

Hale School Voters Approve Millage

A record turnout of voters Monday saw Hale Area School District approve a crucial operational millage proposal for two years to guarantee that the school will run for a full year with a full program.

A total of 1,317 voters received ballots and 708 voters were in favor of the proposal while 596 "no" ballots were cast. There were 13 spoiled ballots.

The previous voter high was in the August millage election two years ago when 1,284 ballots were handed out to voters.

The special millage proposal

adopted calls for 12.5 renewal and 2.25 mills additional, giving the school a total of 24 mills of taxes for operation under a \$900,000 budget. Included in the total is 9.25 mills of taxes allocated from general property taxes.

This was the third and final time that a proposal could be submitted to voters because of the state's requirement of a 45-day waiting period before the next election. The deadline for final millage votes this year is September 30.

"The board of education, administrators and staff are highly elated over the results of Monday's

vote," said Supt. Wayne Case, who took over as the school's chief administrator on July 1. "We are pleased that voters of the district support this school system wholeheartedly."

Case had particular praise for members of Hale Area League for Better Education, who have worked hard for the past several weeks to get the message across to voters that approval of the millage was a necessity.

"Many different people worked diligently to insure the continued operation of this school system," he stated. Approximately 75 per-

sons signed up originally with the HALBE committee to contact individual voters.

In addition, Superintendent Case has been spending the past month meeting with voters of the district and explaining school needs. A final bulletin explaining the millage and answering questions raised by residents was mailed last week to 1,600 households in the district.

On two previous occasions this year, millage proposals were rejected by voters. Two weeks ago, the board of education adopted a resolution stating that, should the proposal again be rejected, the

school would be forced to operate until the money runs out and then would shut down. It was estimated that the district would be out of money sometime in November.

"The entire board of education was on hand during the counting of ballots Monday night and members were pleased with the excellent turnout of voters," said Case.

Like all schools of the county, Hale Area School is scheduled to have an orientation meeting Tuesday, September 3, for teachers and students are to report to classes on Wednesday, September 4.

Front Foot Sewer Cost Slated Where Assessment Lacking

A new program establishing a rate of \$9 per front foot for property on established sewer mains, but which have never previously been assessed for the construction, was adopted Monday night by the Tawas City Water Board.

Building lots involved are located in areas of the city where subdividers and the city cooperated to pay the expense of extending sewer along streets to serve new subdivisions and where sewer mains were constructed in recent years at city expense.

Included would be vacant lots in such areas as the east side of First Avenue from North Street to Burrell Subdivision, the east side of Third Avenue from First Street to North Street, vacant lots along Ninth Avenue where the city paid the expense of a sewer in 1951.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said he was in the process of researching other areas of the city where

sewer had been constructed in recent years and where property owners had never paid an assessment for the cost of construction.

In addition to the \$9 per front foot cost, the prevailing interest rate would be added after January 1976. The regular sewer connection charge of \$225 would also be made when service is requested for an undeveloped lot.

In other business, the water board authorized extension of a water main to serve a professional building being proposed by Dr. Thomas H. Dawson at the corner of M-55 and German Street. The extension is contingent on rezoning of the property by the city council. The owner has agreed to connect to a sanitary sewer when it becomes available.

The water board authorized purchase of materials for water main projects to be financed under a federal loan.

Bd. of Education Approves Hiring 5 New Teachers

Contracts for the hiring of five new teachers were approved Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

On recommendation of Prin. John Alexander, the following high school teachers were hired:

Mrs. Sandra Helms, high school and middle school librarian. She is a graduate of Alpena High School, Alpena Community College and is a 1970 graduate of Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant. Her previous employment included the CMU Library and Alpena City Library.

Mrs. Prudence Welsh, home economics. She is a graduate of Pennsylvania State University and has two years of teaching experience. Her last year of teaching was at Oscoda.

Thomas Rykalski, vocational business education. He is a December 1973 graduate of Western Michigan University, Kalamazoo.

On recommendation of Robert McDonald, middle school principal, the following teachers were hired:

John Bradke, sixth and seventh grade social studies. He is a 1974 graduate of Central Michigan University.

Catherine Butch, special English and reading in grades six, seven

and eight. A native of Standish, she is a graduate of Central Michigan University and taught school for three years at Swartz Creek.

In other business, three changes in school policies were adopted. One change requires that all out-of-town school related trips of all school personnel be cleared at a regular meeting of the board of education. The second requires that administrators are accountable for all phone calls from each office. The third limits the term of office of the president, secretary and treasurer of the board of education to two years. It was stated that this last action was being taken in order to rotate all offices among members.

The board of education authorized advertising for bids for the sale of the building trades house located on First Avenue in Tawas City. A minimum bid was established at \$23,800 and bids are to be accepted at the superintendent's office until 12 o'clock noon, Monday, September 23. It is required that a performance bond or \$500 cashier's check accompany each bid.

