

Enforce Tawas City Snowmobile Code

City police officers have been directed to enforce provisions of Tawas City's Ordinance No. 177 which provides for controlled operation of snowmobiles on city streets.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Thursday that numerous complaints had been received at the city hall concerning snowmobile operators who were operating machines in a reckless manner, failed to yield the right-of-way to other vehicles and pedestrians at intersections or were too young to legally operate a machine on city streets.

Bublitz emphasized that operators between the ages of 12 and 16 years must have a state safety certificate and that children under the age of 12 years are ineligible to operate on city streets.

"Children under 12 years of age may operate machines in their own yards, but are prohibited under the

city ordinance from operating on the street right-of-way," said Bublitz.

Because complaints are being received daily, Bublitz urges snowmobile operators "to control your machine and operations in a proper manner according to law."

Some of the more important points of the city ordinance are as follows:

Snowmobiles are not allowed to operate on M-55 or US-23 and must stop at all intersections; snowmobiles must travel in single file on the far right hand edge of plowed areas of streets; machines are not to exceed a speed of 10 miles per hour; snowmobiles are not allowed in cemeteries or parks; machines are to yield the right-of-way to all vehicular traffic.

Violators of the above regulations may have snowmobiles confiscated for a period of 30 days, with a fine of up to \$100 or 90 days in jail.

Iosco's Finances Appear Excellent At End of Year

Despite an anticipated slowdown in the national economy due to the energy crisis and other international influences, Iosco County's governmental operation is expected to end the calendar year in excellent financial condition.

County Treas. Edward Nelkie reported Thursday that he was settling with department heads on Friday and Monday to close out the county's books for 1973.

In October, the county treasurer projected that the county's general fund would have a surplus of \$120,000 and he said Thursday that "I don't think that will be too far off."

The treasurer's office is to begin this week on preparing an annual report for the county board of commissioners during its January session.

In addition to the general fund surplus, Nelkie said that the county would end 1973 with \$100,000 in unexpended federal revenue sharing money, which is not included in the county's regular year-end balance.

The treasurer reported that treasurers of the various townships and cities had reported last week that collection of property taxes, for which statements had been mailed in early December, were now running ahead of collections at this point a year ago. He believed that the recent plea from schools for payment of taxes may have been a contributing factor in the improved collection status.

The county treasurer had projected last April that the general fund would end 1973 with a surplus of \$90,000. The surplus was boosted, however, when \$20,000 in added revenue was picked up in fees on delinquent taxes during the Lakewood Shores land transaction at Oscoda.

In addition, about \$6,500 in added interest money has been received by the county since banks increased interest rates last summer. In some instances, the county is receiving 6 1/2 percent interest on funds invested in banks.

A portion of the surplus will replace the seven-tenths of one mill which was transferred to schools from the county's share of the 15-mill tax limitation. This action was taken last spring by the county tax allocation board when it became evident that the county general fund would end the year with a surplus while schools would be hard pressed for financing.

City Solves Tree Disposal on January 3

The annual problem of what to do with the family Christmas tree after the holiday season is solved for Tawas City residents, if they cooperate with the department of public works.

Christmas trees placed out next to the streets will be picked up on Thursday, January 3. Residents are asked to have trees out for pickup on the evening of January 2.

"This Christmas tree pickup program is a one-shot program," states City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz. "We are paying our contractor for an extra day of work and any trees placed out later will not be picked up," stated Bublitz.

The city manager pointed out that the contractor is to start his collection early in the morning of January 3 and advised residents to place trees along streets the night of January 2 or earlier.

Complete Job of Long Bore Under US-23

Work was completed last week on boring under US-23 to connect the residence and bait shop of John McMurray along Tawas Bay with the Oak Street sanitary sewer.

Jerry Steadman Company, Bay City, was contractor for boring a 75-foot, 20-inch sewer under the pavement. Cost of the work, estimated at around \$3,000 by City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz, is to be assessed to the property owner. The department of public works completed the connection at Oak Street.

Continued use of a septic tank system by McMurray had been prohibited by the state health department due to the high water level of Tawas Bay.

Hearing Set on TC Special Sewer District

A public hearing on the proposed special assessment district No. 3 along US-23 and Margo Street in Tawas City is to be held Thursday, January 3, 7:30 p. m., at the city hall.

Notices have been sent to all property owners included in the special assessment district which would finance sewer construction.

This is a continuation of hearings held on proposed special assessment district in the Spring Street area and another district along US-23 below the Tawas River bridge.

Persons attending the hearing will receive information on estimated cost of the proposed project.

State Studying Possible Aid to City Park Dock

Prospects for state assistance in a proposed renovation of the solid fill pier at the Tawas City Park appeared excellent last week, according to word from City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz.

In a telephone conversation with Department of Natural Resources officials Thursday, Bublitz learned that Dr. Wayne Tody, fish division director, had assigned a man to study a proposal recently submitted by Tawas City.

Bublitz said that the conservation commission had apparently approved the pier to qualify for state aid. He said the next step would be to determine how this project would rate on the priority list for funding.

Improvements to the park pier have been under consideration here for a number of years. In recent years, storms have washed away considerable fill following the deterioration of wooden piling.

The city proposes to utilize treated wood piling, similar to that utilized on a retaining wall along Ninth Avenue and two bridges, and drive it into the lake bottom around the pier. The interior would then be refilled and capped with asphalt or some other surface.

