Skill Center Eligible for \$700,000 Grant

Iosco Intermediate School District has received confirmation of a grant for construction of the proposed skill center amounting to approximately \$700,000. The money will be available only if a favorable vote on the skill center is returned Monday, September 9.

The skill center will serve the entire Iosco Intermediate School District, which includes Hale, Oscoda, Tawas and Whittemore-Prescott School Districts.

The concept of a skill center is to train students and adults for job skills, to give them training and experience in specific skill areas, to make them more competitive for jobs in the area.

Training will be offered in the following areas: Auto body repair, automotive mechanics, aviation occupations, building trades, heating

and air conditioning, graphic arts occupations, metal trades, welding and cutting, cosmetology, quantity food preparation, small engine repair, electronics, business data processing, stenographic and secretarial, agricultural resources, distributive education — retailing, health and home economics and building maintenance.

In a recent survey, it was found that 70 percent of the students who graduate from the area school districts do not go on to college. Training must be provided for these students so they can obtain jobs. A vocational skill center will provide this necessary experience and training to make them more competitive for jobs.

Bank Receives Contract On TA Tax Anticipation Notes

Peoples State Bank of East Tawas was awarded a contract to furnish \$550,000 in tax anticipation notes to Tawas Area School.

At Monday night's special meeting of the board of education, the local bank submitted an interest rate of 5.75 percent for furnishing the money. Accompanied by a

cashier's check in the amount of \$11,000 to show good faith of the bank, total interest rate to the school will be \$21,346 on the note, effective from August 1 to April 1, 1975.

It was necessary for the board of education to borrow the money to finance operation of the school

Civic Center Idea Goes to Planners

Possible construction of a new city hall-fire hall-library-community building complex was turned over to the planning commission for study Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

Mayor John N. Brugger reported to the council that the proposal had been discussed at a recent meeting of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association. The mayor was of the opinion that the proposal should be studied now for possible implementation when finances are available.

Brugger said that there are indications now that congress, in 1976, will approve the second five-year program in the revenue sharing plan. The current program is due to expire in 1975.

The revenue sharing program has been a boon to financing local governmental projects. The major portion of the money returned to Tawas City, for instance, has been utilized in street construction.

The mayor said that with the current street construction program, along with that planned for 1975, the city's street system should be in excellent condition. He was of the opinion that should congress adopt an extension of revenue sharing in 1976, a portion of the money could be earmarked for financing a new municipal building project.

The mayor expressed the belief that a civic center was a facility which is much needed in the area. Besides offering space for a city hall and offices, fire department and library, he said the building could be utilized for social gatherings and meetings of various organizations.

Because of the need for prior planning to take advantage of federal sharing should the program

be continued, along with an indication in the future from local residents if the community would support a bonding program to aid in financing the project, the council believed the matter should be turned over to the planning commission.

Because of the length of time required for planning construction and financing, City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said a minimum of two to three years would be required.

Table Action On Private Paving Work

A private paving project to be conducted in September during reconstruction of Whittemore Street was tabled for further clarification Monday night by the Tawas City Council.

As part of its 1974 street program, the city plans to reconstruct Whittemore Street with a 22-foot-wide plant mix blacktop surface.

Actual width of the street right-of-way is 86 feet and E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home has requested that the full street width be blacktopped between Fifth Avenue and Sixth Avenue for parking purposes. Owners of the funeral home would pay for additional blacktop work.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the owners had requested that two large trees on Whittemore Street right-of-way in front of the funeral home be removed. Two councilmen indicated they were opposed to removal of such large shade trees in a residential area.

Because of the lack of specific plans showing actual placement of a proposed sidewalk eight feet in width, the council tabled action and is to inspect the property prior to the next meeting on Tuesday, September 3. That meeting is being delayed one day because of the Labor Day holiday.

Past Officials of Canoe Race Were Honored

Past officials of the Tawas River Canoe Race were honored Saturday night at a program held at the Iosco Hotel.

Acknowledgement awards from the Michigan Canoe Racing Association were presented to Hugo Wojahn, Bud Fisher, Robert Kendall and Bernard Race. Ribbons were presented to others participating in handling past canoe races.

A special presentation was made in memoriam to the late John R. Forsten, who was chief timekeeper of racing for a number of years. A gavel is to be presented to Mrs. Forsten.

Verlen Kruger of DeWitt, an official of MCRA, showed a color film on his trip through Canada's Northwest Passage.

Plans for the annual Tawas River race on September 14-15 were outlined by Michael Reed and Robert Jones, co-chairmen.

Ground Broken Saturday for New Grant Community Center at Sand Lake

One of the most active communities in Iosco County broke ground Saturday evening in the first phase years of constructing a community building.

