Officially greeting the club were Mayor Robert Bolen of East Tawas and Mayor John N. Brugger of Tawas City.

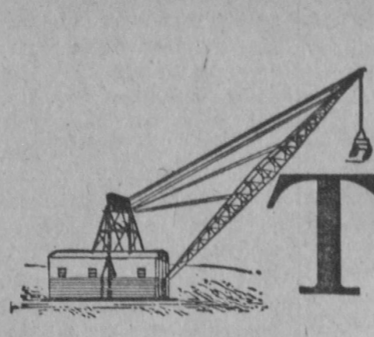
Hosts for the visit are Mr. and Mrs. Carl Schaaf of Tawas City, who have been members of the caravan club since 1969.

Various sections of the United States are represented in the caravan. Members signed up for a tour around Michigan after attending the national rally at South Bend, Indiana.

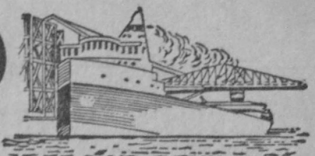
As a means of determining the impact of such a caravan on business in the community, \$2,500 in silver dollars has been distributed to club members.

TA Board Drops Fight on Tax Loss

Acting on advice of its attorney, Tawas Area Board of Education decided Monday night that it would not institute court action challenging the seating of a member of the Iosco Tax Allocation Board.

After researching the question posed by the board of education concerning the legality of the seating of Charles Smith, Oscoda Township supervisor, on the tax allocation board, Atty. Michael Freel said Monday night that the board of education had not followed the state statute regarding an appeal.

Freel said that the law provides that such an appeal be made within 15 days of the tax allocation order and this was not followed. After the allocation board took its final action on May 29, the board of education waited until June 10 before directing its attorney to investigate the matter.

Freel was of the opinion that it would be "an embarrassing experience" for the board of education to take action at this time, as the tax certification had been made. He stated that precedent had been established for the specified appeal time.

While Freel was of the opinion that the board of education could challenge Smith's seat on the allocation board as it appeared that Oscoda Township does not qualify under the law as a municipality, he said that the question of whether or not persons living on Wurt-

smith Air Force Base could be considered as residents of the municipality was a "judicial quagmire."

At the June 12 meeting, Supt. Edward J. Barry said that a municipality of 10,000 people is allowed to have its own representative on the tax allocation board, but believed that Oscoda Township did not qualify under terms of the act as the air base is not part of the municipality as it pays no taxes, is a federal government installation and is tax exempt.

In addition, Freel said his research had indicated that a second member of the allocation board was not properly appointed. Ralph Western, appointed by the probate judge to represent the county at large, is a member of the East Tawas City Council. Freel said that the law specifically prohibits the at large representative from holding office.

Western supported schools during voting by the tax allocation board in its deliberations last spring.

Freel said he had contacted the school's attorney at Lansing, who was in agreement that action at this time would be inadvisable. Freel advised the board of education to wait another year and then "take a hard look" during proceedings of the allocation board. If the board of education was then not satisfied with the division of taxes, an appeal could be started during the specified time.

The matter came to a head following the preliminary tax order. Boards of education of the county were unhappy when operational taxes to schools were lowered from 9.7 to 9.25 mills and county operation benefited by a one-half mill increase.

At the present time, the county board of commissioners is awaiting a petition from the tax allocation board for submitting a pegged millage proposal to voters in November. If such action is approved by voters, there would be no need for a tax allocation board.

Board OK's Tuition For Busch Family

Tawas Area Board of Education voted Monday night to allow a Sherman Township family residing in Whittemore - Prescott Area School District to continue sending their child to Tawas Area School District on a tuition basis.

Mr. and Mrs. Harold Busch, whose earlier efforts to transfer their property from Whittemore-Whittemore-Prescott Area School District to Tawas Area School District had been denied, were given permission to send their child to Tawas Area.

Boards of education of both Tawas Area School and Whittemore-Prescott Area School District had been denied, were given permission to send their child to Tawas Area. The two boards of education are to meet jointly to discuss new boundary lines for the district. The boundary line hedge-podge in Sherman Township resulted in the 1950s during reorganization of the two school districts.

The Busches proposed that the board of education allow them to "trade children" with their neighbors, who desired to send their children to Whittemore-Prescott Area School, although the family lived in Tawas Area School District and was paying tuition at Whittemore-Prescott Area School.

Members of the board of education were of the opinion that the other family was not involved at this point as a formal request had not been received. Inasmuch as the Busch family owns 80 acres of land in Tawas Area School District, the board was unanimous in its action allowing the Busch child to attend this school.

