

# School to Borrow On Future Taxes

Authorization to apply to the Municipal Finance Commission to issue bonds for the borrowing of \$550,000 on anticipated taxes was given Monday night by Tawas Area Board of Education.

The above amount would finance school operation until receipt of taxes next December. It has been stipulated that the interest rate on the bonds is not to exceed six per cent.

In other matters, Prin. John Alexander reported it is expected that the 1974-75 contract with Tawas Area Education Association is to be brought to a vote shortly. He said that representatives of TAEA and the board of education had held a mediation session with Robert Rombouts for a discussion

on issues and the contract language.

It was reported that cost of purchasing a 5,000-gallon tank for underground storage of gasoline for buses would be \$2,106. No estimate was available for the installation cost and no action was taken. During the gasoline shortage and price increase, the board of education has studied the possibility of installing two 5,000-gallon tanks in order to purchase gasoline for buses at a lower cost. The possible saving through quantity buying is now to be weighed against the total cost of purchasing and installing the tanks.

R. Harry Crawford reported that the school district would no longer receive federal money for school operation for children of families employed at the Federal Building, East Tawas. Under a new interpretation of the law, the post office occupies more than 50 percent of the building and federally impacted aid money formerly received for about 30 children is to be discontinued.

The board of education authorized administrators to obtain costs on moving the school counseling office to a new location. It was stated that present quarters offered no privacy to students during meetings with the three counselors. Larger quarters next to the school's main office are to be utilized.

It was reported that the board of education met last week with administrators concerning contracts for the new term. Agreement was reached April 11 on salaries, but contracts are not signed as yet.

Robert Elliott, board of education president, reported that the school's attorney, Michael Freel, is to report July 8 on the status of his investigation of the seating of Charles Smith of Oscoda Township on the county tax allocation board. Eligibility of Smith to be seated on that board is being challenged by the board of education.

No action was taken on a request from the girls' varsity club concerning a field trip this summer to Cedar Point, Sandusky, Ohio. The board of education said it had no objection to the trip, but it could neither deny nor approve the trip as it was to be held when school was not in session.

A bill from Hale Area School for \$1,734 as Tawas Area School's share of a nursing program conducted during the past term was tabled until the July 8 meeting. The instructional program conducted by Hale Area School, in cooperation with Tawas Hospital, was part of a cooperative vocational program between four Iosco schools. Principal Alexander said that Tawas Area School had offered auto mechanics during the past term to students of other schools as part of the cooperative program and had not billed other schools for participating.

Crawford reported that 73 students were enrolled in the Title One reading-mathematics summer program at the Tawas City Elementary Unit. He said the reading center concept was the same as the program offered during the regular school year.

## Tools Stolen from Lumber Yard

A breaking and entering, two larcenies and a vandalism complaint were investigated last week by Michigan State Police from East Tawas.

A large quantity of tools was taken Friday in a breaking and entering at Grove Lumber Company, Kitchen Road, Sherman Township. Stolen was a chain saw, hand tools, an arc welder, acetylene torches, two electric grinders, a surveying instrument and a battery-operated calculator.

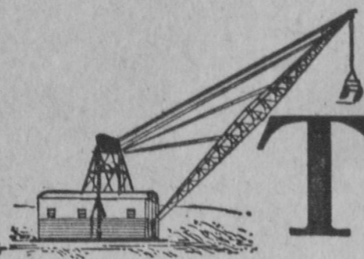

## TA Administration Eyes Budget Cuts

Administrators of Tawas Area School are now studying the school's 1974-75 budget to determine areas to be cut in order to bring spending within slightly lower receipts than anticipated.

All schools of the county are to receive less operational taxes than estimated when budgets were adopted in April, due to the fact that the county tax allocation board reduced the school's share of the 15-mill limitation from 9.75 mills to 9.25 mills.

In Tawas Area School's case, the school receives \$30,862.10 less in property taxes and a reduction of \$4,863.65 in state aid, which is the result of lowering local millage based on the state aid formula.

At Monday night's meeting of the board of education, Robert McDonald, middle school principal, said that 1974-75 class scheduling for grades six, seven and eight had been completed prior to the end of the school year. However, the scheduling was based on the addition of one English teacher to handle an overload of students in those grades. With the cut in the budget, it is not known at present if there will be funds to hire the additional teacher.

McDonald said there would be approximately 530 students in the middle school next fall with 210 students in the seventh grade.

