Council Adopts Street Program

One street was scratched and two streets were added to Tawas City's street construction program for 1974, following action Monday night by the city council.

Because of water and sewer connection work to be completed this summer on First Avenue, blacktop work on that street was deleted from this year's program. Replacing that street in the program, at approximately the same cost, will be German Street from M-55 to Maple Street and Sixth Avenue from Mathews Street to Second Street.

At the council's last meeting, Ald. Robert N. Rollin pointed out that German Street was heavily used by truck traffic and believed that consideration should be given in this year's program. A letter from the city engineer recommended that ditches be improved on that street with a possible new route to the river rather than to construct a storm sewer. The engineer was of the opinion that if a water force main should be constructed on that street, the street surface could be recapped at a minimal cost.

Ald. William Groff was of the opinion that Sixth Avenue from Mathews Street to Second Street should be included in the program because school bus and truck traffic was heavy and the street was in poor repair. He said the street had been under consideration for work during the past three years

Two Tennis Courts Get TC Council OK

After months of study and discussion, Tawas City Council Monday night authorized construction of two new tennis courts near the First Avenue baseball field at a cost of approximately \$15,000. The city is to receive \$7,500 from county federal revenue sharing funds to aid in financing the project.

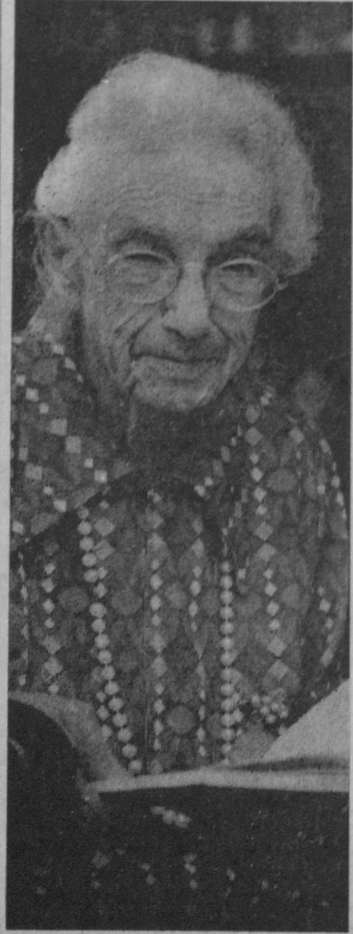
On hand to witness final action by the council were about 30 members of Tawas Area Tennis Club, who have been urging construction of new tennis facilities in the Tawas. Represented were adults and youngsters from the Tawas, as well as surrounding townships.

Gary Stephan, chairman of the park board, said that members of that board had discussed a previous recommendation concerning repairs to the present tennis court in the city park. Because of the extent of the repairs necessary, the park board felt it would be a waste of money to repair the old court and recommended that a new facility be constructed.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said that work could be started after the Fourth of July on preparing the new site and construction of a sub-base.

The two new courts would be constructed according to plans provided by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which allocated \$50,000 in federal revenue sharing money earlier this year to aid local communities to construct recreational facilities.

The two-court facility, measuring approximately 120 by 120 feet, would be constructed of asphalt. The city manager said that the asphalt construction would be ap-

Edna Otis, Iosco Historian, Dies

Edna M. Otis, 94, retired East Tawas newspaper publisher-editor, author and local historian, died Sunday, June 30, at Tawas Hospital. Funeral services are to be held Wednesday, July 3 (today), 2:00 p. m., at Wilber United Methodist Church. Burial will be in Greenwood Cemetery, East Tawas.

Born March 5, 1880, to a pioneer Baldwin Township family, the late Helon N. and Sarah J. Otis, who came to the county in the late 18-60s from New York State, Miss Otis was the last of three sisters living to an advanced age and all having passed away during the past five months. The eldest sister, Mrs. Clara P. Phelps, 102 years of age, died March 10 and Mrs. Ada Ann Schenck, 96, died February 9.

Following graduation from the East Tawas public schools, Miss Otis was employed in the office of the Iosco County Gazette. She taught two years in the rural schools of Iosco County and then returned to newspaper work. In 1916, she became editor of the Gazette and published that newspaper until her retirement in 1947.

