

# 'Mike' Nunn New C of C Executive

Tawas Chamber of Commerce board of directors announced Tuesday (yesterday) the appointment of W. D. "Mike" Nunn as the chamber's new executive director.

Nunn brings to the chamber 31 years of public service. He is known to most people in the area as the former owner of Nunn Hardware, which was located at East Tawas.

Harris Barkman, chamber of commerce president, said in making the announcement. "We are indeed fortunate to have someone of Mike's experience and expertise in chamber matters."

Nunn's public service career is best noted for reaching the position of vice chairman of the Michigan State Highway Commission and has been honored with numerous commendations for his work over the past years.

He served at one time as chairman of the Iosco County Road Commission and served a term as president of state road commissioners. He served several terms as a member of the chamber's board of directors and was active for years on Silver Valley and Perchville committees.

Born April 21, 1909, at Hale, Nunn attended Bay City Central High School, Ohio State University and Michigan State University.

Following 11 years of service with the Michigan Department of Conservation, he owned and operated a hardware for 28 years at East Tawas. He was a member of the Iosco Road Commission for 15 years, served on the Tawas Harbor Commission, is a charter member of Tawas Kiwanis Club, the East Tawas Lions Club and is a member of Grace Lutheran Church.

He was appointed to the Michigan State Highway Commission by Gov. George Romney on November 13, 1964, and served to June 30, 1971. He received the Michigan Minute Man governor's award in 1967.

He is on the advisory committee of the Upper Great Lakes Commission on Tourist and Recreation and a travel information center was dedicated in his name at Mackinac City on June 16, 1972.

In joining the chamber, Nunn said he was "excited about the challenge" he is undertaking and hopes to accomplish many things for the Tawas area in the future.

Nunn and his wife, Edna, make their home at East Tawas. Their son, Michael, recently graduated from Tawas Area High School and their daughter, Mrs. Shirley Parkin, resides at East Tawas.

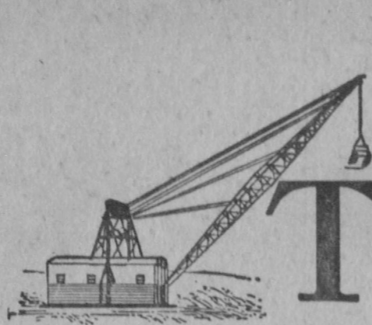
The group performs authentic folk dances and songs, including those handed down in their families from a rural part of Germany. Included in dances are polkas, waltzes, quadrills and other dances.

## Woman Dies As Result of M-55 Collision

Mrs. Esther Sonner, 69, Prescott, became Iosco County's sixth traffic fatality Friday afternoon as the result of injuries received in a two-car crash on M-55, one mile east of M-65.

Investigating sheriff's department officers said that Mrs. Sonner was a passenger in a car driven by her husband, Albert G., 73. Sonner, westbound on M-55, lost control of his car after it struck and killed a fawn, which ran across the highway.

The car swerved across the shoulder and then traveled back across the centerline to collide with a car driven by J. T. Kemp, 50, Marion. Kemp and his wife, Dorothy, were treated at Tawas Hospital and released.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Sonner were admitted to Tawas Hospital and Mrs. Sonner was later transferred to Saginaw.

Other accidents investigated last week by the sheriff's department included one on July 8 in which Richard D. Rakestraw, 20, Lupton, received severe injuries to his right arm and left leg and was treated at Tawas Hospital. Officers said that Rakestraw swerved his motorbike to miss a dog which crossed Kokosing Road at South Branch Road, Plainfield Township.

On Friday, Jeffrey Schlink, 14, Glennie, was treated at Tawas Hospital for a fractured left leg which he sustained in a motorbike crash in Oscoda Township. Officers said the victim was a passenger on a motorbike operated by Albert Tyson, 14, Glennie. The passenger fell off the machine while it was traveling across a farm field.

study possible implementation of sewer work contained in engineering developed five years ago was recommended Monday night by Paul Ropert, superintendent of public works at East Tawas.

Ropert told members of the East Tawas Council that a plan developed by Spicer Engineering Company for a new lift station and sewer mains in the city park could possibly solve a serious water problem in the basement of the community building.