He said it had been hoped to reduce the English class load to about 27 students per teacher with the additional staff member. He said teaching supplies had been ordered for the next term, but a "hold" had been placed on ordering equipment for physical education, shop and home economics until a determination is made on the budget cuts.

There is one other full time staff opening in the middle school grades, along with the vocal music position, which has been shared with elementary grades and the high school.

John Alexander, high school principal, said that he was scheduling interviews for two known vacancies in the high school, which includes English-speech and office practice. He said that a rough

## Hike Rates on Sewer - Water Connections

Following a year-end report on the audit of operational expenses, Tawas City Water Board Monday night increased water and sewer connection fees effective immediately.

City Mgr. Reginald Bublitz said Tuesday that the cost of brass and copper fittings for connections had risen approximately 60 percent during the past year. This increase, coupled with the normal inflation for equipment costs and labor, required higher connection charges.

On property presently served by mains, the following schedule has been adopted:

Three-quarter-inch water connection, raised from \$155 to \$200; one-inch water connection, raised from \$175 to \$225; six-inch sewer connection, raised from \$175 to \$225.

In other business conducted Monday night by the water board, authorization was given to extend a sewer to serve Lot 1 of Goldsmith Addition owned by Lyle Healey and Lot 15 of North Park Acres owned by Michael Billy. Cost of the extension to the two property owners is to be a maximum of \$19 per foot.

The city manager reported on his study of a sewer problem on Eleventh Avenue. He said his study had shown that an old two-inch water main had severe encrustation of deposits which lowered water volume. The water board authorized boring under Fourth Street with a new four-inch main to serve homes on Eleventh Avenue. It is expected that a six or eight-inch main would be required to serve that street should there be development of homes in the future.

She will represent Oscoda at various festivals during the summer months.

## Purchase Site for New TC Post Office

An agreement to purchase a 23,400-square-foot site for a new post facility in Tawas City has been announced by Arvid Berg, acting district manager at Grand Rapids for the United States Postal Service.

The site, which cost \$20,000, is being purchased from Harold G. and Dorothy Bublitz.

The postal service had an option on the property since December 1972, covering a parcel of land located on the west side of Lake Street, 260 feet south of Mathews Street and adjacent to the Bublitz Union 76 service station.

Leonard Hosbach, Tawas City postmaster, said Friday that he had confirmed the purchase by telephone call to Roy Grobe, sectional section manager at Saginaw. Final approval of plans for the new post facility was given by Berg on April 17.

The new postal facility provides 22 parking places for employees and patrons and one for handicap parking only. The property will have an entrance off Lake Street and the building will have a covered canopy at the rear for a loading dock area.

The facility is to be equipped with a hydraulic lift for loading trucks, a 17 by 21-foot lock box lobby, a separate 10 by 10-foot service lobby, an office for the postmaster and 1,829 square feet of workroom area.

Hosbach said that the workroom area alone will be slightly larger than the present post office, which has 1,800 square feet of floor space.

The postmaster said that the new facility would be ready for occupancy by the spring of 1975. "I cannot see any completion date earlier than that, due to the length of time required for advertising for bids, obtaining materials and actual construction," said Hosbach.

"I think this new building, which will have 2,784 square feet of floor space and will be conveniently located, will be something of which people of this community can be proud," said Hosbach.

The present facility is to be leased by Iosco County for office use by the Cooperative Extension Service, once the move is made to the new building. Present quarters are owned by Del Myles of Tawas City.

## Deny Petition Asking School Line Change

A request to transfer property from Whittemore-Prescott Area School District to Tawas Area School District has been denied by the board of education of Iosco Intermediate School District which has responsibility under state law to settle such questions.

A petition requesting the transfer had been submitted by Mr. and Mrs. Harold Busch of Sherman Township, who had transferred their children out of Whittemore-Prescott Area School to Tawas Area School under a tuition basis.

Boards of education of both Tawas Area School and Whittemore-Prescott Area School opposed the property transfer. It was reported that the petitioners had retained the services of legal counsel and may pursue the matter in the courts.

At its last meeting, the board of education of Tawas Area School took the position that it opposed the transfer on grounds that it would further complicate bus transportation of students. It was recommended that the two boards of education meet jointly to discuss new boundary lines for the districts. It has been agreed that such a meeting is to be held within six months.

The boundary line hedgepodge in Sherman Township resulted in the 1950s during reorganization of the two school districts.

