

# TA Board Ratifies Teaching Contract

A new wage contract with 91 teachers represented by Tawas Area Education Association was accepted Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

The pact had been ratified by the TAEA membership about two weeks ago, but injury to the board's negotiator, Thomas Basil, caused a delay of about two weeks.

The new salary schedule calls for a base pay of \$8,500 for a teacher holding a bachelor degree, with a top pay of \$13,250 for a teacher holding a bachelor degree with 10 years of experience. Last year, the base pay was \$8,100 with a top pay of \$12,450.

Base pay for a teacher with a master degree would be \$9,025, as compared to \$8,550 last term. A teacher with a master degree and 10 years of experience would be paid \$14,275, as compared to \$13,464 under the old contract.

Teachers are also paid according to a schedule for hours of education beyond both the bachelor and master degrees.

One of the important new points of the negotiated contract is longevity pay. Teachers who have been in the local school system for more than 11 years, but less than 16 years, would receive an additional \$100 annually; a teacher who has been a member of the system for a continuous period of 16 years, but not more than 20, would receive \$150; a teacher with more than 20 years of service would receive an additional \$200.

Terms of the new contract are to be in force until June 30, 1976, with the exception of salaries and fringe benefits, which are negotiated on an annual basis.

## Dr. J. J. Austin Died Monday; Funeral Aug. 8

Dr. Justus J. Austin, retired general medical practitioner and former chief of staff of Tawas Hospital, died Monday, August 5, at his home on Austin Trail, Wilber Township.

Funeral services are to be conducted Thursday, August 8, 10:30 a. m., at Grace Lutheran Church, East Tawas, with the Rev. William A. Graf officiating. Burial will be in Memory Gardens Cemetery, Tawas City. Friends may call at E. D. Jacques and Son Funeral Home, Tawas City.

Born November 16, 1904, at Belleville, he married the former Rachel Brevik, who survives him. Graduating from the Wayne Medical School in 1932, he spent one year of internship at Ford Hospital and one year of residency at Seymour Hospital, Detroit, before establishing his general practice in November 1934 in Tawas City.

Opening his practice on Mathews Street, he later moved to an office in the Keiser Building and, following World War II, established his office at East Tawas.

He retired from practice about 10 years ago.

During his more than 30 years as a resident of Tawas City, he took an active part in community affairs, served as president of Tawas City Board of Education before reorganization of area schools and was a member of the original board of directors of Tawas Hospital.

Besides his wife, he is survived by one son, Justus J. Austin Jr. of Utica; a daughter, Mrs. Judy Currie of Spring, Texas; three grandchildren; a sister, Mrs. Margaret S. Guthrie of Dearborn.

## TA Opening Day Change Considered

Opening date for Tawas Area School's fall term, previously announced as August 26, may be changed next week due to a later opening date for three other Iosco schools and the intermediate school district.

Supt. Edward J. Barry told members of the board of education Monday night that a tentative agreement had been reached by superintendents several weeks ago to open school on August 26. However, both Hale Area School and Oscoda Area School are holding millage elections later in the month and boards of education of those districts voted to start the term on September 3. Whittemore-Prescott Area School also opens on that same date.

Barry said that schools of the county cooperate in a shared time vocational program and believed that all schools should have a uniform starting day. The same is

true for Iosco Intermediate School District, which provides special education for the three schools and does not open its term until after Labor Day.

The school calendar, as adopted by the board of education, is a negotiable item and approved by Tawas Area Education Association with an August 26 opening date. Barry is meeting with the president of TAEA to determine if a change in the opening date would be reconsidered.

If the change is acceptable, Barry will recommend at next Monday night's regular meeting of the board of education to have the teacher orientation day changed to September 3 and the first day of school for students on September 4, the same as the other three schools in the county.

Barry said that much criticism had been received over the proposed August 26 opening date. He said that many students work until after Labor Day.

In other business, Prin. John Alexander requested the news media to publicize the fact that the school has no intention of starting daily classes any earlier than the 6:50 starting time which was in effect last year under the split session arrangement. He said he received numerous calls about a rumored earlier starting time.

A new school bus policy concerning use of buses for trips is being developed and is to be adopted at next Monday night's regular meeting. Basically, the new policy would allow use of school buses for transportation as long as the group is sponsored through the school's community education program. Trips would require approval by the board of education. Concern has been expressed by board members about the liability of the school when buses are used for groups not connected with a school activity.