As funds become available, additional work will be made to this new complex," stated LeRoy Lutz, chairman of the Grant Township building committee.

Now under construction near the fire hall at Sand Lake is a 40 by 80-foot concrete block building which is to be used for a variety of activities in Grant Township and the lake area. The building will contain 3,200 square feet of floor space.

Contractor for the work is Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, Tawas City. Estimated cost of the building shell, which will have a brick veneer facing, is \$60,000.

"This work is only the start of our project," stated Vincent Wade, president of the Grant Township Men's Association. After the contractor completes work on the shell, volunteers will complete the interior and landscaping.

This is a community project of a number of different organizations in Grant Township, including the fire department, fire department women's auxiliary, men's association, boy scouts, Sand Lake Teen Club and senior citizens. Representatives of each group took a turn at the shovel during the ground breaking ceremony.

Raymond Lenczewski, a member of the building committee and long associated with the fire department, told the group of about 100 persons in attendance that the idea for a community center originated in 1967 during Grant Township's centennial. The fire department was organized that year and was sponsor of the 100th birthday celebration.

Township voters later approved a tax levy and equipment was purchased over a period of years to give Grant one of the best equipped volunteer organizations in the county. Work on a fire hall was completed in 1968.

The present building has a large meeting room and is utilized throughout the year by a number of organizations. In 1970, a building fund was established for construction of a new building.

Since then, various organizations have raised money for the construction project, but the main source of income has been summer and winter festivals at Sand Lake. Additional money was gained through selling "stock" in the proposed new building.

Lenczewski said there were no boundary lines in the township and the lakes area insofar as cooperation in construction and final use of the building. He said it was a community project and believed that the eventual complex would someday serve as the center for township government.

Volunteers of the township recently completed the first phase of a tennis court construction project near the fire hall.

OK Permit

One building application approved during the past two weeks by the Tawas City Department of Public Works was for Reginald Bublitz, 120 Sunset Drive, construct 18 by 24-foot family room, \$7,200.

ET Parking Lot Work to Davison

Bid of Davison and Son Builders, Incorporated, was accepted Monday night by the East Tawas Council for construction of an employee parking lot on land leased from Christ Episcopal Church.

Due to the fact that all bids submitted were higher than originally anticipated, the council felt it was necessary to eliminate an asphalt surface and striping which had been planned for the parking lot.

In other business, five bids for construction of a storm sewer drainage project were turned over to Spicer Engineering Company for evaluation and recommendations.

Permission was given to conduct a fund raising campaign for Cystic Fibrosis in the city, but the council indicated that a letter should be sent to the sponsoring organization indicating that the city desired to have that organization make application to the Tawas-Whittemore-Hale Community Chest for contributions in future years.

A proposed ordinance which would prohibit fishing on the Tawas River bridge was submitted for council study and was turned over to the city attorney for a recommendation. City officials have felt that, due to the narrowness of

the bridge, fishing from the structure was a hazard to both fishermen and traffic.

The proposed ordinance is to be turned over to the county road commission for possible adoption by Baldwin Township, which controls a portion of the bridge.

A formal hearing is to be held October 14 on the proposed replating of Forest Glen Subdivision.

Ald. Ralph Western reported that a telephone call to Washington, D. C., on Monday indicated that approval would soon be received to increase housing for the elderly from 17 to 21 units in a high rise building and to eliminate present scattered low income housing units included in the program. The original program received federal approval but there have been numerous delays in plans.

The council voted to reimburse Tawas Area Promotions \$300 for fireworks during the Michigan Tourist Festival. Representatives of the city are to attend a meeting Wednesday (tonight) for a general discussion on activities of Tawas Chamber of Commerce and city participation in financing that organization through payment of dues.

Sample plans from two other school districts are being studied, along with a third plan based on an index system of salaries.

Basic information being studied by the board of education is to be carried to a future meeting of the Michigan Association of School Boards, which is to conduct a comprehensive program on administrative salaries. It was reported that four members of Tawas Area Board of Education are to attend that meeting.

New US-23 Traffic Study to be Conducted by State

An exchange of letters between the City of Tawas City and state highway officials indicates that the state may re-evaluate its time schedule for improvements to US-23 between Standish and Alpena.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz told members of the city council Monday night that the highway department had indicated that the problem of congestion on US-23 was related not so much to through traffic as to traffic turning off the main highway.

A new study is to be conducted by engineers, along with a count of traffic.

The city manager pointed out in a letter to the highway department that a traffic count was not the only criteria for highway planning and that "you have to drive US-23 to appreciate the problem."

