

Two High School Students to Attend TA Board Meetings

Authorization giving unofficial recognition to two students sitting in on Tawas Area Board of Education meetings was adopted formally Monday night by the board of education.

The two student delegates, who would report board of education decisions back to the student body, would be allowed to enter into board discussions but would not have voting privileges.

An election is to be held shortly among junior and senior classes to name one delegate and one alternate from each class. Before the end of the school term, a sophomore student would be elected to represent next term's junior class at summer meetings of the board of education.

A delegation from the student council appeared at the last meeting of the board of education and asked that the student council be allowed to elect two representatives to attend board meetings.

According to a long-standing local school policy, the student council is invited to send representatives to board of education meetings. Board members emphasized that all meetings are open to the public and participation by all residents is encouraged.

At one time, the student council sent delegates to meetings, but the practice apparently was dropped during the summer months. The standing invitation of the board of education in its printed policy was apparently overlooked or forgotten by the student council, according to Peter Sutton and Eric Haglund, who represented the student council Monday night.

While the two student delegates believed that candidates should be screened by the student council according to an eligibility criteria, Robert Elliott, board of education president, along with other board members, expressed the opinion that any student in the 11th or 12th grades should be allowed to run for the offices.

In other business, Herman Rollin, principal at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, reported that he was still interviewing candidates for the position of elementary reading consultant. He said that such a position was difficult to fill at this time of year.

Rollin's report on the elementary hot lunch program indicated that the program had cleared approximately \$2,200 thus far this term, based on the cost of labor and food balanced against federal reimbursement and lunch charges.

Sheriff George Westcott spent two days last week visiting rooms of the Tawas City Elementary Unit to explain drug problems to children. This is the third year the program has been conducted by Westcott. "By the type of questions asked by students, we can see this program is having a positive effect on developing good, wholesome attitudes and values on the part of the student body," said Rollin.

A puppet show is to be held Wednesday, February 20, at the Tawas City Elementary Unit. Kindergarten through grade three will present a show from 9:00 a. m. to 10:00 a. m., the fourth grade will present its show starting at 10:00 a. m. and the fifth grade will present a show from 1:00 to 2:00 p. m. The public is invited.

Rollin reported that the elementary unit is working in cooperation with Kirtland Community College by permitting 10 practical nurse students to use the kindergarten room for observation of normal growth and development of children.

Mrs. Wendy LaVoie, a teacher at the Tawas City Elementary Unit, reported on a conference attended last week by several teachers from this district at East Lansing. The workshop concerned the teaching of reading, social studies and mathematics and 600 teachers from various parts of the state studied curriculums in use at East Lansing schools.

John Alexander, high school principal, submitted a letter of resignation from Charles Crowley as golf coach meeting to be effective at the end of the present term.

A leave of absence for health reasons for the remainder of the term, without pay, was granted to Mark DeFibaugh, shop and building trades instructor. Shop classes are being handled by Carl Klinger and the building trades classes, which are constructing a house on First Street, will be handled by Gerald Klenow, a local building trades contractor, with supervision by a faculty member.

A decision on naming Raymond VanHorn to the new position of vocational education director is to be acted upon at the next meeting of the board of education.

A report was heard on the purchase of a new kiln for the art room which was purchased through profits from the soft drink machine. A civil engineer from Wurtsmith Air Force Base is to present a program Friday for advanced mathematics and physics students interested in engineering careers. A report was also given on bus transportation and financing and the proposed exchange of the school-owned athletic field on Newman Street for a parcel of land owned by the City of East Tawas was discussed.

Phillip Ferguson of Alpena has been hired to teach English in the middle school.

Ohio Man Admits Theft Of Tapes

Burford H. Adkins, 20, Nova, Ohio, was arrested Saturday by Josco Sheriff's Department and charged with larceny from a vehicle.

Two officers responded to a call from Wala Nichols, 5817 Towerline Road, Hale. A man, later identified as Adkins, had come to the house and asked if he could offer assistance in pulling his truck out of the ditch.

Mrs. Nichols said she was unable to offer assistance and went to bed. Her son-in-law, Gary Graves, arrived later and noticed that her car door was open and that several tape recordings were missing. He followed some foot prints and found the tapes hidden behind a tree.

Two sheriff's department officers went to the scene and, while investigating, a car was observed passing along the road. On its second pass, the car was stopped. Officers found that the tire tracks of the vehicle were identical to those found near the Nichols residence and that the print of boots worn by Adkins matched those which tracked into the woods. Adkins admitted the larceny when confronted with the evidence.

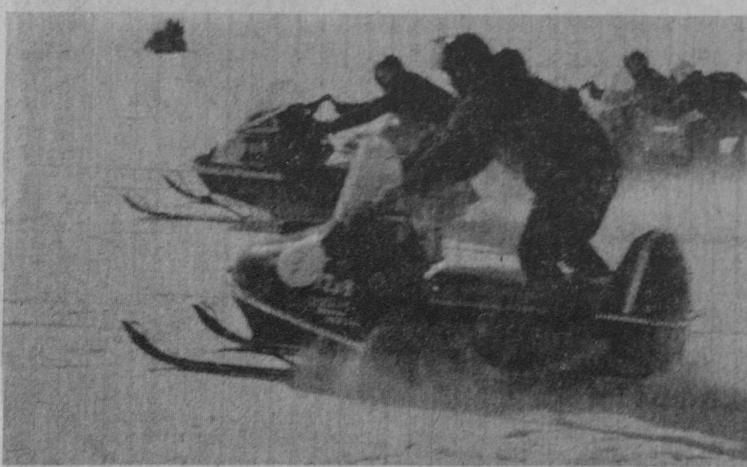

Thomas Bain of 1668 Towerline Road reported Wednesday that a chain saw had been stolen from his garage.