Bublitz said that estimated cost of the project is from \$35,000 to \$50,000. Although not officially confirmed,


one DNR representative believed that approximately \$15,000 could be made available as a means of improving this popular fishing site.

The city manager said that the DNR had cooperated closely with the city in three projects during the past year. The state provided financial assistance in construction of the Ninth Avenue retaining wall and bridge catwalks, as well as financing a pilot project for beach nourishment.

Work was to have been completed Saturday morning on hauling sand from upland sources and placing it on the beach to replace sand lost during storms. The beach has been extended between 65 and 70 feet out into the bay, replacing about 50 feet of land lost in storms.

The city's portion of the project is to construct a groin about 70 feet into the bay and work is to start on that project this week.

The city manager said that the beach is now about 2 1/2 feet above the water level. He said the sand would now have an opportunity to compact during the winter months. Although it is expected that some sand will be lost during storms, the city manager believes the additional beach sand will be of great benefit to the park during the coming year.

Apartment Dwellers Flee Burning Building

Fire Strikes in Business District

Harbor Lights Restaurant, an East Tawas landmark since the early 1940s at the intersection of Newman Street and East State Street, was completely gutted by flames early Sunday morning.

East Tawas and Tawas City firemen battled the blaze for six hours in sub-freezing weather before bringing the fire under control at 7:00 a. m. Five hose lines coupled directly to hydrants poured water onto the blazing frame and concrete block structure during that time.

A frigid wind out of the northwest made the work uncomfortable for firemen, but was not strong enough to seriously threaten two adjacent old structures, the IOOF Hall and Gazette Building.

Charles Viar, who with his wife, Ruth, own the building said that he

was working at Oscoda when notified of the fire. He purchased the building two years ago from Charles Presprich of Saginaw.

The restaurant business was owned by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Hewgley, while the Viars operated C-Vee's Pizza Hutch in adjoining quarters. Viar's equipment was a total loss and the restaurant was a shambles, although some equipment might be salvaged.

The fire is believed to have started in an unoccupied apartment over the concrete addition housing the pizza business. The restaurant closed for the day at 8:00 p. m. Saturday and Viar's daughter, Rio Bailey,

closed the pizza business at 10:00 p. m. and went to an upstairs apartment to care for her daughter, Troy, who was ill.

The daughter said that she and her fiancé, Wayne Wood, were watching television at 1:00 a. m. when they heard a loud buzzing sound. They smelled smoke at about the same time, picked Troy out of her bed, ran through flames at the head of the stairwell and made their exit safely down the stairs and out a side door.

Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Garcia, occupants of another upstairs apartment, made their exit from the burning building about the same time. Mrs. Florence Quick, an elderly crippled

occupant of a downstairs apartment, was carried from the burning structure.

Furniture, household articles and personal possessions of all the apartment dwellers were lost in the fire.

Viar said later Sunday morning that had his daughter not been awake and discovered the flames, he believed that no one would have escaped from the building.

Viar said his mother, Mrs. Imogene Hewgley, had occupied the empty apartment briefly and had moved out Friday. Mr. Hewgley is ill and has been hospitalized for some time.

The night patrol of the East Tawas Police Department had cruised by the building about 12:45 a. m. and had not noted anything unusual. The building is heated with natural gas and it is believed the blaze may have been caused by faulty electrical wiring.

The Hewgleys have been in the restaurant business at East Tawas for about 13 years. They moved to the Harbor Lights building four years ago.

Viar, who spent 22 years in military service and served several years on the East Tawas Police Department, joined them in the operation when the business was moved four years ago. He purchased the building two years ago and estab-

lished the pizza business about a year ago.

The frame portion of the structure is one of the oldest buildings in East Tawas' business district. It was once the site of a mercantile store and housed a photographic studio at one time.

Harbor Lights has had various owners since it was established in the early 1940s. The concrete block addition was used for apartments until Viar established the pizza business a year ago in the lower portion.

He said Sunday morning that the only thing he salvaged from the fire was an old automobile valued at about \$75 which was parked next to the building.

Viar said Sunday that he was unsure of the amount of insurance coverage on the building, which he was purchasing under a land contract for \$35,000. He said he had no insurance on equipment in the pizza business and had about \$1,000 coverage on contents in the apartments. He was unsure as to the amount of insurance coverage for his parents' restaurant business.

Tawas Time Shop, located in an adjacent building to the north on Newman Street, sustained water damage during the blaze. Firemen located on the roof of the building played a stream of water on the burning structure.

Accepts Pleas From Three

Guilty pleas were accepted from three persons Wednesday during arraignment before Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

Ronald D. Blaisdell, Oscoda, entered a plea of guilty to receiving stolen property. Leon V. Webb, Plainfield Township, entered a plea of guilty to breaking and entering with the intent to commit larceny. Richard L. Poorman of Oscoda entered guilty pleas to two counts, larceny of a check from a building and forgery.

Cases of all three defendants were referred to the department of corrections for pre-sentence investigations.

Two Hurt on Snowmobiles

Two persons were injured in snowmobile accidents last week and treated at Tawas Hospital, according to a report from Iosco Sheriff's Department.