Under a provision of state law, the board of education must reimburse the tuition cost when the party involved owns property in the school district. A quirk in the state law established tuition for entering a child into Tawas Area School District at only \$21 annually. Tuition for most districts is \$500 and, in 1968, the tuition here was \$600.

Mrs. Busch said she was pleased with the board's action as she is a working mother and it would create a hardship if her child did not attend Tawas Area School. She said the family's ties were in Tawas and that it would be easier to arrange for a babysitter if her nine-year-old rode on a Tawas bus.

Plans Proceeding on Annual Show

Plans are proceeding on schedule for the 14th annual Tawas Bay Art Show for artists and craftsmen to be held August 3-4 at the Tawas City Park and the Iosco County Building.

Last day for receiving registrations in order to be included in the show's printed program is Wednesday, July 24. Others may register up to and during the show.

Among the 80 persons registered as of Friday are three who will give demonstrations. Included are Stephen Smilor and Barbara Demenski, potters, and Dolores Slowenski, weaver. Portraits in pastel will also be demonstrated.

Following the show, Miss Slowenski will conduct classes in weaving from August 6 to August 10 at the Tawas Bay Artists' art center, 810 West Westover Street, East Tawas. Her visit here is supported by the Michigan Council of the Arts.

Miss Slowenski, a resident of Saginaw, has a bachelor of fine arts degree in weaving and ceramics from Wayne State University. She has done additional work at the Society of Arts and Crafts, University of Detroit and is currently

employed as assistant director of the Saginaw Art Museum. Interested persons may register for classes with her at the art show or by telephoning Mrs. Joseph Pellerito, 362-5633, or Mrs. Harold Peterson, 362-3198.

Members of the art show committee include Mrs. Herbert Blust, Mrs. Herbert Hertzler, Mrs. James Fowler, Mrs. Pellerito, Mrs. Richard Stock, Mrs. James Race and Mrs. Peterson. Herbert Blust has charge of outdoor staging, while Gary Niekie and Richard Atkins are in charge of signs.

As in previous years, guides will be on hand to assist the exhibitors. All are members of the Keyette chapter of Tawas Area High School, under direction of Mrs. Harold Knight.

Members of Tawas Bay Artists and friends are to be hostesses and are to serve coffee to the exhibitors.

Door prizes are to be awarded Saturday, August 3, 8:00 p. m., at the band stand in the city park. The public is invited and admission is free.

Seek Endorsement by Area Fishermen

Need for endorsement by fishermen and private individuals concerning a proposed boat launching ramp and parking area on the east side of the mouth of the Tawas River was emphasized at Thursday night's meeting of the Tawas City Council.

Harris Barkman, president of Tawas Chamber of Commerce, told councilmen that he was concerned over the lack of response to his recent plea to local residents to send letters supporting the project.

The chamber president said that he and Mayor John N. Brugger had met with representatives of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources several times during the past two years and that preliminary engineering plans had been completed.

"Despite our letters in the press and on radio, we do not seem to be getting through," said Barkman. "Officials of both Tawas City and East Tawas have endorsed the project, but unless the state receives the assurance that the community, as well as visitors want the proposed boat launching facility, the DNR will not go ahead with plans."

Barkman said that letters are necessary because of the cost of the proposed project, estimated at around \$400,000. The state, which has been seeking a location for a boat launching ramp on Tawas Bay for several years, would pay 90 percent of the cost, said Barkman.

"The benefit to the entire community would far offset any local cost and we must make people aware of its local value," he stated.

Mayor Brugger said that plans for the proposed facility were available for public inspection at the city hall. The proposal calls for purchase of property on the east side of the river mouth near the US-23 bridge. The acquisition would include three existing buildings on the site for use by the city as service buildings and a tourist information center.

Approximately 50,000 cubic yards of material would be required for land fill and the present lagoon would be dredged. The boat launching site would be located in the protected lagoon area. A parking lot would be provided for 100 cars and boats.

The mayor stated that approximately 25 percent of the total population of the Tawas was involved in the tourist and resort business and believed the proposed facility would add a much needed service for visitors and local residents alike.

