## Property Owner Voices Objection to Sewer Project

Fred Wright of 419 Birch Street told members of the Tawas City Council Monday night that he and other persons residing in his neighborhood were opposed to a special assessment district now in motion to construct a sanitary sewer system to serve his area and the northeastern section of the city.

Threatening possible legal action should the council proceed with its program, which has followed months of discussion and hearings, Wright pointed out that he and many of his neighbors had "signed up" for sewer service when the original system was constructed during WPA days of the mid-1930s.

"For some reason then and over the years, we were unable to receive this service. Now that our families have grown up and left home, you are trying to cram it down our throats," said Wright.

The Birch Street resident had objected to the cost of the project—\$19 per front foot—at the last two council meetings and believed the cost could be lowered if the city would handle the project with its own crew rather than contracting the work. It was the opinion last week of the city's engineering consultant that, because of the depth required for sewer near the Tawas

River and the size of the over-all project which includes three districts, the project should be handled by a contractor.

Mayor John N. Brugger said that the council had been sympathetic to the opinions voiced by older residents in the former First Ward, but present councilmen could not be aware of any discussion concerning sanitary sewers 25 or 30 years ago.

He said that when petitions for sanitary sewer service were received from residents of that area, the council set its engineering consultants to work out an acceptable plan. As a result of that study, it was found that boring under the river for a sewer and water main would provide a more suitable arrangement than assessing the cost of an expensive lift station against private property owners. The river boring is included in the total cost to be assessed against the city at large.

It was pointed out, too, that property owners in all three of the special assessment districts had been notified of the required hearings for establishment of such districts. As a result of discussion at those hearings, a procedure deemed more equitable to all concerned was developed.

## Sidewalk Change Under ET Study

Community reaction to a proposed change in the configuration of one portion of Newman Street will be tested by the East Tawas Council before final plans are approved for a sidewalk-street change in front of the Pendleton Shop.

Timothy O'Connor of the Pendleton Shop appeared at Monday night's council meeting and presented proposed plans for changing the street and sidewalk in front of the business firm, which is now undergoing expansion and reconstruction.

The plan calls for elimination of two parking spaces in front of the store and construction of a concrete and brick sidewalk into Newman Street. A planter box, tree and bench would be located in the area formerly occupied by the two parking spaces. Besides beautifying the general area, O'Connor said the proposal should improve safety conditions for pedestrians.

O'Connor said that the city planning commission had reacted favorably to the idea when it was presented several months ago. According to the city's master plan, Newman Street would eventually be turned into a mall and this would be the first step in that direction.

In other business, the council directed that a letter be sent to the Iosco Board of Commissioners outlining the city's plans for construction of recreational facilities and to seek financial assistance from federal revenue sharing funds received by the county.

At the present time, the city is considering the possibility of purchasing property east of the Newman Street athletic field to expand that facility. The property is presently owned by Tawas Area School, which has suggested a possible property exchange with the city for a new site for future school use. City officials apparently have not been receptive to the proposed land exchange and a meeting between city and school officials was to have been held last night (Tuesday) to consider possible sites for future elementary school construction.

It was announced that Tawas Area Promotions, which sponsored the Perchville USA program, had established July 3-7 for the annual Michigan Tourist Festival Program. Arrangements are now being made with the Wolverine Cycle Club of the Detroit area to stage bicycle races here over the July 4 week-end and the council was requested to close off a portion of Newman Street, Lincoln and State Streets as a starting point for the races. The bicycle competition was an important feature of the Michigan Tourist Festival program for a number of years, but was discontinued several years ago due to a schedule conflict.

It was reported that Tawas Area Promotions is to contact the City of Tawas City for permission to locate a carnival on the property owned by Dr. John D. LeClair along US-23 during the festival. The matter was on the agenda of Tawas City Council Monday night, but a representative did not make an appearance.

The council went on record as favoring the private operation of a sanitary landfill rather than for the County of Iosco to establish such a facility. A resolution is to be presented at today's (Wednesday's) meeting of the county commission.

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## Tawas City Girl Pageant Winner

Miss Debbie Jean Williams, 18, of Tawas City was crowned Miss Oscoda at the second Miss Oscoda Pageant Saturday night.

Miss Robbie C. Miller, 18, of East Tawas was first runner-up, and Miss Susan E. McKay, 17, of Wurtsmith Air Force Base, was second runner-up.