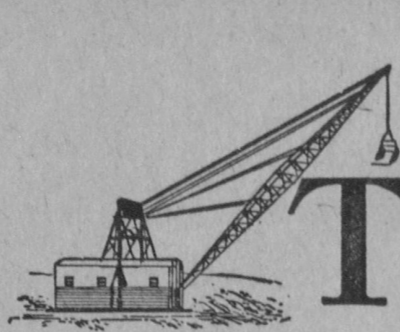

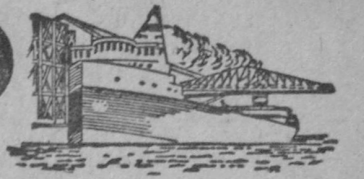

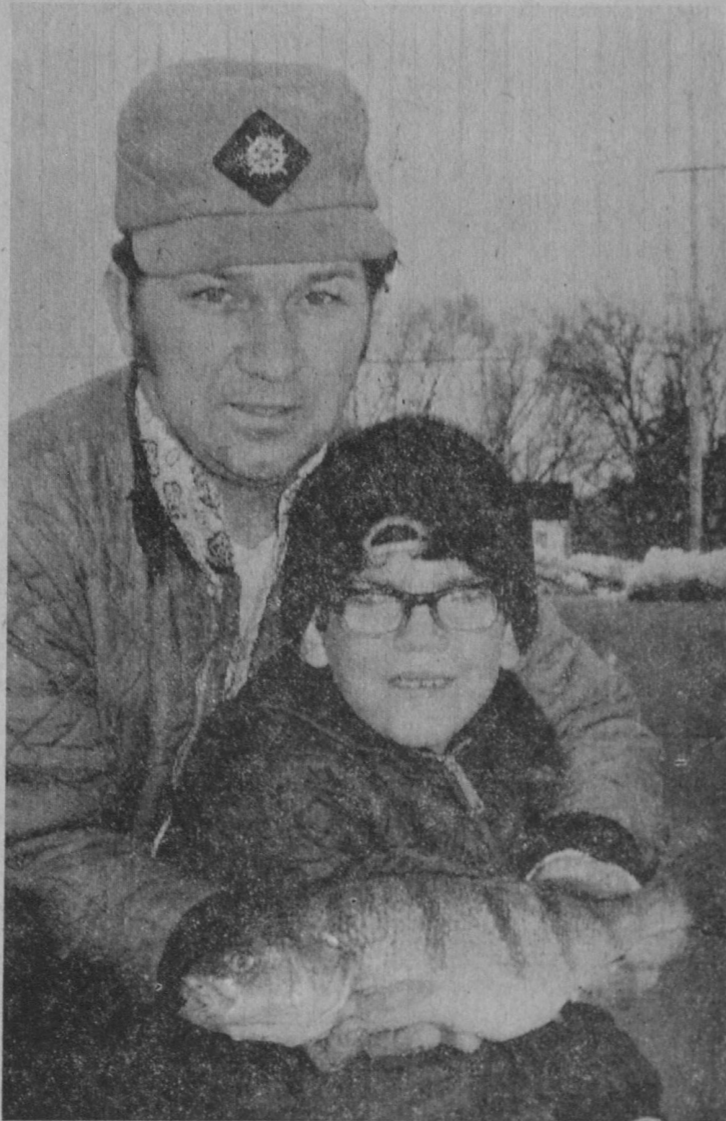

Propose Vocational Skills Center for Iosco

Following a three-month study by the "Co-Op 5" citizens' vocational education committee, Iosco Intermediate School District has made application to the Michigan Department of Education for designation of this county as the location for a vocational training skill center.

The proposed center would be similar to the one presently operated by the Bay-Arenac School District.

According to a report from John Tafelski, intermediate school district superintendent, chances for such a skill center designation appear excellent. He said that considerable work between his office and Lansing is yet to be accomplished.

At the conclusion of its study last week, Co-Op 5 members recommended that a vocational training skill center be constructed to serve the needs of the people in the Iosco Intermediate District and that ownership-operation be retained by the intermediate district.

A resolution recommended that the intermediate board make necessary arrangements to present to the electorate a proposal for taxing authority to bond, purchase and develop a site, to construct, equip and operate an area vocational skill center.

At Monday night's meeting, Tawas Area Board of Education went on record as supporting the Iosco Intermediate School District in this program. Similar resolutions were to be adopted by the county's three other school districts.

Area school districts had given support to the planning of an area skill center and in September 1973, the intermediate school district board of education gave total support to a resolution committing the intermediate administration to a study.

The Co-Op 5 committee and Tafelski developed reports on facilities, finances, curriculum, organization and public information. Superintendents of the four local school districts have given full cooperation and support of the study and would take part in the organizational structure of the center.

According to Tafelski, negotiations are now under way to acquire a site in the approximate geographic center of the county for the skill center. This site is presently owned by the federal government and efforts are being made to trade state land for the property.

If constructed, the school districts would transport students to the skill center on a daily basis. A proposed

curriculum would include auto mechanics, aviation occupations, building trades, heating and air conditioning, graphic arts, metal trades, welding, cosmetology, food preparation and food service, small engine repair, electronics, agricultural resources, business data processing, stenographic and secretarial, general merchandising, health home economics, building maintenance.

Tafelski said that some college courses could be offered, but not necessarily for college credit. "We hope to see the furtherance of education at the vocational level with all ages of people involved," he stated.

