the doorstep of today's national political problems; voters have always been indifferent to primary elections. According to County Clerk D. Keith Papas, Tuesday's voter turnout was the lowest since he has been in office as about one-half of the total number of registered voters usually show up for the primary.

This is a rather strange fact in our political system for a primary election is just as important as a general election in that political parties choose a final slate of candidates from persons who file nominating petitions for the preliminary election. That final ticket is as good or as bad as the people want to make it.

It was not always this way, for a little more than 50 years ago state candidates were selected by parties using the convention system—the same method used today in

picking candidates for president. Some states hold primary elections for the country's highest office, but the final selection of a presidential candidate still takes place at a national political convention.

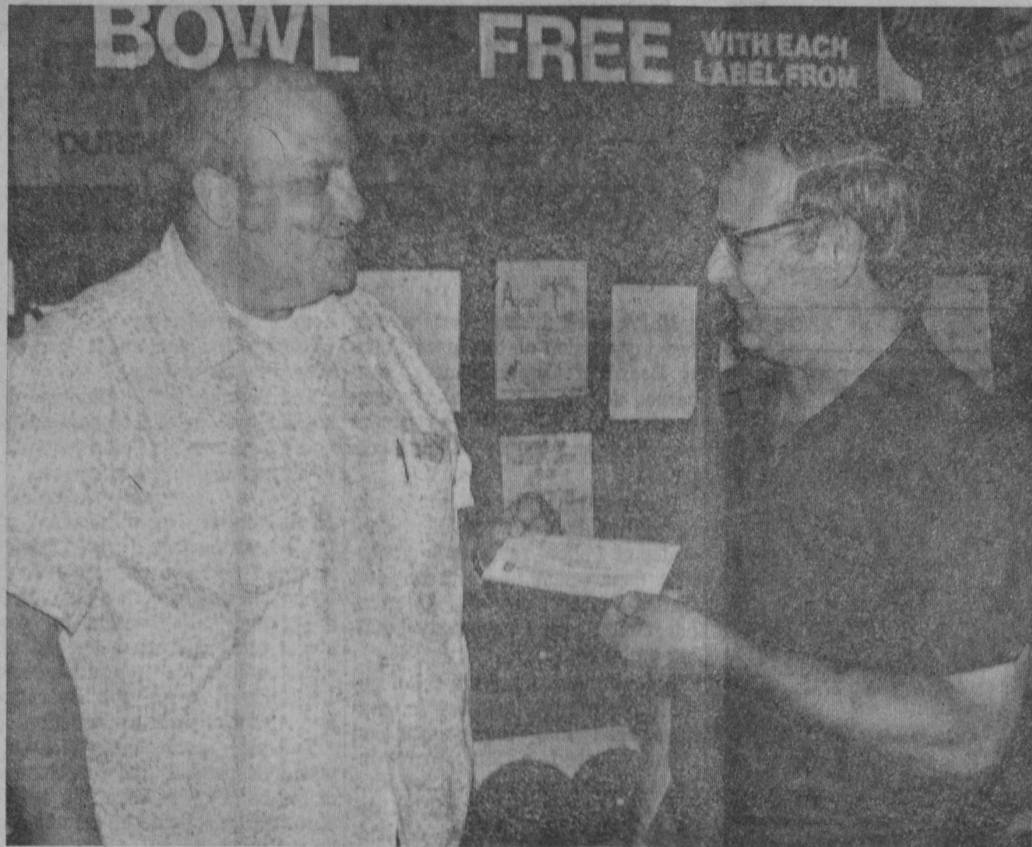
In city and township elections, the convention system was abandoned only a few years ago and a primary election replaced ward caucuses. In Tawas City's case, a new charter calls for election of officials on a nonpartisan basis—there are no political parties.

When the convention system to select candidates was abandoned, interest in politics—at both state and local levels—suffered. Gone are the nostalgic days of the "smoke-filled back rooms" and some real "politicizing" in those ward caucuses.

But the old convention system is not missed from this corner at least. The primary system has eliminated the domineering influence of a few people at conventions and a candidate must stand on his own two feet and face the test of the electorate.