Kathline M. Fisher, 13, Flint, was injured Thursday in an accident 1 1/2 miles northeast of M-65 and River Road in Oscoda Township. She lost control of her machine in the slush and struck a tree. She sustained injuries to her left hand and jaw.

Sandra Kay Flaanagan, 16, Whittemore, was injured December 24 when she lost control of her machine on Ranger Road, Reno Township, one mile north of M-65. The machine hit a tree.

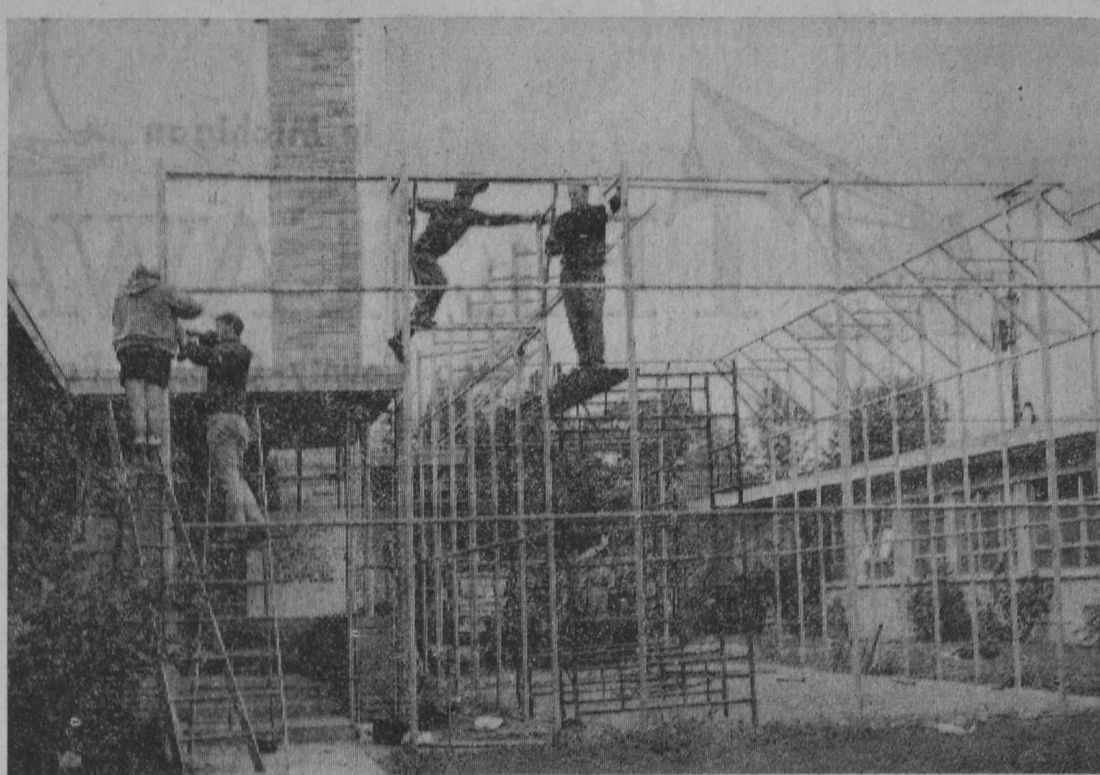

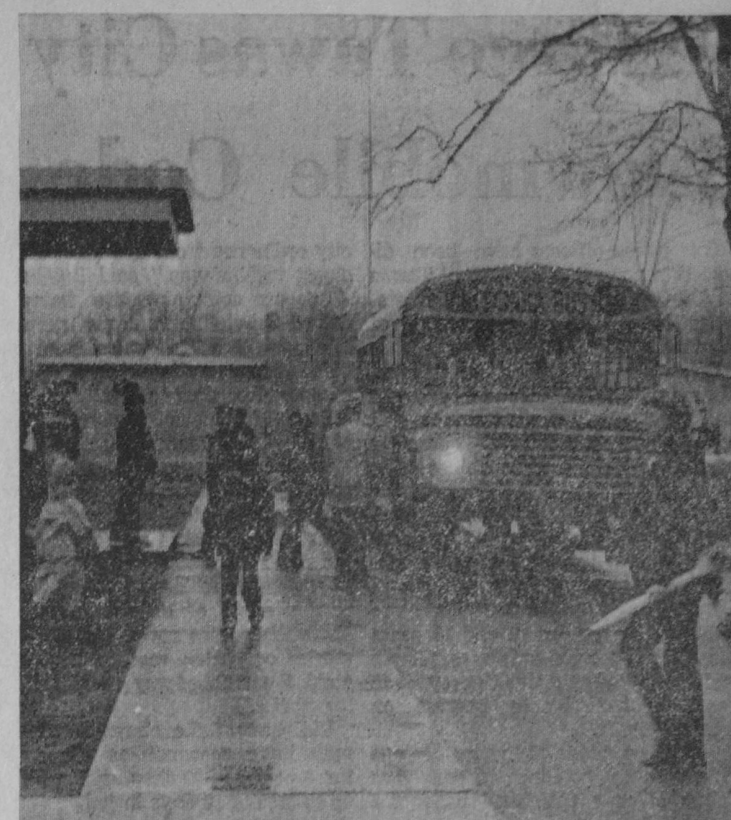

Release Accused Murderers; Were Deprived of Rights

Two men who had been accused of first degree murder in the August 1971 beating-death of Howard Hatton, 64-year-old Tawas City barber, were placed on two years probation in circuit court at Alpena.