Always active in local politics, Miss Otis served for many years on the Iosco County Republican Committee and once served on the Republican State Central Committee.

During her later years, she operated an antique shop in the old Gazette office at East Tawas until ill health forced her retirement about a year ago. She had lived at a rest home at Whittemore for several months and suffered a stroke there on June 20.

A lifetime member of the United Methodist Church, she served as chairman of the Iosco County Centennial in 1957 and the East Tawas Centennial in 1962. She was a charter member and past president of Quota Club of Iosco County, was a member of the East Tawas Ladies Literary Club and other local organizations.

Having access to old newspaper files, county, township and city records, as well as interviewing pioneers on the subject of early days in this county, Miss Otis was an authority on area history and was named by the old Iosco Board of Supervisors in the 1950s as official county historian.

She was the author of numerous newspaper articles dealing with county history and compiled two books, "Their Yesterdays - Ausable and Oscoda," published in 1948, and "Sawdust Days—When the Tawas Area Was Young," which was published in 1973. The latter book was an immediate sell-out and has been republished.

She is survived by several nieces and nephews.

Police Mobilized, but Rock Concert Proved A Fizzle

Mobilization of 15 auxiliary police officers for use last week-end and for the upcoming Fourth of July holiday was authorized Friday at a special meeting of the Iosco Board of Commissioners.

This action followed a request from citizens of the Hale area, who became alarmed last week over prospects of a large gathering of young people there for a week-end rock concert.

More than 100 Plainfield Township citizens attended a public meeting Thursday night at Hale Area High School to discuss means of crowd control, should it become necessary.

Dennis Chrivia, Plainfield Township supervisor, told 18 members of a law enforcement advisory council meeting Friday morning at the Iosco County Building that residents of that township were "very much concerned over the prospects of a large gathering at a rock concert in their neighborhood."

"These people are not going to be pushed around and I don't blame them," said Chrivia. "And I don't think it should be necessary for one to close his business should a large crowd of people develop for this rock concert. I told the people Thursday that we cannot take the law into our own hands should trouble develop; we must have additional police protection and the township is willing to help finance the hiring of additional officers."

Two Hale area youths apparently arranged for holding a rock festival on a farm south of town on M-65. Through questioning of one of the sponsors, Mark Boughner, 18, Iosco Sheriff's Department learned that five bands had been invited to the concert. Officers said that an entrance fee of \$3 per person was to be charged.

The township supervisor said that attempts had been made to "head off" the rock concert, but to no avail. "The more the people in town talked and thought about being overrun by a large crowd, the more fear was expressed," said Chrivia.

Saturday's scheduled rock concert at Hale proved to be a fizzle, according to the sheriff's department. By 11:00 a. m. Saturday, only two carloads of spectators had shown up at the gate and one

Public Had First Look Tuesday at Tawas' New Art Center

Tawas Bay Artists recently opened a new art center in a building located at the corner of Pine and West Westover Streets, East Tawas. The building, owned by Stanley Stasik, is also the site of the East Tawas branch of the secretary of state's office.

Members of the art group were on hand Monday afternoon to move displays of paintings and handicraft work into the center's nicely furnished gallery. The center has a carpeted office-reception area as well as a large work area.

The building is equipped with a photographic darkroom for camera fans, a large loom for weaving fabrics and a handicraft area for pottery crafts.

The new art center is to be open each week from Monday through Saturday effective yesterday (Tuesday). The center will be closed on the Fourth of July.

Art classes for children seven years of age and over are to be offered on Saturdays and classes are planned for adults.

Tawas Bay Artists have been co-sponsors of the annual arts and crafts show held each summer at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

Tawas Bay Artists are being assisted in operation of the new art center by the East Tawas Parks and Recreation Commission and the Tawas City Council. Rental of the building is \$150 a month, of which the art group pays \$75 and the two cities share the remaining \$75.

Motorbike Crashes Hurt Three Drivers

Iosco Sheriff's Department investigated three personal injury accidents involving motorbikes last week, as well as three larcenies, a vandalism complaint, two breakings and enterings and an accidental shooting.