A financial cost chart accompanying the reports lists the total cost of constructing and equipping the center, along with site development, at \$2,001,200. Of this amount, a 50 per-

cent reimbursement from the state is possible, leaving \$1,110,000 to be financed locally. Annual operating cost would be \$483,500, with a possible 12 percent reimbursement from the state.

Total state equalized valuation for the intermediate district in 1974 is \$195,000,000.

A proposal would be placed before voters asking authorization of 2.95 mills to finance the center, of which .6 of a mill would finance cost of constructing and equipping the facility over a period of 15 years, and 2.35 mills for annual operation.

Tafelski said that it is hoped that plans will have progressed to a point where a special election can be held this fall on the bonding and operational proposal to be placed before voters.

Tawas Board OK's Hiring Consultants to Conduct Survey

Hiring of two educational consultants from Central Michigan University to conduct a study "for the purpose of determining the needs, suggesting long range goals and recommending a plan to achieve those goals," was authorized Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

Hiring of Donald O. Bush and Roger J. Goenner of CMU followed an interview last week between the two candidates, administrators and board of education members.

will be \$1.50 per pupil, or approximately \$2,100. Board of education members noted that the cost was considerably below the figure offered by other educational consultants.

The two consultants are to start immediately on the collection of data, evaluation of programs and facilities and determine community goals. This would be accomplished by spring through discussion with the board of education and community leaders.

A written report relating the community background, "a rationale for future educational plans, significant data and alternatives, consequences and recommendations" would be provided for the information of citizens in late summer, or six weeks prior to a date selected by the board of education for an election.

"Because of highly professional implications in working with the board of education, administration, staff and citizens, it is our policy to do all the work and personally be involved throughout," stated a letter from the two consultants.

Visitors Welcomed to Perchville USA Festival

Despite the gasoline crunch, the Tawas are expected to be jammed with thousands of downstate visitors this week-end. This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Perchville USA Festival, originated in February 1954, but the Tawas have been playing host to winter sports fans for more than 35 years and its February festival is one of the oldest in Michigan.

To mark the anniversary, Gov. William G. Milliken signed an official proclamation last week changing the name of the Tawas to Perchville USA for the three-day week-end. Chamber of commerce and city officials witnessed the governor's signature last week at Lansing.

To insure that motorists have enough gasoline to return home following attendance at activities here, local service stations are to remain open over the week-end.

Kicking off the festival will be the annual fish fry Friday night at Lixey's Restaurant, East Tawas. Crowning of the perch king is to be held during that event. A fish fry for the women is to be held at Coyle's Fish and Chips, while a dance is scheduled at the East Tawas Community Building, which has been the scene of winter sports functions since the first Silver Valley carnival in 1938.

Saturday's program starts with flag raising ceremonies by boy scouts on the ice of Tawas Bay and at the Newman Street athletic field, site of the start of the second annual 50-mile snowmobile "run for life" being sponsored by the Michigan

Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Details may be obtained by contacting Timothy O'Connor at 362-3437.

Persons entering the safari obtain advance sponsorship (contributing a minimum of \$10) and entire proceeds go to CF, which helps to give the breath of life to thousands of Michigan children suffering from serious lung-damaging diseases.

The course is from the athletic field at East Tawas to the Osoda Sportsmen's Club on River Road and back. Registration begins at 8:30 a. m. and continues until 11:30 a. m.

A skydiving exhibition is scheduled Saturday at 11:00 a. m. and a biopole baseball game on ice skates is to start at 12 o'clock noon.

Saturday afternoon activities include a second skydiving exhibition at 1:30 o'clock, a polar bear swim and crowning of the polar bear king and queen at 2 o'clock near the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock.

A high school snowmobile safari is to start at 3:00 p. m. from the athletic field, to be followed by another skydiving exhibition at 3:30 o'clock and the conclusion of the 50-mile "run for life."

The program Saturday evening includes the annual Perchville banquet starting at 6:30 o'clock at the Holland House. Van Patrick will crown the 1974 Perchville queen. A dance for high school students is slated at the community building.

Rounding out the program on Sunday will be a flag raising on Tawas Bay at 9:00 a. m. Trophies for the 50-mile "run for life" are to be pre-