The pair, Charles N. Woods, 28, Omer, and Frank W. Spencer, 37, Pontiac and formerly of AuGres, had appealed an October 1971 sentencing on grounds that the court had failed to properly advise them of their constitutional rights before accepting guilty pleas.

After hearing testimony recently in 81st District Court at Standish, Judge J. Richard Ernst bound the men over to circuit court. They had been granted a new trial earlier this year by Judge Philip J. Glennie of Alpena, who heard the case a week ago.

The trial was conducted at Alpena because Circuit Court Judge Carl Haron of Standish had been involved in the original court proceedings as prosecutor.

Woods and Spencer entered a guilty plea last week on a charge of assault with intent to create great bodily harm. The Arenac County prosecutor had been seeking a conviction on a first degree murder charge.

Hatton, who was mayor pro tem of Tawas City at the time of his death, died of injuries in a Saginaw hospital a few days after being beat up on a

The program is not connected in any way with the department of social services, but food is prepared in the kitchen of Isoco Medical Care Facility.

All senior citizens and others unable to prepare their own food or to leave their homes are eligible for the program. There is no physical requirement for eligibility.

Each person participating in the program is charged \$1.50 per day. A full course hot meal prepared at the medical care facility is transported by volunteers to the doors of participants.

Mrs. Lyle Groff, who is co-chairman with Mrs. Arnold Drumm, said that the visit by the volunteers also provides an opportunity to check on the daily status of elderly persons who do not have someone to drop in on them. An emergency telephone number is listed at the home of each participant if the need arises.

This is the second year for the "Dinners to Doors" program in this county and participation has reached as high as 18 persons. Meals are delivered seven days a week, including holidays.

The new metal chest type carriers are insulated to maintain heat in the cooked food. Mrs. Groff said that ad-

ditional carriers would be purchased as additional contributions are received. The program is a non-profit venture and similar to other programs in larger communities.

"Our only hope is that the fuel shortage will not curtail our daily transportation schedule," states Mrs. Groff.

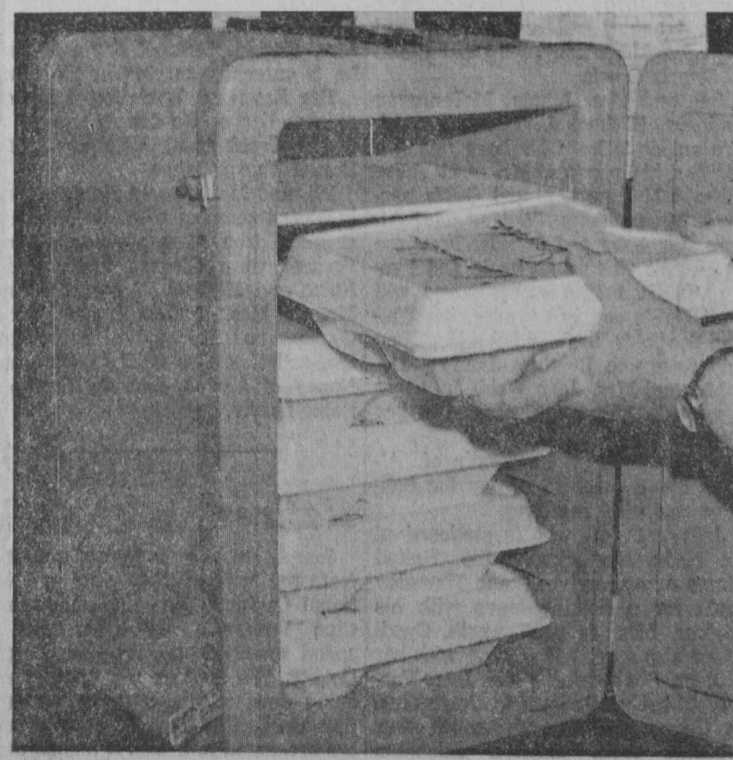

L. B. Smith: A MAN WHO WORE MANY HATS

The Episode of the Long Lake-Loon Lake Ditch



Traces of the ditch dug nearly 100 years ago are still evident in Plainfield.

New light was shed recently on an interesting episode in Isosco County's history when the scribbled handwriting contained in old diaries of a former Isosco sheriff was deciphered.

The leather-bound daily diaries, compiled a century ago between the years 1874 and 1879 by Lyman B. Smith, contain the only written account of a water rights fight between lumbermen and townspeople of Plainfield Township.

Sheriff "Brad" Smith was a participant in that fight as a peace officer and, strangely enough, as one of the litigants, for he and his brother, Eugene Smith of St. Clair, were Plainfield Township lumbermen who thought they had a "better idea" for transporting logs in the AuGres River system.

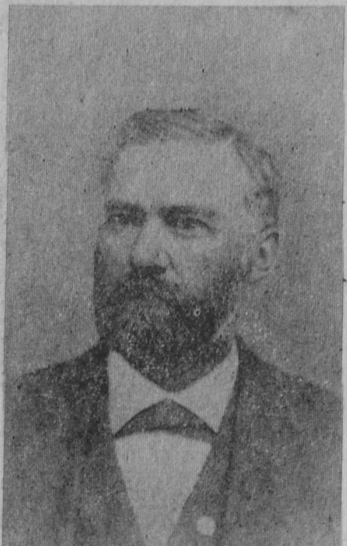
Smith was a man of many hats during a long and colorful career... a timber cruiser when only a boy, an Indian fighter in the West, a cavalry officer during the Civil War, an early day lumberman and two-term Isosco County sheriff.