The high school principal recommended the following coaching assignments, which were adopted by the board of education: Dennis Tibbets, boys' track coach; Steven Wilson, assistant boys' track coach; John Walton, boys' varsity baseball coach; Joseph Disette, boys' junior varsity basketball coach; Betty Cobb, girls' varsity basketball and softball coach; Marcia Sztanyo, girls' volleyball coach.

Joan Harris, who is not a member of the faculty, was hired as the pompon girls coach. She is a former member of the group of girls which participates in football half-time activities of the band.

Vacancies yet to be filled include the girls' track coach, girls' junior varsity basketball coach and faculty manager.

Alexander's recommendations for departmental chairmanships adopted by the board of education included Mrs. Ellen Evans, English department; James Wasylk, mathematics department; Larry VanWagoner, science department; James Papenfuss, social studies department; Gene Salamony, fine arts department.

Janet McArthur is the yearbook adviser, Charles Bailey is to handle dramatics and forensics and Robert Erickson is the debate coach.

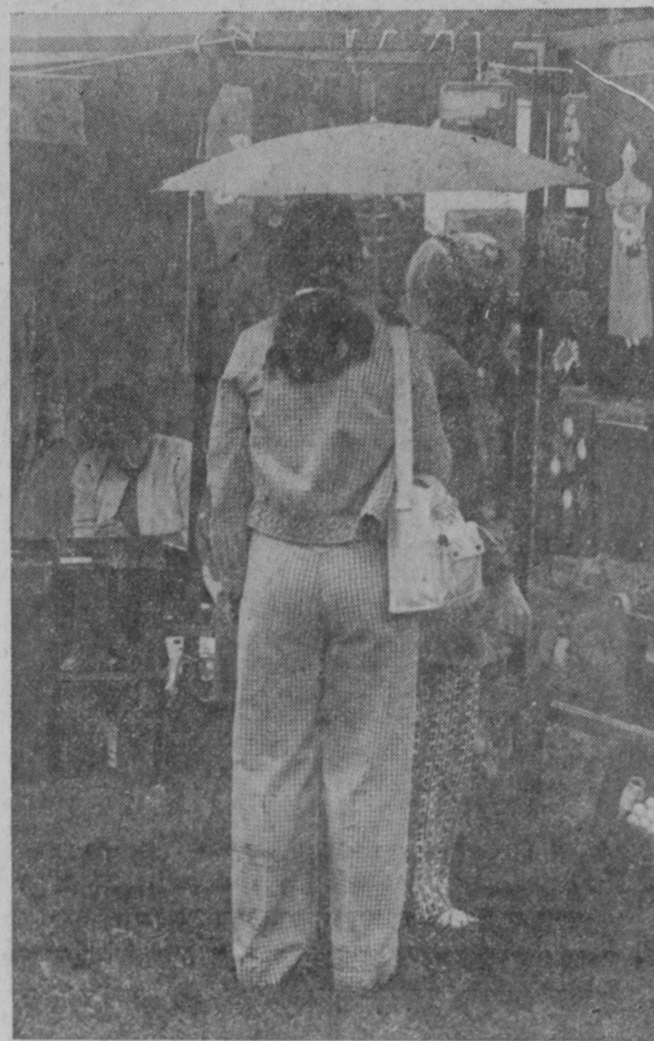
## Light Vote

Despite perfect weather conditions and a number of races on state and local tickets, Iosco voters avoided the polls in Tuesday's primary election.

D. Keith Pappas, county clerk, reported at 10 o'clock Tuesday night that a spot check of polling places around the county indicated that only about 30 percent of the registered voters showed up at the polls.

There were 380 out of Tawas City's 1,086 voters who showed up at the polls, while only 600 of approximately 3,000 voters at Oscoda cast their ballots. The same was apparently true for other districts of the county.