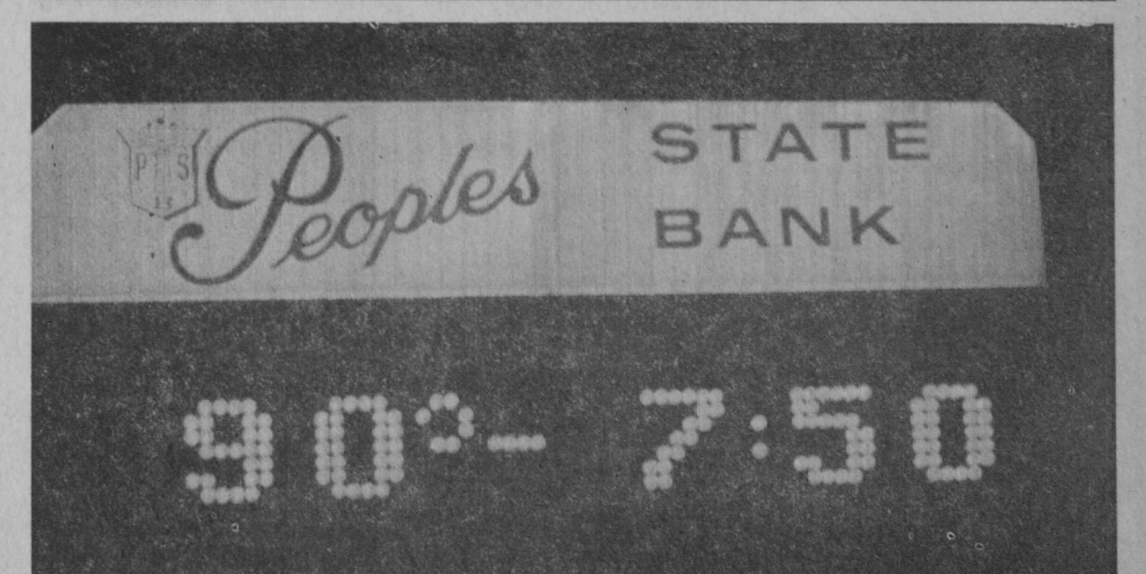
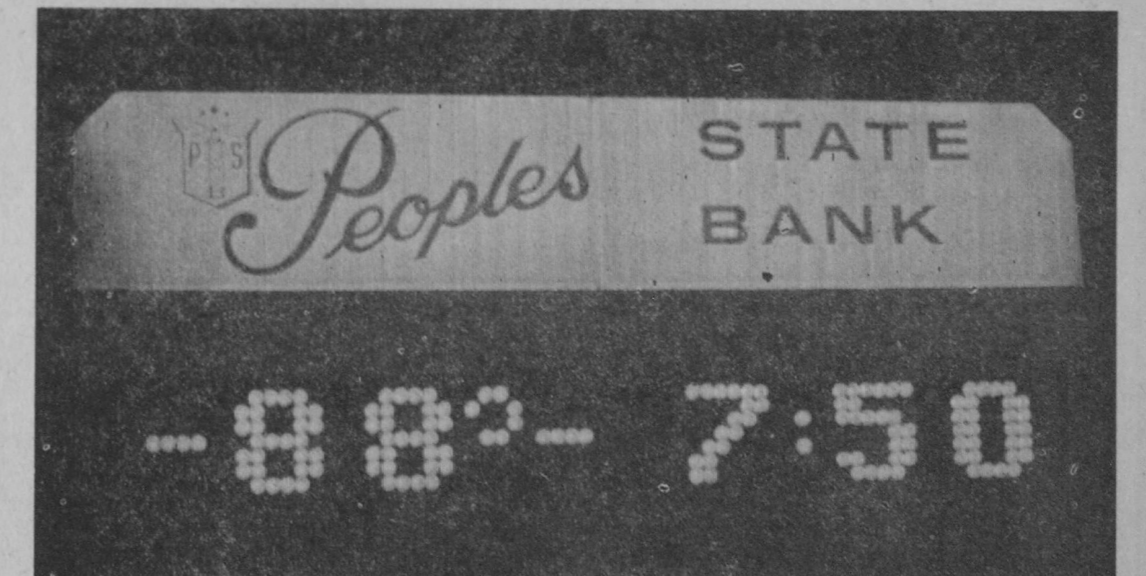
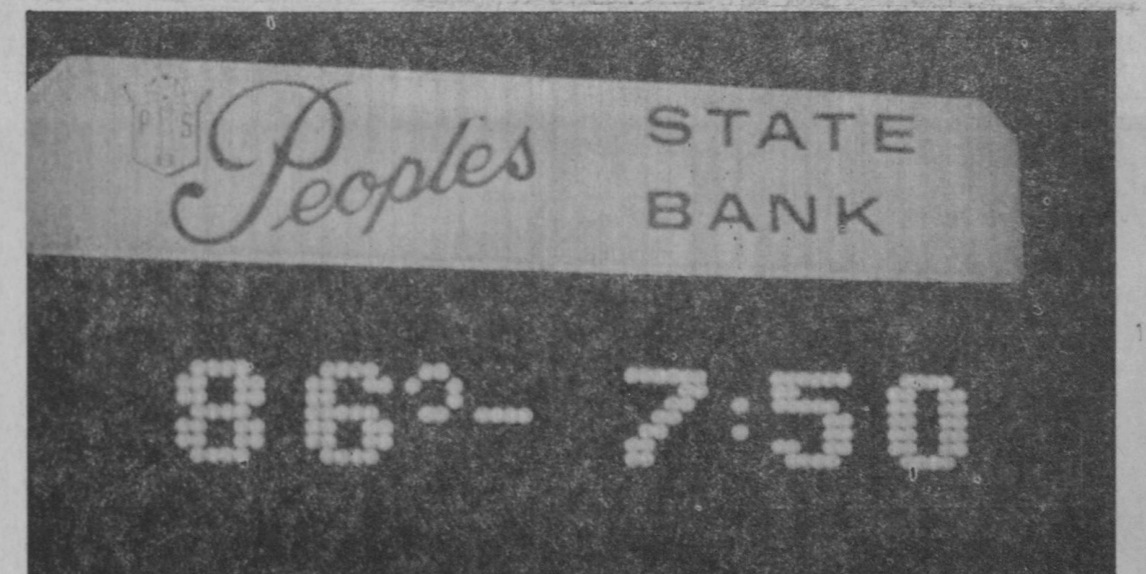
sented at 1:00 p. m., followed by a Bay in a demolition derby.