As a result of the letter, the highway department is to re-evaluate its future plans for possible reconsideration.

In addition, the state is to take

another look at the erosion problem along the Tawas Bay side of US-23 near the M-55 intersection. Last year, the state made extensive improvements to the shoreline with rock fill to protect the highway against further erosion, but the city manager pointed out that evidence of new erosion was now indicated.

In other business, a letter has been written by the city to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (See COUNCIL, page 6.)

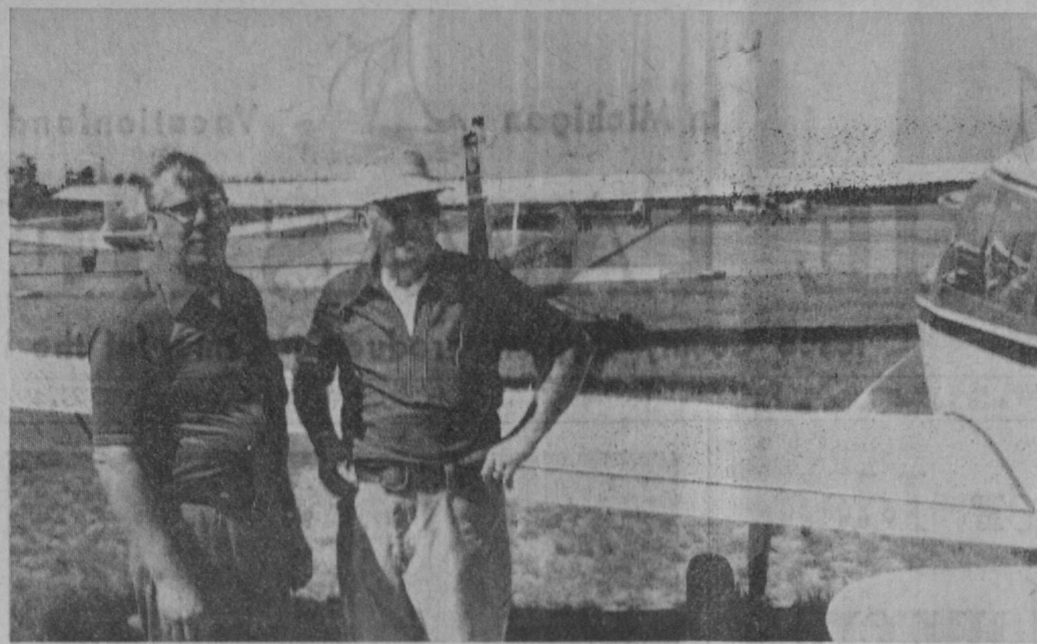

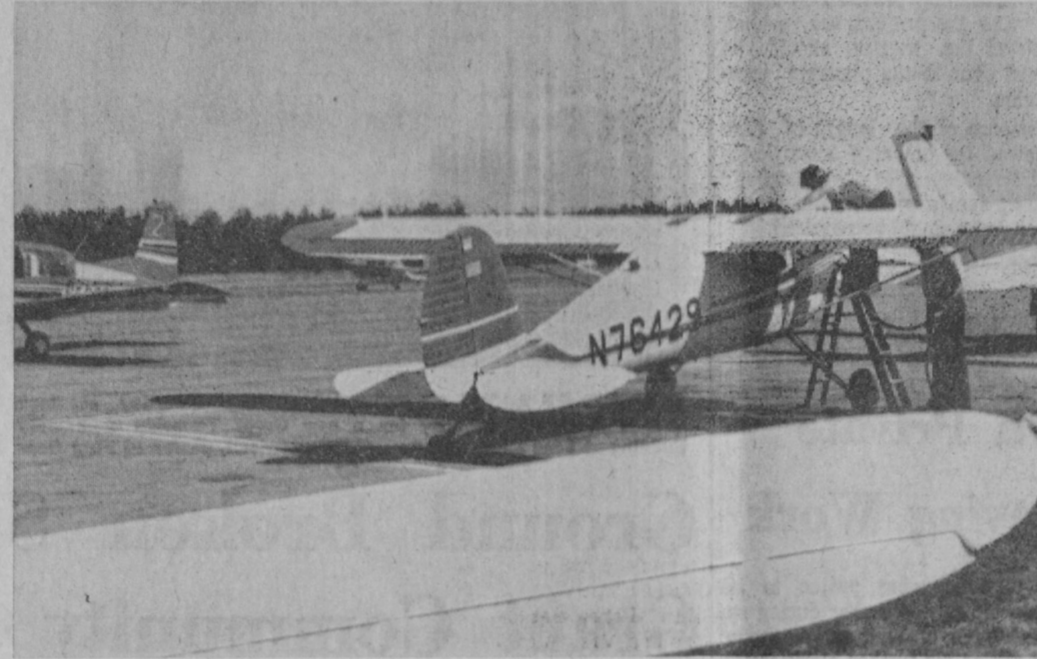

Discovery Of Rabid Bat Brings Health Dept. Warning

Due to the fact a local cat killed a bat and the bat was found to have rabies upon examination by the health department, it is timely to recommend that all pet owners make sure their dogs and cats have been properly vaccinated against rabies.