Injured in motorbike crashes and treated at Tawas Hospital were Robert P. Vitek, 59, Oscoda, who lost control of his vehicle on River Road, Oscoda Township; Rhonda L. Thumme, 15, who sustained a fractured collar bone when her machine flipped on loose sand in Plainfield Township; Dennis A. Garrett, 20, Detroit, who sustained a cut chin when his machine flipped over on a trail near Seven Mile Hill, Oscoda Township.

Larcenies were reported by Dale McDonald, manager of Old Orchard Park, theft of an aluminum boat and motor; Steven Levitski of Owosso, theft of clothing from his car while it was parked at the Village Inn, Tawas City; George Milligan, Whittemore, theft of a lawn mower.

For the second straight week, Consumers Power Company's Foote Dam, Oscoda, was the scene of a vandalism complaint. A total of 25 windows valued at \$187 were broken in the building.

Breakings and enterings included a house trailer owned by Donald Elwart on Oates Road, Alabaster Township. An inspection of the premises has not been made as yet by the owner and officers were unable to determine what was missing. Gloria Sawicki, Flint, reported that a motorcycle, household items and antique furniture had been stolen from her cottage on Sand Lake Road.

Michael Smith, 22, East Tawas, was treated Sunday at Tawas Hospital after being struck in the leg by a .22 caliber rifle slug. Officers said that a companion, Doyle Nelkie, was shooting at a stump at the Buck Creek pond, Oscoda Township. The slug apparently glanced off the stump and hit Smith.

East Tawas Sells Bonds to Finance City Parking Lot

After several years of study, negotiation with property owners and establishment of a special assessment district, another step was taken Monday night in the \$149,000 public parking project at East Tawas when a bid was accepted on furnishing bonds to finance the project.

Through cooperation of Peoples State Bank, the firm of Prescott, Ball and Turben entered a bid and was awarded a contract to furnish bonds at an interest rate of 5.858945 percent. A bid was accepted from Midwest Banknote Company for printing of bonds.

The special assessment bonds will finance purchase of the property commonly known as the A&P parking lot, as well as leasing and development of the two lots owned by Christ Episcopal Church for a 92-space employee parking lot.

Plans for the employee parking lot have been prepared by Spicer Engineering Company and the project is to be advertised for bids.

In other business, the council approved a recommendation of the cemetery board for construction of a 24 by 32-foot chapel building at Greenwood Cemetery. The chapel would be in addition to a storage building and tool shed which was authorized earlier this year.

Edward Higgins, cemetery board chairman, said that plans would be developed for construction of the chapel. The city is to establish a special fund for receiving donations to assist with the cost of construction.

A representative of Tawas Tennis Club, who inquired as to the possibility of repairs to the tennis courts and the status of a project to construct two new courts, was referred to the parks and recreation commission. The city is planning to enlarge the Newman Street athletic field for tennis courts. An area would also be provided for a separate winter ice skating rink to be handled by the Lions Club.

Authorization to use the athletic field on the second week-end of September for the second annual women's slow pitch softball tournament was authorized. Shirley N. Orand, area commissioner for the Michigan Women's Amateur Softball Association, said that the national championship squad would again attend the tournament and that 10 teams would be represented this year.

The city clerk was directed to prepare an ordinance prohibiting fishing from the Tawas River bridge on Bridge Street. Councilmen are of the opinion that young fishermen are endangered there due to traffic conditions and the narrow width of the bridge.

A representative of Norman's, 114 West Bay Street, was in attendance and entered a complaint about the council's prohibition of use of city sidewalks for display of merchandise. Such use is only permitted during city-wide sidewalk sales. A request was also made to allow use of the sidewalk for parking a truck during rain (See ET COUNCIL, page 4.)