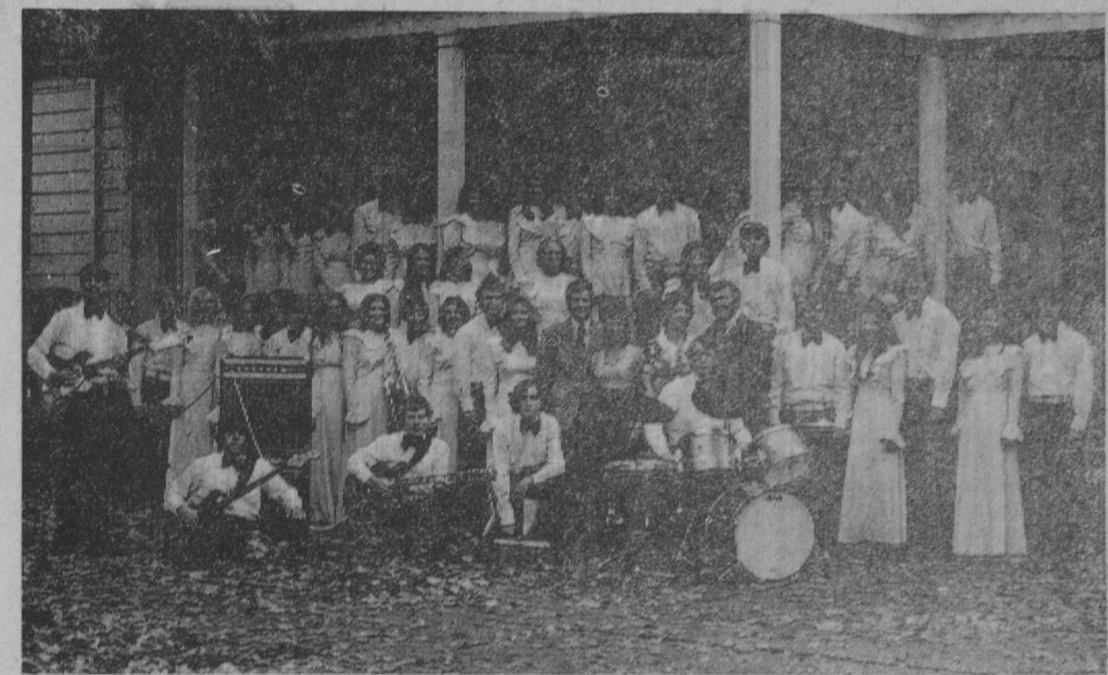

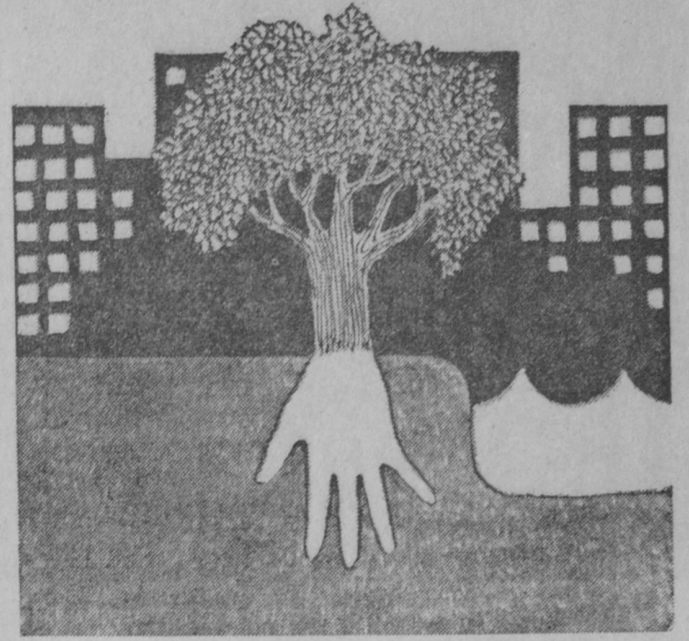

Betty Crocker Award Goes to Miss Thornton

Miss Thornton won the honor by scoring high in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to high school seniors throughout the country - December 4. She will receive a specially-designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for Leadership in Family Living, and remains eligible for state and national honors. From the ranks of all school winners in the state, a state family leader of tomorrow is selected through judging centered on test performance and receives a \$1,500 college scholarship. The second ranking student in the state will receive a \$500 scholarship. Encyclopaedia Britannica Educational Corporation will present "The Annals of America," a 20-volume reference work, to the state winner's school. Representing every state and the District of Columbia, the 51 Betty Crocker Family Leaders of Tomorrow, together with a faculty advisor, will gather in Washington, D. C., in April for an expense-paid educational tour of the capital city and Minneapolis, Minnesota. During the four personal observations and interviews are added to state level judging which results in the selection of the All-American Family Leader of Tomorrow, who receives a \$5,000 college scholarship. Second, third and fourth place national winners receive scholarships increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively. The test, personal observations and interviews are all prepared and conducted by Science Research Associates of Chicago, Illinois. This year, 703,974 students from 14,463 schools were enrolled in the program. Approximately nine-million students have taken part in the program since its inception in the 1954-55 school year and, with this year's grants, total scholarship awards will exceed two-million dollars.

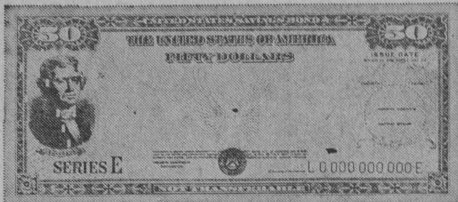

Van Patrick, 1974 Perch King, is Old Hand at Crowning Tawas Queens

Van Patrick, veteran Detroit area-television and radio sports personality, will be crowned Perchville king as the three-day event gets under way Friday night, February 15, with the annual stag fish fry.

Following that event there will be a complete winter sports program during the week-end.

Patrick needs little introduction to sports fans of Michigan or the Tawas. He was the "voice" of the Detroit Lions for many years and was sports director, at one time, for WJR. He now owns his own radio station in the Detroit area, but has retained his hand in sports with the Mutual Radio Network.

Along with his sidekick from WJR days, Bob Reynolds, Patrick has officiated at the crowning of more winter sports queens in the Tawas than any other person. It was 25 years ago—February 1949—when Patrick first came to the Tawas to officiate at the Silver Valley coronation ball. That year, too, marked the first time that Perchville received national recognition with a picture spread in Life Magazine.