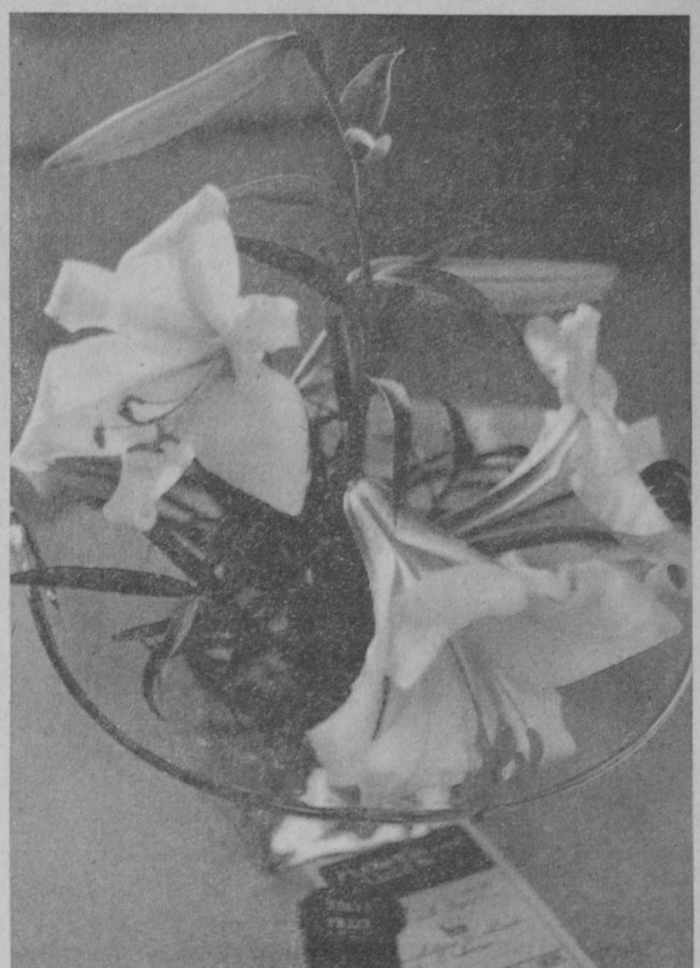
City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that the lack of local response may be due to the fact that the city's present boat launching facility on Ninth Avenue is seemingly adequate for local boaters. He pointed out, however, that the present facility is crowded during the boating season and lacks adequate parking.

The city manager said it would be difficult to reach out-of-town visitors, who vacation and enjoy boating in this area, to seek support of this project.

Boaters, fishermen and other interested residents are urged to send personal endorsement letters to the City of Tawas City or Tawas Chamber of Commerce.

Treasurer Takes Issue With County Commission Over Loss of Interest

County Treas. Edward Nelkie indicated Wednesday that he was opposed to a recent contract adopted by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners which authorized purchase of a \$40,000 compactor machine for use at Multi-County Sanitary Landfill.

The private contractor, which provides dump service to the county effective July 1, is to repay the county treasury over a period of five years. No interest is to be charged for use of the money.

The purchase was made through federal revenue sharing funds received by Iosco and Nelkie told commissioners that he had to cash a \$50,000 certificate of deposit on which the county had been receiving 6 1/2 percent interest.

"Over a period of five years," said Nelkie, "the county will be losing \$5,700 in interest to purchase equipment to supplement private enterprise."

Robert Foster, chairman of the commission, said that the matter had been studied thoroughly and that the contract cost for sanitary landfill service would have been substantially higher had the interest free arrangement not been adopted. Nelkie said that the total amount of fees received through his office for the county general fund is the result of careful investment of public money and believed that interest should at least be charged on use of the money for purchase of the equipment.

In other business, the commission tabled action until the next meeting on a pegged millage proposal which was presented at the June session of the county tax allocation board. The commission awaits receipt of an official petition from the allocation board and the proposal may be placed before voters at the November election.

A resolution by Charles Smith of Oscoda, a member of the tax allocation board, called for asking voters to approve 17 mills of taxes, two mills above the 15-mill limitation under control of the allocation board. The millage, to be in effect for five years, would be pegged at 5.5 for the county, .3 for the intermediate school district, 10 mills for schools and 1.2 for townships. Wade, Trim and Associates was retained by the county for the purpose of providing preliminary engineering concerning the practicality of abating flooding of the Au Gres River. The \$10,000 cost would

be divided equally between Iosco and Ogemaw Counties. The two counties are presently involved in court litigation with AuGres area farmers, who are attempting to force Iosco and Ogemaw into a tri-county drainage district with Arenac County.

Further discussion was held on the possibility of Iosco County providing its own mental health services, rather than to be involved in the present seven-county regional concept. No official action was taken on the matter.

Authorization was given to Stanley Snable, magistrate, to apply for up to six years of military service credit on the county's retirement system. All back payments and interest are to be borne by Snable.