According to Albert L. Kinstrey Jr., administrator of District Health Department No. 2, rabies is always a potential danger to the communities served by the local health department. Last year, we had a positive case diagnosed in an Alcona County horse which had bitten several people.

Since the disease is considered to be 100 percent fatal among humans, anyone bitten by an animal should seek medical treatment or advice from their family physician or hospital emergency room. If a pet has been bitten by an unvaccinated dog or cat or by a wild animal such as a bat, fox or skunk, or if they have been exposed to a known rabid animal, contact the family veterinarian.

The best method of keeping the disease in check, of course, is to routinely have your family pets vaccinated. The common vaccine used now protects a dog for three years.

All animal bite cases should be reported to the local health department and the local sanitarian will see that the animal is quarantined or examined.

Arenac's Private Water Firm Has Problems With State

A private firm furnishing water to residents of Whitney Township, Arenac County, along with the township face court action in plans to upgrade the system in line with state requirements are not met by September 9.

Although Jack Oates, owner of Huron Pure Water Supply and Service Company, insists that his system is adequate to serve needs of township residents for many years in the future, the firm has been under fire from the state for supplying allegedly "bad" water to residents.

At a recent hearing called to consider the problem, due to the fact that the township may be forced into the water business, Oates said he was positive that he was furnishing one of the best grades of water available through any supply system.

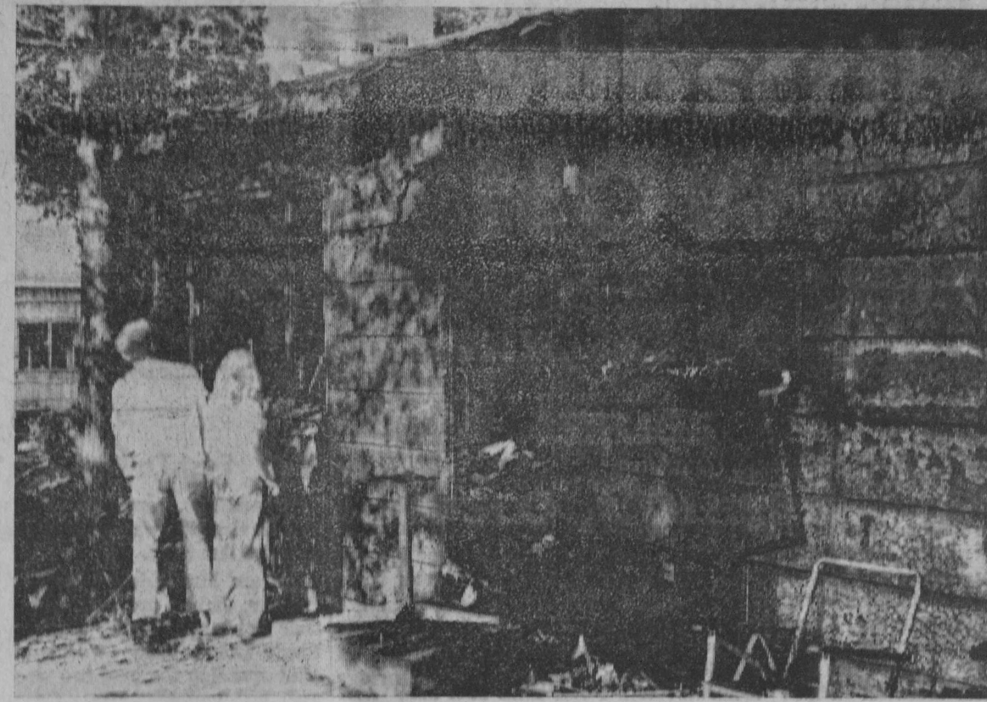
Problems for the private firm started last year when the state obtained two bad samples of water when the utility was experiencing trouble with its chlorination system.

Whitney Township users consumed about 17-million gallons of water last year. The health department apparently sees the problem as one of potential rather than immediate danger.

A health department official has been quoted as saying the state's main objection appears to be with Oates' filtering system, which inspectors claim does not measure up to state standards.