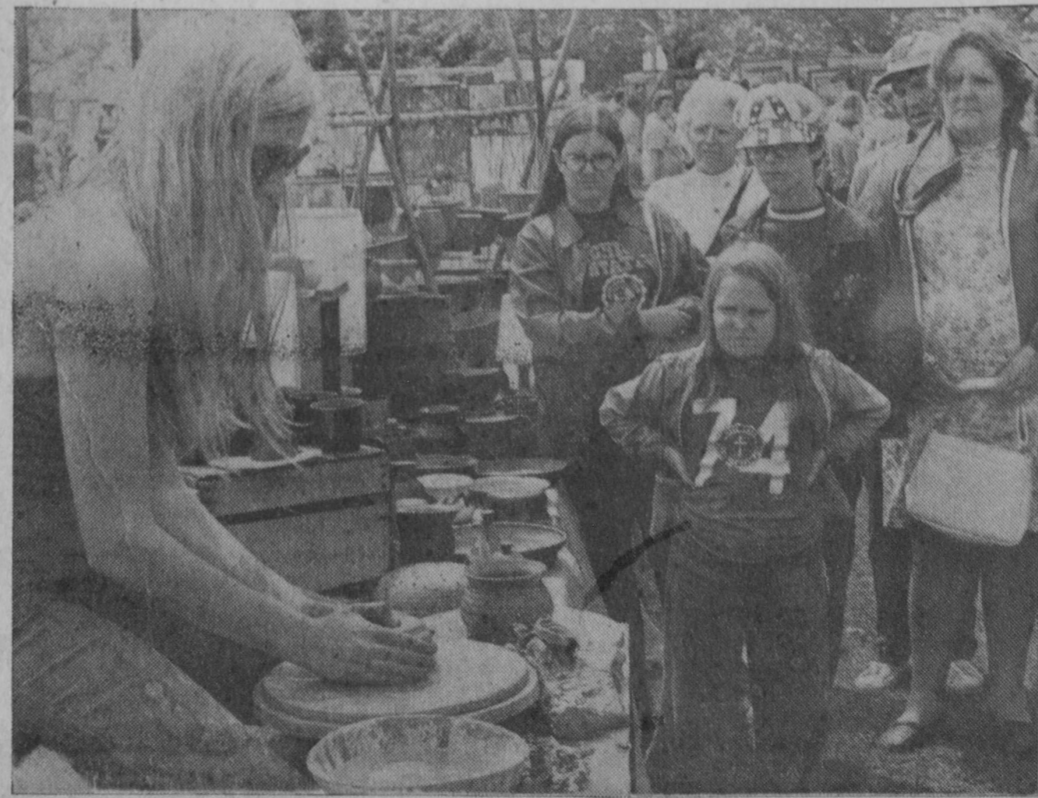

**The Upper Room**

(Read John 5:19-29)  
Verily, verily, I say unto you, He that heareth my word, and believeth in him that sent me, hath everlasting life, and shall not come into condemnation but is passed from death unto life. (John 5:24)