Alert Residents Helped Law Officers With Apprehension of Two Burglars

Two Bay City men apprehended Sunday entered a plea of guilty in circuit court Monday to seven breakings and enterings in the Tawas-Sand Lake area.

Released on bond after being held overnight at the Iosco County Jail were David Laskowski and Mark D. Hacker.

Apprehension of the two men came after a series of events in which local residents witnessed the breaking and entering of a cabin south of Tawas City and one of the two men was later apprehended by local citizens while in the process of entering a cabin west of Sand Lake.

An Alabaster Township resident called the Iosco Sheriff's office around noon Sunday to report that two men had entered a cabin at 1651 South US-23 owned by Joseph DiPonio of Southfield and had removed several fishing rods. The two men had fled the scene before officers arrived, but ownership of the car was traced to Laskowski through the license number furnished by witnesses.

An area description of the car and the license number was broadcast to area police agencies by the sheriff's department, but it was not until 1:30 p. m. that Michigan State Police at East Tawas received a call that a breaking and entering was in progress on Old State Road, three miles west of Sand Lake.

When Troopers Larry Beals and Kirt Titus arrived at the scene, they found that neighbors were holding Hacker, but Laskowski had fled into a nearby wooded area. Search for the man was to no avail as he had caught a ride to Tawas City. Laskowski apparently told the driver that he had "lost" his buddy while fishing and needed a ride.

Laskowski, whose description was not received by the sheriff's department, was not recognized when he showed up at the county jail and requested use of the telephone. After making his telephone call, he left the jail.

Five hours after making his escape at Sand Lake, Laskowski was apprehended by Beals, who had gone off duty and was driving his motorcycle along US-23. The man walking along the highway answered the description of the fugitive and the officer stopped his motorbike and placed him under arrest. Laskowski had a free ride to the state police post on Beals' motorbike.

The two men admitted one breaking and entering in Arenac County, two south of Tawas City and could recall four or five in the Sand Lake area. Items taken in the burglaries were recovered.

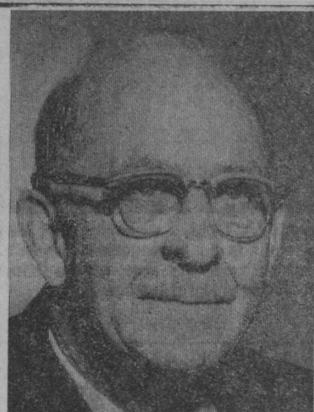
Funeral Today

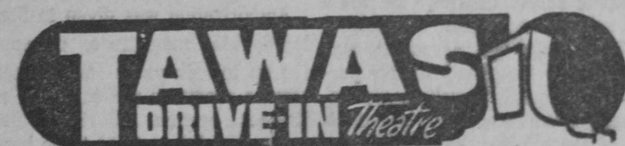

Board Sets Asst. Principal's Duties, Hires Administrators

Establishment of a job description for a new assistant high school principal, adoption of administration contracts, release of two teachers from contracts and approval of contracts for six new teachers were among matters handled Monday night during a busy session of Tawas Area Board of Education.

With an executive session to discuss administrative contracts, the meeting lasted until 11:30 p. m.

Contract for the new assistant principal is basically the same as the one which was in effect two years ago. The position was discontinued when Robert McDonald became principal of the middle school. The only change is that the athletic directorship has been eliminated from the duties of the assistant principal.

The assistant principal will have charge of discipline, attendance, locker assignments, direct the book store operation, manage the activity fund and will occasionally serve as a substitute teacher. Interviews are now being taken to fill the position.

Salary of the assistant principal, as well as other administrators, was not announced by the board of education.

Contracts were approved for John Alexander, high school principal; McDonald, middle school principal; Herman Rollin, Tawas City Elementary Unit principal; Robert H. Crawford, director of noninstructional personnel; Gene Gerber, director of community education.

Daniel DeGood and Richard Salani were released from their teaching contracts to accept positions elsewhere.

New teachers hired included Mrs. Virginia Sloan, formerly of Oscoda Area School, English and remedial reading, who replaces Mrs. Kathleen Cox; Miss Corrine Talbot, formerly of Oscoda Area, who is to teach language arts in seventh and eighth grades. This is a new position as the seventh grade is to number approximately 220 students in the fall as compared to 180 students last term.

Other new teachers in the middle school include Mrs. Marilyn Barry, wife of the Tawas Area School superintendent who taught last year at Oscoda, seventh grade mathematics replacing Laura Michalski; Carl Brien, who comes from Breckenridge with five years of experience to replace Thad Stender as junior band and marching band instructor.