Patrick was to return to the Tawas each February during the years of 1950, 1951 and 1952 to place the crown on the heads of winter sports queens.

The next year, 1953, saw the beginning of Reynolds' long tenure for crowning winter sports queens here and he returned each year until the

Federal Grant Aids Purchase Of Ambulance

Governor's office of Highway Safety Planning has approved a federal grant in the amount of \$7,100 for the purpose of improving emergency medical services in Iosco County.

ORDER AND NOTICE OF HEARING

By order dated August 10, 1970 in Case No. U-3001, the Commission approved its Rules and Regulations Governing the Extension of Underground Electric Distribution Lines. The Commission's order dated August 17, 1970 confirmed and adopted said rules and regulations.

These rules and regulations contain provisions for contributions in aid of construction applicable to extensions of underground electric distribution and service lines in residential subdivisions and to commercial and industrial extensions. The rules established charges of \$1.00 per lot front foot for distribution lines and \$1.25 per foot for service lines in residential subdivisions, and a charge of \$2.00 per trench foot for commercial and industrial extensions. In response to requests by residential home builders and developers, members of the Legislature and utility companies, the Commission believes that it would be in the public interest to review these charges. If the Commission finds that the current costs of construction of overhead and underground extensions are to any extent different from those upon which the above charges were based, it proposes to fix different charges to reflect the change in the difference in costs.

The Commission FINDS that:

a. Jurisdiction in this matter is pursuant to Act 106, P.A. 1909, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.551 et seq; Act 419, P.A. 1919, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.51 et seq; Act 3, P.A. 1939, as amended, M.C.L.A. 460.1 et seq; Act 306, P.A. 1969, as amended, M.C.L.A. 24.201 et seq; and the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, 1954 Administrative Code, Supplement No. 54, R 460.11.

b. A hearing should be held to determine the proper and reasonable charge per lot front foot for distribution lines and the proper and reasonable charge for service lines in residential subdivisions, and the proper and reasonable charge for commercial and industrial extensions

under the Commission's Uniform Underground Electric Extension Policy.

c. All public utilities, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service in the Lower Peninsula mainland should be required to provide specific data for the Commission's consideration in this matter.

THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED that:

A. The Commission, on its own motion, will conduct an investigation to determine whether there should be revision in the charges of \$1.00 per lot front foot for distribution lines and \$1.25 per foot for service lines in residential subdivisions, and the charge of \$2.00 per trench foot for commercial and industrial extensions under the Commission's Uniform Underground Electric Extension Policy.

B. Each public utility, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service in the Lower Peninsula mainland shall, on or before February 4, 1974, prepare and submit to the Commission, together with its proposed testimony, an original and 7 copies of studies for the years 1971, 1972 and 1973 showing its average differential in cost between overhead and underground extensions in residential subdivisions and also the average difference in cost between overhead and underground commercial and industrial extensions. In addition, each such public utility shall submit to the Commission 50 copies of its testimony and studies for distribution to interested parties requesting copies of same.

C. A public hearing will be held at 9:30 a.m. on February 25, 1974 in the Auditorium, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan, and continue, if necessary, on February 26, 27 and 28, 1974, in the offices of the Commission, Law Building, Lansing, Michigan 48913 for the purpose of receiving testimony and evidence concerning this matter. Any interested parties may attend the hearing and participate, subject to the provisions of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure.

D. Any party wishing to intervene in this investigation shall, in accordance with Rule 11 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure, file with the Commission an original and 7 copies of a petition to intervene at least five (5) days prior to February 25, 1974.

E. Each public utility, including rural electric cooperatives, providing electric service shall, on or before February 15, 1974, notify the public of the hearing by publishing a copy of this Order and Notice of Hearing in newspapers of general circulation published within its service area and by mailing a copy of this Order and Notice of Hearing to all cities, incorporated villages, counties and townships within its service area. Proofs of publication and service are to be submitted at or before the scheduled hearing.

The Commission specifically reserves jurisdiction of the matters herein contained and the authority to issue such further order or orders as the facts and circumstances may require.

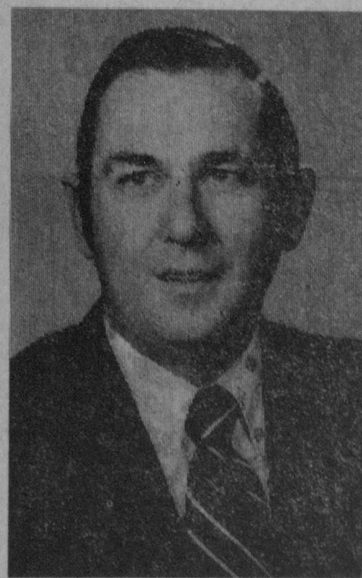

that I have not sent in for payment. Since the deductible has gone up to \$60, what deductible amount will apply to these bills?

Answer: The \$50 deductible applies to your covered medical expenses in 1972. The \$60 deductible applies to your covered medical expenses in 1973.

There is also a "carry-over" rule that applies to any bills for covered medical expenses that you may have around the end of the year. If you have bills during the last three months of a year that can be counted toward your deductible for that year, they can also be counted toward the deductible for the next year.

Question: I am going to retire this year. I have a grown son at home who has been severely disabled since he was born. My wife takes care of him, but she is only 58. Can she get any payments from social security when I retire?

Answer: Yes. In addition, your son may be eligible for benefits that can be paid to adults disabled in childhood. You should apply for benefits for your wife and your son at the same time you apply for retirement benefits. You can apply at any social security office.