## Bicycle Racing to Feature Michigan Tourist Festival

Bicycle racing returns as a major summer attraction in the Tawas after an absence of six years.

Four days of bicycle racing, along with other athletic events, will feature the 1974 Michigan Tourist Festival program to be held in the Tawas July 4-7.

The program includes the sixth running of the Tour of Lumbermen's Monument Bicycle Race. This event was last held in August of 1967 when a field of 21 Olympical-caliber riders was led across the finish line by Siegfried Koch of West Germany.

Leonard Calabrese, who chaired five years of bicycle racing here before the program was dropped in 1968, will again head the committee for the 1974 event sponsored by Tawas Area Promotions, Incorporated.

Starting and finish lines for time trials and all races will be at the corner of East State and Newman Streets at East Tawas. Bicycle racing always provided plenty of excitement for spectators in past years because of the convenient location of competition.

A tentative program was announced this week by the TAP organization. Exact times for bicycle events and more details on individual activities are to be listed next week.

The program for Thursday, July 4, includes a 50 to 60-mile tourist bicycle ride in the afternoon. Stagecraft Productions featuring the Millstones will open a four-day stand for dancing at the East Tawas Community Building. There will be fireworks from the Tawas City Park dock at 9:30 p. m.

Friday, July 5, activities include sidewalk sales all day. There will be tourist bicycle rides starting at 10:00 a. m. to the AuSable River at Foote Dam. The first American Bicycle Association - sanctioned meet is scheduled for 7:00 p. m. with sprint races.

Activities on Saturday, July 6, include a parade at 10:00 a. m. starting from Mathews Street in

Tawas City and continuing to the Michigan State Police Post at East Tawas. Individual time trials and a 25-mile sprint race will be held during the day, along with a bicycle rodeo featuring the skills of tourist and novice bike riders.

In addition to the above, United States PT boats from the Great Lakes Naval Training Station will be at Michigan Waterways Commission Dock. The Knothole League all-star game will be held at the East Tawas Athletic Field at 4:00 p. m., followed by the Pony League all-star game at 6:00 p. m.

East Tawas Lions Club will hold its annual chicken barbecue starting at 11:30 a. m. at the East Tawas Park, while Tawas Kiwanis Club will hold its corn roast starting at 11:30 a. m. at a site yet to be announced.

Another big day of bicycle racing activities is scheduled for Sunday, July 7, with the Tour of Lumbermen's Monument races. There will be a 50-kilometer event and a 100-kilometer Olympic event. No-voice sprint races are to be staged at East Tawas starting at 12 o'clock noon.

Men's slow pitch all-star game will be held, starting at 3:00 p. m. at the Newman Street athletic field.

Throughout the four days, a United States Army helicopter precision flying team will perform during various program activities.

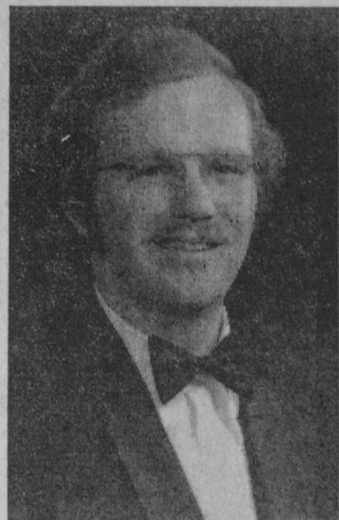
## Carrying Concealed Gun Draws Charge from Iosco