New teachers offered contracts in the elementary grades are Larry Valentine, fourth grade, and William Deckett, a resident of East Tawas, second grade. Both men taught school last year at Oscoda Area School.

A special meeting is to be held Monday, August 5, to consider ratification of a proposed contract with Tawas Area Education Association. The matter was to have been handled Monday night but the board's negotiator was involved in a personal injury accident on Sunday and was unable to attend.

In other business, the board of education approved one of three requests submitted for use of school buses during the month of August. Approval was given for transporting children participating in the Tawas Knothole League to a baseball game at Tiger Stadium on August 3. The school co-sponsors this program with area municipal and township governments.

Requests from Iosco Flying Club for use of a bus to transport visitors from Iosco Airport to Wurtsmith Air Force Base during a dawn patrol and a bus to transport an area women's softball team to the Michigan Amateur Softball Association tournament were tabled.

The board of education indicated that the above two requests were not connected with school functions. In addition, the request by the women's softball team indicated a request to use a driver from another district, which was not permissible.

At its last meeting, the board of education voted to allow transportation to the Tawas of a group of German youths, who presented a folk dancing program here last Thursday. The board required that Tawas Area Promotions, the sponsor, assume all liability during the trip.

It was reported Monday night that no official word has been received as yet from the school's insurance carrier concerning the school's liability for transporting persons during non-school-connected activities.

Carl Babcock, a member of the board's committee which investigated the matter, said that indications are that liability insurance is not available for non-school activities. He said that the insurance carrier had extended its coverage to include transportation of the German youngsters on a one-time basis and at no additional premium.

The board of education approved

an allocation of \$425 as its share of sponsorship of Tawas Area Knothole League.

It was reported that bus replacement cost had now reached \$15,000 per unit, as compared to \$10,200 a year ago. Besides inflation, the difference represents new state regulations on a more costly system of brakes.

The school has received \$283,110 on anticipated state aid for the next school term and, following a study of the general fund's cash flow, the money has been invested in treasury bills and certificates of deposit through cooperation with Peoples State Bank.

Cost of borrowing the money will be balanced out by investments over a short term. Interest to be received by the school ranges from seven to 7½ percent, while the school is to pay six percent on its state aid anticipation notes.

Iosco County Fair Opens Four-Day Program Today at Hale

"See you at the fair" — will be said many times in the next four days as exhibitors begin their early morning work of assembling exhibits today (Wednesday, July 24) in preparation for the Iosco County Fair at the Hale fairgrounds.

Festivities will take on the carnival theme when the midway and big show of Cook Amusement Company opens at 1:00 p. m. today.

As in previous years, harness racing is expected to draw a large crowd Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 25, 26 and 27. Races begin at 2:00 p. m. each day. Robert Ruckle will act as superintendent of speed for the races. Iosco County Fair is a member of the Northern Michigan Fair and Racing Association. Total purse, divided among winners on a 45-25-15-10-five percent basis, according to finishes, will be \$12,000.

While harness racing is a traditional and important part of any county fair, it is but one feature in the over-all program, according to Richard Samson, veteran secretary-manager of the Hale fair.

Exhibits will provide a major attraction for visitors and all the traditional features of a county

fair program will be there, from livestock judging and a big midway to a parade and games for kids.

Fairgoers are urged to attend the 4-H and Future Farmers of America beef sale Saturday, July 27, at 7:00 p. m. in the grandstand area. All bidders are welcome.

Of particular interest to many fair visitors will be the arts and crafts exhibition building, where displays of art work, baked goods and handicraft will be exhibited. This building also houses the antique display area with its store front booths offering protection to valuable family heirlooms.

Thursday morning, July 25, judging of exhibits and livestock entered by 4-H Club members will begin at 9 o'clock. Opening of the midway and judging of open class horses will take place at 1:00 p. m., followed by harness racing at 2 o'clock.

Friday, July 26, the program will open with judging of 4-H Club horses at 9:00 a. m. Midway and exhibit areas open at 1:00 p. m., preceding the 2 o'clock harness races.

Saturday, July 27, is the big day in the fair program and opens at 10:00 a. m. with games and con-

tests for all ages. Participants in the annual parade are to line up at the fairgrounds prior to the 12:30 p. m. starting time. Harness races begin at 2:00 p. m., after which the midway opens at 4 o'clock. Four-H and FFA beef sale commences at 7 o'clock.

Council OK's Engineering for Reconstruction of Pier

Following recent meetings with the fisheries division of the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, Tawas City Council Thursday night authorized engineering for reconstruction of the fishing pier at the city park.