The only thing lacking in the primary system is voter interest and that was the ultimate reason for the change many years ago. Americans will crab at length about the state of the government, but will not take the time to select the best candidate for office.

It is an unhappy fact of life as those interested in a particular candidate do get out and vote in primary elections and the end result may not be the choice of the general electorate. In reality, then, there is not much difference between the old convention system and today's primary elections because of the general public's indifference.

County Commission Races Featured Iosco's Primary

With the voter turnout percentage ranging from a low of 23.6 percent in Burleigh Township and a high of 42.1 percent at East Tawas, both with at least one local contest, the August 6 primary in Iosco County sent election board workers home to bed Wednesday morning much earlier than usual.

Despite the lack of interest shown by voters, there were two close races for county commission nominations, as well as three close races for township office nominations. Two hot contests at Oscoda, including one for a township office and one proposal, are expected to see a recount.

Mary Jane Burdett, Joseph Fox and William Wereley were nominated by Republicans as candidates for three seats on the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. Robert Foster and Donald Griffin, both of Oscoda, were unopposed in the election.

Mrs. Burdett, who apparently will become the first woman ever to be seated on the commission, had a total of 423 votes to defeat Fred B. Lomas, veteran commissioner from East Tawas. Lomas had 237 votes and Merton Killey, also of East Tawas, tallied 160. The total vote for the two men was 397, indicating that the split of East Tawas' ballots had no bearing on the final result.

Mrs. Burdett won in all four precincts of the district. She received 186 votes in East Tawas, 131 in AuSable, 75 votes in Baldwin Township and 31 in Wilber. Lomas tallied 159 votes in East Tawas, 38 in AuSable, 31 in Baldwin and nine votes in Wilber. Killey had 99 votes in East Tawas, 36 in AuSable, 13 in Baldwin and 12 in Wilber.

The race for the District Four nomination proved to be a close race between Fox and William Fuerst of Whittemore. Fox totaled 262 votes and Fuerst had 242 votes. The third candidate, Del Myles of Tawas City, had 125 votes.

Fox had 26 votes in Precinct No. One of Baldwin Township, 57 votes

in Tawas Township, three votes in Burleigh Township, 141 votes in his home precinct of Tawas City and 34 votes in Alabaster Township. He did not receive a vote at Whittemore. Fuerst had 10 votes in Precinct No. One of Baldwin, 52 votes in Tawas Township, 45 votes in Burleigh, 46 votes in Tawas City, 47 votes in Whittemore and 25 in Alabaster. Myles had eight votes in Baldwin, 15 votes in Tawas Township, five votes in Burleigh, 73 votes in his home precinct of Tawas City, four votes in Whittemore and 20 votes in Alabaster Township.

Wereley defeated Arthur Aulerich of Reno Township for the District Five commission post. Aulerich was appointed to this position two years ago when Wereley resigned to become the county tax equalization director. Wereley received 20 votes in Reno, 36 votes in Grant Township, 16 votes in Precinct No. Two of Oscoda Township and 124 votes in Plainfield Township, his home precinct. Aulerich had 29 votes in Reno, 26 votes in Grant, 12 votes in Oscoda Township and 63 votes in Plainfield Township.

In township races, Leona Benson, veteran Alabaster Township treasurer, was defeated for the Republican nomination by Ralph Rohrbach, 51-47. Voters of that township approved two special tax proposals for four years, three-quarters of a mill for fire protection, 89 "yes" and 41 "no;" three-quarters of a mill for garbage collection, 78 "yes" and 56 "no."

Terry A. Palminter won the Republican nomination for AuSable Township supervisor over Dale Lamrock, 181-111.

Lowell Aspin won the Republican nomination for the four-year post of trustee of Grant Township over Jean A. Robelli, 49-24.

Rex Walters and William Steiert won the two Republican nominations for four-year trustee at Oscoda. Walters received 257 votes, while Steiert squeezed a one-vote edge over Richard McKnight, 225-224. Glen C. Highfield was high in a field of four candidates to fill a two-year vacant term as trustee. Highfield had 180 votes, followed by 111 for Harry Curley, 99 for Frank Heinz and 82 votes for Martin Gayeski.

