

Answer: If your mother applies for monthly social security pay-ments when she is 65 or older, she will get 100 percent of her husband's benefit rate if he never received reduced benefits before his death. If he was getting reduced benefits at the time of his death or if your mother applies before she is 65, then her monthly payments will be at a reduced rate. Any social security office will be glad to help her with her application and give exact amounts.

Question: I am blind and have been since birth. My Supplemental Security Income checks, I understand, are based on my blindness. If I go back to work, will this affect my benefits.

Answer: All Supplemental Security Income benefits are based on a person's income as well as their age or disability. It is ex-