During the present high water period, sanitary sewers are being over taxed to handle the excess amount of storm drainage in the city. He said that under the present sewer arrangement at the park, sanitary sewer mains cannot handle the extra load during rain storms. As a consequence, water backs up into the basement of the community building.

Joseph Badalucco, park manager, told the council that he was forced to close the community building for three days last week because of the sewer problem. Restrooms are located in the basement of the building.

Ropert was of the opinion that the parks and recreation commission should make an immediate study of engineering on hand as he did not believe the city was prepared to spend approximately \$100,000 on a new storm sewer system.

In other business Monday night, Badalucco reported he had received authorization from the parks and recreation commission to contract for a blacktop playing surface on tennis courts at the Newman Street athletic field.

The park manager said that receipts at the city park as of July 1 were \$1,000 higher than at the same time last year.

On recommendation of the city superintendent and city police chief, a request by Norman's Store to use the city sidewalk as a sales area was not allowed. A second request to park a truck on the sidewalk for sidewalk sales in case of inclement weather was also rejected.

The council, however, authorized use of sidewalks and a portion of streets in front of business places for a city-wide sidewalk sale on August 9-10.

An ordinance being developed to prohibit fishing on the bridge over the Tawas River on Bridge Street is to be submitted to the Baldwin Township Board for its approval. About one-half of the bridge is located in the city limits of East Tawas.

The city received notification from the Farm Home Administration that its application for federal funds to assist with water and sewer construction had been canceled. The original application had been filed in 1971.

## Probation Terms to Three Persons

Probation terms were given to three persons appearing last week before Iosco Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller.

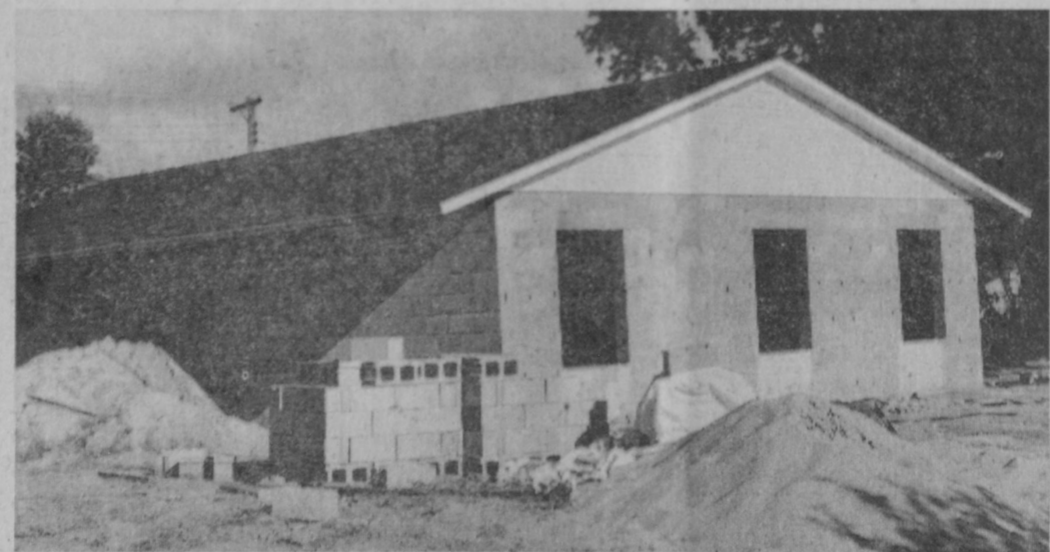
Richard Nelson of Tawas City was sentenced to probation for three years, the first 60 days to be spent in the county jail, for larceny from a building. He was ordered to pay restitution of \$350.

Carol M. Gouine of Oscoda received a sentence of two years probation for violation of the controlled substance act. She was ordered to pay costs of \$100.

George Wehrly of Flint is spending the first two weeks of his one-year probation term in the county jail for violation of the controlled substance act.

## Announce Dates for 20th Annual Tawas Canoe Race

Although the event will be about three months later than usual, there will be a Tawas River canoe race in 1974. To be held Saturday and Sunday, September 14-15, it will be the 20th annual running of the race.

Co-chairmen for the event will be Michael Reed, long active in power boat and canoe racing competition around the state, and Robert Jones, who was the Tawas Perchville polar bear king last winter and has now taken up the paddle of the amateur canoeist.