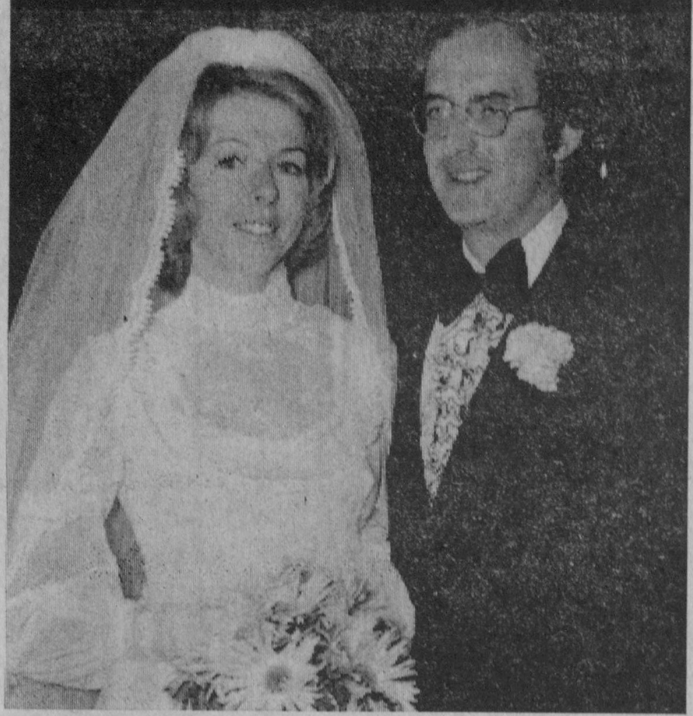

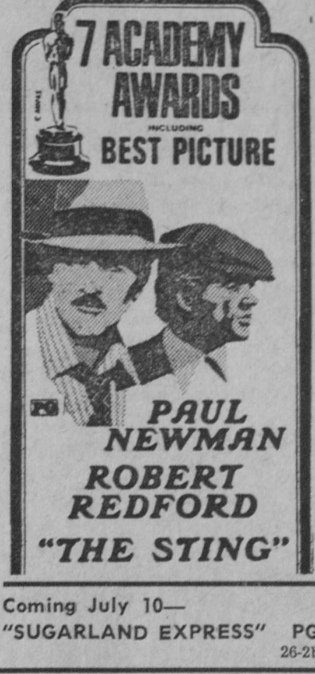

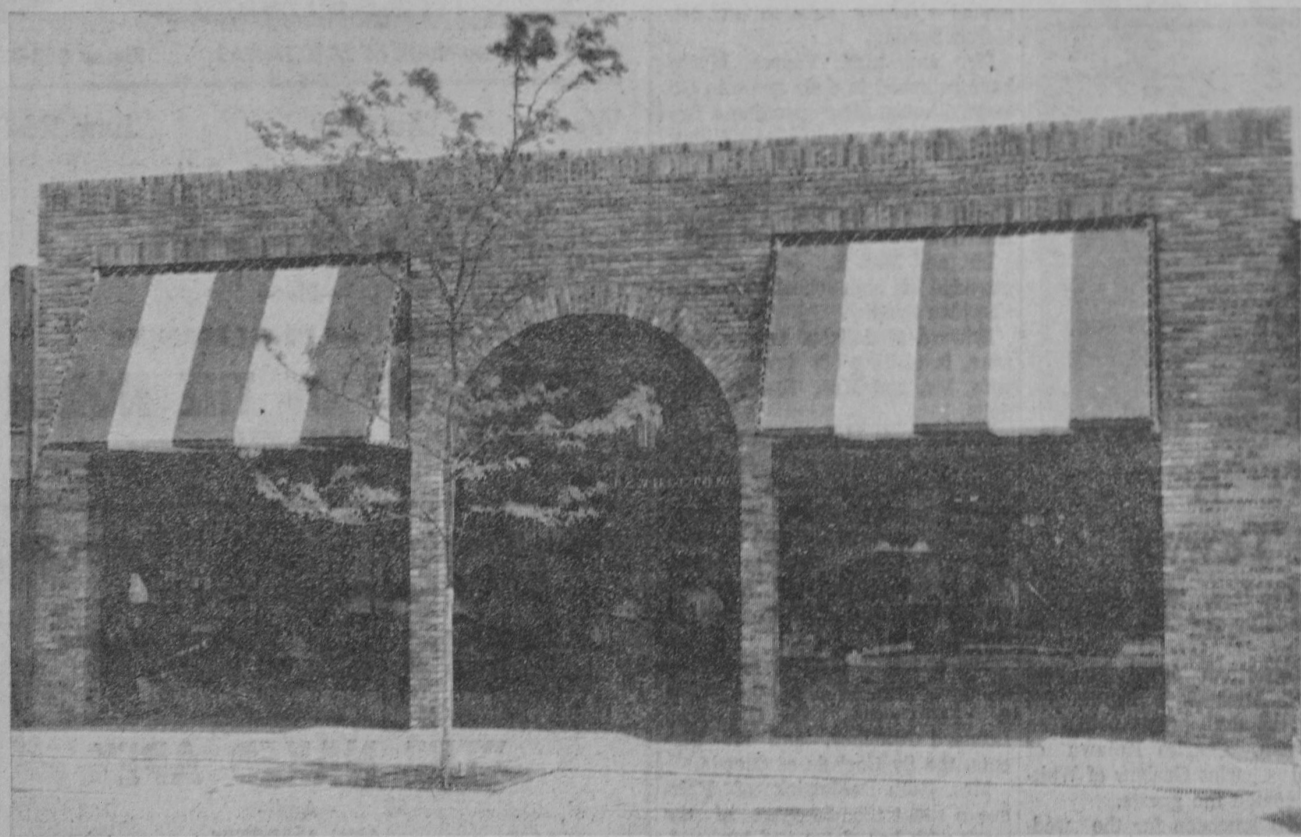

## Donald Griffin of Oscoda is New Member of Board of Commissioners

Donald Griffin of Oscoda has been appointed to fill the District No. 2 vacancy on the Iosco County Board of Commissioners. He succeeds J. B. Smith, who resigned last month.

The oath of office was administered Wednesday to Griffin by County Clerk D. Keith Pappas.

Griffin was the lone candidate to file for this office in the upcoming August primary election. An employee of an Oscoda real estate firm, he is a retired air force officer and worked as an auditor while assigned to Wurtsmith Air Force Base.

In other business, the commission authorized advertising for sealed proposals on a sanitary landfill compactor to be used at Multi-County Sanitary Landfill. Deadline for receiving proposals is Tuesday, July 2. The equipment is to be purchased by the county and used at the landfill. The contractor is to repay the county over a five-year period.

It was reported that the commission has recommended a change in the method of financing the operation of the district health department. At the present time, operational expenses of the department are apportioned to Ogemaw,

Alcona, Oscoda and Iosco Counties based on 50 percent valuation and 50 percent population. The county board of commissioners believes that services rendered to this county are disproportionate with costs to Iosco due to the fact that Wurtsmith Air Force Base is included in the total population and it provides its own health service. The Iosco Board of Commissioners has requested that health department operational costs be based on valuation alone.

A bid from Gary Ulman of \$12,102.44 for the jail heating project was accepted.

Vincent Wade of Sand Lake was appointed to the area advisory council on aging.

Mayor Robert Bolen appeared before the commission to determine if the county has any plans to aid in bridge construction. Bolen said that the bridge over the Tawas River at East Tawas was too narrow and that a definite traffic hazard existed. He said, too, that a dangerous situation existed when children crowded the bridge while fishing in the river. The commission indicated that no county money was available for bridge replacement.

Bolen also expressed the opinion