Born at Amherst, Massachusetts, February 1, 1835, he came to Michigan with his parents in 1836—one year before Michigan became a state. Growing up at St. Clair, he and his brother, Harrison, came to Saginaw in 1851 to "look land" for their elder brother, Eugene. Before reaching his 20th birthday, Brad had entered the highly speculative lumbering business when he purchased nine lands in the Saginaw region and later headed west to lumber in the Minnesota Territory.

Lumbering near St. Anthony's Falls, Smith was there early enough to see Minnesotans change the name of their metropolis from Pig's Eye to St. Paul, but encroachment of the frontiersmen on the lands of the Indians was to have dire consequences. Sandwiched between his lumbering activities and a trip to Pike's Peak in search of gold, he joined the Minnesota Mounted Rangers which were organized to combat the Sioux during one of the worst Indian massacres in western history. He later served with the First Minnesota Cavalry during the Civil War.

Returning to Michigan in 1866, he came to Isosco County in 1867 and entered the lumbering business in Plainfield Township with his brother, Eugene. The Smiths are remembered today by Smith Creek, an important lumbering day stream over which they owned the water rights between its headwaters at Loon Lake and its eventual connection with Hale Creek to form the East Branch of the AuGres River.

Always keenly interested in politics—he voted for John C. Fremont, first Republican presidential candidate—Smith was elected sheriff of

Isosco County in 1874. While holding the "full time" duties of this office for four years, he continued to take an active part in the lumbering industry and handled the Smith operations in this county.

In the spring of 1877, the Smiths were desirous of speeding the transfer of their logs from Long Lake into Smith Creek via a ditch or sluice cut between Long Lake and Loon Lake. At the closest points, the lakes are about one-half mile apart. Such a ditch would have eliminated a good deal of log skidding, but the idea touched off a legal war between the Smiths, S. G. M. Gates of Bay City, T. F. Thompson and other lumbermen and nearly resulted in a shooting war between themselves and property owners of the Long Lake area.

Smith's brother, Eugene, apparently had the "brainstorm" for digging the ditch between the two lakes. On April 18, 1877, Eugene sent a note by the tote teamster asking Brad for a plot of elevations for that area. The information was returned by the returning tote team and the next day Eugene was in East Tawas to purchase spades and other equipment at Richards' Hardware.

Eugene returned to camp on April 21 and his 30-man crew was set to work on the cut. Gates, who had arrived the previous day from Bay City by steam tug, obtained an injunction from the circuit court and Sheriff Smith went to Loon Lake with Gates to serve the papers on Eugene.

Sheriff Smith returned to Tawas City and caught the next steamboat for Bay City, then traveled by railroad to Detroit. After conferring with his attorney, Otis E. M. Cutchson, one of the "top legal brains" of the county, Smith met with Judge J. B. Tuttle and then sent word to Eugene stating that the injunction was null and void.

The sheriff's diary entry for May 5, 1877, states: "Started for Loon Lake

this morning. Took dinner at the lower camp and went to Long Lake. The ditch is running nicely."

What the Smiths apparently failed to take into consideration, or else ignored, was the fact that because of the higher elevation of Long Lake, a ditch between Long and Loon Lakes would have soon drained the former. It is not known how long the ditch was utilized and there is no further mention of it in the sheriff's diary, but old timers of the Hale area still

remember early stories concerning how armed residents of Plainfield Township turned out en masse to stop use of the ditch and threatened violence if the sluice dam on the Long Lake end was not closed.

Sheriff Smith apparently was a reasonable and well-liked man, judging from his continued friendship with E. V. Esmond of Plainfield, one of the principal objectors to the ditch. In any event, the ditch was blocked off before it had a chance to

dig a deep channel between the two lakes and completely deplete the water supply of Long Lake.

The problem of log transportation was solved later when the railroad extended a branch line through Hale and beyond Long Lake. Traces of the ditch dug nearly 100 years ago between the two lakes are still evident and Dennis Chrvia, present township supervisor, walked over the route a few years ago to mark its location.