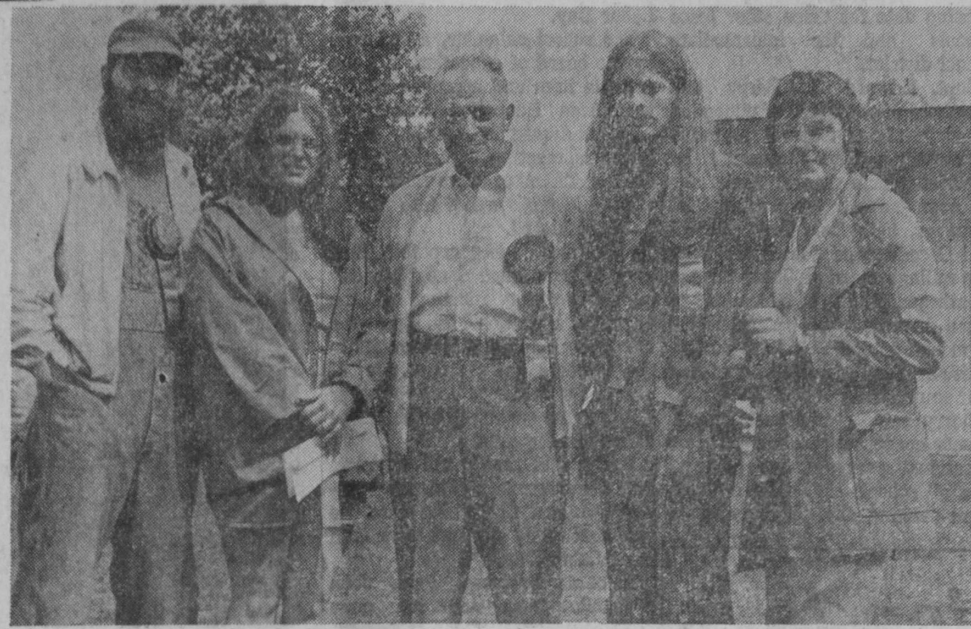

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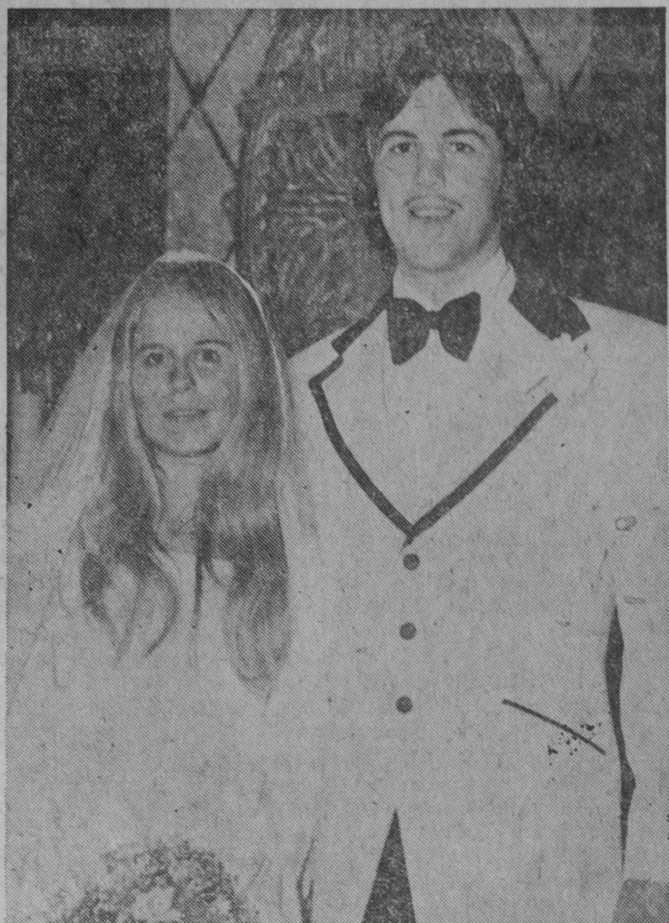

## Launching Site Gets One Endorsement; Expect More Letters

A letter endorsing development of the Tawas River mouth as a small boat launching site, being considered jointly by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and Tawas City, was received Monday from Leonard Hosbach, Tawas City postmaster.

Hosbach expressed the opinion that the development would greatly benefit local residents and visitors, alike, and encouraged the city council to proceed with its interest in the program.

Mayor John N. Brugger said that similar letters were expected from businessmen and would be presented to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, which has asked the area to give some indication of its thoughts toward the proposal.

Brugger said the natural resources commission is expected to hold its October meeting in this area and arrangements are being made for members to inspect the proposed site.

Petitions asking development of the river mouth are being circulated in area gasoline service stations.

In other business, the council accepted a one-year contract with Albert Buch for location of the library in his building on Lake Street. The city manager is to investigate the possibility of installing a sump pump in the basement to relieve a water problem. The opinion was expressed by Ald. Robert N. Rollin that the city should study the possibility of acquiring larger quarters for future library use.

Following receipt of a letter from Davison and Son Builders, which asked the council to reconsider its tennis court construction plan and substitute concrete for plant mix blacktop, the council voted to retain its original plan for constructing two tennis courts on First Avenue with blacktop.

Davison's letter indicated that cost of constructing a four-inch concrete surface would be \$9,936

as compared to 5½ inches of blacktop. Councilmen expressed the opinion that there were advantages of utilizing blacktop in the construction as well as a saving in money.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported that work started Monday on hauling gravel to the site and that an entrance road had been completed. The 120 by 120-foot base is to be compacted and allowed to settle for about two weeks before a blacktop cap is constructed.

It was reported that the contractor for constructing blacktop and sealcoat streets would be in the city sometime after September 15 to perform the council's 1974 street program.

A public hearing on proposed amendments to the city's zoning ordinance, as proposed by the city planning commission, is to be held Tuesday, September 3, 7:30 p. m. Due to the Labor Day holiday, this will be the regular meeting night of the council.