The three-bedroom house, with 1½ baths, was a project last year of the school's building trades class.

Board Authorizes Bus Purchase In Emergency Move

Meeting Monday night to take final action on matters prior to the opening of school on September 3, the Tawas Area Board of Education authorized the purchase of two additional buses for its fleet.

At its last meeting, the board of education learned that delivery of two buses ordered during the last term would now be delayed until about March due to construction difficulties by the manufacturer. School authorities learned, also, that the bid presented by Ottawa Equipment Company was "firm" and the contract price previously quoted would be honored on delivery.

Because of the fact that bus mileage doubled last year with the advent of split school sessions, the board of education authorized purchase of two additional buses which was provided for in the 1974-75 contract.

Authorization was given to order two buses with Bluebird bodies and Ford chassis which are presently available and are expected to be delivered prior to the start of school. Because of inflation, however, the total cost of the buses will be \$30,000, as compared to the \$22,000 estimate provided in the budget for this term.

Carl Babcock, a member of the board of education's transportation committee, said that a study would continue on the possibility of leasing buses rather than outright purchase. School buses are amortized over a period of seven years through transportation money received from the state but, because of this school system's split session arrangement, buses are receiving 14 years of wear during the seven-year period.

In other business, bids were opened and surplus shop equipment was sold to the highest bidder. G. W. Miller of Oscoda submitted a bid of \$125 on a band saw; Maurice Faulstich of Whittemore had high bids of \$125 on a radial arm saw, \$75 on a drill press and \$45 on a jig saw; Raymond Gettel had the high bid of \$100 for a second drill press.

Money received from the sale of surplus equipment is to be used for purchase of additional tools for the shop. A total of 22 bids were received.

Authorization was given to purchase a Sunscope testing machine for the auto mechanics shop. A portion of the cost is to come from vocational training money received from the state. Cost of the equipment, used for engine tune-ups, will be \$5,333. Steven Hitch, instructor, said that the new machine would be an invaluable tool in the school's auto shop instructional program.

Only Minor Injury In Freak Crash

Harold R. Rollin, 61, Tawas City, escaped serious injury in a freak accident last week on US-23, south of Tawas City.

Investigating state police said that Gerald W. Loy, 37, Tawas City, was traveling south with a sheet of plywood in the trunk of his car. A truck passed in the opposite direction and the resulting wind whipped the plywood out of the trunk and sailed it against Rollin's car. The vent window and mirror on Rollin's car were smashed and a fender was dented. The driver received a minor cut on the arm.

A two-year-old Alabaster girl, Erica Lynne Shepardson, sustained bruises and abrasions in an accident near her home. Investigating officers said that a truck operated by Richard P. Bernhardt, 31, Tawas City, backed out of a driveway at Alabaster and struck the girl, who was on her tricycle.

Eight breakings and enterings in Arenac, Iosco and Alcona Counties are under investigation by state police.

Outline Program for Tawas River Canoe Race on September 14-15

Program for the 20th annual Tawas River Canoe Race on September 14-15 was announced this week by Michael Reed and Robert Jones, co-chairmen for the 1974 event.

Proceeds from entry fees are to be donated to the cystic fibrosis campaign.

The program Saturday, September 14, starts at 11:00 a. m. with a canoe parade in the river from the boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue to the US-23 bridge and return.

The men's amateur pole race starts at 1:00 p. m. and the course

starts at 12 o'clock noon, followed by the junior men's race at 12:45 p. m. Pole race for the professional men's division starts at 1:45 p. m., to be followed by the race for junior women at 2:00 p. m., the mixed doubles race at 3:30 p. m., senior race at 3:35 p. m. and canoe jousting at 3:45 p. m.

The program Sunday, September 15, starts at 12 o'clock noon with the men's amateur canoe race, followed by the men's novice division at 12:15 p. m.

The men's professional race starts at 1:00 p. m. and the course

will be from the boat ramp to Tawas Lake and return. Cash prizes in the amount of \$100 per mile will be offered.

The women's professional race starts at 1:05 p. m. along a shorter river course. Prize money of \$175 will be divided among the first three places.

The women's novice or amateur race starts at 1:15 p. m., to be followed by a four-man war canoe race at 2:15 and a "little pro" race for children five years of age at 2:20 p. m. This will start at the boat launching ramp to the US-23

bridge and back to the starting point.

A corn roast and trophy ceremony are to be held starting at 3:30 p. m. at the Tawas City Park.

All canoes entered must conform to the Michigan Canoe Racing Association specifications. Canoes must check in at the boat launching ramp on Ninth Avenue prior to 11:30 a. m. All contestants are required to wear approved life jackets or belt type preservers.

All racing will take place in the river.