You have a furniture problem? The budget will not stretch far enough to buy that new davenport-sleeper or chest of drawers you need for the baby's clothes. No problem—buy used. If you choose carefully, used furniture can be a good buy. Newspaper ads, bulletin boards, garage sales, auctions—there are any number of places where you can find good, substantial furniture at low cost. Social Security Lists Answers to Questions

Question: In October, I hired a woman who comes to the house twice a week and helps me with the cooking and cleaning. When must I report her wages?

Answer: If you paid your household employee cash wages of \$50 or more in the October-November-December quarter, you should have reported her wages and sent the social security contributions to the Internal Revenue Service by January 31. You can get a copy of the leaflet, "Social Security and Your Household Employee," at any social security office for more complete information on this subject.

Question: I have been hearing about the new federal payments for aged, blind and disabled people. Why is social security operating this program?

Answer: Supplemental security income payments are for people with little or no income and limited resources who are 65 or older, blind or disabled. Social security is handling the federal program because it is already in touch with many of these people through its social security benefit payments programs and through medicare and because social security has a network of field offices and established data processing systems.

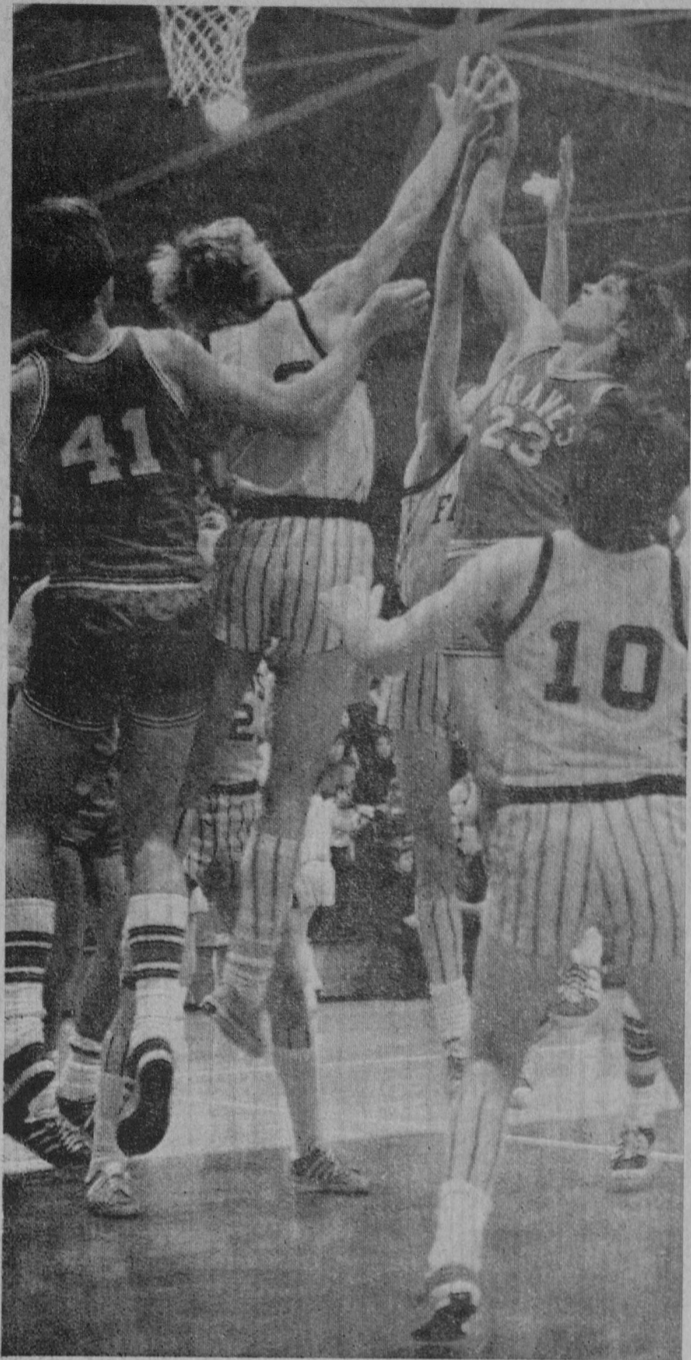

Larry Nichols was top scorer for the Braves with 17 points and Steve Cline contributed 13 markers. Safford was high for the visitors with 14 points.

