## Drowning Victim's Body Recovered

Tracy Warner, 18, West M-55, Tawas City, drowned Saturday afternoon in a canoeing accident on the AuSable River, approximately one-quarter mile east of an island at Lumbermen's Monument. Investigating Iosco Sheriff's Department deputies said that Warner and a companion, Allen Nash, 18, East Tawas, were paddling downstream with a group of other young people.

Warner apparently turned around to look behind him and the canoe capsized. Both young men were thrown into the water and other canoeists threw boat cushions into the water. Witnesses told officers they believed the victim panicked in the water and he went under. The body was recovered Tuesday afternoon.

The victim is the son of Mrs. Jennie Warner and Marvin Warner of Tawas City. He was born September 12, 1955, and was a 1974 graduate of Tawas Area High School.

Other survivors are two sisters, Mrs. Roxanne Krantz of Pennsylvania and Susan Warner of Tawas City; his grandfather, Raymond Warner of Tawas City, and his grandmother, Mrs. Jennie Smith of Tawas City.

## Rose City Man Draws Federal Ct. Sentence

Arnold H. Beyerlein, former executive vice president and manager of the Rose City branch of Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Hale, received a 90-day jail sentence and was fined \$5,000 in Bay City Federal Court Friday for accepting \$7,706 to procure and renew a bank loan.

He was placed on two years probation when appearing before United States Dist. Judge James Harvey.

On March 15, Beyerlein entered a guilty plea to the misdemeanor, which carried a penalty of up to one year in prison. All but 90 days of the sentence was suspended.

Four other charges, which resulted after issuance of a federal indictment last December, were dismissed last Friday. One charge was for making a false entry and the other three charged misapplication of bank funds.

## Japanese Youngsters Visiting Iosco County

For 77 Japanese children, this summer means no more "happy-okai" about American culture. It is time to experience the real thing!

The youngsters, members of Japan's unique language education Labo Party Program, arrived in Michigan July 24 for 30-day home visits with 4-H families.

Three of the youngsters, age 12-16, and one tutor are currently being hosted in Iosco County.

"The Labo Party Program is designed to create an awakening of international understanding and awareness among Japanese children through language," explains Retha M. Hankey, extension 4-H youth agent. "It is administered by 3,500 tutors through the Labo-Teaching Information Center in Tokyo, Japan, and there are currently 60,000 youngsters participating."

"Many of the children may experience such tasks as vacuuming, dish washing or garden work for the first time," Miss Hankey points out. "In Japan, the young-

sters are expected to spend most of their time in school or study and very rarely help with household chores." However, the host families are cautioned against involving the children in tasks connected with machinery or animals unfamiliar to them, and in giving their guests four or nine of anything. In Japan, four means death and nine means to suffer.

Iosco County 4-H families who are hosting the young people include the George Erickson family of Whittemore, the Richard Nagel family of Tawas City, the Gerald Tulgetskje family of Oscoda and the Daniel Perrin family of Prescott.

"We are excited about the opportunities for these youth of two different cultures to establish close relationships during the next month. Hopefully, some of our 4-H hosts will visit their friend's home in Japan next summer," adds Miss Hankey.

The Japanese youth must depart August 21 because they have only a 40-day school vacation.

## Highway Department Announces Plans to Enclose Troublesome US-23 Ditch

Constructing an enclosed drainage system along US-23 from Townline Road east to the Tawas River to eliminate the problem of standing water has been approved by the Michigan Department of State Highways.

Ditches for this section of the highway had been reported as not functioning properly. Standing water produces cattails, algae growth and related problems.

Two years ago, the city council notified the department of this problem through the office of State Rep. George A. Prescott of Tawas

City, who stressed the urgency for correction. A letter to the city from M. Rothstein, engineer of design, stated that ditch cleanout had been considered, but because of the flat grades and high water table, it would not provide a permanent solution.

"We propose, therefore, to enclose the drainage through this section," said Rothstein. "The runoff will be picked up in the ditches by catch basins with dome-shaped grating. This will permit improved ditch grades between drainage structures and eliminate standing water in the ditches."

Rothstein said that although current traffic does not warrant added laneage on US-23, the catch basins would accommodate future widening with curb and gutter should the traffic demand develop. In connection with the current work, the department intends to clean out, regrade and sod the existing ditches.

In answer to another request from the city, Rothstein said that added laneage requested within Tawas City on M-55 could not be justified at this time by either current or projected traffic counts.

"Compared to many sections of highway throughout the state where traffic counts already exceed optimum operating capacity, this work must be given a low priority," he stated.

Rothstein said that proposed improvements on US-23 between the Tawas and Oscoda had been reviewed, but traffic counts do not warrant added laneage. He said that future traffic demand would

be reduced with the relocation of US-23 scheduled in the next six to eight years.