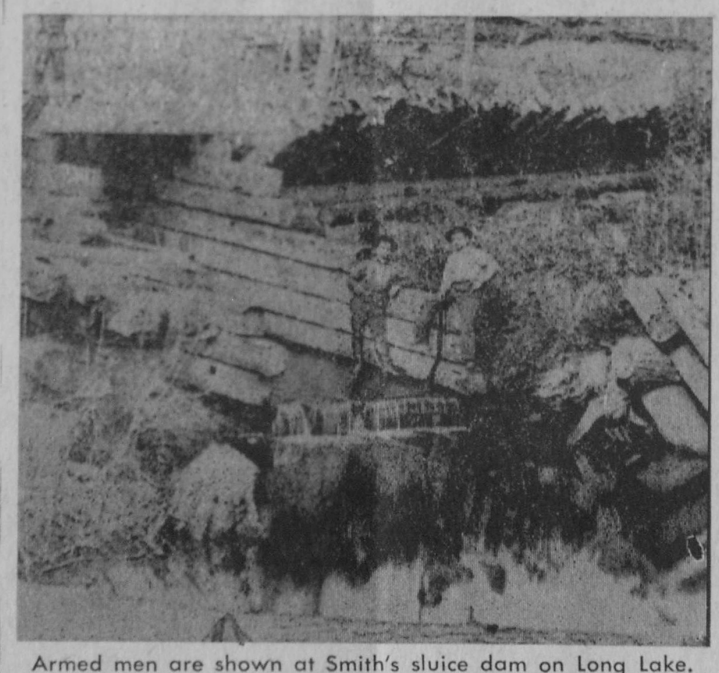

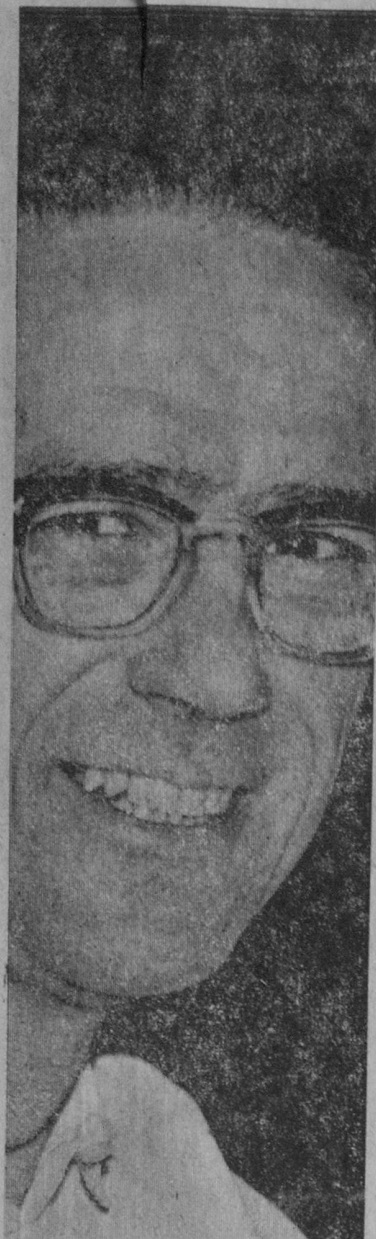

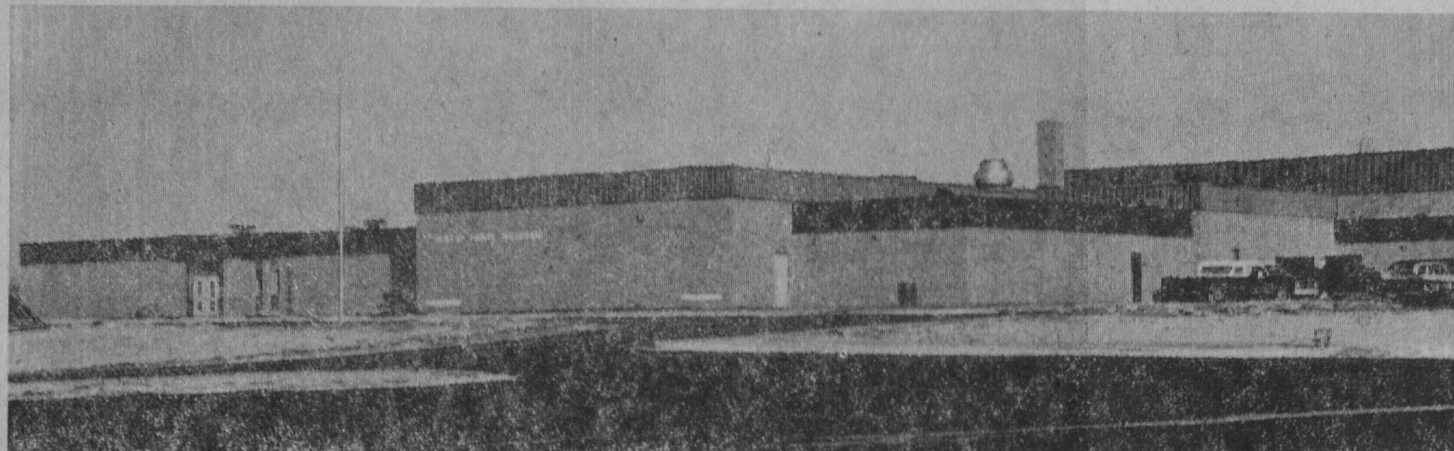

No 'Watergates,' but Energy Crisis Has Had Effect

Iosco's 1973 Headlines Are Reviewed

Local news headlines during the past 12 months had nothing to compare with such national and international events as the Watergate investigation, resignation of Vice President Agnew, threatened impeachment of President Nixon and the Middle East War.

While the national energy crisis has had its share of local concern, a review of headlines in The Tawas Herald from January through December reveals that local stories receiving the most "ink" concerned the federal court conviction and sentencing of Richard Harwood, former president of Peoples State Bank, on charges of misappropriation of funds, along with a lawsuit filed against bank directors by Hartford Indemnity Company; school elections and school financial problems, and the continued problems for property owners caused by shoreline erosion.