The two Tawas City men said Saturday that when the chamber of commerce dropped sponsorship of all local events earlier this year, it was feared that the Tawas River race would have to be discontinued.

"This would have been a loss for the community and my wife and I seriously considered taking over arrangements for the race, but time was too short for holding the event in June," said Reed. He contacted Jones and the two men decided they would seek help from area businessmen to sponsor the race.

As a result, Reed and Jones are to appear at the Thursday noon luncheon of the Tawas City Businessmen's Association to seek assistance in the actual operation of the race. The association founded the race 20 years ago as part of Tawas City's centennial celebration.

Reed said he had made preliminary contacts with businessmen of the Tawas area to raise \$1,000 in prize money for the professional division. This would amount to approximately \$100 in prize money per mile for the first 10 places and would make the race the richest in Michigan.

This year's events will be a radical departure from other years. In addition to spreading activities over a two-day period, the race will start at Tawas City's Ninth Avenue boat launching site near the river bridge. Canoeists will paddle upstream in the river and then return to the finish line at the boat launching site.

Reed said that this would eliminate the former last lap in Tawas Bay to the city park, which was dangerous for participants. He believed, that using the same starting and finishing line near the river mouth would provide better race control, as well as making the race more interesting for spectators.

Three trophies are to be awarded the first three places in seven of the eight divisions planned for the event. The lone exception will be the men's amateur division. Special handcrafted trophies are being designed and prepared for the winners.

Division will include men's pro-

fessional, men's amateur, women's amateur, junior men, novice men, women's amateur or novice. There will be a senior division mixed doubles race, with the combined ages of each team to be 80 years or more, and a war canoe division with four-man teams.

Reed said that the new program had received the enthusiastic support of the Michigan Canoe Racing Association and a large contingent of professionals is expected to enter the competition. Jones and his wife said they had been "working out" in their canoe in recent weeks and were encouraging other local residents to participate in the various amateur divisions. A number of persons have already indicated interest in the competition.

The week-end of racing starts Saturday at 12 o'clock noon with a race to determine the pole position

for Sunday's race in the men's amateur division. A similar pole position race for the men's and women's professional divisions will start around 1:45 p. m. The mixed doubles race will follow at 2:30 p. m.

Sunday's racing events start with the men's amateur division at 12 o'clock noon. The course will be from the river mouth to Grove's landing on Tawas Lake and then return along the same course to the finish line. Men's and women's professional divisions are to start at 1:45 p. m.

During the above racing events, novice classes are to compete along a shorter course in the river. The war canoe division race will end the program.

Tentative plans are being made to hold a corn roast Saturday night at the Tawas City Park.

## Wilber Residents Hold Noses Until DNR's Man Gets There

Residents of the Wilber Road area, who said Tuesday afternoon that they were getting tired of holding their noses, are asking what can be done about the removal of a deer along the roadway which was struck and killed last week by an automobile.

"We can appreciate the fact that this is a busy season for the local representative of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, but the stench of a dead deer along the highway is something else," said Mrs. Alton Abbott.

Mrs. Abbott told the Herald that the deer had been killed last Thursday. "We have called the DNR officer every day to remove the dead animal, but with no results," said Mrs. Abbott.

She telephoned the state health department, the state police and the sheriff's department, but removal of dead animals is out of the jurisdiction of those agencies.

"We need help and we need it now. This is the third deer killed in traffic which has been left to rot along the roadside in our neighborhood," she stated.

Judge Roth Suffered Fatal Heart Attack at Cabin Here

United States Dist. Judge Stephen J. Roth, who suffered his third heart attack in 21 months Wednesday night while vacationing at his Saginaw Bay cottage in Alabaster Township, died Thursday, July 11, at St. Joseph Hospital, Flint. He was taken first to Tawas Hospital and then transferred early Thursday morning to the Flint hospital.

Judge Roth had undergone surgery to perform a heart bypass operation on April 4 after his second heart attack. A second emergency operation was performed two months ago.

Judge Roth, who grew up in Flint, became one of the best known figures in Michigan. Long active in politics and a former state attorney general, his ruling linking Detroit with 52 suburban school systems in the nation's most sweeping school integration program, has been affirmed twice by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals and is now before the

United States Supreme Court. Resolutions from the American and state bar associations recognized his judicial restraint and fairness during his service on the federal bench.