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Return of Steam

RESTORATION of an ancient steam locomotive, which has been in the process for the past five years, is being completed this week at the shop of the Detroit and Mackinac Railway. It is expected that a test run for the locomotive will be made on the railroad's main line on Friday morning. The locomotive, a six-wheel Baldwin switch engine of the early 1900 era, was purchased five years ago from an Alpena scrap dealer after being decommissioned from service at a limestone quarry many years prior to 1969. The locomotive and coal tender are now in a "like new" condition with completely rebuilt boiler, valves, running gear and a new wooden cab. Much of the initial work on the massive restoration was handled by Larry Leslie and other members of the D&M shop crew. During the past several months, Clifford Linten of Lake City, who has many years experience working with steam locomotives, has been in charge of restoring the locomotive to operational order. Securing a locomotive to complement the railroad's antique wooden coaches and other restored rolling stock in the roundhouse museum has been the goal of Charles A. Pinkerton Jr., chairman of the board of directors. During preliminary testing in past weeks, it was the first time since about 1948 that a boiler had been fired up on a steam locomotive in the D&M yard. It was also the first time that residents had the pleasure of hearing a locomotive steam whistle in more than 25 years. This Baldwin locomotive, similar to switch engines used by the D&M until beginning the conversion to diesel power starting in 1946, has a deep-throated chime whistle. Included in the consist of Friday's "train" will be the red wooden caboose which was saved from the scrapper's torch and was on display for a number of years at the Tawas City Park. This car has now been completely restored.

State police, the sheriff's department and city police are investigating a series of vandalism complaints which took place last week.

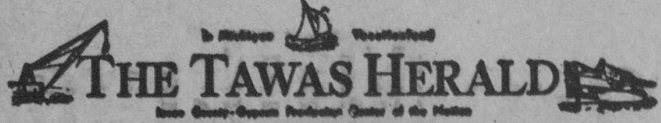
It was reported Wednesday that three small trees at Immaculate Heart of Mary Church, Tawas City, had been broken.

Mt. Clemens Man Held on Iosco Charges

An 18-year-old Mt. Clemens man, Sebastian G. Wandrie, is being held at the Iosco County Jail under \$3,500 cash bond while awaiting trial on a charge of auto theft and possession of marijuana.

Wandrie, captured on foot Thursday evening as he attempted to elude Oscoda Township police officers, was charged with stealing a car earlier that morning at the Pack House Inn, Oscoda.

After receiving the report of the stolen car, township officers received a telephone tip that the car could be found in the woods off M-41 near the VanEtan Lake campground.

Officers found the car stuck on a sand trail and, while awaiting the arrival of a wrecker, were notified by a passing motorist that several people were involved in a fight at VanEtan Lake campground.

On their arrival at the campground, officers saw two men flee into the woods. One officer stayed with the injured victims, who had been slashed by a broken wine bottle, and the other officer took up the trail of the fleeing men. One man was recognized upon apprehension and arrested on an outstanding traffic warrant, but the second man eluded capture.

A female juvenile, who had escaped from a state training school at Adrian, was arrested at the campground and turned over to Iosco Social Welfare authorities and a Detroit man involved in the fight was arrested on a drunk and disorderly charge and sentenced in district court to 10 days in jail.

At 6:00 p. m. Thursday, Wandrie was apprehended by officers about one mile from the VanEtan Lake campground and allegedly was the person who had evaded capture earlier.

Victims of the slashing declined to sign a complaint.

Charged With Theft

An Oscoda man and his son were arrested Thursday by Iosco Sheriff's Department and charged with the larceny of 49 timbers which were used by Consumers Power Company to protect Foote Dam from shoreline erosion on the Ausable River.

Arrested were Elmer Buchinger and his son, Bruce. They are charged with removing the timbers, which measure 12 to 20 feet in length, and using them to construct a boom at their landing on the river. Appraised value of the timbers is approximately \$1,900.

Other larcenies under investigation by the sheriff's department included a complaint from Floyd Schaa of Schaa Lumber Company, East Tawas. The firm's crew was working on a metal building at the Iosco County Airport and left a quantity of tools at the site. When the crew returned Thursday morning, tools valued at

\$830 were missing.

William Borosch reported Wednesday that two 28-foot trusses which he had stored outside his building on Mathews Street, Tawas City, were missing. He also reported that someone had removed property survey stakes and cut a tree down next to his building about two weeks ago.

Two personal injury accidents investigated by the sheriff's department included one Saturday in which Joy Moore, 21, Livonia, was treated Saturday at Tawas Hospital. She was operating a motorbike on a trail in Plainfield Township and struck a tree.

Louis W. Farhood, 16, Royal Oak, received a fractured leg August 20 and was treated at Tolfree Hospital, West Branch. Farhood was traveling west on North Lakeside Boulevard, Plainfield Township, and ran into a vehicle operated by Edward J. Zells, 63, Hale.

SS Disability Program Marks 17th Year

Over 3 1/2-million disabled workers and their families are getting monthly payments as the social security disability program begins its 17th year this month, according to John Carr, social security district manager, Bay City.