Miss Williams, a freshman at Ferris State College, will now represent Oscoda in the Miss Michigan Pageant to be held later this year.

More than 500 persons attended the pageant, based upon the theme, "Come to the Mardi Gras," in the Oscoda High School Auditorium.

The 10 girls in the contest split \$925 in prizes.

## Review Board Sets \$8,532,200 as Value

An assessed valuation of \$8,532,200 for real estate and personal property has been adopted by the Tawas City Board of Review following its meetings during the past two weeks.

Real estate valuation reflects a net increase of \$207,200 on 61 descriptions totaling \$7,029,700, representing a 3.09 percent increase in new construction.

Personal property in 119 descriptions is valued at \$1,502,500, reflecting five new businesses and five which went out of business. Last year, personal property was valued at \$1,491,600.

Yet to be determined is the state equalized valuation, theoretically the true cash value, which is now

undergoing study throughout Iosco County by an appraisal team from the state tax commission.

John Hosbach, a member of the city's board of review, believes that Tawas City can expect an eight to 10-percent increase—possibly upwards to 15 percent—when the state completes its study of sales. He told members of the city council Monday night that it appeared to him that the property assessments in the city were low according to state standards based on sales.

The county tax equalization department had recommended earlier that Tawas City increase its assessment on all residential property, over and above any new construction, by 4.03 percent, or an additional \$182,000. This recommendation was based on a three-year sales study conducted by that department, which indicated that sales were higher than assessments.

With the state tax commission presently preparing to take a look at procedures and assessments in every unit of the county, city officials apparently felt that it would be well to await final word from the state, based on its sales study, before making any change in assessment.

Taxes to be levied in 1974 for city operation (termed locally as summer taxes), yet to be determined by the city council after adoption of an annual budget, would be based on the assessed valuation established by the board of review. The winter tax, which includes schools and the county, would be based on the new state equalized figure yet to be established.

## Contract Would Discontinue City's Two-Man Police Force

After operating the city police department for one year with administration and dispatching provided under contract with the Iosco Sheriff's Department, Tawas City Council Monday night believed that the system had proven so effective that it accepted a new contract whereby the sheriff's department assumes complete control and coordination of city police matters.

As a result of this action and pending formal acceptance to a tentative agreement reached with the county board of commissioners, the city police department would be discontinued and its two patrolmen would become members of the sheriff's department.

Cost of this service to the city under a one-year contract proposed by Sheriff George Westcott would be \$23,340. The city would turn its present patrol car over to the county.

### Officers Would Join Sheriff's Department

The need for central dispatching and coordination of all local police agencies under one department was the primary thought behind council action last year when it proposed a contract with the sheriff's department to provide administration of city police functions.

City officials believed then and are still of the opinion that coordination of local police functions should be handled by one central agency. It believed, too, that coordination of volunteer fire department efforts could best be handled through a central dispatching system.

Mayor John N. Brugger expressed the opinion Monday night that the city had received improved police protection under the arrangement last year with the sheriff's department and, now that county officers had completed required schooling, manning of around-the-clock patrols in the entire county would be improved.

Under the new contract, county officers would also provide enforcement of city ordinances with the city attorney handling prosecution.

## Joint Water-Sewer Project to be Discussed

Local governmental units proposing a joint water and sewer project are to outline their needs to Cong. Philip Ruppe at a special luncheon meeting to be held at Lixey's Restaurant, East Tawas, Saturday, March 30, 12 o'clock noon.

Officials of Tawas City, Baldwin Township and East Tawas, the three units proposing improvements to present facilities to better serve area industrial parks under an engineering arrangement known as the "Edmonds Plan," have been invited to the luncheon.

Plans are now complete and the various units involved have decided to again seek federal assistance to complete the project. When originally proposed several years ago, federal Economic Development Act funds were depleted, but the latest work now is that EDA money is again being released by the federal government for such projects.

Members of Michigan Nurses Association, Michigan League for Nursing, Michigan Licensed Practical Nurses Association and the Michigan State Association of Industrial Nurses are observing this week as "Michigan Nurses' Week."

For 100 years, there have been nurses in peace, war, epidemics, whenever and wherever they were needed, devoting their lives to taking care of the physically or emotionally ill.

Nurses have been informed through continuing education in the latest health care techniques. Michigan schools and colleges of nursing admit many students each year and the rewards of professional nursing are well worth the study and work.