Oates estimates it would take \$85,000 to change the present system to conform to state standards. The state would like to see customers receiving unfiltered water from the Saginaw-Midland line in Sims Township tapped into the Whitney system and engineers see a municipally-owned system as able to meet this need.

The private firm has offered to sell or lease the system to the township.

Disaster Relief Asked for State's Windstorm Victims

Gov. William G. Milliken has asked for federal disaster relief for Michigan victims of July windstorms.

More than four-million dollars in private losses were recorded in windstorms July 3, 4 and 14 in the Counties of Alpena, Arenac, Delta, Emmet, Iosco, Montmorency and Saginaw.

In a letter to the president through the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration, Milliken asked for a declaration that a major disaster exists, saying: "I find that the situation is beyond the capabilities of the state and the affected local governments to effectively alleviate."

Milliken said in an addendum to the letter that \$3,973,000 in wheat, corn, oats, dry beans, sugar beets and potatoes was lost in Arenac County.

Crop losses and damage to private homes in other counties amounted to: Alpena, \$145,790; Delta, \$210,000; Emmet, \$8,000; Iosco, \$300,000; Montmorency, \$32,000; Saginaw, \$225,000.

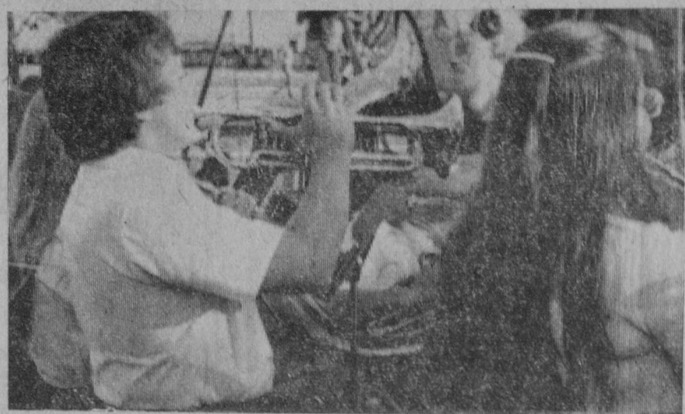

Last Chance This Term

Third Try on Operational Millage at Hale Area School

Monday, August 26, is a red letter day for voters of Hale Area School District, who will decide the fate of an operational millage proposal. On two previous occasions this year, proposals were rejected. Hale Area League for Education, along with Supt. Wayne Case, have been meeting with voters throughout the district during the past several weeks to explain the need for a favorable vote. This will be the last opportunity this year to vote on a proposal.

Last week, the board of education adopted a resolution stating that, should the proposal again be rejected, the school would operate until the money runs out and then would shut down.

The special millage proposal is asking for 12.5 renewal and 2.25 mills additional. If approved, Hale Area School would have a total of 24 mills of taxes for operation under a \$900,000 budget.

If the proposal does not pass, the district would be out of money sometime in November. Without a favorable vote on August 26, Hale Area School would lose 60 percent of its revenue. It would only receive 9.25 mills of taxes allocated by the county, which is actually down .45 of a mill from last year.

The district's enrollment has doubled in the last 10 years and continues to rise each year. Added students mean added costs and, due to projected increased student enrollment this year, the district needs two additional high school teachers, one additional bus and driver, supplies and equipment for the additional students.

Due to the increased valuation of the district and the number of students enrolled, Hale will receive no state membership aid this term. Hale Area School voters defeated a millage proposal April 2, which asked for the same millage as the current proposal. A proposal on June 10 asking for 12.5 renewal and 1.8 additional was also rejected.

The superintendent said the new millage proposal is .45 of a mill higher than asked in the June 10 election to offset the taxes subtracted from the school by action of the county allocation board.

The proposed school budget has been reduced by about \$65,000 over the preliminary. This was achieved by cutting the proposed number of new teachers from five to three and financing buses rather than outright purchase.

AuGres Farmers' River Drainage Suit Adjourned for New Survey

Circuit court litigation, in which four AuGres area farmers seek to force Iosco and Ogemaw Counties to cooperate with Arenac County in a proposed intercounty drainage district on the AuGres River, has been adjourned pending an engineering study conducted by the two upriver counties.

At a hearing conducted last Wednesday at Standish, Circuit Judge Joseph Swallow of Alpena approved a motion calling for adjournment of the case until Wade, Trim and Associates of Taylor conduct an on-site preliminary engineering study.

Ronald Tyler, Iosco prosecuting attorney, said Thursday that the engineering firm is to study the practicality of the present proposal designed to relieve flooding on the lower reaches of the AuGres with a view toward alternate means to handle the problem.