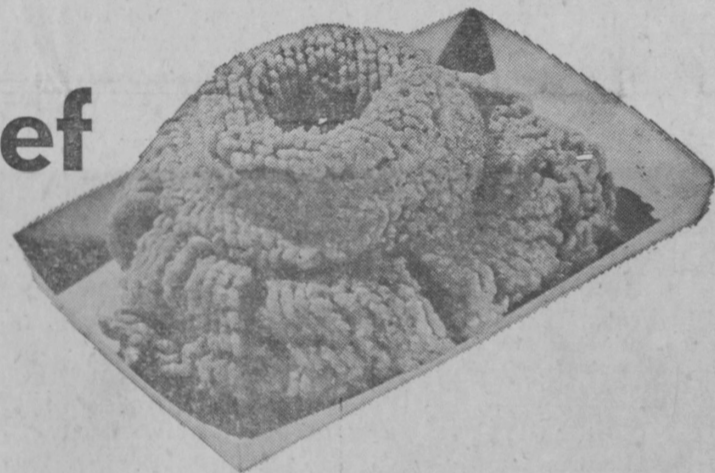

**Answers to SS Questions**

**Answer:** You will need proof of your age, how much income you have and where it comes from, any papers that give the value of any property you own and whatever life insurance policies you have. Any social security office can help you with your application. If you need any other papers, they will advise you.

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**Answer:** Both changes must be reported. Social Security Administration needs your address to issue you the checks on time. But it is especially important for you to report any and all changes in your aunt's address. The payments you are receiving are based in part on

her current living arrangements. You took on the responsibility of acting on her behalf in seeing that the Social Security Administration has current information on which to determine the amount of the check. If you neglected to report a change in her address which had an effect on her payment, you could be held liable for any overpayment.

**Question:** When I signed up for those gold-colored checks that have been coming since the first of the year, I agreed to notify social security of changes in my circumstances, but I cannot remember what sort of things I am to let you know about.

**Answer:** It is not surprising that you do not remember what is necessary to report—the list is long. Some of the items include change of address, change in living arrangements, admission to or discharge from a hospital or nursing home, change in other income, etc. All receiving Supplemental Security Income for the aged, blind or disabled who do not already have our form SSA-8160 should ask us to mail it to them. That form lists the 13 events that could happen that we must know about in connection with the SSI payments.

## Lions Clubs of Michigan Sponsor Eye Donor Banks

Over 275 people in Michigan are blind or are progressively going blind. The sad fact about this is that these people can regain 100 percent of their sight through the eye donation program.

Eyes can be donated if someone wears glasses or sometimes even when a person is totally blind. The operation involves a corneal transplant, which is the grafting of the

clear part of the eye from a donor to a person with a deformed cornea. Removal of the eyes does not mar the appearance of the body.

Eyes for transplants have to be removed within two to four hours after death and are good for corneal transplants for approximately 24 to 48 hours. In the event a patient is not available within the time limit needed to use fresh tis-

sue, the eyes are shipped to eye banks to allow for distribution elsewhere.

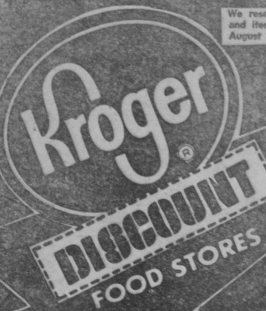

**Japanese Visitor Teaches Children Art of Origami**

Ritsuko Yamakawa, 32, of Toyota, Japan, a chaperone for children participating in the Labo program for 1974, is a guest for three weeks at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Nagel and family on Greenwood Road, west of Tawas City.

Mrs. Yamakawa, who has been a tutor in the international exchange foundation for five years, is talented in the art of origami—folding scraps of paper into the shape of birds—and has been teaching this art form to the Nagel children and

their friends.

Interested in gardening and agriculture, she said that participants in the exchange between the United States and Japan have the opportunity to learn many things about the people of the two countries. This is her third visit to the United States.

The Labo International Exchange Foundation currently is sponsoring home-stay visits of Japanese youngsters with 4-H Club families. Three children are currently guests of families in Isco County.

Mrs. Yamakawa said that the Labo program integrates language acquisition with total personality development, its people and culture. The Labo children listen to story tapes which have been recorded alternately, sentence by sentence, in two-languages—their mother tongue and a foreign language. The program has be-

come a significant educational experience, established in communities throughout Japan. The driving force behind this activity is the tutor, a mother who volunteers her time and efforts in the hope that she may broaden and enrich the lives of children.

During her stay here, she will be visiting with many residents of the area. She and the three Japanese children staying with other Isco families are to be greeted by 4-H Club families at a picnic dinner scheduled Tuesday, August 13, 7:00 p. m., at the East Branch of the AuGres River Park. The Japanese visitors are to present a program of folk dancing.