Nursing is a growing field for alert young men and more are vitally needed in public and private general hospitals. High school students are urged to enter the nursing profession and enjoy job satisfaction, challenge, prestige and security.

Anyone who has a high school diploma and can pass the entrance examination at Kirtland Community College may enter classes. For convenience, a branch of Kirtland College is located on US-23 just north of East Tawas. One course per year, 46 weeks of study, begins each fall. The college is affiliated with Tawas Hospital where practical training is given three days a week. Upon graduation, a certificate is issued by Kirtland Community College. This qualifies the student to take a state board examination and, when the examination is passed, he or she receives the legal title of Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN).

Never before has nursing offered so many exciting career opportunities for all ages, from putting a man on the moon to putting a crippled child on his feet. The rewards are well worth the study and work.

### Results Announced

## Study Occupational Training Needs in Intermediate Dist.

Iosco Intermediate School District has taken on the task of conducting an occupational training needs study for the district. Purpose of this study was to investigate vocational training needs of the district, obtain data on existing and projected needs of employers in the area, determine student interest in receiving vocational training and determine specific programs which may be offered that will correspond with the manpower needs of the area and interests displayed by students in local school districts.

A summary of the results of the survey indicated the following:

- (1) Area employers indicated that, as a common practice, they do not hire high school dropouts;
- (2) Students with a high school diploma that are hired often need additional training;
- (3) Of the employers surveyed, 35 percent indicated that area school facilities did not offer enough training for students to develop marketable skills for job entry;
- (4) 65 Percent of local employers favored the creation of an area vo-

ational center.

The second phase of the survey was to determine the interests and needs of students in the Iosco Intermediate School District. It was found that

- (1) 45 Percent of area high school students would prefer to be in a vocational program that would train them for entry into an occupation;
- (2) Of the students preparing to attend college, 70 percent indicated they would be interested in attending a vocational training center.

Objective of the district is to meet the needs of people. To do so, it is necessary that an area vocational center be established. This center will be designed to develop skills, not only for high school students, but also for special education students. It will offer retraining programs for area employees and serve all area adults and senior citizens with courses and programs to meet their needs.

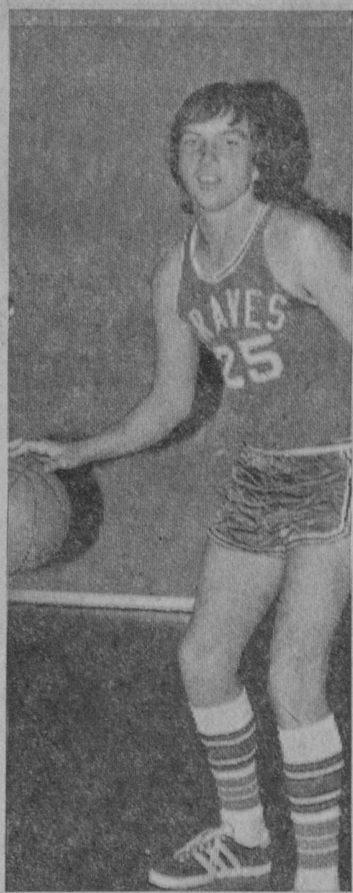

## Sheriff Gives Views on Meal Tab Story

In response to a directive two weeks ago by the Iosco County Board of Commissioners, which disallowed an \$11.65 bill for six lunches submitted for sheriff's department personnel attending a local training meeting, Sheriff George Westcott said Monday that four of the deputies were off duty at the time and attended the meeting on their own time.

Westcott, who said he had not been aware at the time of any directive against paying meals of employees when they were in the county, said he had felt that paying this bill was actually saving the county money.

"Four of the men attended the meeting on their own time and were entitled to be paid at a rate of time and one-half for overtime. The bill for these men, if a bill had been submitted for salaries, would have been in excess of \$55," said Westcott.

The meeting, a law enforcement training session on departmental and community relations, had been called by the prosecuting attorney and was held at the Holland House, East Tawas.

When the business firm's bill for the lunches was processed through the regular course of paying bills

in the county clerk's office, a question arose over payment. The state auditor general's office advised the county clerk that there is no authority for payment of meals unless the public official or employee is traveling outside the county on authorized travel.

A resolution adopted by the county commission reaffirmed a previous resolution establishing reimbursement procedures for expenses when officers or employees are out of the county.