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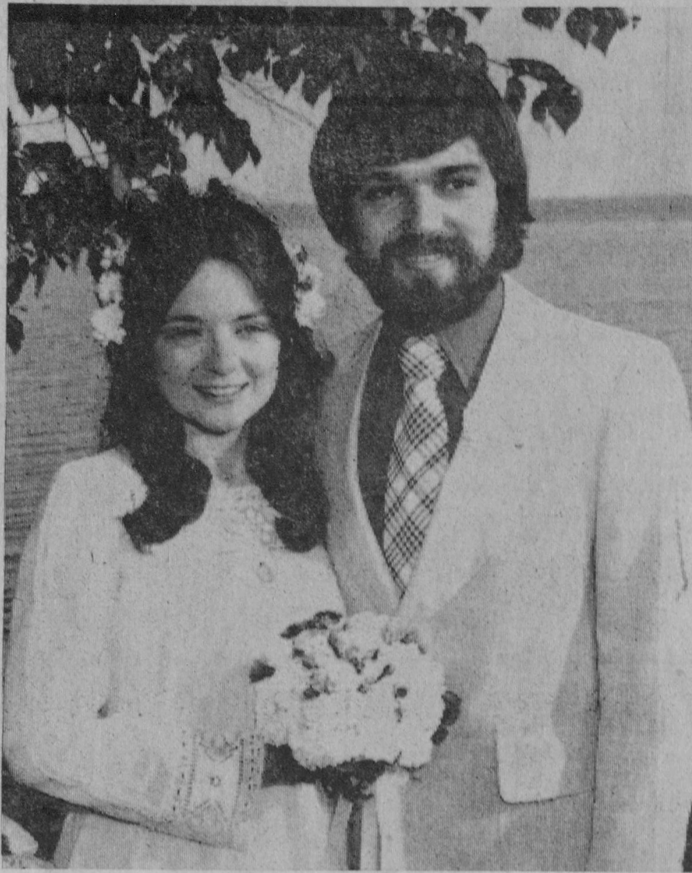

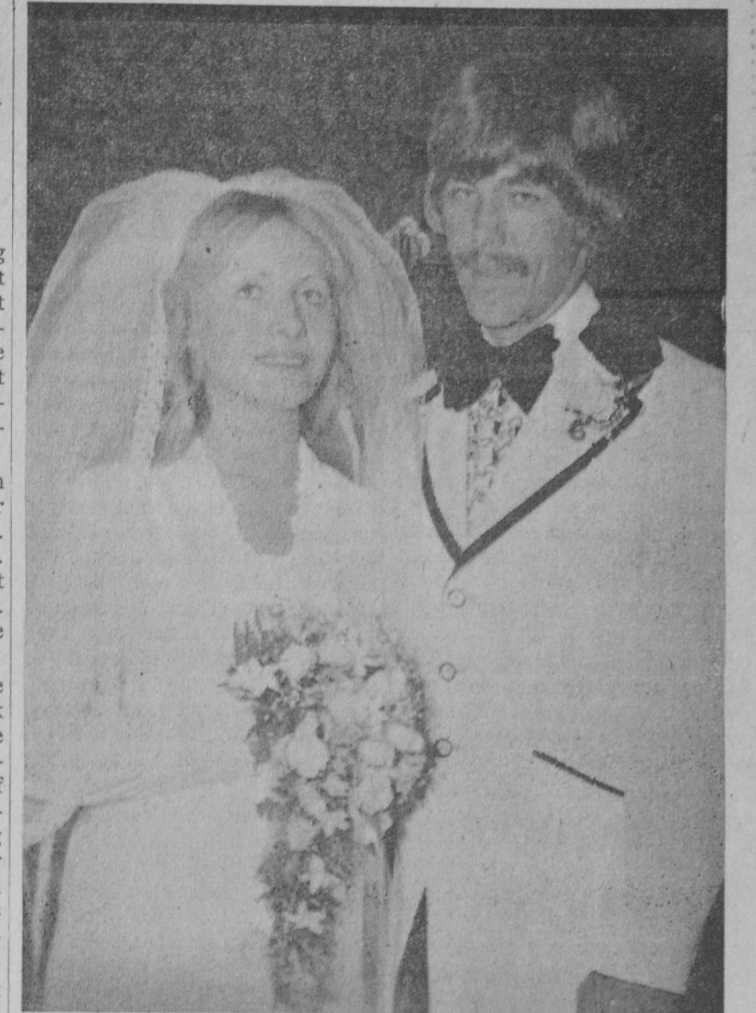

Gas Sales Drop Causes Tax Concern for Roads

A drop in gasoline sales during the spring and sharply rising construction costs foreshadow trouble for Michigan roads and streets, according to Earl Rogers, director of the County Road Association of Michigan.