He is survived by his wife, Evelyn, and five children.

Judge Miller's topic was "Pitfalls" and he advised the group: "It is the duty of the real estate broker and salesman to be aware of the ever increasing number of pitfalls that are awaiting you! Not only are there more pitfalls, but the consequences are more severe. The Land Sales Act provides for a felony and also requires not only the return of consideration paid, but also taxes, interest and substantial attorney fees."

Judge Miller went on: "Zoning is being closely enforced, deeds restrictions checked, plus the new Land Sales Act, Land Use Act and Environmental Protection Act are just a few of the additional pitfalls."

Judge Miller is one of the candidates for the two new seats on the Court of Appeals. He has been a circuit judge in the Alcona, Iosco, Oscoda area for the past 15 years. Representatives of the Borosch, Rollin, Scofield, Prescott and Myles agencies locally were present at the meeting.

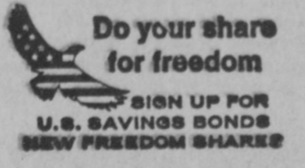

Dr. Minard Filters, chairman of the service committee of the American Cancer Society, announced that a laryngectomy clinic is to be held in this area in September.



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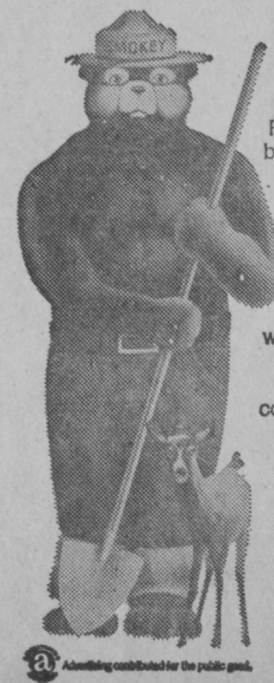