"Only disabled workers between 50 and 65 were eligible when the first social security disability benefits were paid in July 1957," Carr said.

"Today, workers of any age under 65 as well as dependent members of their families can have the protection of disability insurance," he said. "Since July of last year, medicare health insurance has been available to disabled people if they have been entitled to social security disability payments 24 or more consecutive months."

An insured worker becomes eligible for payments if he suffers a severe disability expected to keep him from working a year or longer. Payment begins for the sixth full month of disability.

Generally, a worker who becomes disabled in 1974 must have worked 5 1/2 years in employment covered by social security to be insured. Five years of the work must have been during the 10-year period before the disability began. Young workers, however, may be eligible for disability payments with as little as 1 1/2 years of work, depending on their age and when they became disabled.

"An individual 24 to 31 needs work credits for half the period between the time he became 21 and the time he became disabled," Carr explained. "Before age 24, a worker needs credit for only 1 1/2 years of work in the three-year period before his disability began."

When applying for social security disability payments, a worker submits medical evidence to establish disability. Physicians and other disability experts in the Michigan Department of Vocational Rehabilitation decide whether the worker is disabled under the social security law.

"In most cases," Carr said, "Vo-

national rehabilitation can decide on the basis of medical evidence from the applicant's physician. If more evidence is needed, additional medical tests may be required at the government's expense."

In selected cases, social security helps pay for vocational rehabilitation services, which can include

job training and physical therapy. Social security disability benefits are paid to over two-million disabled workers and over 1 1/2-million dependents. The average payment is \$205 a month. About 1.8-million people getting social security disability payments have medicare coverage, according to Carr.

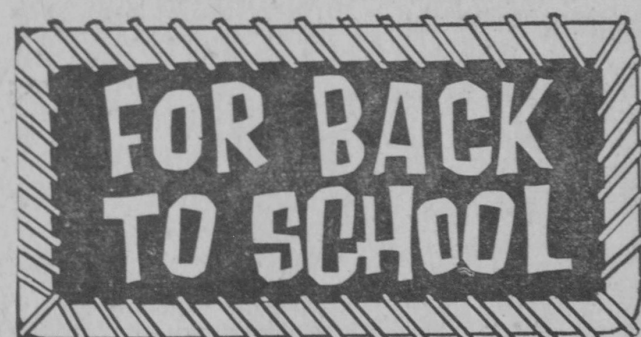

Mrs. McPherson was born April 15, 1888, in Wayne County. She resided in Millington for 70 years before moving to East Tawas in 1968.

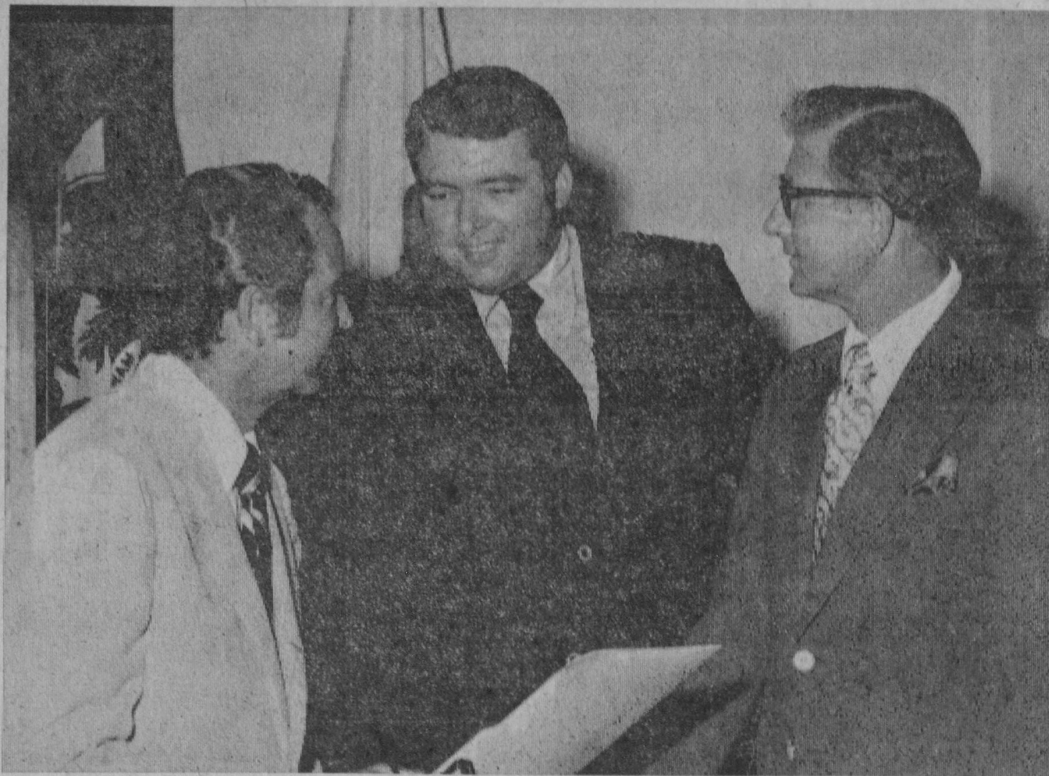

Hunting and Fishing Day, Hunter Safety Week Slated

Gov. William G. Milliken has proclaimed September 8-14 as Hunter Safety Week and September 28 as Michigan Hunting and Fishing Day.