Anyone receiving supplemental security income (SSI) checks should report to social security immediately if he is admitted to a hospital, nursing home or public institution, according to John Carr, social security manager, in Bay City.

When making the report, a person should give his name and social security number exactly as it is shown on the SSI checks, Carr said. The SSI checks should show a person's own social security number.

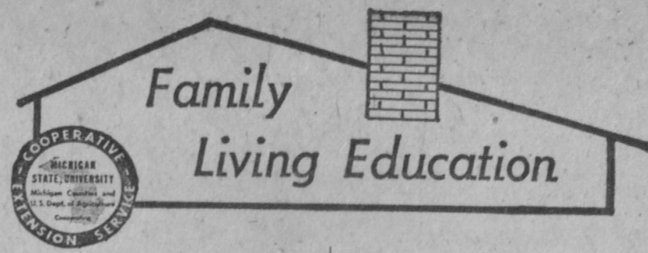

Preventing fire is everybody's business

If mildew, dampness and musty odors are real problems at your house, here are some answers for you.

What causes this whitish growth produced on many kinds of surfaces? Molds do. They are simple plants known as fungi. Though always present in air, molds that cause mildew need moisture and certain temperatures in order to grow. They commonly develop in muggy summer weather, especially in houses that are closed.

Molds that cause mildew flourish wherever it is damp, warm, poorly aired or poorly lighted—in cellars, crawl spaces, clothing closets, on or behind drapes and rugs, in basement recreation rooms and on shower curtains. These molds cause damage and often cause a musty odor.

Mildew is commonly found in basements where damp summer air causes moisture to condense on walls. Sometimes the soil might be saturated and forces water through the wall. This requires complicated procedures to correct. To check where water is coming from, dry an area of the wall and fasten a piece of plastic, 16-18 inch square, or a piece of linoleum or other floor tile to the wall with tape around the edges. After several muggy warm days, remove the patch. If there is moisture under the patch, it must come from water leaking through the wall. If it is dry and the area around is damp, the moisture is due to condensation on the cool basement wall.

In the crawl space under a one-story house, lay a moisture barrier over the soil under the house. Heavy asphalt paper or polyethylene film can be used and the joints should be lapped and weighted down to prevent wind from moving the cover.

Air conditioners in houses do a good job of removing moisture. In non-air conditioned houses, a dehumidifier will remove the moisture. Heat can help. If the mildew appears generally throughout the house, turn the furnace on for a short time, open the windows or turn on a circulating fan and direct it against the surfaces on which mildew is forming.

Closets often get a musty odor because damp air migrates to places like closets or room corners with no ventilation. To dry the air in closets and other small areas, an electric light bulb may be burned continuously. The heat will be sufficient to prevent mildew if the space is not too large. One precaution—be sure bulb is sufficient distance from clothing to avoid the danger of fire.

Chemicals, silica gel, activated alumina or calcium chloride may be used to absorb moisture. Silica gel and activated alumina are not

harmful to fabrics. They can be put in small paper containers and hung with clothes or put in drawers or chests. They can also be put in pans and placed on the floor or on shelves in closets. Be sure the container or closet is closed tightly so that moisture from the outside will not seep in. These two chemicals can be heated to drive off the moisture and reused. Heat in an oven at 300 degrees Fahrenheit for several hours. Silica gel is blue when dry and turns pink as it absorbs water. Calcium chloride liquifies on absorption of water and the liquid is very corrosive and may burn clothing.

Air movement, when the relative humidity is low, will dry the surfaces. This might be done with a fan or by opening the closet doors to permit natural ventilation. Hang clothes loosely so air can circulate around them. Dry all clothing which is wet from rain or perspiration before hanging them in the closet. Cooking, laundering and bathing may add two or more gallons of water to the house within one day unless ventilation is adequate.

In cellars with dirt floors, use chlorinated lime. Sprinkle this chemical over the floor, let it stay until all mustiness disappears, then sweep it up. On concrete floors and tiled walls, scrub with a dilute solution of sodium hypochlorite or chlorine bleach. Use one-half to one cup of bleach to a gallon of water. Rinse with clear water and wipe as dry as possible.

Precaution: Work quickly and carefully on plastic and asphalt tile to avoid spotting the surface. Quaternary ammonium compounds may also be used on floors and walls. Use one ounce of a 10 per-

cent solution to each gallon of water.
