## Tawas A. Voters Approve Millage

A two-year operational tax levy calling for renewal of nine mills of taxes which had expired at the end of the 1973-74 term and two mills additional was approved Monday

## Hale Voters Turn Down Tax Proposal

Hale Area School's special voted operational tax proposal went down to defeat Monday at the annual school election. The proposal lost 676-465.

Two veteran members of the board of education were re-elected. Ellsworth Bernard was top vote-getter with 663 ballots cast in his favor. Leland Dahne received 631 votes. Mrs. Grace Smith, the third candidate for one of the two vacancies, made it a close race by receiving 601 votes.

Members of the board of education and administrators expressed disappointment over the outcome of the millage election. The operational tax proposal asked for renewal of 12.5 mills for two years, plus 1.8 mills of additional operational taxes.

Following rejection of a 2.5-mill additional tax proposal in April, property valuations in the county were increased and the amount necessary to balance the school's budget in additional taxes was lowered to 1.8 mills.

## Oscoda Tax Proposal Gets Axe Again

A one-year tax proposal was turned down Monday for the second time in less than three months by voters of Oscoda Area School District. An operating levy of 7.3 mills was defeated, 1,631 to 1,274. A similar proposal was defeated, 1,889 to 1,354, at a special election on April 11.

William Brandt, incumbent school board president, and Bruce L. Myles led a field of eight candidates for two vacancies on the board of education. Brandt received 926 votes and Myles tallied 1,277. The latter succeeds Dr. Richard M. Wheeler, who was not a candidate for re-election.

## Two Incumbents Are Re-Elected at W-P School

A total of 491 voters went to the polls Monday at Whittemore-Prescott Area High School. A. Emil Sztanyo and Mrs. Lillian Smith were re-elected to the board of education.

Sztanyo received 345 votes and Mrs. Smith tallied 311. Totals received by other candidates were Ronald Horn, 131; Robert N. Dickson, 111; John Lehner, 34.

## Board of Education Challenges Tax Allocation Member's Seat

Eligibility of the seating of one member of the Iosco Tax Allocation Board is being questioned by Tawas Area Board of Education. Authorization was given to press the matter before the state tax commission or to institute action in circuit court.

At Monday night's regular meeting, the board of education went on record questioning the right of Charles Smith of Oscoda Township to be seated on the board which annually splits 15 mills of taxes between the county, townships and schools.

Unhappy over the recent allocation which saw operational taxes to schools lowered from 9.7 mills to 9.25 mills and county operation benefited by a one-half mill increase, Supt. Edward J. Barry declared Monday night that the Os-

codia representative was not eligible to sit on the allocation board and that any vote taken by an ineligible member of the board is void.

In a prepared statement read to the board of education, Barry said that Oscoda Township does not qualify to have a member seated on the allocation board as it is not a municipality. He said that state law had been misconstrued last year to allow Smith to be seated.

Under terms of state law, said Barry, a municipality of 10,000 population is allowed to have its own representative on the board. "Oscoda Township does not qualify under terms of the act as Wurtsmith Air Force Base is not a municipality, it pays no taxes, it is a federal government installation and is tax exempt," said Barry.

"The property tax limitation act provides limits on the rate of taxation on property and to provide for a division of the rate of taxation between counties, townships, municipal corporations, school districts and other local units to earmark funds raised by the local tax limitation," said Barry.

The Tawas Area School superintendent said that "local units" as defined by the act meant counties, townships, villages, cities, school districts, community college districts, intermediate school districts and all other divisions, districts and organizations of government which may now or hereafter be established by law and which have the power to levy tax-

es on property within their respective areas.

"I submit that Charles Smith representing Oscoda Township is not eligible under this act to sit on the allocation board; I submit that any vote taken by an ineligible member of this board is void. The allocation as approved is not valid and a new determination must be made," said Barry.

He said that the new determination should be made by a board made up of one additional member representing schools because the governor gave immediate effect to House Bill No. 5173, which provides for such a member.

Barry said that one of two routes could be followed to question the allocation board's action: One course would be to petition the state tax commission for a determination and the second would be to commence suit in circuit court.

Makeup of the allocation board includes two appointees of the probate judge, Ralph Western, representing the county at large, and Ellsworth Bernard, representing boards of education; Richter Lixey, who represents townships, was appointed by the county clerk, treasurer and prosecuting attorney. The county treasurer, county intermediate school superintendent and finance chairman of the county board of commissioners are statutory members.

Six votes were required by the allocation board before a majority was received two weeks ago.