The observances recognize the contribution of sportsmen toward hunter safety and conservation of natural resources. More than 325,

000 young people have learned to hunt safely and responsibly since the hunter safety program started in 1960. Some 3,500 instructors donate their time to this program.

"I urge all citizens—especially our young people—who are seeking hunting licenses, to contact their local conservation officers to enroll in the hunter safety training classes in their communities," Governor Milliken said.

He also commended hunters and fishermen, who will be observing Hunting and Fishing Day nationally on Saturday, September 28, for their work and concern to protect Michigan's valuable natural resources. Locally, the Iosco Sportsmen's Club will sponsor a program on that day at the organization's clubhouse at Tawas Centre.

"Hunters and fishermen—who many years ago saw the need for environmental protection and began to work for it—deserve special recognition as leaders in this effort," he said.



"By their own request, hunters and fishermen pay a tax on licenses, a tax that provides money for conservation programs, including purchase and maintenance of game areas," Milliken said.

"In addition to hunting, these areas provide valuable open space and homes for many nongame birds and animals," he added. "Without the timely and unselfish financial protection provided by the state's hunters and fishermen, many of these lands would now be unsuited for wildlife needs."

"The availability of recreational lands plays a major role in determining the quality of life in our state. Hunters and fishermen, being close to the land, were among the first to see changes in the quality of our environment, and to develop a strong and consistent concern for environmental protection."

"Residents of Michigan are indebted to these men and women. Their activities at many levels—as youth leaders in communities through such programs as hunter safety training; as supporters of strong but reasonable conservation legislation, and as backers of legal actions to protect the environment—have proved to be of immeasurable benefit to our state."

"I urge my fellow citizens to join me in saluting the hunters and fishermen of Michigan—men and women who stand with distinction among the outdoorsmen of our nation as we observe Michigan Hunting and Fishing Day, 1974."

Tawas Chamber of Commerce in Crash Membership Drive

A crash membership drive is being conducted this week, Monday through Friday, by Tawas Chamber of Commerce to raise finances necessary to support its new executive director in several important projects and to carry on normal chamber functions.

At a special conference with area news media Wednesday night, members of the board of directors reported that only 131 out of a potential membership list of more than 300 had paid dues this year.

"The chamber of commerce could be compared to a brand new automobile parked along the curb—it takes gas to run it," said Harris Barkman, chamber president.

During the past year, objectives and goals of the chamber of commerce have been altered dramatically from previous years. Rather than be the actual sponsoring organization for local promotional events, the chamber's full-time staff is devoted exclusively to the industrial, commercial and civic development of the Tawas area.

Such events as the Perchville USA Festival and Michigan Tourist Festival are now being sponsored by Tawas Area Promotions, while the Tawas River Canoe Race is being handled by a special committee. The chamber, however, assists these sponsoring groups with news releases and public relations.

An important function of the chamber is its continuing effort to maintain a central agency representing the principal civic and business interests where visitors may come for information.

The chamber also acts as a liaison between all lines and types of business, professions and local government; acts as the central publicity agency for the community; speaks for business with the state legislature and congress concerning laws and regulations affecting business; coordinates efforts of local business in building up facilities and prestige of Tawas area as a trading center.

One of the prime new functions of the chamber of commerce and W. D. "Mike" Nunn, its executive director, is the growing concern with many basic problems in every community, including parking, housing, planning, water supply and highway improvement.

Handling the leg work in this new role will be the executive director, Nunn, who was an East Tawas businessman for 28 years, has an extensive background in public service and was vice chairman of the Michigan State Highway Commission, as well as serving with the conservation department, county and state highway groups.

"One of our main objectives is to create interest at Lansing for the Tawas area, Iosco County and Northeastern Michigan," said Nunn.

As an example, Nunn plans to meet with officials of the state highway department in an effort to convince them of the need for improving US-23 with four lanes, rather than to wait for construction of an expressway in future years.

The door on a much-needed re-evaluation of US-23 by the state was cracked open slightly by officials of the City of Tawas City, who have pounded home the point that traffic counts should not be the only criteria for proposed highway improvements.