Estimated construction costs for enclosing the pier with either treated wood piling or sheet steel are to be obtained by the city manager.

Although it was felt that sheet steel would be more expensive than treated wooden piling, the opinion was expressed by several persons that steel would have a more lasting quality and would require less maintenance.

Regardless of the type of construction, estimated state and local funds available for the project would be insufficient to complete the project this year. A state allocation of \$15,000 would be matched by the city.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that a possible saving in the overall cost could result if rock riprap was constructed on both sides of the pier out to deep water. The rock would be covered by concrete and the remainder of the pier would be enclosed with either wood or steel.

The 40-foot-wide pier, which extends 450 feet into Tawas Bay, was originally constructed in 1940 using broken concrete when US-23 was widened through Tawas City. In 1957, steel piling was driven into the lake bottom around the end of the pier and white oak piling enclosed the pier to the shore.

The untreated white oak has deteriorated over the years and wave action has washed away the earthen fill.

It was the opinion of Mayor John N. Brugger that as much work as possible should be accomplished this year with existing funds. He favored the use of steel sheeting.

The city manager said that the city's share of the project could be financed through tax anticipation notes or by borrowing the money through a note. The council is to make a decision as soon as further construction information is available.

In other business, the council authorized an appropriation of \$354, as budgeted, to the Tawas Knot-hole League.

A report from the Iosco Sheriff's Department for city police protection was submitted.

The council authorized an expenditure of \$1,206 for purchase of 10 Christmas street decorations. Ten old decorations on hand are to be repaired.

Tawas City Again Lacks Tax Assessor

Tawas City is again without the service of an assessing officer, according to information presented at Thursday night's council meeting.

It was reported that Wilbur C. Roach, who was appointed city assessor a little more than a year ago after successfully completing the state examination, intended to resign because of business matters. He manages Multi-County Sanitary Landfill, is the county airport manager and operates a janitorial business.

Mayor John N. Brugger told members of the council that considerable work will be required to update property assessment rolls following a 17 percent across-the-board penalty earlier this year from the state tax commission.

Although the 17 percent valuation increase on all residential property was required this year, the mayor said it would be unfair to property owners to continue with the same assessments. He said that some residential property was assessed at or near 50 percent of the state equalized value, while other property was below the required amount.

"Unless we can come up with someone to perform this work, the board of review will have to be brought in to do the work," said the mayor. Several days of work would be required.

He said that a basic front foot assessment would have to be adopted based on the sales study. He said that any changes in assessments would require public hearings.

Young Men Still Must Register

Reports show that draft registrations in Michigan have fallen off sharply during May and June. This decrease is attributed to the belief that many young men 18 years old do not realize that federal law still requires every male citizen and resident alien to register with Selective Service System at age 18. Failure to register is a violation

of the law and may result in the young men being reported to the United States Attorney for possible prosecution.

Registration is a simple process and may be accomplished in a few minutes at any of the 14 area offices in Michigan or by one of more than 900 volunteer registrars in Michigan high schools and colleges.

Men can also register for the draft by mail if they find it difficult to visit a selective service or

registrar. Mail registration forms are available from poster displays located in many post offices, banks, schools and recruiting offices.

A young man required to register can pick up a registration form and complete it at his home where he may be assisted by his family. Instructions are included with the form. When it is completed, he need only fold and mail it. The form is preaddressed and needs no postage.

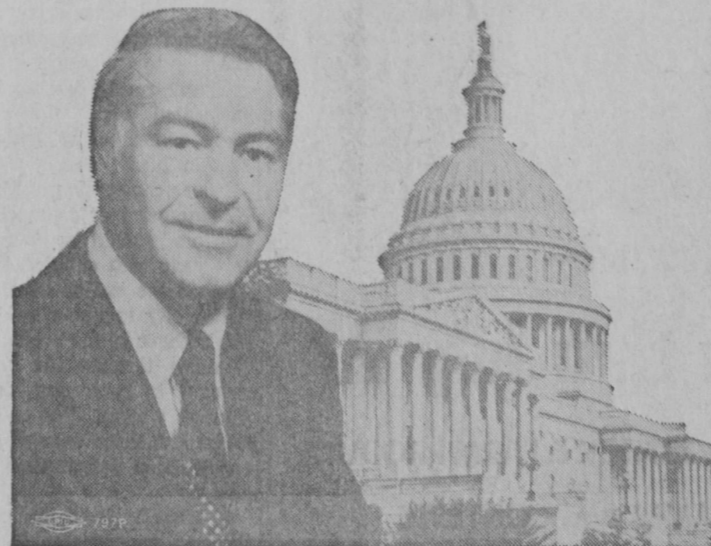

Family Living Education

Let us take a look at food prices. Last year, when we were all screaming about food prices, the cost of food rose an unbelievable 16 percent. This year, the projected increase is "only" 12 percent. But specialists at Michigan State University tell us to face the fact that the era of cheap food is over. We can no longer talk about reducing our food expenditures—food buying is now a matter of managing our food dollars to get the most for our money.