Plaintiffs in the case are Herbert Heinrich, Earl Shillair, Harold Schutte and Alvin Seel. While the petition includes the augmented drainage board, the deputy state drain commissioner and two Arenac officials as defendants, the principal defendants are Iosco and Ogemaw Counties and officials of those counties, who have been steadfast in opposition to involvement in the drainage proposal for a number of years.

Listed as defendants from Iosco County are Robert Foster, chairman of the county board of commissioners; Arthur Aulerich, member of the board of commissioners; John Mielock, county drain commissioner. Ogemaw officials named on the petition are Sherman Lucas, Ogemaw County Board of Commissioners; Russ Mason, Ogemaw County finance committee; Clyde Shulton, Ogemaw County drain commissioner.

On March 27, a conference was held before Judge Swallow and it was determined that attorneys for the defendants would meet with W.

J. Drillock, attorney for the plaintiffs, to receive complete documentation as to the nature of the project, the manner of its proposed implementation and its estimated cost.

On July 17, county boards of commissioners for Iosco and Ogemaw independently approved the hiring of Wade, Trim and Associates to conduct an independent survey. Cost of the work is to be \$10,000 and is to be equally divided between the two counties.

Acting with Tyler as attorney for Iosco is Charles L. Burleigh Jr., attorney for Ogemaw County.

In April of this year, Judge Swallow denied a motion by the attorney for AuGres farmers to have the six Iosco and Ogemaw officials removed from the augmented drainage board. The judge ruled that composition of the board is set by law and that he had no authority to appoint different members.

Because of technicalities involving the augmented drain board meeting in August 1973, Judge Swallow ruled that the meeting legally was never held and ordered the board to reconvene at some future date to consider the drain proposal.

The engineering study to be made by the firm representing Iosco and Ogemaw Counties would be presented at a meeting of the augmented drainage board, along with engineering being proposed by Arenac County and the state department of agriculture. It is expected that 90 days would be required to prepare the new engineering report.

A year ago this month, an augmented drainage board made up of nine Arenac, Ogemaw and Iosco officials, along with Stanley Quackenbush, state deputy drain commissioner for the department of agriculture, voted six to four to stop an intercounty river control proposal promoted by Arenac County. Representatives of the two upstream counties voted against the proposal.

Iosco and Ogemaw Counties have opposed various drainage proposals for the AuGres River for 35 or more years, seeing it as an additional tax burden which would result in little or no benefit to those counties. However, a drainage district was established many years ago to divert water from the East Branch of the AuGres River, formerly entering the AuGres River, to the Whitney Drain.

In recent months, drainage conditions on the mainstream of the AuGres River may have been complicated by the fact that structures in a new state marina at AuGres have been placed too far into the river. Dedication of the new marina was to have been held in July, but was postponed after an investigation pointed out the new problem.

Although responsibility for the error in construction has not been established yet, AuGres area farmers fear that projections into the river will impede the flow of water into Saginaw Bay during the spring runoff.

Hale School's Tax Notes Get State Approval

Atty. Gen. Frank J. Kelly, chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission, announced Thursday, August 15, that the commission approved \$150,000 of Tax Anticipation Notes for Hale Area Schools, Counties of Iosco and Ogemaw. Kelley said, "The proceeds will be used to operate the school district until the collection of current taxes. These notes are dated September 1, 1974, to be due April 1, 1975, and will carry a maximum interest rate of eight percent per annum."

Other members of the Municipal Finance Commission are Allison Green, state treasurer, and John W. Porter, superintendent of public instruction.

Civilians Receive Praise From WAFB

Three hard-working civilian members of the 379th Transportation Squadron, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, were recently recognized for their accomplishments by Maj. Ray V. McManus, squadron commander.

Henry Newhouse of Tawas City, Leroy H. Greshover of Oscoda and Lloyd C. Nicholson of Mikado were cited for their conscientious support of Cub Scout Pack No. 991. The pack is sponsored by men and women of the transportation squadron.

Each of these gentlemen contributed many hours of his time and talents in the construction of several major projects for the youngsters. Included in the list of contributions were space derby

and pinewood derby tracks and the Cub Corner, where the monthly pack meeting is held.

In addition, these three gentlemen have been invaluable in the Vehicle Operations Branch, where their expertise has been utilized in accomplishing Operation's Self-Help projects, a program in which a unit's assigned personnel perform additional duties, such as painting and making minor repairs, in an effort to save the engineering staff extra work and, in turn, taxpayers' money.

Most recently, the three men have been instrumental in organizing materials for the upcoming Step-Van Rodeo, a test of driving skill and maintenance among military step-van drivers throughout Wurtsmith.