Headlines during January started off on a pleasant note when Hale Area School announced the opening of its new 1.6-million-dollar junior and senior high school; on January 10, the Herald's lead story reported

that Harwood stood mute in federal court on a 36-count indictment; one of the main stories on January 17 was that Oscoda Rolled Products Division of Thompson Company was destroyed by fire and 215 persons were thrown out of work. The plant has never re-opened; County Treas. Edward Nelkie caused a stir for the county board of commissioners on January 24 when he reported that Iosco ended 1972 with a cash balance of \$82,398 in its general fund, predicted that the county would end 1973 with a similar balance and pointed out that the board of commissioners had exceeded its 1972 budget by \$88,934; a story on January 31 revealing that the lock on the Tawas Sanitary Landfill had been changed in order to comply with a state health department directive to eliminate the need for daily backfilling had a different ending later in the year.

February's headlines began with two Tawas area residents named as top winners in the state lottery. Clifford Anschuetz won the grand prize of \$200,000 and Mrs. Elmer Squires received \$50,000; that same week of February 7 saw the Tawas Area Board of Education proposing construction of a new high school building and this story was to be continued for several months; on February 28, it was reported that Hartford Indemnity Company had paid \$775,000 to Peoples State Bank for losses arising out of discrepancies in bank records.

The first week in March saw the start of construction on two wooden bridges over the Tawas River. The bridges, along with a retaining wall along Ninth Avenue and construction of a new parking lane at the Tawas City Park, were completed in the fall.

The principal story the first week in April concerned Tawas Area Board of Education's announcement that it was calling for a vote on a \$5,365,643 general obligation bond issue to finance construction of a new high school; on April 11, it was reported that SSGT. Dennis V. DeFur, 25, Wurtsmith Air Force Base, was killed when his parachute failed to open during a skydiving jump over the Iosco County Airport; Baldwin Township was the first local governmental unit in Iosco to apply for the federal flood insurance program. Other local units were to apply for this coverage in succeeding months.

May 2, non-instructional employees of Tawas Area School, represented by the American Federation of County and Municipal Employees Union, voted not to strike Tawas Area School, following a threatened walkout; voters of Tawas Area School District defeated a proposition to bond the district for construction of a new school; Silver Valley was closed by the forest service to all overnight camping and motorized vehicle use as a means of rehabilitating park vegetation.

Another major story developed in July when Tawas Area Board of Education went on record again as opposing a senate bill which would include this district in the Kirtland

Community College District.

Top events in August included a story about Hartford Indemnity Company filing a \$1,675,000 suit against Peoples State Bank directors, claiming the directors improperly surrendered their delegated duties to its former president. The bank later asked the court to determine if it should be included in the insurance company's suit against the directors; the August 15 issue reported that Tawas Bay was the site of its third international Lightning regatta with more than 100 boats participating; erosion along Tawas Bay was threatening US-23 and the M-55 intersection; on August 29, it was reported that Tawas Area School opened the fall term utilizing a split session as a means of relieving overcrowded conditions.

September opened with voters of Whittemore-Prescott Area School District approving 22 mills of taxes for 1973-74 operation; East Tawas and Tawas City accepted a contract with Multi-County Landfill for the deposit of all residential, commercial and industrial refuse; the September

12 issue reported that Tawas Area School District voters approved a 7½-mill operation tax levy for school operation.

In October, announcement was made by the Tawas City Council that it was proceeding with establishment of proposed special assessment districts to finance \$250,000 in sewer construction; no action was taken by a circuit court judge in Arenac County on a petition from Augres farmers asking that Iosco and Ogemaw Counties be forced to cooperate in an inter-county drainage plan; Harwood was sentenced to the federal penitentiary for a period of five years; an enrollment drop at Tawas Area School resulted in a loss of \$20,800 in state aid.

November's headlines included a ribbon-cutting ceremony held by officials of Kirtland Community College for its new Tawas College Center, followed the next week by an announcement by Kirtland that it proposed a state department of education plan for establishing community college districts. The college claimed that it was serving Iosco with its new Ta-

was College Center and believed this county should be included in its service area; a federal judge denied Harwood's first appeal to set aside his conviction and a second appeal still awaits a decision; a recount of votes indicated that Oscoda Area's millage vote ended in a tie and was defeated; John N. Brugger was re-elected mayor of Tawas City by only nine votes over Mrs. Mildred DeBeau and voters approved a general obligation bond issue for financing construction of a new sewer force main.

December's principal headlines concerned an announcement that discussion was under way on a proposed plan to establish joint water and sewer service for the East Tawas, Tawas City, Baldwin, Tawas and Alabaster Township area; Tawas Area Board of Education pleaded for payment of annual taxes in order for the school to pay its past due bills; it was announced that Tawas City post office would have to go "house hunting" effective July 1, 1974, as its present location had been leased to the county.

FHA to Allocate \$97,485,000 to Michigan During 1974

The allocation of rural development loan funds for Michigan for fiscal year 1974 will amount to 97,485-million dollars, Calvin C. Lutz, state director of the Farmers Home Administration (FHA), announced Monday, December 24.

Through FHA, the United States Department of Agriculture serves

farmers, rural residents and towns of up to 10,000 population with farm ownership and operating, housing and community facility loans. In towns below 50,000 or open country, loans are available to develop business and industry.