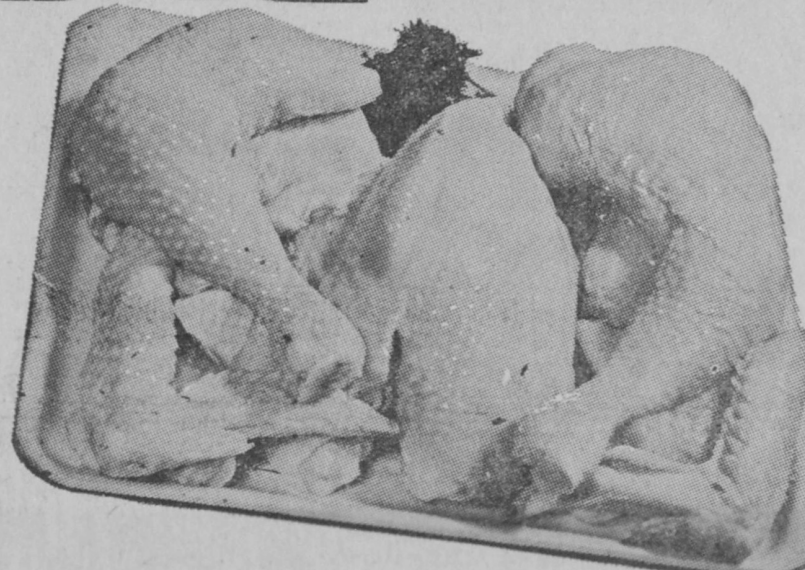

and a maximum of \$19 per front foot was established as the cost to each property owner, regardless of location. Any cost over that amount up to \$25 is to be borne by the city.

Officials said that the project had now proceeded to the point where application had been made to the Municipal Finance Commission for permission to sell special assessment and general obligation bonds to finance the entire project. In its resolutions adopted concerning the three sanitary sewer districts, the council deemed the construction of public necessity to the health and welfare of the community.

Property owners so desiring may pay the special assessment in one lump sum or over a period of years.

It was Wright's opinion that he and his neighbors had been given a "bum steer" over the years. "I will be of retirement age in two years—how am I going to pay for the sewer?" he asked.

Mr. McIntyre was born August 3, 1883, in Beaverton. He and his wife, Lettie, had lived in Detroit before moving to East Tawas.