Mayor John Brugger of Tawas City told chamber directors Wednesday night that the city had pointed out to the highway department that there were many dangerous curves on the route of US-23 from Standish to Alpena, that the accident and fatality rate is high along this stretch of highway. In addition, the city has pointed out that the state stands to lose a portion of the highway should it fail to control water erosion along Tawas Bay.

As a result of the city's efforts, the highway department announced last week that it would re-evaluate its plans for US-23. Two weeks ago, the department announced it would improve drainage along US-23 below the Tawas River bridge and would construct a bicycle path from the US-23 intersection to Plank Road along M-55.

Nunn said he had met with representatives of several communities along US-23 to gain additional support and that he was to meet

with representatives of other communities. From his own personal experience on the highway commission, Nunn said a concerted effort under a regional concept by communities had an important impact on activities by the highway department.

"There are many things which could be done to improve US-23," said Nunn. As an example, he said a pedestrian overpass could be constructed at East Tawas to allow unimpaired foot traffic between the business district, the city park and Michigan Waterways Commission dock. He said that this would be most important when expansion and modernization of the dock is completed.

"Traverse City has one of these overpasses and that city does not have near as much walking traffic as is generated right here," said Nunn. He said, however, that the need for such improvements had to be pointed out to the highway department.

In addition to his concern for the highway, Nunn has become involved with Tawas City officials in their efforts to have the state locate a boat launching ramp and parking lot at the mouth of the Tawas River.

John Lippert, president of Peoples State Bank and a member of

the board of directors, pointed out that the state was most interested in locating a public launching facility on Tawas Bay and that all citizens should get behind this effort to insure that the Michigan Department of Natural Resources would continue its steelhead trout planting program in area waters.

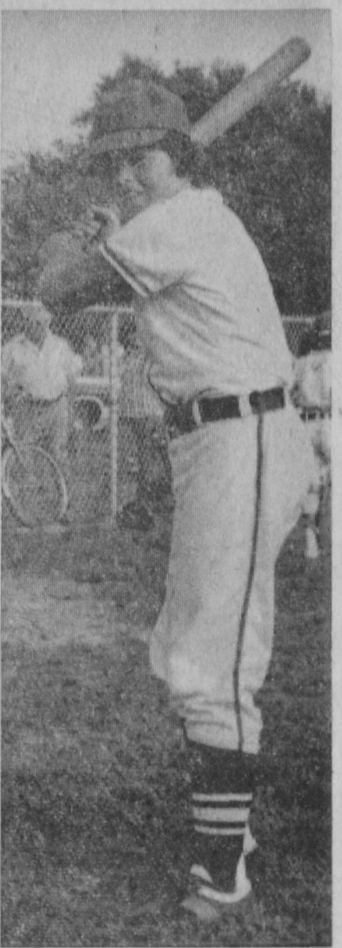
Another important area of Nunn's work will be to cooperate with city and township officials in their efforts to obtain federal and state financial assistance to improve water and sewer facilities, as well as to continue promotional efforts with Tawas Area Industrial Development Corporation to attract new industry.

The chamber of commerce's theme for this week's membership campaign is: "What is good for the Tawas area, in the long run, is good for you!" As a member of the Tawas Area Chamber of Commerce, the board of directors solicits the help of all members on committee work, in laying plans for future projects and "work that must be done."

City Makes Final Application for Low Interest FHA Loan

Necessary forms for a final application hearing on a proposed \$74,500 low interest loan from Farmers Home Administration for municipal improvements was received August 20 by the City of Tawas City.

Meeting with Paul Miller, coordinator for FHA loans, were City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz, City Atty. Kenneth Myles and Ralph Knopp of Edmands Engineering Company, Bay City.

Tawas City made application for an FHA loan a year ago. This month to finance two water loop systems and water main replacement. Although a pre-application hearing had been held, the loan was delayed due to the lack of an FHA coordinator for this state and a hold order from the federal government on all applications.

The city manager said last week that the next step would be to prepare forms for the final application and then hand-carry them through channels at Lansing.

Receipt of the low interest loan money is not expected until about February. It will be necessary for the city to make application for the loan to the Municipal Finance Commission and to proceed along

the same line as adopting a bond issue, which requires hearings, legal notices for sale of bonds and actual opening of bids.

Bublitz learned last week from the FHA official that the city could proceed with its plan to borrow money from the bank until receipt of the FHA loan in order to purchase materials necessary for the project. It is hoped that the water main construction can be accomplished in the very near future in order that work can be completed on several streets involved.

A delay in the city's timetable can be expected, however, as the federal government requires that all work to be accomplished under such a loan be handled by a private contractor, rather than use of city labor. Hiring of a private contractor would require the normal bidding procedure.

Should the city labor force perform the work, the loan could be only used for purchase of materials and equipment.

Bublitz said that the city attorney was to study ramifications in the wording of the final application as it prescribes that any money left from the loan at the end of the project be transferred to the

city general fund. He said this seemed to nullify any prohibition of use of the city crew.