"Gas gallonage used by motorists fell 12.2 percent in April compared with the same month a year ago," Rogers reported. "The decrease for the first four months of 1974 was seven percent below the same period in 1973."

Michigan's nine-cents-per-gallon gasoline tax, together with auto and truck license fees, finances upkeep and improvement of state,

county and municipal highways. "This decline in gasoline sales is reducing revenues for the motor vehicle highway fund which, coupled with inflationary costs, soon will curb new construction and even routine maintenance of roads," Rogers warned.

"The only saving factor thus far has been a five percent increase in auto license fee collections for the first quarter of 1974 and a 6.8 percent increase in actual gas tax revenues due to effects of a two-cents-per-gallon tax increase put into effect last year," Rogers noted. "But this revenue gain already had been more than offset by sharply higher costs of materials and labor."

"Many county road commissions already are deeply worried that revenues are well below anticipations and they fear their ability to maintain road standards for safe motoring is jeopardized," he asserted.

Until higher gasoline pump prices and energy conservation measures dropped gasoline usage, Michigan had experienced a steady 5.1 percent annual increase in motor fuel revenues.

Gasoline taxed for road purposes in April this year totaled 307.1-million gallons, compared with 350-million gallons a year ago. For the first four months of 1974, gasoline used by motorists totaled 1.275-billion gallons as against 1.371-billion gallons in the same period of 1973.

Diesel fuel tax receipts, which also go into the motor vehicle highway fund, were down 3.5 percent to 4.6-million dollars in the first quarter of this year.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz of Tawas City reported Thursday that the city's share of Act 51 money for the first quarter ending March 31 was actually \$550 higher than the check received a year ago for the same period. He said, however, that the increase was not as high as anticipated when the two-cent increase in the state gasoline tax is taken into consideration.

Two local service stations reported that gasoline pumpage since the beginning of the summer was somewhat below usage of a year ago. Clement Stephan of Rainbow Service in Tawas City said that he believed that gasoline pumped at his station probably would return to the same level as a year ago at this time.

John Lansky of Lansky's Standard Service in Tawas City said that hours of operation for that station had been cut during the energy crisis earlier this year and "normal" evening operation on Saturdays and Sunday had only returned about two weeks ago. He believed that the reduced operating schedules of most stations would have some effect on total gasoline usage in the state, but believed that through traffic on US-23 was down slightly from a year ago.

"One must consider, too, that Detroit schools have not let out as yet for summer vacation," said Lansky. The school year has been extended due to the lengthy strike last fall by Detroit teachers.

Joseph Badalucco, manager of the city park at East Tawas, reported Thursday that camper receipts as of June 1 were actually ahead of the same period during the previous year. He said, however, that receipts during the month of June were lower than the previous year due to three solid weeks of rain.

"I really do not believe the shortage and higher price of gasoline will have any great effect on campers at the city park," said Badalucco. He said that weather has a great effect on the number of visitors and believed this area would actually have an increase in the number of tourists as travelers from downstate areas would probably make shorter vacation trips due to the higher cost of gasoline.

posed to mobilizing auxiliary members of the sheriff's department for use in crowd control. Following Friday morning's emergency meeting of the law enforcement advisory council, the commission honored Sheriff George Westcott's previous request to pay \$1 each to members of his auxiliary force to make them county employees for workmen's compensation benefits and other insurance purposes.

Regardless of commission action, the sheriff has power to "swear in" citizens as deputy officers, but he believed that the nominal \$1 fee should be paid to protect the county against possible court litigation.

Westcott assured commissioners that he had been selective in picking men for training as auxiliary officers. Each man, serving without pay, is to be sworn in as a deputy sheriff and each will be uniformed and armed.

The sheriff said that one auxiliary officer would be assigned to a regular deputy sheriff. Three or four patrol cars were to be assigned to the Hale area 24 hours a day on Saturday and Sunday. At Friday's meeting, Basil Odell, undersheriff, told those attending that it would be well to have as many patrol cars in that area as possible to "stop situations before they develop; it should relieve the local tension and take some of the pressure off citizens."