that Oscoda Township should be billed for runs by Tawas Hospital ambulance service into that township. Local units of government, with the exception of Oscoda and AuSable Townships, help to subsidize the hospital's ambulance service, while funeral directors provide ambulance service to Oscoda and AuSable.

Chairman Robert Foster pointed out, however, that county funds had been used to aid in the establishment and operation of the hospital ambulance service and he did not feel it would be proper to bill Oscoda Township for occasional runs by the hospital's ambulance stationed at Hale along M-65 in Oscoda Township.

### Iosco Authorizes Extra Law Officers Over Fourth of July

An advisory council on law enforcement, composed of representatives of various law enforcement agencies, businessmen, governmental officials and area residents, is to meet next Friday to discuss possible methods for crowd control during the Fourth of July holiday.

Attending that meeting as a body will be the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, acting as a safety committee.

At last Wednesday's regular meeting of the county commission, it was stated that the closing of Gordon Creek in Huron National Forest could present "an explosive situation" over the upcoming holiday.

The board of commissioners adopted a resolution authorizing the sheriff to obtain additional trained law enforcement help from out-of-county agencies. The resolution authorized the sheriff to pay salaries, food and lodging for additional trained officers assisting his department over the holiday.

At the May meeting of the commission, Sheriff George Westcott had requested authorization to mobilize several members of the sheriff's department auxiliary over the holiday. Although they would not be paid for their services, the sheriff suggested that they be paid \$1 each in order to be covered under the county's insurance program.

Such an arrangement, advised the prosecuting attorney, would make the auxiliary members county employees.

Inasmuch as auxiliary officers would not have legal authority as police officers, commissioners were of the opinion that it would not be advisable to have untrained persons in a possibly dangerous situation and they would rather have trained officers on hand.

Commissioners stated that if auxiliary members are utilized, it would be best to have them working at the jail, similar to the program over Memorial Day when auxiliary members handled radio

traffic. The sheriff's request was held in abeyance until the next meeting on June 26.