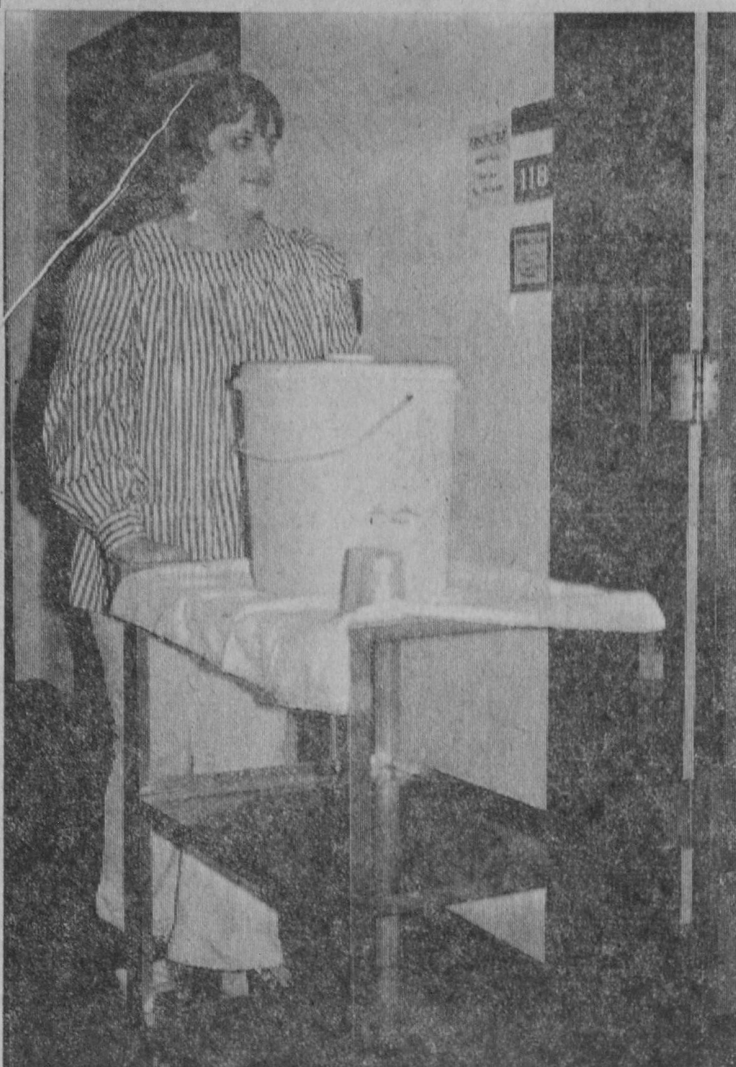

arrangements for the luncheon, said that proposed plans would be outlined to Congressman Ruppe and discussion would be held on possible federal assistance.

The plan, developed by Edmands Engineering Company of Bay City, would expand East Tawas' water system to serve the industrial park in Baldwin Township, as well as providing water storage and other improvements. Tawas City's water system would be expanded to provide improved service to the industrial park here, as well as facilities for water storage and a larger main connecting with the East Tawas water filtration plant.

In addition to this plan, the three above units and Tawas Township recently authorized Edmands and Spicer Engineering Companies to conduct a survey to determine the feasibility of providing secondary sewage treatment on an area-wide basis.

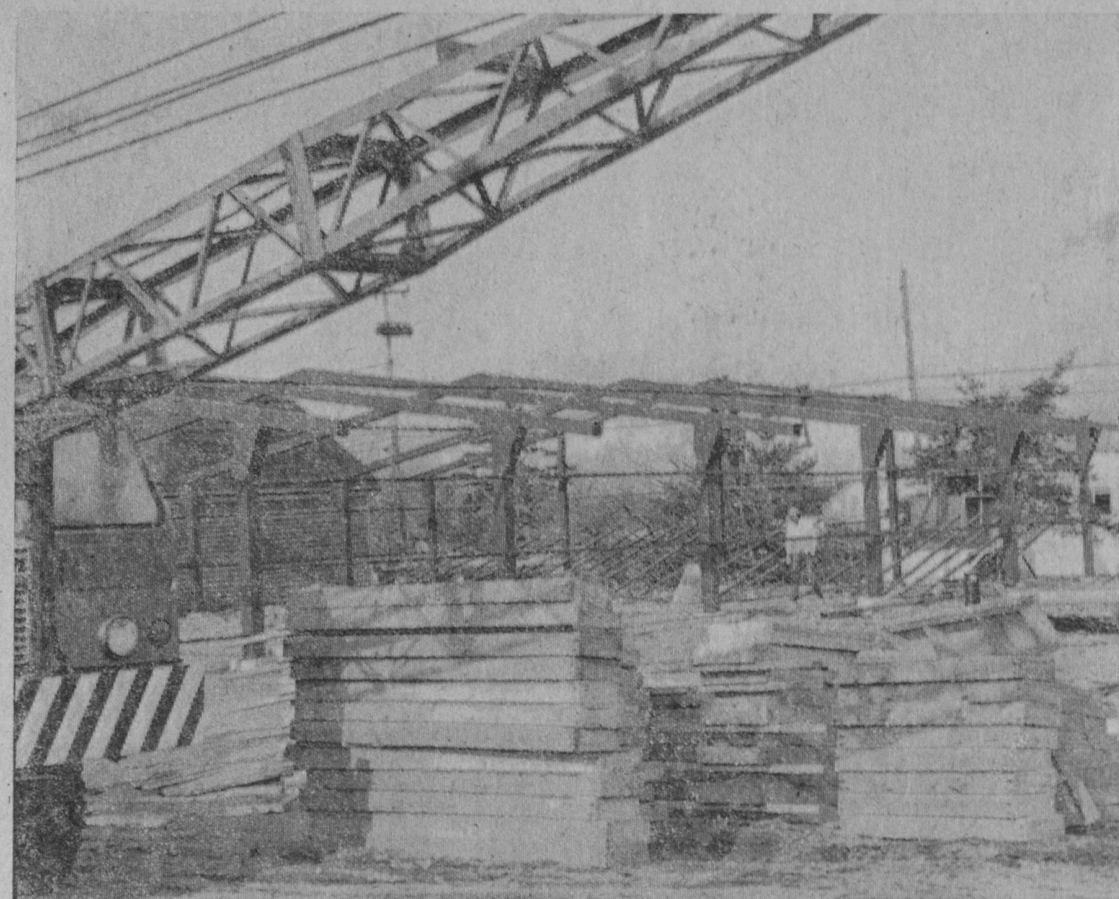

## Young Men Can Register Now by Mail

Young men, age 18, can now register by mail for the draft if they find it difficult to visit a selective service office or registrar.