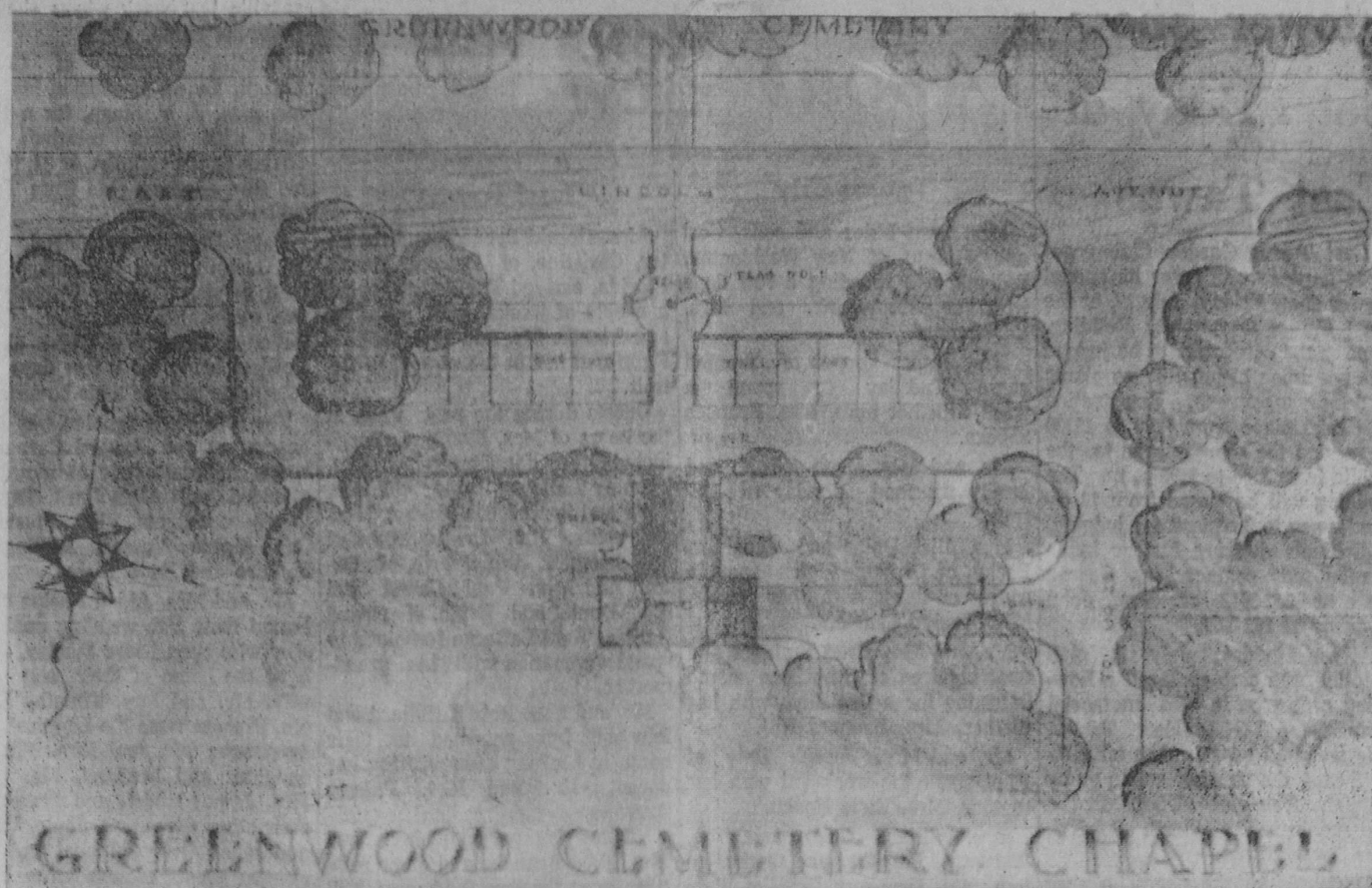

### Access Road Approved for AuGres Marina

A new access road to the Department of Natural Resources' fishing site at the mouth of the AuGres River has been approved by the state senate and the house was to pass the \$17,500 appropriation last week.

The appropriation for the new road, to be located in Sims Township, was originally expected to cover one-half the anticipated \$35,000 cost. County road commission officials now believe that the amount may not be high enough.

**May Designate Payee to Cash SS Checks**

**Question:** My husband has been receiving both a small social security check and the gold colored check for Supplemental Security Income. He had a stroke last month which left him completely paralyzed. Can I endorse these checks by signing both of our names on them?

**Answer:** In order for you to negotiate your husband's checks, you will have to be designated as his representative payee. It is extremely important that you contact your social security office without delay to file the necessary forms. We will need specific information about his condition, as well as certain information about your qualifications for serving as his payee.

**Question:** My mother is a widow and, before she applies for widow's benefits, would you please explain under what circumstances a widow gets 100 percent of her husband's social security benefits?

**Answer:** If your mother applies for monthly social security payments when she is 65 or older, she will get 100 percent of her husband's benefit rate if he never received reduced benefits before his death. If he was getting reduced benefits at the time of his death or if your mother applies before she is 65, then her monthly payments will be at a reduced rate. Any social security office will be glad to help her with her application and give exact amounts.

**Question:** I am blind and have been since birth. My Supplemental Security Income checks, I understand, are based on my blindness. If I go back to work, will this affect my benefits?

**Answer:** All Supplemental Security Income benefits are based on a person's income as well as their age or disability. It is ex-

remely important that you notify your Social Security office of any and all changes in income. If you are blind and go to work, your benefit will be redetermined considering your new income. Your employer's name and address and the date you began working will help the social security office to complete the necessary action.

**Question:** My wife and I were both getting monthly social security checks on my earnings record until she died two months ago. She was not eligible for payments on her own because she had never worked under social security. When I asked the undertaker for a copy of her death certificate so I could apply for a lump-sum death payment, he told me not to bother, that I would not be able to get it. I would like to know if he is right.

**Answer:** Yes, the undertaker was right in telling you not to apply because the lump-sum death benefit is only made when a worker who was covered by social security dies. Since your wife had never worked under social security, there is no lump-sum death benefit payable.

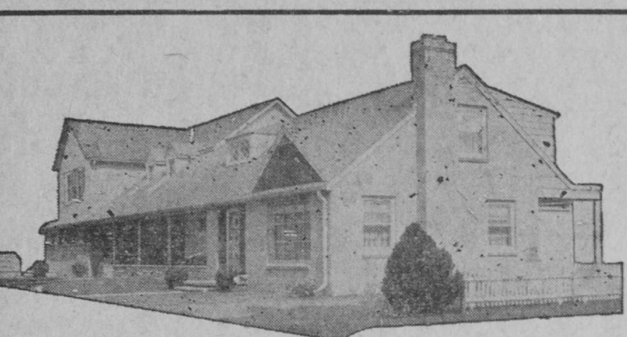

**Nectarines—A Peachy Cousin**  
The nectarine, even though the myth lingers, is not something scientists conjured up by crossing a peach with a plum. This popular relative of the peach was first grown in China over 2,000 years ago. Trader caravans carried it to the Near East, where it flourished in Persian gardens as a delicacy.