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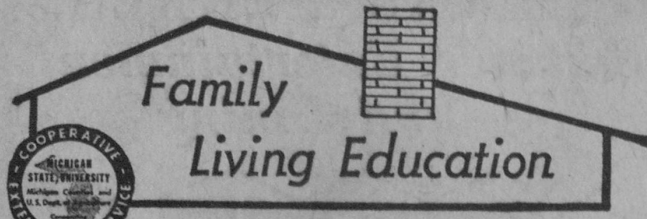

Canning tomatoes? You may need to change your ways—especially if you are one of the home-makers who says, "but I have always done it the open kettle

way." We need to take a good look at our old methods of processing new varieties of fruits and vegetables.

In fact, in the August Consumer Report magazine, there was an article on "Canning Tomatoes? Here's Something To Worry About." It said everyone canning tomatoes at home should use the pressure canning method only, to eliminate the hazard of botulism poisoning in the new low acid varieties of tomatoes.

Let us take a look at this. What is the word from our food specialist at Michigan State University, East Lansing? Here it is:

"There is no doubt that the vast majority of tomatoes now being used for home canning contains sufficient natural acid to be safely processed by the usual boiling-water bath method used for high-acid foods. However, the introduction in recent years of 'low-acid' tomato varieties has raised some legitimate doubts about the adequacy of the canning process for such varieties.

"For those who wish added assurance that their tomatoes and tomato juice are 'high-acid' and, thus, can be safely processed by the boiling-water bath method, you may suggest the addition of three teaspoons of lemon juice to each quart of tomatoes or tomato juice (1½ teaspoon per pint). Although most home-canned tomatoes do not require the extra acid contributed by the lemon juice, it can do no

harm. The slightly more acidic flavor which may be noticeable to some consumers can, if desired, be counteracted by adding a little extra sugar (approximately two to three teaspoons per quart)."

This information is from Doctor Wishnitsky, professor of food science and human nutrition at Michigan State University.

To hot pack tomatoes for boiling water processing, wash and rinse tomatoes thoroughly to remove all garden soil. Use firm, ripe tomatoes. Dip into boiling water for about one-half minute, then dip into cold water. Peel. Leave smaller tomatoes whole, half or quarter larger tomatoes. Bring to low boil, stirring gently. Pack hot tomatoes into glass jars to one-half inch of top. Add one-half teaspoon salt to pints, one teaspoon to quarts. Adjust jar lids. Process in boiling water bath, pint jars for 20 minutes, quart jars for 25 minutes.

Acidity: Tomatoes fall at the breakpoint in acid activity (pH). However, the acid activity is sufficient to permit processing by the boiling water method. In some of the newer varieties, the total or titratable acidity may be lower than in older varieties but the acid activity is not decreased to the point requiring the use of the pressure canner. Spoilage in canned tomatoes frequently occurs because they are not washed thoroughly enough to remove all of the garden soil.

Dr. Portia Morris, extension food specialist, reports that it is important to emphasize sanitation in home preparation. This will remove most of the soil bacteria which often is the reason for spoilage in canned tomatoes. She also tells us to emphasize the importance of sanitary conditions in all our canning methods at home. To avoid development of flat sour bacteria, Doctor Morris suggests that 10 minutes be added to the processing time of the boiling water bath.

If you would like up-to-date canning information and processing time tables, call or write the cooperative extension office in Iosco County. There is a copy of the bulletin, "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables," available upon request at no cost.

Generally parents 62 or over who were dependent on a working son or daughter for at least one-half of their support can get benefits on the deceased child's record. 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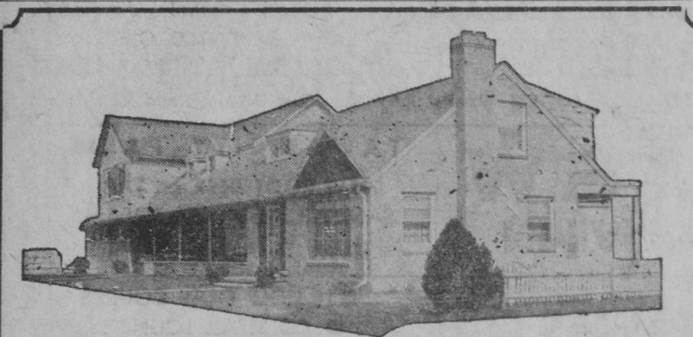

Although parts of the state are dry, consumers should be able to find most of their favorite fruits and vegetables at roadside markets and pick-your-own sites.

The recent home gardening boom may benefit roadside and pick-your-own operators, adds Glen Antle, MSU district extension marketing agent. When people discover the work and cost involved in producing a good-sized home garden, they may be drawn even more to the roadside and U-pick market to buy fresh produce at good prices.