Besides representatives of state, county and city law enforcement agencies in attendance, the advisory council comprises representatives of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, the United States Forest Service, Michigan Department of Natural Resources, probate and district court representatives and businessmen. The meeting was chaired by Ronald Tyler, Iosco prosecuting attorney.

Tyler said he was checking all state laws to determine possible prosecution should those laws be violated at the rock concert. Sheriff Westcott said that at least one other downstate county had offered law enforcement assistance should the need arise over the Fourth of July week-end.

Victoria Lane Sewer District Established by City Council

A determination that establishment of the Victoria Lane special assessment district was a public necessity was made Monday night by the Tawas City Council. A resolution was adopted authorizing continuance of legal steps to establish the district.

The proposed sanitary sewer would be 547 feet in length and would serve Victoria Lane from Manor Drive to M-55. Among lots to be served would be the new Tawas United Methodist Church.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz reported the district would include 1,318 feet of assessable frontage. Total estimated cost of the project is \$16,000, which is approximately \$4,000 less than previously anticipated.

After conferring with the city's bonding attorney, it was learned that the cost to the property owner must be based on the amount of benefit. Because of the shallower depth of the sewers, actual construction cost would be less than the estimated cost for three other special assessment districts which have already been established. As a result, the \$19 per front foot cost to other districts would not be applicable in this district as the actual cost in this district would be less.

The next hearing, to be held in August, would be to determine the interest rate to charge property owners of the district for the unpaid balance on the special assessment. There are five property owners in the district and only the Tawas United Methodist Church was represented.

es could receive a new topping of asphalt should there be any deterioration.

Included in the \$15,000 cost would be 480 feet of 10-foot-high chain link fence around the courts. This would provide security against automobiles driving on the surface, as well as keeping tennis balls within the playing area.

Bublitz said the estimated cost did not include drainage, parking facilities, landscaping and painting of lines on the courts. Members of the tennis club volunteered to assist with landscaping and other work.

The city manager said some of the work could be handled by the city crew, but actual construction of the courts and fence would be by a contractor.

A representative of the tennis club said that a survey was made last week-end at the East Tawas court and it was found that 140 local persons had used facilities there over a period of three days. It was stated that many persons had been turned away because of continuous use of the courts.

Because of high water, the old courts in the city park were unplayable last week. The facility probably would continue to be used for outdoor basketball.

Bublitz said that \$3,000 had been included in the 1974-75 budget for tennis courts. The city would borrow the remainder of the money necessary for repayment over a period of two years.

Counties Happy That State Erosion Bill Was Amended

The Michigan Association of Counties hailed passage of House Bill 5866 last Friday which amends the Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Act to allow counties more time to establish administration and enforcement procedures.

A. Barry McGuire, MAC executive director, said, "The original act was another instance of counties being given a responsibility by the state without adequate time to implement it. Our counties are able and willing to take on new responsibilities if properly funded but we often lack the manpower and/or direction to be effective immediately."

The original act allowed the State Department of Agriculture until July 1, 1973, to set up a state program and mandated the board of commissioners in each county to name an enforcing agency and set forth a schedule of fees for inspections, plan reviews and permits by July 1, 1974. The new legislation makes no reference as to compliance date but rules will be promulgated by the Michigan Department of Natural Resources'

environmental protection branch and the joint administrative rules committee which will allow counties an extension until January 1, 1975, to comply.

"Many of our counties do not have an agency in existence that can adequately handle the administrative and enforcement so that a new agency or an expanded agency must be created. In addition, the problem of what fee to charge in order to meet the costs of administration and enforcement arises. We are very relieved that we now have the additional time to effectively plan this large endeavor," said McGuire.

"MAC continues to support the basic concept of good planning. The implementation of the Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Act is a must for sound planning in the best interests of the people of the State of Michigan," concluded McGuire.

Robert Foster, chairman of the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, said last week that the county's budget for 1974 made no

provision for enforcement of the act locally.