The highway department spokesman noted that the present roadway was widened to 24 feet and resurfaced in about 1965. The question of accident data in the area has been referred to the traffic division to determine if any point corrections are warranted at this time.

Erosion control was also discussed adjacent to US-23 near the

M-55 intersection. Rothstein said that the matter has been reviewed with district maintenance personnel and some erosion problems which had threatened the roadway, were corrected last year. "No further corrections are warranted at this time," said Rothstein.

The highway department spokesman said that local input into these highway improvements was appreciated. Assurance was given that the above points would continue to receive the department's attention.

## Bicycle Path Gets State's Approval

Monday, Mayor John N. Brugger of Tawas City credited State Sen. Robert W. Davis with securing highway department action on a proposal for a special bicycle path from US-23 to Tawas Area School.

The 1.8-mile paving of the shoulders of M-55 will alleviate many serious dangers to youngsters who regularly travel the route by bicycle.

On a recent trip to Lansing, Mayor Brugger and City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz contacted Davis

and emphasized the importance of the project, plus the need for immediate action to avert accidents considered to be inevitable if present conditions were not corrected.

With information from the two city officials, Davis convinced the highway department that the project was needed.

The highway department has announced that bids on the paving project will be taken in either August or September and work is to be initiated as soon as possible.

Specifically, shoulders to be paved for bicycle use are from Plank Road easterly 1.8 miles to the four-lane section of US-23.


## Copper Cable Stolen From USG Quarry

The Commission shall have the right to adopt rules governing its procedure, provided the same are not in conflict with the terms of any state statute or of these Articles. The Commission shall keep a journal of its proceedings which shall be signed by the Chairman and Secretary. All votes shall be by yeas and nays. The journal shall show how each member voted. Each member shall be required to vote upon all motions, resolutions and ordinances unless he shall be disqualified from voting thereof. No member of the Commission shall vote upon any motion, resolution or ordinance in which he has any personal interest. No commissioner shall be financially interested in any contract with the Authority.

Ferguson walked one batter in the fifth and two in the sixth without any damage, but two hits and an error in the seventh inning pushed the winning run over for Tawas.

Tawas lost little time in getting on the scoreboard in the second game, pushing four runs over in the first inning and then went on to win, 12-5.





**Races-Proposals Should Provide Interest**

**Primary Election Next Tuesday—Vote!**

With special interest provided by three local candidates running for state offices, plus races for three county commission posts and two proposals being submitted in two townships, primary election day on Tuesday, August 6, should see a good turnout of voters in Iosco County.

Most Iosco voters will receive three ballots, with the exception of Alabaster, Wilber and Oscoda Townships, where special propositions are being submitted.

One ballot lists candidates for state, congressional, legislative, county and township posts for Republican and Democratic parties. Successful candidates on each ticket are to meet in the November general election. Voters are reminded that a ticket cannot be split on this ballot. If a person votes for candidates on more than one party ticket, the ballot will be rejected.

A second ballot lists candidates for the Third Appellate Court District (non-partisan) and one ballot lists candidates filing for the Republican county convention. No delegates filed for the Democratic convention.

**EXPECT 6,000 VOTERS**  
 Campaigning by candidates at the state and local levels picked up slightly last week and about 6,000 voters are expected to go to the polls—depending on weather conditions on election day and the actual interest generated among voters. The turnout could be much less than indicated above, however, as only 5,948 voters went to the polls in the "off-year" election two years ago. That election featured a hot, six-man race for sheriff.

Slightly more than 7,000 sets of ballots have been prepared for the

election and three precincts in Plainfield and Oscoda Townships use voting machines. In 1972, Plainfield had a turnout of 498 voters and Oscoda Township totaled 666.

**STATE CANDIDATES**  
 Reviewing candidates in the order listed on the primary election ballot, three persons seeking the Democratic nomination of governor are Sander M. Levin, James E. Wells and Jerome P. Cavanagh. Gov. William G. Milliken is unopposed on the Republican ticket.

Philip E. Ruppe, Republican candidate for representative in congress, 11th District, is unopposed on the Republican side of the ballot. Democratic candidates for this office are Paul G. Knutson and Francis D. Brouillette.

The legislative section of the ballot could prove to be confusing to voters as Iosco County is now included in two different districts for state senator.

Burleigh, Plainfield and Reno Townships, plus the City of Whittemore, are included in the 35th District for state senator. This district, formerly represented by Robert Richardson, lists Bert C. Brennan and Robert D. Young as Republican candidates, while Julius F. Blasy and Dorothy J. Currie are Democratic candidates.