Explorers apparently brought the fruit from Europe to the Western Hemisphere, where it was grown as a curiosity in the Eastern United States in the early nineteenth century. During the gold rush era, nectarines were introduced to California.

After World War II, plant breeders succeeded in increasing the nectarine's size and deepening the skin color. The faint blush on a greenish background was changed to its present gold and crimson color. Today's nectarine is also firmer and the flesh is golden instead of white.

Classified as a subspecies of the peach, nectarines occasionally grow on peach trees and vice versa. About 60 varieties have been developed, although only 10 account for almost all commercial sales. Most of the United States crop is grown in the San Joaquin Valley of California.

Federal marketing order regulations help insure a steady flow of nectarines to the consumer and provide for industry-wide standards of quality, size and maturity. To guarantee that shipments comply with requirements, all nectarines are inspected by a federal-state inspection service, operated cooperatively by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service and the California Department of Agriculture.

Nectarines do not have to be peeled and are great eaten out-of-hand. At breakfast, nectarine slices brighten up a bowl of cereal. They combine well in many kinds of salads and fruit cups. Topped with ice cream, they make a delicious simple dessert. More ambitious families may want to try making homemade nectarine ice cream or sherbet. Other dessert ideas include tarts, puddings, short cakes and pies.

How to store if not quite ripe when purchased, nectarines should be held at temperatures of 65 to 70 degrees Fahrenheit until ripe and then refrigerated. When ripe, they will "give" ever so slightly to palm pressure and will show no green at the stem end.

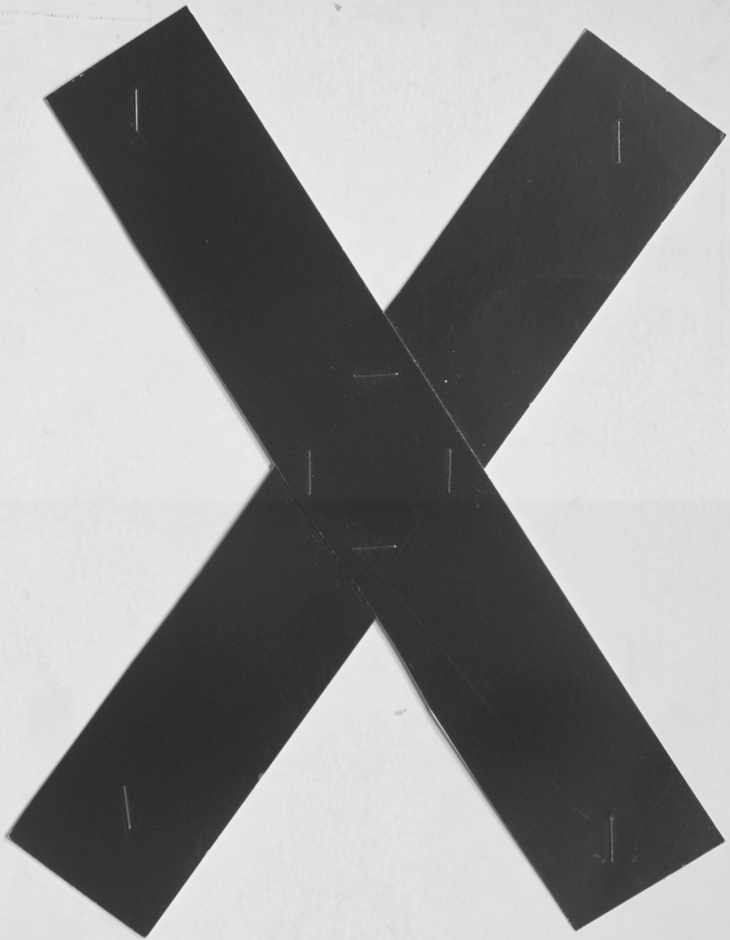