Over 116 officials from throughout Michigan, including three from the Tawas, recently completed a six-week Michigan Governmental Bookkeeping Course presented by Michigan State University, East Lansing, at Alpena Community College. Treasurers, clerks and bookkeepers who attended, some of whom had little or no experience in governmental accounting, learned to apply the Michigan uniform government accounting system to regular bookkeeping procedures or local government practices.

Runway Light Theft A Problem

Continued theft of runway lights at Iosco County Airport could prove to be a serious hazard to aircraft navigation, according to W. C. Roach, airport manager.

Roach reported last week that eight to 10 glass globe lights marking the outlying area of the runway had been stolen. The lights are located at the eastern end of the runway near a public road.

Roach said that tampering with airport lighting is a federal offense. "Most important is the fact that someone could be injured or killed when the lights are not operating properly," he stated.

With air traffic increasing during the summer months, the lights stolen last week were immediately replaced.

Bicycle Racing Returns for Mich. Tourist Festival Program

Bicycle racing, a parade, athletic events, visits by United States Navy PT boats and an army helicopter precision flying team will feature this week's 12th annual Michigan Tourist Festival program in the Tawas.

Dates for the 1974 program have been advanced a month in order to more closely coincide with the Fourth of July holiday. As a result, it is expected that the Tawas will be jammed with regular holiday vacationers this week as well as with persons attending the tourist festival program.

The program is being sponsored this year by Tawas Area Promotions, Incorporated, rather than the Tawas Chamber of Commerce. Retaining dates of the former festival on August 3-4 will be the arts and crafts show sponsored by Tawas Bay Artists at the Tawas City Park and Iosco County Building.

In cooperation with the Wolverine Cycle Club of Detroit, bicycle racing will feature the tourist festival program after an absence of six years. Wolverine Cycle Club furnished most of the competitors when bicycle racing was a major summer attraction here before competition was dropped in 1968.

Heading up the local committee in charge of bicycle racing will be Leonard Calabrese. Start and finish lines for all events will be at the corner of East State and Newman Streets at East Tawas.

The program starts Thursday with a 50-mile tourist bicycle ride in the afternoon. There will be fireworks from the Tawas City Park dock starting at 9:30 p. m.

Activities on Friday include a second tourist bicycle ride at 10:00 a. m. to Foote Dam on the AuSable River. The first American Bicycle Association - sanctioned meet is scheduled for 7:00 p. m. with sprint races on streets at East Tawas.

The program moves into full swing on Saturday with a parade at 10:00 a. m. starting from Mathews Street in Tawas City and continuing east on US-23 to the Michigan State Police post at East Tawas. Included in the parade will be bicyclists, floats, Tawas Area Marching Band, clowns from Elf Khurafeh Shrine of Saginaw, local youngsters dressed as clowns, Iosco Sheriff's Posse, horse-drawn vehicles, students of local dancing schools and antique automobiles.

A 25-mile sprint race will be held for bicyclists during the day, along with a bicycle rodeo featuring the skills of tourist and novice bike riders on Newman Street at East Tawas.

In addition, the Knothole League all-star game will be held at the East Tawas Athletic Field on Newman Street starting at 4:00 p. m., to be followed by the Pony League all-star game at 6:00 p. m.

East Tawas Lions Club will hold its annual chicken barbecue starting at 11:30 a. m. at the East Tawas City Park, while Tawas Kiwanis Club will hold its corn roast starting at 11:30 a. m. at the same location.

Visiting the Michigan Waterways Commission Dock at East Tawas on Saturday will be PT boats from the Great Lakes Naval Training Station.

The program concludes Sunday, July 7, with another big day of bicycle racing. Sixth annual running of the Tour of Lumbermen's Monument is scheduled to start at 11:00 a. m. There will be 50-kilometer and 100-kilometer Olympic events and some of the top cyclists of the Midwest are expected to participate.

Final event listed on the program is the men's slow pitch all-star game, starting at 3:00 p. m., at the Newman Street athletic field.

Two Crashes for Motorcyclist On Same Day

By HELEN MEACH

You can be successful in home canning if you read, understand and follow reliable rules developed and tested by authorities.