Question On Property Value Is Answered

Question: When my property was assessed a few months ago, the market value of my home was listed as \$22,000. Will this count against me when I apply for supplemental security income payments?

Answer: Probably not. A home of reasonable value does not count as a resource under the supplemental security income program. Generally, a home with a market

value of \$25,000 or less based on the latest real estate tax statement is considered a home of reasonable value. In Alaska and Hawaii, the amount is \$35,000 or less.

Question: I am 69 and get social security benefits, but I still work. Back in January, I sent a report to social security telling them how much I thought I would earn this year. I have already earned more than I said I would. Do I have to make another report?

Answer: Yes. If you do not report the change in your estimated earnings, you may get social security benefits not due you and then have to pay back some money at the end of the year.

Your benefits will not be affect-

ed if you earn \$2,400 or less for the year. If you earn over \$2,400 for the year, your benefits will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 over \$2,400. But no matter how much you earn for the year, you will get your full benefit for any month in which you neither earn over \$200 nor do substantial work in your business.

You can report estimated earnings changes on the post card sent to you. If you do not have the post card, you can call any social security office and the people there will help you make this report.

Question: I am 62 years old. Until he died last month, my son helped to support me. The only income I have now is \$15 a week from a boarder who rents an up-

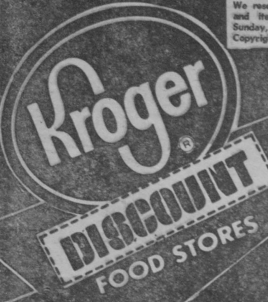

Medicare Claims Contain Errors

According to a recent study, over 50 percent of the medicare claims contain errors which could delay payment of the claim.

John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City, urged medicare beneficiaries to check their claims carefully before mailing them to Michigan Medical Service in Detroit. "A few extra minutes' attention makes the difference between a claim payment or a claim that is delayed several weeks," Carr said.

Carr mentioned several things a medicare beneficiary can do to assure the prompt processing of his claim. First, be sure the complete medicare claim number is written on each bill being submitted, as well as on the claim form itself. "This way," Carr said, "the bills can be easily identified if they should become detached from the claim form." The bills should be attached to the back of the SSA-1490, Request for Medicare Payment.

Second, be sure the bills being submitted are itemized and show the name of the doctor, the date and place the services were received, the amount charged and, most importantly, a description of the illness or injury which required the doctor's services. "Bills just listing 'office call' or 'consultation' will not be accepted by medicare," Carr continued. If a group of doctors are in practice together, the name of the doctor who treated the patient must be circled. "Bills for ambulance service must have a statement from a doctor that the ambulance was medically necessary."

Third, the bills should be submitted to medicare as soon as they total the \$60 annual deductible or more and then submitted periodically after that. "Holding the bills until the end of the year creates a nationwide backlog and delays the processing of the claim," Carr said.

Finally, Carr mentioned several things which are not covered by

medicare and for which bills should not be submitted. These include prescription drugs, routine physical checkups, routine eye examinations and glasses, dentures and hearing aids.

Anyone needing assistance in submitting a medicare claim should contact the Bay City social security office at 1009 North Madison. The telephone number is 892-1174.

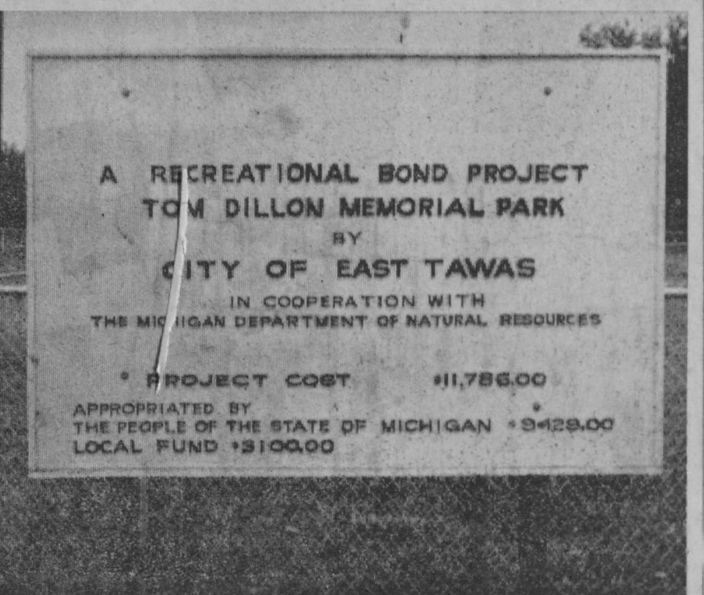