Current allocations for FHA's farmer programs in Michigan pro-

vide 65-million dollars for farm ownership loans and an additional 6.9-million dollars for farm operating loans. A national apportionment of 100-million dollars was made for farm emergency loans, with the proviso that "emergency loans in amounts necessary to meet the needs resulting from natural disasters in Michigan" would be provided.

Under the community services programs, allocations have been made in four separate categories: 13.86-Million dollars for water and waste disposal loans, 1.46-million dollars for community facilities loans, 5.12-million dollars for business and industrial loans and \$245,000 for industrial development grants.

Apportionments for FHA's rural housing program were divided between single family dwellings and rural rental housing. The allocation of housing funds for low interest loans to low income families designated 14.8-million dollars to be used for loans to purchase and renovate existing dwellings and 12.95-million dollars for construction of new homes; 28.65-million dollars was provided for regular, full interest individual housing loans.

Rental housing loan funds of six-million dollars are divided so about two-thirds goes for units with subsidized rents, the remainder for units with regular rent payments. Although final allocation was just completed, the fiscal year started with July 1, 1973, so loans have been made against these now official totals, Lutz said.

W-P Cards Handed Loss to Hale Eagles; Season's First Win

It was a long time coming, but the Whittemore-Prescott Cardinals broke through for a victory against the Hale Eagles, 70-51, on December 21. The Cardinal junior varsity squad came from behind to win, 34-29.

The visiting Eagles and Cards had lost all games going into the fray and both were looking for a win. The game was close for the first two minutes of play until the Cards scored 10 straight points to take a 14-4 lead.

The Eagles closed the gap to 19-17 early in the second quarter, but two quick buckets by the Cards gave them a six-point lead. At intermission, the Cards led, 37-25.

Whittemore-Prescott's close press defense kept the Eagles off balance as Jim Moraitis, Roy Hill, Bob Clayton and Dave Tunney controlled the backboards. Both coaches used reserves freely late in the game.

Ernie Maas of Hale led all the scoring with 17 points. Moraitis led the winners with 16 points, while Bob Clayton and Joe Smith hit double figures for the Cards with 14 points each.

Two other Eagles, Steve Humphrey and Tyson Shellenbarger, hit double figures with the former scoring 14 and the latter meshing 13.

The game ended action for both teams during the holiday break.

Age No Barrier to Receiving Benefits

Question: My brother was only 25 when he died last month. He left a 21-year-old widow and two children, a two-year-old and a baby, five months old. Even though my brother-in-law was very young, could he not still have enough work under social security for his wife and children to get monthly checks?

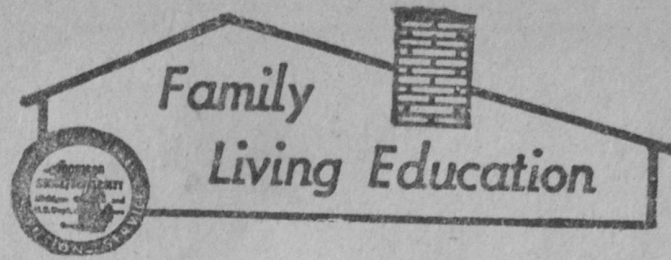
Answer: Yes, if your brother had as little as 1 1/2 years of work under social security, his wife and children could get monthly social security survivors' checks and a lump-sum payment to help with the funeral expenses. Your sister-in-law should call, write or visit any social security office as soon as possible to apply for benefits.

Question: I am 19 and a college sophomore. My mother, who worked under social security, was paying almost all my college expenses before she died a couple weeks ago. Is there any way I could get some financial help for my education from social security?

Answer: You may be eligible for monthly student payments if your mother worked long enough in employment or self-employment covered by social security. If you are single and a full-time student, you should call, write or visit any social security office immediately to apply for student benefits.

Question: I had worked at a job for nearly 25 years until my doctor recently ordered me to quit because of a serious heart condition. Even though my husband is still working, can I receive monthly social security disability payments?

Answer: If you are found eligible for disability payments on your own work record, you will be able to receive monthly checks. The fact that your husband is working will have no effect on your monthly payments. You should call, write or visit any social security office immediately to apply for disability payments.

What will your food dollars buy for you in 1974, the New Year?

Right now you are a frustrated, troubled and often an angry food consumer. Your retail food prices have increased 20 percent in a single year and you are faced with a marked increase in 1974.

The fact that American consumers spend less of their income for food than do consumers of most other developed countries does not make any of us happy in face of spiraling food prices.

The fact, that we do need to be informed consumers is important. If we must make adjustments in food buying for our family table, let's not let the nutritional quality of the family diet deteriorate.

Let's take a look at some changes which we may expect from the food

processors in this new year: We will see increased production of lower cost imitation products, such as meat substitutes and imitation milk; changes in types of products and packaging as a result of a lack of plastics and other packaging materials; reduced availability of highly-perishable foods resulting from the effect of the energy shortage on delivery schedules; increased use of processing technology which will extend shelf life and reduce transportation costs such as drying of fruits and sterilization of milk, for example, because of reduced availability and higher costs; many more processed fruits and vegetables will be consumed.

Now all of this means that if we are to feed our families well with good nutritional meals while staying within a reasonable dollar food budget we must make best choices and buy wisely with meals planned ahead.

Your extension staff stands ready to assist you with food selection, buying information and gardening information. This could be one way to help in balancing the food budget.