An estimated 80 percent of the loss of home canned products is due to faulty seals. The following suggestions will help you to have success in canning at home.

Always follow the manufacturer's instructions on the package for caps and lids. Not all canning caps for home use are alike.

Before placing the cap on the jar, check to make sure that there is the proper amount of space between the top of the food and the lid. With two piece lids you should leave one inch space for low acid foods and one-half inch for acid foods. Also check that there are not any air bubbles in the food. Use a knife to poke out any that are present.

Use a clean damp cloth and wipe the top of the jar before sealing. This removes any particles of food, pulp or fuzz which can interfere with the proper sealing of the lid.

After you have placed the lid on the jar, do not screw the band too tightly. It can cause the lid to buckle. But be careful that the lid is not too loose either. Screw it just comfortably tight without using a wrench.

If you are using a pressure canner to preserve your food, let the canner exhaust itself for a full 10 minutes, otherwise pressure inside the canner is uneven.

Pressure in the canner should be kept constant. If it fluctuates or if it goes down too rapidly, food particles are forced between the jar and the lid.

Lastly, remember not to under-process the food. Underprocessing fails to sterilize the product and subsequent bacterial growth reduces the vacuum needed to hold the lid in place.

Burleigh Township will have one race in the November general election, but all other Republican candidates are unopposed for the primary. Delores Grezeszak is the Republican candidate for treasurer and Peggy Bassi is the Democratic candidate filing for this position.

Grant Township will have a race for supervisor in the November election. Candidates include Olen Herriman, Democrat, and Basil S. Duncan, Republican. Dune Grass Can Stabilize Light Soils

"Dune grass is used extensively for soil stabilization in light sandy soils which are subject to wind and water erosion," says Franklin Kulhanek, soil conservationist.

Through on-site investigations, it has been seen what wind's forces can do when a beach area is left to blow and wash. Drastic improvements have been realized through experimental plots on the Great Lakes and inland.

Dune grass develops a large fibrous root system to supply its moisture requirements. Excavations have revealed roots 10 feet and longer. After grass is established, other woody plants are able to germinate and grow in the shelter of the grass plants.

The temperature at planting time is very essential. It should be around 50 degrees Fahrenheit. During fall, this period is longest and seems to be the most successful. Planting season generally begins in September and extends to November.

Individuals who would like to find out how this type of grass could help should call the Iosco County Soil Conservation District at 362-2591.

Two-Step Increase for SS Checks

Question: I thought I was going to get an 11 percent increase in my social security check, but the check I got in April did not go up that much. What happened?

Answer: The increase in your April check was the first part of a two-step increase in social security benefits. For most people getting social security payments, the overall increase is 11 percent. A seven percent increase started with checks delivered in April. The rest is starting with checks delivered in July.

Question: When an insured worker dies, I hear social security pays a lump-sum death payment, in addition to monthly survivors benefits. How much is it and who gets it?

Answer: The benefit is \$255 and it generally is paid to the widow or widower who was living with the worker. If there is no widow or widower, the \$255 may be paid toward the funeral expenses.

Question: I hear the premium I pay for medicare medical insurance has been increased. Why?

Answer: The basic monthly medical insurance premium rate went from \$6.30 to \$6.70 starting July 1. The medicare law requires an annual review of the medical insurance program to determine if individual premiums and federal funding will cover estimated expenses for the next 12 months. The premium rate increase is related to a rise in the cost of medical services that are covered by medicare and used by people who have the protection.

The basic premium rate for medicare hospital insurance also went from \$33 to \$36 a month, starting July 1, for people who pay a premium for the protection because they are not eligible for social security benefits.

Question: I have never worked in a job covered by social security, but I have heard that I can still get medicare when I reach 65. Is this true?

Answer: A wife getting social security checks on her husband's earnings record can get medicare health care insurance at 65. Also, people 65 and over who are not eligible for social security benefits can get medicare hospital insurance by paying for a monthly premium, but they must also sign up for the medical insurance part of medicare. Starting July 1, the basic premium rates are \$36 a month for hospital insurance and \$6.70 a month for medical insurance. You can get information about signing up for medicare at any social security office.