The Gordon Creek trail camp northwest of the Tawas, designed for about 50 campers on the Lake Michigan to Lake Huron Riding and Hiking Trail, was closed following the Memorial Day holiday by the United States Forest Service. The site had again been the gathering place for approximately 3,000 campers and the area was littered with debris, live trees were cut for campfires, one of two restrooms was vandalized and the campground's only well was cracked and put out of commission.

Entrance to the campground has been closed, the property has been plowed and seedling trees have been planted in the clearing as a means of rehabilitating the area.

Last year, the Fourth of July gathering of campers at Gordon Creek was much lower than on the previous Memorial Day week-end. With the Fourth of July falling on Thursday this year, law enforcement agencies believe that the area may again be crowded with campers and trouble may result from the closing of Gordon Creek.

Closing of the campground has been publicized in downstate metropolitan areas, but any large influx of campers would put heavy pressure on other areas of the national forest, as well as state, county and municipal parks.

Over the past Memorial Day, forest service officials noted that campers had pushed beyond the boundaries designated for Gordon Creek and a large number of campers was reported as far away as the old Thompson Farm.

Continued pressure of vehicular traffic on the national forest is of concern to officials as extensive erosion damage has been created in recent years. As a result, Silver Valley, once a popular year around playground, has been placed off limits to all vehicles.

It is expected that the local communities will have problems with crowd control due to the holiday falling closer to the week-end. In addition, date of the annual Michigan Tourist Festival in the Tawas has been changed to July Fourth and that week-end.

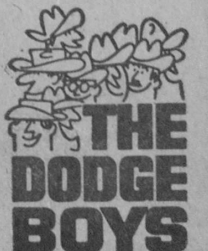

## Son's Benefits Terminate On His Marriage

Question: My husband is 66 years old and is receiving social security. We have a 16-year-old son who receives benefits. If our son marries before he is 18 but stays in school, will his benefits stop? Would it make any difference if his girl friend, age 16, also receives social security on her father's account?

Answer: Your son's benefits will terminate when he marries. The fact that he is still in school or marries another child beneficiary does not change this. His girl friend will also lose her benefit when she marries. If these young people are the youngest in their respective families, when they marry, it could cause your benefits to terminate also unless you and your son's girl friend's mother are old enough to draw wife's or widow's benefits (age 62 and 60).

Question: I have just finished my sophomore year at college, but I am not sure I will return to school in the fall. I get monthly social security payments. Should I have them stopped?

Answer: It is a good idea. Social security can continue payments up to four months in a vacation period to students who plan to return to school full time. Since you are not sure you will go back to school, you should have your social security checks stopped to avoid the possibility of having to pay back some benefits. If you decide to return to school, social security can pay back benefits due you.

Question: I am a June bride. Do I need a new social security card showing my married name?

Answer: Yes. Contact any social security office and the people there will help you get a social security card showing your new name. Your social security number will remain the same for life. Earnings credited to your social security number both before and after your marriage build disability, survivors, retirement and medicare protection for you and your family.

Question: When an insured worker dies, I hear social security pays a lump-sum death payment, in addition to monthly survivors benefits. How much is it and who gets it?

Answer: The benefit is \$255 and it generally is paid to the widow or widower who was living with the worker. If there is no widow or widower, the \$255 may be paid toward the funeral expenses. If you have any questions regarding social security, contact the Bay City Social Security Office at 1009 North Madison Avenue, Bay City, or phone 893-9579. Monthly Premiums On Medicare Insurance Hiked

Monthly premiums on the medical insurance part of medicare will go up starting Monday, July 1. Basic premium rate will go from \$6.30 to \$6.70 a month, according to John Carr, social security district manager in Bay City.

The 40-cent increase in July is related to a rise in the cost of medical services and compares to a 50-cent increase in the medical insurance basic monthly premium rate in 1973, according to Carr.

Medical hospital insurance premiums must also be increased starting July 1. "The basic premium rates will go from \$33 to \$36 a month," Carr said.

Medicare is administered by the Social Security Administration, an agency of the United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare. "People can get information about signing up for medicare by calling, writing or visiting any social security office," Carr said. The Bay City social security office is at 1009 North Madison. Phone number is 893-9579.

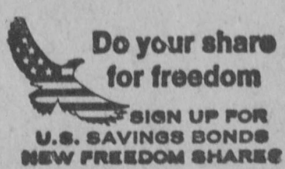