The proposed loan would finance construction of a water loop system on Ninth Avenue and along US-23 to Michigan and Woodward Avenues. Another loop system would be installed on North Street from Eighth Avenue to Harris Avenue. These two loops would greatly improve the city's water distribution system.

In addition, it would finance water main replacement on Harris Avenue between Eighth Avenue and Tenth Avenue, which has proven most troublesome in recent years when the main ruptured during winter months. Short extensions of water mains are included on Victoria Lane and Beech Street.

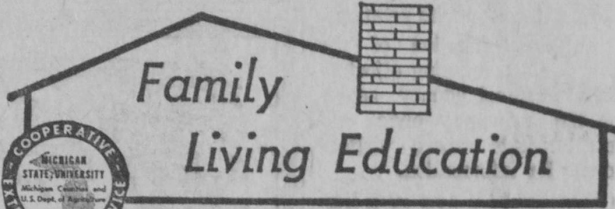

It is that time of year again, the best eating time. We have an abundance of Michigan-grown fruits and vegetables.

It is cheese time, too! Cheese is a natural to serve with our home harvest foods. Most popular cheese on the market in the United States is cheddar. Seven out of 10 pounds of cheese sold is cheddar, although it is known by many different names. Some people may call it American, others call it Longhorn or Daisy, for these are the shapes in which it is made.

Airtight and cold are two good pointers to remember when storing cheese. A heavy plastic wrap or container that fits the cheese closely is recommended to prevent cheese from drying out. Cold, preferably in the refrigerator, is necessary to prevent cheese from "miling off."

Next time you prepare scalloped potatoes, vary the recipe by adding shredded Swiss cheese to your white sauce along with a hint of basil and some chopped green onions. It is a nice flavor change from your usual recipe.

Liederkrantz is the name of a cheese that sounds foreign but it was actually invented in America. It is especially good with sour rye or pumpernickel breads topped with sliced sweet onions that have been marinated in oil and vinegar with salt and pepper. Cheeses are cured from 60 days to a year and prices are based on the degree of curing which is given the cheese. Save money by using a "younger" or less aged cheese where the fla-

vor is not as important as in some casseroles or soups. Serve aged cheese with fruits, wines or crackers.

Best ways to serve: Use a cheese board for most cheese. Most of these come with a spreader that is handy for spreading or even cutting the cheese.

Serve bread and crackers in a separate basket or container so the cheese board is not too crowded for cutting.

Thin-bladed knives do the best cutting job on semi-firm cheeses like the blue-veined ones such as blue cheese. Chunks of these taste better than thin slices. There are several ways to serve Edam and Gouda cheese. They may be cut in wedges with wax covering left on or they may be served with wax coating cut away at the top or turned back to form petals, with a cheese scoop or scooped out or with cheese whipped and returned to shell.

"Eyes" or holes in certain types of cheeses are caused by the bacteria used in their manufacture. These contribute to their nutlike flavor. Swiss cheese has the large holes while Gruyere has smaller ones.

Observe one cardinal rule in cooking cheese: Little cooking at low heat. Cheese is a protein food and like other similar foods, it is toughened by high heat as well as overcooking.

Since cheese is made from concentrated milk (10 pounds of milk to one pound of cheese), it is an excellent source of protein as well as calcium. Ounce for ounce, cheese has the same protein value as meat, poultry, fish or eggs. One and one-half ounces of Cheddar cheese contain about the same calcium as one cup of milk. To thaw cheese properly, leave it in its wrapper and let it thaw slowly in the refrigerator. This is the best way of preventing flavor loss and moisture. Your county extension office has a bulletin, free upon request, filled with information on cheese such as choosing, storing and recipes. It is called "Cheese in Family Meals." Write, phone or come into the office to get a copy.

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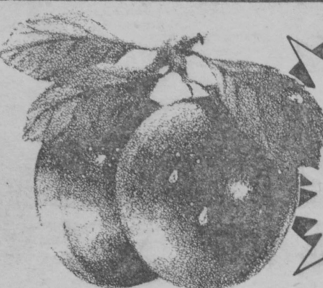