## Aug. Primary Petitions Due Next Week

A flurry to file nominating petitions for the five offices of county commissioner for the August primary election is expected this week by County Clerk D. Keith Papas.

The filing deadline is Tuesday, June 18, 4:00 p. m. Candidates for county commissioner file with Papas and those seeking township offices, also to be listed on the August primary ballot, are to file with their respective township clerks.

Only one candidate had filed as of Friday in each of the five districts for county commissioner. One member of the commission, J. B. Smith of Oscoda, resigned last week and a second commissioner, Carl Libka of Tawas City, announced two weeks ago that he would not seek re-election.

Filing petitions as of June 7 were: Robert Foster, District No. One; Donald Griffin, District No. Two; Mary Jane Burdett, District No. Three; Del Myles, District No. 4; Arthur Aulerich, District No. 5.

Foster and Aulerich are presently serving on the commission. Papas said he expected Fred B. Lomas, presently representing District No. 3, to file shortly.

Papas said that nominating petitions had been circulated by other candidates but had not been received in his office as yet.

Delegates to political conventions to be elected at the August polls are also slow in filing. Only six Republican candidates, all of them women, had filed as of Friday: Sandra Kaye Murray and Marian Killingbeck, both of Oscoda; Jane H. Norwood, Helen N. Collier, Donna L. Sventko, all of East Tawas; Elizabeth Rosenberg, Baldwin Township.

## TA Board Opposes Property Transfer

Opposition to a proposed transfer of property from Whittemore-Prescott Area School District to Tawas Area School District was voiced Monday night by members of Tawas Area Board of Education.

A public hearing on the proposed transfer is to be held Thursday, June 20, 7:30 p. m., at the Iosco Intermediate School District Training Center, Tawas City.

In urging adoption of the school superintendent's recommendation opposing the transfer, Robert W. Elliott, board president, said that the proposed transfer was requested on a basis of emotions. He said that the owner of the property in question had taken children out of the Whittemore-Prescott Area District and brought them to Tawas Area School District under a tuition basis.

Elliott recommended that a meeting between boards of education of the two school districts be held to discuss the boundary line hodgepodge. He pointed out that

the addition of property would not be beneficial to Tawas Area School District because of its already high property valuation. He said, too, that bus transportation was a major factor.

In recommending that the board of education oppose the transfer, Supt. Edward J. Barry said that persons in other nearby areas along the lake shore were interested in transferring to this district and "it is not sound educationally." He said that bus transportation was a major operational item in the budget and there were a number of legal technicalities involved in the proposed transfer. Should the property be transferred, he said that some property owners could be paying school debt retirement taxes in both school districts.

In other business, authorization was given to borrow one-million dollars in tax anticipation notes to finance school operation. This money will tide school operational costs over next fall until receipt of local taxes.

The superintendent said that 80 percent of the schools of Northern Michigan had to borrow money on anticipated local taxes because of the present state aid act, which has changed school financing from a state to a local basis.

Authorization to hire skilled tradesmen to complete work on the house partially constructed by the vocational trades class was given by the board of education. Some interior work remains, along with sidewalks and a driveway.

Prin. John Alexander reported that four driver education classes opened sessions Monday with from 30 to 35 students in each class.

Due to the cost of postage, final report cards will not be mailed to the school's 1,229 students. At the present time, report cards may be picked up at the high school office or later at the administrative office at East Tawas.

The administration was authorized to accept applications for an assistant high school principal, who would handle transportation and discipline matters.

## County Adopts Contract With Multi-County Sanitary Landfill

A three-year contract between Iosco County and Multi-County Sanitary Landfill was accepted Wednesday by the county board of commissioners.

According to the contract, the county is to pay the private firm \$75,000 annually to provide landfill or dump service to all units.

A provision in the contract allows the county to purchase compacting equipment at a price not to exceed \$40,000 for use at the landfill. The private contractor is to reimburse the county for this equipment over a period of five years.

Under terms of the contract, the landfill would also provide space for disposal of junk automobiles.

The landfill, located on Gallion Road, had provided dump services for the past year to East Tawas, Tawas City and Grant Township.

Under the agreement, any governmental unit within the county would be permitted to use the facility.

Operation of dumps by local units of government has proven to be a costly venture in recent years since adoption and enforcement of

new regulations by the state health department. The contract approved Wednesday had been under discussion for a number of months.

The county board of commissioners decided to use a portion of the federal revenue sharing money received by the county for this purpose.