The zoning proposal in Oscoda Township lost, 377-354, while a proposal to treat water with fluoride won, 455-283.

Plainfield Township's election was enlivened by two write-in candidates for the Democratic nomination for supervisor. Kenneth Salisbury won the Republican nomination without opposition with 74 votes. Bruce Hewitt's name was written in on 55 Democratic ballots for supervisor while Terry Good received 41 votes. Hewitt's name will be printed on the November general election ballot as he met the requirement of receiving at least 15 percent of the highest vote cast for any office in his party for that precinct.

An interesting race seems to be developing in Plainfield for township clerk. Mrs. Frances I. Hansen, Republican incumbent, received 164 votes, while the Democratic candidate, Sandra M. Baldwin, received 166 votes.

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Family Living Education

By HELEN B. MEACH
Extension Home Economist

Are you a selective shopper at the meat counter? It helps if you are. If you know something about the cost per serving of meat, you can then figure the cost per pound. Boneless cuts with little waste appear expensive, but they are not so costly when figured on a cost per serving, which actually is a more useful figure than cost per pound.

Recommended meat consumption in a balanced diet is two three-ounce servings daily. As meat cuts vary in the amount of bone, fat and connective tissue or gristle, the number of three-ounce cooked portions per pound will also vary.

The average family in the United States spends approximately one-third or 33 cents of every food dollar for meat. So, obviously the amount you spend in buying meat is of major importance in your food budget. Comparing meat on the basis of cost per serving gives a much better comparison of true meat costs because two different

cuts may cost the same per pound, but cost per serving may be very different.

Here is a guide to help you count the number of servings per pound: Ground and stew meat, four servings; boneless steaks and roasts, three servings; some bone, two servings; bony and fatty meat, one serving.

Ask yourself then, what is the best buy for my family? Do we want spare ribs at one serving per pound? If you are not big eaters, you might be able to get 1 1/2 servings to a pound from meaty ribs.

Let cost per serving guide your meat buying. It can save food dollars. Your extension service offers the free bulletin, "Stretching Your Meat Dollars." Call or write the office in your county to request your copy.

Get Correct Information On Payments

Question: I am 68 and the only income I have is my social security benefit of \$94 a month. I was going to apply for supplemental security income payments, but a friend told me I probably cannot get them because I have a son living across town who can afford to help support me. Is this true?

Answer: You may be eligible for monthly supplemental security income payments, regardless of your son's income. You should call or write any social security office for information about applying for payments.

Question: My mother is 84 years old. She is not really sick, but she is going into a nursing home because she has trouble getting around and taking care of herself.

Will medicare help pay for her care?

Answer: No. Care such as help in walking, dressing, bathing and eating is called custodial care and is not covered by medicare. Only continuing skilled nursing or rehabilitation services furnished in a skilled nursing facility can be covered by medicare.

Question: My husband and I were divorced last year after being married for 23 years. He will retire this fall when he reaches 65. I am 63 and have never worked. Can I get social security benefits on his record?

Answer: Since you were married to him over 20 years, you may get benefits on your ex-husband's record if he is entitled to retirement benefits and you remain unmarried. You must apply for benefits, however. Call, write or visit any social security office. The people there will be glad to help you.

Question: I recently hired a gardener on a part-time basis. The first day he came to work for me, he told me he did not want me to report his wages for social security. Does the law not say I have to do this?

Answer: If you pay your gardener \$50 or more in cash during a three-month calendar quarter, the law requires you to report the earnings and send in the social security contributions. If you do not send in the contributions within a month after the quarter ends, you may have to pay the full amount due plus a penalty later. In addition, your gardener will be missing out on social security credit toward retirement, survivors, disability and medicare protection for himself and his family.

LOOKING BACKWARD—

State-County Both Seek Tawas Point

15 Years Ago—

August 13, 1959—Although federal property on Tawas Point has not been officially declared surplus as yet, both the Michigan Department of Conservation and Iosco County Board of Supervisors have indicated that each may be interested in turning the property into a park.