New mail registration forms were issued this week to all Michigan Selective Service area offices, according to state draft headquarters. Mail registration forms will be available from colorful poster displays located in selected public offices such as county clerks, post offices, armories and schools.

Individuals may also request a mail registration form by writing to any selective service office. Instructions are included with the form. It can be completed at home, then folded and mailed. It is pre-addressed and needs no postage.

The local board having jurisdiction will mail a status card to the registrant about two weeks after receiving his completed registration form.

Federal law still requires the registration of young men at age 18, even though inductions have stopped. With the closing of many draft offices due to budget restrictions, selective service has now initiated the mail registration program to enable young men to register with as little difficulty as possible.

A test of the mail registration system was conducted in Michigan last spring. It was deemed a successful means of supplementing personal registration at draft offices and by volunteer registrars at most high schools and colleges.

## Need Release from Liability When GI Loan Homes Sold

Frank J. Killeulen, acting director of the Veterans Administration regional office in Detroit, has issued a warning to veterans and service men who sell homes purchased with GI loans to make certain they obtain a "release from liability" if another purchaser assumes their loans.

Killeulen said that a veteran could be held financially liable should the new purchaser default on the mortgage payments. In the past fiscal year, the VA has granted 9,270 nationwide releases and about the same number the year before. Killeulen pointed out the VA will grant a release provided the veteran's loan is current, the purchaser agrees to assume the veteran's liabilities and the prospective purchaser is a good credit risk with sufficient income to meet GI loan mortgage payments.

The regional office director explained that "release from liability" does not automatically restore GI loan entitlement the veteran utilized to purchase the home sold. Restoration can be made, Killeulen stressed, only for what the agency describes as "compelling reasons" for disposing of the property, provided the GI loan has been paid in full.

Where purchasers agree to assume loans, the VA official urged veterans to apply promptly for a release from the VA office which guaranteed the loan.

## Answers on Social Security

Question: I will be getting my first job in a couple of months and I cannot find my social security card. I know I got one several years ago but I must have lost it. What should I do now?

Answer: It is advisable to keep the stub of your card so you will have a separate record of your social security number. If you have kept the stub, you should take it to any social security office to get a duplicate card promptly. If you have not kept the stub, get an application for a new social security card at any post office or social security office. Be sure to fill out the application completely and take it to any social security office along with your driver's license or other evidence of your identity. This application will be used to locate your record and your social security number. Social security will send you a duplicate card with your original number on it in several weeks.

Question: I am going to operate a private summer camp next summer and I will soon be interviewing young people for counselor jobs. The counselors I hire will get free room and board and a small salary. Will I have to pay social security contributions on the value of their room

and board? Answer: Yes. The fair value of their room and board plus their cash salaries are their total earnings for social security purposes and must be reported when you send in the social security contributions for them.

Question: Even though I have been disabled for five years, I cannot get monthly social security checks because I never worked at jobs covered by the program. I am

now 43. Can I buy medicare coverage?

Answer: No. You have to be 65 or over to purchase medicare coverage. Disabled people under 65 can get medicare protection only if they have been entitled to monthly social security disability benefits for 24 consecutive months or more.

# Huron-Michigan Levels Not Feasible to Control

Regulation of the water levels of Lakes Michigan and Huron is not economically feasible; small net benefits could be achieved at nominal cost by a change in the regulation of Lake Superior outflows—at Sault Ste. Marie; regulation of Lake Erie may be economically feasible. These were the principal findings of a comprehensive study of Great Lakes water levels by a team of United States and Canadian engineering experts and contained in a report to the International Joint Commission.

These and other findings and con-

clusions are set out in the 300-page report prepared by the International Great Lakes Levels Board, appointed by the commission in 1965 to conduct the technical study. It involved several hundred engineers and scientists from both countries, using the most up-to-date technology and all available information from both countries.

The report is of great importance to lake shore property owners in Iosco County as well as users of public beaches and other facilities along the erosion-threatened shoreline as commission recommendations to the

two governments are to be based on the findings.