A number of dumps in the county have been closed due to health department restrictions. Tawas Township's landfill is operated by Charles Kobs on private property and has a one-year permit from the Michigan Department of Natural Resources, the licensing agency for all such facilities.

In other business, the resignation of J. B. Smith as a member of the county board of commissioners was accepted. This was his second term in office, which expires at the end of the current year, and he had served as county finance chairman.

Fred Lomas was named to succeed Smith as finance chairman and Robert Foster is to fill Smith's positions on the buildings and

grounds and conservation committees.

Sheriff George Westcott appeared before the commission and reported on the closing of the Gordon Creek Campground by the United States Forest Service. The sheriff said that all police agencies of the county were anticipating enforcement problems here over the Fourth of July week-end due to expected high numbers of campers and other visitors.

Westcott said that personnel of the sheriff's department had logged a large amount of overtime during the past Memorial Day holiday and that the entire department was on duty over the holiday week-ends.

He said he had contacted other counties for assistance over the upcoming holiday, if necessary, and believed he could muster from 50 to 100 men. He said that members of the auxiliary police had assisted with radio traffic during the past holiday and requested that he be permitted to mobilize 10 auxiliary members for July 4. He estimated that uniforms would cost approximately \$125 each.

## Judge Miller is Candidate for District Appeals Court

Circuit Judge Allan C. Miller of East Tawas, currently serving his 15th year on the bench of the 23rd Judicial Circuit, has announced that he is seeking election to the newly-created seat on the non-partisan Third District Appeals Court, covering 66 counties of outstate Michigan. This court aids the Michigan legal system by providing a method of appeal between the Michigan Supreme Court and county circuit courts.

Long recognized as the circuit judge to whom many of the highly-involved cases are sent, Miller said that he felt his long tenure on the bench could greatly aid people of this district.

"The court of appeals is designed to assure every person a just, non-costly review of decisions rendered by our circuit courts and administrative boards. My assignments in 30 counties of the state, including two grand juries, should immediately bring much needed experience to this court," said Miller.

An honor graduate of the University of Michigan, Judge Miller had served 12 years as a trial lawyer and two years as city attorney of Tawas City before being elected to the bench in 1959. He has been re-elected twice without opposition and is now serving a term expiring in 1979. His circuit is composed of the Counties of Iosco, Alcona and Oscoda.

Judge Miller has served more days as a visiting judge in other circuits than any judge presently on the bench. In addition to keeping his own docket current at all times, Miller has, on assignment of the court administrator, handled difficult legal matters involving grand juries in Saginaw and

Emmet Counties, civil defense embezzlement in Bay County, county line determination between Wayne and Macomb Counties, the Youngblood-Szymanski conspiracy trial and environmental matters in Grand Traverse and Emmet Counties. Recently, he handled the "lip reading" inquiry at Detroit.

Educated in public schools of East Tawas and Tawas City, he is the son of the late Charles C. Miller, who lost his life in the line of duty as sheriff of Iosco County. His mother, Grace L. Miller, served as Iosco County treasurer for 26 years.

An active church member, Miller has served on the board of directors of the Tawas-Hale-Whittemore Community Chest and the Iosco Chapter of the American Red Cross. He is a past lieutenant governor of Kiwanis International and is currently serving as state Kiwanis laws and regulations chairman. Other activities include board chairman supporting the Mott Children's Hospital at Ann Arbor, the Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Complex of Grand Rapids and domestic affairs committee of Wurtsmith Air Force Base Council.

Judge Miller resides at East Tawas with his wife, Betty, mother of their five children.