That is the sad but familiar picture of food prices from the consumer's point of view. Have you

ever wondered how the food retailer sees it?

Economists report that the food industry, the nation's biggest big business, is fighting a losing battle of its own. Rising labor costs, increases in the cost of benefits to workers and rising costs in general are cutting food retailers' profits to the vanishing point.

It may be hard for you to believe your friendly local supermarket may even be losing money as you watch the cash register totals rise, but it is true that many food retail operations are barely scraping by—some may even be in the red.

How do they stay in business? One tactic is to react to the decrease in profits on food sales by increasing their sales of more profitable nonfood items. Retailers are also building larger stores to contain their expanding array of merchandise and employing fewer people to run them. Their aim is to keep costs from growing while they increase the volume of merchandise they sell. Food specialists predict these trends will produce bigger changes in the food industry than any we have ever seen.

"Dollars and Decisions in the Supermarket" was one of the popular classes taught at College Week for Women on the Michigan State University campus in June of this year. The following food facts were taken from this class.

Your local supermarket does not put products on special just for your benefit. Retailers expect sales of featured sale items to be about 350 percent higher than usual.

If you could take advantage of all the featured weekly specials at

your grocery store, you could pare about six percent off your food costs.

Shopping with a friend increases your food costs about 10 percent, on the average. Shopping with your family raises costs still more. Do yourself a favor—shop alone!

Be wary of impulse purchases when you first enter the store. You are most susceptible to impulse buying when your cart is empty.

15 Years Ago— July 23, 1939—Property for proposed new banking facilities in Tawas City was purchased by Peoples State Bank. The property consists of six lots, three fronting on US-23 (Lake Street) and the other three fronting on Court Street.

Wages of laborers hired by the City of Tawas City were increased from \$1.45 to \$1.60 an hour.

Lewis Besancon was appointed as special assessor for the Newman Street sewer project at East Tawas. The new sewer will extend north on Newman from State to Franklin Street.

Last week's winners in pram sailing at Tawas Bay Yacht Club were Sandy McKay, Robert Busch, Edward Eppert, Dennis Lorenz and Thomas Merschel.

Salary of Oliver Champine for garbage collection in Tawas City was raised from \$75 to \$80 a week. He presently makes pickups three

days a week.

Tawas Kiwanis Club will be host to clubs throughout the state as part of the golden anniversary celebration of the world's largest planted forest—Huron National Forest.

25 Years Ago— July 22, 1949—The Inglesh sawmill at the corner of Hemlock and Wilber Roads is to be dismantled to make room for the new route of M-55. Built for the production of mine wedges, it has been used during recent years for the manufacture of lumber. The wedges were used in coal mines, but production of Michigan coal has declined in the past few years to where only one mine is in operation.

Plans for a sanitary sewer into the Tawas City Park have been submitted to the state health department. Completion of this project would be a step toward construction of the much desired bathhouse and other facilities in the park.

