





## Tawas City Again Lacks Tax Assessor

Tawas City is again without the service of an assessing officer, according to information presented at Thursday night's council meet-

It was reported that Wilbur C. Roach, who was appointed city assessor a little more than a year ago after successfully completing the state examination, intended to resign because of business matters. He manages Multi-County Sanitary Landfill, is the county airport manager and operates a janitorial business.

Mayor John N. Brugger told members of the council that considerable work will be required to update property assessment rolls following a 17 percent across-theboard penalty earlier this year from the state tax commission.

Although the 17 percent valuation increase on all residential property was required this year, the mayor said it would be unfair to property owners to continue with the same assessments. He said that some residential property was assessed at or near 50 percent of the state equalized value, while other property was below the required amount.

"Unless we can come up with someone to perform this work, the board of review will have to be brought in to do the work," said the mayor. Several days of work would be required.