The balance of the county is included in the 37th District for state senator. Seeking the Republican nomination are Hugh F. Prescott of East Tawas and Robert W. Davis, incumbent, of Gaylord. The Democratic side of the ballot lists Prentiss M. Brown and Cass E. Bozek.

Filling out the state side of the ballot is the 105th District representative in the state legislature.

George A. Prescott of Tawas City, veteran legislator, is unopposed for re-election as a Republican. Three men seeking the Democratic nomination are Patrick G. Flynn, Kenneth Trower and Thomas C. Alley.

**COUNTY OFFICES**  
 The next column on the ballot lists county offices and Ronald R. Tyler, Republican, has no opposition on either ticket for prosecuting attorney. There are three races for the five-man county board of commissioners.

Unopposed in the election are Robert Foster of Oscoda, District No. 1, incumbent, and Donald Griffin of Oscoda, who was appointed to fill a vacancy in District No. 2 and is a candidate for the election. There are three candidates for the District No. 3 post, including Fred B. Lomas of East Tawas (incumbent), Merton Killey of East Tawas and Mary Jane Burdett of Baldwin Township. This unit comprises part of AuSable Township, Wilber Township, the eastern portion of Baldwin Township and the City of East Tawas.

Three candidates are listed for the District No. 4 county commissioner post, formerly held by Carl Libka of Tawas City, who retired. Candidates are Delano L. Myles of Tawas City, William Fuerst of Whittemore and Joseph W. Fox of Tawas City. This district is comprised of the western portion of Baldwin Township, Tawas Township, Alabaster Township, Sherman Township, Burleigh Township, Tawas City and Whittemore.

Two candidates seek the District No. 5 post presently held by Arthur J. Aulerich of Reno Township, who seeks re-election. He will be opposed by William Wereley of Hale, who had held the commissioner post in this district until his resignation last year to become the county tax equalization director. The area comprising this district includes Reno Township, Grant Township, Plainfield Township, the western half of Oscoda Township and Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

**NON-PARTISAN BALLOT**  
 Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas heads up a list of 12 candidates seeking one of two new positions in the Third Appellate Court District. Other candidates include Luther I. Daines of Paw Paw, Edward G. Durance of Midland, Donald E. Holbrook Jr. of Clare, John T. Letts of Grand Rapids, Leo E. Maki of St. Johns, Roger Oeming of Saginaw, V. Robert Payant of Iron Mountain, Robert Richardson of Saginaw, H. van den Berg Hatch of Portage, Daniel F. Walsh of Gaylord and Thea Rossi Barron of Kalamazoo.

**TOWNSHIP OFFICES**  
 Alabaster Township has one race for treasurer and two tax rate proposals are to be placed before voters. Vying for the Republican nomination of treasurer are Leona Benson and Ralph Rohrbach. Two races set for the November general election are for supervisor, with J. Harry Rapson, Republican, and Mabel E. Smith, Democrat, filing for that office; Fannie M. Wal-

stead, Republican, trustee, will be opposed by Alice B. Makinen, Democrat. Hope Rescoe, Democrat, is unopposed for clerk, as is Harry Wellna, Democrat for constable.

Voters of Alabaster are to be asked to increase the tax rate limitation by three-quarters of one mill for fire protection and three-quarters of one mill for garbage pickup.

One race is listed on the ballot in AuSable Township. Dale Lamrock and Terry A. Palmiter are Republican candidates for supervisor. The winner will meet Leonard T. Arnold, Democrat, in the November general election. Unopposed Republican candidates are Mornelva Snitchler, clerk; Mary Spencer, treasurer; Otto Thomas, trustee; Donald L. Strickland, constable.

There are no races in Baldwin Township in the primary election. Republican candidates filing include Richter Lixey, supervisor; Frieda Rempert, clerk; Loretta Klenow, treasurer; Howard Burdett, trustee; Emmett Cecil and Donald Wimbe, constables.

Burleigh Township will have one race in the November general election, but all other Republican candidates are unopposed for the primary. Candidates include Martin Siegrist, supervisor; Darrell Colvin, clerk; Leona Chippis, trustee. Dolores Grezeszak is the Republican candidate for treasurer and Peggy Bassi is the Democratic candidate for this position.

Grant Township will have a race for supervisor in the November election. Candidates include Olen Herriman, Democrat, and Basil S. Duncan, Republican. Unopposed Republican candidates are Lucile Blackmore, clerk; Dale Butzin, treasurer. Republican candidates vying for the trustee nomination will be Lowell S. Aspin and Jean A. Robelli.