Don't Wait On Filing For SS

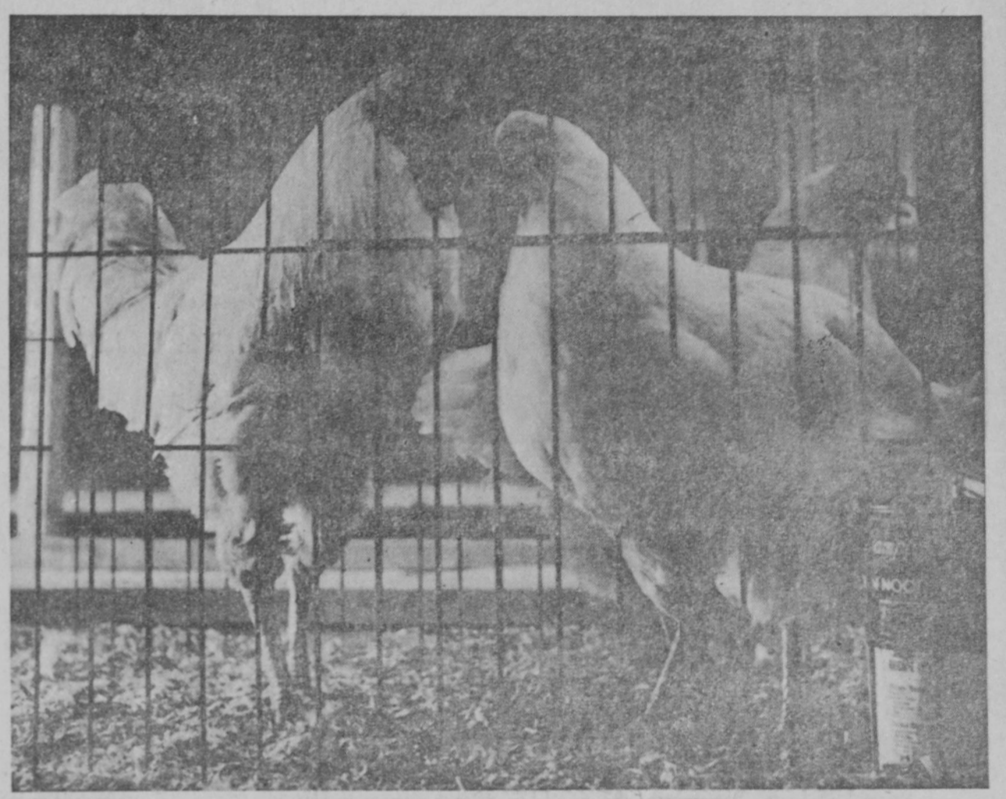
One of the most common myths about social security is that a person should wait until age 65 to file for retirement benefits. It is true that the benefits paid before age 65 are reduced. However, if a person retires before 65, it is generally advantageous to file for reduced benefits. For example, if a person could be entitled to \$200 at age 65, the amount at age 62 will be \$160 a month. For the 36 months between age 62 and 65, a total of \$5,760 in reduced benefits could be paid. The amount of the 20 percent reduction is \$40 per month. If a person delayed filing until age 65 in order to obtain this additional \$40 per month, he would have to draw benefits for 144 months (12 years)

to accumulate \$5,760. Thus, the worker is ahead, so to speak, in accepting reduced benefits for 12 years after age 65 or until he reaches age 77. Since, statistically speaking, the average life span is under age 77, workers would be ahead to file for reduced benefits if retiring before age 65.

Social security interviewers are encouraged to explain the advantages of filing for reduced benefits. In most cases, it is to a worker's advantage to accept reduced benefits if retiring before age 65.

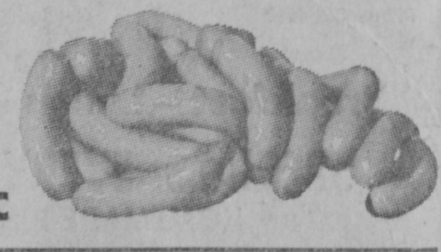

Report Change In Living Arrangement to SS Office

Question: My father entered a nursing home last week. Since he gets supplemental security income (SSI) payments, is it necessary to report his move to social security?

Answer: Yes, it is important that he do so. Any change in a person's living arrangement could cause a change in the amount of his SSI check.

Question: My wife, who had worked for many years in a job covered by social security, died recently. Our only daughter is 27 and has been mentally retarded since birth. Although I work, and expect to continue working for some time, is it possible for my daughter to get any social security benefits on my wife's earnings record?

Answer: Yes, if your wife worked long enough on a job covered by social security, your daughter might qualify for monthly social security childhood disability payments. Your earnings would not affect these payments. You should get in touch with any social security office to apply for benefits for your daughter. You might also ask about the possibility that your daughter might be eli-

gible for supplemental security income.

Question: I became eligible for medicare, I turned down the medical insurance part. Now I want to sign up for it but I understand the deadline was March 31 for people who did not take it when they were first eligible. Does this mean I will never have another opportunity to get the medical insurance part of medicare.

Answer: No, it just means the open enrollment period is closed for this year. However, there is an open enrollment from January through March of every year. You can sign up during that period in 1975 by getting in touch with any social security office.

Question: I am 68 and do not plan to apply for social security retirement benefits for a few more years. However, my wife just reached 62 and she seems to think she can get a wife's benefit on my earnings record even though I am still working. Is she correct?

Answer: No, as long as you continue working and do not get social security retirement benefits, your wife is not eligible for social security payments on your record. However, she may be eligible for reduced payments on her own record if she worked long enough under social security. If she thinks she may be eligible, she should get in touch with any social security office.