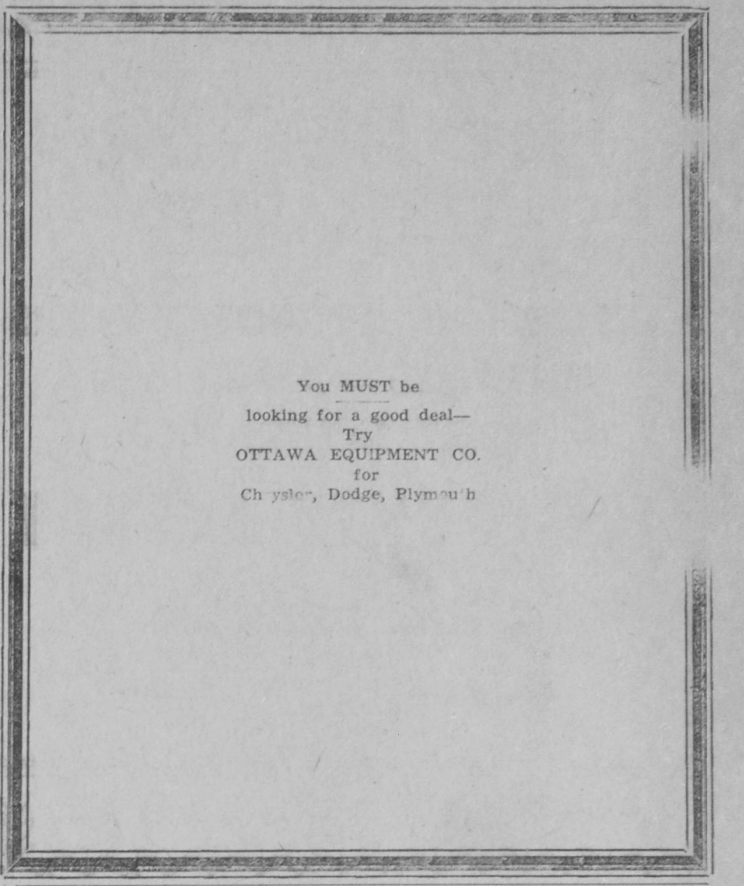

Skill Center Would Receive State-Fed. Grants of \$950,000

The proposed Isosco Intermediate School District Skill Center is in line for a grant of \$700,000 for construction and an additional \$250,000

will also be available for construction of the skill center. This will bring the total state and federal aid for construction of the Isosco Intermediate School District Vocational Skill Center to \$950,000.

On September 9, the voters will be asked to approve 1.98 mills to operate the skill center. According to state equalization laws and additional state funding, this 1.98 mills must be reduced to equalize state aid. This would have the effect of a reduction to .85 mills between 1974-77 to run the entire program, a considerable reduction to local taxpayers.

A skill center will provide youth and adults in the Hale, Oscoda, Tawas and Whittemore - Prescott School Districts an opportunity to learn job skills, to make them more competitive for higher paying and more challenging jobs. Seventy percent of the area youth do not go to college. Can the economy tolerate unemployed, unskilled labor? The answer to this question is NO. "We must train our citizens for jobs for which they can demand a fair wage. In doing so we increase our economic productivity, bring income to our local towns and increase pride in our communities. A vocational skill center can provide training for jobs to meet these objectives. Job training is essential for employment in today's competition on the job market. Isosco Intermediate School District Skill Center will provide this training," stated Donald Currey, who may be contacted for further information at the Isosco Intermediate School District office, East Tawas, phone 362-2461.

He began using a small spoon lure with a down rigger to keep the lure at the bottom of the bay, where the water temperature is about 53 degrees. The change in fishing technique brought immediate results. The Michigan Department of Natural Resources, which planted the brown and lake trout, believes the Tawas Bay area and Lake Huron from Thunder Bay to Oscoda should provide great fishing in the weeks ahead.—Tawas Herald Photo.

Isosco Opposes AuGres River Drainage Plan

15 Years Ago—

August 27, 1959—Isosco County Board of Supervisors has gone on record opposing the inclusion of Isosco County in a drainage and flood control project on the AuGres River. The corps of engineers is considering a project which would

start at the mouth of the AuGres River and extend upstream about 11 miles. Total estimated cost of the project is \$2,000,000 and it is proposed that about 34 percent of the total be shared by Arenac, Isosco and Ogemaw Counties.

Tawas City Airport has been leased to Timber Sky Camp of South Branch and is operated under the management of Larry Spicer.

According to reliable reports, Moscow's jamming of radio programs has tuned down the "Voice of America" to a mere whisper of its former self.

Cecil Cable petitioned the Tawas City Council to have garbage collected twice each week from restaurants and resorts during July and August.

The rubber game of a three-game series between the West Branch American Legion and East Tawas CYO was won by the West Branch team, 2-1. This game was a brilliant pitching duel between Richardson of West Branch and Donald Reinke of the CYO. Jack Mandock

had the only hit for East Tawas.

35 Years Ago—

August 25, 1939—H. Read Smith, Tawas City attorney, has been appointed Isosco probate judge by Governor Dickenson to fill a vacancy caused by the death of Judge David Davison.

Harbor facilities at the mouth of Tawas River are being used to full capacity this summer. Pleasure cruisers from Saginaw, Bay City, Detroit and other points have been using the dock during the past week. This emphasizes the need of further improvements on the project. The present improvements have been made by individual citizens.

In a twilight game Wednesday, Tawas City lost a six-inning game to the House of David, 4-0. Gordon Myles, Tawas City's southpaw, handled the pitching assignment for the locals and allowed five scratch hits.