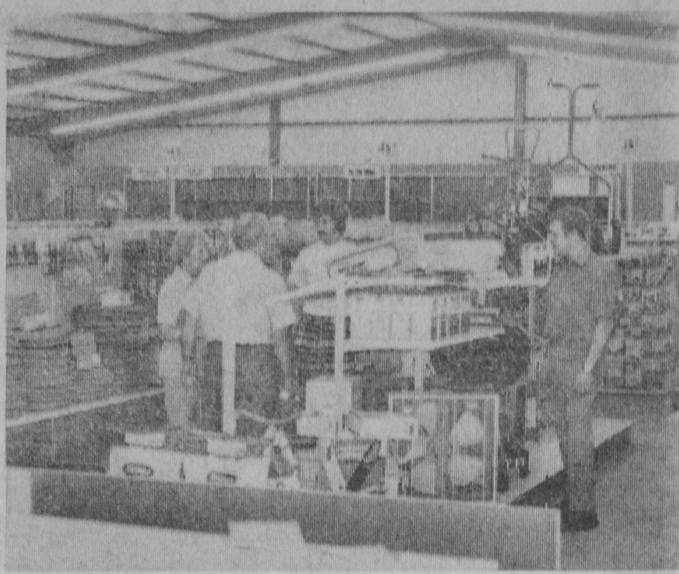

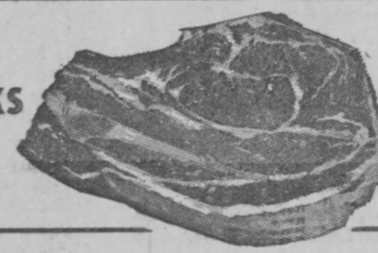

Moved by Tanner, seconded by Lansky, that city make application to state highway department for the parade to be held July 6, 1974, at 10:00 a. m. Carried.

Planning commission minutes of April 18, 1974, were read.

Moved by Savage, seconded by Lansky, that planning commission minutes be approved. Carried.

Planning commission minutes of May 16, 1974, were read.

Moved by Ezo, seconded by Tanner, that planning commission minutes be approved. Carried.

Cemetery board minutes of May 14, 1974, were read.

## Second Step in SS Hike Due in July

Second part of a two-step increase in monthly social security benefits will be included in checks delivered in July, according to John Carr, social security district manager, in Bay City.

Over-all increase will amount to 11 percent for most people getting social security payments. A seven percent increase was included in checks starting in April. "The increase will enhance the financial security of about 30-million people who get social security benefits," Carr said. "People getting social security checks do not have to do anything to get the higher payments. The increase will be added automatically."

Starting in July, average social security retirement payments will go from \$161 to \$181 a month. Average social security disability payments will go from \$184 to \$206 a month. Average survivor payments to a widowed mother with two children in her care will go from \$418 to \$435 a month.

For 1974, the amount of yearly earnings subject to social security deductions has been increased from the first \$10,800 to the first \$13,200, but there is no increase in the contribution rate. Employees and employers will continue to pay 5.85 percent each on covered earnings and the rate for self-employed people drops to 7.9 percent.

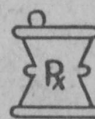

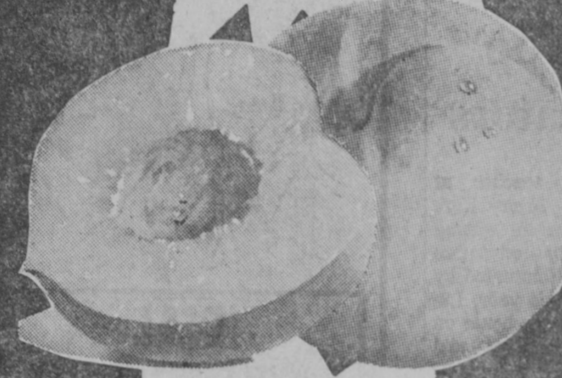

## SS Credit Delay Only For Worker

Question: I am past 65 and still working. Since I earn over \$8,000 a year, I do not get any monthly social security payments. When my retirement benefits are refigured to give me credit for the months after 65 that I did not get monthly payments, will it also increase my wife's social security check?

Answer: The delayed retirement credit you will get because you are working past age 65 is applied only to the worker's monthly social security retirement payment. It does not affect payments made to other family members entitled on the worker's earnings record. However, your continued work may mean a higher benefit for both you and your wife if your pay raises your average annual earnings.

Question: A friend told me that I could get extra credit from social security if I kept on working past 65 and did not get any monthly benefits on my work record. What does my friend mean by extra credit?

Answer: The extra credit will mean increased monthly checks from social security when you do retire and start getting benefits. Any worker who delays retirement past 65 will get a benefit increase of 1/12 of one percent for each month after 65 and before 72 that he does not receive a check because of his earnings. This delayed retirement credit only applies to months after December 1970.

Question: I am getting monthly retirement payments from social security and still working a couple of hours each week. I generally earn about \$20 each week. Do I still have to pay social security contributions on this small salary?

Answer: Yes. If you continue to work in employment covered by social security after you start getting social security payments, you must continue to pay social security contributions on your earnings.

Question: I want to get my first job this summer and one of my classmates told me to make sure I have a social security card before I start looking. When should I apply for a card?

Answer: You should apply right now, several weeks before you will need it. All applications for social security numbers are screened against central files in Baltimore, Maryland, to make certain one person does not get more than one number and this screening takes time. It is a good idea to have your card with you when you go job hunting, because some employers require that you have a social security number before they will hire you.

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
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**Family Living Education**