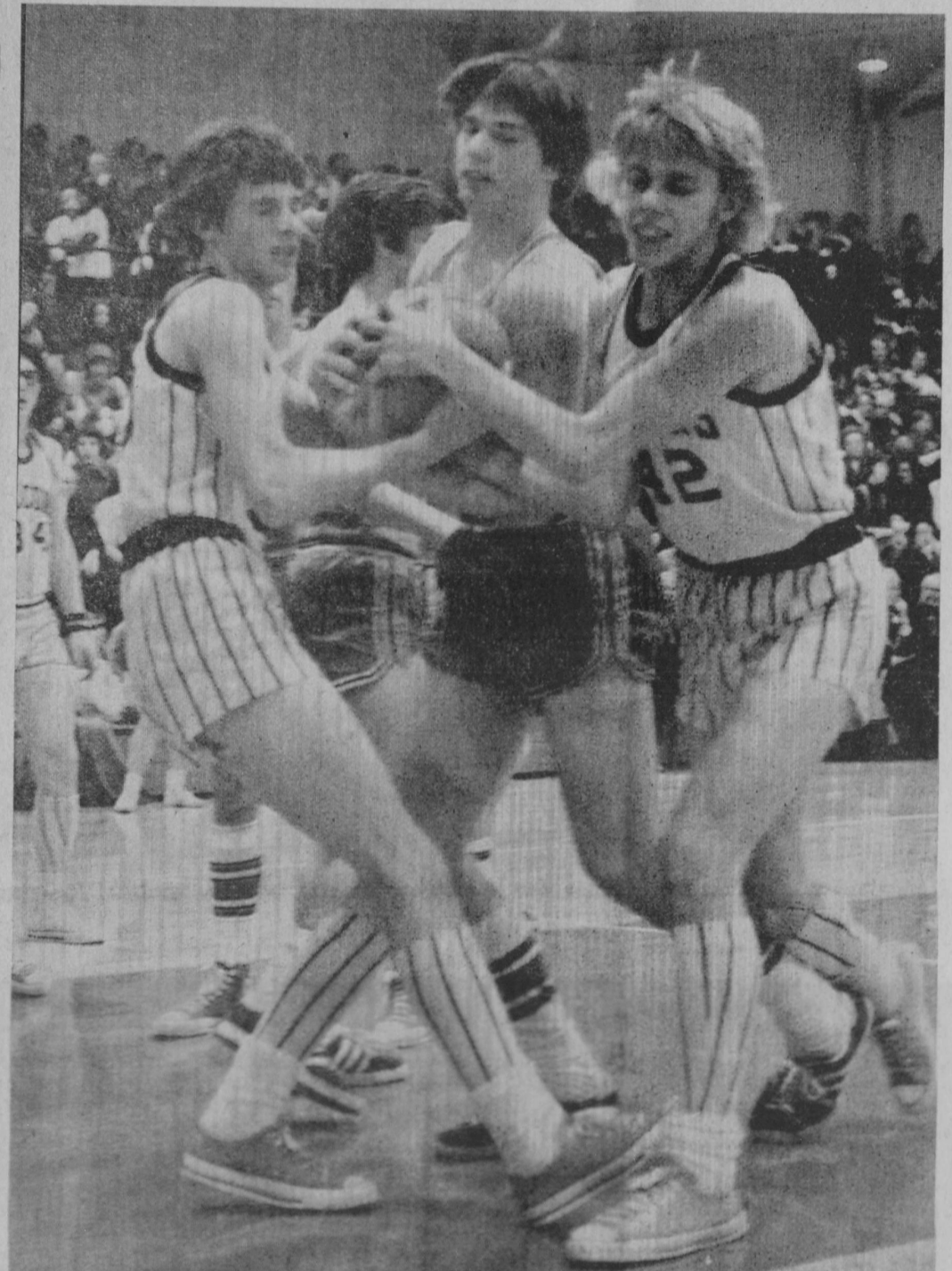

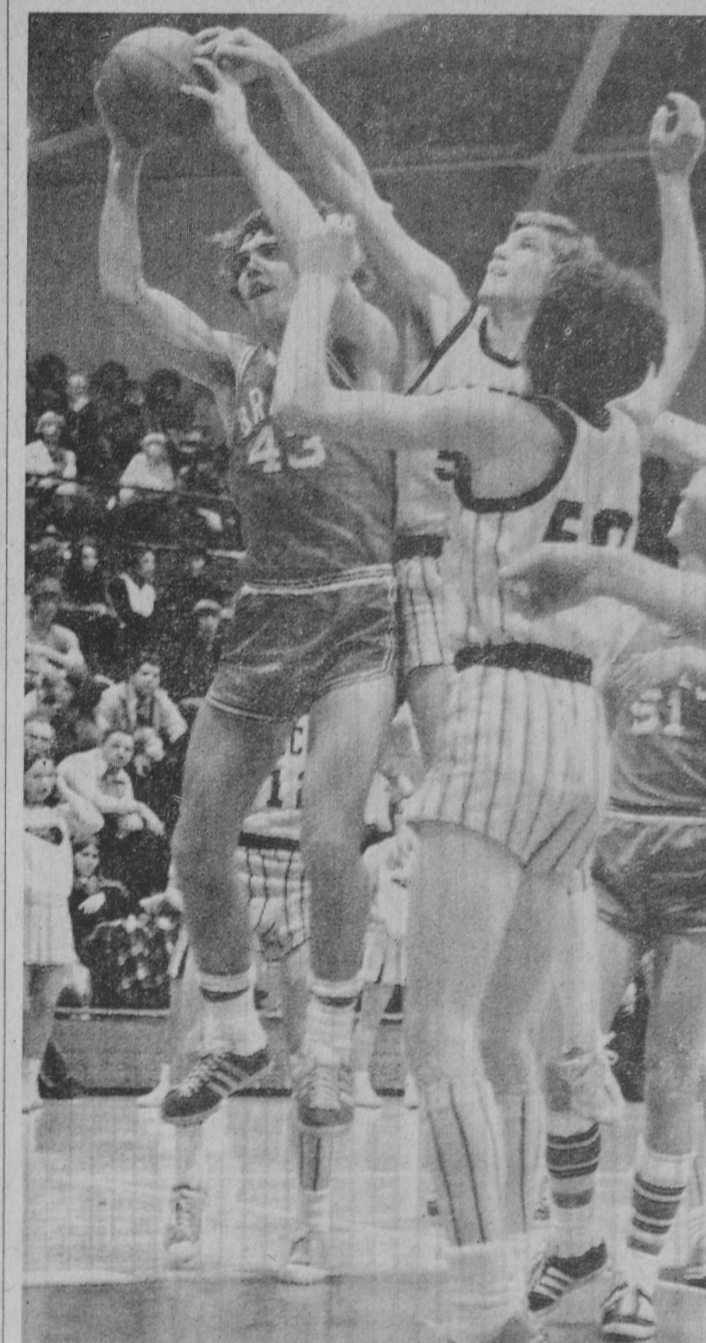
March of Dimes Campaign Extended to February 7