Plainfield Township will have a race in the November election for the clerk's position. Frances Hansen is the Republican candidate and Sandra M. Baldwin is the Democratic candidate. **New Teaching Contract Up for Ratification by TA Board**

A special meeting by Tawas Area Board of Education on Monday, August 5, is to consider a new master contract agreement with Tawas Area Education Association.

According to the proposed new contract, the salary total for 1974-75 would be \$1,069,187, as compared to \$973,490 for the 1973-74 school term. This represents a 9.8 percent increase.

Total salaries would amount to \$1,009,321, as compared to \$923,090 for 1973-74, an increase of \$86,231. Extra curricular activity salaries would be increased from \$18,000 to \$19,210, the cost of insurance would be increased from \$32,400 to \$38,656 representing the change of carriers from Michigan Education Association to Blue Cross. Longevity pay totaling \$2,000 is new to the contract this year and was a negotiated item.

Cost of operation actually shows a 9.2 percent increase over the pre-

vious year. In 1973-74, the daily salary cost was \$5,262 for 185 days. Teachers are being contracted for one extra day in 1974-75 and the cost per day will be \$5,748 for 186

days. There will be 181 actual teaching days during 1974-75 and the five remaining days are for orientation and inservice training.

Details pertaining to base salaries under consideration for teachers with bachelor or master degrees, along with increments, have not been announced.





## Family Living Education

By HELEN B. MEACH  
Extension Home Economist

I promised more food facts for shoppers in this week's column. These are in fact, ideas to help each one of you become a serious buyer of food—a better manager of your food dollars. You may find you are eating better (nutritionally) for less!

If you want to control the money you spend for food, try spending less time in the grocery store. Studies have shown that you spend about 50 cents for every minute in the supermarket. And every extra trip for something you forgot, the first time around costs on the average \$7, with most of that going for things you did not intend to buy. How can you spend less time at the store? By planning ahead. Plan meals and buy only what you planned. But be flexible, asking yourself if you can substitute the special in your meal plan or recipe?

You can save money by buying dairy products that are marked down because they are near their pull date (the last day they can be sold), if your family can use the food within a few days. If they cannot and the food is wasted, your "savings" is really a loss.

Want to pare pennies off your grocery bill? Then leave those packaged biscuits and cookies in

the dairy department and make baked goods at home yourself. They are cheaper. You can usually save six or seven cents per pound if you buy stick margarine rather than the soft stuff in the tub. Cheese that you slice yourself may not be a better buy than ready-sliced cheese. In a package of sliced cheese, all the slices are the same size. Figured on a cost-per-slice basis, ready-sliced cheese may cost less than cheese you cut yourself.

When is a special not a special? When the cost per can, box or pound is higher than usual. Suppose tomato sauce, regularly 12 cents a can, is on special this week at eight for \$1. A bargain? No! Eight cans of sauce at 12 cents per can is 96 cents. Your "bargain" purchase price is four cents higher.

If buying unclassified potatoes in quantity looks to you like a good way to beat high food prices, look again before you leap into a big purchase. There are no regulations limiting the number of bad potatoes you may be buying. And you pay as much for the bad ones you cannot use as for the good ones you can use. So be careful and buy unclassified potatoes only from someone you know and trust.

Egg size is a matter of weight per dozen. A dozen medium eggs

weighs 21 ounces; large eggs, 24 ounces, and extra large, 27 ounces. No matter how much they weigh, you can use eggs one at a time; so medium eggs are often your best buy. Many recent recipes suggest using large eggs, but dropping down one size and using medium eggs will not affect the quality of the finished product.

worked under social security. When I asked the undertaker for a copy of her death certificate so I could apply for a lump-sum death payment, he told me not to bother . . . that I would not be able to get it. I would like to know if he is right.

Answer: Yes, the undertaker was right in telling you not to apply because the lump-sum death payment is only made when a worker who was covered by social security dies. Since your wife had never worked under social security, there is no lump-sum death benefit payable.

Question: My wife's health is not good and I may have to place her in a nursing home. We both receive SSI. We have no other income and both of us are eligible for Medicaid. What will happen to our payments if she goes into a nursing home?

Answer: Since Medicaid will be paying at least 50 percent of her care costs in the nursing home, her basic payment will be reduced to a maximum of \$25, your payment may be increased to a maximum of \$160 a month.

## Son Eligible for Payments Under Dad's Social Security

Question: I will be 65 soon and plan to apply for monthly social security retirement benefits. I have a 19-year-old son who goes to college and I understand he can also get monthly checks when I get my payments. What information will I need to show social security about my son when I apply for benefits?

Answer: You will need your son's birth certificate, his social security number, the name and address of the college he goes to, the date the school term ends and the date of the following school term.

Question: My wife and I were both getting monthly social security checks on my earnings record until she died two months ago. She was not eligible for payments on her own because she had never