Entitled "Regulation of Great Lakes Water Levels," the report describes the hydrology of the Great Lakes; the development of regulation plans for several combinations of lakes and the projected adverse and beneficial effects of the regulation plans on such interests as shore property, navigation and power. The report contains cost estimates for the regulatory works which would be necessary to implement the regulation plans, as well as an environmental assessment for each plan.

The International Great Lakes Levels Board found that the lakes already possess a remarkably high degree of natural regulation due to the immense storage capacities and restricted outflow characteristics. The construction of new works in the connecting channels to regulate either Lakes Huron and Michigan or Lakes Huron, Michigan and Erie in conjunction with existing control works at the outlets of Lakes Superior and Ontario would not provide benefits commensurate with costs.

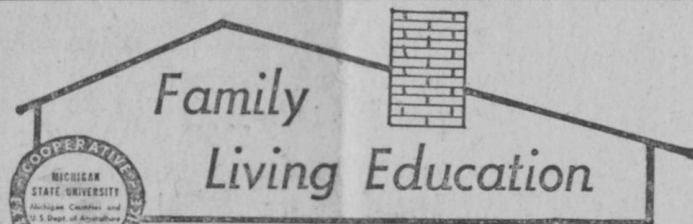
However, the board concluded that small net benefits would be achieved by a regulation plan for Lake Superior outflows which takes into consideration the levels of both Lake Superior and Lakes Huron and Michigan. The board indicated that, in the light of recent unprecedented high water supplies, there is need for further study of possible means for the regulation of Lake Erie and improving the regulation of Lake Ontario to accommodate future water supplies of similar magnitude. The most promising measures for minimizing future damage to shore property interests are land use zoning and structural setback requirements instituted by appropriate authorities.

However, one of the principal problems in instituting such regulations is the fact that the great percentage of the shoreline property is privately owned, has been or is in the process of being developed.

The International Joint Commission, established under the Boundary Waters Treaty of 1909, inquires into problems related to the control and use of boundary waters referred to it by the governments of the United States and Canada and makes recommendations to the two governments for their solution.

The commission will be holding a series of public hearings during the late summer at a number of locations throughout the Great Lakes basin and the St. Lawrence River system to receive the views of all interested persons and their comments on the board's report. The locations of these public hearings are to be announced at a later date.

So you want to lose weight. You are determined—you will take off those unwanted pounds.

But why? Do you want to lose weight so you will look better? Are there health benefits to be gained through weight loss? Do you want the approval of family and friends? Is losing weight part of your master scheme for creating a "new you?" Any of these reasons are valid. The benefits you hope to achieve through weight loss may not provide sufficient motivation to get you through those especially difficult times. So give yourself a little extra incentive. Promise yourself some sort of reward when you have reached your goal.

The reward can be almost anything as long as it is meaningful to you and within range of your pocketbook. A new outfit, a different hair style, a night on the town—you name it. Just be sure it is a reward for which you will be willing to work.

While you are figuring out your motivations and deciding on your reward, let the rest of the family in on your weight loss program. Their understanding, cooperation and consideration can go a long way toward helping you achieve your goal.

Moral support, unfortunately, is not the whole story. Your friends and family can give you encouragement, but they cannot take your exercise for you.

Exercise is one of the two sides of the weight-loss coin. The other side, of course, is food intake management. Any successful weight loss program includes both.

Our motorized, mechanized way of life, with its extension phones, escalators, golf carts, snowblowers, electric can openers, conveniently designed kitchens and suburbs isolated from shopping and service centers that leave no choice but to take the car or bus, has drastically reduced the amount of exercise we get in the course of a day's work.

Planning exercise into your life does not necessarily demand a close acquaintance with sweat-soaked, calisthenics and linament. That sort of exercise is an option, of course. But you can also raise your activity level simply by passing up some of the routine conveniences at your fingertips. Try parking the car at the far end of the parking lot the next time you go shopping. Or get off the bus a stop early and walk the last couple of blocks to work. Take the stairs rather than the escalator. Avoid driving the car when you could walk or ride a bicycle. If a survey of your food habits shows you have a tendency to snack in the middle of the afternoon, substitute a walk outdoors for the needless nibbling. Do not only will you avoid calories you do not need, but you will also work off calories that you otherwise would not have used.

So that is it: Motivation, will power, food management and exercise. It is no magic formula to transform you overnight. It is, however, the safe, sensible, healthful way to a new, slimmer you.
